


PREAMBLE

American genealogies are much more comprehensive than English ones. Many records of parishes in Virginia before the Revolution were deposited by Bishop Meade and Doctor Slaughter in the archives of the Episcopal Seminary in Alexandria.

"The History of the State of Virginia is a history of its people, and its people is nought but an aggregation of families"; quoting Esten Cooke. The Virginians were simply a society of Englishmen of the age of Shakespeare taken out of England and set down in Virginia. There they worked out the problem of living under entirely new conditions. But, they were Englishmen still, with the vices and virtues of the original stock, and Virginia was essentially what it has been styled, a continuation of England."

"Coats of Armor did not become hereditary until the time of Henry III (1216-1273) and Edward I (1247-1307)." Quoting Holland's "Middle Ages", Chapter 2, Page 2. "Many nobles exercised the right of conferring arms upon their followers for faithful services in war, and in the fourteenth century, according to Lower, and even as late as the reign of Henry IV, it was general practice for persons of rank to assume whatever insignia they chose. No attempt was made until the sixteenth century to register or control in any way the use of arms."


"When civilians began to assume importance in the community, and the title 'Armiger' ceased to indicate military rank, this title was coveted by many whose ancestors had never borne arms in battle. It became necessary to form the Herald's College which was charged with the duty of regulating the use of Heraldic Insignia, and of granting the privilege of using arms under proper restrictions. One of their earlier steps was to organize the "Herald's Visitations" by sending out officers of the College to visit every family seat in England, to collect evidence in the shape of pedigrees, to record the arms claimed by each family, and to confirm or disallow questionable claims, in accordance with the evidence."

It took a long time to do this. "Visitations were made in all of the counties in the sixteenth and the early part of the seventeenth centuries. The records of these expeditions, filling thousands of volumns of manuscript are preserved in the British Museum, the Herald's College and elsewhere."

The term, "Gentleman", used in Colonial days, proclaimed the individual's standing in his community, according to Goode's "Virginia Cousins". He either was a member of a titled family or was descended from freemen who had some relative prominence. He was above the class of tradesmen, which was in turn, above the plain people of the towns and cities and the peasants of the countryside.

Following the Battle of Marston Moor in 1644 and the beheading of Charles I on January 30, 1649, the British government under Cromwell made a business of ridding the country of all of Charles' followers of any prominence. In fact it was broadened to include all titled people and their families with the intention of leaving the country to be populated only by the professional people, tradesmen and those of lesser social standing.

The Cavalier migration to Virginia during the Cromwellian rule of England is estimated by historians as being between ten and twenty thousand men. Most of them were compelled to leave, taking their wives and families with them, and whatever personal property it was possible for them to include in their passage, leaving their homes and all other possessions. Some were even assisted in the cost of their transportation and sometimes the entire cost was borne by the government so determined was it in its purpose. Cromwell's Rule was the real beginning of democracy among English speaking people.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Samuel Boush I Left the first chalice to Old St. Paul's Church. Robert Tucker, a prominent merchant, left a chalice and paten in 1722. All three pieces bear the donor's coat of arms.

Reverend John Marsden served at the Borough Church (St. Paul's) and apparently went to Lynnhaven in 1727.

Major Lemuel Newton surveyed the Glebe Lane in November 1710. "Dam in the Mire" Creek came to be known as Newton's Creek, soon after 1690, on account of the tract owned by the first George Newton, east of Church Street between the corner of Nicholson and Bute Streets. George Newton inherited from his father, Wilson Newton, in 1762 the W. N. tract bounded roughly by Church Street, Bute Street extended, Landing Street, and Vermont Street.

George Chamberlayne of Warwick County, Lieutenant in the Virginia Navy, had a son George who lived in Norfolk who was married to Elizabeth Calvert Taylor. Benjamin Pollard of Norfolk, Lieutenant in the Marines and later Captain, 1776, married Abigail Taylor, 1784. He was Mayor of Norfolk in 1787, dying in 1807. He had a son, Benjamin and a daughter, Margaret, who married George Loyall.

Celey Saunders, Captain, married Martha Bland Selden in 1834. Their daughter, Elizabeth Selden Saunders, was wife of Colonel Walter Taylor. Their grandson was a Captain in the U.S.N.

John Nivison probably first lived in the vicinity when his step-father became minister of Portsmouth Parish in 1785. He became a prominent lawyer and died 1820. He and his wife Sarah were buried in St. Paul's churchyard and his daughter Anne was the wife of Littleton Waller Tazewell, who was Governor and Senator. Their son was John Nivison Tazewell.

Possessions in both Virginia and Bermuda belonged to his large family, which included Henry II in Virginia, Horatio, Elizabeth, wife of Joel Cornick, Sarah, wife of Maximillian Boush I, and Mary, wife of Edward Atwood. Henry II died in 1687 leaving three heirs—

- Henry III.
 - 2. Sarah who married Cason Moore I.
 - 3. Mary who married William Moore.

Sarah and Maximillian Boush were the parents of Samuel Boush of Norfolk Town, and Maximillian Boush II.

The Woodhouses lived in the general area between London Bridge and Pungo, called the Upper Eastern Shore Precinct of Lynnhaven Parish.

Samuel Cornick was in Virginia in 1653 when he received a certificate for 650 Acres for transporting thirteen persons including his wife Jane and children, Martha, William and Thomas. William got a patent for his acreage which was just south of the present Village of Oceana. This tract was known as "Salisbury Plain". The Cornicks came from the city of Salisbury in Wiltshire. William

Cornick's wife, Elizabeth, was the daughter of John Martin. Three of their children were, Joel Cornick, who inherited Salisbury Plain and married Elizabeth, daughter of Henry Woodhouse, Elizabeth Cornick married Thomas Cannon, died 1684, and Barbara Cornick, who married Captain Francis Morse.

Thomas Keeling owned land in 1635 on the east side of Lynnhaven River. As Ensign Thomas Keeling he was listed as a Vestryman in 1640. He left six children, the oldest of whom was Adam Keeling—godson of Captain Thorowgood whose wife Anne was sister of William Cornick's wife Elizabeth, both daughters of John Martin. The Keeling lands lay mostly south of London Bridge and Oceana except the old house known as "Dudlies" built about 1690.

Captain Thomas Lawson and wife Margaret Bray arrived at Jamestown in 1610 with their grandson and wife, Their son was born shortly afterwards, Anthony. He had two sons, George Lawson and Anthony II (1634-1701). The latter was head of the line in lower Norfolk County. He went to School in England and after a soujourn, visited Northern Ireland. He settled in Princess Anne County (lower Norfolk) in 1668 adjoining the plantations of the Moseleys and the Hancocks. He took as his wife, Mary, daughter of John Gookin and widow of William Moseley II. Their children were—

- 1. Thomas Lawson I, who died in 1703.
- 2. Mary, who married Thomas Walke I.
- 3. Margaret, who married Colonel John Thorowgood, son of Adam II.

Lt. Colonel Anthony Lawson was one of the feoffees in trust for Norfolk Town Lands under the act of 1680. The other feoffee was Captain William Robinson of Lynnhaven Parish who became owner of a town lot. Lawson did not make his residence at "Lawson Hall" until 1695.

Ensign Thomas Lambert was granted a patent for the Point on the Elizabeth River that bears his name in 1635. He later received a grant in Lynnhaven Parish called Puggetts Neck on Little Creek. He died in 1671, leaving four daughters and in the same year four sons-in-law recorded a deed of petition for the Puggett's Neck property.

Notes-

Pattie and Mattie Keeling's father and mother lived on Bute Street in an old house facing south, near Boush St. and near the tablet.

Mr. Dalrymple was a contractor. His daughter married into the Garrison family. She was divorced from Mr. George Garrison's father and then put on deep mourning as was the custom at that time.

Interview with Mrs. Robert DeJarnett concerning the early history of the German Club. The early dances were held over Olliver's Store at the corner of Church and Cove Streets. At first they were held in the large double parlors at the home of her uncle, Mr. James Reed. He lived on East Main Street and when she was a little girl, she would hear him talking about "dancing the German."

Next the club was moved to Montefleur's Hall and nearly all of the people who went to the dances had to go by street car which ran down Church Street. They would get off of the car and walk through a small muddy lane to get to Fenchurch Street where the hall was located.

Her cousin, Miss Sarah Leigh, married Captain Pegram and lived on E. Main Street. Mrs. Pegram's sister, Miss Fanny Leigh, married a Mr. Bonsal of Norfolk who lived on Freemason Street, opposite the Whittle house, next door to which was later built St. Christopher's Hospital. The yard was paved with light marble with a large black marble "B". The neighborhood children enjoyed calling them the B family. By coincidence the house was sold to Mr. Cicero Burruss so the "B" was retained. Cicero Burruss was the grandfather of Eugene Burruss who married Miss Nellie Oldfield.

Mrs. DeJarnett's mother, Lucretia Nash Reed, was born in Norfolk in the year 1858 and married Dr. George Dodd Armstrong, the outstanding minister of the First Presbyterian Church which was located on Church Street just across the street from Old Saint Paul's Episcopal Church. These two churches gave the name to our present Church Street which was previously known as the 'Road Out of Town'. Dr. Armstrong's mother was a Miss Dodd from New York, and her sister, Susan Elizabeth, married Mr. Benjamin Gray of Norfolk who moved to Richmond. Mr. Gray's daughter was the mother of B. Gray and Whitmell Tunstall of Norfolk. Miss Harriett Reid was another daughter who married Mr. James Spence and went to Baltimore to live.

Dr. George D. Armstrong was born in New Jersey and graduated from Princeton in 1830. His father was also a minister and lived in New York. Miss Rebacca Reid married Mr. Charles Thorburn of an old Norfolk family who lived on E. Main St. across a side street from Mr. Charles Reid.

Captain John Smith, of Jamestown fame, was born in the town adjoining or on the estate of Sir Thomas Willoughby in England and the latter had much to do with Smith's voyages. When he came to Virginia in 1607, it is believed that he brought with him one of Sir Thomas' sons, aged 14 years. Whether this same one or another of the name came over in 1620-1 on the same ship with the Sharps, I know not, although such is claimed. At one time the Willoughbys owned practically all of the Norfolk of that day, but, as they raised only daughters rather than sons it has been very hard to find out much about them. The last male of the original line, Major James Sharp (whose military record I have from the War Department) died about 1845. He and his mother are the only Willoughbys buried in the old Norfolk Cemeteries.

William Willoughby and his wife, Margaret (Marnix) Willoughby, are buried in St. Paul's churchyard. They were the parents of Mary Willoughby who married Colonel William Sharp. It is believed that most of the family's early members were buried in the family burying ground on the estate which was at the head of Willoughby Bay, now filled in and a part of the Air Station at the Naval Base. However you will see the large Willoughby Oak, surrounded by a fence and a tablet marking its history within the Naval Base confines.

The Willoughbys are still a very prominent family in England. One of them was a Lady in Waiting at the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II.

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ALFRIEND FAMILY

Two Alfriend brothers, Shadrack and Benjamin, of Arca (probably Arcadia) in England, came to settle in Prince George County, Virginia, in the year 1700. Shadrack married Anne Wilkins and left two sons, William and John.

John Alfriend died young, leaving two sons—Abraham and Major Joh Alfriend.

Major John Alfriend, married Martha Manson, daughter of Peter and Susan Hardaway Manson. There were seven surviving children—

- Joan Alfriend, who married Mr. Watson but left no children. She died in Lynchburg.

Benjamin Alfriend, one of the two brothers who came to Virginia, and settled in Prince George County, left three sons. Abraham and Ned (Edward) settled in Georgia and Collins lived in Petersburg, Va.

Doctor Shadrick Alfriend who married Elizabeth Woodlief, as noted above, received his degree in Medicine at the University of Maryland. He died while on a business trip in Alabama. He had contracted some kind of fever. This was about the year 1825. The children of Doctor Shadrack and Elizabeth Woodlief Alfriend were—

William Willson Alfriend, the fourth son of John Shadrack and Eliza Prentiss Vickery Alfriend, was born 24th April 1868, as noted, in Petersburg, Va. He died 24th December 1942, in Norfolk. He married Sarah Willmoth Dudley who was born 23rd January 1865. She was the daughter of William Robert Dudley (1842-1918) and Sarah Davis Berryman (1845-1919), both of Bertie County, N. C. Their children were—

William Jeffery Alfriend, attended William and Mary College, graduating in the Class of 1912. He was a member of the Kappa Alpha fraternity. He then entered the Virginia Theological Seminary at Alexandria, graduating from that Institution in 1915. He joined the Virginia National Guard as a Chaplain and was sent to the Mexican border in 1916-17. He was appointed Chaplain of the 116th Virginia regiment of infantry, 29th Division.

