



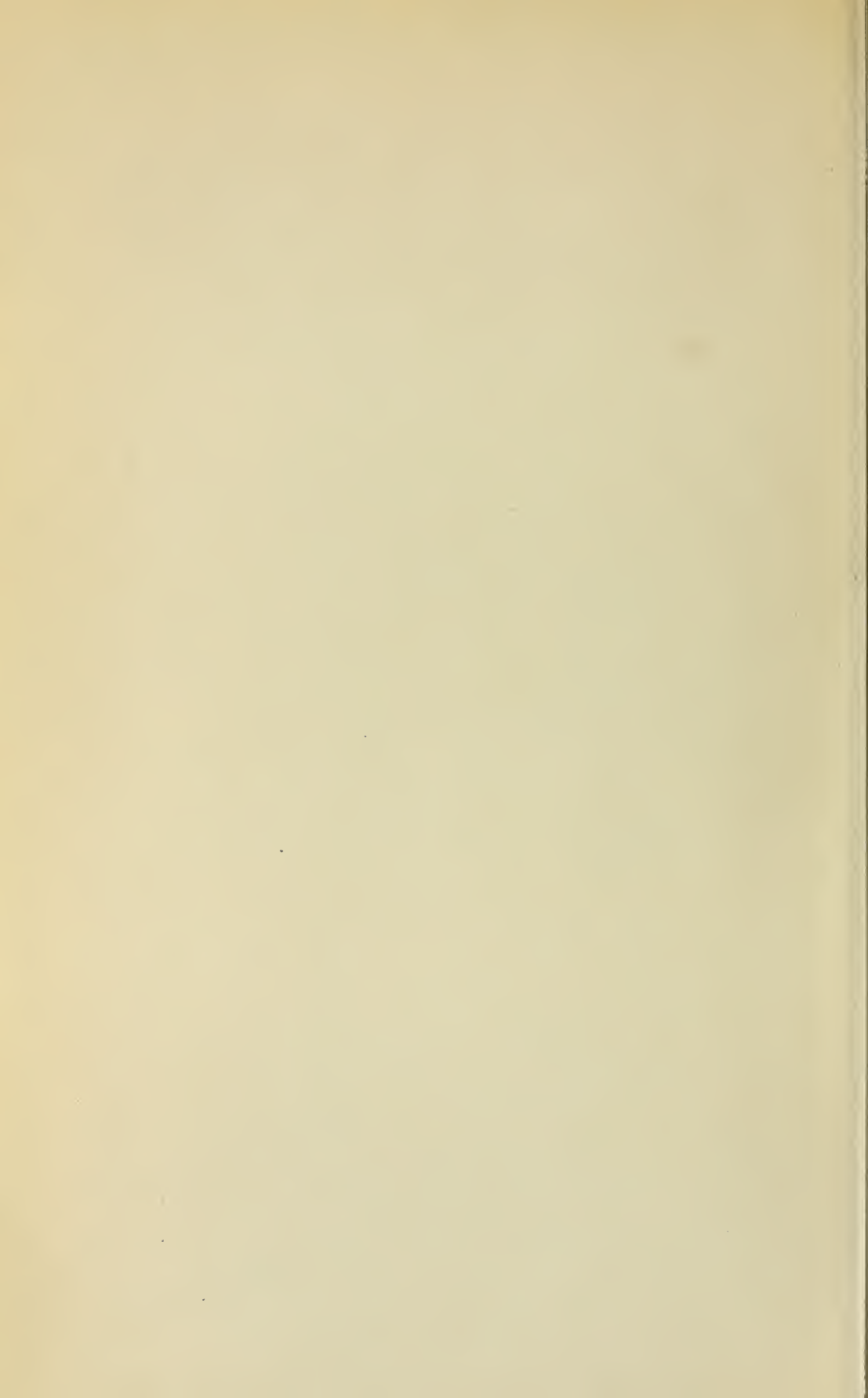

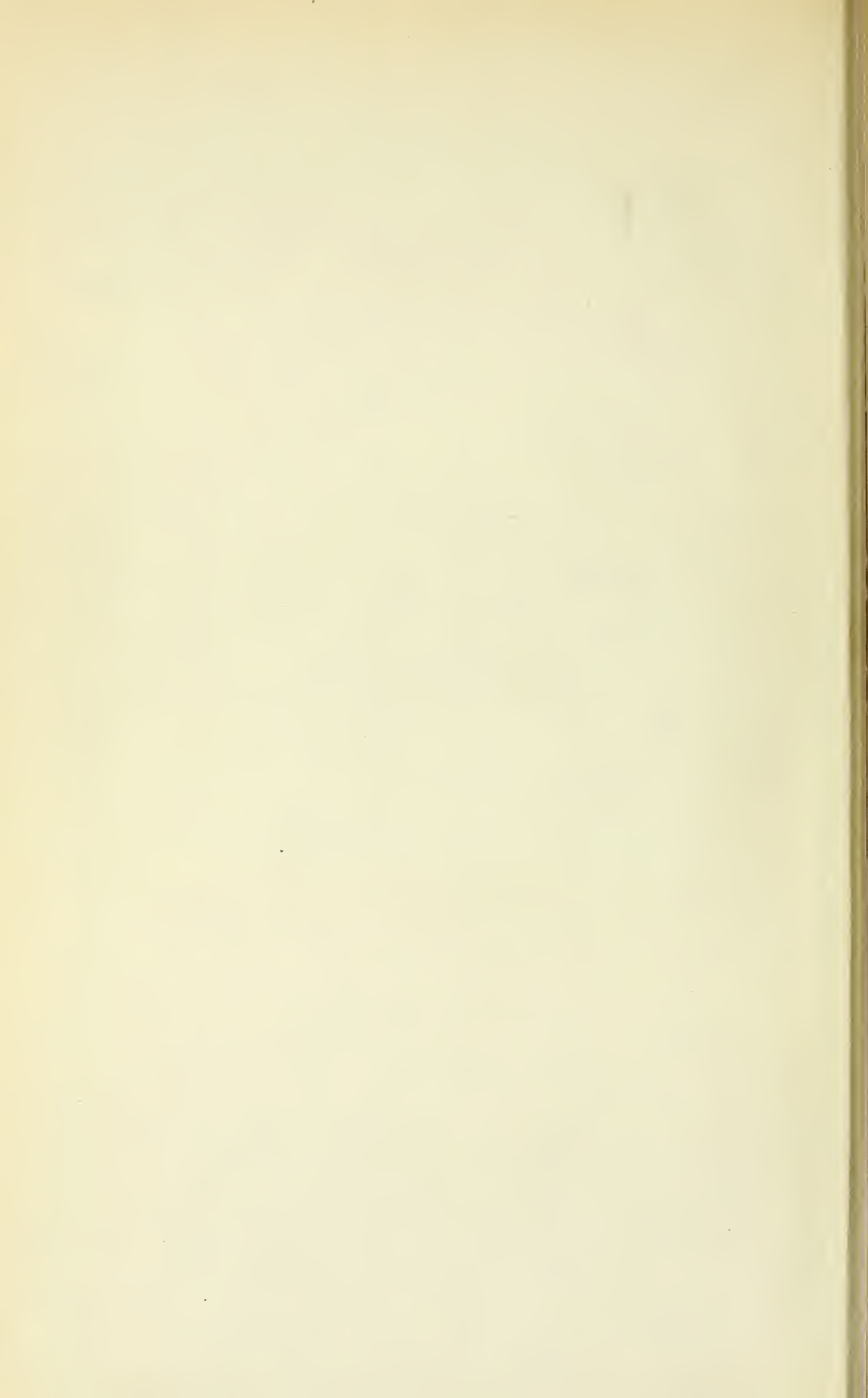

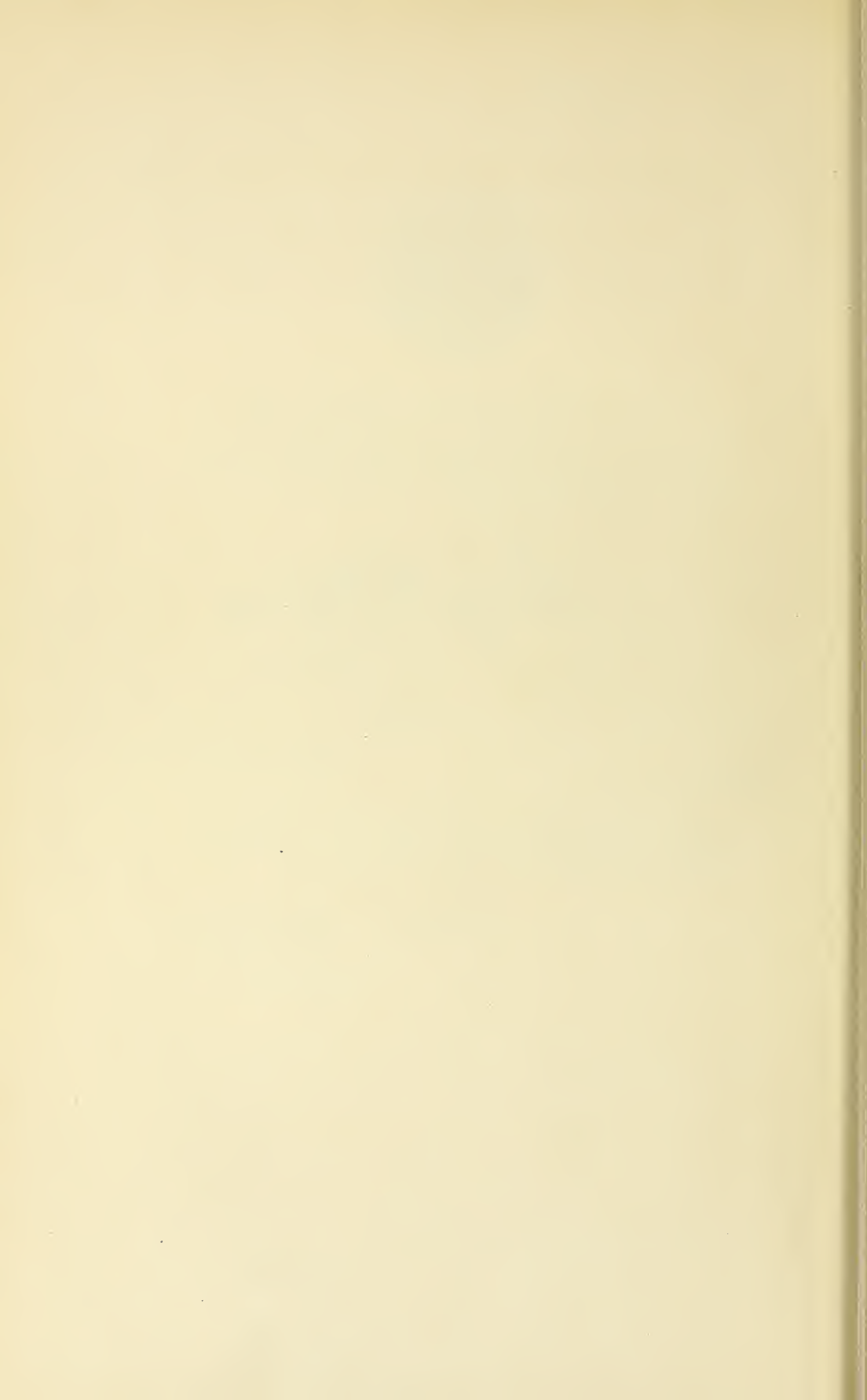

Seventh Book, Begun in 1792

At a public Town-Meeting of the Freeholders and other Inhabitants of Watertown who are qualified to vote in Town affairs regularly assembled at the Meeting house in said Town on Monday the 12th Day of March AD 1792, for the choice of Town Officers and other Affairs as set forth in the Warrants for calling the Meeting; they proceeded as follows. Viz—

