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## PREFACE.

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THE County of York, from its extent, opulence, and commercial importance, holds a distinguished rank among the great divisions of this kingdom. Faithfully to delineate the leading features of the history of this county will be considered as an object of laudable ambition, and to accompany that delineation with an enumeration of the most important portion of its inhabitants, their names and residences, is an attempt that has never before been made. The discharge of this duty has been attended with more labour than was at first anticipated, but the public countenance and support have amply compensated the toil. Much candour will be required on the part of the reader towards an undertaking so novel and extensive; some omissions will no doubt be discovered; and a variety of defects will show themselves, which no diligence could wholly prevent. To guard as much as possible against errors, a large proportion of the following sheets have been submitted to the revision of intelligent gentlemen resident in the places described, thereby superadding local knowledge to that laborious attention which has pervaded every department of the work. The necessity of a popular history of the County of York, by which its inhabitants, as well as strangers, might, without travelling through a vast mass of detached and unconnected publications, become familiarly acquainted with the leading characteristics of their own county, has long been felt and acknowledged, and this work may be considered as an essay towards the supply of that topographical *desideratum*. On the advantages of a Directory, which shall exhibit in a methodical arrangement the names and residences, as well of the nobility, gentry, and clergy, as of the professional gentlemen, manufacturers, and persons in trade, in a portion of the kingdom so large and yet so closely connected as the County of York, it is unnecessary to insist; and to combine with these two requisites a County Gazetteer, describing the precise situation and relative bearing of every town, village, and hamlet in Yorkshire, will be considered as the

appropriate completion of the design. The illustrations consist of Maps of the County, and Plans of the leading Towns of Yorkshire, together with Local and General Distance Tables, and Itineraries of the Coach routes of Yorkshire, and of the principal Mail Coach routes throughout England.

In the historical department much information has been derived from the publications of Dr. Whitaker, Mr. Bigland, Mr. Hargrove, Mr. Boothroyd, and Mr. Farrer; and a great number of communications from different Gentlemen in the various parts of the County, relating to the most recent improvements in their respective towns and neighbourhoods, have given to the history a freshness and accuracy which works of some years standing cannot supply, and which local information can alone impart.

In the Alphabetical Classification under the head of "Villages," a number of Hamlets are mentioned, without any names in the way of directory; in such cases, the places are generally very small, and the inhabitants are, for the most part, either labourers or persons confined solely to pursuits unconnected with any trade, except that which arises out of the sale of their produce.

The mutation of human affairs is in nothing more conspicuous than in the pages of a Directory; even while we write changes are taking place; and at the end of three or four years another Directory of Yorkshire will be required, which it is our intention periodically to collect and to supply.

Little requires to be said in EXPLANATION of the plan of this work. The arrangement of the places is made under two alphabetical series; first, of *Towns*; and second, of *Villages*; and for the purpose of easy reference, two Tables of Contents are annexed, the first of *Places*, and the second of *Subjects*.—By the former all the Parishes in the Riding, with their dependant townships, are distinctly pointed out; and by the aid of the latter all the various subjects comprehended in the following pages will be found with facility.



# YORKSHIRE.



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This noble English province was originally inhabited by the Brigantes, the most numerous and powerful of all the British tribes that possessed the Island before the Roman conquest. Traces of their history are co-eval with the Christian era, and when Julius Cæsar invaded this island, 55 years before the birth of Christ, the Brigantes occupied its Northern districts.—It was not till the reign of Vespasian, about the year A. D. 71, that they were overpowered by Cæcælia, and passed under the Roman yoke. From that period, till the arrival of the Emperor Adrian, in 120, little is known of the transactions, military or political, in the northern part of this island; but it is recorded, that this Sovereign repaired in person to Britain, and after constructing an earthen rampart across the island, between the mouths of the rivers Tyne and Eas, took up his residence in Eboracum, subsequently called the City of York. The century which followed, beheld the inhabitants of the north part of the island conquered, but not a subdued people. Revolt succeeded revolt, and in order to quell the restless spirit of the natives, Severus quitted Rome, and repaired to Eboracum, in 207, where he fixed his head-quarters.—The presence of the Romans restrained the warlike spirit of the Brigantes during the third century, and towards its close they enjoyed some semblance of independence under Carausius, but his assassination in

the midst of his projects for the public good enabled Constantius to subject Britain again to the Roman arms. During the greater part of the next hundred years, the Brigantes, with the southern provinces of the island, submitted to their Conquerors; but in 364, the Caledonians renewed their incursions, which they had made from time to time, ever since the invasion of the Romans, and the country was at the same time harassed by the Saxons, whose predatory descents on the coast indicated their intention to seize as a prey a dominion, which imperial Rome now held with a feeble hand.—Dissensions within, and assaults from without, were fast hastening on the overthrow of the mighty Empire of Rome, and in the middle of the 5th century, the Romans finally relinquished all possession, power, and authority in Britain.

Of their long-protracted residence in Yorkshire, the favourite seat of their power and the centre of their British dominion, many striking evidences are found in York, and in other parts of the county. Like a conqueror of modern times, they bestowed extraordinary attention on their public roads, and at a distance of fourteen hundred years, we can trace in legible characters around us, the labours of the mistress of the world.—One great line of Roman road, which traverses the county of York from south to north, is called Wathling or Watling-street, which ran through the whole length of Eng-

land, from Rutupia, in Kent, to the wall of Severus, on the Tyne, intersecting Yorkshire from the edge of Nottinghamshire to the Bishopric of Durham. Bawtry seems to have been the point where it entered the county, and it has been traced by Doucaster, over Scausby and Pigburn Lees to Barnsdale, through Pontefract to Castleford, a little below the junction of the Aire and Calder; from which point the road was conducted by Tadcaster to York. From this city it is conjectured that it took the N.E. side of the Ouse, crossing that river near Aldborough, below Borough-bridge, and thence by Leeming-lane, to Catterick-bridge, (adjoining to which vestiges of Cataractonium are to be seen) where, turning more to the northward, it passed over the Tees at Piers-bridge, into the County of Durham.\* Another military road led from Mancunium, now Manchester, to York; passing through the township of Stainland, it took the way of Almondbury; it afterwards kept the Calder on the left, till it crossed that river about a mile below Dewsbury, where it fell in with the turnpike-road, and continued in the same course to Wakefield. Thence it kept the direction of the present highway, half way to Pontefract, and then turning to the left, joined the military way from Doncaster to York. A Roman road from Chesterfield, by way of Sheffield, Barnsley, Hemsworth, and Ackworth, joined Watling-street at or near Pontefract; and a Vicinal-way appears to have passed through Pontefract in a southerly direction, to the villages of Darrington, Wentbridge, Smeaton, Campsal, and Hatfield, as also northward to Castleford. There are some other Roman roads in the county, but their remains are to be found principally in the East-riding, and will be traced in that portion of the history, which will be contained in the second volume of this work.

After the Romans had abandoned Britain in 426-7, the country sunk into a state of anarchy. Under the Roman dominion, England and Wales contained thirty civitates, governed by their own magistrates, and it is conjectured that the Britons when left to themselves established the same number of republics. Civil discord terminated in the establishment of military tyrannies—"Kings appointed, but not by God, who in their turn gave way to men more ferocious than themselves."† To aggravate the national maladies, the Picts and Scots made

frequent irruptions into England, to which Yorkshire, from its northern situation, was peculiarly exposed, and the Saxons were at length introduced as auxiliaries against these invaders. During the 5th century the history of Yorkshire is lost amidst the general confusion, and all that is known with certainty is, that it formed a British sovereignty under the name of the Kingdom of Deifyra or Deira. Towards the middle of the 6th century, two Anglo-Saxon Chiefs, Ida and Ella, achieved the conquest of the country to the north of the Humber, and in the year 560, Ella began his reign over Deira, the country between the Humber and the Tyne, while Ida's dominion was beyond the latter river. These two kingdoms were united in the person of Ethelfrid, and obtained from their northern situation the name of Northumbria. The Villa Regia, the seat of the Northumbrian Kings, was, it is conjectured, at Osmondthorp, in the parish of Leeds, and at this day there is a figure of Redwald king of the East Angles, in painted glass at the hall, which ancient edifice, is tending fast to decay. The seven Saxon kingdoms constituting the heptarchy were now established; and in the 6th century the Christian religion was introduced into Britain. The religion of the Druids, professed by the ancient Britons, had given way to the gross and barbarous superstitions of the Saxons. No superstition could, indeed be more terrible than that of the Druids; besides the severe penalties which it was in the power of the Priests to inflict in this world, they inculcated the eternal transmigration of souls, and thereby extended their authority prodigiously. They practised their mystic rites in dark groves or other secret recesses; and in order to throw a greater mystery over their religion, they communicated their doctrines only to the initiated, and forbade the committing of them to writing, from the fear that they should at any time be exposed to the examination of the profane vulgar. Human sacrifices were practised among them, and the spoils of war were often devoted to their divinities. The religion of our Saxon ancestors was founded on traditional tales received from their fathers, not reduced to any system. Woden, whom they deemed the ancestor of their Princes, was regarded as the god of war, and was the chief object of their religious worship. They believed, that if they obtained the favour of this divinity by their valour, (for they made little account of other virtues) they should be admitted after death into his hall; and reposing on couches, should satiate themselves with strong drink, from the skulls of their enemies whom they had killed in battle.

Little more is known of their theological tenets. We only learn that they were Polytheists; that they worshipped the Sun and Moon; that they adored the God of Thunder under the name of Thor; that they had images in their temples; practised sacrifices; and believed firmly in spells and incantations. The intention of converting the Anglo Saxons to the Christian religion originated with Pope Gregory the First, surnamed the Great. It happened that this prelate, when in a private station, before he was elevated to the pontifical chair, had observed in the Market-place of Rome some British youths exposed to sale, whom their mercenary parents in that part of Britain now under consideration, had sold to the Roman merchants. Struck with their fair complexions and blooming countenances, Gregory asked to what country they belonged? and being told that they were *Angles*, he replied that they ought more properly to be denominated *Angels*. Inquiring further concerning the name of their province, he was informed that it was *Deira*, a district of Northumbria—*Deira*, replied he, *that is good! They are called to the mercy of God from his anger, De ira. But what is the name of the King of that province? Ella or Alla*, was the reply: *Alludua*, cried he: *We must endeavour that the praise of God be sung in their country.*\* On his elevation to the Popedom, in 590, Gregory dispatched Augustine, a Roman Monk, with forty associates, to preach the Gospel in Britain. The marriage of Ethelbert, the king of Kent, with Bertha, a Christian Princess, secured the missionaries a favourable reception. This auxiliary founder of the Christian religion in Britain, as she may properly be called, had been very assiduous in her devotional exercises, and had supported the credit of her faith by an irreproachable life. Her popularity in the court and her influence over the king, had so well paved the way for the Christian doctrine, that Ethelbert himself became a convert: Augustine was created Archbishop of Canterbury, and Christianity obtained a footing which it has never since lost in this island. Edwin, the King of Northumbria, on ascending the throne of his father, from which he had been unjustly expelled by Ethilfrid, married Ethelburga, the daughter of Ethelbert, king of Kent, who, emulating the glory of her mother Bertha, became the instrument of converting her husband and his people to Christianity, and about the year 626, procured the elevation of Paulinus, another Roman missionary, to the dignity of the

first Christian Archbishop of York. The lapse of two more centuries beheld Northumbria merged in the kingdom of Wessex, which finally swallowed up all the other Saxon states. Of these, Northumbria was the last that resigned its independence. In the year 837, Egbert advanced from the conquest of Mercia to that of Northumbria, when Eanfrid and his court, perceiving that all resistance would be vain, suffered his kingdom to become tributary to the crown of Wessex. The successful invasion of the Danes followed in 867, and from an Anglo-Saxon, Northumbria became a Danish kingdom, of which Inquar was the King, and York his seat of government. For nearly a hundred years the Danes had the dominion of this part of the kingdom, but in 951 their power in Yorkshire was subverted by Edred, and the ancient kingdom of Northumbria degraded to an earldom.

The boundaries of the Saxon and afterwards of the Danish kingdom of Northumbria, varied with the fortune of war: in general, however, it extended from the Humber to the Tweed, and from the German ocean to the Irish channel. At what period England was divided into counties, hundreds, and tithings, is uncertain, but it is the generally received opinion, that these divisions were made in the reign of Alfred, surnamed the Great. The derivation of the word shire, is from the Saxon word *Seyran*, to divide; at the time of the Domesday survey, which took place between the years 1086 and 1083, the county of York was called *Eurewiccschire*, and comprehended nearly its present limits. At an early period of the Saxon dominion the county of York was subdivided into three districts, which are still recognised under the corrupted name of ridings, or as the word was anciently written *tri-hings*. The North Riding is divided into 12 wapentakes, the East into seven, and the West into ten, (exclusive of the Ainsty) these twenty-nine wapentakes are again sub-divided into parishes, of which there are in the whole county 563, and 243 vicarages. The origin of the word wapentake, which corresponds to the hundred of the more Southern counties, is not very well ascertained; but Thoresby, the venerable historian of Leeds, quoting from Matthew Paris, who himself quotes from Hoveden, gives of it the following explanation;—"When a person received the government of a wapentake, at the appointed time and usual place the elder sort met him; and when he had got off his horse rose up to him; then he held up his spear, and took security of all present, according to custom; who ever came touched his spear with their's, and by

this touch of armour were confirmed in one common interest; and thus from *pæpnu* (weapons) & *tac* (a touch) or *taccaye* (to confirm) they were called wapentakes.\* This county contains 4684 square miles or 3,770,000 square acres, being 100 miles long, 75 broad, and 360 in circumference. It pays a twenty-fourth part of the land-tax, and provides 2360 men for the regular militia.—It comprehends one archiepiscopal city, and 59 market towns, of which 13 are parliamentary boroughs, namely, Malton, Northallerton, Richmond, Scarborough and Thirsk, in the North riding; Beverley, Hedon and Hull, in the East riding; and Ald-

borough, Boroughbridge, Knaresbro', Pontefract and Ripon, in the West riding. At present Yorkshire returns thirty members to parliament, namely, two for the county, two for the city of York, and two for each of the above boroughs; but by an act passed in the year 1831, the number of the members for the county will, from and after the next dissolution of parliament, be increased to four.† The freeholders in the county of York far exceed in number those of any other county in the kingdom. The great contested election of 1807, made a pretty ample disclosure of their amount, when the numbers, at the close of the 15 days' contest, stood thus:—

From which it appears that 14 years ago, upwards of 23,000 freeholders gave their suffrages for county members, and it is probable that 3000 at least did not vote. Since that period, there is no reason to suppose that the number has been diminished, and it may therefore fairly be presumed, that we have at present in this county at least 26,000 persons who, in right of their freehold property, are entitled to vote for county members. According to the census of 1811 the number of inhabitants in this county amounted to 973,113. The returns of 1821, as far as they have been made to parliament, are now before us, but those for the East Riding are not quite complete;† they are however sufficiently so to show that an increase of more than one-tenth on the whole numbers has taken place during the last ten years, and the aggregate number of souls in this division of the kingdom may now be safely stated at eleven hundred thousand. The principal increase has, as usual, been in the West Riding, where the numbers have within that period been swelled from 653,315 to 750,000.

The county of York presents a great variety of surface. The North riding consists principally of two hilly regions, sepa-

rated by a comparatively low tract, which opens on the South, into the spacious vale of York. In the East riding, the face of the country, although varied, is less boldly characterised than in the North. It is divided in the middle by the Wolds, into two extensive plains, and towards the sea the coast of this riding is in general low, when compared with that of the North riding. Considered as to extent and population, the West riding is by far the most important division of Yorkshire. Its surface is very irregular, varying from the low marshy tracts in the east, to the bold and mountainous country of the West. The level marshes are a continuation of those of the East riding, and extend almost to Doncaster. Further westward lies the middle division of the West riding, gradually and beautifully swelling into hills and extending to Sheffield, Huddersfield, Halifax, and Skipton. Beyond these towns the country becomes rugged and mountainous, and is composed chiefly of black moors, which terminate in the lofty range of hills, bordering on Lancashire. These hills are not without many beautiful and romantic valleys, and when beauty is absent, it is often compensated by magnificence of scenery.

In the West riding, to which, in this volume, the history before us will be confined, soils of every kind are to be found, from deep strong clay and rich loam, to the poorest peat earth. Clay and loam, mingled with a portion of sand and moor,

prevail in the East district of this riding, while the middle division consist chiefly of loam on a lime-stone base. Similar soils extend through the West parts, but they are frequently interrupted by tracts of moor, of different degrees of fertility. The climate, like the soil, is much diversified. In the hilly parts of the riding, the climate is windy, cold, and stormy. At Sheffield, although on the South border of the county, the quantity of rain which falls in a year averages 33 inches, though the general average throughout England does not exceed 26 inches. It is indeed found by experience, that the lofty tracts which separate Yorkshire, Lancashire and Cheshire, are full as subject to fogs, rain, and storms, as any part of the British Islands. The air is however pure and healthy, and in these insipidous parts of the Island human life seems of so long duration as in milder and more healthy regions. The middle and less elevated tracts of the West riding are milder and less humid; holding a desirable medium between the tempestuous heights of the mountains in the West, and the dull fogs and damps which usually beset the low marshy country in the East.

The mountains of the West and North Eastern parts of this county are amongst the most elevated in the North of England. They are a portion of the chain, which, commencing Southward in Staffordshire, extends with increased elevation through Derbyshire, Lancashire, Westmoreland, Cumberland and Northumberland, into Scotland, and has attained the name of the Backbone of England. In that portion of the range which belongs to Yorkshire, are several summits of very considerable elevation above the sea. Of these the most remarkable, are Pennigant, on the confines of that division of the West riding called Craven,\* which rises, according to barometrical measurement, to the height of 3930 feet; Ingleborough, 3987; and Wharfedale, 4052 feet. The last mentioned mountain is the highest in England and Wales; fir Croesfell, on the borders of Cumberland, is only 3839 feet; Skiddaw, 3530; and Snowden, the highest in Wales, 3566. Ben Nevis, a detached mountain in the North of Scotland, and the most elevated in the British Isles, rises to the height of 4387. In the vicinity of the Craven mountains there are some extraordinary caves, a species of stupendous natural excavations, which attract the attention of the admirers of the sublime, as much as the views from the mountains afford delight by the beautiful and expansive scenery which they command. The cave of Yordas, in the

vale of Kingdale; Hurtlepot near the head of the subterranean river Wensle, or Greta; Ginglepot, near the same place; Weathercoat cave, a stupendous subterranean cataract, whose top is on the same level with the adjoining lands; and Douk cave, near the foot of Ingleborough, with several other caves, may rank amongst the most striking curiosities of this kind in the kingdom; and the eastward, about 300 feet high, of Malham Cove, which is almost double the height of Niagara, with the curious lake, called Malham Tarn, give to a rugged country more interest than the richest scenery of a tamer description can impart.

The great body of the waters of Yorkshire take their course from West to East, and unite with the Humber, at its approach to the German ocean. Of these rivers, the most northern is the Swale, which, rising at Hollow Mill Cross, in the West moor lands, enlivens the romantic Swale-dale, and after visiting Richmond, bends its course to the South East, until it reaches Myton, two miles below Boroughbridge, where it unites with the Ure. The Ure, rising in the same mountainous region, at Lady's Pillar, between Yorkshire and Westmoreland, and within five miles of the source of the Swale, after collecting many tributary streams in its course through the romantic vale of Wensley, becomes a boundary between the North and the West ridings, three miles below Masham, till it reaches the vicinity of Ripon, and having received the Swale at Myton, continues its course to about six miles below Boroughbridge, where the united rivers take the name of the Ouse, from an insignificant rivulet with which they there form a junction. Under this last appellation, the stream, still further augmented by the waters of the Nidd, flows through the city of York, where it is joined by the Foss, and becomes the limit between the East and the West ridings; being navigable for large barges up to that city: in its winding course to the South, it receives the Wharf, the Aire, and the Don, and in conjunction with the Trent, disappears in the estuary of the Humber. The Wharf, which rises near Green Field, five miles South of Pennigant, and waters the beautiful district of Wharfedale, after passing Otley, Harewood, Wetherby, and Tadcaster, in a course of more than 50 miles, discharges itself into the Ouse, a little below the village of Nun-Appleton. The Aire, one of the most considerable rivers of Yorkshire, rises at Malham, within 20 miles of the source of the Wharf, and about the same distance from the Ribbles, and flows for 30 miles in a South East direction, along the winding valley of Airedale, to Leeds, up to which

town it is navigable. It then proceeds to Castleford, the *Legiolium* of Antoninus.—Near that place it receives the Calder, which rising in the high grounds on the edge of Lancashire, takes an Easterly direction, leaving Halifax at a distance of nearly two miles, and passes by Dewsbury to Wakefield, from which it runs nearly North East to Castleford. From that place the Aire, augmented by the influx of the Calder, holds an easterly course, till after passing within a short distance of Snaith, it runs nearly North East to its confluence with the Ouse, a little below Armin. The Don, which rising in the Western moors above Penistone, flows in a South Easterly direction to Sheffield, where it turns to the North East, and passing by Rotherham, Conisbrough and Doncaster, continues its course along a flat country, by Thorne, when taking a direction due North, it runs to the neighbourhood of Snaith, where it joins Vermulden's canal, usually called the Dutch river, and afterwards falls into the Ouse, at the village of Goole. The Nidd, rising at the North Western extremity of the picturesque valley of Netherdale, directs its course past Pateley-bridge, Ripley and Knaresbrough, and falls into the Ouse at Nun-Monkton. The Skell is a small river, which runs a few miles North of Pateley-bridge, and passing by Fountain's Abbey, and through that part of Ripon called Skelgate, empties itself into the Ure at that place. These are the principal rivers of the West riding, and by their agency they contribute daily to the comfort and prosperity of its inhabitants.\*

Auxiliary to the rivers, and scarcely inferior in importance, are the various canals which intersect this Riding; the principal of which, taken in alphabetical order, are:—the Barnsley canal, 15 miles in length, which commences in the lower part of the river Calder, a little below Wakefield, and taking a South direction, unites with the Dearn and Dove canal, near Barnsley, and opens a line of inland navigation between Sheffield, Rotherham, Barnsley, Wakefield, Leeds, Huddersfield, Manchester and Liverpool: The Bradford canal, three miles in length, commences in the Leeds and Liverpool canal at Windhill, in the parish of Idle, and terminates at Bradford, where rail-ways of considerable extent connect it with the coleries and iron works of Low Moor and Bowling: The Dearn and Dove canal, nine miles in length, commences in a side cut on the river Don, between Swinton and Mex-

borough, and taking a North West direction, terminates in the Barnsley canal, at Eyming's Wood: The Huddersfield canal, nineteen and a half miles in length, commences in Sir John Rameden's canal, at Huddersfield, and crossing the grand ridge in Saddleworth, by one of the longest tunnels in the kingdom, terminates in the Manchester, Ashton and Oldham canal, at Duckenfield Bridge, in the parish of Ashton-under-Line, near which the Peak Forest canal also joins it: The Leeds and Liverpool canal commences in the town of Liverpool, on the right bank of the Mersey, and terminates in the Aire and Calder navigation, in Leeds, after having in its course of 130 miles, passed and enriched Ormskirk, Wigan, Blackburn, Burnley and Colne, in Lancashire, and Skipton, Keighley, Bingley, and Bradford, in Yorkshire: The Rameden canal, four miles in length, commences in the Calder and Hebble navigation, at Cooper's Bridge, and terminates in the Huddersfield canal, at the King's Mills, near Huddersfield: The Ripon canal and navigation commences in the Ure river, at Milby, near Borough-bridge, and terminates, after a course of 7 miles, at Ripon: The Rochdale canal, thirty-one and a half miles in length, commences in the Duke of Bridgewater's canal, at Castlefield, in Manchester, and after passing by Rochdale, crosses the grand ridge, by a deep cut, and terminates its course in the Calder and Hebble navigation, at Sowerby Bridge, two miles from Halifax: The Stainforth and Keadby canal, of the length of fifteen miles, in the counties of Lincoln and York, commences in the Trent, at Keadby, and taking Thorn in its line, terminates in the Don, at Fishlake, near Stainforth: The Tinsley canal commences at Sheffield, and terminates in the Don at Tinsley, a village to the North East, at about an equal distance between Rotherham and Sheffield. It is worthy of remark, that all these public works have been undertaken and completed in that period of national improvements comprehended between the 10th year of the reign of George III. and the first year of his successor, George IV.

The agricultural improvements in Yorkshire have been very extensive, and every species of amelioration of the soil which the industry, skill, and capital of the inhabitants could apply, has been brought into action. In the West-Riding, the farms are generally small, and in

the environs of the manufacturing towns, a great portion of the ground is occupied by the inhabitants, for the use of their families. To the eastward of Leeds, Wakefield, and Sheffield, a great part of the Riding is corn land. In addition to grain of all sorts, flax is cultivated in the marsh lands to a considerable extent; and in the Ainsty of York mustard is now a valuable article of cultivation, though it is still considered as the produce of Durham. In the wapentake of Barkston-Ash, comprehending the eastern boundary of the West-Riding, Tansles, a production almost peculiar to this part of the county, are grown to a considerable extent, and are purchased by the cloth dressers, for the purpose of raising the nap on the cloth before it is submitted to the operation of the shears. Liquorice is another of the productions of this Riding, and grows to great perfection in the deep loamy soil of Pontefract. The horses of Yorkshire have long been universally famed, but they are principally produced in the North and East Ridings. The horned cattle of Yorkshire are of various kinds, adapted to the nature of their pastures, and the uses for which they are employed, and Craven ranks deservedly high as a grazing district. The sheep in the various parts of the county are extremely different in their nature and properties, and in the West-Riding they have been very much improved by the introduction of the Leicestershire breed. Those bred on the west moors and hills of this Riding, when brought down early to pasture in the low grounds, become very valuable for food. The West-Riding produces a considerable quantity of timber; and the oak and ash from this district are used for ship-building, and in the various departments of the manufacture; much is also consumed in coal and other mines. In the vicinity of Sheffield, the Duke of Norfolk possesses about 1500 acres of wood land. According to a calculation made in 1799, the waste land in this Riding amounted to upwards of 400,000 acres, of which one-third seemed to be proper for planting only, and a large proportion of the high lands not even for that. Planting, though a certain, is yet so distant a profit, that not many persons choose to embark a capital in this way.

The mineral productions of the West-Riding are of peculiar value, they create and supply the manufactures; they consist of coal, iron, and stone; and lead is extracted in great abundance from the mines of Grassington and Pateley-Bridge. The West-Riding, indeed, yields in geological interest, to no equal space in the kingdom. In this portion

of the island, four clearly marked divisions present themselves;

*First*, on the East a great marshy district, described by the appropriate name of the "Levels."

*Second*, the range of Magnesian Limestone.

*Third*, the Coal Tract.

*Fourth*, the Moorlands and Metalliferous Limestone, or Mining District.

THE LEVELS rest on the great stratum of red clay and sand, with gypsum or alabaster in varying quantity. The sand rises in the vicinity of Snaith, Thorne, and Doncaster, above the general level, into low fertile hills. Their altitude above the sea seldom exceeds 50 feet. The great rivers Ouse, Aire, and Don, which traverse this extensive tract, have often changed their channels, and from the vast quantity of mud suspended in them during the agitation of the tide, have rendered great service to agriculture, by the facility afforded to the profitable operation of *warping*.

THE MAGNESIAN LIMESTONE RANGE is marked by peculiar features. Its surface is one great plain rising from beneath the Levels, and terminating toward the West in a regular, well defined edge, forming at once the limit of the horizon, and the partial summit of drainage. Its altitude seldom exceeds 400 feet from the sea. Clifton, near Rotherham, is thought to be the highest point in its course. It forms a narrow course of dry land in a northerly direction, from Tickhill by Doncaster, Ferrybridge, Wetherby, Knaresborough, and Ripon. The lime burnt from the laminated upper part is of great value as manure; that from the lower or freestone part is excellent for building.

THE COAL TRACT includes a great number of alternations of sandstone, clay, shale, coal, and ironstone, and occupies the most populous part of the West-Riding. It is characterised by successive parallel ranges of high ground, whose longest general course is nearly North and South. These hills are most abrupt toward the west, while on the east they decline more gradually, one beneath another, and all beneath the magnesian limestone range, which among practical colliers is vaguely asserted to "cut off the coal."—The minute varieties in this extensive tract are innumerable; it may be sufficient to notice the more prominent features in their order of superposition. Beneath the magnesian lime and its subjacent sand appear the blue shale and thin coal of the vale of Went, succeeded by the grit freestone of Aekworth and Kirby. Beneath occur the swift burning

coals of Wragby, Shafton, Crofton, and other places in the great clay district of the Dearn below Barnsley, and of the Calder below Wakefield. These various measures rest upon the coarse grit freestone of Rotherham, Barnsley, Newmiller Dam, and East Ardsley. Coal pits are sunk through it near Barnsley, to several thick seams of hard furnace coal, one of them 10 feet thick. The next great rock forms high ground, and frequently projects beyond the general range into detached hills. It occurs near Sheffield, Wentworth Park, and Bretton Park, forms the high ground of Horbury and Dewsbury, and of Middleton, near Leeds. Beneath are the valuable beds of iron-stone, which are characterized by abundance of muscle shells, found near Rotherham, Haigh bridge, Low Moor, and several other ironworks. Contiguous to the ironstone lie several veins of excellent coal. These soft strata, where they occur in steep banks under the preceding rock, are often covered with woods. Still lower in the series lies the rock of Wortley chapel, Silkston, Elmley, and Whitley hall, with the valuable bituminous coals of Silkston and Flockton, the best seams of the Yorkshire series. This rock, characterized by the smooth plain surfaces which it forms, enters the West Riding from Derbyshire, and passing by Sheffield, Penistone, Huddersfield, Elland Edge, and Clayton Heights, returns in a course parallel to the Aire river, by Idle and Chapel Allerton toward the magnesian limestone. In this part of the series, near Sheffield, Bradford, and Leeds, is dug the galliard stone, so much in request for the roads.

IN THE MOORLANDS, below the flagstone are seldom found thick or good seams of coal, and though in the vast surface of moorlands formed by the millstone grit, and its numerous alternations thin seams frequently occur, and in certain situations are worked with advantage, it seems proper to consider them as belonging to a completely distinct part of the coal measures. Characterised by its irregular texture, and numerous quartz pebbles and a tendency to form crags, this rock, with soft alternations above and beneath, occupies the wide and barren moors west of Sheffield, Penistone, Huddersfield, Bradford, Otley, Harrogate, Ripley, and Masham. Yet in lower ground good soil often covers its decomposing blocks. It is a most durable building stone, and great quantities are annually sent down the rivers Don and Aire. Proofs of its imperishability may be seen in the two finest abbeys of Yorkshire—Kirkstall and Fountain's, both constructed wholly of this stone.

THE MINING DISTRICT is, in some parts of the North, exceeding variable in features, occupying either high or low ground, producing, or not producing metallic ores. In the West Riding it is chiefly confined to lower ground than the moors of the millstone grit, and to the vales by the large rivers, which derive from it much of their fertility. The greatest extent of this limestone series is in Craven, where ores appear far less abundant than in the vales of Nidd and Wharfe. In Craven the series consist almost exclusively of limestone, without those numerous and clearly marked alternations of grit and plate, so useful to the miners of the northern dales. Wharfedale, Ingleborough, and Pennigant, and other lofty mountains, which, on the western verge of Yorkshire, become part of the summit ridge of the island, though their tops are crowned with coal measures, derive much of their altitude from a limestone base. Hougill Fells, on the western boundary, consist of the blue slate rock of Westmoreland, which has received from some eminent mineralogists, the name of Grauwacke slate. This district has peculiar features, and rises suddenly from under the limestone of Wild-bear Fell, to a height scarcely inferior to the loftiest points of the coal and limestone series—with this single exception, the limestone series are the lowest strata, or general base of the county.

The general divisions before adverted to, are so clearly defined by nature, as to admit of a lucid description, and a pretty correct estimate of the spaces of surface they severally occupy. Taking the West Riding at 100 parts:—

The Levels cover .....	20 Parts.
Magnesian Lime .....	8
Coal Tract.....	21
Moors and Mining District..	51

The general inclination of all the various strata which occur in these wide divisions is toward some point near the East, or as the colliers express it, toward the "six, nine, ten, or eleven o'clock sun." There are, however, many partial declinations to all the other points of the compass; of these local "dips" the most prevailing is that towards the south. This may be observed to affect all the strata near Leeds, in their eastward course to the magnesian limestone, near Aberford, and it is thought that the southern dip carries the coal measures quite under that limestone, to an unknown extent, thereby shrouding that valuable series from the research of the collier, until past the river Tees, on the northern verge of the county.



An inspection of Geological Maps\* demonstrates that the coal of the West Riding, narrowed as it is by the unconformed magnesian lime, and the millstone grit, is the largest, most regular, and most valuable coal field in the island. This interesting district deserves, and will amply repay the most careful investigation. In one respect only is there a chance of disappointment. The fossil shells, which adorn and render interesting every stone in the southern counties of England, are comparatively very scarce in Yorkshire; although the lovers of mineral chemistry and crystallography will not meet with that profusion of specimens which other districts afford, the Geologist, regarding with surprise the perfect regularity of the series, the distinctness of character and great variety of the strata, and the grand and striking features of the whole, will acknowledge that no district of equal extent surpasses in variety of interest the West Riding of Yorkshire.

The West Riding contains several mineral waters of great virtue and celebrity; and the chalybeate and sulphureous springs of Harrogate, which will be found described and analyzed in the subsequent pages of this volume, have long held a high reputation. Askern, Ilkley, and Thorp-Arch, rank among the spas of the West Riding, and are noticed in their proper place.

The manufactures of Yorkshire, especially of the West Riding, are of the first importance to the county, and to the kingdom, as well as to the multitudes to whom they furnish employment and wealth. The principal inducement for the establishment of these great works in the interior of the country, was the plentiful supply of water and fuel, for giving motion to machinery and for the various other operations of the several branches of industry. The two distinguishing manufactures of the county are woollen fabrics, and cutlery wares; the particulars of the former of which will be found in the histories of Leeds, Huddersfield, Halifax, and Bradford; and the latter in the history of Sheffield, in the subsequent pages of this volume. These manufactures have a very powerful effect in promoting the agricultural productions of the districts wherein they prevail, both by affording a ready market for every article of provision, and by converting land originally sterile into a generous and productive soil.

In addition to the extensive improvements in agriculture and commerce, a vast increase in the amount and diffusion of real property has taken place in this riding within the last century. This fact is of public notoriety, and a kind of specific confirmation is given to it by the number of suffrages conferred on some of the gentlemen, who, in successive periods have filled the office of Register. It is very generally known, that in the year 1704, an act passed the legislature, for establishing an office at Wakefield, for the registration of deeds, conveyances, and wills, within the West Riding of the county of York, and that it was at the same time enacted, that a public officer, to be styled a Registrar, should be elected by ballot to fill that office, the right of election to be in persons possessing freehold property in the riding, to the amount of £100 a year. For upwards of thirty years no contest took place, and consequently no information as to the number of freeholds was collected from this source: But in the year 1749, the election was warmly contested by three candidates, when Mr. Hitch was elected, and the whole number of voters then amounted to 607. In 1809, at Mr. Busfield's election, they had increased to 1733; and at the election of Mr. Hawksworth, the present Register, in 1817, no fewer than 2844 electors gave their suffrages; from which it will appear, that in a period of less than 70 years, the number of hundred pound freeholders have been quadrupled.

The antiquities of Yorkshire are very numerous, and the most remarkable of them are the ancient castles and sacred edifices. In York, the Keep, or Clifford's tower, is almost all that remains, above the surface, of the ancient castle, but this fabric, along with the minster, will come under review in its proper place. The castle of Conisbrough, west of Doncaster, is one of the most interesting edifices of the kind in England; of this ancient structure, as well as of the castles of Harewood, Knaresbro', Pontefract, Sheffield, Skipton, and Sandal, notices will be found under their proper heads, and those of the East and North Ridings will follow in due course. The number of religious houses erected within the county of York, and all of which have now gone to decay, amounted according to Benton,\* to 106; namely, 14 abbeys, 44 priories, 7 alien priories, 13 cells, and 28 houses of friars of various orders. Of these establishments the ruins of several houses still exist, and some of them exhibit very picturesque and attractive monuments

of ancient devotion and liberality. St. Mary's Abbey, adjoining to York, gives sufficient indications of its original grandeur; and Fountain's Abbey, in the grounds of Studley, and Kirkstall Abbey, in Airedale, as well as Bolton Abbey, in Craven, and Sawley Abbey, on the confines of Lancashire, have attracted admiration for ages past, and will be the resort of the curious for ages to come.

In ecclesiastical affairs the county of York, is wholly and immediately under the superintendance of the archbishop. The suffragans of his grace are, the bishops of Carlisle, Chester, Durham, and the Isle of Man; the latter is styled Bishop of Sodor, (the southern isles of Scotland) and Man; and as he presides over a diocese not formerly pertaining to England, he has no seat in the house of peers. Under the archbishop, ecclesiastical affairs are conducted by archdeacons, an officer first introduced into this diocese by Thomas the Norman, in 1070.—Prior to the conquest, the Saxon prelates sat in the courts with the earls and sheriffs for the administration of justice, but the Conqueror separated the ecclesiastical from the civil jurisdiction, by enacting that no bishop or archdeacon, should in future hold ecclesiastical pleas in the hundred court, nor suffer any cause of a spiritual nature to come under the cognizance of secular persons. At that time it was not decided whether the superiority belonged to the see of Canterbury or York, and in succeeding ages the disputes on this point became high and acrimonious; but in the reign of Edward III. an arrangement was accomplished between the contending prelates, which in reality gave the superiority to Canterbury, and at which time the casuistical and puerile distinction, which still exists, was introduced, by which the Archbishop of York is styled *Primate of England*, and his brother of Canterbury, *Primate of all England*. In modern times the Dissenters have become very numerous in the West Riding of Yorkshire, and the Methodists have not only large and costly edifices for religious worship in the principal towns of the Riding, but a neat and commodious chapel in almost every village.

The nobles of the West Riding are the Dukes of Norfolk and Devonshire; the Marquesses of Hertford and Conyngham; the

Earls Fitzwilliam, Mexbrough, Westmoreland, Effingham, Dartmouth, Thanet, Scarborough, Darlington, and Harewood; Lords Grantham, Hawke, Grantley, Headley, Stourton, Downs, and Howden.

The titles conferred by the city of York and the West Riding are as follow:—York gives the title of Duke to the present presumptive heir to the throne of these realms, and of Archbishop to the Right Reverend Father in God, Edw. Venables Vernon. Leeds gives the title of Duke, to the Osbornes; Doncaster, that of Earl, to the Scotts; Pontefract, to the Fecmore; Craven, to the Boyles; and Harewood, to the Lancelles; Sheffield, that of Baron, to the Holroyd family; Westworth, to the Noels; Rawdon, to the Rawdons; Hastings Towton, to the Hawkes; Wortley, to the Stuarfs; Markenfield, to the Nortons; and Gisburne Park, to the Listers.

Amongst the vast body of eminent men born in this county, may be mentioned Constantine, the Great, born at York, about the year 274; and John Wickliff, "The Morning Star of the Reformation," born in the parish of Wycliff, in the year 1324.

The inhabitants of this portion of the kingdom are distinguished by simplicity of manners, quick perception, and frank dispositions. They are ingenious, laborious and frugal, and as a natural consequence, they have become an opulent community—more anxious to acquire riches, than ostentatiously to display them. Their innumerable charitable institutions form the best evidence of their benevolence, and their exemplary attention to the instruction of youth, the surest test of an enlightened state of the public mind. In all places these generous and patriotic exertions are praiseworthy; but in the West Riding of Yorkshire, where the change in the manufacturing system, and the rapidly augmenting population, have so great a tendency to deteriorate the public morals, they become absolutely indispensable. By thus counteracting evils as they arise, the character of the county is upheld. It has already been shown, that from the earliest ages of British history, Yorkshire has held an eminent rank in the nation of which it forms the largest division, and after the lapse of eighteen centuries, it still maintains its elevated station.

# Historic Sketch

OF THE

# TOWN OF LEEDS.

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*Historic Sketches of the Out-Towns of the Borough, as well as the Names of the Inhabitants, are given under their proper Heads. See general Index.*

LEEDS is the principal seat of the Woolen Manufacture in England. It is situated in the West-Riding of the County of York, in the Wapentake of Skyrack, and in the Liberty of the Honour of Pontefract. Its situation is peculiarly favourable for trade and commerce. The river Aire, which passes through the town, towards its southern boundary, is navigable from the Humber up to the town; and the Leeds and Liverpool Canal, which is now open through the whole line, has a direct communication with the Aire within a quarter of a mile from Leeds bridge. Placed, therefore, in the middle of that line of fine inland navigation which extends here without interruption across the island, it is equally open to the Eastern and Western Seas, having an easy communication with the great depots of commerce that have arisen on the opposite shores of the kingdom, with Hull on the one hand, and Liverpool on the other. The commercial facilities of Leeds are still improving. The undertakers of the Aire and Calder Navigation are at the present moment forming a new Canal, under the sanction of a Parliamentary enactment, from Knottingley lock, to the river Ouse, at Goole, capable of admitting vessels drawing six feet and a half of water, and with an eighteen feet beam. In connection with this important public work, an alteration is taking place in the

locks from Leeds to Castleford, which will be made 18 feet wide, and by which Leeds will become a port for vessels fit to navigate the German Ocean. When these improvements are made, the merchandise will be conveyed in one bottom, not only to London and the other ports of England, but also to various parts of the Continent. The Aire also supplies the town amply with water, as the neighbouring mines supply it with coals, the other prime necessary in the arts; and to these local advantages, together with the other circumstances which have rendered this district the seat of the woolen manufactures, its increasing wealth, population and prosperity, are chiefly to be ascribed. The town stands on the slope, and partly on the summit of a hill, which rises from the north bank of the river, and from the top declines into the east, west, and north.—The town extends about a mile and a half along the river from east to west, but is not quite a mile in breadth from south to north. The northern is connected with the southern part of the town by a substantial free-stone bridge, over which the traffic is so immense as to have long ago suggested the necessity for additional bridges to communicate with the heart of the town; but though several eligible situations present themselves for the erection of these important edifices, certain difficulties have, for many years, stood in

the way of this public accommodation, but these difficulties, we have reason to hope, are now mainly removed. The most eligible situation, and that which would, more than any other, relieve the present bridge, is that point near to which the Leeds and Liverpool Canal forms a junction with the Aire, to be thrown over the river from Water-Lane to the School Close, in a line with Neville-Street. The Monk-pits have also been mentioned as a suitable site for a new bridge, and would doubtless form an advantageous situation, though certainly not equally eligible with that we have mentioned. A stone bridge, about a mile higher up the river than the old bridge, has been lately erected near Park-mills. This beautiful structure consists of one arch, 100 feet in the span, and is from a design by Rennie. Wellington-bridge, which name the new edifice has received, is too far removed from the centre of the town to afford any very general benefit; its accommodation is chiefly confined to the villages of Armley and Wortley, and its advantage to the proprietors of the estates through which the new roads leading to it pass: It cost £7000.

The Parish of Leeds, which is pretty nearly co-extensive with the Borough, extends about 7 miles from north to south, and about 7 miles  $2\frac{1}{4}$  furlongs from east to west, and is 30 miles in circumference. It is divided into ten townships, exclusive of the township of Leeds, which includes the village of Woodhouse.

The soil of the parish is a coarse strong clay, of which excellent bricks and tiles are made. The Romans seem to have appreciated its value, as considerable remains of works, in which they have made use of these articles, have been discovered in the neighbourhood. This covers a finer stratum, which is made into an inferior kind of earthenware. Under this is a thin bed of coal, and lower still is a thin bed of clay, of which fire-bricks, equal to any in England, are manufactured. A kind of clay abounds about Wortley, which is much used in the manufacture of tobacco-pipes. There are no fewer than three distinct beds of coal, which are all in use. The heights in the vicinity of the town furnish very good free-stone and flags, and on the north-east border of the parish there is a bed of imperfect granite, or moor-stone. The strata of siliceous grit abound in organic remains, many of which are extremely curious. The northern boundary is sandy and sterile, but the land in the immediate vicinity of the town is more fertile.

The name of Leeds is supposed by some to be derived from the British *Cær*

*Loid Coll*,—a town in a wood. Others think the town to have been the property of some chief of the name of Lede or Leod. It is not improbable that it may owe its name to our German ancestors, as there is a town called Leeds on the river Dender, in Austrian Flanders, and not far from it a village called Holbeck.

Many vestiges of Saxon antiquities have been discovered in Leeds and the neighbourhood; and Thoresby thinks there must have been a town here in the time of the Romans, though we find no trace of it in their maps. Dr. Whitaker has little doubt that the Roman road from Calcaria to Cambodunum traversed the present site of the town of Leeds, in the line of Briggate, and that there was a *trajectus* nearly on the site of the present bridge. The earliest mention of the town occurs in Bede, who wrote above 1,000 years ago.

The Parish of Leeds has produced several eminent persons. JOHN HARRISON, Esq. was its distinguished benefactor, and has left, in the various charities of which he was the founder, an imperishable memorial. He built and endowed St. John's Church, founded an Hospital, and built the Free School; he also erected a Cross for the convenience of the Market. In the latter part of his life this benevolent man became deeply involved in the political calamities of the times. He was charged, falsely as it should appear, with having sent three horses to King Charles, during the contests between that monarch and his parliament, for which he was condemned to suffer sequestration of the poor pittance which he had reserved for the support of old age, and died in indigence on the 29th of October, 1656, aged 77 years. The spirit of generosity which distinguished Mr. Harrison seems to have pervaded another member of his family in almost an equal degree.—From the monument of his great nephew, the Rev. H. ROBINSON, M.A. in Trinity Church, we learn that the benefactions of that gentleman amounted to no less a sum than £5,595.

CHRISTOPHER SAXTON, the chorographer, is supposed to have been a native of this place. RALPH THORESBY, the antiquarian, and the author of the *Ducatus Leodiensis* and the *Vicaria Leodiensis*, drew his first breath, and passed his life, in the place of which he was the worthy historian. EDWARD FAIRFAX, the poet, the translator of Tasso, and a near relation of the celebrated commander of the parliamentary army, was for some time resident here; and Dr. DAVID HARTLEY, the pupil of Sir Isaac Newton, and the author of 'Observations on Man,' was the son of a clergyman

at Armley. GENERAL GUEST, the distinguished commander of the King's troops at Edinburgh, in 1745, was a native of Leeds, and the son of a cloth dresser. Mr. JOHN SMRATON, engineer, and the builder of Eddystone Light-house, was born at Austhorp, in this parish, where his family still reside. BENJAMIN WILSON, an eminent painter, who flourished about the middle of the last century, was a native of Leeds; and the Rev. JOSEPH PRIESTLEY, L. L. D. so much distinguished as a philosopher and as a divine, was born at Field-head, in the neighbourhood of Birstall, and officiated for several years as the minister of the Unitarian Chapel in this place. This list might be swelled by the names of several other residents and natives eminent in their day, but we have already enumerated the most distinguished.

The Borough of Leeds was incorporated by Charles I. in 1626; a second charter was given to it by Charles II. in 1661; and a third by James II. in 1684. The second charter was restored by William and Mary, in 1689, under which the town is at present governed. It is cursed by no exclusive privileges any restrictive laws, but every man has a right to exercise within its precincts any trade or calling he may think proper. No inhabitant is liable to be summoned to serve upon any jury out of the parish.—Leeds, though a very ancient, is not a parliamentary borough.\* An attempt has lately been made to confer upon this place the privilege of sending to Parliament two members, but it failed of success. The electors of Grampound having been convicted of general bribery and corruption, a bill was brought into Parliament by Lord John Russell, during the session of 1821, to disfranchise that borough; and in order to render the number of burgesses to serve in Parliament complete, it was proposed that the Borough of Leeds, having, as the bill sets forth, "of late years become a place of great trade, population, and wealth, should return two burgesses to serve in Parliament, in lieu of the said Borough of Grampound." As the bill originally stood, every man in the borough, occupying property to the amount of £10 a year, would have had a vote.—Subsequently, at the instance of Mr. Stuart Wortley, one of our county members, the qualification of a voter was raised to the sum of £20 per annum; and the bill in this shape passed the House of Commons: but in its progress through the House of Lords it was remodelled, and, instead of two

members being returned for the Borough of Leeds, it was finally enacted by the three estates of Parliament, that the County of York should return four members instead of two, and consequently, that no members should be returned by Leeds.

The Feudal Rights of this Borough are few in number and unimportant in their operations, with one solitary exception—the rights claimed and exercised by the occupiers of the King's Mills, of compelling the inhabitants of the Manor of Leeds to grind their corn at the said mills; from this restraint, however, those houses which are situated within the Manor of Whitkirk are exempt, having been formerly part of the possessions of the dissolved order of the Knights Templars in England. The toll on Malt is a 32d part, that on Wheat a 16th part. The origin of this custom is very remote. In ancient times each family ground its corn in hand-mills. When water-mills were invented, their introduction was eagerly desired, and no one being found able to build them, in some poor districts, the King was petitioned to erect mills in various places, to which he consented on condition that the inhabitants would bind themselves and their heirs for ever to grind at such mills, on the terms then agreed on. During the Crusades or Holy Wars, many privileges and immunities were granted to the Knights Templars, and among these were the exemption of their lands from certain taxes, and from the Soke of the Mills. A refusal, however, to pay a trifling septennial demand, subjects the proprietors or resident, to a renewal of the claims of the Soke. The houses thus exempt are marked by crosses, which frequently attract the attention of strangers.

Formerly there was a *Commune Furnace*, or Common Bakehouse, with a soke annexed, situated at Kirkgate End. This was a nuisance which grew with the growth of the town; but common sense and the necessity of the case gradually abolished it.

The Lords of the Manor of Leeds still hold a Court Leet, at which a jury is impaneled, whose duty it is to examine into the state of the weights and measures, and to present such persons to the Court as shall have any in their possession short of the proper standard. It is also part of their duty to exhibit to the Court all encroachments upon the rights of the Manor.

A toll of all the corn exposed for sale in the market was formerly taken; but it was judiciously compounded for by the payment

of an annual sum out of the treasury of the Corporation.

The Government of the Borough of Leeds is vested in the Corporate Body, consisting of a Mayor, twelve Aldermen, a Recorder, Town's Clerk, and Common Council of twenty-four persons, who fill up the vacancies in their own body, and annually elect the Mayor from the Aldermen.—The election is, however, rather nominal than real, the Aldermen taking the office in rotation, except as the precedence is given to a newly elected Alderman. All the inhabitants are eligible to be elected members of the Corporation, but the election uniformly falls upon Churchmen in religion, and generally upon Tories in politics. The subordinate officers of the Police consist of a Chief Constable, Deputy Constable, Gaoler, & Beadle. The Mayor and Aldermen have, within the Borough, the same power as is derived by a commission of the peace: and the Chief Magistrate, with one of the Aldermen at least, attends at the Rotation Office every Tuesday and Friday, for the execution of their numerous duties. A Session is held for the Borough every three months, namely, in January, April, July, and October, at which the Mayor presides, and the Recorder recapitulates the evidence, and passes sentence on the prisoners, which can in no case exceed transportation. The General Quarter Sessions of the Riding are held here at Michaelmas, every year, at which the Riding Magistrates attend, and elect one of their own body as chairman.

The POLICE of the Borough, without an undue exercise of rigour, or any ostentatious display of authority, is efficient and well regulated. The town is abundantly supplied with soft water, the streets are well lighted and tolerably cleaned; and a nightly Watch and Patrol have been established, which are very vigilant in protecting the persons and property of the inhabitants.\*

The Borough is divided into 10 districts, in each of which a Constable is appointed to preserve the peace. The superintendence of the temporal affairs of the Church devolves upon the Churchwardens, and it is part of the duty of these officers to enforce a proper degree of decorum in the streets on the Sabbath, in which they have been very successful.

**WATER WORKS.**—The river Aire supplies the town with water, which is brought by a tunnel from the King's Mills to the Water Works, near the Bridge, whence it is forced by a powerful engine into three capacious reservoirs, situated at the upper part of the town, from which, after remaining a certain time to deposit its impurities, it is distribu-

ted by leaden pipes into every part of the town, and almost into every house. Some years ago an opinion obtained pretty generally that these Works were not of sufficient power to supply the town with water, and the intention was formed of erecting new Works, at a vast public expense; but by the able and unremitting exertions of Mr. George Webster, the Works were first put in a state of proper repair, (at a trifling expense) and then rendered completely efficient; and at present there are few places in the kingdom so well supplied with water as the town of Leeds.

The Commissioners of the Water Works are chosen at the vestry of the Parish Church, on the first Thursday in January annually. A treasurer is elected out of their number every year. The following are the present Commissioners:—

**VAGRANT OFFICE.**—As an appendage to the Police in Leeds, an Office was established in the year 1818, for the suppression of vagrancy, which has already been attended with the most beneficial effect. The number of street beggars has, in consequence, greatly diminished, the common lodging-houses are no longer crowded haunts of vice and infection, and the number of crimes has probably decreased. The Office is situated in Vicar-Lane, and all vagrants seen begging in the streets are sent to this establishment, from whence they are passed out of the town, on the morning after their arrival, to the place of their destination. MARKETS.—The Market Days are Tuesday and Saturday, and on the evening of the latter day the town is crowded with the work-people of the surrounding villages, who come to lay in a stock of provisions for the week. The Corn Market is held in the Market-Place every Tuesday, and begins at eleven o'clock in the forenoon. Saturday is a considerable market for vegetables, which are principally exposed for sale on the east side of Briggate. On the west side of the same street the country shopkeepers and manufacturers expose their goods, consisting of shoes, hats, &c. not much to the satisfaction of the resident shopkeepers, who

are disposed to consider it as an infringement upon their rights. The Cattle Market is held in Vicar-Lane, and the Pig Market in Lower-head-Row, on Tuesdays; Upperhead-Row is appropriated to the sale of Horses during the Fairs. On Saturdays & Tuesdays both the Old and New Shambles are well stocked with butcher's meat, of excellent quality, and butter, eggs, poultry, &c. are to be had in great plenty at the Cross. The Fish Market is held in Duncan-Street, Bond-Street, and in the Cross, on Mondays and Thursdays. It is well supplied from the east coast. The Woolen Cloth Market for Coloured and White Cloth is held at the respective Halls, where much business is generally done in a very short space of time.

FAIRS.—There are two Fairs held annually at Leeds; one the 10th and 11th of July, for Horses; and the other on the 8th and 9th of November, for Horned Cattle. On the last of these days young persons of both sexes, from the country, attend to hire as servants, principally into the families of farmers.

WAKES.—At the numerous villages in the vicinity is observed annually a Wake or Feast. These are probably derived from our Pagan ancestors, and were adopted into the Romish church to conciliate the minds of the natives. They are too often seasons of dissipation and debauchery.