On the fifth of September 1917, he married Mary Virginia Bethel of Halifax County, Va. She was the daughter of Charles Thomas Bethel, born 25 January 1855 in Rockingham County, North Carolina, and Mary Alice Coleman (1871-1946), his wife. These two were married in the year 1888. Mary Virginia Bethel was born 8th November 1890. She attended University of Virginia and Columbia University. She obtained her Bachelor of Arts degree from Florida State University in 1930 and her Master's in 1933, and was a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

BLAND

Edward Bland lived in the reign of Edward IV and some older members of the family claim to have descended from him. This Edward Bland of Burfield left a son or grandson named Adam.

Adam Bland married Jane Atkyns, daughter of William Atkyns, Esq. of London around the year 1519. The second son of this marriage was—

Peter Bland, married Susanna whose surname is not available. There were four children—

- 1. Joan
- 2. Susan
- 3. Adam
- 4. William

Adam Bland, the eldest son, was born on 1st of September 1586, approximately. His wife's name is not known. Their son was—

John Bland, who accumulated a sizeable estate. He was buried at Saint Antholins at London in his own vault. He married Susan and they had many children. Their ninth son was—

Theoderick Bland, who lived for a while at Luars, Spain. He then left

Spain and came to Virginia in 1654. He settled in the neighborhood of Westover, on the James River in Charles City County. He died there, having given the money to build the church as well as the ten acres of land upon which it was built. On this land he also had built a courthouse and a prison to serve both the county and the parish. He was a member of the King's Council and a respected citizen. He married Ann Bennet, the daughter of the former Governor of Virginia, Richard Bennet, Esq. Their second son was—

Colonel Richard Bland, who was born on 11th August 1665 and died on 10th April 1720. He married first, Mary Swan who was the daughter of Colonel Thomas Swan. All of their children died young. He married secondly, Elizabeth Randolph, the daughter of Colonel William Randolph of Turkey Island on the James River in Henrico County. Among their children was—

Richard Bland II, born 6th May 1710 and died 26th October 1776. He married Ann Poythress on 21st March 1729. She was born on 13th December 1712 and died on 9th April 1758. She was only daughter of Peter Poythress, gentleman and colonel. Richard Bland II was born at Jordan's Point and was a member of the House of Burgesses for forty years. He was a member of the Revolutionary Conventions of 1775 and 1776, and a member of the first Congress. He was a member of the Virginia Committee of Correspondence, and, was Justice and Sheriff of Prince George County. Their son was—

Captain Richard Bland III, who was born 20th February 1730 and died in 1788. He married Mary Bolling who was born on 16th July 1744 and died on 9th September 1803. She was the daughter of Colonel John Bolling of "Cobbs" in Chesterfield County and Elizabeth Blair, his wife, who was the daughter of Doctor Archibald Blair and the niece of Commissary James Blair, D.D., the founder of the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Va. Their daughter was Anne Poythress Bland who was born 17th May 1765 and died 26th March 1806. She married first, John Morrison, and secondly, Peter Woodlief, who was a soldier of the Revolution in Captain Robert Bolling's Troop. The daughter of Anne and Peter Woodleif was—Elizabeth Bland Woodleif, born 1798 and died 1874, married Dr. Shadrach Alfriend on 27th February 1817.

THE BAKERS

Captain Lawrence Baker, a Burgess from Surrey County, Virginia, in 1666 to 1667, was an uncle of Henry Baker I, who was born in the Isle of Wight, England, and died in the Isle of Wight County, Virginia (1647-1712). Since Lawrence Baker had only daughters, it is Henry Baker I who is the ancestor of the present Baker families and their connections in Norfolk. In 1680, Katherine Baker, daughter of Captain Lawrence Baker, married Hon. Arthur Allen, Jr. and in 1681 she received at her father's death one half of his large estate. The earliest records show that Arthur Allen built "Bacon's Castle", which figured prominently in Bacon's rebellion and is still a show place because of its chandelier-type chimneys. It now belongs to Walter Pegram Warren.

Henry Baker, born in England, had as his Coat of Arms Three White Roses. He was Lieutenant Colonel in the Colonial Army, Justice of the Peace and a member of the House of Burgesses. He married Mary, who is thought to be the daughter of Colonel John Blake, Burgess in 1666 from Nansemond County, Virginia. Colonel John Blake made a grant of land to Henry Baker in 1670. The Blakes were related to Admiral Blake of the English Navy and closely connected with the Bakers.

Henry Baker I left land in Nansemond County and also land in Chowan County, North Carolina (originally part of Virginia) called "Buckland". The estate of "Buckland" is now in Gates County (formerly Chowan), North Carolina. Henry II, his son, lived in both of these places in 1720 and later.

Colonel Henry Baker, the son, was Burgess and Justice of the Peace in Nansemond County in 1714, and later lived in Chowan. His home was "Shoal Bay" (later owned by the Wrenns). He married Lady Angelica Bray of England, living in Williamsburg, Virginia. This couple's son, Henry III, was the father of General Lawrence Baker of the Revolution. General Lawrence Baker married Anne Jones.

Copy of letter written by Mrs. de Graffenreid, of Washington, D. C. to Mrs. George W. McCormick June 1900

If your sister, Mrs. Clark, has become a Colonial Dame I hope she will be there at the next meeting and I am minded to furnish two names, if not three, in the distinguished Baker line of Ancestors who rendered Colonial Service to their

Country-The birth of the elder, Henry Baker of Isle of Wight dating back to 1647. Laurence Baker, a Burgess from Surry County in 1666 to 1677 was it seemed, an uncle of Henry of Isle of Wight-Laurence died in 1681, leaving no sons-(so we hear from Blanche Baker of Norfolk) but daughters only, as his will in her possession shows—In the Will of Henry of Isle of Wight he left "Buckland" to his son Henry II, which was thrown into North Carolina when the dividing line was drawn in 1728. Henry left land to him also in Nansemond County, Va. and he, Henry II, lived there a goodly number of years as late as 1720 and later in Chowan a part of Nansemond-Henry I died in 1712, the year his Will was probated—It was drawn in 1707 when he was about sixty years of age. He had four sons, Henry, James, Laurence and William—From the last son, William, descent Judge Richard H. Baker, living in Norfolk during the Civil War and his sons and grandsons—James, the son of Henry I, was killed in the French and Indian War of 1700. His rank was Lieutenant. Henry I left his Isle of Wight estate to his son, Laurence, whose line became extinct in 1803 when his grandson, Laurence—son of his son Richard—died—The Baker crest was three white Roses-Laurence left in his will the Coat of Arms and pictures to his cousin Laurence Baker, grandson of Henry II who owned "Buckland"-This grandson was General Laurence Baker of North Carolina-of Revolutionary fame, who died in 1805—He in turn was grandfather of General Laurence Simmons Baker, C.S.A. from Suffolk, Virginia-Two orphan boys, Laurence and Hodges, are his grandsons—Henry II was father of Mary Baker who married in 1742 Tscharner de Graffenreid the first born American ancestor-Her mother was Ruth Chauncy -Henry II was Justice of the Peace from Nansemond in 1714 and later from Chowan, a highly honored position in those days—His marriage to Lady Angelica Bray, from England, the birth of their son, Henry III-Henry's second marriage to Ruth and his own birth are not on record being destroyed by fires-The Will of Henry II in 1737 leaves his watch and seal (brought from England by his Ancestors) to his son Henry III, father of General Laurence Baker of the Revolution, who married first Anne Jones they had one daughter and a son Dr. Simmons Jones (Baker). General Laurence Baker next married Anna Marie Burges, daughter of Parson Burges of England-issue one son only, Dr. John Burges Baker who had two sons in the Confederate Service, Major William James Baker, father of Blanche and General Laurence Simmons Baker, C.S.A. from Suffolk, Virginia. In 1885 Major James W. Baker writes that he saw in Edenton, North Carolina, a Commission from George II creating Henry II Justice of the Peace with some Military rank—He was alway called Colonel Henry—His father was a Lieutenant Colonel and so spoken of in the Colonial records of North Carolina. From Virginia leaf of History, Public Officers in Virginia in 1680 Isle of Wight Henry Baker 1699. Receives for Virginia duties in His Majesty's Colony and Dominion for Surry Captain Laurence Baker. Henry Baker Justice of the Peace for Isle of Wight 1702-1698 and 1685. He was also a Burgess for Isle of Wight. Henry II had large tracts of land-He left Buckland now in Gates County, North Carolina, to Henry III. To Ruth Chauncy's sons, John and Blake and others he left separate land in different Counties-John had a son in the Continental Service during the Revolution-He married Anne Norfleet and went to Tennessee—His daughter married Governor Blount of Tennessee-The Blakes were related to Admiral Blake of the English Navy and closely connected with the Bakers-Colonel John Blake was Burgess in 1666 from Nansemond County, and made a grant of land to Henry I in 1670-There is

every reason to suppose that his daughter was Henry I wife—In Henry's will she is called Mary—The name thereafter occurred frequently in coming generations—This would be a third line and there is hardly a doubt says Blanche.

"I have the wills of Laurence Baker 1681—The uncle of Henry I of Isle of Wight, also the will of Henry of Isle of Wight 1712 and of his son Henry 1737 (he died 1739) and of two of his brothers, James 1756 and Laurence of Isle of Wight and of the son and grandson of Laurence, Richard and Laurence, the last of his line."

The Bakers came from the North of England in the early part of the 17th Century, Colonel William Saunders, C.S.A. of Raleigh, North Carolina—Author, Secretary of State of North Carolina—who compiled the Colonial records of North Carolina and was the son of Dr. Simmons Jones Baker—He died a few years since, leaving no children.

Robert Frederick Baldwin (I) of Winchester was the son of Dr. Archibald Stuart Baldwin and Kitty Mackey, daughter of Dr. Robert Mackey of Winchester and Catherine Snickers who were married August 20th, 1757. Robert Frederick Baldwin (I) married Caroline M. Barton who died in 1860. Their son was—

Robert Frederick Baldwin II, born Winchester, Virginia December 16th, 1863. He married Elizabeth Deans Boykin of Baltimore, Maryland where the wedding took place on April 5th, 1899. She was born October 10, 1877 and died April 27th, 1957. He died April 27th 1930. They came to Norfolk at about the turn of the century and he started the real estate firm of Baldwin Brothers and Byrd, Real Estate and Insurance. Their son—

Robert Frederick Baldwin III was born in Norfolk, January 22nd, 1900. He attended the Norfolk Academy and Maury High School, graduating from the latter in 1916. He won a Bachelor of Arts Degree at the University of Virginia in 1919.

Robert Frederick III was a member of the Raven Society and a Phi Beta Kappa at the University. He was elected to the Legislature of Virginia as a member of the House in 1938, serving until he was elected a State Senator in 1948. He declined to run for reelection in 1968, having well served his city and his state. He returned to his real estate and insurance business.

He attended Maury High School and graduated from the Virginia Polytechnic Institute with the class of 1916, majoring in mechanical engineering. He served in the U. S. Navy in World War I, holding the rank of lieutenant, junior grade. He returned to Norfolk in 1919. He was president of the Whaley Engineering Corporation for 32 years, retiring in 1963. He is a member of the engineers of Hampton Roads, Princess Anne County Country Club and the Farmington Country Club. They have two children—

He married Marie Eloise Fitzgerald of New Jersey, on February 14th, 1954. He was a member of the Princess Anne Country Club, the Farmington Country Club and the Norfolk German Club. BALDWIN EXCURSUS

BOYKIN FAMILY

The Boykin family has lived in America over three hundred years. In records in Kent County, England, Boykin is a very old family. The first record of a Boykin in America is one Jarvis or Jervase Boykin who came to Charlestown, Massachusetts in 1635 from Charing Cross, Kent, England. Edward Boykin, early Virginia settler, was born about 1650 and either rented or leased land in the year 1670 in Isle of Wight County, that part that is now Southampton. Then followed grants in the same portion of the county to various Boykins. From Simon Boykin, the youngest son of William (1731) are descended the Boykins now living in Southampton.

