Stand During the hymn: a cross (made from tree branches or drift wood); baskets containing 'gifts' of earth, air, fire and water; and a harvest loaf may be brought in procession and placed at the front.

Confession

Voice 1	We live in plenty and have more than enough to eat. But so often we ignore the cry of those who are hungry and thirsty. You made a world full of diversity and you welcome the smallest and the least important but we often fail to include those who are different;
All	Lord have mercy Lord have mercy

A red ribbon is placed around the branches of the tree.

Voice 1	God's love for us and for all the world weaves through creation like a red thread
Voice 2	God's love surrounds the earth and is his everlasting gift to us all. It wraps around us in our fear and our hope it surrounds us when we are in darkness and when we are in light; in seasons of plenty and times of joy and in quiet and lonely places when we feel afraid.
Voice 1	God offers us his love when things are going well and when everything has gone wrong.
Voice 2	God's love is a red thread that weaves through the story of God's people: it weaves around us and between us; a red thread that marks the pathway to life.
Voice 1	It is the same love that is shown to us on another tree on a hill a long way away. It is the love that walks with us when we are happy and when we are sad.
Voice 2	It is the love that will find us and bring us home.
Voice 1	It is the love of God, stronger than death, the love that makes all things new.
Voice 2	God's love in Jesus offers us the gift of new life.

Preparation notes

You will need:

- a central candle and method of lighting it
- a large cross created out of driftwood or tree branches
- A prayer tree upon which the prayer leaves will be hung
- a large, wide red ribbon long enough to drape around the branches of the tree
- prayer leaves for all members of the congregation and pens. Each person will need a prayer leaf to hang on the tree during the intercessions. You will need to punch a hole in the top and pre-thread with a sustainably sourced environmentally friendly string. The leaves can be cut out of paper and could also be placed in baskets at strategic points so that people can access them easily.
- a harvest loaf which can be made as a workshop activity.
- large baskets or other containers containing symbols of earth, air, fire and water.

Time to get creative! It is good to choose and/or make the contents of the baskets in groups as a pre-service activity. Try to use natural and tactile materials and consider the variety of colours that reflect earth, air, fire and water. Think about using sustainable materials and materials that can be recycled or that are made from previously recycled materials.

Some suggestions:

Earth: brown and yellow cloth; handful of soil in a bowl; sand; stalks and leaves; berries and flowers; apples; part of a tree branch; an atlas; symbol of the city; stones.

Air: white fabric; fluffy fabric made into the shape of clouds; a balloon cut out of paper; a kite; a bird wing cut out of card; incense.

Fire: red fabric; red orange purple and yellow tissue paper scrunched up to suggest flames; candle; a red heart cut out of paper.

Water: blue fabric; variety of blue scarves with different textures; bowl containing water or scrunched up papers to suggest water; an umbrella; fish shapes cut out of paper; whale shapes; scallop shells; raindrops cut from paper and linked together.

And so much more!

You will need to rehearse the procession and positioning at the front.

The Reflection:

Making a link between the tree in the garden described in Genesis and the tree with leaves 'for the healing of the nations' in another garden at the end of time. In the middle is the tree of crucifixion which makes the new creation possible. Distribute paper leaves and pens, explaining that prayers for healing will be invited during the intercessions.