STREETS.—The principal street is Briggate (a corruption of Bridgegate) a very broad and spacious street, extending from the foot of the Bridge to the Moot-Hall, a distance of about 450 yards. At this point it is divided by a row of houses, for the distance of 120 yards, into two miserable streets, or rather alleys; that to the east is the Shambles, the other is called Back of the Shambles, and was formerly the Wool-Market. Emerging from this obstruction the street again assumes its full width, and is called Cross-Parish, from a convenient cross erected in its centre, in 1776, to replace the more ancient structure. This is the market for corn, and also for butter, eggs, and poultry.—When the buildings attached to the Moot-Hall are removed, ("a consummation devoutly to be wished") this street will probably be equalled by few out of London, as the distance from the Bridge to the top of Cross-Parish is near half a mile. The buildings to the east of Briggate may properly enough be termed the Old Town; those to the west the New Town: the latter generally forming the residence of the more respectable part of the inhabitants; the former that of the labouring classes.

The principal street to the east of Briggate is Kirkgate, at the lower extremity of



which is situated the Parish Church, from which it derives its name. This is a long street, and the most populous of any in the town. Branching off on the left at the Vicarage, is Vicer-Lane, formerly called King-Street, in which the Cow Market is held. The House of Recovery, the Assembly-Rooms, the White Cloth-Hall, the Parish Church, St. James's Church, Call-Lane Chapel, the Baptist, Old Methodist, Ebenezer, Bethel, Roman Catholic, Inghamite, Antinomian, and Swedenborgian Churches, are situated in this division of the town.

On the west side of Briggate, in a line with Kirkgate, is a new street called Bond-Street; at the termination of which, in the same line, is Commercial-Street, also newly built, and containing some very handsome edifices, among others the Public Library and the Union Bank. These two streets lead to another, parallel with Briggate, called Albion-Street, beyond which are several handsome squares. The New Sessions-House, the General Infirmary, the Coloured Cloth-Hall, the Philosophical-Hall, the Public Baths, the Concert-Room, St. Paul's Church, Mill-Hill Chapel, Albion Chapel, and the Methodist Albion-Street Chapel, lie in this part of the town.

About the middle of Briggate, and parallel with Kirkgate and Bond-Street, two other streets branch off. That to the west is called Bore or Boar-Lane, and leads to the Coloured Cloth-Hall; the Trinity Church and the Bank of Messrs. Field, Greenwood & Co. are situated in this street, which was formerly the road from the castle to the town. That to the east is called Duncan-Street, and leads to the White Cloth Hall. In this latter street are the New Shambles and the Post-Office.

At the top of Cross-Parish, and in a line with the streets just mentioned, is the Head-Row, a long street, divided into the Upper Head-Row, and the Lower Head-Row; by a narrow street in a line with Briggate, called New-Street.

The principal streets over the Bridge are Hunslet-Lane, Meadow-Lane, and Holbeck-Lane. The Friends' Meeting House, Salem Chapel, the Old White Chapel, and Wesley Chapel, are situated in this part of the town.

**SPRINGS.**—In the town and neighbourhood are several remarkable springs. St. Peter's Well, on the declivity of a hill, about a mile from the market cross, between the old and new roads from Leeds to Bradford, is extremely cold, and is used as a bath in rheumatic complaints. A spring, at the back of St. James's-Street, is celebrated for its efficacy in strengthening weak eyes,

and is called Cankerwell. At the skirt of the *High Dam*, is a diuretic spring, which by the powder of nut-galls, assumes a deep purple hue. But the spa at Quarry-Hill, as Thoresby observes, bears away the bell. The springs at Gipton and Woodhouse are much resorted to by the people in the neighbourhood; and Holbeck Spa Water is in so much estimation that it is cried daily through the streets, and bought by the inhabitants both as a beverage and for culinary purposes.

Of the Ancient Edifices, which in former times served to adorn the town, all have either disappeared or sunk into a state of dilapidation. *The Castle*, supposed to have been built at Mill-Hill, by Ibert de Lacy, during the reign of William the Conqueror, has entirely disappeared. *Rockley-Hall*, at the bottom of Lower Head-Row, is now converted into cottages. The Talbot Inn bears evident marks of antiquity, but its ancient splendour is gone. *The Red-Hall*, at Berkeley-Bar, which afforded a short temporary asylum to Charles I. is now hemmed in with other buildings, and attracts no particular attention among the multitude. The Chantry of St. Mary Magdalen, standing at the top corner on the west side of the marketplace is now converted into a dwelling-house. *Austrope Hall*, near the Friends' Meeting-House, is an ancient building, the date of which it would be difficult to fix. Several other ancient edifices are mentioned by Thoresby, which have wholly disappeared, and the date of which can only be conjectured.

**PUBLIC BUILDINGS.**—*The New Court-House and Prison*, at the bottom of Park-Row, may be ranked amongst the first of the public buildings of the town. The foundation stone was laid on the 2d of Sept. 1811, and the edifice was completed in 1813, under the superintendance of Mr. Taylor, the architect. The principal front is towards Park-Row, and consists of a Portico of Corinthian columns, and two wings, which have pannels highly wrought in bas relief, containing the fasces, fleece, wreaths, &c. The Rotation-Office, and the West-Riding Magistrates' Room, are on each side the vestibule, and communicate with the great room, which contains an elevated stage for the public, capable of containing 800 persons.—There are also two galleries, one for the grand jury, and a corresponding one for ladies—a room for the counsel, and a retiring-room for the grand jury, which communicates with their box; over the vestibule is the grand jury room, which communicates with their box. The basement story, which is entirely arched with stone, consists of an open ground arcade, for the use of the military, behind which

is a guard-room, and an engine-room, sufficiently large to contain the whole of the town and fire-office engines.\* There are also, on this story, gaoler's apartments, which command the prison-court, in which are thirteen cells. On the north side of the court is a room for the militia stores, with an armoury, &c. all which are accessible only through a guard-room at the west end of the building. The public have a distinct entrance at the west end. Meetings under commissions of bankrupts and on the public business of the town are usually held here. On the completion of this edifice, the Old Prison at Kirkgate-End, which had long been considered a disgrace to the town, was pulled down, and the entrance to that street restored to its original width.

**HORSE BARRACKS**, near Bunslingthorpe. This spacious building, of ominous aspect, is now completed. It is computed that the expense of its erection, with the necessary appendages, will amount to £24,000, and the grant made by Parliament for the purpose was £28,000. The site of the building, with the parade-ground, &c. occupies about 11 acres. Messrs. Craven and Co. were the contractors for the erection of the buildings. The situation is pleasant and salubrious.

*The Cloth Halls* are perhaps the most important, though the plainest buildings, in Leeds. In these halls the principal sales of woollens from the manufacturer to the merchant take place. The arrangement of the markets is well adapted to the despatch of business, and in brisk times exhibits an interesting view of the trade of the town and neighbourhood. The mixed cloths are those made of dyed wool; and the hall in which they are sold forms the principal part of the south side of a square, of which the other sides are formed by East Parade, South Parade, and Park-Row. This hall was erected in the year 1758. The building is quadrangular, inclosing an open area, and is 127½ yards long, and 66 yards broad. It is divided into six departments, which, from their magnitude, are properly enough called streets. Each street contains two rows of stands, and every stand measures twenty-two inches in front, having marked on it the name of the clothier to whom it belongs. The total number of stands is 1800. Each stand cost originally 3 guineas, but about the beginning of the present century they sold at from £16 to £24 each;

since that time the value has been greatly reduced, and the average price does not at this time exceed fifty shillings. In the year 1810 an additional story was erected on the north side of the Coloured Hall, and is used principally for the sale of ladies' cloths in the undyed state. The White Cloth Hall, which was built in the year 1775, is on the same plan with the other, of nearly the same extent, and the price of its stands has undergone similar fluctuations. The original cost of these stands was about thirty shillings: some years ago they advanced to six or eight pounds each; but now they sell on an average for not more than twenty shillings. This enormous depreciation is not owing to any decrease in the quantity of woollen goods manufactured, but to the factory system having so far prevailed over the domestic system as to reduce the number of that valuable class of men, the clothiers, attending the Leeds market, from upwards of three thousand to about one half that number. The markets for mixed and white cloths are held on Tuesdays and Saturdays, on which days only the merchants are permitted to buy or even to look at the cloth in the halls. The regulations are similar in both, and tend greatly to promote regularity and expedition. The markets are held in the forenoon, and open by the ringing of a bell; in a few minutes the merchants walk in, each manufacturer appearing behind his stand, and the sales immediately commence. At the end of an hour a warning bell announces the approaching close of the market; and the sound of the third bell, in a quarter of an hour afterwards, terminates the business of the day. Each merchant now quits the hall on pain of a penalty of five shillings for every five minutes that he continues in it after the last bell has rung; and thus, in an hour and a quarter transactions are completed often to the amount of £15,000 or £20,000, and sometimes to still greater extent. The mixed Cloth Hall opens at half-past eight in summer; nine in spring and autumn; and half-past nine in winter. The White Cloth Hall opens when the other closes; and strangers passing through the town frequently gratify themselves by visiting the halls during the hours of business, to which there is no objection. The cloth is brought to these halls in the unfinished state, and it is dressed under the merchant's direction, either by his own workmen or by persons

\* Four Engines are kept at the Court House, and two at the Post-Office. Horses are always in readiness at the Bull and Mouth Inn, in Briggate. Besides these, there are several private Engines in the town, of which one is kept at the Pottery, another at Messrs. Marshall and Co.'s Water-Lane, a third at Messrs. Benyon and Co.'s in Meadow-Lane; and one is also kept at the Black Bull, Land'-Lane, belonging to the Norwich Union Company.

whose business it is to dress and finish wool-les goods. One of the regulations of the hatts is, that clothiers, who have not served a regular apprenticeship to the business, cannot occupy any of the stands. From the year 1726 to the year 1821 inclusive, an annual return has been made at the general Easter Quarter Sessions, held at Pontefract,

**THE PHILOSOPHICAL HALL.**—A handsome stone edifice, lately built in the front of Park-row, under the direction of Mr. Chautrell, the Architect, claims a prominent rank amongst our public buildings, and promises to confer stability upon the Leeds Literary and Philosophical Society, for the use of which it was erected. This Society was established on the 14th of Jan. 1820, and has for its object, the discussion of Philosophical and Literary Subjects.—The original number of members amounted to 59 proprietary, and 108 ordinary members. Its officers consist of a President, two Vice-presidents, two Secretaries, a Treasurer, a Curator, and Librarian, and a Council of Twelve Members:—

The Session commences the first Friday in November, and continues till the third Friday in May. The meeting nights are the first and third Fridays in every month, during the Session, and the hour of assembling is seven o'clock. Each member has the privilege of introducing a visitor; but no inhabitant, resident within the borough of Leeds, can be admitted as a visitor more than three times.

**PUBLIC BATHS.**—In the year 1820 this commodious edifice was built by the same Architect and in the same order of architecture as the Philosophical Hall.—These Baths, which were built by subscription, contain two separate and complete suites of apartments—those on the east

wing being appropriated to the Gentlemen, and those on the west to the Ladies. They are situated at the west end of the town, on the Wellington-road, opposite the Pleasure-ground of the Infirmary. The water is drawn from a never-falling spring, at the distance of 90 yards from the surface, and the Baths consist of Cold and Shower Baths; Matlock and Buxton Baths, at their respective temperatures of 60 and 82 degrees; Hot Baths to any heat required; and Vapour Baths.

**THE GAS WORKS.**—Erected in 1818, by subscription, form an extensive establishment; they are situated in York-street, near the York-road, and supply a large portion of the street lamps, many of the shops, and some of the manufactories in the town.—The Gas Company was formed under the sanction of an Act of Parliament, and the sum already laid out in the works amounts to from £22,000 to £25,000, from which capital there is satisfactory reason to believe that a suitable profit will arise to the proprietors.

The lights are required to be extinguished within a quarter of an hour of the time contracted for, except on Saturday evenings, when they are allowed to burn till 12 o'clock, and if used on Sunday a charge of one-sixth more is made.

The Cockspar lights not to exceed six inches in length, and the Argand lights not to exceed five inches.

Persons contracting for the light are required to take it for an entire year; the payments to be made at Christmas and Midsummer, half a year in advance.

Hotel-keepers and others, whose hours of lighting are uncertain, are accommodated by special agreement.

A Discount is allowed to the owners of mills and workships at the following rate, viz. 5 per Cent. on a payment of £30; 10 per Cent. on a payment of £40; 15 per Cent. on a payment of £60; and 20 per Cent. on a payment of £100 and upwards.

The service pipes are laid at the company's expense to the front wall of the houses adjoining the public streets. The interior fitting-up is at the expense of the consumer.

No burners are used but those provided by the Company.

John Cowburn, to Beeston, Charwell, Morley, Bruntcliffe, Gildersome, Adwalton, Drighlington, Tong, Westgate-hill, Birkenshaw, Bierley, Fulneck, and Pudsey, every day.

**Riding Postmen**—George Wilson, every morning at 20 minutes past 5, to Birstall, Millbridge, and Huddersfield. James Gifford, at a  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 6, to Wakefield, and from thence to Barnsley, every day.

The office opens for the general delivery of letters, at seven o'clock in the morning, in summer, and eight o'clock in winter; the days for which change are the 5th of April, and the 29th of October; such letters as are

not regularly called for, are delivered by the letter carriers, who leave the office for this purpose at the time of opening. Attendance is given during the whole of the day, until half-past five o'clock in the evening, when it shuts for the despatch of the North Mail. Letters for this mail continue to be received with one penny for each, until six, when the bags are finally closed, which takes letters for the East and North Ridings of Yorkshire, the counties of Westmoreland, Cumberland, Northumberland, Durham, the whole of Scotland, the North of Ireland, and the Isle of Man; the intermediate towns from Tadcaster to Ware, and from Stilton to Stevenage, with all Lincolnshire, Cambridgeshire, Norfolk, (except Diss and Harleston) Bury St. Edmunds, Brandon, and Mildenhall, in Suffolk; also to Otley, Skipton, Settle, Gargrave, Cross-hills, and Kildwick, in Yorkshire; to Burnley, Padiham, Clitheroe, Blackburn, and Ulverston, in Lancashire. The same mail arrives in Leeds, every morning, at a quarter-past three o'clock, with letters from Lincolnshire, Norfolk, part of Suffolk, Cambridgeshire, part of Nottinghamshire, East and North Ridings of Yorkshire, and all parts of Scotland; through Doncaster, Ferrybridge, York, and Tadcaster. Immediately on the East Mail leaving the office at six o'clock in the evening, it again opens to receive letters for London, and all other parts of the kingdom, not mentioned above, until seven o'clock, when it shuts for the evening; letters may still be forwarded till eight o'clock, at the following rate:—

From seven in the evening to fifty minutes past seven, 1d.

From fifty minutes past seven to fifty-five minutes past seven, 2d.

From 55 minutes past seven to eight, 6d.

The bags are then forwarded by the Leeds and London Mail Coach, by way of Sheffield, Nottingham, &c. which returns with bags from all the south-west parts of England, through Birmingham; bringing also the Lisbon, Malta, Gibraltar, and West India Letters.

No mails are despatched for London on Friday evenings, neither are any received thence on Tuesday mornings.

The West Mail arrives every evening about twenty minutes past five o'clock, and the letters are delivered within an hour afterwards to the persons who send for them; it again sets out every morning at half-past three, with bags for Liverpool, and the intermediate towns, Lancashire, Cheshire, nearly the whole of the West of England, and all parts of Ireland.

The New Liverpool Mail leaves Leeds

every afternoon at three o'clock, (the letter-box closes at half-past two) and takes letters for Bradford, Halifax, Rochdale, Bolton, Manchester, and Liverpool, and all parts of Lancashire, (Colne excepted) Cheshire, Shropshire, nearly the whole of the West of England, and all parts of Ireland; this mail returns every morning at six, bringing letters from all the places as above-mentioned, and which are delivered at seven in summer and eight o'clock in winter.

**NEWS ROOMS**—There are two News Rooms in Leeds, independent of those at Inns and Public-houses. They are, the Coffee Room and the Commercial News Room; both in the centre of Briggate, and adjoining to each other. Strangers are admitted into each of them on the introduction of a subscriber; and Military and Naval Officers, not permanently resident in the town, are privileged to attend the Coffee Room gratuitously.

**CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS**.—These institutions in Leeds are numerous and well supported.—**THE GENERAL INFIRMARY** is the first in importance; it is situated on a line with the Coloured Cloth-Hall, from which it is divided by a plot of land, used as a burial ground by the Dissenters. It is

an excellent hospital, diffusing extensive benefits to the country around, and is wholly supported by annual subscriptions and voluntary donations. Its officers are—

In the year 1817, a number of benevolent persons, friends and supporters of the Infirmary, purchased a quantity of land at the south front of that building, for the purpose of protecting the institution against the too close proximity of any other building, and, in the same year, Richard Fountayne Wilson, Esq. of Ingmanthorpe, at a cost of £1500, munificently presented the trustees with an additional portion of land, consisting of 4000 square yards, which extended their boundaries down to the Wellington road. This land, which is tastefully laid out as a pleasure-ground, is inclosed by a substantial wall, surmounted with iron palisades, and serves materially to ornament the west entrance to the town, as well as to benefit the General Infirmary.

**THE HOUSE OF RECOVERY**, Vicar-Lane, was built by public subscription, in 1802, and is appropriated to the reception of persons attacked by infectious fevers. It is like the Infirmary, to which it may be considered as an appendage, supported by annual subscriptions and voluntary donations, and is extensively useful. By this institution the germ of infection is plucked up before it has time to spread its baleful influence in the crowded districts of the town, and the general health of the inhabitants, both high and low, is much benefitted by its operation. There are various other charitable institutions, which, it would be unpardonable to pass unnoticed: Among the oldest of these is,

*The Benevolent, or Strangers' Friend Society*, for the relief of the distressed of all religious denominations, and especially those who have no other helper. The objects of distress relieved by this society are all visited before they are relieved; the visitor reports upon their case by filling up the blanks in a judiciously constructed query paper, and the committee, which sits every Friday evening, at eight o'clock in summer, and seven o'clock in winter, at the committee-room, near the Old Methodist Meeting House, determines, with this report before them, upon the amount of relief to be administered. The society is wholly supported by annual subscriptions and voluntary donations. The officers for the present year are

A society of recent establishment, but of great importance to the moral habits of this place, is the *Guardian Society*, in St. James's Street, for the purpose of reclaiming females, who have departed from the path of virtue, but wish to forsake their abandoned courses. This society was established in the year 1821, during the mayoralty of William Hey, Esq. to whose exertions the town is mainly indebted for its formation.

*The Eye Dispensary*, St. Peter's Square. This institution was founded in 1821, for the purpose of affording to the poor an opportunity of receiving gratuitous relief in the varied diseased affections of that very important organ. Its present support is solely derived from the public spirit of the surgical attendants, but it is contemplated shortly to invite the sympathy of more extended benevolence. Surgeons, R. C. HAY, No. 4, Mill-Hill; and T. T. METCALFE, top of Albion Street.

There are in Leeds three separate establishments of Alms Houses. Those which take precedence in point of time are called "Harrison's Hospital," founded and endowed originally by Mr. John Harrison, and consists of 20 houses. In addition to the endowment of the original founder, Mrs. Catharine Parker, of Leeds, left by will,

dated Sept. 3, 1751, the sum of £500, in trust, the interest of the same to be paid yearly to the poor inhabitants of Mr. Harrison's Hospital. Mr. Joseph Midgley, of Leeds, clothier, who died A. D. 1759, made a bequest to this charity amounting to £800. The interest to be paid quarterly. Arthur Ikin, Esq. Alderman of Leeds, left by will, dated March 7, 1795, the residue of his personal and leasehold estates, (after several legacies) devised to the trustees of this hospital, for the purpose of erecting and endowing more houses, "near the same hospital, and upon the ground belonging to the same, for the residence of more poor persons, to be elected after the same manner."

Twelve new houses have accordingly been built, forming a square within the old quadrangular court, and these together with the twenty former habitations (which have been recently and greatly improved) now afford a comfortable asylum for sixty-four poor and aged women,\* each of whom receives, by four payments, a stipend of ten pounds per annum.†

*Potter's Alms Houses*—Mrs. Mary Potter, widow of Thomas Potter, of Leeds, merchant, and who died May 31, 1729, left by will to six trustees, the Vicar of Leeds, for the time being to be one of them, the sum of £2000, for the purchasing a situation "as near to St. John's Church as might be, and the erecting thereon a decent Alms-House for the reception of ten ancient virtuous poor necessitous widows," the yearly interest of the surplussage to be applied to their maintenance. The present site in Wade-lane, now called *Camp-road*, was accordingly purchased A. D. 1736, the building was finished A. D. 1738, and with the interest of £400, left A. D. 1765, by Mrs. Barbara Chantrell, to this charity, the present stipend of each widow is twelve guineas per annum.

*Jenkinson's Alms Houses*—Mr. Josias Jenkinson, of Leeds, left by will, dated August 10, 1643, a farm in Great Woodhouse unto four feoffees and their successors in trust, "for the disposing of the yearly rents and profits thereof, among such poor impotent and aged people, inhabitants of the town and parish of Leeds, as they in their discretions shall think most needful." He further devised unto the same feoffees and their successors, "the eight dwelling-houses lately built by himself at Mill-hill, as Alms Houses, in trust, for their placing therein such impotent and aged persons, inhabitants of Leeds, as they in their discretion should think meet, without taking any

rent of or for the same." No provision having been made by the founder for keeping these Alms Houses in repair, they were, at the beginning of the present century, wholly uninhabitable; they were then entirely rebuilt, and the feoffees having resolved that the rents of the farm in Woodhouse should thenceforward be appropriated to the poor persons placed therein; these now receive an annual stipend, amounting to about £5. each. This benevolent work was effected principally through the humane exertions of John Calverley, (now Blayds) Esq. to whose unceasing care the inmates of all the Alms Houses in the town are essentially indebted for their increased comforts.

**Mrs. Dixon's Charity.**—Mrs. Rachael Dixon, of Leeds, left by will, dated A.D. 1719, certain houses and premises situated in Lowerhead-row, Leeds, in trust, "that the rents and profits arising therefrom should (in case of a contingency, which hath since happened) be yearly divided equally among the widows of three clergymen, whose husbands died beneficed in the parish of Leeds; or, for want of these, in some of the parishes adjoining to that of Leeds, the judges of the necessities of such widows, and the election of them from time to time, and the case of the equal distribution of rents, to be in the Vicar of Leeds, and in the Minister of St. John's Church, for the time being, for ever." These premises have all been let out on leases, covenanting for their being rebuilt, and are now therefore greatly increased in value.

*The Soup Establishment* is in active operation only in times of peculiar distress.—**Mr. J. B. Charlesworth** is the Treasurer.

There are in Leeds also two or three Clothing Societies, by which benevolent females of the more opulent and middle classes supply their poor neighbours with garments, which these fair Samaritans make with their own hands.

Amongst the charitable institutions for the diffusion of religious knowledge, may be enumerated—The Leeds Auxiliary Bible Society, established principally through the active agency of the late venerable William Hey, Esq. on the day of Jubilee in 1809.

The town is well supplied with the means of education. The Free Grammar School, at the North Town-end, instructs "freely," in classical learning, "all such youths and children as resort thereto."

**Usher**—Mr. Henry Atkinson.

The improvements recently introduced into the management of this institution, says Dr. Whitaker, in his Appendix to Loidis and Elmete, are both many and important: the system of education adopted therein is accurately specified, and comprehends not only classical instruction, greatly extended beyond its former limits, but also such mathematical learning as is conducive to the scholars' future progress at either of the two Universities.—The relative merits of every lesson and of every exercise are recorded, and a public examination of the scholars annually had, by an examiner specially appointed, when prizes are given to the meritorious, and censures past and punishments inflicted on the undeserving. The Madras system of teaching has been adopted, and the whole plan of instruction has a near resemblance to that which has for several years been established at the Charter-house School. A third master has been added for the instructing of the two lowest forms, and the salaries of the others made such as to "secure them both respectable and independent situations," whilst every care has been taken "to provide for the due execution of their duty."

The Royal Lancasterian Free School—in Alfred-Street, Boar-Lane, where poor boys are taught without charge to their parents, on the principles of Mr. Joseph Lancaster, was established in the year 1811, on the liberal principles characteristic of these institutions.

The National School, in Kirkgate, where 250 boys and 180 girls are taught according to Dr. Bell's, or the Madras system.

Charity School, Lands, now appropriated solely to girls, eighty in number, who are furnished every year with a comfortable blue cloth dress, and a complete suit of other apparel. The school-house has been recently re-edified and now forms a neat Gothic building. **Governess**, Miss Robinson.

There are besides in the town three Schools of Industry, where poor girls are

taught to read, write, knit, and sew, and prepared for domestic servants—a very necessary branch of education in a place where so many females, from being brought up in factories, are too often unfitted for the duties of servants.

**Sunday Schools**—These excellent institutions are very numerous in Leeds, as will be seen from the following synopsis, exhibiting the state of the Day Schools and Sunday Schools for the education of the poor in Leeds, 1821:—

**PLACES OF AMUSEMENT** :—The places of public amusement in Leeds are neither so numerous nor so well supported as the charitable institutions. They are, the *Theatre*, in Hunslet-Lane, under the management of Mr. Mansell, which is generally open in the months of May and June; the *Assembly-Rooms*, over the north side of the White Cloth-hall, in which there are fortnight assemblies during the winter; and the *Concert-Rooms*, in Albion-Street, in which a series of Subscription Concerts are usually performed in the Winter season.

There are also three *Billiard Rooms*, one of them kept by Mr. Simons, in Vickers' Yard, Briggate; another by Mr. John Stamper, in the Rose and Crown Yard, Cross Pariah; and the third by John Pawson, 40, Briggate.

In the neighbourhood there are several public gardens, one of them at North-hall, on the Bradford Road, and several others at the delightful village of Knosthorp.

**MANUFACTURES AND COMMERCE.**

The Woollen Cloth Manufacture, of which Leeds is the centre, constitutes in a peculiar degree the prosperity of the West Riding. This pre-eminence, however, does not seem to be of a very old date, for Leland says, "it is a pretty market-town, but not so quick (busy) as Bradford." Lord Clarendon, in his History, speaking of Leeds, Halifax, and Bradford, calls them "three very populous and rich towns, depending wholly on clothiers." This was in 1642.

The great bulk of the Woollen Manufacture in this district consisted formerly of the coarser kinds of cloth. The first stages of the manufacture are carried on in the villages and hamlets in the surrounding country, where the wool goes through the respective operations of spinning, weaving, and fulling. From all these scattered establishments, which cover a considerable tract of country to the westward of the town, the cloth is sent in its unfinished state to the Cloth halls in Leeds, where it is sold, as has already been stated, to the merchants. The river Calder is the eastern boundary of the woollen manufacture, which extends hence to the ridge of hills separating Lancashire and Yorkshire. The whole number of master cloth-manufacturers in the West Riding of Yorkshire amounted, some years ago, to between 5 and 6,000, who employed, besides their wives and children, between 30 and 40,000 persons;—latterly that number has been considerably diminished from the causes already stated. The clothiers are men of small capitals, often annexing a little farm to their other business; great num-

bers of the rest have a field or two to support a horse and cow.

Of late years, however, manufactories of cloth have been established on a larger scale, and the use of machinery has much increased. There is a very large establishment at Drony-Laith, belonging to Messrs. Benj. Gott and Sons, formerly Messrs. Wormald, Gott, and Wormald, in which the whole process of the manufacture of cloth, from the first breaking of the wool to the finishing of the piece ready for the consumer, is carried on; and the same gentlemen have also an extensive and handsome building at Armley, appropriated to the purpose of a fulling-mill. These establishments have attracted the attention of most of the distinguished personages who have visited the town. Many other buildings of a similar description have lately been erected. The principal change which has taken place in the West Riding is that introduced by Mr. Wm. Hirst, of this place, who has equalled, if he has not outstripped, the clothiers in the West of England in the manufacture of black and blue superfine cloth, and whose merit has been rewarded by distinguished success. Excited by Mr. Hirst's example, many other manufacturers around us are now engaged in the fabrication of woollens of a superior description, and the term, *Yorkshire Cloth*, no longer conveys the exclusive idea of inferiority, either at home or in foreign countries. Large quantities of ladies' cloths, which come under the designation of pelisse-cloths and shawls, have lately been made in this neighbourhood. In the town and vicinity are also manufactured stuff goods of various kinds, Scots camblets, and blankets; and the elegant manufacture of carpets has been carried on here to a considerable extent, the texture of which resembles the Scots carpets. Several manufactories, inferior in extent to very few in the kingdom, have been established for spinning flax for canvas, linen, sacking, thread, &c.; and even the cotton-trade, extending from Manchester, has taken some root here.—Large quantities of worsted goods are exported from hence, and few branches of manufacture have been so uniformly prosperous.

In the immediate neighbourhood are some manufactories of crown and green glass, and the Leeds Pottery enjoys a considerable reputation in England, Scotland, and Ireland, as well as in foreign countries. Several Iron Foundries have been erected around us, and there is a manufacture of Steam Engines, which, after Bolton and Watts, is perhaps equal to any in the kingdom, as well for its extent as for the skill

and mechanical genius which presides over it. On the Aire and its tributary streams are numerous mills for grinding corn, dyers' wood, rape-seed, &c. as well as for fulling cloth, and turning, carding, and spinning machines. These works are, however, principally wrought by steam, the numerous furnaces of which, for want of the general application of the smoke-burning apparatus, contaminate the air, and impair the beauty and healthfulness of a well situated town.—No material advantage has yet been felt, in this place, from the bill introduced into Parliament by Mr. M. A. Taylor, and passed the last session, for promoting the burning of the smoke of steam engine furnaces.

The inhabitants of this and the other manufacturing districts of the West Riding, actuated by a generous spirit of forbearance, are disinclined to commence prosecutions, even though the health and comfort of a whole population are concerned; and they entertain the hope, which we trust will not be disappointed, that the proprietors of steam-engines will not practise upon the public generosity, but will, with all convenient speed, take those effectual measures which are within the power of every one of them, to remove so great a nuisance. In this expectation they are the more sanguine, because it is now a fact ascertained by the unerring test of experience, that the smoke of steam engine furnaces can be consumed so far as to create no public annoyance, by an apparatus easily fitted up, at a small expense, occasioning no additional consumption of fuel, and that will in no degree diminish the power of the works.

Beside the staple of cloth, linen, &c. the wholesale Tobacco Trade is carried on extensively in Leeds, and mills have been erected here for cutting this American production. It has already been stated that the manufacture of Stuff Goods is carried on in the town and neighbourhood of Leeds, but the principal seat of this manufacture is in Bradford and Halifax, and their respective neighbourhoods. When made, the pieces, as they come from the loom, are offered for sale in the Piece Halls at those places, where they are principally bought by the Leeds merchants, by whom they are finished, and form an important article of foreign and domestic commerce.

As a necessary consequence of the extension of the trade, manufactures, and commerce of Leeds, its population has greatly increased, and within the last 10 years an actual augmentation of one-third part of the whole population of 1811 has taken place, as the following returns made under the Population Act of 1821 will show:—

The population of the town of Leeds as taken in the year 1811, was 35,951—of the Out-Townships 26,583—making the total of the Borough, 62,534. It appears that the present population of the town is 48,603—Of the Out-Townships 35,145—aggregate, 83,746—making an increase upon the last Census of 21,212; exceeding one-third upon the whole Borough.

In Leeds there are three weekly Newspapers. The *Leeds Mercury*, originally established on the 30th of May, in the year 1720, is published by Edward Baines, at the office, No. 76, Briggate, every Saturday morning;

The *Leeds Intelligencer*, established on the 2d of July, 1764, is published by Messrs. Gawthorn and Co. every Monday morning, at their office in New Street;

And the *Leeds Independent*, established on the 7th of January, 1819, is published by Mr. Wm. Hensley, at the office, No. 91, Briggate, every Thursday morning.

Among the most important and interesting literary works which have lately issued from the press at Leeds, may be named Mr. Matthew Talbot's *Analysis of the Bible*, in 4to. *A Treatise on the Nature*

and Properties of English Wool, by Mr. Luccock. *Notes on Brazil*, by the same author, in quarto. *Dr. Whitaker's Edition of Thoresby's Ducatus Leodienis*, and his *Loidis and Elmets*, in 2 vols. folio.—*The Costume of Yorkshire*, by Geo. Walker, Esq. in 4to. containing forty spirited designs, with descriptions in French and English. *The History of the Wars of the French Revolution*, in 2 vols. 4to. by Edward Baines; and the *History of the Reign of George III.* (now in the course of publication) by the same Author. Many of the Clergy of Leeds, as well as several Dissenting Ministers, have occasionally published detached Sermons, Essays, &c. The works of Watts, Doddridge, Edwards, Charnock, and Bates, have lately been printed in Leeds.

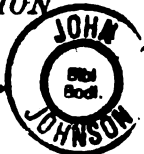

## SAVINGS BANK.

This Institution which is intended for the safe custody and the increase of small savings, belonging to the labouring and industrious classes, resident either within the Borough of Leeds, the wapentakes of Skyrac and Morley or elsewhere, "Was established at Leeds, in January, 1818, under the sanction of an Act of Parliament, passed in the 57 Geo. III." And the management of its concerns is vested in two Patrons, a President, a Vice-President, ten Trustees, a Treasurer, thirty-six Directors and a Secretary. The deposits are vested in Government securities only, which to the amount of one shilling and upwards are received. When deposits amount to 12s. 6d. the depositors receive for interest on that sum, one-half penny per month, or 4 per cent. per annum, on any sum they may have deposited. No depositor to vest more than £100 the first year, nor more than £50 any succeeding year. The interest is paid annually on the first banking day after the 15th of April, or the 15th of October, and if not called for, it is suffered to accumulate for the benefit of the depositor. The Bank is in Bank Street, Boar Lane, and attend-

ance is given every Tuesday and Saturday, from 12 to  $\frac{1}{2}$  past one o'clock, Mr. ROBERT TANNER, Secretary. This institution is in a flourishing condition, as will be seen from the following report made in April last, —

Sixth half-yearly Report of the progress of the Leeds, Skyrac and Morley Savings Bank, to 15th April, 1821.

1062 Accounts have been opened since the commencement of the institution in February, 1818, upon which 3051 deposits have been made amounting to the sum of £32,113. 8s. 6d.

1056 Re-payments have been made to depositors amounting to the sum of £11,478. 13s. 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

There are now 701 open accounts, (being an Increase of 12 $\frac{1}{2}$  since the last Report) and the amount of deposits thereon, including the accumulation of interest for the benefit of the depositors, amounts to the sum of £22,472. 10s. 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

The amount of Deposits and Interest thereon to 15th October, 1821, was £18,293. 10s. 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

Increase from 15th October, 1820, to 15th April, 1821, £4,178. 19s. 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

## MARKET TOWNS.

\* \* For more convenient Reference the Directory of Leeds has been placed at the commencement of the First Volume, as York will take the precedence in the Second Volume. All the other Towns will be arranged in alphabetical order, and the Villages will follow in the same order.

### ABERFORD, or ABERFORD

Is situated on the river Cock, in the wapentakes of Skyrac and Barkston-Ash, in the liberties of Pontefract and St. Peter, in the constaberies of Aberford, Lotherton and Parlington, and in the parishes of Aberford and Sherburn. It is 188 miles from London, 7 miles and a half from Wetherby, and 16 miles from the city of York. The population of this place according to the census taken in 1821, amounts to 1235 persons. Formerly there was a market held here on Wednesday, but it is now discontinued. The neighbourhood is rich in coal and lime, and there are many remains of Roman roads and other antiquities. In addition to the Parish Church there is a Catholic chapel, and a Methodist chapel, there is also a Subscription Library and a Charity School, built on the site of the old school house, (endowed by Lady Betty Hastings,) and which is now conducted on the plan of Dr. Bell. This institution is supported by the benevolent contributions of the neighbouring gentry; to which is added an annual benefaction of ten guineas by the trustees of Lady Betty Hastings, and five guineas by Oriel College, Oxford. Huddleston Hall, about 3 miles from Aberford, a building of great antiquity, was formerly the residence of the Hungate family, but is now the property of R. O. Gascoigne, Esq. Near this place there is an extensive quarry, called Huddleston quarry, of excellent white stone, which acquires a fine polish, and is said to have been used both in the erection of St. Stephen's Chapel in Westminster Abbey, and in the tessellated pavement of the choir of York Minster. At Saxton, three miles from Aberford, there was formerly an ancient building, called Saxton Hall, which has been taken down within a few years, and a neat farm house built on the site, by the late Sir Thomas Gascoigne, Bart. the heir of the Hungate family and the descendant of that ancient house. Near Aberford there is a farm house bearing the name of the Black Horse,

which is reputed to have been the occasional retreat of the notorious Nevison the highwayman. The Parish Church which is dedicated to St. Richard, is at present undergoing considerable enlargement, and R. O. Gascoigne, Esq. is erecting catacombs which will contain thirty bodies. Formerly the trade of pin making was carried on to a considerable extent in this place, but it has ceased for some years. In the vicinity there are many rare and curious plants which grow wild, and which afford an ample field for the study of the Botanist.

### ALDBOROUGH,

Is a parliamentary borough, situated on the river Ouse, in the parish of Aldborough, in the wapentake of Claro, in the liberty of St. Peter; it is 1 mile from Boroughbride, 7 from Ripon, the same distance from Knaresborough, 10 miles from Harrogate, 16½ from York, and 208 from London. In ancient British times it was the capital of the Brigantes, and then named Iseur, afterwards altered by the Romans to Isurium, and by the Saxons to Burc, and lastly Aldburgh, i. e. Old Burc. Here are frequently found Roman coins, urns, tessellated pavements, &c. This place is said, by Higden, in his Polycronicon, to have been sacked by the Danes, and burnt to the ground, about the year 870. It is now a small village, but returns two members to Parliament; the first return of which was in the year 1542, when John Gascoigne, and John Brown were returned. The present members are, Henry Fynes, Esq. and G. C. Antrobus, Esq. The Newcastle interest is predominant here, and the number of electors

amount nominally to 64. Seventy paces from the South side of the old rampart is an eminence, called *Stodforth*, which some suppose to have been an outwork, for the defence of the place. Its shape is nearly a semi-circle and forms a lofty terrace, 200 feet long, and 10 or 12 feet broad. It is not improbable but the present name of the hill may be derived from the latin *stadium*; a place appointed for races and other exercises performed by men on foot. A noble work of this kind was built by Domitian, at Rome, of which this might be an humble imitation, erected by Agricola, his general in Britain, about the same time. The space from this terrace to the wall of the city would afford ample room for those recreations, and the spectators would from hence have a full view of the youthful competitors on the plain below, when engaged in their favourite exercises, the principal of which was the *Ludus Trajæ*, said to have been invented by Ascanius, the son of Eneas, for the youth of Troy, and described by Virgil. The churches of Aldburgh, Boroughbridge, Myton, and Ouseborn, are supposed by Dr. Drake to have been built out of the ruins of *Isurium*. Great quantities might also have been sent by water to York; Clifford's tower and the walk of the Castle appear to be the very same sort of stone. The church is a vicarage, dedicated to St. Andrew. The dean and chapter of York are patrons. On the outside of the vestry wall is a figure, by some supposed to represent Pan, or Silvanus, but it is, beyond all doubt, that of Mercury, as part of the caduceus and the aze on the cap are yet perceptible; the height of the figure is two feet five inches. In the church yard is a grave-stone, placed on low stone balusters, wherein is cut in relievo, the half length figure of a woman in the attitude of praying; the habit appears Saxon, if not more ancient. Channels are cut on each side of the figure to let out the rain water; to this precaution it is perhaps owing that so much of the original figure is still preserved. The stone, which is 8 inches thick, near 7 feet long, and 2 feet 8 inches broad, is a sort of marble found in several quarries in the north of England, which abound with fossil shells. Within the church is a flat stone, inlaid with brass, on which is the figure of a young knight in armour, bearing on his shield the arms

of Aldburgh:—argent a *less dancett*, between three crosslets, botone azure; under his feet is written, on an escrole, Will. de Aldburgh. This brazen relic, being inclosed in one of the pews, is the only one in the church that has escaped the wild fanaticism of that period so fatal to the venerable monuments of antiquity in this kingdom. There are here two dissenting meeting houses and a house of industry. This borough has no corporate body. The population, as taken in 1821, amounts to 481.

#### BARNLSLEY.

Formerly called *bleak* Barnsley, from its exposed situation, (and not *black* Barnsley, as generally represented,) is a flourishing market town, in the parish of Silkstone, the wapentake of Staincross, and the liberty of the honour of Pontefract. It is 9 miles from Penistone, 10 from Wakefield, 13 from Rotherham, 14 from Sheffield, 15 from Doncaster, 30 from York, and 177 from London.—The market is held on Wednesday. According to the census taken this year, 1821, there are 1441 inhabited houses, which contain 4285 males, and 3999 females, making together a population of 8284. The manor belongs to the Duke of Leeds. Wire drawing was formerly the principal

trade of this town, but it has now given place to the manufacturing of flax, bleaching of linen yarns, weaving of linen cloth, ducks, diapers, damasks, &c. which is carried on to a very considerable extent. About thirty-six tons of these articles are sent out of Barnsley every week, the average value of which is about £500 per ton. There are upwards of 3700 looms employed in this town and the neighbouring villages. The wire drawing business is not given up, but is carried on here to a considerable extent, and Barnsley is said to produce the best wire for needles, &c. in the kingdom. There are also two extensive iron foundries for the casting and making of steam engines, pots, grates, &c. Great quantities of free and grindstones are obtained in this neighbourhood. Excellent coal mines are also wrought here; the beds of coal are from 10 to 12 feet thick. This place is well situated for trade, and in addition to its ample supply of fuel, enjoys the advantage of a canal navigation. The land about Barnsley is remarkably good, and equally famous for the growth of wheat and other

grains, both as to quantity and quality. The church, (a chapel of ease,) which is spacious, is now rebuilding; there is also a free grammar school here, founded and endowed by Thomas Keresforth, gent. in the year 1665. A new church and a Roman Catholic chapel are about to be erected. On the right of the road in the parish of Stainborough, 3 miles from Barnsley, is Wentworth Castle, the seat of Henry Vernon, Esq. a most beautiful fabric, situated on an eminence, commanding a fine prospect down into the north, east, and west; and is surrounded by an extensive park. Within the house is a most elegant gallery, the length of which, from south to north, measures 100 feet by 24, within, ornamented in a most superb style. On the east side of the house, in the park, runs a serpentine canal of considerable length, with a handsome stone bridge over it, of one arch. Wentworth Castle occupies the site of an ancient fortress. It was built about the year 1780, by Thomas Earl of Strafford, a marble statue of whom, executed by Rysbrack, stands in the centre of the area.

## BAWTRY,

Is a town of the West Riding, in the wapentake of Strafforth and Tickhill. It is situated on the borders of Nottinghamshire, and is partly in that county; 4 miles from Tickhill, 9 miles from Doncaster, the same distance from East Retford, and 156 miles from London. The market, which is principally for corn sold by the sample, was formerly on Wednesday, but is now on Thursday. It is a small, handsome, well-built town on the Great North Road from London to Edinburgh, and the main street, through which the London road passes, is remarkably broad and spacious. The town stands on the side of an eminence

gently sloping towards the north and the east down to the river Idle, or Iredale, which is navigable hither for small craft. On the western side of the town the ground is elevated and pleasant; but the marshes contiguous to the river, on the eastern side, are subject to frequent inundations. Notwithstanding its advantageous situation, Bawtry has little or no trade. It is situated upon the site of a Roman road, from *AGELOCUM* to *DANUM*, the Littleborough, and Doncaster of the present day. A fair of four days in the year was procured from King John, by Robert de Vipont, Lord of the Manor, for a present of four palfreys. The inland navigation of the river Iredale is on the increase, and considerable quantities of stone, lead and iron, as well as cutlery goods, pass by this medium of conveyance. The Rock Abbey stone, justly celebrated amongst Statuaries and Architects, is shipped at this place for London, &c. Many of the splendid movements, in memory of our naval and military heroes, which ornament the metropolis, are composed of this material. Bawtry has no public buildings of consequence, the only places of worship are a small church, and a methodist chapel. The object most worthy of attention at Bawtry is the elegant mansion of the Dowager Viscountess Galway, which is situated at the southern extremity of the town, on the west side of the Great North road. This edifice is built of brick, and has an extensive and handsome front towards the south. The pleasure grounds on the south and west side of the house are agreeably variegated and interspersed with groves and plantations, all kept in excellent condition; and in a beautiful little area, surrounded with shrubs, is an elegant aviary, stocked with Chinese pheasants and other rare and curious birds. At a distance of one mile from Bawtry, and close on the east side of the great north road, is the village of Scrooby, remarkable for having formerly had a palace belonging to the archbishops of York, who are still Lords of the Manor. Scrooby is said to have been a favourite hunting seat of Archbishop Savage, in the reign of Henry VII. In the next reign it was occasionally the residence of Cardinal Wolsey. It also appears that, in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, Archbishop Sandys resided here, at least occasionally, as one of his daughters is interred in the chancel of the church. The palace stood in a very

damp and low situation close to the confluence of the small river Ryton with the Idle. The large gateway, and porter's lodge were taken down

towards the end of the last century; and the only remaining part of this episcopal palace is converted into a farm house.

## BINGLEY

Is in the wapentake of Skyrack, situated near the North eastern banks of the Aire, at the distance of 208 miles from London, 16 from Leeds, 4‡ South East from Keighley, and 5‡ North West of Bradford, and in the direct road between the two latter towns. It is tolerably well built entirely of stone, and consists chiefly of one long street, in which the market is held on Tuesday. The population of Bingley, in 1811, amounted to 4,782, and by the census of 1821, to 6,176; an increase, which, if the numbers have been accurately taken, shows the town to be both healthful and flourishing. The situation indeed seems to be salubrious as well as extremely pleasant, being seated on a dry hill, between two delightful vales. The surrounding country, to the distance of two or three miles, is well wooded and beautiful. This was one of the 32 lordships which the Conqueror gave to Ernisius de Beun. It had then six hamlets belonging to it.—The family of the Cantilopes afterwards became possessed of it, in later times, this town became more noted by the creation of Robert Benson, Esq. Baron Bingley, by Queen Anne, who appointed him her ambassador to the court of Madrid. The living is a Vicarage, valued in the books at £7. 6s.

8d. and the patron is the King. The present vicar is the Rev. Dr. Hartley, who is also Head Master of the Free Grammar School. By a decree of the Lord Chancellor, promulgated in December 1820, it was determined, that this is to be conducted as a Free Grammar School for teaching the children of the inhabitants of the parish of Bingley the learned languages; and no boy is by right, intitled to be admitted into the said school as a free scholar therein, until he can read the New Testament or Bible, sufficiently well to begin, upon his admission, to learn the Latin Accidence. Besides the Parish church, there are in Bingley three Methodist chapels, one Baptist chapel, and an Independent chapel. There is also a National school, built and supported by subscription, and which is capable of accommodating 800 scholars. The worsted manufacture is carried on in this town and neighbourhood to a considerable extent; and there are several large spinning concerns both in the worsted and in the cotton line. There are two fairs held here, which will be classed amongst the other fairs of the county; there is likewise an annual feast at Bingley, commencing on the first Sunday after the 22d day of August, and which the people who enter freely into its festivities, designate by the name of "The King of Feasts."

## BOROUGHBRIDGE,

Is in the parish of Aldborough, in the wapentake of Claro, and the liberty of Staincliffe; it is 6 miles from Ripon, 7 from Knaresbrough, 12 from Wetherby, 18 from York, and 202 from London. The market day is on Saturday. It has a handsome and commodious stone bridge over the river Ure, on the south bank of which river the town is situated. The houses are well built. It has several good inns, and contains 157 houses, and 860 inhabitants. This borough was enfranchised in the year 1557, and it returns two members to parliament. The electors are *nominally* 74 in number, but the Newcastle interest is paramount, and the election is in reality in his Grace, both here and at Aldborough. The present members for Boroughbridge are Henry Dawkins and Geo. Munday, Esqrs. The family of the Tancredes possessed lands here before the year 1200; their ancient mansion is now converted into the Crown Inn. In the Roman and Saxon times the great North road lay more to the east near the walls of Aldburgh or Isurium, but after the Norman conquest this road was turned, and a bridge of wood being erected across the Ure, the place obtained the name of Burgh-bridge.—In process of time houses were erected for the entertainment of travellers;

and these increasing formed a considerable village, which at length procured a market, and in the year 1557 was constituted a borough. In the year 1381, a sanguinary battle was fought here, between the forces of King Edward II. commanded by Sir Andrew de Harkeley, warden of Carlisle; and those of the discontented Barons, headed by the Earl of Lancaster, in which Sir Roger Bernefield and Sir William Sulley were slain. After the conclusion of the civil war, Thomas Earl of Lancaster, Lord Warren de Lisle, and divers others, were executed at Pontefract and York, being parties concerned in the rebellion. On raising the banks to prevent floods at this place in the year 1792, a great number of human bones, with pieces of broken swords and other arms, were found a little below the bridge; most probably the remains of the slain in the above-named memorable battle. Boroughbridge has several fairs, as will be seen from the List of Fairs contained in this publication. There are also annual races. There are here three stupendous obelisks called *the arrows*, of an irregular form, though somewhat pyramidal and worn by exposure to the weather into channels at the top, which makes them appear as if fluted. In Leland's time there were four of these *arrows*, but one of them has since disappeared either from decay or from some other cause which is unexplained. The remaining three stand nearly in a line from North to South. The northernmost obelisk, which stands nearly West from the town, is 18 feet high, and is supposed to weigh 36 tons; the centre obelisk is 22½ feet high, and is computed at 60 tons; and that to the South is 23 feet 4 inches high, and of about the same dimensions as that in the centre. They are formed of the coarse rag-stone or mill-stone grit, and it is the general opinion, that they were brought from a quarry at Plumpton, near Harrogate. It is difficult to determine by whom and for what purpose they were erected. Dr. Stukeley supposes them to have been placed here by the Druids, and he imagines that in this place they held a great annual festival resembling the Olympic games, and that these stones were the "Meta," by which the race was measured. Dr. Stillingfleet imagines that they were British deities, erected to be worshipped at the time when our ancestors were in Pagan darkness. The late Mr. Har-

grove, the ingenious and laborious historian of Knaresbro', favours the opinion that they were the "Meta" round which the chariots were turned in the chariot races. Dean Gale and Dr. Lister suppose these obelisks to be the work of the Romans, and in that opinion the profound Drake, in his Eboracum, coincides. Leland, Camden and Drake all contend that they were erected by the Romans to commemorate some important victory. In this conflict of opinions it is difficult to decide upon either their object or their use, and we shall content ourselves with having quoted these authorities without adding to the number of the theorists. Boroughbridge has no Corporation. The chief constables are Mr. Humphrey and Mr. John Gilbertson.

## BRADFORD,

Is situated in the parish of that name, in the Wapentake of Morley, and in the liberty of the honour of Postlefract. It is in the very heart of the manufacturing country, being nearly a central point between Halifax, Keighley, Leeds, Wakefield, Dewsbury and Huddersfield. It is 3 miles from Halifax, 10 from Leeds, 14 from Wakefield, 18 from Huddersfield, and 200 from London. The parish is very extensive, being fifteen miles in length, and at an average four in breadth; it of course contains about 40,000 acres, and comprehends the following townships, Alerton, Eccleshill, Shipley, North Bierley, Bowling, Horton, Clayton, Thornton, Heaton, Manningham, Wilden and Howarth, all which are very populous. The town is pleasantly situated, at the junction of three beautiful and extensive vallies; it is built almost entirely of stone; the soil is dry, and the air is sharp and salubrious, the annual mortality in the

town formerly not exceeding one in fifty. In Bradford, as in almost every other manufacturing town in the West Riding, the inhabitants have of late years suffered considerable annoyance from the smoke emitted from steam engine furnaces, and they look forward with some impatience to the removal of this increasing nuisance, which may so easily be effected.—Worsted stuffs form the staple manufacture of this town and neighbourhood, but broad and narrow cloths, wool-cards, and combs are also made here to a considerable extent, and the cotton trade from Lancashire has found its way into this district. The spinning of worsted yarn is also a considerable trade here, and has tended not only to enrich individuals, but to promote the general prosperity of the place. Coal and iron are found in great abundance in the neighbourhood, and the Low Moor and Bowling iron works, which are both in the immediate neighbourhood, are well known in every part of the country, and enjoy a deserved reputation. Bradford, in addition to its other advantages for trade, possesses the convenience of a navigable canal, which is cut from the Leeds and Liverpool canal near Shipley, about 3 miles to the north, and penetrates into the heart of the town, affording excellent convenience for the loading and unloading of merchandise. The piece hall in this place is an excellent mart for stuff goods, it is 144 feet long by 36 feet broad, and is divided into two apartments, the upper and the lower chamber. This building serves occasionally as a court house, and the general quarter Sessions of the peace are held in it. No manufacturing town in England has perhaps suffered so little from the depression of trade as Bradford. In war and in peace it has been alike prosperous. It has indeed felt the vicissitudes of trade in common with other places, but the depression has generally been of short duration, and it has been among the first to feel the vivifying effects of the return of prosperous times. As one symptom of this prosperity, it may be stated, that within the last ten years the population of the town has increased 5,297, and by the census of 1821 amounts to 18,064 souls. The parish church which stands on the site of an edifice much more ancient, is a Gothic structure of considerable antiquity; it was built in the reign of

Henry VI. and after fifteen years labour, finished in the 36th year of that reign. The tower is of later date, and was not completed till the 23rd, of Henry VII. Formerly the advowson of this church, together with that of Calverley, was in the crown, but it was given by Queen Mary to the Archbishop of York. Since that period the benefice has passed into private hands, and Mr. Fawcett is the present patron. The Vicar is the Rev. Henry Heap. A new church, called Christ's Church, has lately been erected here, in a commodious situation, and has a very handsome and airy appearance. There are also meeting houses for the worship of dissenters of the Unitarian, Independent, Baptist and Methodist persuasions. The grammar school at Bradford was chartered and liberally endowed by King Charles. The old school having been for many years in a very ruinous condition, an act of parliament was obtained in the year 1818, to enable the governors to dispose of lands, &c. for the erection of a new school house, and a dwelling house for the head master. The former has just been completed, in an airy part of the town, and is a large and elegant structure, equal, if not superior to any in this or the adjacent counties. Besides, a large room for the purposes of instruction, there is a library and a porter's lodge. The dwelling house for the head master is not yet erected, but it is expected that the governors will proceed with it with all convenient dispatch. Some years ago this was a school of considerable eminence, and several of the first characters in the neighbourhood have been educated on its foundation. It is one of the twelve schools that have the privilege of sending candidates for Lady Elizabeth Hastings's Exhibition at Queen's College, Oxford. The present masters are, the Rev. Samuel Slack, A. M. head master; Mr. John Bowman, under master; and Mr. William Simpson, writing and mathematical master. This town does not appear to have been of any great note in former times, and its ancient history is in consequence rather meagre. It was a member of the ancient Saxon parish of Dewsbury, as appears from Domesday book, at which time it was dependant upon Dewsbury in an ecclesiastical, and Pontefract in a civil capacity. In the civil wars in the reign of Charles I. the inhabitants strenu-

ously adhered to the Parliament, and twice repulsed a large body of the king's troops from the garrison of Leeds. Sir Thomas Fairfax afterwards came to their assistance with 800 foot and 60 horse. This brought upon them a powerful army commanded by the Earl of Newcastle, who invested the town, and attempted to storm it in several places. Sir Thomas Fairfax made a vigorous defence, but having exhausted his ammunition, he offered to capitulate; the enemy however refused to grant the conditions, and he, with fifty horse, cut his way through their lines and made his retreat. According to the conjectures of antiquarians the name of *Bradford* is derived from the ford at the bottom of the church brow; yet it is difficult to imagine how a water so insignificant could have acquired the epithet of "*broad*." The term *broad*, is, however, in Yorkshire frequently applied to rivers which have no peculiar title to that designation, and hence the river Aire where it passes Leeds, is by many called the *Broad Aire*. The ancient families in this parish have never been very numerous, and they are now principally either removed or extinct. Archbishop Sharp was born in Bradford, on the 14th of February, 1644, and was the son of Thomas Sharp, a tradesman, in that place. There is no doubt of his consanguinity to the Sharps of Horton, but Thoresby failing, as Dr. Whitaker imagines, in his usual industry, has not discovered the connecting link. Dr. Richard Richardson was born at Bierley hall, and was an ornament to his native parish, which has produced more valuable than distinguished characters. In ancient times the market was held in Bradford on the *Sunday*, because, as Dr. Whitaker surmises, the church was situated at one extremity of the parish, and few persons would have resorted to it from the more distant quarters, who had not the additional inducement of purchasing and carrying home necessaries for their families. The following is an original and curious account of this place given by Leland, in the reign of Henry VIII. "*Bradeforde*, a praty, quick market toun, dividid aut eo amplius, minus Wackefelds. It hath one paroch church, and a chapel of St. Sitha, it standith much by clothing, and is distant vi miles from Halifax, and four miles from Christea Abbay, there is a confluence in this toun of three

Brokes, one riseth above Boulton Haul, so that the bed is a mile dim. from the town, and this at the town hath a bridge of one arch. Another riseth a ii mile of, having a mille and a bridge of..... The 3 riseth four miles of, having....." The relative consequence of Leeds and Bradford

was very different at that time, and at present; for "Leeds," saith our author, "two miles lower than Christal Abbay, an Aire rywer, is a praty market, having one paroch church, reasonably well buidd, (that is the town, not the church) and as large as Bradeforde but not so quik as it."