From Thomas Boykin, brother of William, it is probable, is descended Major Francis Boykin, II, of the Revolution. He fought with Washington in the north and spent the memorable winter at Valley Forge, and, at the last was at Yorktown. See Pamphlet "Isle of Wight County" 1608-1907, by Col. E. H. Morrison. He was born in 1750 and died in 1805. He married Anne Marshall in 1783.

Upon the return of peace he settled upon his plantation in Isle of Wight. In 1800 he donated to the Commonwealth the land upon which the Court House now stands, and, erected the first public buildings at his own expense. Fort Boykin was evidently named for him.

Francis Marshall Boykin II was born in 1781. He was the son of Major Francis and Anne Marshall Boykin. He was a Justice of Isle of Wight County in 1805, and, a Lieut. Col. of Militia in the War of 1812. He married in 1803 Fannie Godwin and had issue—

- Anne Marshall Boykin who married Watson Pendleton Jordan on November 5th, 1818.
- 2. Francis Marshall Boykin III who was born in 1806 and died in 1866.
- 3. Robert Marshall Boykin who married 1st, Virginia Young and 2nd, Emily Mason.
- 4. Anthony Godwin Boykin who married Anne Reed Elliott.

Francis Marshall Boykin, III born 1806 at Smithfield, obtained his degree in Medicine probably in Philadelphia. He married three times, first, Hester Ann Briggs in 1843; secondly, Evelina C. Ballard; and thirdly, Mildred James Hill. He was a general of Virginia Militia and a Brigadier in the Confederate army in 1864. His plantation was called "The Rocks" and was situated on the James River. Issue by 1st wife—

- Francis Marshall Boykin Jr., who was a Lieut. Colonel in the Confederate Army.

Francis Marshall Boykin Jr. taught school in Norfolk, as also did his half sister, Mildred Isabelle Boykin. William Augustine Boykin and Robert Hill Boykin lived in Norfolk and were both members of the Norfolk German Club in 1871. Robert Hill Boykin married Salie Venable of Petersburg and lived in Richmond. William Augustine Boykin was born at "The Rocks", Isle of Wight County, on 9th April 1851, died in Ruxton, Maryland 19th May 1918 and is buried at Cedar Grove Cemetery, Norfolk. He served as a private in a boys battalion of the 3rd Virginia Infantry, used as local defense forces. He surrendered at Petersburg on his fourteenth birthday, 9th April 1865. After the war he joined the Norfolk Light Artillery Blues and rose from 2nd Lieutenant to Colonel of the Fifth Maryland Regiment (The Dandy Fifth). He attended Davison College and moved from Norfolk to Baltimore in 1881. He married in Norfolk, 13th November 1873, Elizabeth Whitehead Irwin, daughter of Henry and Cornelia Crigsby Whitehead Irwin.

IRWIN FAMILY

George Irwin was born in 1750 and died on 29th March 1812. He lived in York, Pennsylvania from 1755 to 1812. He was a member of Naci's Regiment, moving up from 2nd Lieut. to 3rd Captain in December 1775. He is mentioned frequently in Powell's History of York County.

His first wife was Martha and there are no available records of any children. He married secondly, 15th June 1807, but the wife's name is not given. Their son was—

Major John Irwin but his date of birth is not known at this writing. He married Sarah Mc-Clay of Harrisburg, Pennsylvania and he died on 10th November 1822. Their son was—

Henry Irwin who was born in 1779, in the late days of the Revolution. He died 18th November 1823. He married Elizabeth Cromwell who was born in 1791 and died 16th February 1855 in Baltimore. After the death of Henry, the widow had moved to Baltimore. Their children—

- Ann Matilda Irwin, who was born on 23rd March 1816. She married
 first, George Weathered with no record of children. She married,
 secondly, James Winchester. Their daughter was Ann Irwin Winchester of Ellerton, Maryland who was a member of the Maryland Historical Society in 1929.
- Mary Irwin, who was born the fourth of April 1818. She did not marry.

- 3. Henry Irwin Jr., born 13th October 1819 and died 9th July 1868. He was buried Elmwood Cemetery, Norfolk. He was a Captain in the Confederate army and General Elsey's Chief of Staff. He married on June 11th, 1846 Cornelia Grigsby Whitehead, born 1827 and died March 9th, 1869. There were eight children—
 - (a) Mary Irwin, born March 4th, 1847
 - (b) Henry Howard Irwin, born November 19th, 1848, died April 16th, 1850.
 - (c) Cornelia Grigsby Irwin, born May 11th, 1851, died July 24th, 1920 at Burvale, England. Buried in Elmwood Cemetery, Norfolk. She married George McBlair of Richmond in June 1880.
 - (d) Elizabeth Whitehead Irwin, born July 31st, 1853, died March 5th, 18 buried Norfolk. She married William Augustine Boykin, born April 9th, 1850, died May 14, 1918, Norfolk.
 - (e) Susan Shober Irwin, born April 20th, 1856. She married Robert Duer Wainwright, a Captain in the United States Marine Corps.
 - (f) Anne Howard Irwin who was born April 8th, 1858.
 - (g) Ellen Elzey Irwin, born June 10th 1861 and died May 12th, 1862.
 - (h) Emily Winchester Irwin, born October 15th, 1862. She married Robert Lee Hardy, uncle of General MacArthur. There were five children—

Cornelia Whitehead and Henry Irwin died soon after the yellow fever outbreak, leaving five daughters. Their guardian and uncle was John B. Whitehead. He employed a Mrs. Williamson as house keeper and kept a home for the girls on Bank Street.

 - (b) Elizabeth Deans Boykin, who was born on 10th October 1876, and died on 27th April 1957. She married Robert Frederick Baldwin on 5th April 1899 in Baltimore, Maryland. He was born in Winchester, Virginia 16th December 1863 and died 27th May 1930, Norfolk.

BANKHEAD FAMILY

Times Dispatch, June 12, 1910.

At a meeting held at Spottsylvania Courthouse for the election of officers, James Bankhead was chosen as Lieutenant of minutemen for Caroline County, September 12, 1775 (Force's American Archives 693). His portrait is in the St. Memine collection of Etchings in the Corcoran Art Gallery and in the Congressional Library, and a large oil painting in uniform is in possession of a great-great grand daughter in Connecticut. He lived at "Bankhead's Point" near Port Royal, and died in comparative youth, leaving a son and two daughters. His widow, Christian Miller Bankhead, lived to extreme old age, dying in 1840 at "Oak Spring" near Guinea Station, of an overdose of opium, "beloved of all who knew her" as stated in an old bible. The flounce of her India mull wedding dress elaborately embroidered, is still cherished by descendants, and has done duty as a christening robe for a great-grand child. Her silver snuff box and the "christening bowl" of oriental china with blue and red decoration (much scratched and battered) in which the children were baptised, are also owned by a descendant, together with a lock of her snow-white hair, as soft and fine as a baby's.

Their son, General James Bankhead U.S.A., after serving nearly fifty years during the War of 1812, the Greek and Seminole Wars, and the Mexican War, died in Command of the Department of the East in 1856. Of him and his wife, Anne Pyne, of South Carolina, there are six portraits and various miniatures in possession of descendants. Their house was at "White Plains", near Fredericksburg, was burnt during the Civil War. Their sons were Capt. John Pyne Bankhead, U.S.N., who commanded the "Monitor", lost in a violent storm off Cape Hatteras during the Civil War. General Smith Pyne Bankhead, C.S.A. (Captain of Virginia Volunteers, Mexican War); and General Henry Cary Bankhead U.S.A., General John Bankhead McGruder, C.S.A. and Captain George McGruder, U.S.N. were grandsons of James Bankhead and Christian Miller of Port Royal.

Several mahogany chairs, with cabriole legs and Dutch feet, which belonged to Thomas Roy and were imported from Scotland, have come down to his great-great-great-grand children through Elizabeth Roy and Christian Miller, their daughters and granddaughters. One of these chairs which is at "Spring Grove" near Guinea's Station, had the pierced splat and a small piece of the club foot kicked off by a Federal Soldier during the civil war, but is still highly treasured by a descendant.

It is not known if Thomas Roy had other children or left a will; Caroline County records have been destroyed.

James Bankhead, M.D., was a surgeon in the Royal Navy. His ship had visited Virginia several times and he was much impressed with the climate and the soil. Accordingly he resigned his office and came to Virginia prior to 1738.

He settled and built up a practice in Westmoreland County, on Monroe Creek. There, he met Elinor Monroe, aunt of President James Monroe, and married her on August 20, 1738. His son, James Bankhead was a Revolutionary officer, Lieutenant in the Marines.

The third James Bankhead was born in Virginia 1783, son of Lt. James Bankhead. His tastes pointed to a military life and he joined the army as Captain of the Fifth Infantry, June 18, 1808. He rose by successive steps to the rank of Lieu. Col. of the Third Artillery, April 26, 1832. He saw active service and won brevet rank as colonel in the Florida Campaign, and afterwards in the Mexican War. He received a like honor for conspicuous gallantry at Vera Cruz in Command of the Second Artillery, when he received the brevet rank of Brig. General, March 29, 1847. In the following year he was commander of Orizaba, a Department of Mexico, and at the time of his death had charge of the Military Department of the East. His son, John Pyne Bankhead, was a U.S. Naval officer during the Civil War. General Bankhead died in Baltimore November 11, 1856.



James and John Roy are on record in Spotsylvania as early as 1720, 5 years after the formation of the County. The former bought 107 acres on "Haslee River", and the latter, described as being of "St. Mary's Parish", Essex County bought 121 acres. They were of Scotch extraction, members of the Clan Gregor, having assumed the name Roy when the McGregors were prescribed in Great Britain. James Roy (d. 1741) His will names son, Thomas to whom he left all his land, and his daughter, Elizabeth, wife of John Gordon. Thomas Roy, whose guardian was John Gordon, Jr. was person for whom the town of Port Royal was named. On February 15, 1777 he became 2nd Lt. of Grayson's Continental Regiment. Elizabeth Roy, daughter of Thomas Roy m. James Miller, a Scottish man. His portrait is extant.



Dr. William Bankhead, of Caroline County, Virginia. He procured his medical degree from the University of Pennsylvania.

His daughter, Christian Miller, born 1758, m. about 1776, James Bankhead, son of Dr. James Bankhead and Ellinor Monroe of Westmoreland.

"Elizabeth Roy (McGregor) a daughter of Thomas, married a Scotchman living near Port Royal. His portrait by Copley is in possession of his great-granddaughter, Miss Virginia Miller, of Washington. He was a wealthy merchant, owning vessels which traded direct with the mother country. His daughter Christian Miller, (born 1758) married (about 1776-7) James Bankhead, son of Doctor James Bankhead and Ellinor Monroe of Westmoreland."

BARRON FAMILY

The earliest Barron of whom there is an available record is Captain Samuel Barron who came to Virginia from Bristol, England slightly before 1735. He brought with him a considerable fortune. There was constant danger in the colony of Spanish invasion, and the British governor appointed him commander of old Fort George, at Old Point Comfort. Fort George was composed of a few redoubts or strong points which were connected by brestworks. What few guns that were available were placed in the redoubts. The great hurricane of 1749 completely eliminated Fort George, the garrison fled inland. Captain Barron, according to family records, was "a gay and frolicsome man" and soon gambled away his fortune with other British Officers. He, however, owned considerable land in or near Hampton, Virginia. His youngest son—

James Barron (Primus) 1740-1787, apparently revived the family fortunes, for when Virginia's Governor, Thomas Jefferson, appointed him Commodore of the Virginia State Navy in 1779, he was able to lend the Continental Government 10,000 pounds which, incidentally, was never repaid. He had two brothers who fought the British at sea during the Revolutionary War, William and Richard. Richard was killed in a running fight with the British off Pleasure House Creek at Lynnhaven. James Barron's two sons, Samuel (Secundus) and James (Secundus) were the "Famous Barrons". James Barron, Commodore, 1740-1787 married Jane Cooper of Hampton. Among their children were—

- 1. Commodore Samuel Barron II who was born in 1765 and died in 1810.
- Commodore James Barron II who married Elizabeth Armistead, born 1769, died 1851. He married secondly Elizabeth McLachlin. Their son was—

Samuel Barron III who was born 1808 and died in 1888. He married Imogen Wright (1808-1855). His father having died when he was two years old, he was raised by his uncle, James. Imogen Wright was the daughter of Mary Taylor Sawyer of N. C. and Mathew Phripp Wright, her husband, of Norfolk. Their children were—

 - (e) William Henry Thompson Barron, born in 1854 and died in 1924. He lived in Warsaw most of his life. He married first 1878, Helen Louise Boutelle. He married secondly, Charlotte Anderson Long of Massachusetts.