Voted and Chose Amos Bond Esq^r Moderator of the Meeting—

Then Jonathan Brown Esq^r inform'd the Town that his Eyesight has fail'd, and he is unable to serve the Town as Clerk &c he wish'd the Town would not make choice of him for the like Services—The Town then voted and return'd their thanks to him for his past good Services as Town Clerk & Treasurer &c—

Then Chose Nath^l Ruggles Whitney Town Clerk & Treasurer—

Then Nath^l Ruggles Whitney was sworn into the Office of Town Clerk & Amos Bond Justice of the peace—

Chose for Measurers of Wood Maj^r Ebenezer Kent, M^r Jedidiah Leathe, and Cap^t Nathaniel Bemis—

Chose for Cullers of Hoops & Staves M^r Samuel Holt, and Cap^t Abner Craft—

Chose for Sexton M^r Phinehas Jenison, and to be paid for his Services the same as last Year—

Then the Votes were brought in for County Treasurer, Ebenezer Bridge Esq^r had all the Votes which was forty two—

Chose for Surveyors of Timber M^r David Sanger & Cap^t Daniel Jackson—

Then voted that Swine shall not run at large the ensuing Year—

Voted and granted £100. to support the Schools the present Year—

Voted that the Money be expended in the same manner as last Year—

Voted that the Article for repairing the great Bridge be postponed untill April Meeting—

Then the Conditions for farming out the Taxes were [*page torn*] which are as follows. (Viz). That the Taxes be farmed to the lowest bidder they giving Bonds to the Town Treasurer to the satisfaction of the Selectmen; and the several Treasurers to be settled with in one Year from the Delivery, or Date of the Tax-bills or forfeit their premium. Extraordinarys excepted—
Chose for Collectors of Taxes M^r David Stone for the East

District and agreed that he shall have $\frac{d}{71\frac{1}{2}}$ ᶆ pound for collecting Town, County, and State Taxes (if any there be)—

Then Chose Mr. Jonathan Stone for the West District and agreed that he shall have $\frac{d}{91\frac{1}{4}}$ ᶆ pound for collecting the like Taxes —

Then the Fishery was let to M^r Edmund Fowle for £15,, 10,, to be paid on or before the first Day of September next; the Conditions to be the same as the Year past—

M^r Edmund Fowle paid the Treasurer 18/ as earnest Money— Then Voted that this Meeting be adjourned to the first Monday in April next at 4 O'Clock Afternoon at the public Meeting-house—

- 2^d To choose Fire-wards—
- 3^d To know the mind of the Town, what they will do with their Hay-scales after the term of time is expired which they are now let for, or act any thing thereon as the Town may think proper—
- 4th To hear the Request of any Persons who wish to have their Taxes abated and act any thing thereon as they think proper—or to hear the request of any Collector who wish to have any Person's Taxes abated—
- 5th To know if the Town will grant Liberty to have the Stone-wall standing on the ministerial place West of the House straightened —

On Monday the second Day of April AD 1792 for the purpose of giving in their Votes for a Governor, Lt Governor, and Senators—The Selectmen being present the Meeting was opened and the Votes for a Governor were called for, brought in sorted and counted and it appeared that His Excellency John Hancock

Voted not to build a House according to the report of s^d Committee—

Voted to dismiss the article concerning the repairing of any House for the poor—

Voted and Granted £7,, 10 for the support of the Great Bridge.

Voted and Granted Jon^a Brown Esq^r as Afsefsor

At a Public Town Meeting of the Freeholders and other Inhabitants of Watertown who are qualified to vote in Town Affairs, regularly assembled at the Meeting house in said Town on Monday the second Day of April AD 1792 for transacting sundry Affairs as set forth in the Warrant—

1st Voted and Chose Amos Bond Esq^r Moderator of the Meeting—

2^d Voted to Choose two Firewards—

Voted & chose Amos Bond Esq^r & Cap^t John Fowle Firewards—

3^d The Article concerning the Hay scales was debated; and the Town Voted to empower the Selectmen to lease them after the Term of time is expired which M^r Jed^h Leathe has

hir'd them for untill the next March Meeting and then to be let at public auction—