The market, if such it can be called, is on Wednesday. The country around it is chiefly agricultural, but a manufacture of hop-bagging is carried on in the place to some extent. The town is tolerably well built, and has in it several good shops. In the tenth century, Archbishop Wulstan, obtained Cawood for the see of York, from Athelstan. In the reign of Richard II. Archbishop Neville flourished here. In the time of Henry IV. Archbishop Bennet built the hall, and his successor, Archbishop Kemp, built the gate, which is now standing. The celebrated Cardinal Wolsey resided at this castle a whole summer, and part of the winter, where he was preparing to be publicly enthroned at York, when he was arrested on a charge of high treason by the Earl of Northumberland, who had orders to conduct him to London; but the death of the Cardinal at Leicester, terminated that life which the extinction of his ambitious hopes had rendered no longer worth preserving. The castle was demolished during the civil wars; forty years ago the vaults and foundations were dug up, and nothing now remains of this once stupendous edifice but the ruins of the great gate-way, and a few other fragments which the corroding tooth of time is fast crumbling to dust.

## DEWSBURY,

(With Dawson green and Dewsbury moor.)

Is situated in the ancient parish of that name, in the wapentakes of Agbrigg and Morley, and in the liber-

ty of the manor of Wakefield; it is 5 miles from Wakefield; 8 from Leeds; the same distance from Huddersfield; 9 from Bradford; 10 from Halifax; and 187 from London. The market is on Wednesday. This town stands at the foot of a hill, near the River Calder, and is a place of great antiquity.—Dewsbury was the common centre from which the light of Christianity diverged over the dale of Calder to the north and to the east and west far beyond it; the parent of the parishes of Thornhill and Burton, which are known to have existed in the time of the Conqueror, and of those of Almondbury, Kirkheaton, Huddersfield, and Bradford, all of which continue to attest their ancient dependence by prescriptive payments to the incumbent of the mother church; to which may be added, on the clearest evidence, those of Halifax and Mirfield, though they have either ceased to pay such an acknowledgment, or were not originally charged with it. The whole of the Saxon parish of Dewsbury may be estimated at an area of 400 miles. In all these circumstances it forms an exact counterpart to the original parish of Whalley, in Lancashire. The two churches were placed in the first expansion of their respective vallies, that of East and West Calder, and the point at which the two original parishes touched is about 23 miles from Dewsbury and 14 from Whalley. An opinion has obtained currency that the Parish Church of Dewsbury was built during the missionary labours of Paulinus. This opinion Dr. Whitaker combats in his "Loidis and Elmete;" he however maintains, that though the personal ministry of Paulinus was not immediately followed by the erection of churches, yet that this apostle of Northumbria erected basilica or crosses, and it is probable that the present Parish Church of Dewsbury stands upon the site of one of these Saxon edifices. The following inscription is placed on a cross which at present stands at the east end of the chancel, on the outside of the church—"Pavlinvs hic prædicavit et Celebravit, A. D. 627." This is however, not the identical Saxon wheel cross, but a fac simile of it, made probably from Camden's traditionary copy.—Some years ago there was found in making an excavation on the estate of Mr. Halliley an old iron spear in good preservation, supposed to be Roman; and in the spring of the last year.

(1821) Mr. Carrett, in digging foundations for his offices, found inclosed in a small building of stone about 5 feet square, covered with a strong arch of stone about 3 feet below the surface, an ancient jug or pitcher, of small size, supposed also to be Roman; at the same time was found, and within four yards of the above, an ancient well, walled round with stone, about 8 yards deep, filled up with rubble stones, which has since been cleaned out, but nothing particular discovered. It is supposed to have been filled up for centuries. In the years 1766 and 1767, the walls of the church gave way, and were pulled down, but with a laudable regard to the preservation of the productions of antiquity, all the inside of the church which could be preserved, was permitted to stand. This partial demolition brought to light, not the original cross of Paulinus, but some remnants probably of equal antiquity, (amongst the most singular and valuable of which is part of a Saxon tomb) these are now deposited in the garden of the Vicarage-house. Antiquarians supposed the name *Dewsbury* to be derived from the original planter of the village *Dui* or *Dew*, who previous to the arrival of Paulinus, had fixed his abode, and fortified his "*Burg*."—This supposition does not derive much countenance from Domesday-book, in which the town is called—DEWSBERIA. Another conjecture holds, that the original name is *Dewsborough*, or God's Town. A superstitious practice of considerable antiquity still exists here, which consists in ringing the large bell of the church at midnight on Christmas eve, and this knell is called "the Devil's passing bell." For some years this place has been again rising into consequence. It can now boast many extensive manufacturing establishments of blankets, woollen cloths, and carpets; and the population, as well as the wealth of the town, is rapidly on the increase. Three new churches are about to be erected in this parish, under the million act, the sites of which are to be at Earlebeaton, Hanging Heaton, and Dewsbury-moor. Besides the Established Church, there are two Methodist Chapels, and one Calvinistic Dissenters' Chapel; there are likewise two Free Schools for boys and girls, and one school where the national system of education prevails. This place is admirably situated for its inland navigation, which extends along the whole of the

navigable part of the river Calder, and affords a canal communication to Huddersfield, from which goods are forwarded to Manchester and to the Western Sea with great despatch and regularity. Within the last few years, a fine spacious new road has been cut, at great expense, by a number of public-spirited inhabitants, from Dewsbury to Leeds, and hopes are entertained that one of the mails, (which already runs between Leeds and Huddersfield,) will speedily pass on this route from Hull to Liverpool.

## DONCASTER

Is situated in the parish of that name, in the wapentake of Strafforth and Tickhill, and in the liberty of the honor of Pontefract; it is nine miles from Bawtry, twelve from Rotherham, ten from Thorne, fifteen from Ferrybridge, 15 from Pontefract, by the new Barnsdale road, and 163 miles from London. The town is pleasantly situated on the South bank of the river Don, and is one of the most clean, airy, and elegant towns in the British dominions. The great North road from London to Edinburgh passes through the whole length of the town, taking in its range Hall gate, High street, French gate, and Marsh gate, and its inhabitants in trade derive considerable advantages from the never-ceasing intercourse kept up on this road. The public buildings are the parish church, dedicated to St. George, several dissenting meeting houses, the town hall, built in the year 1744, at an expense of £8000, and the theatre. The church stands on the site of an ancient castle near the banks of the Don, and is of antiquity too remote to be traced with any degree of precision. Some years ago, when the church underwent a repair, a stone, bearing the date of 1071, was taken out of the wall at the West end, and it is probable that the erection of this edifice is at least in some of its parts as remote as the Norman conquest.— It is a spacious and elegant structure, and has a fine square tower, 141 feet high. The baptismal font bears the stamp of great antiquity, and is supposed to be of Saxon sculpture. No tithes or glebe, or Easter-offerings, are annexed to the vicarage of Doncaster, of which the stipend is only £66 a year, while the rectory, at present the property of Miss Sharp, a descendant of Dr. Sharp, archbishop of York, is worth from £1000 to £1200 per annum.\* The other places of worship in Doncaster are, the Presbyterian chapel, built in 1740, two Methodist chapels, a Meeting house for the Society of Friends, and the Independent chapel, built in 1804, which is situated on the East side of Hall gate, and is an elegant structure. The charitable institutions of Doncaster consist of an Hospital, founded by Mr. Thomas Ellis, in the 30th year of the reign of Queen Elizabeth, for the maintenance of six

decayed housekeepers of good reputation; a public Dispensary, erected in 1792, by the Corporation, for the purpose of administering advice and medicine gratuitously to poor persons, and towards the expenses of such establishment the founders subscribe 100 guineas per annum, the remainder of the fund being supplied by the donations and annual subscriptions of the benevolent. In 1719 a Poor House was erected at Doncaster; and in 1799, a House of Industry was established.— There are also various benevolent societies for relieving the sick and destitute. In the ground story of the Town hall there is a Free Grammar School, to which the Corporation have added an English school, and endowed it with £100 per annum.\* The Town Hall was repaired and beautified in 1784, and in 1800 the stone work, which time had decayed, was repaired, and the edifice considerably elevated. Here the town's records are kept, and the chief business of the corporation transacted; the Court of Requests for the recovery of small debts, and the meetings of the Justices to transact the business of the district are also held here, the latter every Saturday. The market day is on the Saturday, and the corn market of Doncaster may rank among the first in the North of England, the accommodations for holding the different markets are extremely liberal, and they are all well supplied. On the second Saturday in June (O.S.) a wool market commences here, and continues every Saturday, until the 6th of August. There is also an Agricultural Meeting for exciting emulation in cultivation, the breed of cattle, &c, held annually in the latter end of July or the beginning of August. Doncaster, like Leeds, is not a parliamentary borough. The funds of the corporation are extremely ample, amounting to at least £7000 a year, and a considerable portion of which is employed in improving the town and its precincts, and adding to the comforts of its inhabitants. The first charter granted to Doncaster was by Richard I. and James II. conferred upon the Corporation royal charters in the first and fourth years of his reign. The corporation of Doncaster consists of a Mayor, a Recorder, a Town Clerk, 12 Aldermen, and 24 Common Councilmen, the 3 senior Aldermen being invested with the au-

thority of Justices of the Peace. The following is a list of the Body Corporate and of the other public officers of this ancient borough, in August, 1821.

Doncaster has never been a manufacturing town, and several attempts to establish manufactures in it have

failed. Neither is it a place of much general trade, though it enjoys the advantage of a fine inland navigation, and has coals at a moderate price.—The inhabitants have many advantages rarely to be met with in other places. They have no assessments for lighting or paving the streets, the expense of which is defrayed by the corporation; no police rate or constable ley is levied; and the expenses for poor's rates and highways are very moderate. The air is remarkably pure and salubrious, and as might naturally be expected, the population is progressively on the increase. In the year 1801 the number of inhabitants amounted to 5697; in 1811 to 6935, and by the census of 1821 to 8544. The annual ratio of mortality does not exceed one in forty-four.—There are few towns in the kingdom in which so great a portion of the inhabitants possess independent fortunes, and the neighbourhood is remarkable for opulent families. In a town so situated there are very naturally numerous seminaries for education, and a dozen highly respectable boarding-schools for youth of both sexes may be enumerated in the town and its immediate neighbourhood. The races which are generally held the third week in September, and continue four days, afford a source of considerable emolument to the town, and have for some years been progressively increasing in splendour and attraction. The St. Leger's stakes in particular excite a lively interest amongst the votaries of the turf in every part of the kingdom. The race ground, perhaps stands unrivalled; and the grand-stand, built at the expense of the corporation, for its elegance and accommodation is not to be excelled. The corporation give a plate of 50 guineas, besides 20 guineas towards the Doncaster stakes, and 20 guineas in addition to the filly stakes. There is besides his Majesty's plate of 100 guineas, and a gold cup of the value of 100 guineas given by the stewards. Doncaster is a town of great antiquity; it is the Danum of Antoninus, and was the garrison of the Crispinian horse under the Dux Britannia. Ninnius gives it the name of *Caer Daun*; by the Saxons it was called *Dona Cæcen*, and by the Scots *Doncastle*; in the Charter granted by Richard I. it is called *Danecastre*, and by Dugdale *Donacastre*. These names it is obvious have all a reference to the Roman station, and signify the "*castrum*," or camp on the Don. The town stands on the great Roman road called

Watling street, which may be traced over Scawsby Lees, near Adwick-le-street, and in many other places northward towards Legiolium, now Castleford, near the confluence of the rivers Aire and Calder. In the place where the Town hall now stands was formerly a church, dedicated to St. Magdalene. There was also two priories, St. James and St. Nicholas, with a house of Dominicans, which were founded in the reign of Henry III.\* It does not appear that Doncaster was ever a walled town, although from a grant of a messuage, dated in the year 1300, it seems to have been then surrounded by a ditch. As to the castle on the site of which now stands the parish church of St. George, it is not known by whom it was founded nor when it was destroyed. Camden says that the town was destroyed by lightning in the year 750, and it is supposed that the castle was burnt down at that time. Doncaster cannot boast of many remains of antiquity, but at the south end of the town is a venerable column, with the following inscription round it in old Roman capitals, ICEST. EST. LA. CRVICE. OTE. D. TILLI. AKI. ALME. DEV. EN. FAICE. MERCI. —*This is the Cross of Ote de Tilley, on whose soul God have mercy, Amen.* Although the situation of Doncaster renders it an important pass to a country extremely convenient for the marching of armies, it does not appear from any records extant that either the town or its immediate neighbourhood has ever been the scene of any great military transactions. The environs of Doncaster are remarkably pleasant, and on the western side they are delightfully picturesque. Potteric Car on the south, which till the year 1766, was entirely a morass extending about 4 miles in length and nearly three in breadth from east to west, is now completely drained, and covered in summer with luxuriant crops. Balby and Warmsworth, two neighbouring villages, are remarkable for being the places where the celebrated George Fox, the founder of the sect called Quakers held their first meetings, and where they suffered persecutions, very little short of the inquisition. Happily those days are passed, never we hope to return, and in the cause of religious as well as of civil liberty is established upon its only secure foundation—the light and knowledge of a whole people.

FERRYBRIDGE,

Is a handsome well-built place, in the parish of Ferry Fryston, the wapentake of Barkston Ash and the liberty of the honour of Pontefract. It is 2 miles from Pontefract, 15 from Doncaster, the same distance from Leeds, 22 from York, and 181 from London. The town which is small, is situated on the southern bank of the river Aire, over which it has a handsome stone-bridge. The inhabitants find their chief support from the passage of travellers for whose accommodation there are several capital Inns. This pass over the Aire was thought of great consequence in the time of Edward IV. and the possession of it occasioned a severe conflict between the armies of the rival houses of York and Lancaster. In the adjacent fields, and particularly about Brotherton Marsh there have been often found human skeletons, ancient armour, and other relics of intestine war.

### GISBURN,

In the parish of that name, in the wapentake of Staincliffe, and the liberty of Staincliffe, is 7 miles from Clitheroe, the same distance from Colne, 11 miles from Skipton, the same distance from Settle, 12 from Barnley and 281 from London. The market was formerly on Monday, but it has now almost ceased to exist. There is however, a fair for cattle held on the Monday, every fortnight throughout the year. The country around is wholly agricultural and the land is let out principally in grazing farms, for which it is admirably adapted, and innumerable flocks of cattle are fattened for different markets. There is here no trade or manufacture. The church is a decent structure, with a tower, side aisles and choir, built of fell stone, probably in the reign of Henry VII. The painted glass in the windows is supposed by Dr. Whitaker, from whom we quote, to be of the age of Henry VIII. The choir in the north side of the chancel belongs to the Listers of Westby and Arnoldsbiggin, that on the south to Sir John Lister Kaye, Baronet, of Moor Grange, as lord of Midhope. The living is a vicarage, in the gift of the crown, and is valued in the books at £11.6s.8d. The manor of Midhope in this parish is one of the most extensive grazing farms in Craven. The manor of Rimington, also in this parish, has long been remarkable for a rich vein of lead ore, which yields a considerable portion of silver; and several years ago a person was convicted and executed at York, for counterfeiting the silver coin of the realm, in metal supposed to have been procured from the lead of Rimington. The manor of Gisburn is now the property of Lord Ribblesdale. Gisburn Park, in this parish, the residence of his Lordship, is beautifully situated at the confluence of the Ribble and Stockbeck. The house, with much simplicity, has a very elegant and pleasing effect. The lodge, through which is the entrance into the park, is a most beautiful piece of Gothic architecture, richly ornamented

with figures, pinnacles, &c., carved with the greatest taste and elegance from designs of the present noble owner. In the house is a series of good portraits, among which may be distinguished Lord Chief Justice Lister, of the time of Henry VIII.; General Lambert, apparently an original; his son, an excellent painting by himself; and Oliver Cromwell, by Sir Peter Lely. This portrait is said to have been taken by his own order, and was presented to General Lambert; the portrait is held to be very faithful and exhibits the Protector with all the warts and protuberances which distinguished his homely countenance. On the canvass is painted the Word "Nec" which probably refers to his peremptory mandate for the immediate execution of the King. Here is preserved an ancient drinking horn, taken from a buffalo, which is nearly twenty inches long, and contains two quarts. It is supported by three silver feet, resembling those of a man in armour; and round the middle is a filleting inscribed—"Qui pugnet contra tres perdet duos"—he that fights against three shall lose two. Gisburn Park is chiefly remarkable for the herd of wild cattle, descendants of that indigenous race which once inhabited the wild forests of Lancashire. This species are white, save the tip of their noses, which are black; and rather vicious, especially when protecting their young. They breed with tame cattle. Within the manor of Gisburn, on the high bank of the Ribble, is a small, but very entire square fort, called Castle Haugh, and near it a barrow, which being opened was found to contain a rude earthen urn. The population of the town of Gisburn amounts, by the census of 1821, to 690 souls.

## HALIFAX

Is the centre of a large parish of that name, in the wapentake of Morley, and in the liberty of the honour of Pontefract. It is 8 miles from Bradford, the same distance from Huddersfield, 16 from Rochdale, 11½ from Keighley, and 196 from London. It is situated on the south-eastern declivity of a gently rising eminence, but being inclosed by a chain of hills which stretch from east to south, it seems, as approached in that direction, to stand in a deep valley. From the boundary of Lancashire to the valley which separates the townships of Halifax and Ovenden from Northowram, the whole basis of the parish is gritstone. Immediately to the east of this valley argillaceous strata, with their general concomitants, stone and iron, once more appear; and to this cause, together with the abundant supply of fuel, and the rapid descent of its numerous brooks, so important in manufacture before the introduction of the steam engine, the parish of Halifax is greatly indebted for its wealth and population.

The parish is very extensive; it comprehends 124 square miles, or 79,200 acres. The land in the neighbourhood of Halifax is naturally sterile and unproductive; it is, however, in general, in a good state of cultivation; and this township, more perhaps than any other in the country, serves to prove how completely the wealth and industry of man can triumph over the most stubborn indispositions of nature. In a farming district the whole township would have laid waste for ever. Here it is the tiller who has made the soil, not the soil which has enriched the tiller. In the year 1574, when Camden travelled in Yorkshire, this parish was peopled with 12,000 souls, and such was then the unproductive state of the soil, that the venerable antiquarian observes, that there were in it more human beings than beasts of every description. Since that time the population has increased nearly to 100,000, as the following return, made in the year 1821, will show, and the cattle have probably increased in an equal ratio:—

The population of the town of Halifax, including those parts of the town which lay in the townships of Northowram and Southowram, is, males, 6579—females, 7485—total, 14,064 persons.

Dr. Whitaker in his "Loidis and Elmets," published in 1816, supposes that the tide of population in Halifax was then at its flood, and enters into rather an elaborate argument to prove that the reflux was at hand, but in this, as in some other of the Doctor's observations concerning Halifax, he seems to have erred, and, as if to set at nought his theories, the population, within the last 10 years, has increased nearly 20,000, of which astonishing augmentation one-half, at least, has unquestionably taken place since the promulgation of the Doctor's prediction. The town of Halifax is nearly three quarters of a mile in length from East to West, but the breadth is narrow and very irregular; it is generally well built, partly of brick, but principally of stone, which latter material is very abundant. It has a good market which is held on the Saturday, where, besides provisions and other articles common to all markets, a considerable quantity of the manufactures of the neighbourhood are brought for sale. The woollen manufacture, for which this town and neighbourhood have been famous for ages, prevailed here, though on a very limited scale, as early as the year 1414,\* and continued to increase from the year 1448 to 1540, during which period the number of houses increased from 13 to 520.† The manufacturers of Flanders, seeking refuge from the persecutions with which they were assailed in their own country, repaired in great numbers to England, and many of them are supposed to have settled at Halifax. This conjecture derives some strength from the similarity which exists in the dialect of the labouring class here and in the low countries, particularly in Friesland, and hence the following distich:—

"Gooid brade, botter and sheese  
"Is gooid Halifax, and gooid Friese."

Halifax cannot boast of great antiquity; its name is not found in Doomsday book, nor is it mentioned in any ancient record before a grant of its church was made by the Lord of the Manor, in the early part of the 12th century, to Earl Warren, of the priory of Lewes, in Sussex. The origin of the name of the town is also uncertain.—It is probably half Saxon and half Norman. In the deep valley, then embos-

somed in the woods, where the parish church now stands, was a hermitage dedicated to St. John the Baptist, the imaginary sanctity of which attracted a great number of pilgrims in every direction. Four ways, by which the town of modern Halifax is entered, still distinctly point at the parish church as their common centre; these were the roads by which the pilgrims approached the object of their devotion, and hence the name of Halifax, or *Holy Ways*, for *fax*, in Norman French, is an old plural noun, denoting highways.‡ If this was formerly a hermitage, it must be acknowledged that a more proper place could not have been chosen for that purpose. The traveller, who from the adjacent heights, looks down on the situation of Halifax, and, by the aid of imagination, takes a retrospective view of times long passed, will readily form in his mind the idea of a deep and lonesome valley, where almost impenetrable woods and rugged sterility forbade the herdsman to enter with his flocks; and will contemplate with equal delight and astonishment the effects of manufactures and commerce, which have so wonderfully changed the scene, and overspread the dreary desert with wealth and population.§ And yet this is the district on which Dr. Whitaker has chosen to pour out the vials of his unholy indignation. This district it is which the Dr. says has *declined* into manufactures. Declined, indeed! Which manufactures, he should have said, have transformed a sterile wilderness into a fruitful country, full of people, of wealth, and of comfort. That the manners of the people of Halifax are somewhat primitive, and remote from courtly polish, may be readily admitted, but that a stranger in going amongst them "is shocked "by a tone of defiance in every voice, "and an air of fierceness in every "countenance,"|| is an unpardonable exaggeration, the suggestion of a prejudiced mind, and as remote from the truth as Dr. Whitaker's portrait of the parishioners of Halifax is from fidelity. The indiscriminating harshness with which this reverend antiquarian has treated the manufacturing population serves to prove that he writes under strong prejudice, and his total want of information upon all subjects of trade and commerce, except with the book-

sellers, leads to the regret, that any consideration of profitable employment should have induced him so far to do violence to his subject and to his feelings, as to engage in writing the history of one of the principal manufacturing districts of the kingdom.

The town of Halifax being situated in a rugged and mountainous country, and out of the ordinary range of hostile armies, does not appear, from the records that are extant, to have suffered much from the calamities of war. In the civil wars, in the reign of Charles I. this town was garrisoned by the Parliamentarians, and seems to have been strongly attached to their cause. At that period an obstinate action took place in this neighbourhood, at the top of Halifax bank, adjoining the road to Wakefield; this gave the place the name of *Blood Field*, which designation it retains to this day. There are also in different parts of the parish some vestiges of intrenchments, supposed to have been thrown up in those unhappy times, together with some traditionary accounts of skirmishes, which were not however of sufficient consequence to gain a place in the written records of the times. After the civil wars were ended, Halifax was represented in parliament, both in the time of the Commonwealth and under the Protectorate,\* but it appears that this privilege was withdrawn on the restoration. The vestiges of antiquity found in this parish are not numerous; but about five and forty years ago a countryman, digging peat on Mixenden Moor, near Halifax, struck his spade through a black polished stone, resembling a hone or whetstone; adjoining to this was a most beautiful brass celt, in excellent preservation. These remains were accompanied by four arrow heads of black flint; by a light battle axe of a beautiful green pebble; and lastly, with a hollow gouge, or scoop, of hard grey-stone, evidently intended for the excavation of canoes or other wooden vessels. The last is unique—no implement for this purpose having ever been discovered before. Together they seem to have formed the imperishable part of the arms of a British soldier, who, by some other means than in battle, had perished, perhaps two thousand years ago, among these wastes, where all remains of the body, together with the handles of the weapons, had long been decomposed, and mixed with the

common earth.† The parish church of Halifax stands near the SE. end of the town, and the choir directly pointing the entrance from Wakefield. It is a large Gothic structure, 64 yards in length, and about 20 in breadth within the walls. The precise year when the building was begun cannot be ascertained, but all evidence internal, as well as external, fixes the erection of it in the reign of Henry VI. Since that time it has been frequently re-edified, and the chancel seems to have been an addition to the original fabric. The steeple, which was built by the munificence of the families of Lacy and Savile, the founders of the parish of Halifax, was begun in the year 1450; and the tower, which is well proportioned, is said to be 117 feet in height from the ground to the summit of the pinnacles. Within the church are two chapels. That on the North was erected in conformity with the will of Archbishop Rokeby, who died in 1521, and ordered that his bowels should be buried in the choir of this church, and his body in the new chapel at Sandal. Nearly opposite, but of much greater extent, is the chapel of Dr. Holdsworth, the 12th vicar, who was unhappily murdered in the vicarage-house, in 1556, and whose remains are deposited here. The parish, or vicarage of Halifax, is larger than the whole county of Rutland. Its extent is not less than 17 miles from East to West, and about 11 miles, on an average, from North to South; it contains 26 townships and hamlets; and besides the parish church of Halifax, of which the Rev. Samuel Knight is vicar, there are in the parish 12 chapels, to which the vicar appoints the curates. Elland and Heptonstall enjoy the parochial privilege of burying and marrying. The living of Halifax is in the gift of the crown, and it is valued in the books at £84 18s. 6d.

For many ages a mode of trial and execution existed in the forest of Hardwick, which was co-extensive with the parish of Halifax, which will claim some attention. This proceeding was expressed by the name of "The Gibbet Law;" of which Bentley, in his history of Halifax, gives the following account:—"The inhabitants within the forest of Hardwick had a custom, from time immemorial, that if a felon were taken within their liberty, with goods stolen out, or with-

in the liberty of the said forest, either hand-habend, back-berand, or confessand, any commodity of the value of thirteen-pence half-peuny, he should, after three markets, or meeting days, within the town of Halifax, next after such apprehension, and being condemned, be taken to the gibbet, and have his head cut off from his body."

The felon was however to be publicly and deliberately tried, by a sort of jury, consisting of the frith-burghers within the liberty. The process of the gibbet law was this:—When the felon was apprehended, he was immediately brought before the lord's bailiff, at Halifax, who kept the common gaol in the town, had the custody of the axe, and was the legal executioner. The bailiff then issued his summons to the constables of four several townships within the liberty, to require four frith-burghers within each, to appear before him on a certain day, to examine into the truth of the charge. At the trial, the accuser and the accused were confronted before the jury, and the goods stolen were produced. If the party accused was acquitted, he was instantly liberated; if condemned, he was either executed immediately, if that was the principal market day, or sat in the stocks on the less meeting days with the stolen good on his back, if portable, or if not, they were placed before him. The jurors were not sworn, and bishop Hall insinuates, that they were not impartial—

"Or some more atrait-laced Juror of the rest  
"Impannelled on an Halifax inquest."

It is not easy to suppose how justice could be perverted by a tribunal of this nature; there were no niceties of evidence to balance, no doubtful points to clear; the whole duty of the court consisted in identifying the goods alleged to be stolen, in ascertaining their value, so as to bring them within the custom, and in proving that they were either hand-habend, or back-berand, or confessand, that is, that the offender was taken with them, in his hand, or having them on his back, or that he had confessed to have stolen them. Dr. Grey supposes that thirteen-pence half-peuny may have been called hangman's wages, in allusion to Halifax law; and Mr. Watson supposes, that this sum was given at Halifax, as a gratuity to the executioner. The execution always took place on the great market day, in order to strike the more terror into the neighbourhood. When the criminal

was brought to the gibbet, which stood a little way out of the town, on the West end, the execution was performed by means of an engine, called a gibbet, which was raised upon a platform four feet high, and thirteen feet square, faced on every side with stone, and ascended by a flight of steps. In the middle of this platform were placed two upright pieces of timber, fifteen feet high, joined at the top by a transverse beam. Within these was a square block of wood, four feet and a half long, which moved up and down by means of grooves made for that purpose; to the lower part of this sliding block was fastened an iron axe, of the weight of 7lb. 12oz. The axe thus fixed was drawn up to the top by a cord and pulley. At the end of the cord was a pin, which being fixed to the block, kept it suspended till the moment of execution, when the culprit having placed his head on the block the pin was withdrawn, and his head was instantly severed from his body. If the offender was condemned for stealing an ox, a sheep, or a horse, the end of the rope was fastened to the beast, which being driven, pulled out the pin, and thus became the executioner. In other cases, the bailiff or his servant cut the rope, and allowed the axe to descend. From this description of the Halifax gibbet, it appears, that it was an engine similar to the guillotine erected in France soon after the breaking out of the revolution, and by which fatal machine so much blood was shed. The Gibbet-law at Halifax seems to have been nearly co-eval with the town itself, but its origin is unknown. It began about the time that the manor of Wakefield, (which includes the present parish of Halifax,) was bestowed upon the Earl of Warren, and it may be traced to as early a date as 1280. Records of the executions are brought down to the year 1650, about which time it ceased, on an intimation to the bailiff, that if these executions were repeated, he would be called to public account for his conduct. The Earl of Morton, regent of Scotland, in passing through Halifax, about the middle of the 16th century, witnessed one of the executions by the gibbet, and ordered a model to be taken of the machine, which he carried into Scotland, and had one of similar construction made from it. This instrument remained long unused, and hence obtained the name of the *Maiden*; but

in the year 1581, that nobleman himself was brought to the block, and suffered by the machine which he had caused to be erected. Remains of these fatal instruments may still be seen, both at the gaol at Halifax, and in the parliament house at Edinburgh. The number of persons executed in Halifax, under the operation of the gibbet, during little more than a century, namely, between 1541 and 1650, amount to no less than 49. And Mr. Watson observes, that this list of executions, combined with the strict discipline observed by the police of Hull, probably gave rise to the proverbial petition of thieves and vagabonds, "From Hull, Hell, and Halifax, good Lord deliver us."

Turning from these ancient usages, on which, from their singularity, we have been induced to bestow more than common attention, we come to the history of modern Halifax. And here the manufactures of the town and neighbourhood first claim attention. This parish is admirably adapted, by its situation and local advantages, for the purpose of manufacture and commerce. The Calder passes within a mile and a half of the town, the nearest point being at Salter's-hebble, from whence merchandize is forwarded to Hull and London. To the west there is another wharf at Sowerby bridge, about two miles from the town, where goods are sent to Rochdale, Manchester and Liverpool, by the Rochdale and the Duke of Bridgewater's canal. — Although Halifax has been noted for several centuries for the manufacture of woollen goods, it was not, till the time of Henry VII. that it obtained any considerable importance. In the beginning of the 18th century the manufacture of woollen stuffs was introduced, and shalloons, tammies, du-roys, everlastings, calimancoes, moreens, shags, serges, baize, &c. have since been made in great perfection. — The shalloons are woven expressly for the Turkey market, and after being dyed a scarlet colour, are sent by the merchants to the Levant, where they are chiefly used for turbans. Formerly the greater part of these goods passed through the hands of the London merchants but they are now principally exported by the merchants of Halifax and Leeds. The cotton trade has extended into this neighbourhood, where it has taken considerable root, and the cards used in the early operations of the manufacture both of wool and cot-

ton, are made here in great perfection, and to a considerable extent. — For the convenience of trade the manufacturers, some years ago, erected, at an expense of £12,000 a handsome edifice of free stone, in the lower part of the town, for the sale of their goods, called the Piece Hall. This building is a large quadrangle, occupying the space of 10,000 yards, with a rustic basement story, or square cippi, at the lower side, and above two other stories, fronted by two entire colonades within, which are spacious walks leading to arched rooms where the goods of the respective manufacturers in the unfinished state are deposited, and exhibited for sale to the merchants, every Saturday, from ten o'clock to twelve. This structure, which unites elegance, convenience, and security, contains 315 separate rooms, and has the merit of being proof both against fire and thieves. — With respect to the first, no part of the building can be consumed but the roof; and for the latter, had the portable goods of the Forresters of Hardwick been so collected, and so inclosed within stately walls, their axe might have rusted, and their gibbet have rotted down, in the interval between two executions. Another public edifice deserving attention in Halifax is a new Church, erected in the upper part of the town, under the sanction of an Act of Parliament, by Dr. Coulthurst; the late worthy vicar, and dedicated to the Holy Trinity. Of this the masonry, like all the modern masonry about the town, is excellent and elaborate. The burial ground exhibits an example of neatness and good taste. The Rev. Wm. Willmott is the perpetual curate. The Methodist Chapel, situated in Church lane, is a spacious and convenient building inwardly, but the exte-



rior appearance is heavy and inelegant. The New Methodists have also a handsome and commodious Chapel in North Parade. There are two Independent Chapels, one called the Square Chapel, a fine lofty structure, built of brick, and situated near the bottom of Horton-street, of which the Rev. Joseph Cockin is the Minister; and the other, in Wade-street, recently erected, of the Doric order of architecture, called Skon Chapel, of which the Rev. Edward Parsons, jun. is the minister. The Particular Baptists have a small chapel on the north-west side of the town; Minister, the Rev. John Ake-royd. The General Baptists have also a small chapel on Haley-hill; Minister, the Rev. Joseph Ellis; and the Unitarians have a convenient small chapel, in Northgate, of which the Rev. Richard Astley is Minister. There is a Subscription Library of some extent, at Ward's-end, but a great portion of the books are in a mutilated state, and too many of the works are in the class of novels. There are three News Rooms; one under the Library; a second at the Upper George Inn, in Crown-street; and one at the Admiral Nelson Inn, on Cow-green. The Charitable Institutions are, the Dispensary, where medical and surgical aid are successfully administered to the poor, who are recommended by subscribers. — The medical officers are Richard Moulson, M. D.; Mason S. Kenay, M. D.; Mr. Joseph Sunderland, Surgeon, and Mr. Wm. Garlick, Surgeon; Mr. J. B. Davis, Apothecary. Nathaniel Waterhouse, of Skilcoats, Salter, who died in 1641, founded an Alms-house in this town, for twelve poor women, and a blue coat hospital for 20 poor children, the schoolmaster whereof has £45 per annum. He also bequeathed yearly salaries to the ministers of several chapels, of £2, £3, £4, and £5 each; a legacy to the free school at Skilcoats, established by Queen Elizabeth, and a house for the lecturer. These bequests, with money for the repair of the banks, amount to £300 per annum. There is in Halifax a school on Dr. Bell's plan, called the National School, near to Trinity Church; and a Lancasterian School, in Abion-street, Cabbage-lane. The Benevolent Society distributes money and clothing to the sick and destitute, during the inclemency of winter. The Baths at Halifax, which are situated at the lower part of the town, in a delightful valley, to the left of the road lead-

ing to Huddersfield, afford a very salubrious accommodation both to the inhabitants and to strangers; they are amply supplied with fine spring water rising in the premises, and comprehend in their suite, cold, warm, and swimming-baths. The places of amusement are the Theatre, at Ward's End, and the Assembly Rooms, adjoining the Talbot Inn; of the former, Mr. Bickerton is the manager. The police office is in Copper-street; the constables for the present year are, George Pollard, Esq. and Samuel Farrar, Esq.; deputy constable, Mr. John Brierley. The magisterial duties of the district are performed by John Dearden, Thomas Horton, Michael Stocks, and William Barstow, Esqrs. and attendance is given every Saturday at the Magistrates' office, Ward's end, for that purpose. The management of the Water-works, and the repair and lighting the public streets are vested, by Act of Parliament, in certain trustees, who are empowered to assess the inhabitants for the same. The town is amply supplied with good water, principally from two springs, rising near Peilan, about a mile N. W. of the town. Mr. Michael Garlick is clerk to the trustees, to which gentleman the Editor of this work is mainly indebted for the accuracy and extent of his topographical information relating to the modern state of Halifax. Mr. John Rothwell and Mr. John Lister are the surveyors of the high-ways. The churchwardens are, Mr. Wm. Rothwell and Mr. Wm. Hoyland; and the overseers, Mr. Nathan Whitley, Mr. John Rothwell, Mr. Wm. Davy, and Mr. Joseph Whiteley; assistant overseer and vestry clerk, Mr. John Casson, jun. A Court of Requests is held here, for the recovery of debts under 40s. of which Mr. John Wilson is clerk.

Mr. Watson's Temple of Fame, for the parish of Halifax, is very capacious, but it is wholly unnecessary to enter upon a list of obscure aspirants to immortality, and it is sufficient to say, that Dr. John Tillotson, Archbishop of Canterbury, was born at Haughton, in the township of Sowerby, in the year 1630, and that a handsome statue is erected to his memory, and placed at the West end of the chapel. Henry Saville, of the illustrious family of that name, was born at Bradley, in the township of Stainland, in the parish of Halifax, on the 30th of Nov. 1549, and was one of the most accom-

plished scholars of his age. David Hartley, M.A. a celebrated physician, was born at Illingworth, in this parish, and acquired great reputation in the early part of the 18th century, for his medical and mathematical writings. The celebrated Daniel de Foe, though not a native of Halifax, being obliged to abscond from his own neighbourhood on account of his political writings, came to this town, and employed himself in writing his book "De Jure Divino," and other literary productions; but in particular he is said to have composed here his famous romance of Robinson Crusoe. Dr.

Herschel, the celebrated astronomer, to whom we are indebted for the discovery of the *Georgium Sidus*, was also an inhabitant of Halifax for some time, and occupied the humble station of organist at the parish church, and musical preceptor, in which his success was so small that he was obliged to quit the place. These celebrated men form the most distinguished luminaries which, for a succession of ages, have adorned the parish of Halifax, and present a constellation of genius of which places with more lofty pretensions might be proud.

### HARROGATE.

THOUGH generally spoken of as a single place, consists in reality of two villages—High and Low Harrogate. From the approximation of the two places, by the yearly erection of new buildings, there is reason to suppose that this distinction will soon cease, and that the popular will soon become the appropriate appellation. In speaking of the distances we shall so consider it. Harrogate is from 2 to 3 miles from Knaresbrough, 11 $\frac{1}{2}$  miles from Ripon, 15 $\frac{1}{2}$  from Leeds, 20 from York, and 211 from London. High Harrogate is in the parish of Knaresbrough, and Low Harrogate in the parish of Pannal, they are both in the wapentake of Claro, and in the liberty of Knaresbrough. To this place, during the summer months the nobility and gentry resort from all parts of Great Britain and Ireland, to receive the benefit of the waters, for which it is so deservedly celebrated. The situation of the place with respect to part of the circumjacent country, is high

and commanding, and the air is of course cool and salubrious. High Harrogate commands a most extensive prospect of the surrounding country, finely varied by towns, villages, fields and plantations. The cathedral of York is seen distinctly from it on a clear day, though at twenty miles distance. Harrogate has risen rapidly into importance during the last half century. It is at present considered one of the principal watering places in the North of England, and several of the Inns now receive annually more company than the whole place contained inhabitants forty years ago.

The spas consist, first, of the *Sulphur Well*, which is situated in Low Harrogate, at the foot of a hill, rising to the South West. The water (open at all times) is received into a circular stone basin, covered with a large leaden cupola, supported by pillars. The spring appears inexhaustible, and supplies alike the numerous visitors and the distant consumption. A number of persons are employed daily in bottling the water to be used at a distance, and when corked immediately on being taken out of the well it will retain its virtue for years. Hence it has become an article of considerable export, and Mr. Blackburn, the proprietor of the promenade rooms, has a large demand in this way. The well is surrounded every morning, during the season, from seven till nine o'clock, by a number of the inhabitants of the place, as well as by a crowd of visitors, who receive the water from the hands of female attendants in pint glasses. It is taken in different quantities, of from one to four glasses at a time. The sulphurous impregnation renders it extremely unuseful at first, but after a little time it becomes less unpalatable. No other precaution or preparative seems necessary, except that of commencing with moderation. This water was not known till many years after the discovery of the Steel waters at High Harrogate, and when discovered, it was for a long time supposed either to be too offensive, or too dangerous to be taken internally, and was therefore at first only used as a lotion for the skin. Time and experience have, however, proved its virtues, and during the whole of the last century, up to the present time, it has been used both internally and externally, by all ranks of people, and with amazing success in scorbutic and other diseases.

Dr. Monro in treating of the sulphur waters, observes, that in small quantities they are good alternatives, and when drunk in large quantities, are strongly purgative; they have been much used and found extremely serviceable in cutaneous disorders and scrofulous cases; and among the best remedies for destroying worms and their nidus, and extremely beneficial in removing indigestion and disorders arising from obstructions. Besides its internal use, the sulphur water taken from the Bog Wells is much in use for warm baths, for the relief of chronic and cutaneous disorders.

The spring next in reputation, though of recent discovery, is the *Cheltenham Water*, which rises in the ground of Mr. Oddy, for the use of which the drinkers pay half-a-crown a week. This water is exhilarating and restorative, and as it contains salt, generally acts as a gentle purgative. Of the Cheltenham water it is usual to drink pretty copiously, both before breakfast and in the middle of the day. Very near this, and in the same garden, is a spring of stronger Chalybeate, but nearly destitute of salt.

Low Harrogate, which is the principal, if not the exclusive seat of the Sulphur Wells, possesses also another valuable spring, discovered in 1783, called the *Crescent Water*, which contains the principal ingredients of the Sulphur Water, in a weaker degree, with the addition of Chalybeate. It is raised by a pump, over which stands a handsome cupola, in the garden of the Crescent, and is the property of Mr. Linforth; the subscription to this well is half-a-guinea for the season.

High Harrogate claims priority of establishment, as a place for visitors. The inn, or hotel, called the Queen's Head, bearing date from the year 1687. The only waters drunk at that time were the Steel waters, obtained from the two Chalybeate springs situated on the common, near the race ground. The principal of these, which is called the *Old Spaw*, was discovered by Captain William Slingsby, in the year 1671, who after several trials of it, preferred it to the Saviniers, in Germany, and ordered it to be enclosed. The dome which now covers this spring was erected by the late Lord Loughborough, who built a neat mansion, and planted a range of trees on his estate near the common. His Lordship's estate, consisting of 156

acres, was subsequently purchased by Dr. John Jaques, the present worthy resident. At the South end of the common, is the *Tewit Well*, so called from the *Tewit* or *Lapwing* being a constant visitor here; it has a stone covering, and, like the *Old Spaw*, is

a *Chalybeate*, vitriolic spring, of a sort of milky taste, strengthening to the system, and particularly useful in cases of the gravel. The following table shows the contents of a wine gallon of each of the Harrogate waters:—

Harrogate is supposed to derive its name from being in the direct road between *Knaresbro'* to *Heywra-park*; and it was originally called *Heywra-gate*, as appears from a grant of land to *St. Robert*.

Visitors take up their residence during their stay, as suits their convenience, either at one of the hotels, or at private lodgings, of which there are many in both Harrogates. The houses all afford good accommodation, some of them in a very superior style of elegance, and the following are their terms:

The recreations of the place are those afforded by the Theatre, the Promenade rooms, the Libraries and the News rooms, the Billiard rooms, the Assembly rooms, and the Race ground. The theatrical season is during the months of July, August and September, and the nights of performance Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday in each week. The balls, to which the company at the different houses are invited, are held on Mon-

day at the Dragon; on Wednesday at the Crown; on Friday at the Granby, and occasionally at the Queen's Head and White Hart Hotels; dancing generally commences at nine o'clock in the evening. The races are pretty frequent, and the visitors often ride their own horses in the generous strife.

The places of worship are *St. John's Chapel*, of which the *Vicar of Knaresbrough* is patron, situated in *High Harrogate*, near the middle of the common, and built by subscription, in 1749. Divine service commences at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, and three in the afternoon every Sunday, and there is morning service every Wednesday and Friday at 11 o'clock. Nearly opposite this chapel of ease, is a *Methodist chapel*, situated in *Paradise-row*, in which there is preaching every Sunday at half past ten in the morning, and half past six in the evening. There is also an Independent chapel, adjoining the *Hope Hotel*, in which there is service every Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, and every Sunday evening at half past six. A new and more commodious chapel, intended for this congregation, is now erecting, near the Dragon, at *High Harrogate*. A small chapel has also been lately erected, near *Low Harrogate*, by the *Independents*.

Besides a great number of post carriages, three stage coaches pass through this place daily; the Tele-

graph, between Leeds and Newcastle; the Union and the Tally-ho, between Leeds and Ripon. A coach also comes from York on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, and returns the same days. The mails are due every morning at seven o'clock, and the delivery commences at 8 o'clock. The office closes at  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 4 in the afternoon.

In the neighbourhood of Harrogate there are several places of fashionable resort, to which the company frequently make excursions; they are—Knaresbrough—Plumpton—Harewood House—Studley Park—Hackfall—Brimham Rocks—Cowthorpe—Bolton Abbey, and Newby, each of which will be found described in its proper place in this work.

By the exertions of several benevolent persons, principally visitors at Harrogate, who have themselves found

the benefit of its waters, a determination was taken at a public meeting, held on the 31st of August, 1821, the Earl of Harewood in the chair, to erect Baths and Hospital Wards for the poor requiring the use of these waters. For the advantages of this institution, which will no doubt speedily be realized, the indigent visitors are much indebted to the Hon. Montague Burgoyne, of East Sheen, Surrey, to whose humane and persevering exertions in the cause of humanity, this tribute is deservedly due. Dr. Hunter, of Leeds, has also aided the good work by his pen; and Mr. Richardson, the surgeon of Harrogate, by his very efficient exertions as treasurer to the fund. The population of Harrogate with Bilton, according to the returns of 1821, is 1,934, being an increase since 1811, of 351.

#### HUDDERSFIELD

Is one of the five principal market towns in the central part of the West Riding; it is in the wapentake of Ayrigg, and in the liberty of the honour of Pontefract, 8 miles from Halifax, 16 from Leeds, 13 from Wakefield, 16 from Bradford, 24 from Manchester, and 181 from London. The town which derives its name from *Oder* or *Hudder*, the first Saxon colonist in the place, stands on the river Colne, which rising near the source of the Don above Holmfirth, falls into the Calder near Nunbrook. The valley formed by this stream, with a small quantity of level ground upon its banks, comprehends the parish of Huddersfield. Naturally, this part of the country is barren and unproductive, but its local advantages for manufacture, arising, principally from its coal and waterfalls, has raised it to the rank of one of the principal seats of the woollen trade in the kingdom, and where men congregate in large numbers, the soil seldom remains for any long time unproductive. Formerly oats, and those of the coarsest kind, formed the principal part of the grain grown in this parish, and the sarcasm cast by Dr. Johnson, upon the Scotch when he defined *oats*, as food for man in Scotland, and for horses in England, applied with as much force to the

parish of Huddersfield, as to the parish of Glasgow, but now, both wheat and barley crops are raised in good perfection, in "the vale of Colne," and the wheaten loaf is as often to be seen as the oatcake, upon the table of the inhabitants. The great, and almost the sole proprietor, is Sir John Ramsden, Bart., whose family had a grant of the market by patent, dated as early as the 23d of Charles II. The revenue derived from this property, by the Ramsden family, is at the present day more than princely. The inland navigation of Huddersfield affords to its trade the most ample facilities, both to the East and to the West. The Ramsden Canal, which commences at the King's Mills, close to the town, crosses the high road to Halifax, and passing Black-house-brook, near Deighton, unites with the Calder at Cooper's bridge. In this way a communication is opened, with the great trading towns of Halifax, Wakefield, Leeds, and York, as well as Hull, from whence the merchandise is shipped to foreign countries. The Huddersfield canal, which joins the Ramsden canal at the south end of the town, conveys goods westward, by way of Longwood, Slaithwaite, and Marsden. There is a tunnel, nearly three miles and a half in length, cut through the English Appennines, to within two miles of Dobcross, from which the canal, after crossing the river Tame, in several of its windings, comes within a mile of Lydgate, by Mosley and Staley-bridge, and unites with the Ashton and Oldham canal, near Ashton-under-Line. The navigation to Manchester is then direct, and from thence the communication by water, is made daily to Liverpool, the great depot of commerce on the western coast. The Huddersfield canal has answered better for the town, and for the country through which it passes, than for the proprietors. It has been a losing speculation; and ages will probably pass away before it pays common interest for the money invested in the undertaking. The manufactures of this town and neighbourhood are principally woollens, and consist of narrow and broad cloths, serges, kerseymeres, and various other woollen fabrics. Formerly, the buyers and sellers of cloth met in an open square; but, in the year 1765, a commodious hall was erected for their accommodation, by Sir John Ramsden. This building, which is two stories high, forms a large

circle, with a diametrical range one story high, which divides the interior parts into two semicircles. The light is wholly admitted from within, there being no windows on the outside, by which construction security is afforded against fire and depredation. The hall is subdivided into streets, and the benches or stalls are generally filled with cloths, lying close together upon edge, with the bosom up for inspection. Here, in brisk times, an immense quantity of business is done in a few hours. The doors are opened early in the morning of the market day, which is Tuesday, and closed at half-past 12 o'clock at noon; they are again opened at 3 in the afternoon for the removal of cloth, &c. Above the door is a handsome cupola, in which a clock and bell are placed, for the purpose of regulating the time of commencing and terminating the business of the day. A century ago, the population and opulence of Huddersfield did not amount to more than one-half of either Halifax or Wakefield, but it is now equal to the larger of them, and promises fair to maintain the commercial and manufacturing consequence which it has so deservedly acquired. According to a calculation, made by Dr. Walker, who has published a topographical account of Huddersfield, it would appear that the place is healthy, in a very eminent degree, and that, on an average of five years, the annual number of deaths in proportion to the population was only as 1 is to 51 and a fraction, but this return is so evidently fallacious, from such of "the Dissenters and Sectaries," as bury at their own places of worship being omitted, that it is calculated only to mislead, and any person taking his estimate of the mortality of the town of Huddersfield, from the Doctor's "approximation to the truth," would approximate only to error.

Dr. Walker, with a laudable regard to public health, recommends the establishment of a House of Recovery in Huddersfield, on the plan of that at Leeds, and we unite with him most cordially in the recommendation, not only for Huddersfield, but for every large manufacturing town in the county, for we will venture to assert, as the result of much experience, that there is no public charity, merely secular, which does so much good at so little cost. A favourable disposition towards this object of the Doctor's solicitude is one of the rea-

sons for combating his mortality returns; for the opponents of a fever hospital, if any such there be, might find a triumphant objection upon the data which he has furnished, and might inquire why Huddersfield should emulate the example of Leeds in the preservation of health, seeing that they are already a great deal more healthy without such an establishment than their neighbours are with it, the proportion of deaths in Leeds being as 1 is to 40, while in Huddersfield it is only as 1 is to 51?

Turning from this digression, for which the occasion must form the apology, it may be observed that the history of Huddersfield does not furnish much matter for the gratification of antiquarian research, though it is an undoubted fact that the castle hill at Almondbury was, in the early age of our history, crowned with a Saxon fortress, which menaced the villages below;\* and that the celebrated Roman station of *Cambodunum*, was within the parish of Huddersfield, on the confines of Stanland, and in the township of Longwood.† It is also acknowledged that there are some ancient symbols of druidical worship still extant in this parish; and that the site of a Cromlech and several stupendous rocking stones of that kind remain to this day. Not far from Meltham there is one of these stones; but the finest druidical remain in the parish of Huddersfield is in Golcar, on Wholestone Moor.‡ From the rolls of Richard II. it appears, that in the third year of that reign free warren in Huddersfield was granted to the prior and canons of Nostel. But before this time, so early as the year 1200, Roger de Lacy granted to William de Bellemonie, ancestor of the Beaumonts, of Whitley, a grant for his homage and service. A grant was also made by the same Roger de Lacy to Colin de Dammeville, which said Colin, as an act of gratitude to his benefactor, "gave to God, the blessed St. Mary, and the Abbots and Monks of Stanlaw, for the soul of his lord, Roger de Lacy, all his part of the said mill of Huddersfield, upon the river Caune, and 20s. annual rent."