(f) There were three other sisters who died unmarried.

Commodore Samuel Barron III (1808-1888) was commissioned by Presidential Order in the United States Navy as a Midshipman, when three years old, in order for his mother to have sufficient pension to live comfortably when his father died. He was on active Naval duty as a Midshipman at 14 years old. He rose to Captain in the U. S. Navy but seceded with Virginia at the start of the War Between the States. He was made Commodore in the Confederate Navy. He was captured on an inspection trip at Fort Hatteras, N. C. He was eventually exchanged and spent the rest of the war in Paris as a Confederate agent. His Aide was Lieut. William Conway Whittle of Norfolk. He died in Essex County, Virginia.

Commodore Samuel Barron II (1765-1810) joined the Virginia State Navy as a Midshipman in 1790 at the age of fourteen. He took part in many engagements with the British during the Revolutionary War and had been made a Lieutenant by the time it ended. He rejoined the Navy in 1798 as a Lieutenant under Captain Truxton (Nancy Truxton Barron's great, great grandfather) on the USS Frigate Constellation. He commanded her for a short time when Truxton became Commodore. He was Commander-in-Chief of the United States Fleet in the Mediterranean in the Tripolitan Wars. He succeeded Commodore Preble in 1804 and in 1805 concluded the Peace Treaty with the Bashaw of Tripoli.

Commodore James Barron II (1768-1851) married Elizabeth Armistead. He joined the Virginia State Navy as a Midshipman at twelve years old. Actively fought against the British at sea during the Revolution, finishing as a Lieutenant. He joined the fledgling U. S. Navy in 1798 as a Lieutenant under Captain John Barry, the ranking officer. Captain Barry was the great grandfather of the late C. Moran Barry of Norfolk. Captain Barry described Barron as follows: "There is no better officer in the U. S. Navy." He soon made Captain and then Commodore. He was headed for the top when tragedy struck.

He sailed from Norfolk aboard the Frigate Chesapeake to take over the Command of the Mediterranean Fleet when his vessel was attacked by HMS "Leopard" in Lynnhaven Rhodes. The Chesapeake was unprepared for battle and did not get off a single shot. Twice wounded, Barron surrendered his ship to save further slaughter. He was censored for "not anticipating the possibility of a British attack" and was suspended from the Navy for five years. As a result of this affair Barron finally challenged Stephen Decatur, a former midshipman under him. Decatur was killed in the ensuing duel at Bladensburg in 1820. Barron was wounded but survived to re-enter the Navy in 1822 and lived to be its senior officer. The poor Chesapeake later in the war left Boston again unprepared under Captain Lawrence of "Don't give up the Ship" fame. She was attacked and captured by HMS Shannon under Capt. Broke. She was sent to Halifax and later to England where she was broken up. Some of her timbers are in an operating grist mill in England today.

Samuel Barron IV (1836-1892) married Agnes Newton Smith, daughter of Col. Joseph Smith of "Mantua". He was in the Confederate Navy and sailed with the famous Captain John Moffett of the Confederate Ship "Florida", a Commerce Raider. Their son was Judge James S. Barron of Norfolk.

Commodore James Barron II (1769-1851) married Elizabeth Armistead. Their children were—

- Jane Armistead Barron who married Wilson Hope and died in 1861. Their son was—

BARTON FAMILY

The Reverend Thomas Barton was of English parentage, his ancestors being Royalists and churchmen who sided with King Charles at the Battle of "Marsden Moor" in 1844 and a year later at "Naseby". This completed the defeat of the King's forces who were comprised for the most part of the gentry and the 'landed proprietors'. Oliver Cromwell seized for the state the property and possessions of the Royalists and the Barton family remained in the background until the accession of Charles II. He granted them considerable land in Ireland in compensation for their losses.

The Reverend Thomas Barton was born in 1730 and died in 1780. He was educated at Dublin University, Trinity College, and shortly after graduating accepted a professorship at the University of Pennsylvania in America. He married, in 1753, Esther Rittenhouse, daughter of Matthais Rittenhouse, the early American Astronomer. At the outbreak of the American Revolution he was the rector at the episcopal church at Lancaster, Pa. He had but recently taken his vows to his church and his king, so he felt compelled to resign his pastorate and move with his family to New York which was at that time in the hands of the British. Elizabeth Stark was the daughter of Captain William Stark and his wife Mary Bolling, whom he married in 1727. Mary Bolling was the eldest child of Colonel Robert Bolling Jr., who was the son of Col. Robert Bolling of "Chellowe". He died at Springdale in 1821. The 3 known children of Richard Peters and Martha Walker Barton were—

Due to ill health, he resigned from the Navy and went back to his boyhood home at "Springdale" where he continued to practice medicine as best he was able. He married on April 12th, 1854, Sarah Cabell McClellan who was born December 2nd, 1822. She was the daughter of the Hon. Thomas S. and Margaret Cabell McClellan.

James, the 3rd Earl of Ormond, was the son of James, the 2nd Earl of Ormond and Lady Elizabeth D'Arcy.

James, the 2nd Earl of Ormond, was the son of James, the 1st Earl of Ormond and Lady Eleanor de Bohun.

Lady Eleanor de Bohun, was the daughter of Princess Elizabeth Plantagenet and Humphrey de Bohun, Earl of Hereford and Essex.

Princess Elizabeth Plantagenet, was the daughter of England's greatest king, Edward 1st, and Eleanor of Castile, his queen. She was daughter of Ferdinand III, king of Castile, and the granddaughter of Alphonzo IX and Queen Berengaria.

Matilda was the daughter of—

Henry 1st, King of England, and Matilda, his wife, dau Malcolm III, (1027-1087) King of Scotland.

William the Conqueror, King of England and Duke of Normandy and Matilda died 1083, his wife, were the parents of Henry 1st. Matilda, his Queen, was the daughter of Baldwin 7th, Count of Flanders and Adela, his wife. Adela was the daughter of Robert 1st, King of France who died in 1017. William 1st (Conqueror) was natural son of Robert, Duke of Normandy and Arlotta, the daughter of the tanner of Falaise.

Baldwin 7th, Count of Flanders, and Adela, daughter of Robert 1st, King of France who died in 1017, were the parents of Matilda, who died in 1083 and who married William the Conqueror.

Baldwin 6th, Count of Flanders, married Eleanor, daughter of Richard, 2nd Duke of Normandy. He was the son of—

Arnolf 5th, Count of Flanders, who died in 988, married Rosalie, daughter Baranger II, King of Italy. Arnolf 5th was the son of—

Baldwin 4th, Count of Flanders. He married Maud, the daughter of Conrad 1st, King of Germany. Baldwin 4th was the son of—

Arnolf 3rd, Count of Flanders—He married Alica, the daughter of Herbert, the 2nd Count of Vermandois. Arnolf was the son of Baldwin II, Count of Flanders.

Baldwin II, Count of Flanders, married Alfretha, (Aelswitha) who was the daughter of Alfred the Great of England, born 849, and Alswith (Ealhswith) his wife. Alfred was the son of Ethelwolf and the grandson of Egbert, King of the West Saxons. He trained his subjects in arms and in agriculture and was able to hold off and to drive back the constant invasions of the Danes and begin the building of the British nation. Baldwin II was son of—

Baldwin 1st, Count of Flanders, married Judith, the widow of King Ethelwold. She was the daughter of—

Charles, the Bold, Roman Emperor (he called himself). His wife was Ermuntrude, the daughter of the Count of Orleans. Charles the Bold was the son of—

Louis 1st, The Pius, Roman Emperor, who married Judith, the daughter of Welf (Guelph), Count of Bavaria. Louis 1st, the Pius, was the son of—

Charlemagne (742-814), King of France, whom the Pope had pronounced "Roman Emperor". Born in 742 he succeeded his father as King of the Franks in 768. His empire embraced all of France and a large part of Germany, and later the Netherlands and most of Northern Italy. He died in January 814. He developed several ports, encouraged scientists and teachers, sought to improve the liturgy and church music and enacted wise laws. He did much for his people and his country. Charlemagne was the son of Pepin, the Short.

Pepin the Short, King of France, married Bertrade. She was the daughter of Charibette, Count of Laon. Queen Bertrade died in the year 768.

Charles Martel, was born in 688. He was the son of Pepin II d'Aeristal, Duke of Austrasia, and Elphide, his wife. Charles Martel was the Duke of Franks. He died in the year 741. He married as his queen. Robrude.

Pepin II d'Aeristal, Duke of Austrasia, married Elphide. He died in 714. Doda, son of Pepin I, married Anchasis, the daughter of Saint Arnold. She died in 640. He was the son of—

Adalgiselus, son of Arnolf, Bishop of Metz, and Begga, his wife. She was the daughter of—

Pepin 1st, King of Austrasia, who died in 639. He was the founder of the Carolingian Line.

Returning to William the Conqueror and his wife Matilda-

Egbert, 1st King of England was of the royal family of Essex, b 779, reigned 802-839.

Ethelwulf, his son, was King of England from 839 until 857. His son was— Alfred the Great, born 849. He was sent to Rome for his education and religious training. He married Eathswyth Meriel, daughter Ethelred Meriel, Earl of Gaine in Mercia.

Edward the Elder, was their son. His queen's name was Elgiva. Their son was—

BELL

Hatten's "Emigrants to America 1600 to 1700" lists John Bell to Virginia. Greer's "Early Virginia Immigrants 1623-1666" shows "Alexander Bell and John Bell in 1654 sponsored by Thomas Willoughby of Lower Norfolk County."

John Bell of Whyteside, Scotland, born about 1620, married Marion Mc-Cullock of Ardwell. Their son, John Bell of Arkland and Whyteside was born in 1655, and killed as a Covenantor in 1685. His son, James Bell of Gribdae, born 1678, died 1756, married Mary McMillan (born 1683-1777). Gribdae was purchased by him in 1723, together with Marks and Kirkbride, in Scotland.

William Bell of Marks, son of James and Mary Bell (born 1698 died 1783) married Margaret Holliday (b. 1715, d. 1800). Their son, the second one, John Bell of Gribdae (1745-1835) married Grizel Gordon (1749-1826). Their third son, Alexander Bell of Gribdae, born 1784, died 1812, was buried in old St. John's churchyard, Richmond, Virginia. He married Jean Hamilton.

Their son, Alexander Bell (b. November 13, 1803) came to Virginia as a young man and married on May 31, 1833, Margaret Souther in the Presbyterian Church at the corner of Charlotte and Catherine (Bank) Streets, Norfolk. She was the daughter of Robert and Margaret Souther, born on Wide Water Street, Norfolk, on November , 1806. Their surviving children were:

- Robert Souther Bell (March 21, 1834-1905), First Lt. in Hoke's N. C. Brigade, C.S.A. He was a prisoner on Johnson's island. He died July 18, 1905.
- Alexander Taylor Bell, (b. December 12, 1835-). He was a physician and officer in Stuart's Cavalry; was captured at the fall of Richmond, prisoner in Libby Prison.
- 3. James Nichol Bell, (born August 9, 1839, died January 1890).
- 4. Douglas Bell (born January 25, 1841, died May 1898 in Baltimore, Md.)
- 5. Margaret Souther Bell (b. January 25, 1843—Norfolk, died October 26, 1920).
- Norman Bell (August 30, 1844-October 20, 1916). He was Secretary attached to the staff of General Robert E. Lee. He made copies of General Lee's farewell address.
- 7. Thomas Knox Bell (December 28, 1845-November 30, 1895). He served under General Joseph E. Johnston, in ordinance department. He surrendered with Johnston at Greensboro. He never married.

