Fishery Let March 1810

The Agents of the Town of Watertown chosen for the purpose of leasing the fishery in Watertown, Weston & Waltham agreeable to an Act of the General Court passed March 2<sup>d</sup> 1798, empowering the Town's of Watertown, Weston, & Waltham to lease the fishery called Shad & Alewives within the limits of said Town's met at the House of Nathaniel Weld Innholder in said Town on Monday the twenty sixth day of March AD 1810, at two of the Clock in the Afternoon—

The Agents of Weston & Waltham, not being present, the Agents of Watertown proceeded as follows (Viz).

The Agents aforesaid met at the time & place aforementioned by adjournment, & proceeded as follows——
They agreed to lease all the privilege & right of taking the fish called Shad & Alewives in Charles River, within the limits of Watertown the ensuing Year, on the following Conditions (Viz).—

The privilege of taking the fish called Shad and Alewives within the limits before described, three days in each Week and no more to the highest bidder, he or they giving security for the payment to the acceptance of the Agents—five & Cent to be paid down as earnest Money, and the residue to be paid on the first day of September next.—And the purchaser to have the privilege of improving the Seines that the Town now have and the purchaser to have liberty to procure two new Seines,

The persons or persons who improve the fishery shall be accountable to the Agents for the improvement of the Seines if they are improved for the fishery in Newton, in proportion to the rent of Watertown & Newton fishery.—

The Committee who were chosen & empowered on behalf of the Town to settle with Jonas White Esqr & his Associates, who hired the fishery the last Year, and to make them such fair & equitable abatement of the rent as they should judge reasonable—Gave notice to the persons interested, and on the twenty third instant met them at the House of Mr Ezra Farrar, for the purpose of making said settlement; but your Committee finding that a portion of the Town appeared to be dissatisfied with the measure that had been adapted for the settlement of the business aforesaid and understanding from the Selectmen that a Warrant had been granted for calling a Town Meeting to be held this day, thought it most adviseable not to proceed in the business to the extent of their authority; but proposed to the said White & his Associates as a measure, the best calculated to give satisfaction to all persons interested, that we would investigate the subject, collect all the facts, and report the same to the Town, for their consideration & final settlement. This proposition being readily agreed to on the part of the said White and his Associates, Your Committee went into an examination of all the circumstances of the business, and now beg leave to report as follows (Viz)—That Amos Bond Esqr and Mr Jeduthan Fuller were chosen Agents by the Town the last Year to lease the fishery—That they put the same up at Vendue, as had been usual, and it was bid off by Jonas White Esq<sup>r</sup> for himself Mr Nath1 Weld, John Richardson Esqr & Mr Abijah White at the sum of six hundred & eight dollars— That it has been stated to your Committee by the said Bond & Fuller, that it was their expectation, and they believe to have been the expectation of the said White & his Associates, at the time the fishery was leased, that there would not be any other or greater incumbrance in the River to obstruct the passage of the fish, than had been usual in

Years previous—That your Committee are convinced, that there was Seines set across the River from shore to shore, at Cambridge & at Brighton and continued through the season, at those particular periods of the Tides in which the Fish pass up & down the River, which entirely obstructed their passage. That large quantities of fish were taken every day in the Week both at Cambridge & Brighton a portion of which it is reasonable to suppose, would have passed up the River to the Watertown fishery had it not been for the obstruction of said seines—That it is stated to your Committee both by the sd White and his Associates. who hired the fishery and several of the persons who were employed to catch the fish, that but a very small quantity were taken at the Watertown fishery notwithstanding every attention was paid & every means used to take all that come within their limits.—Your Committee have also examined and made all proper enquiry respecting the Accounts of the said Jonas White and his Associates relative to the fishery the last Year, and they are

satisfied

Satisfied that the Monies paid & expended by them including the rent, amounts to \$1518,,44—and that all the credits resulting therefrom amount only to the sum of \$938,,76 making to them a loss exclusive of all their time & trouble in the business of \$579,,68—

Under all these circumstances, your Committee think it will be unjust to compel the said White & his Afsociates to pay the full amount of the rent, and they confidently believe that the Inhabitants of the Town, will be unwilling to inforce it even if they have the power: And your Committee have no doubts but that the said White & his Associates, will be satisfied to sustain a portion of the lofs, in order that the business may be amicably adjusted; altho they think that they have a just claim to be indemnified for an injury, from which, they consider it was the duty of the Town to protect them. Your Committee therefore take the liberty to recommend that the sum of \$289,,84 being half the amount of the loss sustained, should be deducted from the rent aforesaid and if the said White & his Associates will accede thereto, that the Treasurer of the Town be authorized & empowered, on payment of the balance, to give them a full discharge for the rent of the fishery the last Year; fully & conscientiously believing that by such a procedure, the interest of all concerned will eventually be promoted;