This neighbourhood enjoys the advantage of several mineral springs, which, if not endowed with those sin-

gularly brilliant properties ascribed to springs of greater fame, are important to the labouring classes, to whom access to distant waters is pretty nearly impracticable. At or near Holmfirth, Lockwood, Kirkheaton, and Slaithwaite are to be found springs yielding, on analysis, different proportions of sulphureous impregnations. In the township of Soyland there is a strong chalybeate; and in Eringden, in the parish of Halifax, there is another with an impregnation slightly sulphureous as well as chalybeate.\* Amongst the public edifices in Huddersfield are the parish church of St. Peter's and Trinity church, the latter being lately built by B. Haigh Allen, Esq. at Greenhead, at an expense of £12,000. The first stone of this edifice was laid in 1817, and the church was opened for public worship on Sunday the 10th of October, 1819, having been consecrated two days before by the Archbishop of this province. The style is Gothic, and it contains upwards of 1500 sittings, of which one third are free seats. Its situation, which is on the North-west side of the town, is very commanding, and in every part of the surrounding country it forms a beautiful object, at once picturesque and impressive. There are also two Methodist chapels, both very commodious buildings; one of them used by the Methodists of the Old and the other by the Methodists of the New Connexion. The former of these erections, which is situated in Queen street, has been very recently built, at an expense of £8,000, and is the largest Methodist chapel in the kingdom. It will seat 2,400 persons, and is in length 102 feet, and breadth 72 feet, exclusive of the wings. There is likewise an Independent chapel, a little out of the town at Highfield, and a Meeting House for the Society of Friends, at the Paddock. The charitable institutions in Huddersfield are the Dispensary, established on the 12th of May, 1814, on the restoration of peace; the Bible Society, established in 1810; the Religious Tract Society, established March 16, 1816; the National School Society, established in 1819, and the Church Missionary Association, established in 1813, besides some other charities of a more circumscribed nature, for the relief of the poor and destitute. A Company for supplying the inhabitants with gas

has lately been established, and the new works are advancing rapidly towards completion. The scale of charges for the use of the gas, and the regulations for the consumers are similar to those adopted by the Gas Company in Leeds, for which see page 22 of this work. ### KEIGHLEY

Is a considerable market town, in the Craven district of the West-Riding of York; it is in the wapentake of Staincliffe, and the liberty of Clifford's Fee, situated in a deep valley, at the junction of two small brooks, which discharge themselves about three quarters of a mile below into the river Aire. This town is 4 miles from Bingley, 10 from Bradford, the same distance from Skipton, 12 from Halifax and 210 from London. The market is held on Wednesday. The town is moderately built, almost wholly of stone, and contains 9,223 inhabitants, according

to the census of 1821. The worsted trade is the principal manufacture, but cotton goods are also manufactured here, with great spirit and industry.—The stuff goods are sold principally in the piece-halls of Bradford and Halifax, and pass through the hands of the Leeds merchants to the foreign or domestic consumer. The Leeds and Liverpool canal passes within two miles of this place, by which navigation a communication is opened through the rich and populous counties of York and Lancaster, from the Eastern to the Western sea. Keighley may be considered as the north-western extremity of the manufacturing district of Yorkshire; Skipton and Settle being almost out of the range of that district. The town is abundantly supplied with water, under the regulations of an act of Parliament obtained in 1816, from two never-failing springs, to the West and East. In the neighbourhood, on a very small plain, which is the only one in this extensive parish, there is a race-ground, but this sport seems to be on the wane here, as in some other places. The church, which is dedicated to St. Andrew, is spacious and handsome, having been rebuilt in the year 1805.—The tower or steeple is of an octagon form, and contains 8 fine toned bells; it also contains a curious clock, of exquisite workmanship, made by the late J. Prior of Nestfield, the Yorkshire mechanic; and in the church there is a powerful organ. In it are two remarkable grave stones, on each of which is a cross; and on one of them a sword with two escutcheons, and the inscription

**Gilbertus Keighley de Hilly, et Margaret uxor, 1023.**

This date, if the cyphers have not been defaced by time or accident, and restored by some careless hand, refers to the reign of Canute, and few of our churches can boast a sepulchral monument of so remote a period. This inscription probably indicates at once the antiquity of the place, and the family from which its name is derived. The living is a rectory, in the gift of the Duke of Devonshire, and is valued in the books at £21. 0s. 7d. but is worth from £500. to £600. At Elam Grange, near this town, a large quantity of Roman Denarii was found in the year 1775. Here is a free grammar school, erected in the year 1716, of which the Rev. Thomas Plummer is the present master. There is also a



manor court, under Lord Geo. Henry Cavendish, for the recovery of debts under five pounds, held on the Thursday of every third week, of which Mr. Charles Carr is steward. Keighley affords few materials for general history, but it is recorded of it, that in the civil wars, in the reign of Charles I. it was occupied by the troops of the Parliament, in the month of February, 1645, who were surprised by a party of royalists from Skipton Castle, under Captain Hughes, and many of them made prisoners; this victory was, however, of short duration, for General Lambert advanced speedily from a neighbouring station, attacked the royalists, recovered the prisoners, and pursued Hughes and his troops to the gates of Skipton Castle, where they found refuge. In addition to the church there are the following places of worship in Keighley, viz. Independent chapel, High green; Wesleyan Methodist chapel, Chapel lane; Baron Swedenburgh chapel, King street; Baptist chapel, High green; Methodist New Connexion, South street.

## KNARESBOUGH,

In the parish of that name, in the  
 wapentake of Claro, and the liberty  
 of Knaresbrough and St. Peter's, is  
 from 2 to 8 miles from Harrogate, 7  
 from Wetherby, 12 from Ripon, 7  
 from Boroughbridge, 18 from Leeds,  
 and 203 from London. The town is  
 delightfully situated on the north eas-  
 tern bank of the river Nidd, which runs  
 here amongst precipitous banks, and  
 through a romantic valley. The late  
 venerable historian of Knaresbrough,  
 Mr. Hargrove, from whom we prin-  
 cipally quote in this historic sketch,  
 supposes that Knaresbrough derives  
 its name from its situation *Knarres*,  
 in the German language signifying a  
 hard knot, or a rocky mountain; he  
 also conjectures that this may have  
 been a fortified post of the Romans, as  
 it is easy to trace the remains of a ditch  
 or rampart, and several Roman coins  
 have been found here, particularly some  
 of the Emperors Claudius and Constan-  
 tine. At the time of the conquest  
 the manor of Knaresbrough, which  
 comprehended that town and ten sur-  
 rounding villages, was part of the de-  
 messes of the crown. The Castle of

Knaresbro' was built by Serlo de Burgh, Baron of Tonsburgh, in Normandy, who accompanied the Conqueror into England, and received this, together with several other Lordships, as a reward for his services. In the civil wars in the time of Charles I. the castle was held by the King's forces, but after the decisive battle of Marston Moor, it was taken by assault by Lord Fairfax. In 1648, it was rendered untenable by order of Parliament. About a mile from Knaresbrough are the remains of an ancient camp, on the point of a hill, 200 feet above the Nidd, and from this station there is a fine view of the town and castle. On the declivity of the hill, to the south of the castle, at a considerable elevation above the river, is an ancient and curious monument of enthusiastic piety: this is St. Robert's Chapel, hollowed out of the solid rock; 10 feet 6 inches in length, 9 feet broad, and 7 feet 6 inches high. The reputed founder of this extraordinary excavation was a native of York, son of Took Flower, who was twice Lord Mayor of that ancient city, in the reign of Richard I. Above the chapel is a hermitage, formed of petrifications, moss, and other substances, and finely shaded with spreading shrubs. Within is seen the figure of a hermit sitting in a contemplative attitude, in a monastic habit, with his books, beads, and cross. Above this venerable cell

rises the ornamental building called Fort Montague, in honour of the Duchess of Buccleugh, the benefactress of its grateful occupier. The fort was scooped out of a rock by a poor weaver and his son, who cut the cliff into terraces, rising one above another, and planted them with flowering shrubs and ever-greens. Here are also arbours with seats judiciously placed, a green-house, and excellent tea-rooms for the reception of company. There is an ancient subterraneous excavation in this neighbourhood, called St. Robert's Cave, to which it is probable the hermit occasionally retired. It was formerly of considerable extent, but it is now so nearly filled up that a man can scarcely stand in it erect. Whatever might be the ancient purpose to which this hermitage was applied it is only memorable in modern times for the horrid murder committed here on the body of Daniel Clark, by Eugene Aram, a schoolmaster of Knaresbrough.\*

The priory, which is about half a mile below the castle in the vale of Nidd, was founded by Richard Plantagenet, about the middle of the 13th century for friars of the order of the Holy Trinity, is now the property of the Slingsby family, and the remains of the dismantled edifice is occupied as a mansion-house by John Lee, Esq.

The Parish Church, which is de-

\* Eugene Aram.—This unfortunate man's history is as singular as it is melancholy. Descended from an ancient but decayed Yorkshire family, his education was very slender, but by the application of his own powers, he acquired an acquaintance with the Latin, Greek, Hebrew, and Chaldee languages, as well as a competent knowledge of history, antiquity, and botany, to which he added no mean talent for poetry. Though of a studious and contemplative turn, he associated with depraved company, and was a party to a scheme along with Daniel Clark, a shoe-maker, and Richard Housman, a flax-dresser, the object of which was, to make use of Clark's credit to borrow a quantity of silver plate and other property from their neighbours and then to abscond. Having accumulated the property, they met on the night of the 7th of February, 1744, to divide the spoil. Either to diminish the chance of detection, or to increase their own booty, Aram and Housman murdered Clark, and concealed his body in St. Robert's Cave.—Years passed away without a ray of light being cast upon this deed of darkness. At length the discovery of a skeleton, not Clark's, at Thistle-hill, near Knaresbrough, in the year 1758, disclosed the fatal history. A surmise went abroad, that the bones just dug up were those of Daniel Clark. This opinion Housman combated, and taking up one of the bones said, "This is no more one of Daniel Clark's bones than it is mine." The confidence of these terms strengthened the suspicion already existing against Housman, who being apprehended and examined as to the supposed murder, confessed his participation in the crime, adding, however, that Aram perpetrated the deed.—Search was then made for Aram, who was found at Lynn, in Norfolk, employed as a teacher in a school. Being brought into Yorkshire, he was tried and found guilty of the offence, notwithstanding an ingenious defence more remarkable for subtlety of argument than for force of reasoning. Sentence of death followed immediately on conviction. In the interval between the trial and execution, Aram wrote a paper claiming a right to dispose of his own life. This privilege he exercised; and when on the morning of the execution he was roused from his bed to be conducted to the gallows, it was found that he had inflicted upon his arm two such desperate wounds with a razor, that the performance of the executioner was scarcely necessary to terminate a life that was fast ebbing out at his vein. After his execution his body was conveyed to Knaresbrough Forest, where he was hung in chains.

dedicated to St. John the Baptist, is in the patronage of Lord Rosslyn; and its present value is somewhat more than £200, though it is stated in the King's books at only £9. 9s. 4. The structure is neither very spacious nor very elegant, and it appears to have been erected at several times. Its antiquity is not known, but from several vestiges of burnt timber found in the walls in 1774, when the present bells were placed in the steeple, it is supposed to have suffered in the conflagrations in the reign of Edward II. when the Scots carried fire and sword through the northern parts of the kingdom. The other places of worship in Knaresbrough are a Methodist Chapel and Independent Chapel.

In the long walk on the south western bank of the Nidd, and opposite to the ruins of the castle, is the famous **DROPPING WELL**. The spring from which this well is supplied rises in the steep declivity of the hill, at the foot of a limestone rock. After running about 20 yards towards the river, it spreads itself over the top of the rock, from whence it trickles down in about 30 places, dropping very fast, and creating a musical kind of tinkling sound, owing probably to the cavity of the rock, which projects in a circular curve from the bottom to the top, overhanging nearly 15 feet. This rock, which is about 30 feet high, 45 feet long, and from 30 to 40 feet broad, started about a century ago from the main bank, leaving a chasm of from 2 to 3 yards wide, over which the water is now carried by an aqueduct. The rock is covered with plants, flowers, and shrubs, and the conjecture is, that the petrifying principle consists in the water which abounds with fine greasy particles, depositing them in its descent, when in languid motion, and thus forming an incrustation on the bodies which it meets with in its course. Tradition relates that the famous Yorkshire sibyl, Mother Shipton, was born near this rock, towards the latter end of the 15th century, and that she delivered to the Abbot of Beverley those *wonderful* prophecies, which in ages of ignorance served to amuse the childish and impose upon the credulous, but which are falling into disrepute and neglect before the general diffusion of knowledge in the present day.

Formerly Knaresbrough was a place of considerable resort as a watering place, but fashion, the supreme

law-giver in this respect, has caused a diversion in favour of Harrogate, and the ancient seat of the De Burgh's is now only visited not resided in by the company who repair annually into this neighbourhood to accumulate a stock of health for the coming year. The linen manufacture, which is the staple trade of the town, claims this as its ancient seat, and is now carried on to a very great extent. There are also some cotton webs produced, but linen has decidedly the preponderance.

Amongst the extraordinary men that have appeared in different places, few have been more remarkable than John Metcalf, usually called *Blind Jack of Knaresbro.* Though deprived of sight at the early age of 4 years, he acquired, in the different periods of his long life, considerable eclat as a musician! a soldier! a common carrier! a guide! a fortune hunter! and a projector and constructor of public highways! This extraordinary man died in the year 1810, in the 94th year of his age, having previously published a memoir of his own life, dictated by himself.

Knaresbrough is a parliamentary tho' not a corporate borough. It sends two members to Parliament, and the Right Hon. George Tierney and Sir James Mackintosh are at present returned, under the patronage of the Duke of Devonshire, for that borough. The right of election was originally in the possessors of 84 burgage holds, but a majority of these tenures having been purchased by the great Earl of Burlington, the exclusive right of sending Members to Parliament is secured to his descendants. The electors for the borough of Knaresbrough are for the most part not inhabitants, but come into the town early on the day of election, from Market-Weighton and elsewhere, and after having exercised their elective franchise, for property which they can with difficulty themselves identify, they partake of a good election dinner and quit the place in the evening, never probably to visit it till the morning of the next election! The government of the borough is vested in a bailiff, who is also the returning officer at the election. The market is held on Wednesday, and is one of the principal corn markets of Yorkshire. Knaresbrough, like most other manufacturing places, has increased materially in population within the last ten years; in 1811, it amounted to 4234; but the census of 1821, states the present numbers at 5253.

## OTLEY

Is a small, but well built market town, situated in a delightful country upon the banks of the river Wharfe, in the upper division of the wapentake of Skyrack, and the liberty of Cawood, Wistow and Otley; it is 15 miles from Wetherby, 10 from Leeds, 15 from Skipton, 8 from Harewood; and 206 from London. Its population in 1811, was stated at 2602; according to the returns of 1821, it now amounts to 3067. There are various conjectures relating to the derivation of the name of this place. The popular notion is, that oats were formerly cultivated here to a great extent, and hence the name *Oatley*, which is equivalent to *Oatfield*; Dr. Whitaker, however, insists that this is a vulgar error, and that as the name was originally spelt *Othelal*, it is a personal appellation not unfrequent in England before the conquest and comes from the field of *Othe* or *Otho*. The entry in Domesday book sanctions this supposition, for there it is spelt *Othelal*. Formerly this parish was of great extent, and contained 81 square miles, comprehending the present parish of Otley, Weston, (or a part of it) part of the parish of Guiseley, and that part of Ilkley which includes Middleton and Stubham. This manor was given by King Athelstan to the see of York. In the *Nomina Villarum* of 1316, the Archbishop is returned as Lord, as all his successors have been up to the present day, and they have a civil as well as spiritual jurisdiction in the place, where justice is administered by magistrates holding their commission under the metropolitan. Part of the site of the ancient mansion of the Archbishops of York, at the north side of the town, is still denoted by the Manor House, and when the present modest, but elegant mansion which occupies that site, was built by M. Wilson, Esq. about thirty years ago, some ancient and strong foundations were taken up. This, with "the gallows hill," at some distance without the town, and the peculiar jurisdiction of the Archbishops within it, are all the relics left of the ancient form of the place. The kitchens of the ancient mansion or castle were built by Archbishop Bower, who, consumed at Otley some portion of the four-score tons of claret, with a proportionate quantity of the other elements of hospitality, which he is said to have annually expended.

Whether any of his successors honoured Otley with their presence is not known. The church is a spacious building dedicated to All-Saints, as some hold, or as others to St. Mary, and was originally a Saxon fabric, but nothing now remains of the ancient structure, except, perhaps, the north door, which has a plain circular arch. Several monuments of the ancient families, especially of Fairfax, Fawkes, Vavasour, Palmer, and Puleyn, are in the church. The vicarage is in the patronage of the Lord Chancellor, and valued in the King's books at £18. 1s. 8d. annually. A number of doles to the poor are dispensed from the church in this place. Every week there is a distribution of bread; the widow's dole of 20 shillings to 20 poor widows, is given yearly on the first Sunday after the 7th of April; and at Christmas the sum of from fifty to sixty pounds is distributed principally to such of the labouring poor as support themselves without the aid of the parish rates. There is a grammar school at Otley founded by Thomas Cave, in the year 1611, and named in honour of the then Prince of Wales, Henry's School. The seal is a rod on one side and a palm on the other; the motto is curious, and conveys a pun upon the founder's name, it is *DEUM PAVE, TOMO CAVE—Fear God, and mind thy Book*. This school was originally amply endowed, but it is supposed that the lands were sold or bartered for a certain annuity, which at that time was doubtless sufficient, but which at present, owing to the depreciation in the value of money, now forms only a petty salary. A hospital for lepers existed here in the time of Edward II. but no vestiges of the building now remain. Formerly the woollen trade prevailed at Otley to some extent, under the fostering care of the society of "Merchant Adventurers," instituted in 1296, and a legal right was conferred upon clothiers to erect cloth tenters before the premises in Cross-green, but this trade has long since departed and established itself in situations more contiguous to fuel, and better situated for inland navigation. The market, which is held on Friday, is of very ancient standing; it is known to have existed about nine centuries, and perhaps no market in the kingdom, in a town of the same size, is at present superior to it in the variety and extent

of its business. It is, indeed, a market and fair united. Vast quantities of corn are brought here and sold into the manufacturing districts to the south-west; and the populous town of Leeds derives a considerable supply of cattle, sheep, and calves, from this market. The Wharf here abounds with smelts, trout and eels, and sometimes salmon are taken in this neighbourhood. Otley has at different periods suffered from the overflowing of this river, but the most considerable inundation on record took place in 1673. At the south end of the town is a fine bold hill called the Chevin, (signifying the ridge of mountains) which rises majestically over the road to Leeds, and together with Romalds moor and Poolbank forms a mountainous range extending to the Wharf, which traverses some of the finest scenery in England. This beautiful vale is adorned with mansions of distinguished persons. Farnley Hall, the residence of Walter Fawkes, Esq. is about a mile and a half from Otley, in an elevated situation, commanding noble views up and down the vale of the Wharf, with the planted ridge of the Chevin in front.

Attached to the old mansion of Queen Elizabeth's time, is a magnificent modern house, built by the late proprietor soon after he became possessed of the estate. Denton Park, in the manor of Otley, at the distance of about 5 miles from the town, up the river, is at present occupied by Sir Henry Carr Ibbotson, Bart. This, for several generations, was one of the principal residences of a family distinguished in the annals of their country for arts and arms—the baronial branches of the Fairfaxes. This line, in seven generations, produced two judges, Sir Guy and William Fairfax, and two distinguished generals, Ferdinando and Thomas, successively Lords Fairfax, and well known commanders for the parliament. Sir Thomas, afterwards Lord Fairfax, "the hero of the Commonwealth," was born here in the year 1611, and died in the same house on the 12th of Nov. 1671. Besides the church there are four other places of worship in Otley; two of them are Methodist Chapels, the third a Quakers' Meeting House, and the fourth is the Assembly room, where the Independents worship.

## PENISTONE

Is a small market town situate on the right bank of the river Don, in the parish of Penistone, the wapentake of Staincross, and the liberty of the honour of Pontefract. It is 7 miles from Barnsley, 14 from Wakefield, 13 from Huddersfield, 13 from Sheffield, and 177 from London. This parish comprehends 8 distinct hamlets or town-

ships, in which the manufacture of linens mostly prevails. Thursday is the market day, and a good number of cows, calves and sheep are on that day generally exhibited for sale. The population, according to the returns of 1831, amounts to 645. The town consists of four streets, crossing each other at right angles, and the houses are well-built. The public buildings are the parish church, dedicated to St. John, of which the Rev. Martin Naylor, A. M. is vicar, and the Rev. John Howarth, curate; a Methodist Chapel; a Friends' Meeting house; and a Free Grammar School, endowed with £120. a year. There is also a charity school for girls. Wakefield is the Post town, and the letters are conveyed from thence every Monday, Thursday and Saturday, in the afternoon of each of which days the Post returns again to Wakefield. The environs of Penistone have a dreary and barren appearance, especially to the Westward, where nothing presents itself to the eye but black and barren moors, covered chiefly with heath and ling. In other parts the soil is variable, but for the most part wet and spongy. Some of the land in the vicinity of the town is inclosed with stone walls, and produces oats, with a small quantity of wheat; but the moors to the westward are all unlimited common. The climate, as well as the soil, is cold and unfavourable to vegetation. Seed-time and harvest are late, and the latter is sometimes not concluded till the month of November. The late Dr. Nicholas Sanderson, the blind professor of mathematics in the University of Cambridge, was born at Thurstone, in this parish, and exhibits an illustrious proof that no difficulties are too great for genius and perseverance to surmount. This deservedly celebrated scholar lost his sight in infancy, by the small pox, but notwithstanding this misfortune, he learnt to read by passing his fingers over the grave stones in the church yard, and so vigorous was his mind, and so retentive his memory, that he acquired a perfect knowledge not only of his own, but of the dead languages also; and by having Euclid and Archimedes frequently read to him in the original, he became one of the most profound mathematicians of the age. His elements of Algebra will serve to perpetuate his name, and to reflect honour upon the parish that gave him birth.

### PONTEFRACT

Is a place of great antiquity and of considerable fame in the annals of England; it is situated in the parish of that name, in the wapentake of Osgoldcross, and in the liberty of the honour of Pontefract. It is 9 miles from Wakefield, 13 from Leeds, 15 from Doncaster, 24 from York, and 179 from London. The town stands on a beautiful eminence, and is approached on every side by a considerable ascent. Three long streets, disposed in the form of the letter Y, constitute the principal part of the town, which is clean, spacious, and airy. It is surrounded by seats of nobles and opulent commoners, and persons of large or small fortune may find here agreeable society, according to their rank and inclinations.\* There is but one parish church in which divine service is performed that of St. Giles, formerly called, "St. Mary de Foro." This church is of considerable antiquity, being mentioned as early as the reign of Henry I. in the charter of Hugh Delaval; it is a small edifice, destitute of exterior elegance, and built without regard to any regular order of architecture. The interior, however, yields to few in neatness, and the chancel has been lately ornamented with a fine painting of the crucifixion, executed by John Standish, a self-taught artist of eminent merit, and a native of this town. The living of Pontefract is a vicarage, in the patronage of the King, and is valued in the books at £13. 6s. 8d. The church of All Saints, or All Hallows, was formerly the parish church; but at what time, or by whom it was built, is unknown. The Rev. Dr. Boothroyd, the learned and indefatigable historian of Pontefract, is of opinion,

that the erection of this structure may be referred to the reign of Henry III. and that it suffered irreparable injury during the memorable siege of the Castle, in the reign of Charles I. For several ages Pontefract was without a parish church, but by an act of the 29th Geo. III. the church of St. Giles obtained that distinction, and the once magnificent church of All Hallows, now a venerable ruin, was consigned to the all-devouring tooth of time. Besides these churches, there were formerly in this town several other places sacred to religion. The Chantry, or church of St. Thomas, was erected on the spot where Thomas Earl of Lancaster was beheaded in the reign of Edward II. in 1322, but no part of that structure now remains, though the site may be distinguished in a field on the foot way to Frystone-on-the-hill, which still bears the name of "The Saint," and will transmit it to posterity. The chief religious house was the priory of St. John, of which nothing now remains to convey an idea of the extent or magnificence of the structure. The plot of ground, now called Monk-hill, which continues extra parochial, indicates the site of this decayed priory, which was founded in the year 1090, by Robert de Lacy, for the monks of the order of St. Benedict. At the dissolution of the monastery, the demesnes were let out in leases to different individuals, till the 7th year of the reign of Edward VI. when the whole property belonging to it was granted to George Lord Talbot. Subsequently it came into the hands of Archbishop Dawes, whose only daughter and heiress brought it by marriage to Edwin Lord Harewood, in whose family it still remains. The Dominicans, or Black Friars, had a house at Pontefract, nearly in the centre of the garden, called, Friar's Wood, on the West side of the town; here the monks enjoyed all the advantages of privacy and retirement in a warm and sheltered abode. In this convent was interred Roger de Mowbray, who died in the 51st year of Henry III. The reformation was fatal to this sanctuary; and on the suppression of the lesser religious houses, in the 28th of Henry VIII. it was surrendered to the crown. Here were also houses of Carmelites, or White Friars, as well as of the Austin Friars; but no vestige of them at present remains, nor any tradition of the places where they stood. There are

here various charity hospitals, and the King's free grammar school, founded and endowed by Edward VI. Till within the last few years there was a charity school, for 24 boys and 12 girls, but this institution has been abolished, and the funds, by what authority we know not, appropriated to the national school. It is in contemplation to restore it to its primitive state.

In addition to the parish church there are at present in Pontefract several places of worship for christians of different denominations. The Independents, the Methodists, the Society of Friends, and the Roman Catholics, have each of them a chapel or meeting house.

The origin of the town of Pontefract, and the etymology of its name are alike unknown. The monkish legend of Thomas de Castleford, who wrote the history of this place, is entitled to no credit; according to this ecclesiastic, the name of Pont-fractus, or Pontifract, is derived from the miracle ascribed to St. William, Archbishop of York. The story is in substance this:—William returning from Rome, where he had received the pall, was met by such vast crowds of people, who assembled to crave his blessing, that the wooden bridge over the Aire, near this place, broke down, and great numbers fell into the water. The holy prelate, deeply affected by the danger of so many persons, poured out his prayers to heaven with such fervour and success, that not one of them perished. Other historians contend, probably with equal truth, that the scene of this miraculous transaction was at York, and that the bridge was over the Ouse; however that may be, the credit of the legend, as far as it relates to the name of Pontefract, is entirely destroyed by the charters granted by Robert de Lacy, of the priory of St. John, in which this town is called Pontefract, fifty-three years before the pretended miracle was performed. Anciently, in the time of the Saxons, this place was called Kirkby, but, according to Camden, it was changed by the Romans to Pontefract, because of a broken bridge over the Wash, which is now confined in a narrow channel, but formerly, before the drains were made through the marsh, was of much greater breadth. Another etymological conjecture is, that Hilbert de Lacy conceiving that there

was a resemblance between this place and a town in Normandy, called Pontefrete, where he was born, changed its name from Kirkby to Pontefract.

Kirkby, now Pontefract, appears to have been a burg, in the time of Edward the Confessor. After the conquest, this manor, with 150 others in Yorkshire, besides 10 in Nottinghamshire, and four in Lincolnshire, were given by William to Hildebert, or Aldert de Lacy, one of his Norman followers. This powerful Baron undertook the stupendous work of erecting Pontefract Castle, which he commenced early in the reign of King William, and completed in the year 1080. This Castle was built on an elevated rock, commanding the most extensive and picturesque view of the surrounding country. Its situation contributed greatly to its strength, and rendered it almost impregnable. It was not commanded by any contiguous hill, and the only way it could be taken was by blockade. The wall of the ballium, or castle yard, was high, and flanked with seven towers. It had also a parapet; the merlons were pierced with long chinks ending in round holes, called oilets; and a deep moat or ditch was cut on the western side of the Castle. On this side were also the herbican, or draw-bridge, and near to these was the main-guard, a place of considerable magnitude and strength. There were also other gates, which might be used as watch-towers, and some of them protected by draw-bridges. On an eminence, near the western extremity of the ballium, stood the keep, or round tower. The walls of this edifice were of extraordinary thickness, it is said one-and-twenty feet, and having in consequence better withstood the injuries of time and seasons, now remain more perfect than any other part of the Castle. On the second story were the state rooms, suitable for the residence of a prince; but these apartments, with the staircase leading to them, are now destroyed. At the bottom of the keep is a dismal dungeon, fifteen feet deep, and scarcely six feet square, without any convenience for the admission of light, and designed undoubtedly for a place of rigorous confinement. There were also frightful dungeons in some others of the towers. The whole area, occupied by this stupendous fortress, seems to have been about seven acres, which is now principally converted to the much more useful purpose of gar-

den ground. There are yet some vestiges of the wells by which the castle was supplied with water, but they are nearly filled up, though they must have been very deep. The estates and honour of Pontefract continued in the family of Lacy, till the year 1310, when Henry de Lacy, through default of male issue, left his possessions to his daughter and heiress, Alice, who was married to Thomas, Earl of Lancaster, and uncle to Edward II. In the civil wars in this reign, the Earl of Lancaster took a distinguished part, and the forces of the insurgent Barons having been defeated at Boroughbridge, the Earl, with ninety-four barons and knights, was taken and brought to Pontefract Castle, which had fallen into the hands of the Royal army. Here he was for some time imprisoned in the tower, the only entrance to which was by a trap door in the floor of the turret.— Soon after, the King being at Pontefract, ordered him to be tried by a number of Peers, amongst whom were the Spencers, his mortal enemies. The result of the trial it was not difficult to anticipate. The Earl was convicted without being heard in his own defence, and his memorable inquiry—“Shall I die without answer?” served to show that his doom was irrevocably fixed. Sentence being passed, he was hurried away to execution. Mounted on a jade of a horse, without bridle, and the only favour he could obtain was, the privilege of dying on the block instead of the gallows.— The next royal blood that stained Pontefract Castle, was that of Richard II. who was murdered in cold blood, or starved to death in this fortress. In the succeeding reign, Richard Scroope, archbishop of York, was tried and condemned in this castle, and the sentence was executed near Bisphothorpe, on the 8th of June 1406. Richard III. paved his way to the throne by shedding the blood of Anthony Woodville, Earl Rivers, Richard Lord Grey, Sir Thomas Vaughan, and Sir Richard Bawco. These distinguished persons were all basely murdered in Pontefract Castle, in the year 1483, without any legal trial.\* In the reign of Henry VIII. this fortress surrendered almost without resistance to the famous Robert Aske, captain-general of the Pilgrims of Grace. Coming down to the reign of Charles I. this was among one of the last strong holds of

that unfortunate and ill-advised monarch. When the civil war broke out, Pontefract Castle was garrisoned by the king's troops; but soon after the battle of Marston Moor, near York, it was besieged by the forces of the Parliament. In the beginning of December, Sir Thomas, afterwards Lord Fairfax, made himself master of the town, and on Christmas day laid close siege to the castle.† On the 19th of January, after an incessant cannonade of three days, one of the towers gave way, and by its fall carried part of the castle wall along with it, by which a breach was effected. The besiegers now offered terms to the garrison, but the governor, Colonel Lowther, rejected the proposal to surrender, and resolved to defend the place to the last extremity. After some further operations, Sir Marmaduke Langdale, one of the King's generals, made a rapid march from Oxford, at the head of 2000 horse, and obliged the enemy to raise the siege. On Gen. Langdale's departure, the Parliamentary troops again collected, and the Royalists in the castle had to sustain a second siege. On the 31st of March, 1645, the enemy took possession of the town, and after three months of incessant cannonades, attacks and sorties, the garrison being reduced almost to a state of famine, surrendered the castle by an honourable capitulation on the 30th of June. By an unaccountable remissness, the Parliamentary governor, Colonel Cotterel, who acted as the substitute of Sir Thomas Fairfax, was left in the possession of the castle, with only 100 men. Colonel Morrice, well aware of the weakness of the garrison, had the address, partly by stratagem and partly by force, to take possession again of the castle, and being joined by 30 horse and 500 foot, part of the king's scattered forces, they prepared for another siege. In the month of October, 1648, the third siege of this famous castle commenced, and was conducted by Oliver Cromwell in person. The future protector having remained a month before the fortress, without being able to make any impression upon its massy walls, found it necessary to join Fairfax, and General Lambert was sent on the 4th of December to prosecute the siege. This able general pressed the siege with great vigour, but the garrison was neither discouraged by his efforts, nor by the deplorable state of

their cause in other quarters. On the 30th of January, 1649, the King was beheaded; and the news of this melancholy event no sooner reached Pontefract than the garrison proclaimed his son, Charles II. and made a vigorous and destructive sally against the enemy. This was amongst the last efforts of the Royalists. Every where their cause was in ruins; and on the 25th of March, the garrison being greatly reduced in numbers, surrendered by capitulation. The tremendous effects of artillery had shattered the massy walls of the castle; and its demolition was completed by order of Parliament. Within two months after its reduction, the buildings were unroofed, and all the valuable materials sold. For six centuries this magnificent and formidable castle was the ornament and the terror of the surrounding country, and till this time it had existed in all its strength and glory. Now it was reduced to a heap of ruins; and at this day little even of those ruins remain; but when they shall have disappeared, the vast and solid mound will still, in a language too distinct to be misunderstood, read an impressive lesson on the instability of human greatness.

Quitting these subjects of general history and these records of other times, it may be observed that Pontefract is not now, nor ever has been, a manufacturing town. It is, however, famed for its gardens and nurseries, which are very extensive, and the wholesome product of which commands ready sales. Great quantities of garden stuff is carried hence to Leeds and Wakefield; and seedlings from the nurseries are sent to the most distant parts of the kingdom. The deep loamy soil is also well adapted, and is noted for the cultivation of liquorice; and Pontefract cakes, a preparation from this healing root, are well known, not only in England, but also in foreign countries. The market, which is held on the Saturday, is well supplied with corn, butcher's meat, fruit, and other viands, but the choice vegetables are sent to a distance, and are to be found in greater perfection, as well as in larger quantities, in Leeds than in Pontefract. In the centre of the town, where the market is now held, formerly stood the cross of St. Oswald. It is said that anciently none could be arrested here, and a free way leading to the cross, with five yards round it, was long kept unpaved

in memory of this privilege. In the year 1735, the old cross was pulled down and a handsome dome, supported by Doric pillars, erected in its stead.— At the bottom of the market place is a handsome modern built Town hall, erected at the joint expense of the Corporation and the Riding; in this edifice the basement story is used as a prison; and in the next story are the Court house, in which the Borough Sessions are held quarterly, and the Rotation-office, in which the magistrates hold their weekly sittings on the Monday, for the transaction of the magisterial business of the borough. The Savings' Bank is also held here, and the officers of that institution meet to receive deposits, and to make their payments every Saturday. This room is also used as an Assembly room. At the top of the best market is a stately Court-house, lately built by the Riding; here the principal general Sessions of the Peace for the West Riding of the County of York are held annually in Easter week, at which a return of the quantity of woollen cloths milled in the clothing districts, during the preceding year, has hitherto been made by the searchers to the magistrates, and promulgated by them for the information of the country. The theatre is a neat building, erected a few years ago by public subscription, and is open twice in the year by a company of comedians, under the management of Messrs. Huggins and Clark. The race course, at about a mile from the town, is delightfully situated, and the race week is a period of great gaiety and festivity.— Pontefract is a corporate borough, and returns two members to parliament.— The franchise is in the inhabitant householders, of which there are about 700. The present members are Lord Viscount Pollington, the son of the Earl of Mexborough, of Methley Park, and Thomas Houldsworth, Esq. of Manchester. The government of the town is in the body corporate, consisting of a mayor, recorder, and twelve aldermen, with a common council consisting of twenty-four burgesses. The principal officers are:—

The temple of Fame has not been crowded by the historian of Pontefract. 'Few men,' he says, 'who have ranked high in church or state, or who have been distinguished in the annals of literature, have either been born or resided in this town.' Amongst these few he mentions Bishop Bramhall, Primate of Ireland, who was a native of Pontefract, and rose by his talents and learning to his distinguished honour and high station in the church. The indefatigable antiquarian, Dr. Nathaniel Johnson, who made large collections for the history of Yorkshire resided here; and Lun, the facetious barber and keen satirist, who wrote

the Poem of "The Newcastle Rider," and several other pieces not unworthy the pen of a Churchill, ~~stood~~ both with lather and without, in this ancient borough for a number of years. Pontefract, standing off the great North road, has hitherto not been a place of much intercourse, but the communication recently opened by means of the new Barnsdale road is expected to enliven the town, and to confer substantial and permanent benefits upon its inhabitants. A hope is entertained, grounded upon the propriety and expediency of the measure, that the Glasgow mail from and to London, instead of taking the present route by Wetherby and Boroughbridge, will speedily pass through Pontefract, Leeds, Harewood, Harrogate and Ripon, and thus open a direct mail communication which cannot fail to promote the accommodation and advance the interests of a very populous and opulent line of country. The population of Pontefract, according to the returns of 1821, amounts to 4447.

**RIPLEY**

Is a small market town, in the  
parish of that name, in the wapentake  
of Claro; it is 5 miles from Knares-  
brough, 7 from Ripon, 19 from Leeds,  
and 208 from Loudon. The market,  
which is but little frequented, is held  
on Monday. The church is a rectory,  
dedicated to All Saints, of the annual  
value of £400, and is in the gift of Sir  
William Ingilby, Bart. In the church  
yard is a very uncommon pedestal to  
an ancient cross, with eight niches,  
intended probably for kneeling upon  
some solemn occasions. In the south  
aisle, near Baynes' choir, supposed to

have been St. John the Baptist's chapel, is the tomb of Sir Thomas de Ingilby, a Justice of the Common Pleas in the time of Edward III. and in the north aisle, near the patron's choir, is a tomb supposed to be that of Sir Thomas Ingilby, the founder of the church, of the date of 1415. Sir Thomas de Ingilby, about the year 1378, married the heiress of the Ripley family, and by this marriage acquired the estate; but it was not till the 17th of May, 1642, that the baronetage came into the family, having been at that time conferred upon Sir William. Sir John, the fourth baronet, died in the year 1779, unmarried, and the title became extinct; but it was revived by Sir John, his successor, by patent, dated the 24th of March, 1781, and is now inherited by Sir William Ingilby, the late High Sheriff of the County of York. The residence of the Ingilby family is called Ripley-castle, and is an ancient castellated building, erected in the year 1555, as appears from the following inscription carved on the frieze of the wainscot, in one of the chambers of the tower. "*In the yeere of our Ld. M. D. L. V. was this house buylded, by Sir William Ingilby, Knight, Philip and Marie reigning that time.*" The castle has been much enlarged of late years, and is now a spacious and commodious mansion, with green-houses and hot-houses scarcely to be exceeded in the kingdom. The castle is embattled only for ornament, but the lodge and great tower still retain their characteristics of strength and security. The apartments are elegant, and in the great staircase is a superb Venetian window, of stained glass, ornamented with a series of escutcheons, displaying the quarterings and intermarriages of the Ingilby family during a period of 443 years. *Arms.*—Sable and etoile of six rays, proper.—*Crest.*—On a wreath, a boar's head, couped and erect, argent, armed or.—*Motto.*—Mon Droit. After the battle

of Marston Moor, Cromwell took the route to Ripley, and sent to the castle by an officer, a relation to the Ingilbys, to announce his arrival in that town. Sir William was at that time from home, but his lady, the daughter of Sir James Bellingham, who received the communication, requested that Cromwell might be told, that no such person as himself could be admitted there, adding that she had force enough to defend herself and that house against all rebels. With some persuasion, this heroic lady was at length prevailed upon by her relative to receive the General, which she did at the gate of the lodge, with a pair of pistols stuck in her apron strings; and having told him that she expected that neither he nor his soldiers would behave improperly, she led him to the hall. There sitting or reclining, each on a sofa, in different parts of the room, these two extraordinary personages passed the night, equally jealous of each others intentions. At his departure in the morning, this high spirited dame caused it to be intimated to Cromwell, that it was well he had behaved in so peaceable a manner, for had it been otherwise, he would not have left that house alive. There is at the entrance to the town, from the North, a charity school, built in the year 1702, the origin of which is stated in the following inscription, written on a tablet, and placed over the door—"This school was built by Mary Ingilby, in the year 1702; and endowed with part of the fortune of Catharine Ingilby; being the two youngest daughters of Sir William Ingilby, of Ripley, in the county of York, Baronet." Ripeley is the ancient name for a pasture on the banks of a river, and this town standing near to the Nidd, doubtless receives its name from the pasture, in a part of which it was built. The population of the parish, by the returns of 1821, amounts to 3057.

### RIPON

Is a market town and parish, in the wapentake of Claro, and in the liberty of Ripon, 6 miles from Boroughbridge, 18 from Knaresbrough, 11 from Harrogate, 25 from Richmond, and 212 from London.

It is pleasantly situated on a rising ground, between the river Ure and the small river Skell, not far from their confluence. Over the former of these rivers there is a handsome bridge of 17 arches, near the town, and within little more than a mile, there are five other bridges over these rivers. Ripon obviously derives its name from its situation, on the "ripa," or bank of a river. None of the streets in the town are either spacious or uniform, except the Market-place, but they are generally clean and have an inviting appearance. The Market-place is a handsome and well-built square, surrounded with good houses, and ornamented with a beautiful obelisk, in the centre, ninety feet high, erected in the year 1781, by William Aislabie, Esq. of Studley, who had represented this ancient borough in parliament, for the space of sixty years. On the east side of the Market-place there is an elegant

modern town-hall, built at the expense of Mrs. Allanson, of Studley-Royal, in the year 1801. The lower room is set apart for public business, and here the Magistrates for the borough and liberty of the West and North Ridings meet every Friday.

The first historical notice of Ripon occurs in 661, in which year Eata, Abbot of Melrose, in Scotland, founded a monastery here, between Stammergate and Priest-lane, and at which time the town contained only thirty houses. After the controversy concerning the time of keeping Easter was decided, at the synod of Whitby, in favour of the Roman computation, the monks of Ripon refusing to submit to the decision, were obliged to leave their monastery, which was given by Alfred, King of Northumbria, to Wilfred, Archbishop of York, the Cardinal Walsey of those times. The structure of this edifice this splendid ecclesiastic greatly improved, and in the year 678, he entertained Egfrid, King of Northumbria, with his whole court. Under the fostering influence of the Archbishop, Ripon rose into opulence and consideration, and the church received many marks of royal munificence. After a life chequered with many vicissitudes, he died in the year 711, in the 76th year of his age, and was, by his own desire, buried at the south side of the altar, in his favourite monastery at Ripon.\* The bones of this venerable prelate were, in the year 940, removed to Canterbury, by Odo, Archbishop of that see, and the fame of his piety gained him a place in the calendar, where he may be considered as holding the rank of the tutelary saint of Ripon. The town to this day, honours the memory of its benefactor, by an annual feast. On the Saturday next after Lammas-day, (old style) the effigy of the prelate is brought into the town, preceded by music; the people go out to meet it, and with every demonstration of joy, commemorate the return of their venerable patron from exile. The following day is dedicated to the saint, and is called St. Wilfred's Sunday. The festivities now commence, and do not finally terminate till the end of the week. The monastery of Ripon, when in its glory, received extraordinary marks of royal munificence. King Athelstan, by two charters, one in Latin and the other in Old English,

granted it various immunities, and particularly "the privilege of sanctuary," with this addition, that whoever infringed on its rights, which extended a mile on each side of the church, should forfeit his life and estates, thus rendering the church, the town, and a circle of two miles in diameter, a refuge to all that fled thither—secure alike against the claims of individuals and the operation of the laws of their country. The boundary of sanctuary yet remains, and is marked by three crosses, each a mile distant from the church, one of which is called Kangel—that is Archangel-cross; another Sharow-cross, and the third Athelstan-cross. The privilege of sanctuary, so encouraging to the commission of crimes, existed for many centuries in England, but it was totally abolished in the year 1548. No remains of St. Wilfred's monastery now exist, but some part of the site was in the year 1415, granted by the Archbishop of York, with the licence of Henry V. to the Vicars of the Collegiate Church, to build upon it a house, which is now the deanery.\*

The Collegiate Church of Ripon, dedicated to St. Peter and St. Wilfred, was first established for canons of St. Augustine; after flourishing for some ages, the order was dissolved in the reign of Henry VIII. The chantries were afterwards dissolved by Edward VI. James I. re-founded the church in the 2d year of his reign, and endowed it with part of its former revenue. It has now a dean, sub-dean, and chapter, and sends a proctor to the convocation of the province of York. It is also in some degree parochial, as the inhabitants have the benefits of its use without the charge of a rate for its support. This Cathedral is a large and venerable Gothic structure, but being built and altered at different periods, it exhibits in several instances changes from the Gothic to the Saxon style. The first stone of this edifice was laid in the year 1381, but it appears from dates in the choir that it was not finished till 1494; so that from the commencement of the work to its completion, an interval intervened of 163 years! It is built in the form of a cross, having at the west end two uniform towers, each 110 feet high, and in the centre is the great tower of St. Wilfred, from which there formerly arose a very noble spire. On each of these towers there originally stood a

spire of wood, covered with lead; 120 feet high; but the spire of St. Wilfred steeple was blown down on the 8th of December, 1660, and fell upon and demolished the arched roof of the choir. To prevent similar accidents the two spires at the west end of the Minster were taken down a few years afterwards, and the uniformity of the edifice was thus restored. The King is patron of the deanery, and the sub-dean is nominated by the dean from among the prebendaries, of which there are six. When a vacancy occurs among the prebendaries, the dean and chapter nominate three persons, and the Archbishop of York collates one of them to the stall. This cathedral contains a number of handsome monuments well worthy of attention, on one of which, bearing date in the year 1637, is inscribed the name of HUGH RIPLEY, the last wakeman; and on another, in the Minster-yard, the name of MARGARET LUPTON, of Braisty-wood, who "lived to be the mother and grand-mother of about 150 children, and at the baptism of her first grand-child, the child had ten grand-fathers and grand-mothers then present." She died in the 74th year of her age. Besides the Minster, there are in Ripon three other places of worship; two Methodist Chapels and a Chapel for Dissenters of the Independent persuasion, all of them modern structures.

At the north-east end of the town and at a small distance from the Minster is a remarkable Tumulus, commonly called Ellshaw or Alice-hill. It is nearly of a conical form, the circumference at the base being about 900 feet, and the height of the slope 7½ yards. From the base to the summit it is wholly composed of sand, gravel and human bones, and tradition says, that it was thrown up by the Danes, as a depository for their dead. Upon this subject there is, however, no certain information; nor does the fact of several brass coins of Osbright and Ella, two Northumbrian Princes, who both of them fell in the year 867, warring against the Danes, having been found in this hill†, cast any light upon its origin, except that when combined with the name Ellshaw, it somewhat favours the conjecture, that the mount was formed by the Danes, and took its name from the latter of these chiefs,

whose body might swell the stupendous mass of mortal remains.

Ripon has undergone many vicissitudes and been subject to great sufferings. At the time of the Danish invasion the town was reduced to ashes, and as William of Malmshury says, the traces of its former existence could be discovered only by its ruins. It appears however to have soon recovered from its misfortunes, and in the year 886, it was incorporated as a royal borough by Alfred the Great. Its government and police were then in a vigilant or wakeman, 12 elders, and 24 assistants.\* Every night at nine o'clock, the wakeman caused a horn to be blown, indicating that the property of the inhabitants was at that hour taken under the protection of the police, after which, if any house or shop was robbed, before sun rise next morning, the sufferer received a compensation for his loss from an annual tax of fourpence levied on every inhabitant whose dwelling had but one, and of eightpence where it had two outer doors, from which latter circumstance a double degree of danger might be apprehended. The tax, with its beneficial effects, has long since fallen into disuse, but the custom of blowing the horn an hour after the appointed time of ringing the ancient curfew continues to this day. Ripon had scarcely recovered the shocks received in the Danish wars before it was again doomed to total destruction. The Northumbrian Danes having revolted against the authority of Edred, that prince marched his army into the north, and Ripon and its monastery were destroyed in the general system of devastation which he carried through the kingdom of Northumbria. The town was soon after rebuilt, but in the year 1066, it shared the fatal consequences of the revolt of the Northumbrians against the Norman conqueror, and at the time of the Domesday survey it remained waste and uncultivated. Tranquillity succeeding, Ripon again revived, and remained undisturbed till the wars between Scotland and England, in the unhappy reign of Edward II. when in the year 1323, the Scotch monarch Robert Bruce having driven Edward and his army out of Scotland, and pursued them into England, ravaged the country with fire and sword to the walls of York, and among other devastations burnt

the town and monastery of Ripon. But the victorious reign of Edward III. delivered this part of the kingdom from the inroads of the Scots, and the town of Ripon, by the liberal donations of the Archbishop of York, and the neighbouring gentry, like another Phoenix, again rose from its ashes.— Since that time it has been honoured with several royal visits: Henry IV. being in the year 1405, driven from London by the plague, retired to Ripon, and remained there for some time with his whole court. The same cause occasioned the removal of the court of the Lord President of York to this town in 1604. In the year 1617, James I. on his way from Scotland to London, spent a night at Ripon, where he was received with every mark of affectionate loyalty; as was his son Charles I. who twice visited this place, first in the year 1633, and the second time in 1644. One year before the last visit of the king, the parliament forces under Sir Thomas Mauleverer, who had occupied the town for some time, and committed unpardonable spoliation upon some of the monuments, and other ornamental parts of the minster, were defeated in the market place, and driven out of the town by a body of the king's horse from Skipton castle, under the command of Sir John Mallory, of Studley. Since that time Ripon, sharing in the tranquillity happily enjoyed by the rest of the kingdom, has no more been exposed to the calamities which it so often experienced in the ages of barbarism and intestine war.

We have seen that the first incorporation of this ancient borough was in the year 886; and as early as the reign of Edward I. it sent two members to parliament. The privilege was soon after discontinued, but it was restored in the time of Edward VI. The corporation consists of a mayor, recorder, 12 aldermen, and 24 assistants: the following list contains an enumeration of the mayor and aldermen for the time being.

The mayor is elected yearly, on the first Tuesday in January, and enters upon his office on Candlemas-day. To support his dignity during his mayoralty, he has the rent of certain corporation lands, with the toll of corn and grain sold in the market, which toll was given to the wakeman and his successors, before the conquest, and was confirmed by Henry VIII. in the year 1533. The borough is under the patronage of Mrs. Lawrence, of Studley Royal, and returns two members to parliament.—The right of election is vested in the occupants of burgage tenures, of which there are about 146. The electors generally coincide with the lady patroness, as to the proper persons to represent their borough in parliament, and those candidates which she recommends they approve. In this way all the tumults of contested elections are avoided in Ripon, and the harmony of the town is never broken in upon by the exercise of a popular right in the form of the elective franchise. The present members are the Right Hon. F. J. Robinson, President of the Board of Trade; and George Gipps, Esq. If any sarcasm be conveyed in these observations, it is meant to be directed rather against a defective system of representation than against individuals; for them it is impossible to feel any thing but the greatest respect; and it is only an act of common justice to say, that in Ripon, as much perhaps as in any other place in the kingdom, the property of the affluent proprietors in the neighbourhood, is made to conduce to the proper object of all wealth. Extreme poverty is scarcely ever to be seen here, except in the wandering mendicant, and it is quite refreshing after witnessing the mass of congregated misery in some of the rankly peopled streets of large towns, to see the air of comfort and contentment which so generally prevail in this ancient borough.

The public charitable institutions in Ripon, are a free grammar school, endowed in 1553, by King Philip and Queen Mary; a public dispensary; Sunday schools; and two national schools; besides four hospitals, three of which are of very ancient foundation, for females; and the fourth founded and endowed in 1672, by Zacharias Jepson, a citizen of York, but a native of Ripon, for 12 poor boys who are maintained, clothed and educated.—Ten of the principal gentlemen in the

town and neighbourhood generally hold the office of governors of the Free Grammar School, and have the appointment of the master and usher, the former of whom receives a salary of £180. and the latter £60. per ann. The sons of all the resident inhabitants of the parish are admissible to this school. In the year 1792, a new theatre was built at Ripon, by the late George Hassel, Esq. and opened for the first time on the 20th of August in that year. There is a good market here held on the Thursday; and a wool market every Wednesday during the season. The transit of corn, coals, groceries, and other merchandise is rendered easy by the inland navigation; in 1767, an act of parliament was obtained for making navigable the river Ure, from its junction with the Swale, to Bondgate-green; and a number of vessels have been employed upon that river ever since this work was completed, to the great convenience and benefit of the town and neighbourhood. Latterly this navigation has been very much improved, a new act having been obtained in 1820, and Mr. Alderman Farrer, the historian of Ripon, has with his usual public spirit devoted himself with great assiduity and success to the undertaking. This town was once celebrated for its manufacture of spurs, which were in such repute that "As true steel, as a Ripon rowel" became a proverbial expression, when speaking of a man of courage, fidelity, or honesty. The woollen manufacture is also said to have flourished here in former times, but it has quitted the banks of the Ure to take its station on the Aire, the Calder and the Colne. An ancient custom formerly prevailed very generally in this town, which has not wholly given way to modern refinement; on midsummer-eve, a house-keeper who has in that year changed his residence into a new neighbourhood, or district of the town, spreads a table before his door in the street with bread, cheese and ale, for those of his new neighbours who choose to partake of his hospitality. If the master of the house be of ability the company are invited into the house to supper, and the evening is concluded with mirth and good humour. The origin of this custom is unknown, but probably it was instituted for the purpose of introducing the family of the host to their neighbours. The population of Ripon, according to the re-



turns of 1821, amounts to 4563, being an increase of 930, within the last ten years. Of the environs of Ripon, it is impossible to speak in terms of too high commendation. The air is mild and salubrious, and the country is rich, fertile, and highly cultivated; it is interspersed with places of great public attraction which command general admiration, and amongst the principal of them may be reckoned, Studley, Fountains Abbey, Newby, and Hackfall.

#### ROTHERHAM

Is a small market town in the parish of that name, in the wapentake of Strafforth and Tickhill, and in the liberty of Hallamshire; 6 miles from Sheffield; 13 from Barnsley; 12 from Doncaster; and 158 from London. It is situated partly on the declivity of a hill, and partly in a valley, on the river Don, at its conflux with the Rother, which runs on its western as the Don runs on its north-western side. The houses are generally of stone, substantial and well built, but as many of them stand near the bottom of a hill, and as the streets are narrow and irregular, the town has rather a gloomy appearance. The parish church is a spacious and handsome Gothic structure, built in the reign of Edward IV. and dedicated to All Saints; it is a vicarage, in the patronage of Lord Howard Effingham, and of the annual value of £300 to £400. There is also a meeting house for Dissenters, built in the year 1705; and another for the Methodists, rebuilt in 1805.—To the former is attached a school, for the education of 80 poor children of the parish of Rotherham. The minister for the time being is the governor, and admits the children; but the master is appointed by the trustees of the founder, Thomas Hollis, Esq. of London, by whose munificence the school is liberally endowed. This institution is kept under excellent regulations.—Besides the Protestant Dissenters' school there is in Rotherham a Free Grammar school, endowed by the King, of which the Reverend Benjamin Birkett is master; there is also a Church Charity school, supported by the donations of the benevolent from time immemorial, over which Mr. John Clarke presides as master. In a place where so much exertion is used to afford learning to all classes of the people, it is natural to look for the means of gratifying the taste thus acquired; and we find accordingly that there is in the town an extensive Subscription Library, containing many thousands of books in the various departments of science and literature.—This town was the birth place of Thomas Scott, usually called Thomas of Rotherham, Archbishop of York. This prelate, who ascended the episcopal chair in the year 1480, and died in 1500, founded at Rotherham a College, called Jesus College, for a Provost, five priests, six choristers, and

three schoolmasters. By the census of Rotherham, taken in 1821, it appears that the population amounts to 3548. The town is in a thriving state, and considerable trade is carried on in coals, corn and other articles. This town enjoys great facilities for water carriage, the Don being on the South-west navigable to Sheffield; on the North-east it forms a communication with the Aire; on the East with the Stainforth and Keadley canal, and all Lincolnshire, and the North-west with the Dearn and Dove and Barnsley canals, and consequently with the Calder, thereby opening a water communication with all the great manufacturing towns of Yorkshire and Lancashire. Rotherham has an excellent market on Monday, for corn, cattle, and butchers' meat, and every second Monday there is a fair for fat cattle, sheep, and hogs; and this, like the fortnight fairs of Wakefield, which it much resembles, is well attended by graziers and butchers, from very distant parts of the country. There are here two ale and porter breweries, on an extensive scale, which, by means of the inland navigation, have a ready transit for their beverage to other parts of the country. In ancient times this place was famous for its manufacture of edge tools, and there are still iron and steel works, on a large scale, in the immediate neighbourhood. The village or hamlet of Masborough, in this parish, is divided from Rotherham by a handsome stone bridge over the Don, and contains about the same number of inhabitants as the parish town. Here are the great iron-works belonging to the Walkers, which, within the last 70 years have grown into deserved celebrity. At these works are manufactured cannon of the largest calibre, and almost every kind of cast iron articles, and many of wrought iron, as bar, rod, and sheet iron. The iron bridges of Sunderland, Yarm, and Staines, as well as the bridge which crosses the Thames, called Southwark Bridge, were cast at these foundries. Less business is at present done at these works than formerly, partly from the number of similar establishments which have arisen in various other parts of the kingdom, but principally, perhaps, from the great wealth of the family having diminished the stimulus to ardent exertion. The neighbourhood abounds with iron ore, and the Masborough works are chiefly supplied from the mines on the estates

of the Earl of Effingham, and those of Earl Fitzwilliam. There is in the village of Masborough an academical institution called "The Rotherham Independent College," for the education of young men intended for the ministry, amongst that class of Protestant Dissenters called Independents. This institution was opened on the 5th of November, 1795, under the superintendance of the late Edward Williams, D. D. who was the first theological tutor. On the death of Dr. Williams, the Rev. James Bennett was appointed to fill his place in the theological department, the duties of which office he now discharges. The Rev. Thomas Smith, A. M. is the classical tutor, and the institution is in a state very satisfactory to its patrons and friends. The buildings, which are well adapted for the purpose, stand on a rising ground, in a salubrious situation; they were originally constructed to receive sixteen students, but they have since been enlarged, and made to accommodate five and twenty.—The funds for the support of this seminary arise from voluntary contributions. The late excellent Samuel Walker, Esq.\* was amongst the original projectors, and one of the most munificent donors of the Rotherham College, which stands in the immediate vicinity of that chapel which was built by his liberality, and of which the Rev. James Bennett, the theological tutor of the college, is the present minister. The environs of Rotherham are pleasant and picturesque. On an eminence, on the East of the town, stands an elegant mansion, belonging to the Walker family; and in the neighbourhood, on the way to Barnsley, is situated Wentworth House, the magnificent residence of Earl Fitzwilliam.