In the year 1855 the yellow fever epidemic hit Norfolk, wiping out some whole families. Everyone was in mourning. Just before the quarantine, Mr. Bell, his family, Mrs. Falconer and her children, boarded one of the last vessels

allowed to leave, thus escaping the horrible plague. Provision was made for the care of the negroes while the family was away.

A glimpse of life in Norfolk when the yellow fever epidemic was over gave this picture of the Bell family:

"Mammy Rose, the old Negro cook was gone. William became our cook, and Pa bought two others, Jim Dillard, who became our butler, and Critty, our chambermaid. Our family consisted of Father, Mother, Robert, who was a clerk in Father's office, Alexander and James, who were at William and Mary and Charlottesville respectively, Douglas and Norman at the Academy on Bank Street, Thomas, who went to Miss Kate Bell's, an old friend of my mother's, and I (Margaret) who went to Mr. Aristides Smith's school on Holt Street. Norman and I began at Miss Kate Bell's. There we really did learn to spell, memorized our multiplication tables and were taught manners with respect for our elders. I, the only daughter, took music from Miss Cassidy, an Irish lady who lived on the corner of Cumberland and Freemason Streets, opposite Christ's Church and Dr. John Baylor's house on the other corner. After the fever, Miss Cassidy did not come back and I began music under Mr. Masi until the summer of 1861. He was organist of Christ Church. Miss Mary Masi and Mr. Frank Masi are his grandchildren.

"The Confederate troops had all left and the Yankees took over the town. I went to the front bedroom and, peeping through the shutters, watched the enemy calvary come down the cobblestone street. A thick gloom settled over us. There were only Father, Mother and I left of the family. In order to remain in Norfolk, we were required to take the oath of allegiance. This is a copy of the certificate handed Mother:

Norfolk, Virginia October 5, 1864

Provost Marshall's Office District of Virginia

This is to certify that Margaret S. Bell, aged 51, occupation housekeeper, residence 41 Catherine Street, has taken and subscribed the Oath and Parole required by General Orders Nos. 31 and 49, Current Series, for a loyal citizen of the United States, residing in a state ever in rebellion, or who has sympathized with the Seceding States.

A. W. Irchen Capt. and Supply Adjutant Provost Marshall

"Pa was very fond of entertaining company. During the early part of the war when the Confederates were in Norfolk, he was always going down town and meeting soldiers and bringing them home for a meal. One Sunday, I happened to be looking out of a window and saw Pa coming up the street accompanied by two strange men. I exclaimed, 'Here comes Pa with two more hungry soldiers to eat dinner.'

"One of these soldiers was an Irishman, Walter F. Irvine, who was stationed with his battery, The Louisiana Guard Artillery, at Sewell's Point. He visited our house frequently, and once he was taken sick and spent several weeks

with us. Then Norfolk was evacuated and I did not see him until after the war, and seldom had news from him. He afterwards became my husband." This account was by Margaret Souther Bell Irvine.

Margaret Irvine's mother, Margaret Taylor Souther, was born in Norfolk, November 13, 1806. She was an unusually pretty and attractive young lady, counting among her many beaux Hugh Blair Grigsby, half uncle to Miss Betty Poindexter and Hugh Blair Galt's mother's father.

Her husband, Alexander Bell II, had been born at Gribdae, near Kirkcudbright, Scotland, November 13, 1803. His father was Alexander Bell also who came to this country and died quite young on December 19, 1812, his wife having died years before. Alexander Bell I came over to join an uncle, Basil Gordon, living in Fredericksburg. After his death, the son Alexander Bell, when he was old enough, came to Virginia to the same Basil Gordon, his great uncle. He went into business with his future brother-in-law, Thomas F. Knox, but moved to Norfolk when he married Margaret Souther.

The diary of Margaret Souther Irvine relates:

"In 1801, there came to Norfolk a vessel named "Jean" from Aberdeen, Scotland. On her were George Reid and wife, nee Elizabeth Taylor, and her younger sister, Margaret, daughters of John and Margaret Carr Taylor of Forfar, Scotland. Also a passenger was a young man, Robert Souther, of Dundee, Scotland. His family name was originally Johnstone, but for political reasons, some generations back, it was changed to Souther, also a family name.

"Robert Souther, having become acquainted with the Reids and Margaret Taylor, decided to remain in Norfolk, and in January 1808, married Margaret. He became a retail merchant and they lived in a cottage on Wide Water Street, adjoining a stone yard and wharf which he had acquired.

"In the early twenties he built a large home on Main Street, south side, where the family lived until 1852, when it was sold for the settlement of his estate. It was located just west of the old Gladstone Hotel. He was a prosperous man, having a large stone business with Sicily and a corn business with the eastern States.

"The children of Robert and Margaret Taylor Souther were James, who moved to New York; Robert to Philadelphia; Virginia, who married Thomas F. Knox and was living in Fredericksburg; Jean, who married Thomas G. Broughton; Charlotte Louisa who married John Falconer, a Scotsman, living in Baltimore; and Margaret who married Alexander Bell. Margaret and Alexander Bell lived in the Bank Street home in Norfolk, where their children were born. When the house was sold in 1852, they went to live with the Broughton's, who were living at Mariner and Chapel Streets. There was still another daughter of Robert and Margaret Souther, Eliza, who remained with her mother and cared for her until her death.

WALKE AND CURTIS

Drayton Mills Curtis was born 7th October 1782 at West Simsbury, Connecticut. He married Mary Walke, who was born 13th November 1788 at Norat Norfolk, Virginia. He died 25th April 1856 at Brecksville, Ohio.

Mary Walke was educated at the Moravian Seminary at Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. She became a teacher at the Moravian School in Salem, North Carolina. She was married on 30th November 1809 to Drayton Mills Curtis in Norfolk, Virginia. She was the daughter of William Walke and Mary Calvert. She was the granddaughter of Anthony Walke and Mary Moseley, and, of Cornelius Calvert and Elizabeth Thoroughgood. Cornelius Calvert was mayor of Norfolk in 1768 and in 1778. He was the son of Cornelius Calvert and Mary Saunders. The family bible of Cornelius Calvert may be seen at the Willoughby-Baylor House in Norfolk.

Drayton Mills Curtis and Mary Walke were the parents of Elizabeth Curtis Wallace, whose diary for 1863-64 has been published by the Norfolk County Historical Society under the title Glencoe Diary.

George Thomas Wallace was born in the year 1812 at Great Bridge, Norfolk County, Virginia. He married on 24th February 1835, at Deep Creek, Elizabeth Curtis, who was born 31st January 1816 at Chillicothe, Ohio. As noted, she was the daughter of Drayton Mills Curtis and Mary Walke, his wife. George Thomas Wallace died in 1889 at "Glencoe", Norfolk County, and Elizabeth died 7th January 1866.

FEREBEE

Thomas Cooper Ferebee II was born 25th August 1830 at Indian Town, Currituck County, North Carolina. He died on 5th July 1879 at the residence of his brother-in-law, Dr. George Walke Wallace in Berkley, Norfolk, Virginia. He graduated from the University of North Carolina in 1853 and was married on 10th September 1857 to Mary Elizabeth Wallace, daughter of George T. Wallace and Elizabeth Curtis Wallace of "Glencoe", Norfolk County. Thomas Cooper Ferebee II was the son of—

Thomas Cooper Ferebee, born 1771 and died 1834, and Judith Gregory Mackie, his wife. He was the son of—

William Ferebee who was born in 1722 and died in 1783. His wife was Elizabeth Cooper who was born in 1728 and died in 1794. He was a member of the North Carolina Assembly in the years 1760, 1762, 1778 and 1779. He was a member of the State Senate in 1782 and 1783. In 1761 he built on his plantation, "Culong", the Indian Town Academy. He was the son of Thomas Ferebee and the grandson of John Ferebee, the surveyor, who laid out the streets of the Borough of Norfolk in 1682.

Note: Henry Berkeley, Esq. received 1st April 1651, a grant for 2400 acres of land in James City County, lying on the north side of the Chicahominy River, near the head of the said river, up the swamp which divides this and the land of Thomas Rolfe. This grant was given as a reward for the transportation into Virginia of 48 people.

MIDDLETON

John Sutton Middleton was born on 3rd July 1786, and died 15th December 1867. He was son of Joseph Middleton and Elizabeth Ballentine. They were married on 18th October 1765, by Parson Pasteur, rector of St. Bride's Parish. Their son was—

Hon. Joseph Blackwell, founder of the Virginia Family, settled in Northumberland County, naming his home "The Poplars". Graduating from Oxford, he came to the Colony in 1636, being sent over as King's surveyor. The original seal with the Blackwell arms is now in possession of one of his descendants, Edgar Blackwell of Northumberland County. His wife's name is unknown. His known son was Hon. BOUSH FAMILY

Maximillian Boush, the Elder, was the first of the family in the Norfolk section. His plantation was on Bennett's Creek. His first wife was Mary Bennet who evidently died childless. His second wife was Sarah Woodhouse. Their known children were—

- 1. Samuel Boush I who was left property by both his father and mother.
- 2. Maximillian Boush II, also left property by both his father and mother.

Samuel Boush was the first mayor of Norfolk, appointed by the Charter of the Borough on 15th of September 1736 in the Tenth Year of the Reign of King George II. Samuel Boush married in 1696, (as her third husband) Alice Mason, the widow of Robert Hodge, who died in 1681. She was the daughter of Col. Lemuel Mason, born 1628 and died about 1702, and Anne Seawell, his wife. Anne Seawell was the daughter of Lieut. Henry Seawell and Alice Willoughby, his wife. Henry Seawell was a Burgess and Alice Willoughby was the daughter of Thomas Willoughby.

Col. Samuel Boush II was the son of Samuel and Alice Mason Boush. He married first Ann Goodrich, daughter of Benjamin Goodrich. He married secondly in 1735 Frances Sayer, daughter Charles Sayer, 1st Clerk of Court of Princess Anne County (1716-1740) and his wife, Margaret. He was 1st Clerk of Court of Norfolk County 1742-1754, Burgess from Norfolk County, Vestryman of Elizabeth River Parish, Justice Norfolk County and Colonel Norfolk County Militia. He died in 1736—see Will Book I, Norfolk County, Pages 32 to 37.

Maximillian Boush II, son of Maximillian Boush, the Elder, and Sarah Woodhouse, his wife, married Elizabeth Wilson. Their known children were—

- Frederick Boush, who owned a lot in Kempsville which he willed to his granddaughter, Elizabeth Walke Boush.
- Elizabeth Boush, who married Gershom Nimmo, who died in 1766. She was married a third time, to Jacob Hunter.

Maximillian Boush II was Queen's Attorney in the County Courts of Norfolk and Princess Anne. Later he was King's Attorney in these two counties and Nansemond. In 1723 Maximillian Boush, who lived in Lynnhaven Parish, was a church warden, according to "Meade". In 1724, according to the parish record, Major Max. Boush and John Cornick were wardens and Captain Anthony Walke was a member of the vestry. He was Lt. Col. of Militia and a Justice from May 2nd, 1733 to June 5th, 1734. He was Sheriff from June 1734 to May 5th, 1736 and a Member of the House of Burgesses for many years.

Captain Nathaniel Boush, son of Col. Samuel Boush and Frances Lawson, his wife, gave bond on 4th September 1787 to marry Elizabeth (Talbot) Tabb,

widow of John Tabb. Her will can be found in Will Book #4, page 215, Corporation Court, Norfolk.

Charles Sayer Boush, born 1792-died 1831, was the son of Captain Nathaniel Boush and Elizabeth (Talbot) Tabb. He married Catherine Webb, daughter of Dr. George Webb of Great Bridge. Their marriage bond was dated the 17th of October 1822. Wedding probably at Trinity Church.

In compliance with the royal mandate, land was purchased from Nicholas Wise—about fifty acres—and the town of Norfolk was surveyed and platted by John Ferebee, surveyor, showing half-acre lots with Main Street where it is now located and several lesser streets.

From 1682 to 1700, the following names were among lot owners in the town of Norfolk: George Newton, Thomas Walke, Samuel Boush, Thomas Nash and Edward Moseley.