Your Committee on that day accordingly met & waited on Mr Eliot for the purpose aforesaid—Mr. Eliot observed, that he had obtained a Copy of the vote of the town but that he did not understand thereby what the town wished for,—that he did not know what was meant by a settlement—that he had no settlement to make neither did he wish for any,—that he was satisfied to remain in his present situation,—but that he was ready to receive any propositions the Committee were disposed to makeand requested that they might be made in writing—Your Committee in reply observed, that they considered the vote of the town to be perfectly plain & intelligable, that it expressed a wish that he would consent to relinquish all his Pastoral relations with the town, and a desire to know on what terms he would make such relinquishment -Mr. Eliot then observed if that was the meaning of the vote, he was not prepared to answer—that it was a business of consequence and that he should wish for Counciland expressed a wish that the Committee would address their inquiries to him in writing, and in more diffuse and explicit terms than was expressed by the vote, and that they would allow him as much time to consider of the subject as they could with propriety before the meeting of the town—The Committee in compliance with the request of Mr. Eliot accordingly proposed to

To the questions contained in your Communication to me dated 25th Sept 1818—I answer—

That if, as you believe, it is the wish of the town of Watertown, that I should relinquish all my engagements as their Minister, I will consent to do so, on condition that I should continue to receive as a compensation for such relinquishment the full amount of my Salary, to be paid quarter yearly during my life in addition to the improvement of the house and land I now

The Trustees of the Watertown Ministerial Fund ask leave to present to the Town the following statement of their proceedings the last year and of the existing state of their funds—

Since the last annual statement the Funds have not been able to dispose of any of their real estate, or in any way to increase the amount of their Fund; They have however the satisfaction to believe that it has been managed and improved in a manner the best calculated to preserve the original value, and to produce a certain income; it now rents for the sum of two hundred & fifty five dollars prannum

The Personal Estate is in Notes of hand satisfactorily secured, and amounts to the sum of three thousand one hundred fifty six dollars and fifty cents, the interest of that sum for one year is one hundred and eighty nine dollars and thirty nine cents, which added to the rent of the real estate will amount to the sum of four hundred and forty four dollars and thirty nine cents. The committee are fully satisfied, that a saving of one third part of the present expense of supporting the Poor, may be made to the Town, by keeping them all together provided a Situation can be procured with suitable accommodations for their reception, for a Sum not exceeding Three Thousand Dollars. Such an arrangement will depend in a great degree, upon the manner in which it is commenced—great precaution therefore and diligence will be necessary in the outset—

A Situation is to be purchased—Rules and Regulations for the good order and government of the Institution must be prepared, and a system of Econemy and Prudence, adopted and pursued in all things relative thereto——

For the accomplishment of these objects, considerable time is necessary—The committee therefore recommend that the Poor remain in the care of the Selectmen for the year ensuing; And that a Committee be appointed, with power to purchase a suitable situation, and make all the necessary arrangements for the reception of the Poor at the commencement of the next year, and to dispose of the old Poor house at their discretion—

Adjournment of Town Meeting of Oct 14<sup>th</sup> 1824

Agreeably to adjournment of the Town Meeting October 4, 1824 the Inhabitants assembled at the public Meeting-house Nov. 1, 1824 at 4 O'Clock in the afternoon, the meeting was opened by the moderator and following report and resolves were read and ordered to be accepted & reported at length on the Town records

The subject & report their doings to the town—have in pursuance of their appointment attended to the subject & ask leave to report in part viz

That they have investigated the rights of the town to the lands lying easterly of the Stream passing under Treadway bridge the mill creek & Charles river, from the great road leading to the Meeting house down to the John Sanger estate, so called, now owned by Mr Isaac Patten—and they find—that the land easterly of said stream mill creek & Charles river, & adjacent thereto, from the said great road down to the said Sanger estate, has been common & uninclosed from time immemorial—& been used & improved by all the inhabitants and the public for the purposes of passing & repassing, common landings—wharfage &c—That the late Mr David Sanger owned & improved the lands lying easterly of those above discribed and used for public purposes as aforesaid—That as early as the year 1739 & at divers times afterwards the town took measures to let the said lands & actually let the same, as appears by the records of the town—That it appears also by the same records that the said David Sanger at divers times between the year 1740 & the year 1780 petitioned the town to sell to him the said lands & that the town uniformly refused to grant his petition—excepting about the year 1750, when the town voted to sell him "five rods for a wharf" but it does not appear that any deeds were ever given of the same nor that any part of said land was ever exclusively occupied

and improved by him—That the site or line of the old wall to which the said Sanger improved is now visible from the garden of the Rev. Mr Francis southwardly for many rods.—

Your Committee further find that after the division of the estate of the said David Sanger to & among his heirs, that part of his estate lying easterly of the lands used by the public