\* The history of the founder of the iron works at Masbro' is short, but instructive: At twelve years of age he was left an orphan, with two brothers and four sisters, without property, and almost without education. His industry and talents soon supplied these deficiencies, and qualified him for keeping a school. He afterwards established, along with his brothers, Aaron and Jonathan, a small foundry, which in time, under his fostering genius, became one of the most extensive and flourishing establishments of the kind in Europe; and he died on the 12th of May, 1782, in the 66th year of his age, rich in property, and abounding in Christian virtues.

#### SADDLEWORTH

Is a village which gives name to a district, and though the district is in the parish of Rochdale,\* it is situated at the south-western extremity of the West-Riding of the County of York, being bounded by Cheshire to the south-west, and Lancashire to the north-west. It is in the wapentake of Agbrigg, and the village is 5 miles from Oldham, 12 from Huddersfield, and 200 from London. The district of Saddleworth is 7 miles long, and 5 wide in the broadest part. It is a wild, bleak region, but trade and manufactures have accumulated in it a vast number of inhabitants, and reclaimed large tracts of that land for the purposes of cultivation which a people purely agricultural would have consigned to eternal sterility. This district is divided into four quarters called *meres*, (the ancient term for boundary) viz. Friars-mere to the N. E. Quick-mere to the S. E. Shaw-mere to the S. W. and Lord's-mere to the W. Friars-mere was once an estate belonging to the Black Friars, who had a house or grange there near Delph. Dobcross and Delph may be considered as the centre of Saddleworth, the former a little to the S. W. and the other a little to the N. E. of that precise point.

\* Hugo de Stapleton, Lord of the Manor of Rochdale, erected a chapel in Saddleworth for his tenants, which, on the dissolution of the Monasteries, was annexed to Rochdale. The tythes have been purchased by the land-owners, but the consecration to the chapel is in the Vicar of Rochdale.

A tradition prevails that Saddleworth derives its name from an ancient bargain by which one of its possessors sold the whole district for a saddle, hence called *Saddle-worth*; but it was not we presume till it had attained an increased value, that the Stapletons sold the manor to the Ramsdens; by whom it was sold to the Farrers and the Holts of Ashworth, the former of whom sold their shares to the tenants. Putting out of consideration the apocryphal tradition of the Saddle, property in this mountainous region has advanced in value within the last hundred and fifty years, in an incredible ratio, as the following facts will prove: On the 9th of August, 1654, William Farrer, Esq. of Ewood, near Halifax, purchased a share of the lands of Saddleworth from William Ramsden, Esq. of Longley-hall, for £2,950. These lands in 1775 brought in an annual rent of £1,500 to James Farrer, Esq. of Bamforth-grange. In 1790, he sold off land to the amount of £10,000. and by advancing the remainder, still kept up the rent of £1,500 a-year. At his death, in 1791, it had increased to £2000 a-year, much of it in lease for lives, and the estate being sold in small parcels to the occupiers and others, it produced nearly £70,000, making an actual profit in the sales, exclusive of the rents, of upwards of £77,000, upon less than a £3,000 purchase. A remarkable proof of the healthiness of the place appears in the following fact: A benefit society established in 1772, consisted of upwards of 800 members, some of whom were upwards of fifty years old at their entrance, and up to the beginning of 1794 only 12 members had been buried out of the whole number.\* The trade of Saddleworth has increased in a very rapid degree. In the year 1740, not more than 8640 pieces of cloth were manufactured in this district, and those of a very coarse and inferior kind; in 1792, the annual number was increased to 38,627; and in 1820, the number of pieces milled, according to the supervisors' returns, amounted to 7026 narrows, and 12,458 broads, exclusive of kerseymeres and shawls, which have been the articles principally manufactured here for the last two or three years, and of which there have been produced in this district during the last year, at least 40,000 pieces; 2,640,000 lbs. of wool has been consumed in the manufacture of those 59,484 pieces of cloth, of the

value of at least £800,000. The number of *woollen* looms in Saddleworth, is about 3500; of *cotton* looms, from 3 to 400; and there are about 100 mills turned by the Tame and its tributary streams. Many of the super-fine broad cloths made here vie with the cloths of the West of England, and are little inferior to those of the first Leeds manufactures. The land under cultivation in this district lets in small farms at from 20s. to 40s. an acre. Some choice meadows will bring £5 or £6. The Huddersfield Canal, which passes through the heart of Saddleworth, and penetrates, by a tunnel upwards of three miles in length, through the mountains of Pule Moss and Brunn Top, has conferred a lasting benefit upon this country, and facilitated greatly the transit of coals, corn, wool, lime, manures, &c.— Castle Shaw, in Saddleworth, exhibits the remains of an ancient fortification, and is supposed by Dr. Whitaker to have been a fortress of the provincial barons. It appears from the present elevation of the ground and the Hus-teds and Castle-hills, that the area of this ancient castle extended over several statute acres; and round beads of the Britons have been dug up here of the same kind as those which have been discovered in the British barrows upon Salisbury Plain. It is conjectured that a castrum at Castle Shaw, seated at the foot of Stan-edge, within two furlongs of the Roman road to Slack, was a Roman station. In this neighbourhood are the once-celebrated rocks of Green-field, as well as several druidical remains, to which we have already referred in the history of Huddersfield. On the whole, Saddleworth is an interesting, though an uninviting part of the country, and the Mountaineers of this region, like those of Switzerland, have a character peculiar to themselves: They are rude of speech, but kind and hospitable in disposition, without many of the benefits of education, but of quick perception and sound judgment. They mix little in the world, their own deep vallies and lofty mountains form a world of their own, in which as much real comfort and solid contentment exist as fall to the lot of the generality of mankind.

The following descriptive enumeration of the villages and hamlets in Saddleworth will serve to convey a tolerably accurate idea of that extensive district:—

- DIGGLE BRIDGE**, a small hamlet, with a corn mill,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles NNE. of Dobcross.
- DIG LEE**, a manufacturing hamlet,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles from Dobcross.
- DOBXCROSS**, a large village, in which there are 2 Banks, Buckley & Co. and Harrop & Co. there are also a chapel, stamp office, & post office; 5 miles ENE. of Oldham.

#### SEDBERGH,

A small market town pleasantly situated on the NW. extremity of the West Riding of Yorkshire, near the river Rother, which fall into the Lune, about 3 miles from the town. Sedbergh is a parish divided into three townships, viz. Sedbergh, Dent and Garsdale, in the wapentake of Ewecross, and on the borders, though not in the district of Craven; it is 5 miles from Dent, 10 from Kendal, 11 from Kirby Lonsdale, and 260 from London. It is situated in a secluded and fertile vale among rugged mountains. The market is on Wednesday, but it is almost disused. The principal manufacture at Sedbergh is cotton, and there are two mills, at which a considerable number of persons are employed, one of them belonging to the firm of Messrs. John Upton and Son, and the other to Mr. Peter Taylor. There are here a parish church, a Methodist chapel, and a Friends Meeting-house; but the distinguishing public institution of Sedbergh, is its amply endowed Free Grammar school, which has produced many eminent men. This school was founded by Roger Lupton, D.D. provost of Eton. The appointment of master is in the Master and Fellows of St. John's, Cambridge. This school had fallen to decay, and the lands appropriated to its support had been sold and embezzled! but Sir Anthony Denny, Knt. a liberal patron of learning, caused the school to be repaired, and not only recovered, but also settled the estate so firmly as to prevent all future alienations.\* Provost Lupton founded two fellowships and eight scholarships, in St. John's College, Cambridge, for students from this school; and Mr. Hebblethwaite, also founded one fellowship at St. John's; besides which this is one of the schools which is entitled to send a candidate for Lady Elizabeth Hastings' Exhibitions. The produce of certain estates at Sedbergh, is applied to the relief of poor householders belonging to the township, not receiving parochial assistance, towards clothes for 12 poor children of the township, above 7 and under 12 years of age; to the purchase of bread to be given to poor people at the church yearly on St. John's day, and for an exhibition to a Sedbergh boy scholar, while educating in St. John's College. The population of Sedbergh by the returns of 1821, is 2022.

## SELBY

Is a brisk market town, situated on the banks of the Ouse in the parish of Selby, in the wapentake of Barkston Ash, and the liberty of St. Peter's. It is 8 miles from Snaith; 10 from Howden, 15 from York, 20 from Leeds, and 177 from London. It is in all probability the ancient Roman *Salebia*, but history has not marked the era of its foundation, nor preserved any authentic documents of its state in the times preceding the Norman conquest, though it appears to have been a place of some note at that period. The ancient and famous abbey which was once the chief ornament and glory of Selby, was founded by William the Conqueror, in the year 1069, for Monks of the order of St. Benedict, and dedicated to the honour of St. Mary and St. Germanus, who quashed what was called the Pelagian heresy. In the following year, the Conqueror coming to Selby to settle the endowment, he was accompanied by his Queen, and she was there delivered of a son, who was afterwards King of England, by the name of Henry I. This abbey was favoured by the succeeding kings with great privileges, and the abbots of Selby and York, were the only two mitred abbots in England north of the Trent. The monastery of Selby flourished in great splendour till the period of the dissolution, when it was surrendered by Robert de Selby, on the 6th of December 1539, in the 30th of Henry VIII. Two years afterwards, a part of this abbey was conveyed to Sir Ralph Sadler, Knt., for a valuable consideration, the sum of £736. prompt payment, and £3. 10s. 8d. per annum. Sir Ralph, afterwards alienated it along with the little park, estimated at ten acres of land, and the manor of Selby, to Leonard Beckwith, and his heirs, the Walmesleys of Dunkehalp, in Lancashire; and by marrying the heiress it came to Lord Petre, in whose family it still remains. This ancient edifice is magnificent even in its ruins. The dilapidating hand of time was slowly proceeding in its labour, when on the 30th of March 1690, about six o'clock in the morning, the steeple or tower fell down, and by its fall destroyed the south end of the transept, and the roof of the western part of the south aisle. When the present steeple was erected it is difficult to say, but it appears to have been in the early

part of the last century, as the parish register of the year 1702, contains a list of the subscribers to this work. The conventual church of Selby, was made parochial by letters patent dated the 20th of March, 1618, and a minister was thereunto nominated, authorized and appointed by the Archbishop of York. This church is a fine specimen of the architecture of the time in which it was erected. Selby, has a good grammar school, founded by Edward VI. and well endowed. There is here a handsome bridge constructed of timber over the river Ouse, which is particularly admired for the despatch in the admission of vessels. This bridge, though estimated to weigh 70 tons, can be opened and shut in the short space of one minute. It works on balls resembling cannon-balls, and the facility of its movements is astonishing. A branch Custom House has lately been established at Selby, by the Lords of the Treasury, and vessels can now proceed from hence direct to any part of the kingdom, without being exposed to the detention to which they were formerly liable, by being compelled to stop at Hull, to be cleared at the Custom House there. The commerce of Selby has been increasing for some years. By means of a canal from the Ouse to the Aire and Calder, a navigation exists between Leeds and Selby, by which this place becomes the loading and unloading port of the West Riding of Yorkshire, and upwards of 800 vessels, with cargoes clear coastwise from hence every year. That spirit of improvement by which the Aire and Calder Navigation Company is at present actuated, has tended much to the advantage of Selby, by increasing the quantity of merchandise passing through this port, as well as to the benefit of the trading interest generally; and the Steam Packets which now ply daily between Selby and Hull, and Hull and Selby, occasions an influx of company hitherto unexampled in this place. There is a good market here on the Monday, and the handsome Gothic cross erected in the market place, is at once an ornament to the town, and an accommodation to the numerous persons who resort to it for the transaction of their business. The soil in the neighbourhood of Selby is various, part of it being sandy, and part a hazel clay. The chief proprietors are the Hon. E. R. Petre, and Humphrey Osbaldeston, Esq. There are also a

great number of copyholders. A considerable quantity of wood, or rather woad for the use of dyers is raised in this neighbourhood; the seed of which is sown with red clover, and when it is in full bloom it is reaped by women and boys, who go before the mowers to pluck and gather it into bundles.—Large quantities of potatoes are raised in this parish; and near the town, as well as in all this line of country, a great deal of flax, chiefly for the manufactories of the West Riding, is grown, which is cleaned and dressed

in the neighbourhood. The warp-land, as it is called, over which the waters of the Ouse and the Aire, are permitted to flow by means of sluices, which admit and retain the water until the sediment is deposited, is peculiarly rich and luxuriant. Upon this land it is not thought safe to sow wheat, from an apprehension that the seed would perish during the winter, but it is admirably adapted to raising spring corn, of which there are heavy crops. The population of Selby, according to the returns of 1821, amounts to 4097.

## SETTLE

Is a small well-built market and post town in the district of Craven, in the parish of Giggleswick, and in the wapentake and liberty of Staincliffe; 16 miles from Skipton, 17 from Kirkby-Lonsdale, and 234 from London. This town, which may be considered as the capital of Ribblesdale, derives its name from the Saxon word *Setl*, a seat.\* It forms a part of the *Percy Fee*, and was included in a charter of free warren, granted in the 4th of Edward II. to Henry de Percy, along with "Gygleswyke and Routhmel." At that time landed property in this district produced but a small revenue, as it appears from the MSS. in Skipton castle, relating to the *Percy Fee*, that the sum total of annual rents then received by the *Northumberland* family, for their manors and estates in *Ribblesdale*, extending from *Selby Abbey*, South, to *Pennigant*, North, a district nearly 20 miles in length, was only £91. 1s. 2jd. The situation of *Settle* is picturesque and singular, but its beauty would be much increased if the high and gloomy stone fences round the fields were displaced by hawthorn hedges. *Castleberg*, a conical lime-stone rock, 210

feet high backed by a cluster of rugged crags, and in ages past undoubtedly crowned with a fortification, rises almost perpendicularly above the town. The projecting top of this hill once formed the gnomon of a rude, but magnificent sun dial: the shadow of which passing over some grey stones upon its side marked the progress of time to the inhabitants of the town beneath—an instrument certainly more ancient, and possibly as old in its application, as the dial of *Ahaz* itself.† But the hour-marks have long been removed, and few remember the history of their old benefactor, whose shadow now takes its daily tour unobserved. The summit of *Castleberg* affords a beautiful and extensive prospect. From this eminence may be seen *Pendle-hill* on the South, *Pennigant* on the North, and *Ingleborough* toward the North-West, rearing their lofty heads above the neighbouring hills, while to the South, a rich and delightful vale opening to the West, displays an extensive landscape, and the whole scene is truly sublime. The markets and fairs of *Settle* are of considerable antiquity, and are held by charter from *Henry III.* The market is held on the Tuesday, and besides the annual fairs, there is a fair held every alternate Friday, from *Easter* to *Whitsuntide* for lean cattle, and every alternate Monday throughout the year for fat cattle, leather and hides, for the manufacture of the latter of which it was at one time famous. There are here several cotton mills, in which the labouring classes find themselves compensated for the deficiency of work in the fields. The luxurious venture of the low lands in this neighbourhood can no where be surpassed; its fertility is such that a statute acre of this land lets for 6l. a year; and near the town 50. per statute acre is given for some choice meadows. The land here is used principally for grazing, as the fogs and rains which so frequently prevail, prevent the corn ripening, and the burthen of tythes discourage arable cultivation, which could indeed be applied to little advantage under the pressure of such a rental. Within a mile to the North-West of *Settle* is *Giggleswick*, a very handsome village, and formerly a market town, remarkable for a *Free Grammar School*, founded by *Edward VI.* in the 4th year of his reign, by *Letters Patent*, dated the 29th of May, 1547, and called, "The *Free Grammar School*

of King Edward VI. of Giggleswycke," of which seven inhabitants and the vicar for the time being are governors. The lands and messuages with which this school was endowed, were, at the time of its endowment of the annual value of £28. 3s. which are held in fee, rendering the crown £8. 2s. yearly.—The endowment was part of the possession belonging to the deserted monastery of Nether Acaster, the value of which was much increased by the drainage and inclosure of Walling Fen, and its present amount is nearly £1000. per annum.\* Originally there were only two, but now there are three masters, two of them for the classics, and one for mathematics.—Pupils of good morals are admitted "from every quarter of the globe," and instructed gratuitously; and boys may be boarded in the village at different rates, from £30. to £150. a year. There are six scholarships founded by Mr. Carr, at Christ College, Cambridge, for scholars educated at this school. Archdeacon Paley received his classical education here, under his father, who was head master nearly fifty years. Here is also a National School as well as at Settle, both of them built by subscription. The parish of Giggleswick contains five townships, viz. Giggleswick and Stackhouse with the hamlet of Rome—Settle with the hamlets of Lodge and Meerbeck—The two Stainfords—The village of Langcliff and hamlet of Winskill—and the village of Rathmel. The parish church, which is dedicated to St. Alkald, is at Giggleswick, and the earliest records relating to this edifice go to 1316, when William de Alverton was vicar. It is a large, uniform, and handsome building, exactly in the style of the other churches in Craven, which are known to have been rebuilt in the reigns of Henry VII. and VIII. About a mile to the north-west of Giggleswick, is a remarkable ebbing and flowing well, which issues from the face of a long ridge of rock, skirting the road from Settle to Clapham. The habits of this singular spring are extremely irregular; within the last few years it has been observed to rise and fall nineteen inches in the space of five minutes. The time of its flux and reflux is apparently unconnected with rain or drought, or any other external cause. Sometimes it is completely dry, and then on a sudden is heard to issue from the recesses of

its native rock with a hollow gurgling sound. The water, which is received into a stone cistern, is limpid, cold, and wholesome, and has no peculiar taste. The phenomenon of the ebb and flow was formerly accounted for upon the principle of the Simple Siphon, but that doctrine was so full of difficulties as applied to the regular reciprocations of the Giggleswick spring, that it is now exploded, and the venerable John Gough, the keen perception of whose mental eye compensates the loss of natural vision, has, in a paper read to the Manchester Philosophical Society, (see Transactions, vol. II. second series,) bronched the very plausible theory that the ebb and flow of this well is produced by the agency of a natural Compound Siphon, formed in recesses of the lime stone mountain from which the water issues. Two hundred years ago, the learned of that age were puzzled with this spring, and Drunken Barnaby, the jolly itinerant, thus describes it:—

"Near to the way as the traveller goes,  
A fine fresh spring both ebbs and flows;  
Neither know the learned that travel,  
What procures it, salt or gravel."

According to the census of 1821, the population of the town of Settle amounts to 1508.

# Historic Sketch

## OF THE

# TOWN OF SHEFFIELD.

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Lists of Streets in Sheffield at the beginning of the 18th and 19th centuries...p. 296.

Sheffield, in population and consequence, ranks as the second town in the West-Riding of the county of York. This ancient seat of the cutlery manufacture is in the parish to which it gives name, in the southern division of the Wapentake of Strafford and Tickhill, and in the liberty of Hallamshire. It is 6 miles from Rotherham; 12 from Chesterfield; 14 from Barnsley; 13 from Doncaster, and 160 from London. It is finely situated on an eminence, at the conflux of the rivers Sheaf and Don, from the former of which it derives its name, and the streams of the Loxley, the Porter, and the Riveling, all unite here. Sheffield is the capital of a district familiarly known by the name of HALLAMSHIRE, which district, though not very well defined, may be said to comprehend the three parishes of Sheffield, Ecclesfield, and Hansworth, with the chapelry of Bradfield.\* The parish of Sheffield is of considerable extent; it stretches about 10 miles in length, and its average breadth may be taken at 3 miles; its area,

of course, contains about 22,000 acres. The soil about Sheffield is generally of a deep clay, and it is very productive from the quantity of manure bestowed upon it. The land is rich in mineral productions, and especially in the three important bodies of iron, coal, and stone. The air, when uncontaminated by smoke, is healthful and salubrious, and M. de Dr. Buchan, who resided here about 30 years ago, says, "consumption is more prevalent here than in almost any other part of the kingdom," it is to be attributed to the manufacturing system, and to the nature of the employment of the generality of the labouring classes, which may be supposed to incline to habits of intemperance; there are, however, two counteracting principles to this evil; first, a large proportion of the workmen have now small gardens, in which they spend a portion of their leisure hours; and second, the cutlers are widely dispersed in the neighbouring villages, like the clothiers in the neighbourhood of Leeds, where they enjoy good air, and accustom themselves to out-

door exercise. It does not appear that the inhabitants of Sheffield are in general shorter lived than those of other large manufacturing towns, but an exception must be made with respect to workmen employed in grinding outlery, particularly that branch termed *dry grinding*. These men seldom attain the age of 50 years, and a vast majority of them are cut off at a much earlier period. It is singular that no expedient is used to prevent the fatal consequences of this deadly calling. We have safety lamps for colliers, life boats for sailors, and gauze breathers for fustain singers; why are there no lungs preservers for the Sheffield grinders?

Sheffield is a place of great antiquity, and had, before the Norman conquest, obtained a degree of independence as a part of the manor of *Hallam*. When this neighbourhood became new modelled, under its Norman proprietors, it gave name to an extensive parish, and a still more extensive manor, and there was the castle of its Lord, and the centre of population. Though now principally known as a commercial district, and as possessing a monopoly of one great article of our national manufacture, it was once the seat and favourite residence of a race of ancient nobility, by whose history it became connected with the general records of the kingdom. The traces of these times are now few and fast obliterating, but it is one of the objects of history to cherish their remembrance. The reverend historian of Hallamshire\*, with the persevering industry of an antiquarian, and the enlightened liberality of a Christian philosopher, has happily rendered this duty an easy task, and it would be difficult to discover a safer guide through the intricate mazes of remote times.

Grimesthorpe, Hallam, Attercliff, and Sheffield, are described in the Domesday Survey as being *Terra Rogerii de Busli*, and it is known that Roger de Busli was one of the persons who accompanied the Duke of Normandy in his successful invasion of England. Part of the extensive possessions of the house of the De Buslis passed to Idonea, wife of Robert de Vipont, the heiress of that family; but long before that period, Sheffield and many other estates within the Busli fee had become the property of the house of De Lovetot. From the time when the Lovetots obtained their interest in Hallamshire, may be dated the superiority which the vill of Sheffield acquired, and has ever since maintained, through the whole district which has at any time borne that name. It is by no means certain whether the original Castle of Sheffield was built by the first of the De Lovetots, or whether he

found one erected on that most convenient site, by Sweyn, the dispossessed Saxon Lord, or some of his progenitors. The probability is, that this Castle, which stood in the angle formed by the Sheaf and the Don at their junction, existed before the conquest, and that it served as a baronial residence for a chief of the Saxon race under the Heptarchy. The family of the Lovetots seem to have considered power but as a trust to be administered for the general good, and one of their first cares was to plant churches on their domains. Under the administration of this ancient house, the first churches in Ecclesfield, in Bradfield, and in Sheffield, were built, and one-third part of the tithes arising in these were granted to the Monks of Worksop. At that time a few straggling huts and smithies, forming an irregular street extending from the Castle and bridge to the Church gate, with a few houses lying towards the town-mill, and perhaps a branch stretching in a south west direction, forming what is now called the Fargate, constituted the whole town of Sheffield. The last of the male line of the Lovetots died between the 22nd and the 27th years of the reign of Henry II. leaving an only daughter Matilda, or Maud, then of tender years, as a ward of the reigning monarch. Henry left it to his son and successor, Richard, to select the person to whom her hand should be given, and he, as might have been expected, chose the son of one of his companions in arms, Gerard de Furnival, a young Norman knight, on whom, by this alliance, the fair lordship of Sheffield devolved.

Several members of the house of Furnival were summoned to Parliament among the Barons of the realm. Gerard attached himself ardently to the interests of King John, and there is a tradition, that that monarch paid a visit to Sheffield Castle at the time when his adherent was its lord. Soon after the death of this prince, De Furnival joined in one of the crusades, and closed a short adventurous life at Jerusalem, in the year 1219. During the possession of the Furnivals, the ancient Castle of Sheffield was re-edified, or a new Castle raised on its site, in virtue of a charter granted by Henry III. in the 54th year of his reign. On the 18th of November, 1296, Thomas, Lord Furnival, obtained from the King a charter, under the great seal of England, for a market every week, to be held on the *Tuesday*, at his manor of Sheffield, and a fair every year during three days, namely, on the vigil, day, and morrow of the Holy Trinity, unless such market and fair should be to the detriment of the neighbouring markets and fairs; which we may conclude they were

not, as the market and fair have continued to the present time, except that the latter is held on the Tuesday after Trinity Sunday. Another, and a more important charter which has long been venerated as the Magna Charta of Sheffield, was granted by Thomas De Furnival himself, on the 10th of August, 1297. The object of this charter was, first, to abolish those base and uncertain services by which the inhabitants of Sheffield held their tenements of their lord, and to substitute in their stead a fixed and annual payment in money. The sum agreed upon to be paid by the whole town was £3. 8s. 9d. which continued to be paid for several centuries, under the designation of the Burgery-rents, but after a time, when money became depreciated, and labour advanced, the expense of the collection would have exceeded the product of the rents, and it was accordingly discontinued: The second clause of the charter provided for the due administration of public municipal justice, by reviving the court baron, which it appointed should be held every three weeks; and by the last provision of the grant, the inhabitants of Sheffield were freed from all exaction of toll through the whole circuit of Hallamshire, whether they were venders or purchasers. The historian of Sheffield very naturally asks the question, Why Sheffield, when it became, in consequence of its charter, a free borough, was not summoned to send its representatives to the House of Commons, as were other boroughs of less consideration? and the answer he returns is—that it might probably be considered as virtually represented by its Lord, who was regularly summoned to take his seat in the House of Peers. But this surely is a very unsatisfactory reply. Virtual representation, at best, is a sort of anomaly, but to speak of a borough being virtually represented in the House of Commons by the presence of a Peer in the House of Lords, is a refinement upon virtual representation perfectly novel in itself, and altogether insufficient to account for the right of returning members to Parliament being withheld from the inhabitants of Sheffield. In the latter part of his life, Thomas, Lord Furnival, entered into an extensive agreement with the Monks of Worksop, by which, among other things, he converted his tythe from his manor of Sheffield, into an annual money rent. This deed was executed at Nottingham, in 1328, and in 1332 "the Great Granter" died, and was buried in the church of the barefooted friars, at Doncaster. The name of Furnival continued at Sheffield fifty years after the death of the benefactor of that town, and Joan, Lady Furnival, the only daughter of William, his

son, carried the estates of her family to the house of Nevil, by her marriage with Sir Thomas Nevil. The fruit of this marriage was an only daughter, named Maud, who married John Talbot, afterwards Earl of Shrewsbury. Thus the inheritance of the Furnivals accrued to that noble family.

Before the close of the 14th century, and before the ancient family of Furnival had become extinct, the artificers of Sheffield had obtained a certain reputation for the article which still ranks high in the staple manufacture of the place; and the poet Chaucer, describing the accoutrements and appearance of a miller, in the days of Edward III. says—

"A Shefeld thwytel bare he in his hose

"Ronde was his face and camysed was his nose."

A thwytel, or whittle, was a knife such as was carried about the person, so late as Charles I. by those whose quality did not entitle them to the distinction of a sword. There is no positive proof that, so early as Chaucer's time, the artificers of Sheffield fabricated other articles of cutlery, but it is highly probable that they did not confine themselves to the "thwytel."

The first Earl of Shrewsbury was a captain of distinguished renown, and fell at the battle of Chatillon, in France, contending with unequal numbers, on the 20th of July, 1453, his son, John Talbot, dying by his side. His successors, the second and third Earls, were less distinguished characters. In the civil wars of those unhappy times they took an active part, and manifested a strong attachment to the house of Lancaster. The Castle of Sheffield, built for defence, and commanding a considerable tract of country, was held by its Lancastrian possessors as a fortress for King Henry George, the fourth Earl, was born in 1460, and was lord of Sheffield and Hallamshire, including his minority, seventy years. This Earl made great additions to the lodge in the centre of his park, about two miles from the Castle and the town of Sheffield, and in the early part of the reign of Henry VIII. raised there a noble country residence, sometimes called the Lodge, and sometimes the Sheffield Manour, a name which its ruins, (spread over 2 or 3 acres of ground) retain to this day. Cardinal Wolsey was at this time in the zenith of his power, but he carried not his honours meekly. He was capricious, haughty and insolent, even towards the ancient nobles of the land, and in the year 1530, the natural consequence of such behaviour manifested itself in his ruin.—"Pride," saith the wise man, "goeth before destruction," and Sheffield was peculi-

arly a witness of the humiliation of this haughty ecclesiastic. The Earl of Northumberland was sent to arrest the Cardinal at Cawood, with instructions to deliver his prisoner into the custody of the Earl of Shrewsbury. On Sunday, the 6th of November, he left Cawood, and passing through Pontefract and Doncaster, arrived at Sheffield on the 8th. The fallen Cardinal was received at the Manour with every mark of respect from the Earl and his family, who treated him as a voluntary guest, rather than as a prisoner. He remained at Sheffield 16 days in a state of deep dejection. Here he was seized with a mortal malady which turned to dysentery, and his physician predicted that he could not survive more than four or five days. Notwithstanding his illness he was hurried towards London, mounted on a mule! The first night after he left Sheffield, he slept at Hardwicke Hall; the next at Nottingham; and on the third he arrived at Leicester Abbey. Here, says Cavendish, his gentleman usher, he was received and welcomed with great reverence by the Abbot and all his convent: "To whom my Lord, the Cardinal, said, Father Abbot, I am come hether to leve my bones amonge you. As soon as he was in his chamber, he went incontinent to his bed very sick. This was upon Saturday at night; and then continued he sicker and sicker, till on Monday he died."

During the life of the sixth Earl of Shrewsbury, a prisoner of still more elevated rank was in custody at Sheffield, and spent a large portion of the period of her captivity in the Castle of this place. The jealous mind of "the Virgin Queen," as Elizabeth has been whimsically called, induced her to make a captive of Mary, Queen of Scots, and as a special mark of her royal confidence in the Earl of Shrewsbury, to place her in the keeping of this nobleman, very much against his inclination. On the 17th of May, 1568, Mary having escaped from the Castle of Lochleven, landed at Workington, in Cumberland, whence she addressed a letter to Elizabeth, beseeching her to afford her an asylum. This *asylum* she first found in Bolton Castle, from whence she was removed, on the 2d of February following, by way of Rotherham, to Tutbury, where the Earl and Countess of Shrewsbury were ready to receive her. Here she remained nearly two years; and at the end of the year 1570, she was removed to Sheffield Castle. Her attendants, ordinary and supernumerary, amounted at this time to about 40 persons, but her confinement was not on that account the less rigorous, and she was watched day and night by a select number of the

tenantry employed in that revolting service. Immured in this stately prison, "without," as she herself says, "fresh air, not allowed necessary exercise, and towards the latter part of the period became so weak in her lower extremities, that she was obliged to be carried by her servants when she would pass from room to room," she quitted the scene of so many sorrows by command of her royal cousin, and was removed to Winfield, on the 3rd of September, 1584, to be placed in the keeping of Sir Ralph Sadler, and Sir John Somers. At Winfield she was placed under the same restraint as at Sheffield. From Winfield she was removed to her old prison at Tutbury, from thence to Chartley, and finally to Fotheringhay, where on the 8th of February, 1587, her life was terminated on the block, after a captivity of 18 years, 8 months, and 22 days, having spent upwards of 13 years of that dreary period in the Castle at Sheffield. Here we shall leave her, waiting the great day which will clear up the mysteries of her sad story, when every merciful allowance will be made for the infelicities of that situation in which it had pleased Providence to place her, and when royal victims and royal persecutors shall appear on an equal footing before the throne of an unerring Judge. Three years after the death of Mary, Queen of Scots, whose execution, George, the sixth Earl of Shrewsbury attended, that nobleman died at Sheffield Manour, and was succeeded by Gilbert, his son. This Earl sat upon the trial of the Earl of Essex, in 1600, and on the death of Elizabeth, in 1603, he signed the proclamation, in which James I. was named as her successor. Earl Gilbert died in London, on the 8th of May, 1616, and was interred in the parish church at Sheffield.

Lady Aetha Talbot, youngest daughter and co-heiress of the Earl Gilbert, was married to Thomas Howard, Earl of Arundel and Surrey, and by this marriage the lordship of Sheffield was transferred to that noble family, in whom it is at present vested. In the timer of which we have been speaking, Sheffield presented the singular appearance of a thriving manufacturing town, the centre of a trading district, and at the same time, the seat of a rich and noble family, surrounded by their spacious domains. It was not to be supposed that this anomaly could long exist; and the time had now arrived when the splendour of the Castle of Sheffield was to be obscured, and the seat of its noble possessor transferred to Arundel. About this period the sound of civil war was again heard, and Sheffield Castle was doomed to be the scene of mighty conflicts between Charles I. and the parliament,

Sheffield and its neighbourhood embraced the popular cause, and Sir John Gell, one of the generals of parliament, marching in force from Derbyshire, took military possession of the castle. William Cavendish, Earl and afterwards Marquis of Newcastle, marched into Yorkshire at the head of the royal army, consisting of 8000 men, and on his approach to Sheffield, such was the panic he created, that the parliamentary forces abandoned both the town and Castle, and suffered the Earl to take possession of them without a blow. On the departure of the principal part of the royal army for York, Major Thomas Beaumont, of the ancient family of Beaumont of Whitley Hall, was left in possession of the castle, which he maintained till the battle of Marston Moor, fought on the 22nd of July, 1644, saw the royal army entirely overcome, and the Marquis of Newcastle precipitately quitting the kingdom. The Earl of Manchester now determined to reduce Sheffield Castle and the other garrisons in the neighbourhood, and Major-General Crawford was dispatched upon that duty. To prevent the effusion of blood, a summons was sent to Major Beaumont requiring him to surrender the castle. This demand was answered by a volley of shot, and a reply that "the garrison would hold no parley." The besiegers now raised two batteries, and kept their cannon playing upon the fortress for four and twenty hours without any visible effects. Finding that the siege would be protracted, Crawford sent to Lord Fairfax for the *Queen's Pocket Pistol*, and a whole culverin, which being brought to the spot, played with such fatal effect, that the garrison was obliged to capitulate, and the castle was surrendered on the 11th of August, 1642, to the Parliamentary commander.—The heads of the house of Howard, being adherents of the king, their estates at Sheffield were confiscated; but they were restored four years after on the payment of £6000. by the Earl of Arundel, in the way of composition. On the 30th of April, 1646, a resolution passed the House of Commons, directing that the Castle of Sheffield should be rendered untenable; and on the 13th of July, in the following year, another resolution passed the same assembly, for the "sleighting and demolishing" that ancient structure. On the 23d of April, 1648, the work of demolition had begun, and a few vaults are all which now remain to bear witness that such an edifice once stood on what is yet called the Castle-hill. The Manour still existed, and this house was a habitable residence forty or fifty years after the castle was demolished, but in the year

1706, it was dismantled by order of Thomas, duke of Norfolk, and the furniture dispersed in some of the old houses in the neighbourhood. When there was no longer any mansion, there was no further necessity for a park, and at the time when the Manour was abandoned, the park was divided into farms, and distributed amongst twenty tenants. The native forests of Hallamshire then also felt the power of the axe; and the fine avenues of the park, the growth of centuries, and the admiration of successive generations, were doomed to swell the stock of a carpenter, or to afford handles for the tools by which the spoliation was committed.

Having thus rapidly traced the history of Sheffield through the periods of its successive Lords—the Buslis, the Lovetots, the Furnivals, the Nevils, and the Talbots, down to the possession of the noble house of Howard, embracing six centuries of time, we arrive at the modern annals of this place, which, though less interesting to the readers of general history, are still more important to the age for which we write.

Sheffield is connected with the circumjacent country by two bridges, one of them over the Don, and the other over the Sheaf. The Don bridge is of stone, close to the Castle, it has five arches, and is called Lady Bridge, from a religious house which anciently stood near it, dedicated to the Virgin. This chapel, which did not stand on the bridge, as at Rotherham and Wakefield, but at its foot, was afterwards converted into a wool warehouse, and subsequently into alms houses for poor widows; but when the bridge was widened, 1768, the alms houses were pulled down. Lady bridge was originally erected in 1485, pursuant to an agreement entered into for that purpose, between Sir John Plesaince, vicar of Sheffield, and Wm. Hill, master mason, by which agreement Hill undertook "to make a sufficient brige over the watyr of Dune of V. arches of his own costys, all mason worke, clensing the grounde werk, and scayfyld makying for a c. markys, Syr John causing all manner of stuff needful to the said werk to be brought to the grounde of the parish cost, i. e. lyme, stor, sande and tymber." The bridge over the Sheaf was built by Edward, Duke of Norfolk, in 1709; it consisted of one arch, and leads to Sheffield park, Hansworth, Woodhouse, &c. eastward. This bridge has since sunk into a state of decay, and is at present rebuilding. There is also at the end of the Nursery, an iron bridge of three arches more remarkable for its convenience than its beauty.

Sheffield has long been celebrated for its manufacture of cutlery goods, but though there is reason to believe that this

town was engaged in the fabrication of iron and steel instruments, so early as the year 1297, and though it is admirably situated for the purposes of trade, its inhabitants, at the commencement of the 17th century, amounted only to 2207 souls: of which 725 were obliged to live upon charity; 100 were householders which relieved others; 160 were householders that could barely support themselves; and 1222 were the children and servants of these two description of householders. Up to that period the trade was incumbered with a great many restrictions, and the presence of a noble family combined with the remains of feudal subjection, to which the labouring classes were exposed, paralyzed their exertions, and rendered this district the abode of a congregated mass of pauperism and dependence. For many ages their principal, if not their sole production was the whittle, but as the minds of the artisans began to expand, and the trammels of aristocratical domination to relax, other articles of more importance were invented, and shears, knives, scissors, scythes, and sickles were added to their fabrics. In the session of parliament of 1624, the cutlers of Hallamshire were erected into a corporate body, consisting of one master, two wardens, six searchers, twenty-four assistants and the rest commonalty; the existing master, wardens, searchers, and assistants to choose their successors every year on the first day of St. Bartholomew. By this act of incorporation, it is provided, that it shall be lawful for the master, &c. to make laws for the government of their trade; and to levy reasonable penalties on those of their trade who neglect to observe them. This corporation consists at present of about six hundred members, and the laws by which they are governed are considered conducive to the prosperity of their manufacture. This company has a hall for the transaction of their business, and the enjoyment of their festivities, called the Cutler's Hall, which was built in the year 1638, and is situated on the south side of the parish church yard.—Till about the middle of the last century the trade of Sheffield was still confined and precarious, none of the manufacturers ventured to extend their trade beyond the limits of this island, and old persons still remember the time when all the produce of their smithies was conveyed weekly to London, on roads of a very different description to those which now exist, by a drove of pack horses.

The middle of the last century may be said to have been the Augustine age of the Sheffield manufacture. A new era now opens upon us. The year 1742 is memorable in the history of this place for the introduction

of a new manufacture, which has become not a formidable rival, but an efficient coadjutor to the staple trade of Sheffield. In that year, Mr. Thos. Bolsover, an ingenious mechanic, then employed in repairing the handle of a knife, which was composed partly of silver and partly of copper, was struck with the possibility of uniting the two metals so as to form a cheap substance, which should present only an exterior of silver, and which might be used in the manufacture of various articles in which silver had been before solely employed. Mr. Bolsover began a manufacture made of this material, but confined himself to buttons, snuff boxes, and other light articles. The full value of an invention, really beneficial, seldom develops itself at once, and it was reserved for another member of the Corporation of Cutlers of Hallamshire, Mr. Joseph Hancock, to show to what other uses the copper, plated in this new method, might be applied, and how successfully it was possible to imitate the finest and richest embossed plate.—Mr. Hancock employed copper, plated with silver, in the manufacture of candlesticks, tea-pots, waiters, and most of the old decorations of the side-board, which previously to his time had been formed only of wrought silver. The importance of this discovery now began to be fully understood; various companies were formed; workmen were easily procured from among the ingenious mechanics of Sheffield, while the streams and the falls of the Don and the Sheaf furnished a powerful agent for rolling out the metal in mills erected for the purpose. Birmingham, the great toy-shop of Europe, as it has been significantly called, early obtained a share in this splendid and lucrative manufacture; but the honour of the invention belongs to Sheffield, and that place still stands unrivalled in the extent to which the manufacture is carried, and in the elegance and durability of its productions.\* The term, *Sheffield plate*, forms a pass-port to every market, and inspires confidence in every dealer. The introduction of this new branch of trade naturally gave to Sheffield a share in the manufacture of silver plate, properly so called, and that the manufacturers might be relieved from the necessity of sending their goods to be stamped in London, an Assay Office was established in Sheffield, which was opened on the 20th of September, 1773. A few years before this time, the refining of the precious metals was introduced into Sheffield, and Mr. John Read, who settled here in the year 1768, carried this important branch of our national commerce to a great extent, and established it as one of the staples

of this place. An article of less consequence, but by no means unimportant, is an imitation of plate, in a superior kind of pewter, called Britannia Metal, in which there has been many years an extensive home and export trade. In this town and its immediate neighbourhood there are several foundries for iron, brass, and white metal, and numerous works are established on the banks of the rivers for the purpose of slitting and otherwise preparing the iron and steel for the manufacturers. About the year 1758, the extensive lead works on the Porter were begun, the first public brewery was established, and a silk mill was erected near the Don, the machinery of which was soon applied to the spinning of cotton, but neither the silk nor the cotton trade has made any progress in Sheffield, though the latter has been perseveringly prosecuted upon the site of the original silk mill, after two successive conflagrations. The carpet manufacture is carried on in Sheffield to a considerable extent; and there are upwards of 160 looms employed in weaving hair setting. There is also a small quantity of woollen cloth manufactured here, but it seems an exotic, and like cotton and silk not a native of the soil.

The flood of improvement and prosperity continued to flow freely through this age. In the year 1780, Mr. Joseph Broadbent first opened a direct trade with the Continent from Sheffield; and in the following year the river Don was made navigable to Tinsley, within three miles of the town, which greatly facilitated the export of merchandise. The first stage waggon which travelled from this neighbourhood was set up about the same time by Joshua Wright, of Mansfield; and to add to the public accommodation, a stage coach was established from Sheffield to London, in the year 1760, by Mr. Samuel Glanville, of the Angel Inn. Five years after the first coffee-room in Sheffield was opened, by Mr. Holland, at the same inn; and in 1770, Mr. Roebuck opened a bank in the town, which was then a perfectly *waigue* establishment in Sheffield, for the accommodation of its merchants and traders. In 1786, the first steam-engine grinding-wheel was erected by Messrs. Proctors, on the east bank of the Sheaf, and the agency of water has since been in a great measure superseded in the large manufactories, by the use of that much more certain and efficient power—steam. Up to the year 1786, there was no newspaper existing in Sheffield, though several unsuccessful attempts had been made to supply the inhabitants with news, without importing it from Northampton, from which the winged messenger, Mercury, was despatched weekly;

but there are now no fewer than three weekly newspapers issued from the public press of Sheffield, namely, the Iris,\* published by Mr. Montgomery, the poet, in the Harthead, on Tuesday; the Mercury,† published by Mr. Todd, the post master, in the Market-place, on the Saturday; and the Independent,‡ published by Mr. Bacon, in Angel-street, on the same day as the Mercury.

The Public Buildings of Sheffield are numerous, and may be classed in the following order:—Places of Worship—Hospitals—and Buildings for the purposes of Trade, Amusement and Military Accommodation. The Parish Church takes the precedence in this classification. This church, though anciently dedicated to St. Peter, is now called Trinity Church; it stands near the centre of the town, and was erected in the reign of Henry I. It is a Gothic structure, with a spire rising from the centre of the building; its length, from east to west, is 240 feet, and its breadth, from north to south, 130 feet. The interior consists of a nave, two side aisles, and a spacious chancel. On the north side of the communion table, is the vestry and library; and on the south side is Shrewsbury Chapel, in which are deposited the mortal remains of four Earls of the family of Talbot; these are—1st, George the 4th Earl, the founder of the chapel, who died in 1538, and whose monument is an altar tomb, with spiral columns at the four corners, standing in a recess beneath the arch, and upon it cumbent effigies of the Earl and his two Countesses. 2d, Francis, the 5th Earl, who died in 1660, and whose altar tomb is without inscription or effigies. 3d, George, the 6th Earl, who died in 1690, and whose monument, erected by himself, in distrust of his executors, stands against the south wall. And 4th, Gilbert, the 7th Earl, who died in 1616, but who has no monument, because the Shrewsbury chapel did not afford space for another befitting his quality. The south aisle of the church is almost exclusively devoted to interments of members of the numerous, and once opulent family of Bright. The north end of the chancel was the burying place of the Jessops, of Broomhall, the patrons of the church, many of whom are here interred. By marriage with Barbara, a female branch of this house, the Wilkinsons, of Boroughbridge, became connected with Sheffield, and near to the monument of William Jessop, Esq. is a monument of the Rev. James Wilkinson, for half a century Vicar of this Parish, and who, by his “unflinching piety, inflexible integrity, and

unwearied zeal in the service of the public," obtained and deserved the endearing appellation of "*The Father of the Town of Sheffield.*" This monument was erected by a subscription of the nobility, gentry, clergy, and others, and the bust by which it is adorned, though the first is not the least happy effort of the chisel of Francis Leggitt Chantrey, the distinguished British statuary, to whom Derbyshire has the honour of having given birth.\* Here also lies Lady Elizabeth Butler, over whose remains is placed the following ancient inscription:—

Here lyeth Elizabeth, daughter, of Thomas, erle of Ormond, and of Robe his wyf, somtyme wyf to the Lord Mountioye, whiche Elizabeth deceased the xi. day of February the yere of our Lord M cccc x. on whose soule Ihu have mercy men.†

Near the door of the chancel, on the south side, and affixed to the wall, was formerly a brass plate with an inscription, commemorating the interment of a person of the name of William Walker, who is supposed to have been the executioner of King Charles I. but with better reason to have been the translator of the *Vindicia contra Tyrannos*. The evidence of this imputation rests on no better authority than a tradition prevailing in the village of Darnall, where Mr. Walker resided, and on the fact, that a person of the name of Walker actually struck the blow by which the unfortunate Monarch was decapitated. Between the Shrewsbury Chapel and the Vestry is the communion table, with a painting of the Last Supper, by Nathaniel Tucker. The old capacious stone font, prepared to receive the whole body of

the infant, (according to the ancient practice of the English Church) which stood near the west door, has long since disappeared, and given place to the present baptismal marble basin, which stands near the communion table. The present vicar of Sheffield is the Rev. Thomas Sutton, A. M.; the three assistant ministers are, the Rev. Matthew Preston, A. M. the Rev. Edward Goodwin, A. M. and the Rev. William Humphrey, A. M. The living is estimated at from 5 to £600 a year. The stipends of the assistant ministers, which amount to about £240 a year each, are paid out of the church property, by the church burgesses. The other churches in Sheffield are, St. Paul's church, a handsome Grecian structure, built in 1720; it is situated in Norfolk street; and the present minister is the Rev. Thomas Cotterill, A. M.; the nomination is in the vicar. St. James's church, situated in the Vicar's croft, erected in the year 1788, the Rev. Thos. Best, A. M. minister; the appointment of the Clergymen to this church is in the vicar of Sheffield for the time being. There is also a Chapel at the Duke of Norfolk's Hospital, which was opened in the year 1777, and is calculated to contain a large congregation. Divine service is daily celebrated in this chapel by a minister of the Established Church, and a sermon is preached every Sunday; the Rev. William Downs is Curate, and Governor, and the Rev. Thomas Robinson officiating Curate.

The Dissenting Places of Worship in Sheffield, are more numerous than the Churches, and a large proportion of the inhabitants are Dissenters. Within that town are fifteen edifices, which were originally erected, and are still used by them as places of worship. They are

Of these Meeting-houses, only the two first have stood their century, all the others have been erected within the last forty or fifty years. The preponderance of Dissenters in Sheffield may be traced back to the time of the persecutions, in the reign of the second Charles, when the Vicar of Sheffield and his three Assistants were all ejected, along with 3000 other pious Clergymen, because they would not sacrifice their conscience to their interest, by signing the articles of uniformity. The necessary consequence of these rigorous measures was to create Dis-

senters, and in Sheffield, St. Bartholomew's day, so renowned in the annals of persecution, beheld the Churches deserted, and the Meeting-houses crowded with their congregations—another proof, if another was wanting, that "the blood of the saints is the seed of the church." At present the Churches and Chapels in Sheffield are in general well attended, and the following digest will show to strangers and residents, at what hours their respective services commence, both on the Sabbath and other days:—

There is a Monthly Missionary Prayer Meeting held at the Independent Calvinist Chapels alternately, on Monday evening, seven o'clock.

Sheffield, though never what could strictly be called an opulent town, has for many years abounded in Public Charities. That of the greatest antiquity is St. LEONARD'S HOSPITAL, founded by William de

Lovetot, about the time of Henry II. This establishment stood on a little eminence on the east side of the town, still called the Spital-hill, and continued to afford its relief to the poor of Sheffield, till Henry VIII. with

indiscriminate fury, swept away so many institutions of our forefathers, the beneficial along with the useless and pernicious. THE OLD ALMS HOUSES, at the foot of Lady bridge, which it is supposed was formerly the chapel of the blessed lady. When this hospital existed, the lords of the manor were accustomed to allow twenty shillings a year to each of the inmates, but they were taken down when the bridge was improved, about the year 1767. THE TOWN TRUST, though not strictly a public charity, does in some degree partake of the nature of such an institution. The property of this body, which is now of the value of about twelve hundred pounds a year, consists in houses, lands, shares in the river Don navigation, and savings out of the annual income. Their original patent of incorporation is dated as far back as the year 1554, and their property then consisted of certain lands, which had been given by various benefactors at different periods for public uses. By the original patent the burgesses and inhabitants, *burgesses et inhabitantes* of the town and parish of Sheffield are declared to be one body politic and corporate, by the name of "*Twelve Capital Burgesses, and commonalty of the town and parish of Sheffield,*" with power to acquire lands, plead, be impleaded, &c. with power to fill vacancies which may occur by death or removal. To this body the lands &c. are assigned, to repair the parish church, bridges and common ways, and to assist the poor, &c. In later times some doubts arose respecting the powers of the twelve capital burgesses, and an appeal was made to the Court of Chancery, from whence issued a decree on the 8th of September, 1681, which adjudged the premises to thirteen inhabitants of Sheffield named, and for the better performance of the trust it was further decreed, that whenever any three or more of the trustees should be dead, the vacancies should be filled up by the greater part of the inhabitants within the town of Sheffield, so that the trustees should never be fewer than ten, for above six months. This decree is the authority under which the town-burgesses, or town regents, or town-collector and his assistants, as they are sometimes called, now hold and administer the property. A considerable discretionary power is given to the trustees, by a clause in their charter, comprehended in the terms, "any other charitable and publique uses," and they are accustomed to subscribe liberally to the public charities. From this fund the trustees defray the expense of lighting the public streets, the charge of which forms no part of the parochial imposts sustained by the well-taxed community of Sheffield. The

right of the inhabitants at large to elect the persons by whom the vacancies in the trust were to be supplied, like all popular rights when not vigilantly maintained, was in danger of being lost. For many years there was no public election, but the attention of the inhabitants having been drawn to this point, by the publication of the decree, the vacancies in the year 1818, were filled by the popular suffrage. The following is a list of the present trustees:—

On the eastern bank of the Sheaf, on a plot of ground, which was formerly a part of an orchard belonging to the Castle, stands an excellent institution, called, THE HOSPITAL OF GILBERT, EARL OF SHREWSBURY, built about the year 1666. This hospital, which consists of two quadrangles, was erected and settled by Henry Earl of Norwich, Earl Marshal of England, in pursuance of the last will and testament of his great grand father, Gilbert Earl of Shrewsbury, and was first inhabited in 1673. At first the number of inmates amounted to ten men and ten women; but by successive enlargements it has been made to contain seventeen men and the same number of women, and their income, which was originally two shillings and sixpence per week each, is now ten shillings a week to each of the men, and eight shillings a week to each of the women, with coals, and certain articles of dress. In the year 1770, Edward Duke of Norfolk endowed the hospital with £1000, which was principally expended in erecting a larger and more commodious chapel, called the Duke of Norfolk's chapel. The governor of the hospital who officiates at the chapel, was endowed with the income of £300. and a share of an estate at Neepsend, by Mr. William Birley, of London, in 1715. On the north side of the town is a hospital, erected in the year 1703, by THOMAS HOLLIS, a merchant of London, a native of Rotherham, and the founder of the Dissenters' Free School at that place. This excellent man did not distribute his benevolence in the questionable shape of posthumous donations, but while he lived he was the friend of the aged and the indigent. In this hospital sixteen poor cutlers' widows have each a



separate habitation, and now receive a guinea every three weeks, for their maintenance. There is also, on the same foundation, a school, at which about 40 children are taught to read, and in the summer months a master is employed to teach them to write also. Mr. Robert Rawson is the governor of the hospital. The FREE GRAMMAR SCHOOL at Sheffield is of considerable antiquity, Mr. Thomas Smith, of Crowland, in Lincolnshire, an attorney at law, supposed to have been born at Sheffield, may be regarded as its founder; he died in the year 1603, and bequeathed £30, a year, "so long as the world should endure," for the finding of two sufficiently learned men to teach and bring up "the young children of Sheffield in godliness and learning:" and several other benefactions have since been added. The present school was erected in 1648, in Townhead-street. The head master is the Rev. William White, and the second master is the Rev. Geo. Harrison. The number of scholars is 70. The Madras system of teaching has been adopted here, and the whole plan of instruction has a near resemblance to that which has for several years been established at the Charter House School, in London. The salary of the head master is stated in Carlisle's description of endowed Grammar Schools, at £80 per annum.