The first church on the present site of Old St. Paul's was started in 1640. Most of the people in the early days of the parish came by boat. Newton's Creek, a branch of the Elizabeth River, came within a hundred or two hundred yards of the churchyard. Samuel Boush presented the church with a silver chalice which is now available to sightseers in the Norfolk Museum.

Norfolk received its charter from the King in 1736 and officially became a town. Samuel Boush II was appointed the first Mayor by Governor Gooch.

Major Maxmillian Boush was church warden of Lynnhaven Parish November 1723 according to the parish record. In 1724, Major Boush and Mr. John Cornick were church wardens and Capt. Anthony Walke was a member of the Vestry (according to Meade). In 1748, new names appeared among the vestry: Major Nathaniel Newton, James Nimmo, Major Thomas Walke and John Whitehead. In 1805, the Vestry included Thomas Lawsen, George D. Corprew and William Boush.

Catherine Webb was his second wife. His first wife was Martha Sweney, daughter of Charles and Ann Wythe Sweney, whom he married on the 6th of May 1774. Martha Sweney was born in 1753 and died between 1787 and 1792.

Jonathan Eilbeck Boush, was born 24th August 1823, in Portsmouth, Virginia, and died 25th May 1885, son of Charles Sayer and Catherine Webb Boush. He married on 8th of June 1848, Catherine Virginia Willey, born 20th February 1827, died 8th June 1908, daughter William Malachi and Loretta Wallace Willey of Norfolk County as shown in the family Bible.

Herbert Mallory Boush, born 5th June 1870, died 15th February 1936, son of Jonathan Eilback and Catherine Willey Boush, married on the 16th of December 1897, Laura Herbert Foster, daughter of Charles Burroughs Foster and Anne Herbert of Princess Anne County, Virginia. Anne Herbert was daughter of Edward Henry Herbert and Rebecca Tatem, his wife, of Princess Anne County.

George Webb Boush, born in Princess Anne County, 23rd September 1898, was the son of Herbert Mallory and Laura Foster Boush. He married Eileen Lindsley of Kansas City, Missouri on the 8th of January 1921. She was the daughter of Lawrence Dell Lindsley of Palermo, Kansas, and Neelie Maria Prescott born in Keesville, N. Y.

Eileen Lindsley Boush, daughter of George Webb and Eileen Lindsley Boush, was born 5th October 1922. She married on 28th December 1950,

Russell Burnley Davis, son of Joseph Eley Causey Davis of Southampton County, Virginia, and Maude Moore of Martin County, N. C., his wife.

The children of Russell Burnley and Eileen Lindlsey Boush Davis are-

Samuel Boush I gave the site upon which Old Saint Paul's Church now stands. Not only the land but he contributed substantially toward the cost of the first church built upon the site in the year 1640. He gave a silver platen to the old church which is highly treasured and still in the possession of the church. His initials were worked into the brickwork of the new church which was shelled and burned by Dunmore in the Revolutionary War. The church was rebuilt, the walls being 22 inches thick and practically unharmed by the fire. The walls around the churchyard, many times patched and rebuilt, are still in place.

Lieut. Francis Mason (1595-1648) married Alice Willoughby. He had come to Virginia in 1613 and later became a Burgess. Their son was—

Col. Lemuel Mason (1628-ca 1702) married Alice Willoughby, the daughter of Thomas Willoughby. Their daughter—

Alice Mason, daughter of Col. Lemuel and Alice Willoughby Mason, married Samuel Boush.

EXCURSUS

Edward Travis came to Virginia around the year 1620. He married a Miss Johnson who was the daughter of John and Anne Johnson in the year 1624. The Johnsons lived on Jamestown Island.

Edward Travis Jr. was their son. In as much as her grandson was named Champion, it can be assumed that he married Elizabeth Champion. Their son was—

Edward Travis III who married a young lady named Rebecca. Again we do not have her family name. The fourth Edward was called—

Col. Edward Travis, an organizer of the local militia which was most essential for protection from the Indians. He married Susanna Hutchings. Their son was—

Col. Champion Travis, who married Elizabeth Boush, the daughter of Samuel Boush whose will was probated in 1784. She was the granddaughter of Col. (Major) Samuel Boush whose will was probated in 1759, and the great granddaughter of Samuel Boush I and Alice Mason, his wife.

Susan H. Travis, daughter of Col. Champion Travis and Elizabeth Boush, his wife, married in 1813, Edmund Ruffin (1794-1865). He was an editor, Agriculturist and it was he who fired the first gun at Fort Sumter.

Edmund Ruffin was the son of George Ruffin (1765-1810) and Jane Lucas, his wife.

William Boush was the son of Frederick Boush. He married Mary (surname not available) and their daughter's name was Eliza whose first husband was J. S. Walke. She was born in 1802 and died in 1884.

John Boush built in 1783-4 the large frame house on what now is called Tazewell St. His second wife was Alice Mason Porten who later married Samuel Boush, son of Maximillian Boush, II, who was "Queen's Attorney". This house was much later owned by the Freeman family who eventually had it moved and rebuilt at Edgewater where it is still occupied by some of the family.

Other children of Herbert Mallory and Laura Herbert Foster Boush were-

BOYKIN FAMILY

The first member of this family of whom we have a record was-

Edward Boykin who died in 1728. His wife was named Ann. His grant was recorded in the Land Office of Isle of Wight County, Virginia in patentbook #7, Page 462.

William Boykin was his son. He married Margaret Vickers. He died in 1732.

John Boykin was the son of William Boykin. John married Elizabeth Joyner. John died in 1792.

Joel Boykin married Sarah Grantham on 13th March 1775. He died in 1807.

David J. Boykin of Cedar Lawn was their son. He died in 1830. He married Elizabeth Pasteur who was born in 1786 of Southampton County. She was the daughter of Captain John Pasteur, born 1752 in France, and his wife, Honore Wilson. Captain John Pasteur was the son of Dr. Jean Pasteur of Williamsburg, Va.

John Pasteur Boykin, born 1813, of "Cedarlawn", Southampton County, was the son of David and Elizabeth Boykin. He married Martha Ann Fulgham in 1842. John died in 1886 at "Cedarlawn" and Martha in 1883.

Alexander Christopher C. Boykin, born in 1855, was the son of John and Martha. He married Florence Gatewood Jeffries, born 22 1864, on 25 July 1889. He died on 10 May 1943 and she died in May 1958. Their children were—

- Maury Boykin, civil engineer, who was employed by the City of Norfolk until he reached retirement age. He was unmarried.
- Barbara Gatewood Boykin, who married Harold Leroy Benson, now deceased. Their daughter is Barbara Minor Benson who married Dale Lincoln Terrill who was born in 1943. The daughter of Dale and Bar-Barbara Terrill is Elizabeth Minor Terrill who was born in 1971.
- Christine Minor Boykin, who married Robert Jackson Crow, born in 1907. Their children are,

Patricia Boykin Crow, who was born in 1934,

Robert Jackson Crow, who was born in 1941. He married Winifred Tanges.

Florence Gatewood Jeffries Boykin was the daughter of James Madison Jeffries, born Feb. 22nd, 1841 and died in 24, and Lucy Barbara Gatewood, born 25 July 1843 and died September 14th, 1918. She was the daughter of—

Doctor William Lowry Gatewood of Essex County—died at "Linden Hall", Middlesex County. He was the son of Kemp Gatewood of "Bealomonde", Essex County and Barbara Minor.

Kemp Gatewood, was the son of William Gatewood of "Bealemonde" and Elizabeth Cosby.

William Gatewood, was the son of John Gatewood born in England and died in Essex County, Virginia.

Philemon Gatewood, was the first cousin of Kemp Gatewood, was commissioned a Naval Officer by George Washington and lived for a time on Catherine Street in old Norfolk. He was the grandson of John Gatewood (1st).

John Minor 1st, was born in 1707 at "Topping Castle". He married on Nov. 14th, 1732 Sarah Carr, born in Nov. in 1714. He died in 1755 and she on 28th Nov. 1772. He was a major in the Continental Line 1777-1779 and a member of the House of Burgesses for King William County. He was son of Garrett Minor of Fredericksburg, and Diana Carr, his wife.

Sarah Carr, was the daughter of Thomas Carr (born 1678, died 1737) and Mary Dabney, daughter of Corneliue Dabney.



BROOKE FAMILY

Most of the Brooke Family of Virginia, or, perhaps all of it can be traced back to Robert Brooke, Gentleman Justice, and his wife Katherine Booth who were living in Essex County in 1689. Exactly who this Robert Brooke was is a matter of uncertainty, and though it has been stated, and there are some who believe, that he was the third son of the Robert Brooke who came from England to Maryland in 1650, with his wife, Mary Mainwaring, and eight sons. Apparently there is no real proof of this connection.

The following is a quotation from the genealogical writings of the eminant Professor, St. George Tucker Brooke, who published the genealogy of the Brooke family in the Virginia Historical Magazine. "In 1689 we find Robert Brooke and his wife, Katherine Booth, daughter of Humphery Booth, living in Essex and filling the office of Justice of the Peace of the County. Whence he came will probably not now ever be known."

There were numerous Brookes living in Virginia before 1689, from whom Robert of Essex might have descended, as the family took an early interest in the colonization of Virginia and were very active in the Virginia Company. We find in the charter of 1609 that Sir Colithenes Brooke, Sir John Brooke, Christopher Brooke, Gentleman, and Robert Brooke are mentioned among the incorporators of the Virginia Company.

In John Smith's "History of Virginia" we find the names of two Brookes listed among the "Adventurers" making the voyage to Virginia in 1620. William Brooke came from England to Virginia, with 19 other immigrants on board "The Temperance" in 1621, and, Basil Brooke aged twenty came to Virginia in 1634 on the "Bonaventure". Robert Brooke, aged thirty-three landed in Virginia 15th May 1635, and a Robert Brooke, is said to have come to Virginia in 1660. There was a William Brooke who was Clerk of the Court of Essex in 1665. All of these may have been connected with the Maryland family, and probably so, as the names are the same and also the coat of arms. It is thought that they stem from one of the three branches of the Brooke family in England, namely the House of Cobham.

Robert Brooke of Essex and his wife Katherine had four known children—Robert Jr., William, Humphrey and Mary.

Robert Brooke Jr. was a noted surveyor and a "Knight of the Golden Horse Shoe". He rode with Governor Spottswood on his memorable journey across the Blue Ridge Mountains in the year 1914. There is a Tablet erected by the Colonial Dames, atop the mountain pass, at Swift Run Gap, with the name of the Governor and the names of all of those whom accompanied him, engraved upon it. This Robert Brooke is said at one time to have owned at least twenty thousand acres of land in Virginia. He lived at "Farmer's Hall" on the Rappahannock River which was burned some years ago.

William Brooke, brother of Robert Brooke Ir. married Sarah Taliaferro. He died early, leaving his widow, Sarah Taliaferro Brooke who proceeded with his plans and built the well known old colonial home known as "Brooke's Bank" on a part of the Old Plantation also facing the river. Here this branch of the Brooke family dwelt for more than two hundred years. It was built in the year 1731.

It seems that the Brooke family history was sadly neglected for a long time. An interesting story is that during the Battle of Fredericksburg the explosion quite close to the old house of a shell from a Union gunboat in the river nearby so shook the house that it caused a secret panel in the wainscot to spring open. This brought to light a mass of old papers including wills, deeds, land patents and letters which helped the record immensely.

There is a tablet in the Essex Court House at Tappahannock, inscribed thusly-

> In Memory Of ROBERT BROOKE Gentleman Justice of Ye Old Court 1692-1706 and of ROBERT BROOKE IR Deputy Clerk of Ye Old Court 1700 HORSE SHOE KNIGHT

Since the early Colonial beginnings of the Brooke family in Virginia, Brookes have become connected by marriage with many other old Virginia families including the Baylors, the Littles, the Tunstalls, the Brooke Taylors and the Wallers.