4th Voted not to abate any person's Taxes except they apply to the Town—

5th Voted that the Selectmen be impowered to give Liberty to straighten the Line on the Ministerial place provided any person or persons will undertake to do it at his, or their own expence—

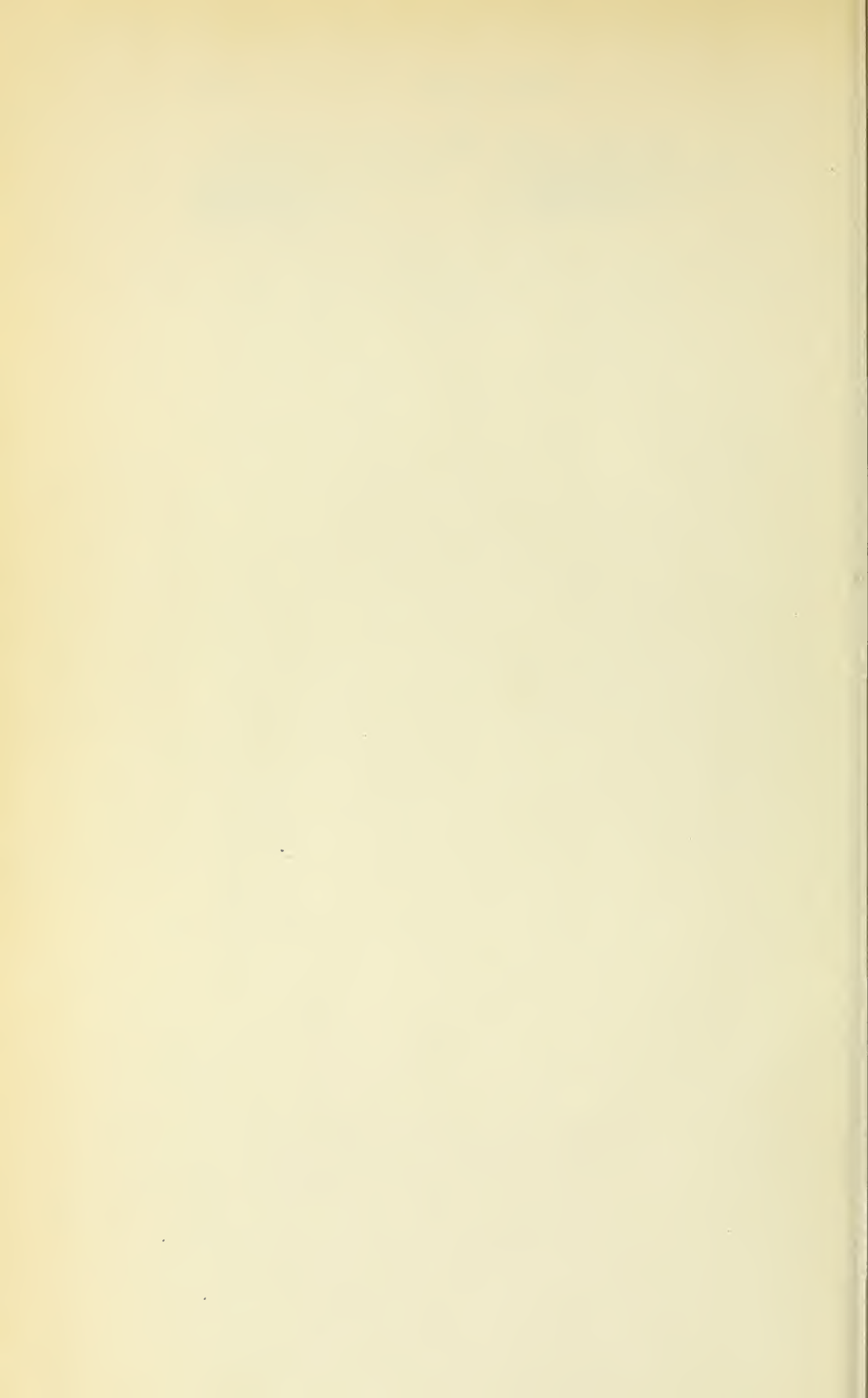