There are also in Sheffield a Boys' CHARITY SCHOOL, near the corner of the Parish Church yard, where 60 boys are clothed, maintained, and educated. This school was built by subscription, and supported by voluntary contributions; it has also received many benefactions, the principal of which are a bequest of £500. from Mrs. Elizabeth Parkin, in 1766, and another of £3000. 3 per cents. from Mr. Thomas Hanby, of which the school began to receive the benefit in 1797. The present Master is Mr. Thos. Swain. The FREE WRITING SCHOOL and BIRLEY'S CHARITY is another public school, under the patronage of the church, and the town burgesses, in which children are taught writing and accounts. This school was built in 1791, and liberally endowed by Mr. William Birley. The GIRLS' CHURCH SCHOOL stands at the North-east corner of the Parish Church yard, and here sixty girls are educated, maintained, and clothed, trained to be domestic servants, out of the contributions of the benevolent; *mistress*, Elizabeth Wild, *sen. assistant*, Elizabeth Wild, *jun.* BARLOW'S CHARITY consists of £6. a year, and the produce of certain property bequeathed by Francis Barlow, of Sheffield, gent. in 1688, to be paid every

Christmas, to the overseers of the poor of Sheffield, to be distributed to the most needy decayed tradesmen of that place. SITWELL'S CHARITY.—Francis Sitwell, of Sheffield, attorney, in 1740, gave £400, to the Company of Cutlers, which he directed should be lent to poor cutlers in sums of £5. each, without interest, for six months, with a proviso, that the persons borrowing the money should make a deposit of goods exceeding £5. in value, but, notwithstanding the lawyer's precaution, his money is now lost, and his benevolent intentions defeated. PARKIN'S CHARITY.—Besides the £500, to the Boys' Charity School, that benevolent lady bequeathed another sum of £500, to the poor of Sheffield, the interest whereof is distributed yearly by the Vicar, his three assistants, and the churchwardens. KIRKBY'S CHARITY consists of the interest of £400, which is paid by certain trustees to two poor widows.

The gigantic Free Schools of modern times have almost swallowed up those of more ancient establishment. These consist in Sheffield, as in other large towns, of the Royal Lancasterian Boys' and Girls' Schools; the National School; and the various Sunday Schools. The Lancasterian school for boys was instituted in 1809, and is situated in Gibraltar-street; Mr. George Tucker is master, and Mr. Samuel Cooper assistant. The number of boys is 820, and the whole expense of the establishment is supported by voluntary contributions. The Lancasterian school for girls is also situated in Gibraltar street, and was instituted in 1815. The number of scholars in this school is 400; and there is a branch school in Allen street, consisting of 200 girls. Like the boys' school, both the parent stock, and the branch, its descendant, have to depend for support upon voluntary contributions. Mrs. Elizabeth Mather is the mistress of the Gibraltar school, and Mrs. Hannah Barber of that in Allen street. The NATIONAL DISTRICT SCHOOL is situated in Carrer street, it is conducted on the Madras or Dr. Bell's system, and contains eleven hundred scholars, boys and girls, who are instructed in reading, writing, arithmetic, &c. at the very small charge of sixpence per quarter. The Rev. Henry Ellershaw is the master, and Mrs. Ann Somersett the mistress. The following lists will serve to convey to the mind of the reader some idea of the attention which is paid in Sheffield to the education of the rising generation.

In the enumeration of the public charities of Sheffield, we have purposely withheld till the last the mention of that noble institution the GENERAL INFIRMARY, which crowns them all, and without which all the others would have been incomplete. On Monday the 23d day of April, 1792, the inhabitants of Sheffield, on an anonymous invitation, assembled at the Town Hall, to take into consideration the propriety of erecting a General Infirmary at that place, and with great propriety they placed their venerable and benevolent vicar, the Rev. James Wilkinson, in the chair. On this occasion, Mrs. Fell, of New Hall, commissioned Mr. Swallow to subscribe, in her name, £1000.; the generous flame soon spread. In a short time the contributions amounted to £15,000. to which was subsequently added the sum of £2500. With these funds the work was speedily commenced. On Wednesday the 4th of September, 1793, the first stone was laid, and on the 4th of October in the following year, the house was opened for the reception of patients. Secured from the annoyance of manufactures, and the near approach of other buildings, by the purchase of thirty-one acres of the land which surrounds it, this handsome stone edifice stands a conspicuous object from two of the principal approaches to the town. Its doors are open to all, without regard to residence, on the recommendation of a subscriber, and in cases of accidents no recommendation is necessary. The total number of in and out-patients admitted to the benefit of this institution since its commencement, to Midsummer 1821, is 28,127. The total number of patients who received its benefits from Midsummer, 1820, to Midsummer, 1821, was 823 in-patients, and 2171 out-patients. In the year 1802, a Jennerian establishment was first connected with this institution, and from that time to Midsummer in the year 1821—19,896 persons have received the benefit of the vaccine inoculation here, not one of which has died in consequence of the disease! Nearly the whole of the £17,500 originally subscribed for the Infirmary was expended in the erection of the building and the purchase of the land. The current expenses daily arising are therefore defrayed out of annual subscriptions, benefactions and legacies. In the list of benefactors two deserve particular notice; the first is by a gentleman who desires his name may not be known, by Messrs. Thomas Coutts and Co. bankers, London £6337. 2s. 10d. the same bountiful hand presenting at the same time two sums of the like amount (being the proceeds of £30,000. three per cents) to the Infirmaries of Nottingham and

Derby; the second benefaction deserving this particular notice, was from the late Rev. John Lambert, of Chapel-town, who by will appointed the three Infirmaries of Leeds, Hull and Sheffield, residuary legatees in equal shares of his personal estates, by which bequest each of those institutions became entitled to, and in 1819 received the sum of 3500l.

The other public buildings in Sheffield are the Town Hall, in the Hay-market, erected in the year 1806, at which time the old Town Hall at the south corner of the parish church yard, which had stood for 106 years, was taken down. The new hall is very commodious, and in it are held the meetings of the commissioners, the sessions of the justices of the peace, and town's meetings on public occasions. The places of amusement are the Theatre and the Assembly Room, which constitute an elegant building in Norfolk Street, erected in the year 1762, and made capable of accommodating that part of the population which choose to partake of these entertainments. The military barracks stand at the north-east corner of the town on the banks of the Don, and are happily now very slenderly tenanted.

The population of Sheffield had much out-grown the conveniences of many of its places of public resort. The market place, which was sufficient for two thousand inhabitants, was ill calculated to afford accommodation to ten times that number, and many of the thoroughfares which led to it were crowded and choked up with the carriages and commodities which every Tuesday and Saturday pressed into the town. To obviate these inconveniences a petition from the principal inhabitants was presented to the Earl of Surrey, the owner of the market, about the year 1783, praying that measures might be taken for the improvement of the market place and the necessary passages; with this petition the Earl was pleased to comply, and under his auspices an act was obtained in the year 1784, by which he was empowered to purchase various private interests in that part of the town where the market was then and is now held, to take down the ancient walls and other buildings pertaining to the market, and to remove the old slaughter houses which were then situated in the centre of the town, close to the shambles. He was also empowered to form another market place on the same site and to widen the advances to the same. The whole of these improvements, for which the town is greatly indebted to Vincent Eyre, Esq. the agent of the Earl of Surrey, on account of his cordial and active co-operation, were conducted under the inspection of a number of the principal inhabitants who were appointed in the act commissioners for the purpose.—

The Earl was further empowered to remove the cattle market, from the Bull stake (now called the Hay-market) to some more convenient situation. All the purchases under the powers contained in this act were to be completed in three years, and the improvements were prosecuted with so much vigour and success that the new Shambles were opened on the 31st of August, 1786. A handsome and exceedingly convenient market place was obtained, together with a readier communication between the upper and the lower parts of the town through New Market Street, and the streets on each side of the Shambles; a convenient place was set apart for the beast market in the Wicker, and the slaughter houses, long the crying nuisance of Sheffield, were placed in the best possible situation, close to the waters of the Don.

A spirit of improvement has for many years been in active exercise in the town of Sheffield. A very large proportion of the freehold property of the town was vested in the Howard family, and had descended under settlements of entail from its ancient lords to that noble house. This circumstance was found to operate considerably to the disadvantage of the town, which, from the extent of its manufactures and commerce, called for a more general diffusion of real property. The Duke of Norfolk was not insensible to this circumstance, nor disinclined to take the measures necessary to cherish that spirit of improvement which on every hand presented itself. An act was accordingly procured in the year 1802, on the presentation of the Duke and his heirs "for vesting several messuages and hereditaments in Sheffield, and divers detached parts of the settled estates of the Howard family in trustees upon trust to sell and lay out the money in the purchase of more convenient estates or otherwise." This was followed by three other acts having the same object in view. Extensive sales have been made under the provisions of these acts with distinguished liberality towards the tenants and occupiers of the lands and houses, and the consequence has been a great accession to the list of freeholders in the town and parish of Sheffield, every one of whom is thus bound by another tie to his country, and may be considered as a lord of the soil.

Sheffield and Ecclesall had long had their courts-baron; and in the 29th of Geo. II. an act was passed by which the proceedings in personal actions in these courts were regulated. This act having proved inefficient was repealed by another act passed on the 16th of June, 1808. By the provisions of which act commissioners are appointed for hearing and determining cases on which the property in question does not exceed Five

Pounds, and for administering summary justice between the parties. The benefit of the act is principally felt in the easy recovery of small debts, which could only be effected at great expense and risk in the superior courts of the country. Complaints have sometimes been made of the police of Sheffield; and it must be confessed that for many years the public streets of that town exhibited striking proofs of a want of some reformation. In the year 1818, an act was passed for the more effectual watching, cleansing and lighting the town, and an obvious improvement has arisen since the provisions of this act were carried into effect. At one time an intention prevailed of invigorating the police by the establishment of a stipendiary magistracy, but this proposal was very properly rejected by the good sense of the inhabitants, and rendered unnecessary by that sculous devotion to the public interest which distinguishes the gentlemen in the commission of the peace in that neighbourhood.

It had long been a matter of regret, not to say of reproach, to the town of Sheffield, that while from the extent of its manufactures, and the weighty nature of its fabrics, it stood peculiarly in need of the advantages of inland navigation, it was the only large manufacturing town in the county of York that had not a canal or navigable river at the door of its manufactories. We have already seen that in the year 1761, the river Don was made navigable to Tinsley, and the company of proprietors had subsequently made many important improvements in the navigation of that river. By an act obtained in the year 1788, the Don had been made to communicate with the Barnsley canal, and to join the Trent at Keadby, and thus to form an inland navigation to every part of the kingdom; but still the town of Sheffield was labouring under the inconvenience of having the wharf upon its own river at the distance of three miles. Many attempts had been made to procure the concurrence of all the parties interested in a plan for a projected canal from Sheffield to the wharf at Tinsley. The collision of conflicting interests had hitherto stood in the way of this grand commercial desideratum, but in the year 1815, private interests and personal prejudices gave place to the public good; the consent of the proprietors of the property being obtained, the money required for the purpose of effecting the work was easily raised; an application was made to parliament, and on the 7th of June in that year the Royal assent was given to an act incorporating the subscribers to the scheme by the name of "The Company of Proprietors of the Sheffield Canal," and power was given to them to make and maintain a navigable cut from the west part of

the castle orchards adjoining the town of Sheffield, to the navigable part of the river Don at Tinsley. On the passing of the act, the work was immediately commenced; early in the year 1819, the canal was completed; and on Monday the 23d of February, in that year, this direct water communication from Sheffield to the German Ocean, was opened with a degree of pomp and splendour suitable to the occasion.

It must not be inferred from these numerous and important improvements that Sheffield and its manufactures have enjoyed a state of uninterrupted prosperity. No place has suffered more from the vicissitudes of trade. The American war produced a state of considerable depression; and the town had only just recovered from the effects of that abortive effort to establish the principle of taxation without representation, when the wars of the French revolution came to plunge its inhabitants in still deeper distress. The frame of society throughout the world was disordered by this long and exhausting contest; and peace itself, when it returned, did not bring prosperity in its train. In order to force a market, the spirit of competition among the master manufacturers was carried to such an extent that they relinquished the fair profits of their trade; the consequence was an undue depression in the wages of the artisans, and the introduction of the pernicious practice of paying wages in goods instead of money. Many of the workmen in consequence became themselves pauper manufacturers and wholesale dealers in hardware, which they sold not for what the articles were worth, but for what they would fetch, not unfrequently at 30, 40, and even 50 per cent. below the regular prices. The glut of cutlery thus became excessive. The parish was burthened with a host of half-famished claimants, and the poor's rates were so heavy that many of the contributors to those rates reduced their establishments to the lowest possible standard, and took up their residence in neighbouring townships

where the parochial imposts were less oppressive. These evils, like most others in trade, carried in them their own remedy; in time the quantity of goods manufactured became better adjusted to the extent of the demand; the rate of wages was advanced, money was paid to the workmen instead of goods, and Sheffield seems now to be returning slowly, but we hope certainly, to a state of moderate prosperity.

Sheffield, never amongst the first, but usually amongst the most judicious to adopt any general improvement, waited to see how far that great discovery of modern times—light drawn from the gaseous principle emitted from coal, was applicable to enlightening streets and manufactories. When the experience of the metropolis and a number of the other cities and towns of the kingdom had proved its utility by the best of all tests, the test of experience, a capital of forty thousand pounds was raised in £25. shares in this place, and a company was established called "the Sheffield Gas Light Company," under the authority of an act of parliament. The great spring of all commercial speculation, derived from the prospect of liberal profits, stimulated the exertions of the proprietors; the works were commenced on a suitable site near the Sheaf bridge, and on the night of the 6th of October, 1819, the town was enlivened by a light as much superior to that shed by oil or tallow, as the light of the sun is to the less effulgent brightness of the moon.

The population of Sheffield has kept pace with its other improvements. The first regular and systematic return of the population of this country was made in the year 1801, since which time population acts have passed periodically, and the growing importance of Sheffield may be traced in these decennial returns:—In 1801, the population of the town was 31,314; in 1811, it amounted to 35,840; and by the return of 1821, it is swelled to 42,157. The following is the return for the whole parish:—

## SHERBURN

Is a small market town, in the parish of that name, in the wapentake of Barkston Ash, and in the liberty of St. Peter's; it is in the direct road from Tadcaster to Ferrybridge, from each of which it is about 6 miles distant. Sherburn was anciently a place of considerable importance, and King Athelstan had a palace here, which he bestowed, with a considerable part of the town, upon the Archbishop of York, but it was subsequently alienated by Archbishop Holgate, in exchange for certain lands at Cawood and Bishopthorp. The palace has now disappeared, except a few inequalities in the hall garth may be considered as remains, and the church, which is a handsome and spacious structure, dedicated to All Saints, was, it is said, erected out of its ruins. The living is a vicarage, valued in the King's books at £47. 17s. 11d. and belongs to the Prebendary of Fenton, in York Cathedral. The nave of the church exhibits a beautiful specimen of architecture, at once rare and magnificent. A detached chapel formerly stood near the south east corner of the churchyard, but it has long since fallen into decay, and in digging among the rubbish some years ago, a very rich and elegant cross was found. A Roman road runs from hence to Aberford, which is still very distinct. There are here a grammar school and hospital, founded in the year 1619, by Robert Huagate, Esq. counsellor, and endowed with £120. per annum, for the clothing and maintaining of the boys in the hospital, and £12. per annum to the master, payable out of the lands of the parish, belonging to Robert Oliver Gascoigne, Esq. of Parlington. A subsequent endowment was awarded to the master on a late inclosure, and £10. has been added, making the annual stipend £34. There are 8 boys upon the foundation, who are admitted by Mr. Gascoigne at the age of years, and superannuated at 15.—About 30 day scholars attend the school, who pay a small quarterage. The English language and arithmetic are taught here, in addition to the



classics. The present master is the Rev. T. Allen. This school has four exhibitions of £7. 10s. each, at St. John's College, Oxford, and it is one of the eight grammar schools in Yorkshire which are entitled to send candidates for Lady Elizabeth Hasting's exhibition to Queen's College, Oxford.

Sherburn was the scene of one of the most singular and important events in the civil wars between Charles I. and the Parliament. In the year 1645, the King, having constituted Secretary Lord Digby, Lieutenant-general of all his forces north of the Trent, his Lordship advanced by the route of Doncaster towards York. On his arrival at Sherburn, he stopped to refresh his troops, where information reached him that Colonel Copley, an officer in the service of Parliament, was advancing with a party of horse. Digby presently "summoned to horse," and marched with a party of his troops out of the town to meet the enemy, whom he fell upon and put to flight. Copley's discomfited followers fled through Sherburn *pell mell*, when that part of the royal army which had not been engaged in the fight, supposing that the fugitives were their comrades, and that they had suffered a defeat, mounted their horses and dispersed in every direction. At this critical moment, a troop of the parliamentary forces which had remained upon the field unbroken, fell upon Lord Digby and those around him, and drove them to Skipton Castle. By this fatal catastrophe, Digby's army, which had raised high expectations, was broken up; his baggage, containing his cabinet papers, fell into the hands of the enemy, to the high gratification of the parliamentary party; and Richard Hutton, the High Sheriff of the County of York, who had espoused the royal cause, was left dead upon the field.

The farmers in the neighbourhood of Sherburn are largely concerned in the cultivation of flax, for which the land is well adapted, and the town and its vicinity are farmed for fine orchards. *Winesours*, a species of plum, of peculiarly fine flavour as a preserve, are grown at Sherburn in great perfection. The winesour tree is raised from suckers; it is a hardy plant, of a large production, and grows upon any soil; but limestone is its element, and on other soils the fruit soon degenerates. Friday is the market day.

The population, according to the census of 1821, amounts to 1144. Sherburn derives its name from the pure and clear, though diminutive stream, by which it is watered and refreshed.

## SKIPTON

Is an ancient market town, situated on a branch of the river Aire, and on the banks of the Leeds and Liverpool canal; it is in the parish to which it gives name, in the wapentake of Staincliffe, and the liberty of Clifford's Fee, 10 miles NW. of Keighley, 15 W. of Otley, 15 SE. of Settle, and 218 NW. of London. The town is entirely built of stone, and its principal streets are disposed in the form of the letter Y. In domesday book and all the early charters, it is called Sciptone, Sceptone, or Sceptatone, evidently from the Saxon *Scop*— a Sheep; and the name was acquired from the vast tracts of sheep-walks which anciently laid around it.\* Skipton is a place renowned in history; and its castle with the noble families inhabiting it, have shed over Craven, of which it may be considered the capital, the venerable rust of antiquity. At the time of the Norman conquest Skipton formed a part of the possessions of Earl Edwin, one of the Saxon Barons; it was afterwards granted to Robert de Romillé, one of the followers of the Conqueror, who built Skipton castle, as the seat of his Barony, about the end of the reign of William the Conqueror. The erection of this baronial residence elevated Skipton from a village to a town, but it never had a municipal government, nor was it ever represented in parliament. Subsequently the barony of Skipton came by marriage into the Albemarle family, but by the artifices of a bold and officious priest,\* it

was obtained from its rightful owner and vested in the crown. Edward II. bestowed this valuable inheritance on his ill-fated favourite Peirs de Gaveston, who became so obnoxious, by his upstart pride and insolence, to the ancient barons, that they rose in rebellion against his royal master, captured the favourite in the castle of Scarborough, and struck off his head in the castle of Dedington. The next alienation transferred it in the year 1311, to a family, who, with the exception of a single attainder, have held it five hundred years, during the larger part of which time they resided at Skipton castle in great wealth and honour. The grant was made to Robert Lord Clifford, by Edward II. in the 4th year of his reign, at which time the annual rent of arable land in Craven was ten-pence, and pasture land four-pence an acre. At that period matrimony was subject to a singular toll in the forest of Skipton, and it was ordained "that ev'ry bryde cumyng that waye shude eyther gyve her leste shoo or iiii. lvd. to the forester of Crookryse, by way of custome or gaytloys."† Thomas Lord Clifford next succeeded to the barony of Skipton, and he had a daughter, Elizabeth, who was married, as Dodsworth says, "at six yeares olde, being carried to the chapel in Skipton castell, in the armes of John Garthe, to Robert son of Sir William Plumpton; he dying, shee was, at xii yeares of age, mar'd to Wm. the bro. of Rob't, Sir Wm. Plumpton, promising that they shold not ligg together (*datur hæc sentia antiquetatis*) till she was xvi. yeares old, and at xviii. she was mother of Margaret Lady Rowcliffe." The Cliffords were amongst the first noble families in the kingdom who engaged in the memorable civil wars between the houses of York and Lancaster. They were zealous Lancasterians, and Thomas Lord Clifford fell in the first battle of St. Albans, fought on the 22d of May, 1454, when the Yorkists triumphed and left about 5000 of their enemies stretched upon the field. The events of this fatal day are supposed to have imparted a degree of ferocity to the character of John Lord Clifford, the son and successor of Lord Thomas. This young nobleman had been engaged in the civil wars, from the earliest manhood, and fought at the battle of Wakefield, on the 24th of December, 1460, when the red rose of

Lancaster, under the fostering hand of the heroine Margaret of Anjou, Queen of Henry VI. again bloomed forth. On that memorable day the Duke of York himself was killed, with 3000 of his followers, and his son, the Earl of Rutland, a youth of seventeen, being brought into the presence of Lord Clifford, the interesting young prince was murdered in cold blood by the savage hands of the vindictive peer!\* Nor was this his only barbarity, his revenge for the death of his father impelled him to other excesses, and Leyland says—"that for slaughter of men at Wakefield, he was called the boucher." His own untimely death followed the year after. On the approach of the last decisive battle, between the rival houses, his Lordship advanced to Ferrybridge with the flower of Craven under his command. After forcing the passage of the Aire, he marched towards Tadcaster; but stopping at a small village† between Towton and Scarth-ingwell, he took off his gorget, at which moment he was struck in the throat by a headless arrow, shot out of a bush, and immediately expired. The cause of the house of Lancaster survived "the boucher" of the Yorkists only one day.—At Deindingdale

"The candle died which gave King Henry light."

On the following day, the 29th of March, 1461, the decisive battle of Towton was fought; Edward triumphed, and the hopes of Henry were extinguished in the crimsoned streams of the Wharf. Four years after the accession of Edward IV. to the throne, John Lord Clifford was attainted, and the castle, manor and lordship of Skipton, were granted in tail-male to Sir William Stanley, Knight, and subsequently to the Duke of Gloucester. In the 1st year of the reign of Henry VII. the attainder of Lord John was reversed, together with those of all the other adherents of the house of Lancaster, and the estates of the family were restored to Lord Henry Clifford, his son, surnamed *The Shepherd*, in the year 1485. For five and twenty years the young lord had been immured amongst the fells of Cumberland, and his manners and education were those of a peasant. Conscious of his defects, and attached to solitude, he spent a large portion of the remainder of his days at

Barden, where he studied astronomy and alchemy. At the age of 60 he emerged from his retirement, and was appointed by the king to a command in the English army, at the battle of Flodden Field, where the king of Scotland and the flower of his nobility sank under the prowess of the English arms. Lord Henry Clifford, survived the battle of Flodden ten years, and died on the 23d of April, 1523, aged 70 years. He was succeeded by Henry his son, who was then thirty years of age, and had passed his youth, like our Henry V. among a band of dissolute followers as an outlaw, raising contributions to supply their extravagances from the religious houses and the peaceful husbandman. Young Clifford was a favourite of Henry VIII. and two years after his accession to the family inheritance he was created Earl of Cumberland. On that occasion his lordship made a journey to London, attended by three and thirty servants, and it appears from the "household booke" that the expenses of the journey from Skipton to London amounted to £vii. xvs. id. The great gallery in Skipton castle was built by this Earl, and the King, as a reward for his courage and loyalty in resisting, though not with complete success, Aske and his fanatical followers, *the Pilgrims of Grace*, conferred upon him a gift of the Priory of Bolton, with the lands thereto belonging in the parish of Skipton, together with the manors of Storithes, Heslewood, Embsey, &c. and the manor of Woodhouse, (part of Appletrewick) belonging to the dissolved Priory of Morton: to add to his good fortune, the whole Percy Fee, equivalent in extent to half Craven, became vested in the Cliffords in consequence of the Earl's marriage with Lady Margaret Percy.‡ This flood of good fortune did not prolong his life beyond the middle age; he was cut off prematurely on the 22d of April, 1542, aged 49 years. At his death an inquisition was taken to ascertain the value of his vast estates, which were found to amount only to £1119. 7s. 8d. per annum. Henry, his son, the second Earl of Cumberland, succeeded his father, and little more is recorded of him but that he died at Brougham castle, in

Westmoreland, and was buried at Skipton. George, the third Earl of Cumberland, was born at Brougham, on the 8th of August, 1558, and succeeded to the title and estates when he was eleven years and five months old. He married Lady Margaret Russell, third daughter of Francis, Duke of Bedford, by whom he had two sons who died young, and a daughter Lady Ann Clifford. The Earl was a great navigator; and bore a considerable part in the defeat of the Spanish Armada. He died in the meridian of life "of a bloody flux, caused, as was supposed by the wounds and distempers he received formerly in his sea voyages. He died penitently, willingly, and christianly." In the celebrated family picture in Skipton castle, the Earl is one of the principal figures, and in the inscription prefixed to that picture, drawn up by his daughter, assisted, according to tradition, by Sir Matthew Hale, the great law luminary, it is said, that "This Earl George was a man of many natural perfections, of great wit and judgment, of strong body, and full of agility, of a noble mind, and not subject to pride or arrogance, a man generally beloved in this kingdome." Dr. Whitaker says, all this is true as regarded his public character, but "he was an indifferent and unfaithful husband, and a negligent and thoughtless parent; he set out with a larger estate than any of his ancestors, and in little more than twenty years he made it one of the least. Fortunately for his family, a constitution, originally vigorous, gave way at 47 to hardships, anxiety, wounds, and probably licentiousness." Lady Ann inherited the principal estates, but the titles, on the death of Earl George, devolved upon Sir Thomas Clifford. Lady Ann first married Richard Sackville, Earl of Dorset, and after his death the Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery, whom she also survived. On the death of the last of the Earls of Cumberland without issue, which took place in the year 1643, all the lands belonging to the family reverted to the Countess of Pembroke. The countess was an ornament to her age and country, and she died the 22d of March, 1675, aged 87 years. The Lady Margaret Sackville, her first daughter and co-heir by Richard, Earl of Dorset, married John Tufton, Earl of Thanet, on the 21st of April, 1629, and the manor and castle of Skipton descended, on the death of the

Countess of Pembroke, to that noble family. John, the second Earl, died in the year 1664, and was succeeded by Nicholas, the third Earl, who dying without issue, November 24, 1679, was succeeded in the title and estates by Sir John Tufton, his brother, who survived him little more than five months, and died at Skipton castle. His successor was Richard, his younger brother, who died unmarried, March 8, 1683, leaving his honours and estates to his brother Thomas, the 6th Earl, who after having held the honour of Skipton longer, and applied the revenues better than any of his ancestors, with the exception of Lady Ann Pembroke, died July 29, 1729. Earl Thomas was succeeded by Sackville Tufton, his youngest brother, who died December 1, 1753, leaving Sackville, his son, who died April 10, 1786, and was succeeded by Sackville, the ninth Earl of Thanet, who is the present Lord of the honour and castle of Skipton, and the hereditary High Sheriff of the County of Westmoreland.

Skipton castle, the ancient residence of this long line of nobility, is at a very short distance from the church eastward. Of the castle, as built at the period of the conquest, little remains, except the western door-way to the inner castle, consisting of a treble semi-circular arch, supported upon square piers. The most ancient part of the castle now remaining consists of seven round towers, partly in the sides, and partly in the angles of the building, connected by rectilinear apartments, which form an irregular quadrangular court within. The walls are from nine to twelve feet thick; this part was the work of Robert de Clifford, in the early part of the reign of Edward II. The eastern part, a single range of building, at least sixty yards long, terminated by an octagon tower, is known to have been built by the first Earl of Cumberland. The present entrance, concealing the original Norman door-way, was added by Lady Pembroke, and it is remarkable, that this comparatively modern part of the castle is the only part which threatens to fall, as the old founders of imperishable stone and cement, which last, even hardens with time, contain in themselves no more principle of decay than the rock on which this edifice is erected. Within, however, all is desolation and ruin. In the second great rounder from the entrance is the muniment room of the

Cliffords, in which the treasures and the writings were anciently kept. The apartments, formed about sixty years since, out of the gallery, contain several portraits, in a perishing state, particularly the great historical family picture, painted and inscribed under the direction of the Countess of Pembroke—a head of Sir Ingram Clifford—another, called Fair Rosamond, intended for Lady Margaret Percy—and a half length picture, in a very decayed state, lately discovered, and meant, as Dr. Whitaker,\* (the learned and interesting historian of Craven, from whom we principally quote) conjectures, for Lady Eleanor Brandon. Skipton castle, from its importance, and the military character of the families to which it successively belonged, has undergone several sieges, but, except it be the Munitiuncula of Hexham, destroyed by the Scots, in the reign of Stephen, of which there is considerable doubt, it never suffered any material injury by belligerent operations, till the time of the civil wars, between Charles I. and the parliament. At that time it sustained a siege, or blockade of three years, against the generals of the parliamentary army, Lambert, Poyntz, and Rossiter; the Earl of Cumberland, owner of the castle, being then the Lord Lieutenant of the West Riding, and Sir John Mallow, of Studley, an old and faithful loyalist, the governor. After the surrender of the castle, which fell on the 22d of December, 1645, and the success of the republican cause, parliament issued an order, directing that Skipton castle should be dismantled and demolished. This order was partially carried into effect in 1649, but the Countess of Pembroke, the great restorer of ruined edifices, repaired and again rendered it habitable, though not perhaps tenable as a fortress for which it was never, owing to its exposed situation, from the neighbouring heights, very well adapted. Over the modern entrance to the castle, the widow of Dorset and of Pembroke ordered an inscription to be placed, intimating that this castle was repaired by her order, in the years 1657-8, after it had been reduced to ruins by order of the parliament. Since

that time, and from the year 1666 to 1818, this ancient structure has undergone several other repairs, and it is now a comfortable and still stately residence; here and at Appleby castle their noble owner who generally resides at Hothfield Park, in Kent, spends a few weeks every year.

The parish church at Skipton was probably founded at the same time as the castle, by Robert de Romillé, but no part of the original structure remains, except four stone seats, with pointed arches and cylindrical columns, in the south wall of the nave, may be referred to the period of the eleventh century. The present church is a spacious and substantial building, though evidently built at very different periods. Dr. Whitaker conjectures, that the original church consisted of one, or at most of two aisles, and that the whole choir of three aisles has been added to the original building eastward. This latter work he refers to the time of Richard III. who, when Duke of Gloucester, occasionally resided at Skipton castle. The roof, which is flat, and extremely handsome, cannot be older than Henry VIII. At the East end are the arms of the priory of Bolton. Beneath the altar, unusually elevated on that account, is the vault of the Cliffords, which was the place of their interment, from the dissolution of Bolton priory to the death of the last Earl of Cumberland. Over these relics of departed greatness, there is a gorgeous display of the pomp of heraldry, the pride of genealogy, and the ostentation of noble alliances, of which the Cliffords had to boast as much, perhaps, as any family in the kingdom. First, and immediately over his remains, is a grey marble tomb of Henry the first Earl, and Margaret Percy his wife. On the slab are grooves for their figures; but if ever they were placed there, they have been removed, and the brasses with the epitaphs were stolen away in the civil wars. At the head of this monument is a small altar tomb, to the memory of Francis, Lord Clifford, the infant son of George Clifford, third Earl of Cumberland. On the south side of the communion table is a stately tomb of black marble, inclosed with iron rails, and erected by the Countess of Pembroke, to the memory of her father, George Clifford, third Earl of Cumberland. The last epitaph belonging to this noble family is admired for its brev-

vity, simplicity, and pathos, and is expressed thus:—

IMMENSUS DOLORIS MONUMENTUM  
 AUGUSTUM  
 HENRICUS PATER DEPLET  
 FRANCISCUM,  
 CAROLUM,  
 HENRICUM,  
 A. D. MDCXXXII.

These are the sons of the last Earl, all of whom died in their infancy.

The town of Skipton has long enjoyed the benefit of a well endowed Free Grammar School, which was founded on the 1st of September, 1548, by William Ermysted, Clerk, Canon Residentiary of St. Paul's, London, who having long been minded to found a school here, for instructing boys in grammar, granted to Sir Ingham Clyford, Knt. William Tankard, Stephen Tempest, Esqrs. and others, certain messuages, lands, &c. at Addingham, Skipton, and Eastby, &c. for the endowment of a school for the instruction of boys, as well in the first rudiments as in all the art of grammar; directing that, to such school there should be one master, and that he should be a chaplain or priest. The whole rental of the estate which then amounted only to £9. 15s. 4d. is now about £600. per annum.† Boys are admitted, free of expense, indifferently throughout the parish. The English grammar by Ash, Louth, and Murray, is taught; and the Latin, Greek, and Hebrew grammars. The master is also required to explain to the scholars *Virgil*, *Terence*, and *Ovid*, and the other Latin poets, and to teach them to compose epistles, orations, and verses. William Petyt, Esq. in 1707, gave £200 for the support of two poor scholars from this school, at Christ's College, Cambridge. And his brother, Silvester Petyt, Esq. formerly of Staple Inn, by his will left £24,048 Old South Sea Annuities, and a library, at Skipton,† the gross annual sum of which fund, in 1815, amounted to £721. 9s. 2d. —The objects of which donations are persons, wherever resident, standing in need of immediate relief, after paying £20. a year to Christ College, Cambridge, small salaries to a school master and librarian at Skipton, and put-

ting out annually about fourteen poor children apprentices in the county of York, and for buying books for the use of the school. The appointment of a master for the grammar school is vested in the Vicar and Churchwardens, and the present master is the Rev. Thomas Gartham.

There formerly stood at the entrance to the town of Skipton, from Broughton, an ancient mansion, the residence of the Lamberts, called Winterwell Hall, probably from a spring on the premises, which was never frozen in winter, but the hall had almost disappeared before the Leeds and Liverpool Canal was projected, and the well itself was swallowed up in that great public work.

Skipton is a place of considerable trade and business, and by its markets and fairs thrives as a connecting link between the two populous counties of York and Lancaster. The market is on the Saturday, and great quantities of corn are brought eastward, chiefly from Knaresbro', and dispersed from hence into different parts of Craven, and into the north eastern parts of Lancashire. Formerly scarcely a cart was to be seen in Skipton market, but now there are not fewer than 200 attend weekly. This is partly owing to the great quantities of corn produced by the inclosure of Knaresbro' Forest. Like Wakefield and Rotherham, Skipton is a great mart for cattle and sheep, and a vast number of purchasers from Manchester, Preston, Blackburn, Bolton, and other parts of Lancashire, as well as from the manufacturing districts of Yorkshire are seen here, at the fortnight fairs, which are held every other Tuesday throughout the year.—The Leeds and Liverpool Canal, which skirts the town of Skipton on the south west side, affords great facility to trade, and connects it with both the Eastern and Western sea. Some manufactures are carried on in the town, but they are not to any great extent; the all-pervading cotton trade has for some years had a footing here, and a considerable number of webs are produced in the course of the year, in this town and neighbourhood. The only public buildings in Skipton, with the exception of those already mentioned, are the Town-hall, in which the general quarter sessions for the peace for the West-Riding are held, once in the year; and the National Schools, built by subscription in 1814 and 1816, where 127 boys and 74 girls receive instruc-

tion daily, according to Dr. Bell's system of education. The population of Skipton has increased considerably within the last few years; in 1811 it amounted to 2,868, but by the census of 1821 it is swelled to 3411. The vale of Skipton is one of the finest and most fertile in England. It contains little tillage, but displays the most luxuriant meadows and pastures that are any where to be seen; the environs, particularly in the neighbourhood of Kildwick and Cross Hills, are greatly admired by tourists, and, in the figurative language of the poets, this may be called a terrestrial paradise.

## SNAITH

Is a small market town, in the parish of that name, in the wapentake of Osgoldcross, and in the liberty of the honour of Pontefract, 8 miles SE. of Selby, 9 miles SW. of Howden, and 174 miles from London. The town stands on a gentle declivity, on the southern bank of the river Aire, five miles from its confluence with the Ouse, before the united rivers take the name of the Humber. The church is an ancient Gothic structure, dedicated to St. Lawrence, and is the burying-place of the ancient and noble family of Lord Viscount Downe, who has a seat at Cowick, a village about half a mile south east of Snaith.— There was formerly a priory here, the advances to which were some years ago visible from the church, but they are now totally demolished. Flax is much cultivated in this neighbourhood, and the Aire affords it a ready conveyance to the Leeds market. At the west end of the town stands an old hall, formerly the residence of the Yarboroughs. The market is on the Thursday; and the population of the town, according to the returns of 1821, amounts to 834.

## TADCASTER,

The Calcaria of the Romans, is situated partly in the wapentake of Barkston Ash, in the west riding, and partly in the Ainsty of York, the middle of the bridge dividing the two jurisdictions; it is 9 miles from York, on the high road to London, 14 from Leeds, and 185 from London. The town is clean and well-built, and the streets are disposed in the form of a cross, by the roads to York, Ferry-bridge, and Leeds. It has a good market on the Wednesday, and being the great thoroughfare from York to the South, and to the West, it generally exhibits a lively and bustling scene.—Many ancient coins have been found in this place, and it was considered by the Romans as one of the outposts of their chief military station, which was the city of York. On the south bank of the river there was formerly a castle, from the materials of which the present bridge over the Wharf, which is one of the finest in the county, was built at the beginning of the last century, and considerably enlarged about 30 years ago. The church, which is a vicarage, dedicated to St. Mary, and valued in the King's books at £8. 4s. 9d. stands upon part of the site of the ancient castle; it formerly belonged to the abbey of Salley, in Craven, but is now in the gift of the Earl of Egremont. Besides the church there are in this town places of worship for the Dissenters and the Methodists. Tadcaster has always been regarded as an important military station, and in the civil wars of England, this town and its

neighbourhood have been the scenes of great military operations.—Within two miles of Tadcaster, at the village of Towton, the Pharsalia, as it has been called, of England, the great battle was fought between the houses of York and Lancaster, which displaced Henry VI. and elevated Edward IV. to the throne of these realms.—Here the folly of the nation in those times of darkness and ignorance was fully exhibited, and upwards of 36,000 Englishmen sacrificed their lives in deciding the question, whether a juvenile tyrant or an imbecile prince should be their master. The people took different symbols of party, the partizans of the house of Lancaster chose the red rose as their mark of distinction, and those of York the white rose. The battle of Towton was fought on Palm Sunday, the 29th of March, 1461.—Edward IV. with his General, the Earl of Warwick, brought 40,000 chosen troops to the field, and Margaret of Anjou assembled an army of 60,000, under the Duke of Somerset. While the Yorkists were advancing to the charge, there happened a great fall of snow, which driving full in the faces of their enemies, blinded them; this advantage was improved by a stratagem of Lord Falconberg's. That nobleman, who led the van in the army of Edward, ordered a body of infantry to advance before the line, and after having sent a volley of flight-arrows amongst the enemy, immediately retired. The Lancasterians, imagining that they had got within reach of the opposite army, discharged all their arrows, which fell short of the Yorkists. After their quivers were emptied, Edward advanced his line, and did execution with impunity on the dismayed Lancasterians. The bow, however, was soon laid aside, and the sword decided the combat, which ended with the day in a total victory on the side of the Yorkists. Edward had issued orders before the battle to give no quarter.—The routed army was pursued with a dreadful slaughter. The flying troops shaped their course for Tadcaster bridge, but despairing of reaching it, because they were so hotly pressed, they turned aside towards the place where the Cock, a small rivulet, runs into the Wharf. This was done with so much hurry and disorder, that the bed of the rivulet was soon filled with human bodies, which served as a bridge for the pursued and pursuers to pass over. The slaughter at this point

was tremendous; 36,776 men fell in the battle and retreat; and the waters of the Wharf were crimsoned with the blood of the victims:}

- “ England had long been mad, and scarr'd herself;  
 “ The brother blindly shed the brother's blood,  
 “ The father rashly slaughtered his own son,  
 “ The son, compell'd, was butcher to the sire;  
 “ All this divided York and Lancaster,  
 “ Divided in their dire division.”

Henry and Margaret, who had remained at York during the battle, on hearing of its disastrous result, retired to Scotland, and afterwards quitted the kingdom, while Edward, after visiting York, returned to London, and was crowned on the 29th of July following.

In later times, when Charles I. and the parliament contended for authority, a battle contested with equal obstinacy, but with much less bloodshed, was fought at Tadcaster, between the Earl of Newcastle and Sir Thomas Fairfax. The Earl being appointed to the command of the royal army, in 1642, commenced his operations by marching from York with 4000 men, and seven pieces of cannon, to attack the town of Tadcaster, where the parliamentary General was posted with 700 troops. The Earl began his attack upon Sir Thomas's works about 11 o'clock in the morning, and continued it till dusk without intermission, during which time 40,000 musket shots were discharged, besides the fire from the artillery; but the slaughter bore no proportion to the shot expended, as the number killed on both sides did not exceed 300. The ammunition of the

royalists failing, they were obliged to desist, with the intention to renew the attack the next morning, when a further supply should arrive from York. The disparity of force disinclining Sir Thomas Fairfax to sustain another day's engagement, he drew off his men to Selby and Cawood in the night, and the following morning the royalists marched into Tadcaster without opposition. The only person of any note who fell in the battle of Tadcaster was Captain Lister, who was shot by a bullet in the head, and, relating to whom, Thoresby, in his *Ducatus*, mentions the following remarkable instance of filial affection:—The Captain's son passing through Tadcaster some years after the battle, finding the sexton at work in the choir, inquired where his father, Captain Lister, was buried? To which the sexton replied by showing him a skull, just dug up, which he averred was the head of the Captain. On examining the skull, a bullet was found lodged in it, and this testimony to the truth of the grave-digger's words so struck the young man, that he sickened at the sight, and died soon after.

Tadcaster has a Free School, and a Hospital for 12 poor persons, called the Hospital of Jesus, founded by Dr. Oglethorpe, Bishop of Carlisle, who crowned Queen Elizabeth, but was afterwards deprived of his see, for adhering to his religion. In the year 1714, Henry O'Bryen, the last Earl of Thomond, in Ireland, was created Baron and Viscount Tadcaster, but dying without issue, in 1742, the title became extinct. Tadcaster is not a place of much trade, though it is well situated for that purpose, and stands upon the banks of a fine river, which is navigable up to the town. The population of this place, according to the census of 1821, amounts to 2426.

## THORNE

Is a small but brisk market town,  
 in the parish of that name, in the wa-  
 pentake of Strafforth and Tickhill,  
 7 miles SE. of Snaith, 10 miles NE.  
 of Doncaster, and 163 from London;  
 it is situated on the south bank of the  
 Don, which here begins to take a nor-  
 thern course, and at Newbridge, 4 miles  
 from Thorne, enters a canal cut by Cor-  
 nelius Vermuiden and his Dutch and  
 Flemish settlers, and then flows north  
 east to the Ouse, into which it falls at  
 Crowle bridge. The market is on Wed-  
 nesday, and a good deal of business is  
 transacted at it. Thorne is a place of  
 considerable trade, which is much im-  
 proved by its navigation. There are on  
 the banks of the river, at the quay and  
 at a place called Hangman-hill, ship  
 builders' and raff merchants' yards,  
 and wharfs for the landing of mer-  
 chandise. The surrounding country  
 is for the most part fertile, but low  
 and monotonous. In the neighbour-  
 hood are vast moors and swamps,  
 which are however mostly drained,  
 and many of them inclosed. Towards  
 the south-east lies the flat country  
 which forms the western side of the  
 Isle of Aizholm, in Lincolnshire, and  
 on the south is the level of Hatfield  
 chase. To prevent inundations, strong  
 and high banks inclose the river, the  
 country being in many parts consider-  
 ably lower than high water mark.—  
 The population of the township of  
 Thorne, is 3163.

**TICKHILL**

Is a small market town, on the borders of Nottinghamshire, in the parish and liberty of that name, and in the wapentake of Strafforth and Tickhill, 4 miles from Bawtry; 7 from Doncaster; and 166 from London. The streets are disposed nearly in the form of a cross by the roads from Worksop to Doncaster, and from Bawtry to Rotherham. The market, which is on Friday, is now almost disused, and the principal trade in the place is malting, for which this town was formerly noted. The church is a handsome structure, with a lofty and handsome tower, and its architecture shows it to be of the age of Henry III. The chancel is an altar tomb, ornamented on the sides with large quatrefoils, and a brass plate fixed in the wall commemorates the name of William Eastfield, Seneschal of the lordship of Holderness and of the honour of Tickhill, who died December 24, 1386. The church also contains several tombs, mural monuments, and inscriptions, commemorative of different families who have resided in this neighbourhood. Anciently there was a castle on the south side of the town of considerable celebrity, but little now remains of it except the lofty mound on which the keep stood, with the ditch and part of the wall surrounding the fortress. An ancient gate-way forming the entrance on the western side is the most curious part of the ruins. The northern part of the structure, with modern repairs and additions, is the seat of Frederick Lumley, Esq. and a great part of the area within the walls is converted into gardens and shrubberies. The large and towering trees, which skirt the ditch and wall, contribute to give a venerable

appearance to this interesting relic of the feudal ages. It is conjectured that the castle was originally built of brick, and that the town takes its name from that circumstance, Tichel in the Dutch language being the name for brick. This supposition is controverted on the ground that the art of brick-making, was lost after the departure of the Romans from this country, and that it was not revived till the reign of Richard II.\* and in the interval Tickhill castle was founded by Roger de Busli, one of the Conqueror's followers, who built, or re-edified Sheffield castle. Camden says that "Tickhill was of such dignity heretofore, that all the manors hereabouts appertaining to it were called the honour of Tickhill." In the civil wars, immediately preceding the commonwealth in England, this castle was garrisoned by the King's troops, but after the battle of Marston Moor, which sealed the destiny of the royal cause, it stood only two days when Major Monkton, the governor, with his small garrison, surrendered to the parliamentary force; and soon after, namely, on the 13th of April, 1646, an order was issued by parliament, that this castle with a number of others should be dismantled and rendered untenable. This order was strictly executed, and Tickhill castle almost disappeared. A little to the west of the town, in a deep valley, are seen the ruins of an ancient Priory of Augustines, founded in the reign of Henry III. but it is probable that the Eighth Henry, who was as great an enemy to monasteries as the legislators of the commonwealth were to castles, divested the Priory of its revenue, and suffered it to fall into ruin. The charities of Tickhill, are a school and an alms house. The population, according to the returns of 1821, amounted to 1830

### WAKEFIELD

Is a large and opulent town, delightfully situated on the left bank of the Calder, in the wapentake of Agbrigg, and in the centre of the parish and liberty to which it gives name: it is 9 miles from Leeds; 10 from Barnsley; 13 from Huddersfield; and 187 from London. The streets are, for the most part, regular, handsome, and spacious, and the houses, which are principally of brick, are well built, large, and lofty. The market place, however, is contracted and inconvenient, and before the corn market was

removed into Westgate, it was very inadequate to the proper accommodation of a town of its present magnitude. In the centre of the market there is a small, but elegant cross, of the Doric order of architecture, with an open colonade supporting a dome, with an ascent by an open staircase to a spacious room, which is lighted by a lantern, in the dome, and in which room the commissioners of the streets hold their meetings, and other public business is transacted. Friday is the market day at Wakefield, and a great deal of business is done in corn and wool, the latter of which is sent here from various parts of the kingdom, to be disposed of by the factors to the manufacturers in the adjacent districts. The fortnight fairs for cattle held here every alternate Wednesday, are much resorted to, and contribute to supply an extensive and populous country to the west with fat cattle, brought from the north, the south, and the east.

Wakefield is a place of great antiquity.\* In the Domesday survey it is called **WACHFELD**, and it is supposed to derive its name from some Saxon possessor. Leyland's description of this town, given three centuries ago, is animated, and correctly pour-

\* Many relics of antiquity have been found in the neighbourhood; and as late as the 13th of March, 1821, a large quantity of clay moulds, (more than could be contained in a bushel measure) in which coin had been cast by the Romans, for the payment of their soldiers, were turned up by the ploughshare in a field at Lingwell Gate, near Wakefield. Four crucibles were found along with these moulds, in which the metal had doubtless been melted, and though they must have lain in that situation, for at least fourteen centuries, they had suffered no injury, either from time or accident. Several silver Roman coins have from time to time been picked up in the same situation, and some of them in the identical matrix in which they had been cast. Upwards of a hundred years ago, similar remains were found in the same place, as appears from Camden's Britannica, Gough's Edit. Vol. iii. Page 279. In 1812, about 40lb. weight of Roman copper coin was dug up in a field, upon the estate of the Marquis of Hertford, on the Wakefield Outwood, in the township of Stanley, near to which place, it is conjectured, that the Romans had a station. Through the laudable zeal of Mr. Thomas Pitt, an intelligent gentleman in Wakefield, a number of specimens of these moulds and coins, with one of the crucibles have been collected, and are now deposited in the antiquarian department of the British Museum and other depositories.

trays the place at the time in which he wrote—"Wakefeld upon Calder," says he, "ys a very quick market towne and meately large: well served of flesh and fische, both from the se and by rivers, whereof divers be thereabout at hande. So that al vitaille is very good chepe there. A right honest man shal fare well for 2 pens a meale."—"It standith now al by clothyng."—"These things I especially noted at Wakefeld: The faire bridge of stone, of nine arches, under the which runneth the river Calder; and on the est side of the bridge is a rightly goodly chapel of our Lady, and two cantuaric prestes founded in it, of the fundacions of the townesmen, as sum say: but the Dukes of Yorke were taken as founders for obteyning the mortemayn."—"There was a sore batell fought in the south feildes by this bridge; and yn the flite of the Duke of Yorke's parte, other the duke himself or his sunn therle of Rutheland, was slayne a little above the barres beyond the bridge, going up a clyving ground."—"The Lord Clifford, for killing of men at this batall, was called the boucher."—"The building of the towne is meately faire, most of tymbre, but sum of stone. Al the hole profite of the towne standith by course drapery. There be few townes yn the inwarde partes of Yorkshire that hath a fairer site or soile about it. Ther be plenty of veines of se cole in the quarters about Wakefeld." Fuller in his history of the Worthies of Yorkshyre, calls this town, "MERRY WAKEFIELD," and says—"What peculiar cause of mirth this town hath above others I do not know, and dare not too curiously inquire, lest I should turn their mirth among themselves into anger against me. Sure it is seated in a fruitful soil and cheap country; and where good cheer and company are the premises, mirth (in common consequence) will be the conclusion: which if it doth not trespass in time, cause, and measure, Heraclitus, the sad philosopher, may perchance condemn, but Saint Hilary, the good father, will surely allow."

The manor or lordship of Wakefield is very extensive, its boundaries reaching westward to the confines of Cheshire and Lancashire, from a few miles eastward of Wakefield, and comprising upwards of 120,000 inhabitants, (about one-eighth part of the whole population of Yorkshyre.) An inquisition taken in the reign of Queen

Elizabeth, for which see Appendix to this work, will serve to show its great extent, and the enumeration of the places will be found of advantage to the suitors in the Manor Court.

Having stated the extent of the manor of Wakefield, it may be proper to present a rapid sketch of its lords. It was part of the possessions of the crown of England, until the grant by Henry I. to William Earl Warren, about the year 1107. This manor remained in the Warren family till the 9th of Edward II. when John, the last Earl, having no legitimate male issue, gave all his honours, castles, manors, and tenements to the king, in the year 1316, with a view of obtaining a regrant to his natural children, after which, in the year following, the king granted this manor with several others in Yorkshyre, to him and his concubine, Maud de Nerford, for life, with remainder to John de Warren, natural son of the Earl by the said Maud, remainder to Thomas, another of her sons, and remainder to the heirs of the said Earl lawfully begotten, and in failure of such issue to revert to the crown. In the 12th Edward II. a grant, by licence of the king, was made by John Earl Warren, for his life, to Thomas, Earl of Lancaster, but the latter Earl having engaged in an unsuccessful rebellion, along with a number of other peers, he was taken prisoner after a signal defeat at Boroughbridge, and beheaded at his castle of Pontefract. The period of the Earl of Lancaster's possession did not exceed three years, when the Earl of Warren, became again lord of the manor of Wakefield. Maud de Nerford, to whom the Earl was afterwards married, having survived the Earl and her two sons, came into possession of the manor and held courts at Wakefield, by the title of the Countess de Warren, until her death, in the 33rd Edward III. From that time until the reign of Charles I. the manor was in the hands of the crown, but it was then granted to Henry, Earl of Holland; by whom it was given as part of the marriage-portion of his daughter, to Sir Gervase Clifton, of Clifton, Notts, Bart. The possession of the Clifton family continued only a few years, when it was sold about the year 1663, to Sir Christopher Clapham; and in the year 1700, it was purchased of the heirs of Sir Christopher, by the Duke of Leeds, in whose family it still remains. The most noble

George William Frederick, Duke of Leeds, is the lord of the manor of Wakefield, and the direction of all writs within this liberty is "to the lord of the manor of Wakefield, and his deputies." Amongst other extensive powers of feudal times, the Earls Warren, had "Furcas" or Gallows at Wakefield, "et iudicium quod ad furcas pertinet;"—and till the reign of Charles II. the gibbet law of Halifax,† was one of the privileges of the lord of this manor. The axe of the gibbet is still in the possession of the lord of the manor, by whom it is kept as a relic of antiquity.

Sandal Castle, built by the late Earl of Warren, for his favourite mistress, was used as the court or manor house of this extensive fee, from its first erection to its decay or demolition, and here the Saviles of Thornhill, in whom the office of steward was almost hereditary, occasionally resided and always transacted the business of the courts. "They were," says Dr. Whitaker, "men of business, active and useful in their generation, from the 14th century down to the last representative, (long the representative of this populous and busy county) Sir George Savile." The manor house, near which is the moot-hall where the courts are held, is now in Wakefield, opposite the church, and forms a very humble successor to Sandal castle. While upon subjects of antiquity, it may not be inapplicable to mention, on the authority of Roger Hoveden, that in the year 1201, Eustace, abbot of Hay, in Normandy, came into England, preaching the duty of extending the sabbath, from three o'clock on Saturday afternoon, to sun-rising on Monday morning, pleading the authority of an epistle written by Christ himself, and found on the altar of St. Simon, at Golgotha. The shrewd people of Yorkshire treated this fanatic with contempt, and the miller of Wakefield persisted in grinding his corn after the hour of cessation, for which, says the historian gravely, his corn was turned into blood, while the mill wheel stood immovable against all the waters of the Calder!