Robert Brooke, Gentleman, of "Brooke's Bank", third son of Robert and Mary Mainwaring Brooke was born between 1652 and 1657. He lived in old Rappahannock County, Virginia, that which is now Essex County. He married sometime before 1683 Catherine, the daughter of Humphrey and Margaret Underwood Booth of old Rappahannock County. Their children were—

- Robert Brooke III of "Farmer's Hall", Essex County, a well known surveyor. He was a member of Governor Spottswood's party who crossed the Blue Ridge Mountains and discovered the beautiful Valley of Virginia. The members of this cavalcade were called Knights of the Golden Horseshoe and each was presented by the Governor with a small golden horseshoe as a momento. Robert Brooke's horseshoe is still preserved in the family. His wife's name was Phoebe.
- 2. William Brooke of Essex County who died in 1735.
- 3. Humphrey Brooke who died unmarried between 1758 and 1763.
- 4. Richard Brooke of Smithfield, Virginia, born 1732 and died 1792.

William Brooke, son of Robert and Phoebe Brooke, was born about 1720. He married Mary Beale of "Chestnut Hill", Richmond County. They had a daughter, Phoebe Brooke. Their son was—

William Brooke Jr. whose home was known as "Locustdale" in old Rappahannock County. He married in 1811 Jeannie Morrison, daughter of Captain Morrison and his wife, Jane Cumming, of Fonnes, Scotland. She died at Warrenton, Virginia.

James Vass Brooke, son of William Jr. and Jeannie Morrison Brooke, was born 10th October 1824 at Falmouth, Virginia. He married on 23rd May 1844 Mary Elizabeth Norris. He died on 9th October 1898 at Warrenton. She was the daughter of Thaddeus and Anne Calvert Norris. Thaddeus was the son of Samuel Norris and Mildred, his wife. Anne Calvert was the daughter of Samuel Calvert whose wife is not known. Mary Elizabeth Norris Brooke died on the 18th April 1879 at Warrenton. James V. Brooke was a delegate to the Secession Convention, a signer of the Secession Ordinance, Captain during War, wounded, lawyer and member House of Delegates.

William Throckmorton Brooke was the eldest son of James Vass and Mary E. Norris Brooke. He was born on 8th January 1847 at Warrenton. He was Norfolk City Engineer for many years. He sponsored the bill to erect a monument at Yorktown and is responsible for its erection. He married on 10th November 1886 Mary Goode, daughter of Hon. John Goode and Sallie Urquhart, his wife. He was a member of the 44th, 45th and 46th Congresses. He died in 1917. Sallie Urquhart was the daughter of Dr. Richard A. and Mary Norfleet Urquhart of "Strawberry Plains", Isle of Wight County. Children of William T. and Mary Goode Brooke—

- James Vass Brooke, born October 24, 1887. He married Edith Shepherd May 3, 1899. She was the daughter of Dr. Lemuel C. Shepherd and Emma Cartwright. The children of James Vass and Edith Shepherd Brooke are—

GOODE FAMILY EXCURSUS

The Hon. John Goode was born in Bedford County, Virginia 27th May 1829, married Sallie Urquhart on 10th July 1855. He graduated from Emory and Henry College in 1844. He attended the University of Virginia and later studied law under the Hon. J. W. Brockenbrough at Lexington and was admitted to the bar in 1851. He married on 10th July 1855 Sallie Urquhart as previously noted. At the age of 22 he was elected to the House of Delegates. He was a Presidential Elector in both 1852 and 1856.

At the outbreak of the war he was assigned to the staff of General Jubal A. Early, as a Captain. He took his seat in Richmond as a member of the Confederate Congress. A few years after hostilities he again entered politics and on the 3rd November 1874 defeated the notorious Vermont carpet beggar, James H. Platt Jr., for congress. He had moved to Norfolk in May 1865 and was again soon elected to the Virginia Legislature. He was a candidate for his third time in Congress when the matter came up of "The Virginia State Debt Settlement". He was a pronounced advocate of the full payment by the state of all of its past just obligations. There were so many people opposed to this that he lost the election.

While a member of Congress he was the author of the bill providing for the erection of a suitable monument at Yorktown for the commemoration of the surrender of Lord Cornwallis to the allied armies of Washington and Lafayette. He was made president of the Yorktown Centennial Association. He was also a member of the Board of Visitors of University of Virginia, William and Mary College and the Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College, which later became the Virginia Polytechnical Institute. In May 1885 President Cleveland appointed him Solicitor General of the U.S. He sometimes served as attorney General.

The Hon. John Goode was the son of John Goode Sr. and Ann Leftwich. John Goode Sr. was the son of Edmund Goode and Miss Branch, his wife. Ann Leftwich was the daughter of John Leftwich and Sallie Walton, his wife. These two were married on

Dr. Richard Alexander Urquhart was the son of John Urquhart and Nancy Williamson, his wife. They were married on the 13th December 1792.

Richard Brooke of Smithfield, Virginia, born 1732 and died in 1792. He married, first, Anna Hay Taliaferro, daughter of Francis Taliaferro of "Espon". He married secondly, Sarah Taliaferro, daughter of William Taliaferro. Children by his first marriage were—

- Robert Brooke who married in 1786 Mary Hopper, widow of Mr. Thom, and daughter of Archibald Richie.

Richard Norris Brooke, son of James Vass Brooke, was a noted artist and leader of Art circles in Washington, D.C. His paintings hang in the Corcoran Art Gallery.

BROWNE FAMILY

The first member of the Browne Family of southeast Virginia of whom we have record is the *Hon. Charles Browne* of Lanakshire, Scotland. He married Lady Anne Cochran, daughter of William, Lord Cochran, created Earl of Dundonald on 12th May 1669. Their eldest son was—

Charles Browne, who left Scotland and migrated to Maryland about the year 1720. He settled in Queen Anne County and married Priscilla Brooke who was born 16th November 1717. She died in August 1786. BRUCE FAMILY AND OTHERS

David, Earl of Huntingdon—
1st daughter—Margaret 2nd daughter—Isobel—de Brus—their son
Robert de Brus, 5th Lord of Annandale, born 1210,
died at Lochmaben Castle 1295. He was one of the fifteen regents of Scotland
during minority of Alexander III and one of the "Competitors for the Scottish
crown on the death of Margaret," the "Maiden of Norway" in 1290.

Robert Bruce, his eldest son, Earl of Carrick and 6th Lord of Annandale, accompanied Edward 1st on his crusade to Palestine in 1269. Married 1271 Martha Margaret, Countess of Carrick. Their son was:

Robert Bruce, the greatest of Scottish kings. In 1297, joining the English, he fought against Wallace but in 1298 he joined the Scottish army. After a stay at the court in England, learning that his life was threatened by Edward, he fled to Scotland and assembling his vassals at Lochmaben Castle, and claimed the crown, which he received at Scone, March 27, 1306. Being twice defeated by the English, he dismissed his troops, retired to Rothlin Island, and was supposed to be dead.

In the spring of 1307, he landed on the coast of Carrick and defeated the Earl of Pembroke. In two years he had retrieved nearly the whole country from the English. In successive years he advanced into England, laying waste the country; and on June 12th 1314, defeated in the famous battle of Bannockburn the English forces advancing under Edward II. After years of hostilities, he again defeated Edward in 1323 at Byland Abby, forcing a truce. However, not until March 4th, 1328 was the independence of Scotland fully recognized. He died in 1329. He had married first Isabella, daughter of the Earl of Mar. There was a daughter, Marjory, who became the mother of Robert II. Secondly, he married Elizabeth, daughter of Aymer de Burgh, Earl of Ulster, by whom he had a son who succeeded him.

John de Brus, a younger son of Robert, 5th Lord of Annandale married Marjorie Chateria. Their son Robert de Brus of Clackmanan 1348-1389, married Isobel Stewart, daughter of Sir Robert Stewart of Dunisdees and Inverneath. Their second son, Edward married before 1417, Agnes, eldest daughter of William de Erth or Airth. Their son Sir Robert Bruce III of Clackmanan was beheaded by James II January 1449-50. He married daughter of Scrymgeon of Dudhope, Constable of Dundee. Their son Alexander Bruce of Stanehouse and Airth was dead. In 1487 married first Janet Livingston (no issue) and secondly Margaret, daughter of Sr. Malcomb Forrester of Torwoodhead. Their son Sir Alexander Bruce of Brigham and Earshall was knighted by James III before 1495, died 1504, married Janet Stewart, daughter of Sir David S. Forsyth (?).

Their only son, Sir William of Earlshall b. 1486-7 d. January 28th, 1584-5 at age 98. He was Knighted by James IV. He married Margaret Meldrum, of

Seggie Leuchore Parish, Fife. Their son, Peter, succeeded 1584-5 of Earlshall. He married Agnes Scrimgeon, daughter and co-heir of Sir John Scrimgeon of Dudhope, Constable of Dundee. Their son Alexander IV of Earlshall died September 30th, 1600, married Euphernia, daughter of John Leslie of Parkhill, son of William, Earl of Rothes.

Their son, William, V of Earlshall, served heir October 14th, 1601. Knighted by James VI. He married 1594 Elizabeth, daughter of Sir Andrew Wood, of

Largo County, Fife. She was granddaughter of the famous Admiral.

Their son, Alexander Bruce, married Jean, daughter and heiress of John Kirkcaldy ester Abden.

Their son, Robert, 10th male heir of Earlshall and first of Grangehill or Grangemyre. He became in 1709-10 representative of the House of Earlshall, Bailie, and merchant of Kinghorn died 1731-32 aged 94. He married Elizabeth Wemyss, niece of Sir John de Bogie m. 1664 Fife.

Their son, Robert II of Grangehill and 11th Earlshall, served heir 1732. Baptized September 27th, 1679, d. 1764. Merchant and Provost of Kinghorn. He married Margaret Schaw, daughter of Robert Schaw at Edinburgh June 8th. 1702. Among their sons was Alexander Bruce born January 8th, 1718, emigrated to America. Will dated 1764 in Norfolk County, Virginia. In 1750 he married Sally Tucker, daughter of Robert Tucker. Their daughter, Margaret Bruce, married 1st Col. John Wilson of Norfolk County. His will dated January 9, 1779. He died December 15, 1779. Another daughter of Alexander Bruce and Sally Tucker was Suzanna who married first James Willis Langley and secondly Rev. James Green Martin November 9th, 1784, Methodist Minister of Norfolk, who died December 18, 1803. One of their sons, William Martin b. 1785 d. 1834 was a Physician, he married Sophia Scott Dange of Camden County, N. C. Suzannah died July 20th, 1815. Sophia Bery, April 23, 1798 married November 9, 1815, d. July 28th 1873. Nathaniel Hoggard was the son of Thurmer Hoggard of "Poplar Hall".

Holt Wilson b. May 19, 1779, d. March 24, 1845 and his wife Mary Hoggard, b. , d. November 20, 1849 married October 16th, 1806.

Capt. Hugh Nelson Page's parents were John Page of Caroline County, born 1743 at "Northend" died 1789; and Elizabeth Burwell who died in 1811 in a Richmond Theater fire. Her parents were Lewis Burwell of "Kingsmills", York County and Frances Thacker whose father was Edwin Thacker of Middlesex, whose father was William Thacker of York. Lewis Burwell was son of Lewis Burwell surviving son of Major Lewis Burwell of "Queens Creek" and his second wife Martha Leah Cole who died in 1704. Major Lewis Burwell was son of Major Lewis Burwell b. 1631 d. and his wife Lucy Higgenson. Martha Lea Cole was daughter of John Leah and Mary Baytard who were married in 1662.

John Page of Caroline County was the son of John Page Sr. of North End, Gloucester County, b. 1720 d. 1780 and Jane Byrd of "Westover" b. 1723, youngest child of Col. William Byrd of "Westover" b. 1674 d. 1744, and Maria Taylor of Kensington, England, who was the daughter of Thomas Taylor. Col. William Byrd was the son of William Byrd b. 1653, d. 1701. Emigrated to America 1678, and Mary Horsemanden, daughter of Col. Warham Horsemanden. William Byrd's mother was Grace Stagge.

John Page, Sr., 1720-1780, was second son of Hon. Mann Page of "Rose-well" b. 1691, a. January 24, 1730 and Judith Carter b. 1694 and married in 1718, she was daughter of Robert (King) Carter, president of the Colony of Virginia and Judith Armistead, his first wife, married in 1688. Hon. Mann Page was the son of Hon. Mathew Page b. 1659, d. January 1703 and Mary Mann b. 1672, d. March 27, 1707 at "Rosewell" married in 1688.