No county in England has witnessed more of the civil wars to which Great Britain, in former ages was exposed than Yorkshire, and Wakefield may rank amongst those towns in Yorkshire where this scourge of na-

tions has prevailed in its utmost horrors. The "sore battell fought in the south seildes by the bridge," as mentioned by Leland, occupies a distinguished place in English history. After the battle of Northampton, in which the Lancastrians sustained a signal defeat, and in which Henry VI. was taken prisoner, his Queen, Margaret of Anjou, repaired into the north, where she soon drew together an army of 20,000 men. The Duke of York, informed of her appearance in Yorkshire, hastened thither with a body of 5000 men. Having arrived in the vicinity of Wakefield, he heard that the Queen was advancing towards him with greatly superior numbers. On this he resolved to retire to his castle at Sandal, and there to shut himself up till his eldest son, the Earl of Marche, who was levying troops on the borders of Wales, should arrive with the rest of his forces. The Queen soon appeared before the walls of Sandal castle, with the main body of her army, led by the Dukes of Somerset and Exeter, provoking her enemy to battle, sometimes by menaces, and at other times by insults and defiance, observing that it was disgraceful to a man who aspired to a crown to suffer himself to be shut up by a woman. This was more than he could endure. He quitted the castle and descended into the plain; and having drawn up his troops on Wakefield Green, he offered battle to the Lancastrians. The inequality of numbers was of itself sufficient to decide the victory, but the Queen having placed a body of troops in ambush under Lord Clifford and the Earl of Wiltshire, they fell upon the rear of the Duke's army, while they were attacked by the main body in front, and in less than half an hour the Duke himself was slain, and his little army was almost annihilated. His body was soon recognized amongst the slain, and his head cut off by Margaret's orders, and fixed upon the gates of York, with a paper crown upon it, in derision of his pretended title. Clifford, whose thirst for blood seemed insatiable, plunged his murderous sword into the body of the Earl of Rutland, an interesting youth of seventeen, second son to the Duke of York, and 3000 of his father's troops were on that day numbered amongst the dead.

At the breaking out of the war between Charles I. and the parliament, Wakefield had its full share of

suffering; and we are told by Mr. Drake, a writer of the next age, "that Wakefield, Leeds, Halifax, and Bradford, and several other towns and garrisons against the king, were in six weeks space, by the valour and conduct of the Lord-general (Newcastle) reduced to his Majesty's subjection; but by the various chances of war lost and won again, sometimes by one party, sometimes by another, and Yorkshire, in spite of all precaution, was for some years, a scene of bloodshed and misery."

The public edifices in Wakefield may be distinguished as ancient and modern. The ancient buildings are the Parish Church, the Chantry on the bridge, the Free Grammar School, the Charity School, and Heselden Hall; those of more modern date are, St. John's Church, the Dissenters, and Methodist Meeting Houses, the Court House, the Register Office for the West-Riding, the Clerk of the Peace's Office, the House of Correction, the West-Riding Pauper Lunatic Asylum, the Theatre, the Tammy-Hall, the Corn Exchange, and the Public Rooms. The Parish Church, which is dedicated to All-Saints, is a spacious and lofty Gothic structure, and may be ranked amongst the best Parish Churches in the North of England; it is 156 feet in length, and 69 in width; the tower is 22 feet wide in the inside, and with the spire 228 feet high. It appears from Domesday-book, that there was a Church here in the year 1080, about which year the Yorkshire survey was made; but the present Church was not erected till the year 1470, and in the year 1724 the South front was entirely rebuilt, since which time the North side and the East end have both been re-edified. The living is a vicarage, in the presentation of the crown, and the Rev. Samuel Sharp, A.M. is the present incumbent. The Chantry, or Chapel on the bridge, was founded, according to Archbishop Holgate, by Edward IV. but there was doubtless a chapel here, dedicated to "our Lady," in the time of Richard II.\* and it is probable that Edward IV. only re-edified and re-endowed it, as a sanctuary to pray for the souls of the slain in the battle of Wakefield. The architecture, particularly the fa-

cade is of the most exquisite workmanship, but on the dissolution of the Chantries the endowment was withdrawn, and it has, to the regret of every lover of antiquity, been suffered to fall into a state of dilapidation. The increased and increasing population of the town of Wakefield having rendered two Churches necessary to the accommodation of its inhabitants, towards the close of the last century Mrs. Newstead, a widow lady, bequeathed a plot of land, for the erection of a Church, together with £1000. towards the support of the minister. After some delay, arising out of a troublesome litigation, the pious work was begun, and completed at an expense of £10,000. and the sacred edifice, which is dedicated to St. John, gives name to a number of stately houses, constituting a street at the North entrance to the town, and a square, of which the Church and its ample cemetery form the centre. The Rev. William Wood, A.M. is the present minister. The other places of worship in Wakefield are, Westgate Chapel, an Unitarian place of worship, of which the Rev. Thomas Johnstone, is minister; Zion Chapel, in George street, the Rev. Samuel Bruce, minister; Salem Chapel, in George street, the Rev. Thomas Jefferson, minister; both these are Independent places of worship; the Quakers' Meeting House, near George street; and the Methodist Chapel, in West Parade, of which the Rev. Samuel Woolmer, and the Rev. Thomas Harris, are the present ministers.

"The Grammar School of Queen Elizabeth, at Wakefield," was founded in the year 1592, by the Savilles, ancestors of the Earl of Mexbro', "for the teaching, instructing, and bringing up children and youth in grammar and other good learning." Fourteen honest men, of the most wise, discreet, and religious persons in Wakefield, or within two miles of it, are the governors, and the School is open to all the inhabitants, indefinitely, free of expense, though the head master, (and probably the second also,) is usually complimented with a small donation at Christmas†. The school house stands on a retired and well chosen site, and there is a good library belonging to it. There are several exhibitions and scholarships at this School, to the Universities of Cambridge and Oxford, three of which are possessed

of considerable revenues. The Rev. M. J. Naylor, whose salary is £180. a year, is at present head master; and the Rev. J. L. Sisson, second master.

There is also a Charity School here, for the clothing and instructing of 106 poor boys and girls; and, it is said, that the various eleemosynary foundations in Wakefield command a revenue of £1000 a year. Heselden Hall is a very ancient edifice, principally of wood, standing at the North Eastern extremity of the town, and of a date as early as Henry VI. The hall part of the building, is a fine timber apartment, open to the roof, and its name is derived from the family which were its original occupants.

Amongst the modern buildings the Court House is a handsome and commodious structure situated in Wood-street, in which the Quarter Sessions of the Riding are held once in the year, and where the West-Riding Magistrates in the neighbourhood assemble weekly to dispense justice. The House of Correction, which is the goal of the West-Riding, stands at the bottom of Westgate, and from the increasing population of this division of Yorkshire, as much as from the increase of crime, is generally filled with inmates. The expense of this establishment, from April 10, 1820, to April 30, 1821, amounted to £4918. 10s. 9½d.; Mr. James Sheppard is the governor, and this prison has the reputation of being well conducted. Its limits are, however, too circumscribed for its population, and an enlargement is now taking place with a view to the improvement of the prison, and the more convenient classification of the prisoners, the expense of which, is estimated at £25,000. The Lunatic Asylum, for the reception of paupers labouring under the deprivation of reason, is a very convenient building, and from its exterior appearance, and its interior management, is an ornament to the town, and an honour to the Riding; W. C. Ellis, M. D. is the director. The expense of this establishment, (exclusive of the parochial payments,) from April 10, 1820, to April 30, 1821, amounted to £728. 13s. 7d. These ample premises are capable of accommodating 250 patients. The townships from whence the patients are sent defray the expense of their support; and since the establishment was opened on the 23rd of November, 1818, 73 patients have been cured, 31 have died, and 4 have been sent home

to their friends as improper objects. On the 5th of November, 1821, there remained in the house under cure 152 patients. The Tammy-Hall, for the exposure and sale of w.ollen stuffs, is situated in Wood-street, but it is now little used, that branch of trade having emigrated partly to Halifax, but principally to Bradford. The Corn Exchange, lately erected, is situated at the top of Westgate, and is well calculated for the extensive transactions of a market which ranks amongst the first in the North of England. The fortnight fair for cattle is held in the Upper Ings, where ample accommodation is provided.\* The Public Rooms, though amongst the last, are by no means amongst the least beneficial establishments of Wakefield, they form a handsome and commodious building, situated near the Court-House; the News Room affords an ample supply of the London and Provincial newspapers; and the different compartments of the library are gradually filling with works in the various branches of science and literature, while the upper room is appropriated to concerts, assemblies, and other public amusements. The Theatre, which is situated in Westgate, was erected by the late Tate Wilkinson, Esq. and is now under the management of Mr. Mausel.

Wakefield now, as in the time of Leyland, still "standith by clothbyng." Like Leeds, it is situated on the edge of the manufacturing district, of which the Calder here forms the Eastern boundary. Scarcely a single woollen manufacturer is found to the East of Wakefield. The trade of the town, particularly in corn, is greatly improved by its navigation. The river was rendered navigable to Wakefield in the year 1698, and in 1760 its navigation was extended to Salter Hebble, near Halifax. Corn, coal, wool and other merchandise, are continually in transit here, and the principal establishment of the Aire and Calder Navigation Company is on the banks of the river, near the bridge, under the direction of Mr. Joseph Priestley. Some increase has taken place in the population of Wakefield, within the last twenty years, but that increase is by no means in proportion to the other principal towns of the Riding, as will appear

from the following returns: in 1801, the total number of inhabitants was 6,131; in 1811, it had increased to 8,593; and in 1821, the returns amount to 10,764.

From this brief outline of the annals of Wakefield it will be seen that it is a town alike interesting in its

remote history and its present state; and it remains only to add, that the manners of its inhabitants unite the honest frankness of the manufacturing character, with the urbanity and polish of those places where the clack of the shuttle never breaks upon the ear of the stately citizen.

Is a small market and post town, pleasantly situated on the left bank of the river Wharf, over which there is a handsome stone bridge; it is in the parish of Spofforth, the wapentake of Claro, and the liberty of Ripon, 7 miles N.W. of Tadcaster, the same distance S.E. of Knaresbrough, and 194 from London. There is a weekly market on Thursday. Across the river is a fine stone wear for raising the water, by means of which several flour, oil and logwood mills are worked. The manor was anciently a possession of the Knights Templars, but on the abolition of their order in the reign of Edward II. it was given by the Pope to the Knights Hospitallers of St. John, and the grant was confirmed by parliament in 1324. In the civil war, in the time of Charles I. this town had a small garrison, consisting of 300 foot and 40 horse, commanded by Sir Thomas Fairfax. This handful of brave men, unused to the vigilance of the camp, was surprised by 800 horse and foot from York; and the attack being made early in the morning, the guard were found sleeping at their post,

"for," says Sir Thomas, "at the beginning of the war, men were as impatient of duty as they were ignorant of it." The general, however, was awake, and with the assistance of four men held the enemy at bay, till more of the guards were got to arms. A smart engagement then ensued in which the assailants were repulsed. The attack was soon renewed; but in the midst of the conflict Fairfax's magazine was blown up, and produced so tremendous an explosion, that the royalists believing that the parliamentary forces had cannon began to retreat, and retired to the garrison at York, from which they had issued to engage in this abortive enterprize. A little below this town is a place called "St. Helens Ford," where the Roman military way crossed the river. Some very important improvements have lately been made in Wetherby, at the cost of the Duke of Devonshire, the great proprietor here, by whose directions a considerable number of old and ruinous buildings have been pulled down, and a number of small, neat, and comfortable houses, built of stone, erected in their stead. By our Saxon ancestors, this town was called *Wæderbi*, which signifies *to turn*, owing to its situation on an angle of the Wharf.\* The country around presents much beautiful and diversified, though no very striking scenery. The population according to the returns of 1821, amounts to 1217.

# Villages, Hamlets, &c.

OF THE

## WEST-RIDING OF YORKSHIRE.



The names which follow the description of each place are those of the principal inhabitants and traders; where no names are inserted the population is generally very small, and the inhabitants consist either altogether of the labouring classes or of persons unconnected with trade.

The letter *p.* is placed after the name of each village that gives name to a parish, *wap.* signifies wapentake, and N.S.E.W. the cardinal points of the compass, show the bearing of the village or hamlet from the nearest market town, which is generally the post town.

The number of inhabitants both in the towns and villages stated in this work, are extracted from the official returns of the date of the 28th of May, 1821, made under the population act of the 1st of George IV. In some of the hamlets no population returns are given, in which case they are usually included in the parish or township of which those hamlets form a part.

**ACKTON**, in the parish of Featherstone, wap. of Agbrigg, liberty of Pontefract; 3 miles W. of Pontefract. Population 72

**ACKWORTH (High)**, (*P.*) in the wap. of Osgoldcross; 3 miles S. of Pontefract. Mrs. Mary Lowther endowed a school here for youths of both sexes; she also founded an hospital for six poor women, each of whom receives 9*l.* 10*s.* yearly from the same endowment. The church is a small, but neat edifice, of which the Rev. W. R. Hay, M. A. is rector. The population of this parish amounts to 1575.

**ACKWORTH (Low)**, adjoins, and is in the parish of High Ackworth.—Between the villages of High and Low Ackworth stands a handsome stone edifice, built 70 years ago, partly by voluntary subscription and partly by aid of parliament, as an appendage to the Foundling Hospital, in London. This building cost £13,000. The Foundling Hospital had a similar establishment in Shropshire, both of which were supplied with children from London. The house at Ackworth was occupied twelve years as a Foundling Hospital, and during that period there were admitted into the three Foundling Institutions of London, Shropshire and Ackworth, upwards of 16,000 children, of which number, 11,400 died before they were at an age to be put out as apprentices, which was usually at about eight years of age. This dreadful mortality, the diffi-

culty of obtaining proper nurses, and of providing humane masters, with the frequent contest from the opposition of parishes, and the cruelty of masters where they were apprenticed, proved such insurmountable obstacles to the well conducting of the charity, that the house at Ackworth was abandoned as a Foundling Hospital, and remained unoccupied and on sale for eight years. In the year 1777, Dr. Fothergill and three others of the Society of Friends stepped forwards and purchased the building with eighty-four acres of land, for the sum of £7000. The want of a suitable establishment for the guarded and religious education of the children of the less wealthy classes of their Society had long been lamented by the Friends, and Dr. Fothergill and the other purchasers offered the premises to the next annual assembly in London. The offer was accepted, and the premises opened as a National School for the Society, which has since been liberally supported by annual subscriptions, donations, and legacies. The house is well adapted for a public school, both by situation and accommodation; the principal front is to the south, and two wings standing east and west are joined to the main building by colonades.—The sum of ten guineas per annum is paid with each child, either by the parents or friends of the child, or by the district meetings of the society; but the average cost of each is about seventeen guineas, including clothing, stationary, and other necessaries. The number of children in the school is limited to 300, viz. 180 boys and 120 girls, but there is always a considerable number on the list waiting for admission. The average time of each child in the school has been

three years; and the number of deaths one in each year since its commencement by Friends; total number admitted, from the opening of the school, to June, 1821, 4366. The pupils are well grounded in an English education, their morals and habits are sedulously attended to, and the order and decorum which prevail in every department do credit to the wisdom, prudence, and seal of the managers. The immediate management is under the care of Mr. Robert Whitaker, who fills the office of superintendent, subject to the direction of a committee of twenty-eight Friends in the vicinity of Ackworth, and another committee of the same number, who sit in London; and all matters of importance must be confirmed by both these committees before they are enforced.

This is a populous and thriving village, the inhabitants of which are chiefly employed in the manufacture of cotton. The church, dedicated to St. Michael, is pleasantly situated on an eminence, near the river Wharf; it is an ancient structure, and the present rector is the Rev. John Coates; Mrs. Mary Cunliffe is patroness in her own right. Here is also a spacious and well-built Methodist Chapel, erected in 1778, which was enlarged in 1808; a small distance from this place there is a Meeting-house for the people called Friends; and about one mile from hence are the remains of a Roman camp. Population 1570.

**ADDLX, (P.)** in the wap. of Skyrack; 5 miles N. of Leeds, the *Adhill*, or, the Hill of the Ada of the Saxons, and the *Burgodurum* of the Romans. At a small distance from the village are the remains of a Camp, about 120 yards in length and 90 yards wide, and a number of ancient monuments, altars, urns, coins, &c. have been found here through successive ages, some of them within the last few years, and are now in the possession of the Rev. George Lewthwaite, the present worthy vicar of the parish. The church is an ancient structure of exquisite workmanship, erected probably about the end of the 11th century, and dedicated to St. John the Baptist. The living is a rectory in charge, valued in the King's Books at £16. 3s. 4d. and is in the presentation of the ancient family of Arthington.—See Arthington.—Population, 699.

In the year 1643, a battle was fought on Adwalton moor, between the royalists under the Earl of Newcastle, and the Parliamentary forces under Sir Thomas Fairfax, the latter of whom had made an unsuccessful attempt to relieve Bradford, then besieged by the King's forces. The engagement, which was bloody, resulted in the defeat of Sir Thomas, who was driven through Leeds, and obliged to take refuge in the garrison at Hull. To this day memorials of the battle are perpetually dug up; bullets, cannon balls, and even chain shot have been found amongst these relics. The siege of Bradford was now pressed with great vigour, and though the steeple of the church, which was the citadel, was hung round with woolpacks, the town fell into the hands of Newcastle, who had determined to give it up to military execution. From this sanguinary purpose, according to tradition, he was dissuaded, by an apparition in female form, which appeared to him while he slept at Bowling hall, the night before the entry of the Royal army, and, with the cry of "Pity poor Bradford," implored him to spare the town. The petition of the messenger prevailed, and the lives of the unarmed inhabitants were spared.—Population included with Drighlington

**BATLEY**, (P.) in the wap. of Morley, and the honour of Pontefract; 8 miles S. of Leeds; a place of great antiquity, called by our ancestors the field of *Bat* or *Batta*. The Church, dedicated to All Saints, was granted to the canons of St. Oswald, and confirmed by Henry I. This church has disappeared, and a structure of more modern date, dedicated to the same patrons, took its place in the time of Henry VI. The more recent edifice is adorned by a fine alabaster tomb of the Mirfields, and around the sides, held by figures of men and women, are shields of Mirfield, impaled with Savile: the same with Fitzwilliam; and of Eland and Mirfield, which time has rendered indistinct. The north chapel of the choir belong to Howley Hall; the south to the manor of Batley, whose lords, the Copleys, were interred within it. The Rev. Thomas Foxley, A.M. is the vicar, and the Rev. Matthew Sedgwick, M.A. is the curate of Batley. Howley Hall, built by Sir John Savile, the first alderman of Leeds, in 1500. is called by Camden, *ante elegantissima* :—

a most elegant structure, and well deserved the appellation; after standing for a century and a half, the pride and admiration of the neighbourhood, it was, at the instigation of a faithless agent, blown up with gun-powder, by order of the Earl of Cardigan, in 1730, and nothing now remains of it but some massy grout work at the angles. The dependencies on Batley are Morley, Churwell, and Gildersome, and its population 3717 souls. Batley Carr is a portion of the same parish. In the year 1613, a school house was built at Batley, by the Rev. John Lee, a native of the place, and endowed with a revenue, which is now of the value of about £100 per annum. This school has lately been re-built.

**BEESTON**, in the borough of Leeds, wap. of Morley, and honour of Pontefract; 2 miles SW. of Leeds, is delightfully situated on an eminence, commanding an extensive view of Airedale, but the vicinity of the coal mines detracts from the pleasantness of the situation, and casts a sombre tint over the whole village. The mines were worked as early as the reign of Charles II. and the mention of them serves to introduce one of the most tragical events in Yorkshire history. There lived in that reign, in a solitary situation, at Beeston Park, a master miner,

named Leonard Scurr, who had filled the office of minister at Beeston chapel, during the Protectorate. Having collected a considerable sum of money to take with him to London, for the purpose of trade, the fact was known to some of his neighbours, and on the night previous to his intended journey, being on the 19th January, 1679, two ruffians, of the names of Holroyd and Littlewood, with some other persons, entered his house at the early hour of 11 o'clock, and murdered the whole family, consisting of Mr. Scurr, his aged mother, and a servant girl, the latter of whom they beheaded, at the instigation of a wretched woman of the party. Then they stripped the house and set fire to it, with the hope of concealing their delinquency. Holroyd soon after set off for Ireland, taking with him a woman with whom he cohabited. While in that kingdom, suspicion fell upon the woman, who wore a gown and scarlet petticoat belonging to Mrs. Scurr, and which an old servant in the family saw and identified. In consequence of this discovery both the woman and her paramour were apprehended and lodged in York Castle, along with Littlewood, on whom suspicion had also fallen. At the Lammas assizes of 1682, the two men were tried and convicted, and Holroyd, who died a hardened and impenitent sinner, was executed for the offence on Holbeck moor, in the presence of 30,000 spectators. After the execution his body was removed and hung in chains on the spot.— Littlewood was relieved, in the hopes that he would give some information, but what became of him afterwards is not known.— The woman, who had probably not been engaged in the murder, does not appear to have been put upon her trial. The only piece of antiquity in the place is Beeston Chapel, which it appears, from a lancet window at the West end, is as old as Henry III. The Rev. Joseph Swaine, B.D. is the present minister. It appears from the counter book of Nostel, that there was anciently a hospital at Beeston, and Dr. Whitaker conjectures that it stood at the bottom of the hill, on the south side of the brook dividing Churwell and Beeston; Thoresby does not mention it, and not a vestige of the building now remains. **BERWICK (or Barwick) IN-EMMET**, (P.) (a Saxon name; indicating the village of the castle,) in the wap. of Skyrack, & honour of Pontefract; 6 miles S. of Wetherby. This village contained anciently a castle of great extent and magnificence, and was the seat of Edwin, one of the most distinguished of the Northumbrian kings. The fortification, which is four furlongs in circumference, and contain an area of more than 13 acres, sufficiently proves that this has been a royal work. Nothing now remains of this once stupendous edifice but the ground-work, which shows that the Mount called Hall Tower Hill, has been encompassed by a

double trench. This manor was afterwards part of the possessions of the Lacey, Earls of Lincoln, from whom it descended to the Dukes of Lancaster, to which Duchy it has been ever since annexed. The church is dedicated to All-hallows. Its first rector appears to have been Rad de Bodeham, in 1235; and its present rector the Rev. Wm. Bathurst, B. A. The living is charged in the king's book at £33. 12s. 6d. Its dependencies are Barnbow, Berwick, Kiddal, and Potterton, Morwick and Scholes, and Roundhay.—Population 1481.

A spacious school house, where instruction is gratuitously afforded to the children of the poor (according to the National System) has just been built here from a design by Mr. Taylor, at the expense of William Charlesworth, Esq. as a tribute to his native place. Dr. Joseph Priestley, the celebrated philosopher, was born at Field Head, near this place, in 1733. The parish "stands chiefly by clothing." The village of Birstall gives name to the parish, which contains eight townships, i. e. Gomersall, Heckmondwike, Liversedge, Cleckheaton, Wike, Hunsworth, Drighlington and Tong, which latter is tributary to the church, by a payment of five shillings annually, under the name of "Rogue's Money." Tong also pays annually 2s. to the vicar of Birstall for synodals, and keeps in repair a part of the church yard wall. Birstall does not furnish the name of a

township, but is one of the four villages constituting the township of Gomersall, i. e. Birstall, Great Gomersall, Little Gomersall and Birkinshaw

**BOLTON ABBEY**, in the parish of Skipton, wap. and liberty of Staincliffe; 5½ miles NE. of Skipton. The remains of the priory being surrounded by bold and majestic high grounds are scarcely seen until the traveller arrives on the spot. Bolton Priory stands upon a beautiful curvature of the Wharf, on a level sufficiently elevated to protect it from inundations, and low enough for every purpose of picturesque effect. In the latter respect it has no equal among the northern houses, perhaps not in the kingdom. Opposite to the east-window of the Priory Church the river washes the rock nearly perpendicular. To the south all is soft and delicious, but, the glories of Bolton are on the north. Whatever the most fastidious taste could require to constitute a perfect landscape, is not only found here, but found in its proper place. In front, and immediately under the eye, is a smooth expanse of park-like enclosure, spotted with native elm, ash, &c. of the finest growth; on the right, a skirting oak-wood, with jutting points of grey rock: on the left, a rising copse. Still forward are seen the aged groves of Bolton-park, the growth of centuries; and farther yet, the barren and rocky distances of Simonscat and Bardenfell, contrasted to the warmth, fertility, and luxuriant foliage of the valley below. About half a mile above Bolton, the valley closes, and either side of the Wharf is overhung by deep and solemn woods, from which huge perpendicular masses of grey rock jut out at intervals. Here a tributary stream rushes from a waterfall, and bursts through a woody glen to mingle its waters with the Wharf. There the Wharf itself is nearly lost in a deep cleft of the rock, and next becomes an horned flood, enclosing a woody island; sometimes it reposes for a moment, and then resumes its native character, lively, irregular, impetuous. The cleft mentioned above is the tremendous *Strid*. This chasm, being incapable of receiving the winter floods, has formed on either side a broad strand of native grit-stone, full of rock basons, "or pots of the fin," which bear witness to the restless impetuosity of so many northern torrents. But if the Wharf is here lost to the eye, it repays another sense by its loud and solemn roar, like the voice of a mighty spirit of the waters," heard far and beneath, amidst the silence of the surrounding woods. The terminating objects in the landscape are the remains of **Barden Tower**, interesting from their form and situation,

but still more so from the recollection which they excite. The principal remains of Bolton Priory now standing, were parts of the church. The nave is still used as a parochial chapel. Over the west door are two escutcheons; that on the north displays the Cliffords' arms, the other on the south side a *Cross formee*. Besides the west end, parts of the nave and choir are yet standing, though much mutilated. The want of a tower detracts much from the beauty of the building. According to Dr. Whitaker, from whom we quote, the Priory was founded by William de Meschines and Cecelia his wife, at Embsay, in the year 1121, and continued there about thirty-three years, when it is said by tradition to have been transferred to Bolton, on the following account:—"The founders were now dead, and had left a daughter who adopted her mother's name, Romille, and was married to William Fitz-Duncan, nephew of David, king of Scotland. They had issue a son, commonly called the Boy of Egremont (one of his grandfather's baronies, where he was probably born,) who surviving an elder brother, became the last hope of the family." "In the deep solitude of the woods betwixt Bolton and Barden, 4 miles up the river, the Wharf suddenly contracts itself to a rocky channel, little more than four feet wide, and pours through the tremendous fissure with a rapidity proportioned to its confinement. The place was then, as it is yet, called the *Strid*, from a feat often exercised by persons of more agility than prudence, who stride from brink to brink, regardless of the destruction which awaits a faltering step. Such was the fate of young Romille, who inconsiderately bounding over the chasm with a grey hound in his leash, the animal hung back, and drew his unfortunate master into the torrent. The misfortune is said to have occasioned the translation of the Priory from Embsay to Bolton, which was the nearest eligible site to the place where it happened." One of the gates of the priory still remains; and by stopping up its openings, has been converted into a dwelling, (the ground floor being one large room) which has been used as an occasional residence by the Duke of Devonshire. This Priory was dissolved the 11th of June 1540; and in 1543, was granted to Henry Clifford, Earl of Cumberland, in which family it remained till 1635: when Elizabeth the daughter and sole heiress of Henry, the last Earl of Cumberland, marrying Richard, the first Earl of Burlington, carried the demesnes into that family, whose daughter Charlotte, sole heiress, married in 1748, the Duke of

Devonshire, in whose family the property still remains. Population, 127.

The following observations on the view from this common were made by John Watson, Esq. of Malton, in the year 1781;—"Upon the middle of this moor, a man may see ten miles around him; within those ten miles there is as much free stone as would build ten cities, each as large as York; within those ten miles there is as much good oak timber as would build those ten cities; there is as much limestone and coals to burn it into lime as the building of those ten cities would require; there is also as much clay and sand and coals to burn them into bricks and tiles as would build those ten cities; within those ten miles there are two iron forges sufficient to furnish iron for the building of those ten cities, and ten thousand tons to spare; within those ten miles there is lead sufficient for the ten cities, and ten thousand fadders to spare; within those ten miles there is a good coal seam sufficient to furnish those ten cities with firing for 10,000 years; within those ten miles there are three navigable rivers, from any of which a man may take shipping and sail to any part of the world; within those ten miles there are seventy gentlemen's houses, all keeping coaches, and the least of them as Bequire, and ten parks and forests well

stocked with deer; within those ten miles there are ten market towns, one of which may be supposed to return £10,000 per week."  the Druids; here we find rock-idols, holy  
 altars, and sacred passages for mysterious

purposes. The cannon rocks, which may  
 be ranked amongst the most remarkable parts  
 of this magnificent and rudely picturesque  
 scenery, contain perforations through which  
 the wily priests probably conveyed sounds of  
 awful import to the oracular idols, which, in  
 times of Paganism, stood upon their sum-  
 mits. There are here also, a great number of  
 tumuli spread over the ground, resembling  
 those at Stone-henge, and some of the im-  
 mense rocks vibrate upon a pivot like the  
 Logan-stones of Cornwall. The estate is  
 the property of the Grantley family; and in  
 the year 1793, William Lord Grantley built  
 a house and suitable offices in the centre of  
 these ancient and imperishable temples, for the  
 accommodation of those who come to wonder  
 and conjecture over this congregated mass of  
 Druidical relics and natural phenomena.

 the pen of Shakespeare, under the designa-  
 tion of "*The Yorkshire Tragedy*." Divest-  
 ed of poetic fiction, the story is this:—  
 Walter Calverley, the son and heir of William  
 Calverley, Esq. married at the close of the  
 16th century, Philippa, daughter of Sir John  
 Brooke, by whom he had issue three sons,  
 William, Walter, and Henry. Dissipation  
 and other vices in the head of this ill-fated  
 family, had plunged them into extreme em-  
 barrassments, and under the influence of  
 intoxication, jealousy, or intolerable appre-  
 hension that his children would become beg-  
 gars, he came to the desperate resolution to  
 be himself their murderer. The intelligence  
 that his brother had been committed to pri-  
 son in consequence of a security given for  
 Walter, brought on the crisis which he had  
 contemplated, and observing his oldest son,  
 a boy four years old, at play in the gallery of  
 Calverley hall, the unnatural father rushed  
 upon him, and inflicted two or three wounds  
 with his dagger. He then seized upon the  
 bleeding child, and carried him to the room

of his mother, who was asleep, while the  
 nurse was dressing another of the children  
 in the room. The unhappy mother, roused  
 from her slumbers by the violent entry of her  
 husband, soon became aware of the danger  
 which threatened her children, and endea-  
 voured to save the second child from his  
 fury, but all her efforts were in vain, and  
 he plunged the reeking dagger into its heart,  
 while clasped in its mother's arms. His  
 fury was then directed against his lady, and  
 he inflicted upon her several severe wounds.  
 Still unsatiated with blood, he took his horse  
 and rode off for the village where his infant  
 child was at nurse, but as he entered the  
 place, he was thrown from his horse, and  
 secured by a servant, who had been dispatched  
 after him. On the following day he was  
 taken before Sir John Saville, of Howley,  
 and Sir Thomas Bland, Knights, two of the  
 Magistrates of the West-Riding, in whose  
 presence he confessed his crime, adding, that  
 he had harboured the intention of killing  
 his children for two years past, and that "the  
 reason that moved him therunto was, for  
 that his wife had many times heretofore  
 uttered speeches and given signs and tokens  
 unto him whereby he might easily perceive  
 and conjecture, that the said children were  
 not by him begotten, and that he had found  
 himself to be in danger of his life sundry  
 times by his said wife."\* At the close of the  
 examination, he was committed to gaol, but  
 as the plague then raged in York, he was sent  
 to Wakefield. Subsequently he was removed  
 to York, where he was brought to trial, but  
 refused to plead either guilty or not guilty :  
 "he was adjudged to be pressed to death ;  
 according to which judgment he was executed  
 in the Castle, at York, the 5th of August,  
 1604."† The lady of this high-born male-  
 factor recovered from her wounds, and his  
 son Henry succeeded to the estate and chat-  
 tels, the latter of which his father, by re-  
 fusing to plead on his trial, had saved from  
 forfeiture. The estate remained in the Cal-  
 verley family till the year 1754, when Sir  
 Walter Calverley, who took the name of  
 Blackett, sold the manor and estate of Cal-  
 verley to Thomas Thornhill, of Fixby, Esq.,  
 by whose heir, Thomas Thornhill, Esq. of  
 Fixby, in Yorkshire, and Riddlesworth, in  
 Norfolk, it is still possessed. The hall is

**CASTLEFORD**, (P.) wap. of Os-goldcross, and honour of Pontefract; 3 miles NW. of Pontefract. A village situated near the confluence of the rivers Aire and Calder. Here was a Roman station, named *Leguolum*, by Antoninus; and Hoveden (the historian, who was living in the reign of king John,) expressly calls it a city. Many Roman coins, and other remains of antiquity are frequently found here. It was the station of the VI. or *Victrix Legio*. At the conquest, this place became the property of the Roman *Lacy*, the heiress of which family was married to John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, to whose heirs the rectory has ever since belonged. The king, in right of his Duchy of Lancaster, is the patron of the living; the Rev. Thos. Barnes, M. A. is the present incumbent, and T. Davison Bland, Esq. is lord of the manor of Houghton cum Castleford. For a village, Castleford is a place of considerable trade, and contains an extensive pottery, a mill for grinding flint, and a grist-mill. There is a parish school, built by subscription, and a Sunday school. The tithes are settled by act of parliament, and the rector receives 28 quarts of wheat for every one pound rent paid by the tenant to his landlord on arable land, and 20 quarts for every £2. rent on grass land, free of Tenants' Taxes. Population, 1022.

THE CAVES of Craven are among the most striking and stupendous curiosities in the West Riding of Yorkshire. Of these natural excavations the cave of *Yordas* first claims attention. It is situated in the vale of Kingsdale, under the mountain of Gray Gareth, and near the foot of Whernside. It is within a solid perpendicular rock of black marble. Entered from the west, the road divides into two parts; on the right is the Bishop's Throne, and on the left the Chapter House—so called from their resemblance to these appendages to a cathedral, each of which is surmounted by pendent petrified ornaments, the accumulation of ages. Small cascades fall in various places from the roof and sides, with different trilling notes, and serve to entertain the ear with their music, while the watery eye is gratified with the sublimity of the scene. A pistol discharged in this cavern, by the multiplied reverberations produces a report like the sound of a park of artillery. According to tradition, this cave has been alternately the habitation of giants and fairies, as the different mythology prevailed in the country. *Hurtlepot*, in Chapel-de-Dale, at the eastern base of Ingleton Fells, is a round deep cavern, between 40 and 50 yards in diameter, at the bottom of which there is a deep black lake. Round the top of this horrid chasm are trees, the branches of which meet almost in the centre, and heighten the gloom of the yawning abyss beneath. In great floods the Pot flows over; and the large black trouts which inhabit it are frequently caught in the night by the country people. About 150 yards above, at the head of a grotesque glen, through which passes the subterranean river Wease, or Greta, is a chasm called *Ginglepot*, at the bottom of a precipice. It is of an oblong and narrow form, about 10 yards wide and 20 yards deep at the north corner, and is filled with smooth pebbles at the bottom, except in the south corner, where there is deep water, which, in floods, swells up to the top, and issues out an impetuous torrent.

*Weathercoat Cave* or *Coave*, as it is there pronounced, is situated in the same dreary glen, and is the most surprising natural curiosity in Great Britain. It is a stupendous subterranean cataract, in a huge cave, whose top is on the same level with the adjoining lands. Here both the ears and eyes are equally astonished by the sublime and terrible. The margin all around is guarded and ornamented with trees and shrubs. This cave is of a lozenge form, and divided into two by a rugged and grotesque arch of limestone-rock. The whole length from south to north is about 60 yards, and the breadth about half the length. At the south end is the entrance into the little cave, on the right of which is a subterraneous passage under the rocks, and a petrifying well. In a corner of this room is a natural seat and table, well suited for the retreat of a poet or philosopher. The perpendicular height of the north corner is 36 yards; and at about one-third of the distance from the top issues a torrent of water out of a hole in the rock, about the dimensions of the large door in a church, of sufficient body to turn several mills, and with a curvature which shows that it has had a steep descent before it appears in open day. It then falls 25 yards at a single stroke, on to the rocks at the bottom of the cave, with a noise that appals the stout-hearted. The water next takes a subterranean course for about a mile, visiting in its way the caverns of *Ginglepot* and *Hurtlepot*. A large rock, which the impetuosity of the stream has in some age rolled down, is suspended between the eyes of the spectator and the top of the cascade, like the coffin of Mahomet, at Medina, and has an excellent effect in the scene. At the bottom of the cave, covered over with a ceiling of rock 30 yards thick, is a dark chamber, where the roar of the cascade is heard in thunder. In great floods, though perhaps not oftner than of septennial occurrence, the streams from above fill the whole capacity of the cavern, and overflow its summit. *Douk Cove*, at about a mile to the south, towards the foot of Ingleborough, somewhat resembles *Weathercoat*, but is less grand and terrible. The stream of this cascade does not fall above 8 or 9 yards, but the subterranean passage out of which it issues is very curious, and by the help of a ladder may be explored. *Catknot Hole*, another of these extraordinary caves, at the foot of Gearstene, is entered by a narrow passage, under the roof of which entrance a man cannot stand erect. A quarter of a mile within the road is wider, but the roof is still low, and the passage incommodious. The rocks jut out in various directions, and are pendent in grotesque and fantastic shapes.

most of them covered with a fine coating of spar, fair as alabaster, while brilliant icicles of various shapes and colours are presented from the roof—all generated by the fine particles of stone that exist in water, which transudes through the roof and sides, and adhere to the rock in their descent. A little above the village of Selside, and about two miles from Gearstones, *Alum-pot*, a round steep cavity, in the limestone rock, about 10 yards in diameter, and of tremendous depth, is situated. The rivulet, which falls into this pit, fills a great part of its cavity with spray, and causes the spectator to shrink back with horror, when he would from the brink look into its vast abyss. Several other caves and chasms are to be found at the base of the mountains of Ingleborough and Wherside, which are of less note, but which, in the absence of the wonders above described, would be considered as great natural curiosities\*. Malham Cove and Tarn will be found described in a subsequent page.

**ELLAND**, an ancient village situated on the right bank of the river Calder, in the parish of Halifax, wap. of Morley, and honour of Pontefract; 3 miles SE. of Halifax. Population, including Greetland, 5088. The Old Hall, on the opposite

side of the Calder, is in the township of Elland, and here for many ages resided the knightly family of the Ellands, which became extinct in consequence of a deadly quarrel with the Beaumonts in the reign of Edward III. Of the tragical scenes which produced this catastrophe, an ancient ballad, aided by tradition, and confirmed by some circumstances of indisputable authority, affords the following history;—Sir John Elland, instigated by some unexplained cause of hostility, raised a body of his friends and tenantry, and placing himself at their head, sallied forth by night from the "Manor-hall," and attacked and slew Hugh of Quarmby, Lockwood of Lockwood, and Sir Robert Beaumont of Crossland, the latter of whom was torn from his wife and beheaded in the hall of his own house, and all of them were murdered in the presence of their families. On the perpetration of these sanguinary murders, the younger branches of the Beaumonts, the Quarmbys, and the Lockwoods fled into Lancashire, and found an asylum under the roofs of the Townleys and the Breretons. In that age the police of the country was unable to cope with a powerful knight and his subservient dependents, and it was not till the eldest sons of the three outraged families had grown up to manhood that retribution was sought and obtained for the blood of their parents. With this purpose the three young men placed themselves in a wood, at Cromwell-bottom, and as Sir John Elland was returning from Raistrick, they met him on a hill beneath Brook-foot, and slew him. Not satisfied with this act of justice, they determined to extirpate the name of Elland, with which sanguinary intention they placed themselves in a mill, near which the young knight with his lady and their son had to pass to the church. On the approach of the family, over the dam, the murderers rushed forth and shot an arrow through the head of the father, and wounded his only child so desperately that he died soon after in Elland-hall. The name of Elland now became extinct, and the daughter of Sir John, to whom the estates and manor descended, having contracted marriage with one of the Saviles, the property passed into that family, in whose possession it remains to the present day. The murder of the young knight and his infant son roused the town of Elland to arms, and they advanced *en masse*, to punish the murderers. For some time Beaumont, Quarmby, and Lockwood, whose arms vengeance had nerved, stood their ground and defended themselves with distinguished valour against the unequal numbers by which they were assailed, but being at length overpowered, Quarmby

fell dead on the field, and his comrades only escaped the same fate by the fleetness of their horses. Elland, at this time, was a market town under a charter granted by Edward II. and for some time it held a rivalry with Halifax, but for many ages the market has been discontinued, and it is now distinguished only as the *second* place in that extensive parish. The chapel is still parochial, and Brighouse, Raistrick, Fixby, Greetland, Old Linley, Stainland, Barkisland, Soyland, Rishworth, and Norland, are dependent upon Elland.

FARNLEY, in the borough of Leeds, the wap. of Morley, and honour of Pontefract; 4 miles W. of Leeds. This lordship anciently belonged to Sir John Danville, and passed by marriage into the family of the Nevilles; from whom it descended to the Harringtons, next to the Langtons, and then to the Danbys. Farnley-hall, now the residence of Edward Armitage, Esq. was erected, as appears from an inscription on the front, in the year 1586, by Sir William Danby. The manor and estates of Farnley, after passing by descent, devise, or marriage, in the same blood for six centuries, were sold in the year 1799, by William Danby, Esq. of Swinton Park, near Masham, to Mr. James Armitage, an opulent merchant of Leeds. After the battle of Marston Moor, in 1644, a party of flying cavaliers took post in Farnley wood, where they remained for some time, and one of their number in a work entitled "The Memoirs of a Cavalier," has given a curious account of their adventures in this place. On the restoration of the Stuarts, the recesses of Farnley wood formed a place of assembling for a number of "round heads," who declared for a "christian magistracy" and a "gospel ministry." This conspiracy obtained the name of the "Farnley Wood Plot," and here, as in the "Rye-house Plot," a person of the name of Oates, an old officer in the parliament army, seems to have been one of the leading conspirators. That the conspiracy was not of a very extensive nature may be inferred from the deposition of Ralph Oates, the son of the captain, from which it appears that the number of conspirators never exceeded thirty persons, and there is much reason to believe, that to answer political purposes more consequence was given to the affair than it deserved. Lord Clarendon, in his history of the Rebellion, says "that the object of the plotters was to seize upon the city of York;" but it appears that they were disappointed in some expected co-operation, and that before they undertook any actual service, they were seized and committed to prison. In January in 1683-4, a special commission of oyer and terminer was sent down

into Yorkshire, to try these infatuated men, when twenty-one of them were convicted and executed. The principal part of the conspirators expiated their crime and their folly at York, but in order to strike terror into the neighbourhood, three of them, namely, Robert Atkins, John Errington, and Henry Watson, were brought to Leeds, and executed on Chapeltown Moor, on the 19th of January, 1664. This monastery, with 563 acres of land, and all the liberties thereto belonging, were in the year 1540, granted to Sir Richard Gresham, Knight; after passing through the families of a succession of owners, it was sold in the year 1767, by Michael Messenger, Esq. to William Aislabie, Esq. of Studley, for £18,000. and is now enjoyed by Mrs. Lawrence, of Studley Royal.

**HACKFALL**, in the parish of Kirby-Malsard, and in the wap. of Claro, is 2 miles S. of Masham, and 7 miles NW. of Ripon. Like Fountain's Abbey, Hackfall is the property of Mrs. Lawrence, of Studley. The admirers of bold and magnificent scenery here find a rich gratification. At Studley all is art; at Hackfall all is nature. The characteristics of the two places are widely different, but they are both, in their kind, of the first order. The name of Hackfall is conjectured to be derived from *Hag* a witch, and *Fall* a descent, making together a witch's valley. How this matter may be it is difficult to determine, but many of the views presented on the declivities and from the summits of this fine deep woody glen, are unquestionably bewitching. At the entrance to the grounds a small rivulet is seen falling into two pools, from whence the water descends down a precipice, and is then seen gently gliding along the valley, till it is checked by the rocks, which form a chain of water-falls half a mile in length. Having passed the second gate to a covered seat, one of the most complete bird's-eye landscapes in nature presents itself, with a double cascade in front: beyond which is the artificial ruin of *Mowbray Castle*. A winding walk leads through a woody dingle to *Fisher's Hall*, a small octagon room built of petrifactions. Here the views are enchanting, but they must be seen to be enjoyed. At a short distance on the same walk is a *grotto*, from whence is seen a cascade falling from a height of 40 feet. The *Rustic Temple*, built of unhewn stone, near the edge of a pond, in the centre of which is a fountain, which casts a jet of water to the height of 20 feet, presents a view of a noble amphitheatre, formed by the progressive ascent of tall and spreading trees. In the same path, by the edge of the water, stands *The Hut*, where the river Ure, embosomed by the extending branches of the neighbouring oaks, winds at the feet of the visitor. An irregular walk conducts to a small building on a little knoll, called *Limehouse Hill*, from whence, over a fine bend of the river, the steeple of Masham church and part of the town appear. The path now becomes winding and rocky, and a thick grove of stately trees conducts to the *New Mount*, where the rocky valley and

woody scenery appear in great perfection, with the hills and rocks in all their native magnificence. The climax of this magnificent scenery is reserved for *Mowbray Point*, on which stands an edifice, representing an ancient ruin. Here every object is to be seen that can impart to a landscape beauty, elegance, and sublimity, the sea alone excepted. In front are Hambleton hills, with the Scar, called "The White Mare;" below which stands the town of Thirsk; Northallerton is seen to the right; York Minster to the S. E. at a distance of 30 miles, relieved in the back ground by the Wolds of the East Riding; and to the N. E. the lofty mountain, called, Roseberry Topping, presents itself at a distance of 45 miles. "Here," says Mr. Gilpin, speaking of Hackfall, "nature has wrought with her broadest pencil; the parts are ample; the composition perfectly correct; I scarce remember any where an extensive view so full of beauties, and so free from faults, as that taken from Mowbray Point. The vale of which this view is composed extends from York almost to the confines of Durham, and is certainly one of the noblest tracts of country of the kind in England."

**HAREWOOD**, (P.) in the wap. of Skyrack; 8 miles N. of Leeds; is one of the neatest and most pleasantly situated villages in England. It consists of two spacious streets, which form regular approaches to the gate-way of Harewood-house, and were uniformly re-built by the late Lord. The court leet and court baron of Harewood extends over the following townships:—Harewood, East Keswick, Wike, Wigton, Weardley, Weeton - cum - Weacohill and Dun Keswick; and, in addition to the above-named places, the parish of Harewood includes Alwoodley. There is a charter for a market to be held here every Monday, procured by Lord Strafford about the year 1633, and two annual fairs, besides a fortnight fair in summer, but this charter is now almost a dead letter. Forty years ago, there were six houses of public entertainment in this village, but now there is only one. The population of the township of Harewood is 849. The church is of great antiquity, and in an excellent state of preservation. The original edifice is supposed to have been built in the time of the Conqueror or of his successor; but the present church is of the date of Edward III. Here the remains of the pre-

prietors of Harewood, the Redmans, the Rythers, the Nevilles, and the Franks, repose under stately monuments. But the monument which most distinguishes Harewood church is that of Sir William Gascoigne, of Gawthorpe, Knight, Lord Chief Justice of England; the upright Judge, by whose coolness and intrepidity Henry V. when Prince of Wales, was committed to prison, for an insult offered to the bench. Near this monument rest the ashes of Judge Sir Thomas Dennison, who died in 1765, and whose epitaph, it is said, was the composition of Lord Mansfield. The church, which is dedicated to All Saints, is a vicarage, in the alternate gift of the Harewood family, and the Wheeler's of Ledstone, and valued in the books at £19. 8s. 4d. On the declivity of the hill, rising from the vale of Wharfe, stands an ancient and dilapidated castle, built about the same time as the original church, probably by one of the Romells. But the great object of attraction here is Harewood-house, the residence of the Earl, which, for splendour and extent, may vie with the first houses in the kingdom.—The Harewood estate was purchased from the trustees of John Boulter, Esq. the spendthrift relative of the parsimonious Sir John Cutler, about the year 1721, by Henry Lascelles, Esq. of Northallerton, some time collector of the customs at Barbadoes and burgess in parliament for Northallerton.—The purchaser of this fine domain died in the year 1783, and was succeeded by Edwin, his eldest son and heir, who in the year 1790 was created Baron Harewood, of Harewood castle. So long as there was an habitable residence for the owners of Harewood, the castle was their mansion; but it was completely dismantled long before the present family became owners of the lordship, and the first Lord Harewood, before he was created a peer, neglecting that gloomy piece of antiquity, fixed upon a site on the opposite side of the hill, above Old Gawthorpe, where he gratified his splendid taste; and at an expense probably of a hundred thousand pounds built for his family this princely Corinthian edifice, to which was given the name of Harewood-house.\* In the year 1798, his Lordship died, and was succeeded by his cousin Edward, who, on the 7th of Sept. 1812, was created an Earl. His Lordship survived his eldest son Edward 6 years, and at his death on the 4th of June, 1814, was succeeded by his second son Henry, the present Earl of Harewood.

Here is an hospital for 10 brethren and 10 sisters, endowed by Robert Holgate, 59th Archbishop of York, the inmates had formerly 12 marks each annually, and the master as much as five of them: the trustees of this institution shamefully abused their trust, and had appropriated the greatest part of the endowment to their own uses, but after a long contest in Chancery, the greatest part of the property was recovered, by which the poor pensioners rose from a state of abject poverty to affluence, having now nearly £100. a year each; the united ages of the 20 persons amount to more than 1600 years. There is here a free school endowed by the same prelate, in which many respectable characters have received their education. Pop. 963.

A commodious Methodist chapel has been erected in this village. The place is full of manufactories, some of them on a very large scale. Fortunately for the inhabitants, there is here a suite of warm and cold baths, partaking of the nature of the Harrogate sulphur waters, though by no means of the same strength. The water from the Holbeck springs is considered very salutary, both as a beverage, and for culinary purposes, and men ply the streets of Leeds with it daily in small carts, selling it to the inhabitants at a half-peenny a gallon. The steeple, which is of the ordinary height, sinks into insignificance beneath the neighbouring houses on the cliff, where the beholder looks down upon its highest pinnacle. The traveller, at his first view of this extraordinary village, is struck with astonishment at the singularity of its situation and appearance. The Rev. Robert Pope is curate; there is likewise a Methodist chapel, old connexion, and an Independent chapel, of which the Rev. John Cockin is minister. This is a place of great trade, and the principal part of the inhabitants are employed in the manufacture of woollen cloth.

In the year 1758, a very handsome episcopal chapel was erected here, upon the site of the ancient edifice, under the auspices of the Stanhope family. In the reign of Edward VI. the domain lands, late belonging to the monastery of Kirkstall, in Horsforth, were granted to Archbishop Cranmer, whose eldest son Thomas, it is believed, transferred this estate to Edward Lord Clinton, who, in the 8th of Elizabeth, sold the manor to Gabriel Green, Robert Oglethorp, Richard Pollard, John Stanhope, James Lister, and Robert Craven. The only families of these purchasers now surviving are the Stanhopes, the Pollards, and the Cravens. The Stanhopes largely contributed to the rebuilding of the chapel, and John Pollard, Esq. the representative of the name, in the year 1819, at an expense of £1500, built an iron bridge over the Aire. Besides the church chapel there are here a Methodist chapel, built in 1799, and a Baptist chapel, built in 1810. Considerable attention is paid in this village to the education of youth, and there are three Sunday Schools, each well supported by subscriptions from the congregations to which they belong. Special sessions are held here every fortnight, at the Stanhope Arms, at which the Rev James Armitage Rhodes and William Rhodes, Esq.



usually attend to administer justice. The population of this village amounts to 2824.

In this village there is an academy for the education of the students preparing for the ministry of the Independent denomination. This institution was founded in 1800, by Edward Hanson, Esq. then resident at Clapton, near London, but a native of Yorkshire.— Before his death, which happened in January, 1803, he maintained 2 students, and left by will £150 a year, as a provision for the continuance of the seminary. From its commencement it has been under the superintendence of the Rev. W. Vint, minister of the Upper Chapel, and voluntary contributions have enabled its patrons to enlarge the scale of the institution. At this period (1822) there are fifteen students, and the annual increase of the funds promises future prosperity.

**ILKLEY, (P.)** in the wap. of Skyrack; 6 miles WNW. of Otley, a place of great antiquity, and the Olicana of the Romans. The church is the funeral place of the Middleton family, and the tomb of Sir Adam de Middleton, which is of the date of 1312, stands in it. William Middleton, Esq. a descendant of that ancient house, is the lord of this and the adjoining manors of Middleton-with-Stubham, and Langber-with-Nesfield. In the church yard there are 3 ancient Saxon crosses, which Dr. Whitaker supposes were not sepulchral, but early objects of religious veneration, and that the number is in allusion to the mystery of the Trinity. The Roman fortress at Ilkley, of which the outline on three sides is still entire, is placed on a steep and lofty bank, overlooking the river Wharf; and the original altar to Verbeia, the nymph of the Wharf, is still in existence at Middleton Lodge, though time has effaced the inscription. Olicana had its summer camps and out-posts, which appear on the surrounding heights. They are three in number, and have the names of Castleberg, Counterhill and Woofa Bank. Ilkley is much frequented in the summer, for the benefit of its cold spring, which issues from the sides of a high hill overlooking the village, and the bath is deemed highly salutary in relaxed and scorbutic cases. **Ingleborough**, in the parishes of Bentham, Horton & Clapham, wap. of Staincliffe; 10 miles SE. of Settle, a mountain 3987 feet above the level of the sea. From the summit of Ingleborough, the country with its roads, rivers, towns and villages, capes and bays, may be seen like a large map stretched under the eye of the observer to a distance of 40, 50, and 60 miles. The immense lime-stone base on which this mountain stands is between 20 and 30 miles in circumference. The rise in some places is even and gradual, whilst in others, as to the N. and W. it is rugged and almost perpendicular. The top is plain and horizontal, being almost a mile round, having the ruins of an old wall upon it. On the western edge there is the remains of a beacon about 4 yards high, ascended by steps; and which may be seen over a vast tract of country. Though Wharfedale is higher than Ingleborough, yet the top of the latter mountain, from its situation, is the first land that the sailors descry in their voyage from Dublin to Lancaster, and it is seen when they are 30 miles at sea.

**KIRKHEATON, (P.)** in the wap. of Agbrigg, and honour of Pontefract; 3 miles NE. of Huddersfield. The first race of mens lords who appear in this place bore the name of De Heton, but the manor has long been in the Beaumont family, whose mansion is Whitley Hall, and whose burying place, as the numerous monuments erected to their memory show, is Kirkheaton church. In the church-yard a handsome monumental column is erected, to commemorate the premature fate of 17 poor children, interred in one grave at this place, who fell victims to a dreadful fire, in the factory of Mr. Thomas Atkinson, at Colne Bridge, on the 17th of February, 1818. A yew tree, which has survived eighteen generations of men, and which is of the extraordinary dimensions of 20 feet 9 inches in circumference, above the grains, stands in the church yard. The living

is a rectory, of which the Rev. John Smithson, A. M. of Headingley, is the incumbent. Population, 2186.

*Kirkhouse Green,* in the parish of Kirkbramwith, wap. of Osgoldcross, and honour of Pontefract; 4 miles W. of Thorne.

**KIRKLEES HALL,** in the parish of Dewsbury, wap. of Agbrigg, and manor of Wakefield: 4½ miles N. of Huddersfield.—This interesting portion of the township of Hartshead is chiefly memorable as the site of a nunnery, founded in the reign of Henry II. by one of the Reyners, for Benedictines. The nunnery was situated on the verge to the south of a deep brook, hence called Nunbrook; and though only one fragment of the house remains among the numerous buildings of a large arm yard, yet the outline diligently pursued shows that the establishment must have been of considerable extent. The tomb of Elizabeth de Stainton, and another, protected by iron-rails, which still remain, point out the situation of the church, and it is ascertained that the nave, transept, and choir, must have

been at least 150 feet long. Kirklees is also famous as the occasional residence and sepulchre of that ancient archer and freebooter, Robin Hood, who lived in the beginning of the thirteenth century, and who, according to tradition, was suffered to bleed to death by a nun, to whom he had applied to take from him a portion of his redundant blood. That such a character existed the testimony of Piers Plouhman appears to decide, whether he was, as the epitaph preserved by Dr. Gale, Dean of York, imports, of noble parentage, or an outlaw of humbler birth, is not equally clear, but that his mortal remains rest at Kirklees, under an ancient cross, and beyond the precincts of the nunnery, is generally admitted. The cross bears no inscription, but the epitaph may have been engraved upon a tomb-stone, which has ceased to exist: it is in these words:—

“ Hear, undernead dis latil stean,  
Lais Robert, Earl of Huntington;  
Nea arcir vir as him sa geud,  
An pipi kauld him Robin Heud;  
Sick utlaus as hi, an is men,  
Vil luglande nivr si agen;  
Obit 24, Kal. Dekembris, 1247.”

A statue of this renowned freebooter, large as life, leaning on his unbent bow, with a quiver of arrows and a sword by his side, formerly stood at one side of the entrance into the old hall. In the 1st of Elizabeth, Kirklees became the property of Robert Pilkington, and in the 8th of that reign it was transferred to John Armytage, in whose family it has continued to the present day. Till the time of James I. the site of the priory was the family residence, but in that reign they removed to the present more airy mansion, which is now occupied by Sir George Armytage, Bart.

In the spring of the year 1820, the tomb of the outlaw of the 13th century formed one of the places of rendezvous for a popular sedition, better suited to the age of the Henries than of the Georges. The manufacturing parts of the country had for many months laboured under extreme distress, from a failure, both foreign and domestic, in the usual demand for the products of their industry. The labouring classes in consequence experienced severe privations, and a disposition to tumult and insubordination began to prevail. On the night of Friday, the 31st of March, a simultaneous rising was appointed to take place in many of the populous villages by which Huddersfield is surrounded, and a plan of approach from various points, for the purpose of capturing the town and giving a signal of successful rebellion, by

stopping the stage coaches, was organised, and partly carried into effect. Towards the hour of midnight, considerable bodies of men marched from the different villages to their appointed stations, Huddersfield forming the centre and point of attack. The eastern division *divouaced* near the obelisk at Kirk-  
lees, and committed some excesses on two or three persons, who were travelling in that direction; from some cause not well ascertained, but probably from the detected treachery of their instigators, the insurgents not only here, but at all the other stations, dispersed suddenly, and returned to their homes without making their intended hostile attack. The itinerant emissaries, of which here were numbers passing about the country, represented this as a premature movement, to remedy which, the night of the Wednesday following was appointed for the breaking out of the grand rebellion, and Grange Moor, a large plain, centrally situated between Huddersfield and Barnsley, was the appointed place of rendezvous. A number of infatuated men, principally from the town and neighbourhood of Barnsley, many of them workmen out of employment, and none above the rank of labourers, repaired to the moor in the course of the night. After waiting till morning in anxious expectation of the approach of a triumphant army, which they had been led to believe was advancing from the north on its route to London, they began to disperse, and their movements were considerably quickened by the appearance of a body of the king's troops from Huddersfield. As soon as the first alarm had subsided, several of the insurgents, both in the neighbourhood of Huddersfield and Barnsley, to the number of twenty-two, were apprehended and committed to York castle, where they were arraigned for high treason, at the summer assizes, and charged with conspiring, or intending to levy war against the king. On Monday, the 11th of September, an adjourned assize was held for the purpose of proceeding with the trials of these prisoners, but during the evening of the preceding day, an offer had been made to them by the authority of the law officers of the crown, to the effect that if they would consent to plead guilty of the charge preferred against them their lives should be spared, and the sentence of death which must be passed upon them, commuted to some more lenient punishment. Comative, a disbanded soldier, and one of the heroes of Waterloo, who appears to have been the leader of the Barnsley division, and whose fate, had the trials proceeded, seemed inevitable, exerted himself with great vigour and success to obtain the acquiescence of his fellow-prison-

ers in this proposal, which was in the end unanimously acceded to. The prisoners, on being placed at the bar, all pleaded guilty, and the final decision of the crown was, that they should all, without exception or discrimination, be transported beyond the seas for the term of seven years.

**KIRKSTALL**, in the borough of Leeds, and wap. of Skyrack, a pleasantly situated hamlet on the banks of the river Aire; 3 miles W. of Leeds. Kirkstall is celebrated for its Abbey, which deservedly ranks amongst the first monastic ruins in the kingdom. Antiquaries, Topographers and Painters, have all conspired to exhaust this subject. Henry de Lacy, in order to redeem a religious vow made in sickness, assigned over his township of Barnoldswick, in Craven, for the purpose of erecting and endowing a monastery. The building being finished in 1147, Alexander, prior of Fountain's abbey, was ordained abbot. The inhabitants, whom many of the monks had displaced, considered them as invaders, and the hostility became so inveterate that the abbot pulled down the church and transferred the religious foundation to Kirkstall, where Selth, the superior of a small order of brethren, had already taken up his station. Here the abbot built a church in honour of the blessed virgin, and on the 19th of May, 1159, he brought over his monks from their former house to take up their residence at Kirkstall. A variety of benefactors endowed this abbey at various times with large donations, and the community became so large and opulent that at the visitation, in the year 1301, the monastery possessed 216 draught oxen, 160 cows, 152 yearlings and bullocks, 90 calves, and 4000 sheep and lambs. On the 22d of November, 1540, the house was dissolved, at which time, according to Speed, its revenues were of the annual value of £512. 13s. 4d. As we have seen, Alexander of Fountain's was the first abbot, and John Ripley was the last. On the dissolution, the site was granted by Henry VIII. to Thomas Cranmer, Archbishop of Canterbury, but it was afterwards alienated to Peter Hammond and others, and the Earl of Cardigan is the present proprietor. It is remarkable that this stately building, having been the last in this country that arrived to its full perfection and beauty, was amongst the first visited and destroyed at the dissolution. To describe a ruin on which description has already been exhausted, is an useless labour; but Gent's sketch of the dismantled abbey is so correct and spirited, that an extract from it may be acceptable. "The stately gate north-west of the abbey, (as may appear by the magnificent arches on each side

through which they were once used to pass into a spacious plain, at the west end of the church; the crystal river Aire incessantly running by with a murmuring noise; the walls of the edifice built after the manner of a cross, having nine pillars on each side from east to west, besides three at each end; the stately reverential aisles in the whole church; the places for six altars, on each side of the high altar, as appears by the stone-pots for holy water; the burial place for the monks on the south side (near the palace) now made an orchard; the arched chamber leading to the cemetery, next the church, in the walls of which are yet to be seen several large stone coffins; the dormitory, yet more south-east, with other cells and offices; all these are enough to furnish the contemplative soul with the most serious meditations. The abbey now is only a mere shell with roofless walls, having yet a well-built, but uncovered steeple, (part of this steeple has since fallen) the eastern parts embraced by its ivy, and all about the whole pile desolate, solitary and forlorn." Within the last few years considerable improvements have been made in the grounds at Kirkstall bridge, by Sir James Graham, Bart. the lessee under the Earl of Cardigan, and time, which is slowly, but steadily diminishing the ruin, is adding rapidly to the beauty of its approaches.

**KNOTROP**, in the borough of Leeds, wap. of Skyrack, and honour of Pontefract; a very pleasant village, situated about a mile and a half from the south-eastern extremity of Leeds, and near to the banks of the Aire, sheltered from the cold winds of the north by a gently rising hill of considerable height, at the foot of which it lies. Here was an ancient mansion belonging to the family of the Baynes, one of whom represented the town of Leeds in parliament, in the time of the commonwealth: when it was built is not known: but the little of it that remains is in the most antique style; it is occupied as tenements. In an adjoining garden, now in the occupation of Mr. Joshua Major, are gravestones with Latin epitaphs, but too much defaced to be decyphered. The place where they are seen was once a burial ground belonging to the early Quakers, being converted to that use by a gentleman of the name of Stables, who possessed this estate. The epitaphs are doubtless of more ancient date. This village is now almost wholly inhabited by gardeners, to whom Leeds market affords a ready sale for their productions.

**KNOTTINGLEY**, in the parish of Pontefract, wap. of Osgoldcross, and honour of Pontefract; 1 mile E. of Ferrybridge. A very extensive village situated on the banks of the river Aire, which has been long noted for its great production of limestone. A canal is forming by the proprietors of the navigation, commencing at Knot-

tingly, to be continued to Goole, a distance of near 17 miles, which will in its course pass near Hut Green, Egborough, Heck, Pollington, and New Bridge, where will be a lock to open into the Dutch river, and then pass by the grounds of Lord Downe, to Goole, where it opens into the Ouse. The church is a chapel of ease to Pontefract, but has all the rites of burial and marriage services, &c. done at it; there are also, a Methodist chapel, and likewise a Calvinist place of worship. Pop. 3753.

The hall here was the seat of the Withams, for divers successions, till Henry Witham, Esq. sold it to Sir Thomas Wentworth, afterwards Earl of Strafford, who made it a stately mansion: his son William sold it to Sir John Lewis, who made great improvements in the house, gardens and park; from whose family it passed by marriage to that of Hastings, Earls of Huntington, and thence to that of Rawden, Earls of Moira. On the 20th of September, 1806, their Royal Highnesses the Prince of Wales and Duke of Clarence, with their suite, arrived at Ledstone, on a visit to Michael Angelo Taylor, Esq. then residing there. Christopher Wilson, Esq. is the present occupier of the hall. Ledaham and Ledstone are adjoining hamlets, the family mansion, as has been described, is at the latter, and the parish church at the former. The church is chiefly remarkable as the place of interment of Lady Elizabeth Hastings, of pious memory. A stately monument, afterwards augmented by the statues of her two sisters, records, in elegant Latin, the character of this ornament to her sex.— Her own figure is placed on a sarcophagus reclining, and reading a book of devotion, and the countenance, which is a portrait, handsome and spirited. Lady Frances and Lady Ann Hastings are placed on pedestals at the side, and are represented with the attributes of Piety and Prudence.

lation 4259. Here the Neviles had for many ages a manor, park, and principal mansion. Of the latter, which, from its architecture, carries us back to the age of Henry VII., sufficient remains to show that it has been a noble house, with a centre and two wings—

In modern times the most remarkable event in the history of this township relates to those unhappy disturbances which took place in some of the manufacturing districts of the kingdom, in the year 1812, and which had for their object to put down by violence and intimidation the use of certain machines, used in the manufactures, which diminished, for a time at least, the demand for manual labour. These commotions first broke out in Nottinghamshire, about the close of the year 1811, and were there directed against the use of machines used in the fabrication of lace and hosiery; and early in 1812 they spread into Yorkshire, where machines for the dressing of woollen cloth were attacked. The lawless system under which the workmen in these branches of business acted was called *Luddism*, and an imaginary personage styled *General*, alias *Ned Lud*, was their reputed commander. To effect the destruction of machinery, and to attack the buildings in which it was contained, fire arms became necessary, hence bands of men confederated for the purpose, and bound by illegal oaths, were found prowling through the disturbed districts by night, rousing the inhabitants from their beds, and demanding the arms provided for the defence of their dwellings. In the West Riding several mills were entered by night, and the shears, employed in the dressing of woollen cloth by the new system, broken and destroyed. Amongst the latest and most desperate attacks of this kind was that made upon the mill of Mr. William Cartwright, at a place called Rawfolds, in the parish of Liversedge. For this hostile visit, which Mr. Cartwright had anticipated, he stood prepared, and had for several weeks taken up his lodgings in the mill, the doors of which were by night strongly barricaded. On the night of Saturday the 11th of April, 1812, the long meditated assault was made. A considerable body of men, to the number of some hundreds, principally, but not wholly cloth dressers by trade, having assembled in a field at Kirkclees, marched in companies, some of them armed with pistols, others with hatchets, and others with bludgeons, and many of them unprovided with any weapon whatever. On their arrival at Rawfolds, a little after midnight, they instantly commenced a furious attack upon the mill, which Mr. Cartwright, supported by four of his own workmen and five soldiers,

met by a vigorous and well sustained discharge of musketry. In the course of the engagement, several desperate attempts were made to break down the doors and force a way into the mill, but none of them proved successful, and after a conflict of twenty minutes, in which two of the assailants were killed and a considerable number wounded, they withdrew in confusion, leaving the gallant little garrison masters of the field.\*—Crime and violence are often progressive, and often rapid in their gradations. The first intention of the Luddites was simply to destroy an obnoxious piece of machinery; the next step was nocturnal plunder for arms; this was followed by the assembling of a sort of insurrectionary army; and after the defeat at Rawfolds, George Mellor, the General Lud of the district, announced to his infatuated followers that the system of operations must be changed, and that instead of attacking the mills, they must shoot the masters. The first victim marked out for assassination was Mr. William Horsfall, a considerable manufacturer at Marsden, by whom a quantity of the obnoxious machinery was employed. Mr. Horsfall, it appears, had expressed himself in strong terms against the delusions under which the workmen laboured, and was probably, on this account, selected out for destruction. To effect the diabolical purpose, George Mellor, William Thorpe, Thomas Smith, and Benjamin Walker, being each of them provided with pistols, repaired in the afternoon of Tuesday the 28th of April, to a small plantation near Crosland Moor, on the way from Huddersfield to Marsden, and as Mr. Horsfall returned from the market, about six o'clock in the afternoon, two of the assassins discharged their pistols, and inflicted upon him a number of wounds, of which he languished till the morning of the Thursday following, when he expired. Crimes so atrocious nerve the retributive arm of justice; under a vigorous system of police, established by a neighbouring magistrate, † sixty-six persons were, in the course of the year, apprehended and committed to the county gaol, on various charges connected with these disturbances, and in the January following, a Special Commission of oyer and terminer was held at York, for the purpose of trying the of-

fenders. The proceedings of the court were of the most solemn and impressive kind.—Eighteen of the prisoners, including three of the murderers of Mr. Horsfall, were capitally convicted, and seventeen of them were executed. Of the others, six of them were convicted of simple felony, and transported for seven years, and the remainder were either liberated on bail or acquitted. So terrible an example extinguished every vestige of Luddism, and from that time to the present not one act of popular excess has been committed in the county on account of the use of machinery in the manufacture of woollens.

This village is pleasantly situated on the declivity, but towards the foot of a large range of steep and craggy mountains. Nature has here put on her boldest front. The first object that claims the attention of the visitor is *Malham-cow*, not a cave, for it has properly nothing of the cave about it. It is a fine amphitheatre of perpendicular limestone rocks, stretched in the shape of a segment of a circle across the valley, 286 feet high in the centre. The rocks are piled stratum upon stratum, and a small brook springs out at the bottom, which usually flows in a narrow subterranean



an passage, but in the time of floods the vomitary is not of sufficient capacity to discharge the waters, which rise up to the summit of the rock, and pour down in a stupendous cataract, superior in depth, and little inferior in grandeur to the falls of Niagara. On the east side of the village, at the distance of nearly a mile from the Cove, and of an equal altitude with it, is the mass of limestone rock, cleft asunder by some mighty convulsion of nature, called *Gordale*. The view of this "marble jaw'd" chasm, from the western bank, is awfully sublime, and the natural arch under which the water passes imparts an august effect to the romantic scene. To add to this accumulation of phenomena, a fine lake of clear water, contained in a natural stone basin, three miles in circumference, has been formed upon the moor, which has obtained the name of *Malham Tarn*. The tarn, which, in the dialect of the country, imports a small lake, is stocked with an inexhaustible store of trout and perch of unusual size, and of delicious flavour. This lake may be considered as the source of the Aire, which bursting in an abundant torrent from amongst the noblest rocks in England, instantly declines into an insignificant stream, but in its course towards the sea becomes one of the principal rivers of Yorkshaire.

**METHLEY, (P.)** in the wap. of Agbrigg, and honour of Pontefract; 5 miles NW. of Ferrybridge; contains a population of 1499 souls. This place is of considerable antiquity, and we learn from Domesday-book, that Osulph and Cnut, the two Saxon proprietors before the Conquest, were expelled from it, to make room for Iibert de Lacy, the great Norman Lord; subsequently the manor was granted to the hospital of St. Nicholas, of Pontefract, in the reign of Henry IV. by whom it was exchanged with Sir John Waterton for certain advowsons. By this bargain the Watertons became seised of Methley, and probably built the manor-house, which was completely and uniformly rebuilt by Baron Savile. The church of Methley was in existence at the time of the Domesday survey; it is a living in charge, valued in the King's Books at £25. 8s. 6jd. and it is in the patronage of the Duchy of Lancaster; for though the manor was alienated by the Lacies, the advowson did not pass under the grant. The chantry contains many monuments of exquisite workmanship and in good preservation, of which the following are the principal—The first is of "Robert Waterton and Cicely his wife." Opposite is another tomb of alabaster, with two recumbent figures, male and female, without inscription, but with armorial bearings, which about this to be the grave of Lionel Lord Welles, who fell in the battle of Towton-field. Between these two monuments is a magnificent tomb, commemorating the founder of the present family, Sir John Savile, of Bradley and of Methley, Baron of the Exchequer. On the north side of the choir is a stately monument by Scheemakers, to the memory of Charles Savile, Esq.; and opposite to this is the latest in the series, a sumptuous monument to the first Earl of Mexbrough. But the greatest antiquity about the church is a statue of King Oswald, the patron Saint, over the South door, far more ancient than any part of the present edifice, and probably contemporary with the foundation of the church and parish. Methley-park, the stately residence of the Earl of Mexbrough, is admired for its beautiful scenery; but the recent death of the Countess, who was the life and ornament of the place, has cast over it a gloom that time alone can dissipate. Methley stands upon the banks of the Calder, about a mile from Castleford, where that river unites with and is merged in the Aire, and hence the sprightly distich:

"Castleford women must needs be fair,  
"Because they wash in both Calder & Aire."

**MIRFIELD**, (P.) in the wap. of Agbrigg and honour of Pontefract; 3 miles SW. of Dewsbury. Population 5041. *Moorfield* or *Mirfield* probably forms the etymology of this place. The river Calder runs through the middle of the parish, *Mirfield* being on the north and *Hopton* on its southern bank. Up to the year 1261, *Mirfield* formed a part of the Saxon parish of Dewsbury, and the cause of its separation, as appears from a Latin MS. in Hopkinson's Collection of Documents is curious: It happened, says the ancient story, that as the Lady of Sir John Heton, the Baroness of *Mirfield*, was going to mass before dawn, on Christmas day, to the Parish Church, (of Dewsbury) at a distance of 3 miles, that she was way-laid and robbed and her principal attendant murdered, at a place called Ravensbrook-layne. On the same day, while she was at dinner, at nine o'clock in the morning, that being then the fashionable hour, two mendicant Ecclesiasties, came to crave her charity, telling her at the same time

that they were going to Rome, where her husband, Sir John, was then residing. On this intimation she sat down and wrote a letter to her husband, narrating to him the horrid scene she had so recently witnessed, and begging of him to make interest with the Pope to erect the chapel of *Mirfield* into a parochial church, that the inhabitants might no longer be exposed to the dangers she had encountered on the way to their parish church. This letter she confided to the Priests, who duly delivered it to the Knight, and whose suit was so successful, that his Holiness elevated *Mirfield* into a rectory, and bestowed the patronage of the church upon Sir John Heton and his posterity. Sir John's first care was to confer the living upon his younger brother, whose name was also John, and by whom the rectory-house was built, about the year 1300. The church of *Mirfield* was afterwards appropriated to the endowment of the nunnery at Kirkstiles, and formed the best part of its revenue. On the dissolution of that religious house, in 1540, it was granted to Thomas Saville, of Clifton, gent. and after passing through a number of families was purchased by the Armytages, and Sir George Armytage is now the impropriator and patron. The rectory of *Mirfield*, though let half a century ago for two hundred guineas a year, was estimated in 1540, at no more than £6. 6s. 8d. *Mirfield*, it appears, has given birth to a bishop as well as to several cavaliers, and John Hopton, the bishop of Norwich, in the reign of Queen Mary, was born at *Blake-Hall*, and resided alternately at that place, and at *Armley*, near Leeds. The plague, with which England was visited towards the middle of the 17th century, extended its ravages to *Mirfield*, and the parish register records, that no fewer than 134 of the inhabitants were swept off by that malady, between the middle of July and the end of October, 1631. At the west end of the church is a conical mount, erected by the Saxons, and intended as a place of defence to the manor house of the Lords. Immediately adjoining to this hill is the mansion successively occupied by the *Mirfields*, the *Hetons*, the *Beaumonts*, and the *Armytages*, and which is still called *Castle-Hall*. The date of this edifice is not well ascertained. That feeling which induces us to give to persons and to things which are ancient a higher degree of antiquity than belongs to them, carries the *Castle-Hall* back to the time of Canute, and finds inscribed upon it 1022. Persons less inclined to the marvellous, read the date 1522; but, if, as is supposed, it was the residence of Sir John Heton, the founder of the parochial church, higher antiquity than the sixteenth century

belongs to it; and this opinion is countenanced by the following metrical epitome of the history of Mirfield, transcribed by the Rev. Joseph Ismay, from an ancient manuscript:

"In time of yore a knight did dwell,  
At Castle-Hall, near Chapel Well;  
And Sir John Heton was his name,  
A worthy baron, great in fame;  
Lord of this town, as story tells,  
When Chapel stood at Chapel-wells;  
He got this church parochial made,  
And the foundations of it laid  
In the same place where now it stands  
Upon a part of his own lands;  
Behind the house a mount appears  
A lasting monument of years;  
It was erected by the Danes  
And piled up with wonderous pains,  
A Saxon lord possessed the same  
Before the Norman princes came;  
The Normans, next, possession took,  
As doth appear by Domesday book;  
The Beaumonts did the place command  
When Harry Tudor ruled the land,  
The house rebuilt, which ages stood,  
And front adorned with carved wood  
By Thomas B.\* the owner's name,  
Who lived and died in the same.  
Bells to the church the living call,  
And to the grave they summon all;  
And when, by death one gets a fall,  
He's neighbour, then, to Castle Hall."<sup>†</sup>

Mirfield is now principally distinguished as one of the favourite seats of the woollen manufacture, and as a centre of this staple trade. It is a fertile, opulent, and delightfully situated village, and from its ancient history, and present respectability, is well entitled to a somewhat elaborate notice.

one of the chief towns in the wapentake of Agbrigg and Morley, but it is now only known as a populous clothing village, containing 3039 souls. At the time of the Domesday survey, Morley had a parish church, but it was reduced by Robert de Lacy to the dependant state of a chapel to Batley soon after the conquest. In the time of Charles I. this chapel ceased to be an episcopal place of worship, and was leased out by Savile, Earl of Sussex, for 500 years, to a number of trustees of the Presbyterian persuasion, and ever since that time it has been used as a dissenting place of worship, formerly by the Unitarians, but latterly by the Calvinistic dissenters. Morley is said to exhibit the only instance, throughout England or Wales, of an ancient established place of worship which was not restored to the established church, at the restoration of the Stuarts. Still it retains much of the form of the church, and has a choir and two side aisles, supported upon wooden posts, instead of columns, "but," says the late Dr. Whitaker, "marking the hands into which it has fallen, by sectarian frugality and indigence." The Doctor should rather have said, exhibiting the distinction which often exists in villages, between places of worship which are supported and upheld by private contributions and those which derive their supplies from the public purse.

A piece of painted glass yet remains here, representing a king with a crown, a sword, and a shield, bearing the arms of the kingdom of East Angles: and on the 20th of August, 1774, a gold coin of Justinian, weighing 21 grains, was found at this place.

This village is beautifully situated in a fertile valley, partly in the township of Barkisland, and partly in the township of Soyland. The church, dedicated to St. Bartholomew, is a neat and commodious structure in the Tuscan order of architecture: it is a chapel of ease to Elland, for the three contiguous townships of Barkisland, Soyland, and Rishworth. In the church yard are several tomb-stones cut with great taste and neatness, by the celebrated John Collier, who, under the fictitious name of *Tim Bobbin*, was the author of the well known and facetious work, *The Lancashire Dialect*. This church is also remarkable for being sur-

rounded with one of the finest yew hedges in England, cut according to the fashion of other times, in the form of Saxon arches. But the most remarkable event connected with this place is the great inundation which happened on the 18th of May, 1792, and which has been called *Ripponden flood*. Between the hours of three and five in the afternoon, the water rose seven yards perpendicular, and bore down in its course several bridges, mills, and a number of houses; many persons also lost their lives on this melancholy occasion. The church was very much damaged, part of the church yard washed away, the graves laid open, and a coffin was lodged in a tree at a considerable distance. The injury at that time sustained by the ancient edifice created the necessity for a new chapel, which was built soon after the flood.

The site was granted to William Ramsden and Thomas Vavasour. These ruins stand at a short distance from the western extremity of Sandbeck park, and the grounds were greatly improved by the late Earl of Scarborough. Stately trees are growing amidst the ruins, which, with the lake in the valley and the bold contiguous scenery, present a picture inexpressibly charming, especially when viewed with the light and shade they receive from a western sun. The building is much dilapidated. Time has committed many ravages, and men have aggravated the spoliation. All the remains of this venerable structure are, one side of the nave of the church under the middle tower, and some detached arches. The stone of which the abbey was built was dug out of the celebrated quarry nearly adjoining, and is well known to masons and builders by the name of Roach Abbey stone.

This forest, now nearly enclosed, is said to have been one of the haunts of the renowned free-booter whose name is given to the well. Barnsdale is also remarkable for being the place where king Henry VIII. in his progress to York, in the year 1541, was met by the archbishop and 300 of his clergy, who on their knees presented him with £600.

On the right side of the choir door was interred under a stone, now decayed, "James Boswell, the king of the gipsies, who died on the 30th of January, 1708." This is the first name mentioned in the present parish register. For a number of years it was a custom among the gipsies to pay annual visits to his tomb, where they performed various ceremonies, one of which was to pour a flagon of ale upon his grave. The Lacies, to whom it belonged as a dependency upon the castle of Pontefract, had a castle or manor house near the church, of which a mass of strong grout-work yet remains. The church of Rothwell is dedicated to the Holy Trinity, and was appropriated to the priory of Nostal, to which it must have been given by one of the Lacies. It is a discharged living, valued in the books at £41. 18s. 10d. The great tithes with the advowson of the vicarage were sold by Humphrey Mildmay and Thomas Crompton, to George Earl of Salop, in the 31st of Elizabeth. After several intermediate descents, they were sold by the executors of Edward Wortley Montague, Esq. to Charles Brandling, Esq. of Middleton, for £16,000, and the patronage of the living is now in that family. The vicar is

the Rev. Ralph Brandling, A.M. Rothwell Haigh or Haye, so called from the pale with which it was surrounded, was, like Roundhay, an ancient park of the Lacies. It afterwards descended to the house of Lancaster; and subsequently relapsed into a state of nature. It contains 643 acres, and is now a fertile and productive tract on the surface, but its principal value is below the soil, and its coal mines, which were worked for many years by the Fenton family, and are now in the hands of Messrs. J. and J. Charlesworth, are of great value. Lord Stourton is the proprietor of these mines, but the manor of Rothwell and Rhodes belongs to John Blaydes, Esq. of Oulton. Population, including Rothwell Haigh and Rhodes Green, 2155. Rothwell is the only parish between Leeds and Wakefield.

**SANDAL MAGNA**, (P.) wap. of Agbrigg, manor of Wakefield, and honour of Pontefract. Sandal is chiefly remarkable for

its ancient castle, built in the reign of Edward II. about the year 1320, by John Plantagenet, the last Earl of Warren, as a residence for his favourite mistress, Maude de Nerford, the lady of the unfortunate Thomas Earl of Lancaster. (See page 422.) In the reign of Edward III. Edward Balliol resided here while an army was raised to establish him on the throne of Scotland. The castle afterwards became the property of Richard Plantagenet, Duke of York, who was slain in the battle of Wakefield, in the year 1460; and it was for some time the residence of his son Richard, Duke of Gloucester, afterwards Richard III. The last siege sustained by this castle was in the civil wars of Charles I. when it was held by Colonel Bonivant, for the King, till it surrendered to the arms of Parliament, in October 1645. In the following year it was dismantled by order of Parliament, and is now a diminutive ruin, little more than sufficient to mark the site where stood this ancient manor house of Wakefield. Great part of the nave and transept are standing, and the choir and chapter-house are yet traceable by their foundations; but the gateway is converted into a cottage, and in the walls of the adjoining houses are several well cut shields, exhibiting the arms of Percy, Lacy, Tempest, Hamerton, &c. The manor and demesnes belong at present to the Right Hon. Lord Grantham. Population of the village (including Tosside) 561.

The remains of the castle extend 45 yards from north to south, and 16 from east to west. The hall, which has been a most magnificent room, is 75 feet in length, and 34 in breadth. After the battle of Towton, so fatal to the Lancasterians, and in which the Earl of Northumberland, and Sir Charles Percy, his brother, were slain, their estates were laid

waste by the enraged conquerors; this mansion was dismantled, and reduced from a princely palace to an heap of ruins. The church, situated in the centre of the village, is an ancient structure; the living is a rectory, under the patronage of the Earl of Egremont. There is here likewise a good stone built chapel, for the use of the Methodists. Population, 895.

ality no actual assemblage of houses constitu-  
ting a village which is called Stanley. Over-  
thorpe is a straggling hamlet in this town-  
ship, and consists chiefly of farmers; but  
Wrenthorpe is the hive, the inhabitants of  
which are principally employed in the wool-  
len manufacture. Wrenthorpe is a corruption  
of Warrenthorpe, a name derived from the  
once powerful lords of the manor of Wake-  
field, and the name has suffered a still fur-  
ther deterioration, and is now popularly  
called *Potovers*. The population of this  
township has been greatly increased by the  
inclosure of the Outwood, from whence the  
timber was principally obtained for the or-  
iginal *wooden walls* of Wakefield, but which  
at the time of the inclosure had not upon it  
a single timber tree. Considerable as has  
been the increase of population, the paro-  
chial rates have still more increased; in  
1672 they amounted annually to £51. 11s. in  
1725 to £73. 12s. in 1731 to £105. 9s. 2d.  
and in 1817 to £2698. 0s. 3d. In diminution  
of the parochial imposts, Mr. Richard  
Taylor, of Sandall, left by will, lands in  
Thornes, which now produces £60. per an-  
num. The commissioners for the inclosure  
of the wastes awarded the sum of £5666. 13s.  
4d. to the townships in the parish of Wake-  
field, for the reparation of their roads, of  
which sum £1133. 6s. 8d. was adjudged to  
Stanley-cum-Wrenthorpe, and a like sum to  
Alverthorpe-with-Thornes. The inclosure of  
the wastes, which amounted to 2200 acres.

afforded to the freeholders of the parish of Wakefield an opportunity of exonerating themselves from the payment of small tithes, which they very prudently availed themselves of by allotting to the vicar a quantity of land, which, previous to the present reduction in agricultural produce, was of the value of from 6 to £700. a year, though vicar Arnott, before this arrangement, declined to vote for a registrar, on the ground that he could not make oath, that his income from small tithes was worth a hundred a year. The great, or restoral tithes of the parish have also been purchased, and are in the hands of six lay-pay improprators. Tithe on hay has some time been claimed here, but it appears that the proprietors of the tithes, in their printed rental of 1763, considered hay as subject to a modus of only one shilling per acre. Here is the field of action celebrated in ancient song, where the battle was fought between Robin Hood, Scarlet, and Little John, with the Pinder of Wakefield, "All on the green;" and the field is called Pinder's field to this day. Passing from small things to large, here too the Romans had a station, and the great mass of moulds and roman coins referred to at page 420 in this work were found in the township of Stanley. The road expenditure in the township of Stanley has been subject to great fluctuations: in 1812 it amounted to £1153. 14s. 6d. of which £788. 6s. 6½d. was for law charges! In 1813 the law expenses amounted to £307. 1s. 6½d. and in 1814, the total amount of expenditure was reduced to £358. 1s. 10½d. none of which last mentioned sum was expended in the courts, but all upon the roads.

In the domesday survey this place is called Newhusum, and a settlement of Knights Templar here, so early as 1181, gave it the additional name of Temple. Temple Newsam is connected with several important historical events:—the order of Knights Templar was established in the early part of the 12th century, by Baldwin II. king of Jerusalem, for the defence of the Holy Sepulchre, and the protection of Christian pilgrims. Their name was derived from the vicinity of their house to the temple; and for some time they were strict in their religious observances, and exemplary in their moral conduct. After the ruin of Jerusalem they spread themselves over Europe, and acquired by their valour and their fame immense riches. Among other benefactions conferred upon them, William de Villers presented to the English Knights Templar the manor of Newhusum, where they soon after founded a preceptory. Riches begat luxury—luxury vice—& vice infamy.\* They sunk in public estimation; their privileges, which were numerous, were withdrawn from them, and the members of their order were subjected to the most terrible circumstances of infamy and severity. In 1311 the order was suppressed by the Council of Vienne, and their dispersion followed soon after.—Their revenues were in general bestowed upon other orders, and the rival fraternity, the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, became in general the inheritors of their revenues, as well as of their former fame. Temple Newsam, however, never fell into the hands of the Hospitalers, but was granted by Edward III. to Sir John Darcy. In this line it descended to Thomas Lord Darcy, who, in the reign of Henry VIII. was beheaded, and his estates forfeited to the crown, for joining the northern insurgents, denominated the *Pilgrims of Grace*, in their unsuccessful attempt to compel Henry to restore the dissolved monasteries. After the death of Lord Darcy, the manor of Temple Newsam was granted to Matthew, Earl of Lenox, who resided here at the birth of his son Henry Lord Darnley, the unfortunate husband of Mary Queen of Scots, and the re-

\* A more striking proof of the degradation into which these defenders of the Holy Sepulchre had sunk cannot well be found than in a species of defence offered for them (by Dr. Whitaker: about a century ago an ancient cup, belonging to the Templars was found at Temple Newsam, bearing a licentious inscription, which the Doctor very justly observes, “serves to vindicate the Knights of this house from the most odious part of the charge preferred against them.”

puted father of James I. Darnley's union with that princess is a tragedy. Mary, allured at first by his youth and exterior accomplishments, took a pleasure in exalting him, and granted him the title of King. The ardour of her love soon abated; and David Rizzio, an Italian musician, became the royal favourite. Roused to fury by his jealousy, and prompted by some of the ancient nobility of Scotland, he took the resolution to despatch the paramour. With this determination he entered his wife's apartment, on the night of the 9th of March, 1566, attended by a number of noble conspirators, while she was at supper, and finding, as he expected, Rizzio present, he plunged his dagger into his breast, and laid him dead at his feet. This outrage Mary never forgave, though she had the address occasionally to conceal her resentment. The Earl of Bothwell was her next favourite. Darnley had apartments fitted up for himself in a solitary mansion at some distance from Holyrood-House, and soon after midnight, on the 9th of February, 1567, the house in which he slept was blown up with gunpowder. Mary and Bothwell shared in the odium of this murder, and the remembrance of that fatal night probably aggravated the gloom of Sheffield Castle, and gave an additional pang to the closing scene at Fotheringay.† On the death of the Earl of Lenox, Temple Newsam came into the possession of King James I., by whom it was conferred on his kinsman, Esme Stuart, Duke of Richmond. The Duke sold the estate to Sir John Ingram, the founder of the Irving peerage. Sir Arthur, in the splendour of his disposition, pulled down the old house, and erected on its site the present princely mansion. The fair domain of Temple Newsam is now in the possession of the Marquis of Hertford, in consequence of his marriage with Isabella Ann, the daughter of the last Viscount, and the house, which boasts a fine collection of pictures, stands to great advantage in the park. The church of Whitchurch is the burial place of the Lords of Temple Newsam, and their splendid monuments serve to adorn the chapel of that neat but unostentatious edifice. Pop. 1165.

THORNHILL, (P.) in the wap. of Agbrigg, and honour of Pontefract; 2 miles S. of Dewsbury, the parent stock from whence the parish sprang. This parish is situated on the Calder, and commands extensive views along its picturesque banks. Anciently, it was the seat of the knightly family of the Thornhills, who intermarried with the De Fixbys, in the reign of our first Edward. Afterwards, namely, in the year 1404, the Thornhills became united with the Saviles, of Dodsworth, near Barnsley.—These families have for ages been amongst the leading persons in their native county, and have served at intervals in successive generations, the office of Sheriffs and Representatives for Yorkshire. Early in the 16th

century, in the time of Sir Henry Savile, an inquisition was made of the family estates in Yorkshire, which were stated to consist of 300 messuages, 300 tofts, 10 water-mills, and 23,000 acres of land, exclusive of the waters in the parish of Halifax: the value of the whole of this immense property as stated in this inquisition, was £489. 14s. per annum, and that land, which will now let for three pounds per acre, was then valued at scarcely threepence! Sir Geo. Savile, for many years the able and patriotic representative of this county in parliament, was the last surviving male descendant of this ancient family. At his death on the 9th of January, 1784, he was buried with his ancestors, in the chapel of the Saviles, in the choir of Thornhill church, and his ample estates descended by devise to the second son of his sister Barbara, who married Richard Lumley Savile, afterwards Earl of Scarborough. The records of the church at Thornhill go as high as the year 1390. The civil wars in the time of Charles the First were fatal to the ancient residence of the Thornhills. Sir William Savile, the fifth baronet, was a zealous supporter of Charles, and his house, the remains of which still show that it had something of the nature of a castle, was besieged, taken and destroyed by the forces of parliament. This house stood in the midst of an extensive park, which sloped to the banks of the Calder, and was adorned with aged and romantic woods, and one of the largest Spanish chesnut trees in the north of England still stands at the north-eastern corner of the mote. A market and fair were granted by charter to Thornhill, in the 14th of Edward II. but it is now merely a clothing village, though by no means destitute of striking indications of its ancient splendour. It will be seen from the population returns, at the beginning of this book, that the present population of the parish of Thornhill, including Flockton, Shitlington, and Lower Whitley, amounts to 5458, of which 1933 are in the township of Thornhill.

**THORNHILL LEES**, in the parish of Thornhill, wap. of Agridg, and honour of Pontefract; 2 miles S. of Dewsbury. This place is connected with a train of events which it would be improper to pass over in silence, in a history of the West Riding of Yorkshire, and which it would be equally unsuitable, in a publication of this nature, to treat in detail. During a considerable part of the year 1817, the manufacturing districts of England and Scotland were in a state of considerable commercial distress, and at the same time the subject of a Radical Reform, in the constitution of the Commons

House of Parliament, was considered by a large proportion of the labouring classes as a sovereign remedy for the general suffering. These two circumstances co-operating with a supposed disinclination on the part of government, to listen to the petitions of the people, produced much discontent, which in some cases assumed the air of disaffection. These feelings were considerably exasperated by certain political emissaries, who, in the spring of that year came down into the north of England, and who, affecting to be themselves Radicals, were, in reality, spies and instigators. The most distinguished of these characters was a person of the name of Oliver, a man of plausible manners and of insinuating address. Mr. Oliver, introduced by a reputed delegate, visited the reformers in Nottinghamshire, Warwickshire and Lancashire, but the south-western part of the County of York was the favourite seat of his pestiferous mission. Here, as in other places, he and his travelling companion sedulously inculcated upon their dupes the belief that the people in the metropolis, and in other populous parts of the kingdom, were ready to rise in open rebellion, and waited only to be joined by the reformers of the north, in order to overturn the government by physical force. To obtain credit with his employers for seal and usefulness, he assembled several meetings of persons whom he dignified with the name of delegates. One of these meetings was held at Thornhill Lees, on Friday, the 6th of June, at which Mr. Oliver attended in person. While the assembly, which consisted of about a dozen persons, were preparing for deliberation, they found themselves environed by a strong detachment of military, headed by Major-General Sir John Byng, the commander of the district, by whom ten of them were secured and conveyed to Wakefield, for examination before the sitting magistrates. Mr. Oliver, the prime mover of the assembly, was suffered to escape. The events of this day, however, led to a distinct recognition of his mission, and to a public exposure, through the medium of the press, of his official connexions. It was now no longer possible to conceal the fact, that a system of espionage had been resorted to, and the first minister of State, Lord Liverpool, when pressed upon the subject in the House of Lords, admitted "that Mr. Oliver had been employed by government, to gain information from the disturbed districts;" but his lordship assured the house "that he had been discouraged from endeavouring in any way to excite, or to extend the disaffection which he was to assist in suppressing." A few days after the capture of the delegates at Thornhill Lees,

a full bench of magistrates, with the venerable Lord Lieutenant (Earl Fitzwilliam), at their head, assembled at the Court House in Wakefield, and after a patient inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the prisoners were all discharged; but two of them were detained by a Secretary of State's warrant, under the Habeas Corpus Suspension Act, on a charge of high treason. Two days after the meeting at Thornhill Lees, some hundreds of persons assembled about midnight, at a place adjoining the town of Huddersfield, called Folly Hall Bridge, under a delusive expectation that they would be joined by other insurgents from various parts of the kingdom, and that, when united, their force would be sufficiently strong to overturn the government of the country! The approach of half a dozen yeomanry cavalry produced considerable alarm in the ranks of the insurgents, but they mustered military ardour sufficient to fire several shots, and one of the cavalry horses was wounded in the head. The yeomanry, not considering it prudent to engage with so great a disparity of numbers, retreated for the purpose of obtaining a reinforcement, but, before they could return to the field, a panic had seized the motley assembly at the bridge, and, in a few minutes, their force was completely dispersed. Four-and-twenty persons, charged with having in some way participated in this futile enterprise, were subsequently apprehended and committed to York castle, and several others fled from justice and from their country. At the Assizes in July, ten of the prisoners were put upon their trial before Baron Wood, part of them charged with stealing fire arms on their way to the place of rendezvous, and the remainder with aiding and abetting certain persons unknown, in firing at, with an intent to kill, maim, or disable Mr. David Alexander, the yeomanry cavalryman whose horse was shot in the head. Both the charges being ill supported by evidence, all the prisoners put upon their trial were acquitted, and the bills presented against the principal part of the other prisoners were thrown out. In fine, not a single conviction took place, and this marvellous sedition terminated without the loss of a drop of human blood, either in the field or on the scaffold.

Near the village is a tremendous cliff, called Thornton Scar, partly clothed with wood, and partly exhibiting the bare rock. This scar is about 100 yards high, and runs up a considerable way, varying its elevation, into the mountains, along with one, not quite so perpendicular, on the other side: these unite so closely at the bottom, that the frightful chasm scarcely leaves room for the hurrying brook to escape, by a precipitate flight over a succession of small cascades. At a short distance hence is Thornton Force, a fine cascade, which rushes from an aperture in a high rock, and falls at one leap near 30 yards, partly from the top of a rocky ledge, over half of which it falls in one unbroken sheet of 4 yards wide, and then tumbles over a bulging rock into a deep black pool below. A spray, like a mist, rises from this cataract, which continually sprinkles the ground for several yards. The tops and sides of the rocks are beautifully fringed with ivy and other shrubs; they are a few yards higher than the cascade; and the whole, viewed from the basin below, form an exceedingly fine picture. At what period this curious piece of workmanship was effected is not known, but it is believed that it may be referred to the time of the Druids. A rapidly increasing population had rendered the old chapel at Sowerby Bridge, in this township, insufficient to accommodate the inhabitants, and a new and commodious church, in the Gothic order of architecture, has, through the liberality of the inhabitants, just been completed at that place, capable of seating nearly 1000 persons. The Rev. James Franks, M. A. who also acts as a surrogate, is the incumbent. This church, which is not to be confounded with Sowerby chapel, stands in the township of Warley, and has for its parochial district a part of Warley, containing 2379 inhabitants; the adjoining part of Skircoat, containing 1860 inhabitants, has also always been intimately connected with Sowerby Bridge, and its minister. There is an Independent chapel at Warley, of which the Rev. Thomas Hawkins is minister. Population, 4962.

**WENTWORTH-CASTLE**, in the parish of Silkstone, wap. of Staincross, and honour of Pontefract, (the seat of the Vernons;) 2 miles S. of Barnaley; is a spacious quadrangular pile, built by Thomas Earl of Strafford, in 1730, occupying the site of an ancient fortress. The portico of the principal front is a most elegant specimen of ornamental architecture. The hall is 40 feet square. A good marble statue of this nobleman stands in the centre of the area. The gallery is a noble room, 160 feet long, 30 wide, and 24 feet high; here are a number of statues and a noble collection of pictures. The house is surrounded with a very fine park, and the picturesque scenery which it commands is heightened to the east by a serpentine canal of considerable extent.

**WENTWORTH HOUSE**, the residence of Earl Fitzwilliam, is situated in the parish of Wath-upon-Dearne, in the wap. of Strafforth and Tickhill, and in the liberty of Tickhill. This magnificent edifice, which consists of a centre and two wings, has a front of exquisite architecture, 600 feet in length, and the portico is peculiarly elegant; the hall is 60 feet square, and 40 feet high, with a gallery 10 feet wide running round the whole, which is supported by 18 Ionic pillars, the intervening niches of which are ornamented with fine marble statues. The gallery at the end of the hall is 130 feet long, by 18 feet wide, and there are spread over the various apartments a number of exquisite paintings, from the pencils of Guido, Paulo Giordano, Caracci, Titian, Luca Giordano, and Spagnoletto. The museum also contains a number of fine antiques, which claim the attention of the virtuoso. Every thing without this princely mansion is consistent with the magnificence that reigns within. The park comprises 1500 acres of beautifully variegated ground, richly clothed with wood, and embellished with expanses of water. Out of the bosom of these majestic woods rises a graceful Ionic column, erected by the Marquis of Rockingham, to commemorate the acquittal of his gallant friend, Admiral Keppel. But the chief object of admiration is the mausoleum, erected by the present Earl Fitzwilliam, in honour of his revered uncle. This superb monument, which is built of free stone, stands on an eminence to the right of the grand entrance into the park from the Rotherham road. The height is ninety feet, and it consists of three divisions. The first is a square Doric basement; the second story is of the same form, but of the Ionic order, each of its four sides opening into an arch, and disclosing a beautiful sarcophagus standing in the centre; on the frieze of the entablature over the arches, is this inscription in Roman characters: THIS MONUMENT WAS ERRECTED BY WENTWORTH, EARL FITZWILLIAM, 1788, TO THE MEMORY OF CHARLES, MARQUIS OF ROCKINGHAM. This is surmounted by a cupola, supported by twelve columns of the same order; and at each corner of the railing which encloses this superb structure, is a lofty obelisk. But the most interesting part is the interior of the lowest story; this is an apartment rising into a dome, and supported by eight columns, encircling a white marble statue of the departed Marquis, in his robes, as large as life, by Nollekins. In the four recesses of this apartment are placed fine white marble busts of Edmund Burke, and the Duke of Portland: Frederick Montague, and Sir George

Seville; Charles James Fox, and Admiral Keppel; John Lee, and Lord George Cavendish. The statue of the Marquis stands on a square pedestal, on one side of which his titles are inscribed, and the other three pay a just and noble tribute to his memory in prose and in verse, the first by Edmund Burke, and the second by Frederick Montague. It is justly said of him, that "the object of his public life was, to give stability to the liberties of his country; security to its landed property; increase to its commerce; independence to its public councils, and concord to its empire." "These were his ends. For the attainment of these ends, his policy consisted in sincerity, fidelity, directness, and constancy." The virtues of his private life adorned his public character. And, "a sober, unaffected piety, the basis of true morality, gave truth and permanence to his virtues." His successors are reminded that this monument is not built to entertain the eye, but to instruct the mind; and they are not inattentive to the daily monitor; their private virtues, and their public worth prove them to be the legitimate representatives of the house of Westworth. No sacrifice is too great for them to make, that the maintenance of the laws, and the liberties of their country require. **ALike** unshamed by the smiles, and unswayed by the frowns of courts, they fearlessly discharge their public duties as Senators, and as Britons, and consider all power, whether it be that of a sovereign, or of his viceroy, as a delegation to be held only for the benefit of the people. This is true nobility. Of the antiquity of the family, it is therefore unnecessary to speak, though it is more than coeval with the Norman conquest; and it is recorded, that Sir William Fitzwilliam distinguished himself in the battle of Hastings, fought in the year 1066.

On one of the highest peaks of these hills is a lodge, built in 1510, by Sir Thomas Wortley, for the pleasure, (as an unique inscription cut in the face of the rock informs the reader) of hearing the Harts bells. The proprietor of this estate is James Archibald Stuart Wortley, Esq. and the lodge, which bears the venerable stamp of antiquity, is occupied by Lady Viscountess Heron, the mother of this honourable knight of the shire.

**YEA DON**, (Upper) in the parish of Guisley and wap. of Skyrack; 3½ miles S. of Otley. Yeadon is chiefly inhabited by clothiers. Population 2455. In this township resides a professor of divination, Hannah Spence by name, the daughter and successor of Hannah Green, the renowned sybil, popularly called "The Ling Bob Witch." In ages past, legislators and divines believed in the extraordinary pretensions of these second-sighted impostors, but now their votaries are principally found amongst those whose minds are a century at least behind the age in which they live. The statute books prove that at no very remote period, laws were enacted in England against witchcraft; and a neighbouring parish affords a document of unquestionable authenticity, from which it appears, that in the year 1604, the vicar of Calverley and five of his parishioners, executed a certificate, which was presented to the Judges of Assize at York, wherein they declared "that Robert Hare, Isabel Hare, his mother, Ann Brigg, and Elizabeth Birkinshaye, all of their own parish, were vehemently suspected of the devilish art of witchcraft," and that they had practised and done much hurt and mischief to their neighbours for the space of 20 years past. The object of this deposition was "to root out abominable witchcraft;" but this it should appear was a thing of difficult accomplishment, for two centuries after the reverend divine had signed his certificate, we find a relentless witch, instigated by the most "devilish disposition," visiting the neighbouring village of Bramley, and sacrificing her dupes on the altar of her cupidity. This tragical story may be read at length in the au-

thentic "History of Mary Bateman, the Yorkshire Witch;" of which the following rapid sketch forms the outline:—Mary was born at Aisenby, near Thirak, in 1788, and having married and taken up her residence in Leeds, became at the age of 30 a witch by profession. Her arts were innumerable, and her crimes, even to murder, not a few. Poison was her favourite instrument, and when her interest prompted to the deed, her conscience never stood in the way of its application. After practising upon a number of other persons, she was directed by a young woman, one of her dupes, to the ill-fated family of William Perigo, a small clothier at Bramley, whose wife was supposed to labour under an *evil wish*. This was in the year 1806. For upwards of nine months, the enchantress, aided by an imaginary personage, to whom she gave the name of Miss Blythe, held Perigo and his wife in her toils, now exciting their hopes, then rousing their fears, but all the time draining their purse, till she had got from them £70 in money, which was all they had in the world, and remorselessly stripped the house of its furniture, and the inmates of their best apparel. At length when they had nothing more to give, and when they became clamorous for the fulfilment of those promises of happiness and prosperity which the evil spirit by which they were plundered had held out to them, she took the desperate resolution to silence their importunities and avoid detection, by terminating their lives. With this purpose, and under the pretence of administering a *charm*, she gave them poison to mix in their food. Both Perigo and his wife partook of the honey and the pudding in which the noxious drugs were infused—the loss of her life, and he to the ruin of his constitution. The death of Perigo's wife disipated the delusion under which he had so long laboured. He laid his case before the Magistrates at Leeds, and Mary was committed to the County Gaol. On the 17th of March, 1809, she was tried for the wilful murder of Rebecca Perigo, and being convicted on the clearest evidence she was ordered for execution on the Monday following. At the appointed time she expiated her crime on the gallows, and her body was given for dissection to the General Infirmary, at Leeds, in which town she had run her iniquitous career.

Each of these liberties has a separate jurisdiction and local courts in which pleas are holden. The principal of those courts are, the court baron of the honour of Pontefract, of which John Hardy, Esq. is steward, and the court baron of the manor of Wakefield, of which the Duke of Leeds is steward. Formerly these courts could not hold pleas in cases exceeding forty shillings; but in the 17th of George III. an act was passed, "for the more easy and speedy recovery of small debts, within "the parishes of Halifax, Bradford, Keighley, Bingley, Guiseley, "Batley, Birstal, Mirfield, Hartshead-cum-Clifton, Aldmondbury, "Kirkheaton, Kirkburton, Huddersfield, and the liberty of Tong," establishing courts of requests for those places in matters not exceeding forty shillings; and "for extending the jurisdiction of the courts "baron of the honour of Pontefract, the manor of Wakefield, and the "manor of Bingley," from forty shillings to five pounds. The various liberties of the West-Riding do not by any means comprehend all the places within this division of the County of York, but they contain a large portion of them, and in this publication the liberty in which each town, village, and hamlet, (if within any of them) is pointed out.

## THE TIMES AND PLACES

*Of holding the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, with the usual Adjournments.*

Easter Quarter Sessions are held at Pontefract only, and always begin on Monday after Low Sunday, or the first Sunday after Easter.

Midsummer Quarter Sessions always begin at Skipton on Tuesday in the first whole week after the 7th of July; Bradford on Thursday after; and Rotherham on the Wednesday following.

Michaelmas Quarter Sessions always begin at Knaresbrough on Tuesday in the first whole week after the 11th of October; Leeds on Thursday after; and Sheffield on the Wednesday following.

Christmas Quarter Sessions always begin at Wetherby, on Tuesday in the first whole week after the Epiphany; Wakefield on Thursday after and Doncaster on the Wednesday following.

N.B. If any of the days by which the Sessions are regulated happen to fall upon a Sunday, the Sessions will not be held until the Tuesday week following.

☞ After each of the above-mentioned Quarter Sessions, there is an Adjournment to Wakefield, for the purpose of inspecting the Prison, &c. which is generally held within a month or six weeks from the last Adjournment.

\*.\* All the Sessions for the Boroughs in the several Ridings of Yorkshire, are held the same week as the Riding Sessions.

# LIST OF BANKERS IN LONDON.

**THE BANK OF ENGLAND.**—This National Establishment is managed by a Court of Directors, who act for the Company of Proprietors, under a Charter of Incorporation dated the 27th of July, 1694. The dealings of the Bank of England are principally in bullion; in the discount of Bills of Exchange; and in the circulation of their own Notes. They also advance money to the Government, under the sanction of Parliamentary enactments; and the management of the Public Funds is immediately under their care. In the year 1796, an Act of Parliament, called *The Bank Restriction Act*, was passed, restraining the Bank Directors from paying their own notes in specie; this disqualification is now withdrawn; and by the Act founded on Mr. Peel's Bill, every holder of a Bank of England note, of whatever amount, will, on and after the 1st of May, 1823, have the power to demand the payment of the same in the Coin of the Realm. At present the Bank Directors, in the exercise of that option which they now possess, are paying off all their notes under the value of Five Pounds, and withdrawing all such Bank Notes from circulation.