Marshall Parks Jr., b. November 8th, 1820, died June 12th, 1900 married Sophia Chauner Jackson, b. June 27, 1820, d. December 5th, 1890—married June 6th, 1855, he was the son of Marshall Parks Sr., b. Feb. 19th, 1786, d. January 19th, 1840 was born in Lincoln, Massachusetts died in Norfolk. He married Martha Sweeney Francis Sawyer Boush, November 19th, 1817. Her parents were Charles Sayer Boush, b. July 28, 1794 and Martha Sweeney whose parents were Charles Sweeney and Anne Wythe, daughter of Thomas Wythe. Charles Sweeney's parents were Samuel Sweeney and Anne Willoughby. Samuel Sweeney's parents were Henry Sweeney and Alice . Parents of Marshall Parks Sr. were Major Leonard Parks b. October 25th, 1760, d. June 8th, 1838, third child, second son; and Elizabeth Buckman of Malden, Massachusetts.

Major Leonard Parks was the son of David Parks (b. January 10, 1724, lived in Shrugfield, Vermont, and died in Texas) and Sarah Gibbs, b. November 14th, 1735, she was the daughter of Isaac Gibbs and Thankful Wheeler.

David Parks parents were Joseph Parks (b. January 9th, 1670, d. 1756 lived in Concord) and Abagail Joseph Parks parents were Lt. Richard Parks and Elizabeth Billings. Sophia Chauner Jackson (b. June 27, 1820, d. December 5th, 1890) was daughter of Rev. Joannes Edward Jackson (b. January 13th, 1783. He was the brother of Rev. Jackson of Old Saint Pauls'

Church who died a hero in the epidemic of 1855 and is buried in the church yard.

Rev. Joannes Edward Jackson's parents were William of Tutbury, Stafford-shire County, England (b. October 22nd, 1767, d. April 23rd, 1812) and Mary Butler, born at Handsworth, near Burmingham, England, August 15th, 1754, d. February 10th, 1822. Her parents were John Butler and Mary Congreve who was the daughter of Thomas Congreve and Elizabeth Sayer. She, the last named, was the daughter of Thomas Sayer and Elizabeth Ashton.

Hon. Mathew Page (1659-1703) was the son of Col. John Page (1627-1692) and Alice Lukin. Col. John Page (1627-1692) was the son of Thomas Page, b. 1597, who in turn was the son of Richard Page (1556-1642) and Francis Madge of London. Richard Page (1556-1642) was the son of John Page, b. 1521, married 1553 Aworie Redding of Hedgestone Middlesex. John Page, born 1521 was son of Henry Page, born 1492, and Wenole Harrow of Middlesex. They were married in 1520. Henry Page, born 1492, father was Nicholas Page of Essex.

Charles McIntosh Tunstall (b. July 21st, 1883, d. 1962) married Anne Byrd Page June 23rd, 1906. His parents were Dr. Alexander Tunstall (b. April 8, 1843, d. November 10, 1905) and Anne Dornin McIntosh (b. April 7, 1855, d. January 7, 1895.) He was a prominent Real Estate operator in Norfolk City.

Dr. Alexander Tunstall's parents were Dr. Robert Baylor Tunstall (b. August 3, 1818, d. April 1, 1883) and Elizabeth Walke Williamson (b. December 6, 1821, d. July 8, 1872). They were married January 7th, 1840.

Dr. Robert Baylor Tunstalls' parents were Alexander Tunstall (born in King and Queen County April 19, 1787, d. July 28, 1868 lived in Norfolk) and Elizabeth Todd Baylor (b. October 7, 1786, d. August 4, 1858).

Alexander Tunstall's parents were Richard Tunstall of "Bestlands", King and Queen County, where he was Clerk of the Court, (b. 1734, d. 1792) and Catherine Brooke who died 1827 at Fox Hall, Princess Anne County. They were married in 1781.

Richard Tunstall's father was Richard Tunstall, Jr. (b. before 1728, d. before 1786). His mother was Hancock Lee who died 1692.

Richard Tunstall Jr.'s father was Col. Richard Tunstall, Clerk of the Court of King and Queen County (b. 1700, d. before 1787). His mother was Anne Hill Walker (b. 1708, d. 1787). Anne Hill's father was Leonard Hill. Col. Richard Tunstall's father was Richard Tunstall.

Dr. Alexander Tunstall's (1843-1905) mother was Elizabeth Walke Williamson. Her parents were Thomas Williamson (b. December 6, 1821, d. July 8, 1872) and Anne M. M. Walke (b. June 13, 1780, d. May 3, 1837).

Thomas Williamson's parents were John Williamson of Henrico County (b. 1733 and d. 1806) and Sarah Price. John Williamson's parents were Thomas Williamson (b. 1700, d. 1740), who was a vestryman in Henrico County, and Judith Flemming.

Thomas Williamson's parents were John Williamson and Rebecca Chamberlaine.

John Williamson's father was Sir Thomas Williamson. Anne M. M. Walke's parents were William Walke and Mary Calvert who died September 9th, 1798.

William Walke's parents were Anthony Walke (b. January 23, 1726, d. October 1779) and Mary Moseley.

Anthony Walke's parents were Anthony Walke, Sr. (b. 1690 and d. October 8, 1763) and Anna Lee Armistead, his second wife. Anthony Walke Sr.'s parents were Thomas Walke and Mary Lawson, married 1689. Anna Lee Armistead's parents were William Armistead and Anna Lee.

Elizabeth Todd Baylor's (1786-1858) parents were Robert Baylor (b. d. December 31, 1814) and Lucy Todd Garnett (d. 1794). They were married in 1784. Robert Baylor's parents were Gregory Baylor (b. 1710) and Mary Whitting. They were married in 1749. Gregory Baylor's parents were Robert Baylor and Hannah Gregory, daughter of Richard Gregory, Robert Baylor's father was John Baylor.

Catherine Brooke, who died 1827 at Fox Hall, was the daughter of Col. George Brooke of Mantapike who married Anna Tunstall in 1749. Col. George Brooke's parents were Humphrey Brooke who died in 1738 and Elizabeth Braxton. Humphrey Brooke's parents were Robert Brooke and Catherine. Elizabeth Braxton's father was George Braxton.

Hancock Lee's (d. 1792) parents were Richard Lee and Anna Hancock whose mother was Lucy Pigott. Richard Lee's father was Sir Robert Lee. Lucy Todd Garnett's parents were Francis Garnett who died in 1767 and Elizabeth Todd. Francis Garnett's parents were John Garnett (b. August 27, 1717, d. February 14, 1746) and Elizabeth Evans. John Garnett's parents were James Garnett and Sarah Green. Sarah Price's parents were John Price of Henrico County and Mary White, daughter of Col. White of Ellerson Mills. Judith Flemming, wife of Thomas Williamson who was born in 1700 was the daughter of Tarleton Flemming of "Rockland", New Kent County (b. about 1700) and Hannah Bates of Yorktown. Tarleton Flemming was the son of Charles Flemming and Susanna Tarleton. John Price, father of Sarah Price, was the son of John White Price and Anne Kennon, b. November 3, 1721. They were married in 1738. She was the daughter of Richard Kennon. John White Price's parents were Samuel Price and Elizabeth Prior.

Mary Moseley's father was Col. Edward Hack Moseley, her mother was Mary Bassett whose parents were Hon. William B. Bassett and Johanna Burwell.

Colonel Edward Hack Moseley's parents were Capt. Hillary Moseley and Hanna Hack. Mary Calvert (wife of William Walke) who died September 19th, 1798 was the daughter of Cornelius Calvert who was born March 13, 1725, and Elizabeth Thoroughgood. They were married June 19th, 1749. He was the son of Cornelius Calvert Sr. who died June 1747 and Mary Saunders, his wife. She was the daughter of Jonathan Saunders and Mary Bennett. Elizabeth Thorogood was the daughter of John Thorogood III and Elizabeth Nason. He was the son of John Thorogood II and Francis Sidney. Elizabeth Mason was the daughter of Lemuel Mason and Anne Seawell. Anne Dornin McIntosh (1855-1895) was the daughter of Capt. Charles Flemming McIntosh (b. October 24, 1813, d. May 13, 1862) who was a Commander in the U. S. Navy and a Captain in the

Confederate Navy, and Isabella Donaldson Thorburn (b. June 28, 1827, d. November 26, 1909) who were married December 4, 1849.

Hon. William Bassett married Joanna Burwell as shown above. She was the daughter of Hon. Lewis Burwell who died December 19th, 1710, and Abigale Smith, (1636-1690) who was the daughter of Anthony Smith and Martha Bacon. Hon. Lewis Burwell (d. 1710) was the son of Major Lewis Burwell and Lucy Higginson as shown above. Capt. Flemming McIntosh was the son of George McIntosh (b. December 3, 1767, d. April 14, 1863) and Elizabeth Mason Walke (b. February 24, 1784, d. April 21, 1855). They were married May 28th, 1801. George McIntosh was the son of Peter McIntosh, sheriff of Edinburg and Isabella Lyon, daughter of Robert Lyon. They were married November 3, 1766 and lived at Avongate.

Elizabeth Mason Walke (b. February 24, 1784, d. April 21, 1855) was the daughter of William Walke, (b. February 17, 1762, d. January 1, 1795) and Mary Calvert who died September 19th, 1798. Isabella D. Thorburn was the daughter of James Donaldson Thorburn, (b. January 1, 1802, d. June 11, 1835) and Anne Moore Howison (1805-1872). James D. Thorburn was the son of James Thorburn (b. December 29, 1769, d. December 29, 1838) and Anne Roy Buckner of Port Royal, Virginia buried in Old St. Paul's Churchyard, Norfolk (b. 1781, d. September 10, 1822) James Thorburn was son of John Thorburn (1749-1792, see "Thorburn by Wertenbaker" page 95) and Isabella Donaldson, who died in 1792. Her monument is in St. Michael's. Her father was John Donaldson (b. 1719, d. January 12, 1767). Her mother was Margaret Tait whose monument is in St. Michael's.

Anne Roy Buckner (b. 1781, d. September 10, 1822) buried at Old St. Paul's, Norfolk, was the daughter of William Buckner of Port Royal, Virginia and Dolly Roy. This William Buckner's parents were William Buckner of Caroline County and Judith Hawes, nee Oylett.

William Buckner Sr.'s parents were Richard Buckner and Elizabeth Cooke. Judith Hawes father was William Oylett or Aylett of Prince William County. Dolly Roy's parents were Thomas Roy and Judith Beverley. Thomas Roy was the son of John Roy and his wife, Dorothy. Judith Beverley's father was Capt. Harry Beverley. Anne Moore Howison, (1805-1872) was the daughter of Samuel Howison (1779-1845) of Dumfries, Scotland, and Helen Rose Moore (1784-1850). Samuel Howison was the son of Stephen Howison (1737-1815) and Mary Brooke who died in 1808. Stephen Howison was the son of John Howison (b. August 6, 1682, d. December 12, 1754) and Anne Wood from Scotland. John Howison's mother was Margaret Mitchell.

Mary Brooke died in 1808. She was the daughter of Basil Brooke, (1687-1759), and Dorothy Taney. Basil Brooke was the son of John Brooke and Sarah.

Dorothy Taney was the daughter of Michael Taney III and Mary Neale.

Helen Rose Moore was the daughter of Edward Moore, who emigrated to Stafford County from England, and Helen McDonald of Scotland, the daughter of Donald McDonald and his wife, Jean.

(Harriott Myers, born July 26th, 1792 was the wife of Rev. Joannes Edward Jackson, born January 13, 1783).

BURROUGHS

The Burroughs family came to the Northern Neck of Virginia before the Revolution. Capt. Elzy Burroughs lived in Middlesex County before 1798 when his son, John J. Burroughs, was born. He served as a defender against the British invasion of 1813 and was one of the heroes of Craney Island, under General Robert Barraud Taylor. He came to Norfolk as a widower with a large family in 1810. He was an engineer-contractor and built the Old Stone Bridge that stood for a long time at the corner of City Hall Avenue and Granby Street, where the canal branched off the Elizabeth River. It ran across Granby Street about where the Monticello Hotel and Royster Building now stand. He also built some of the lighthouses along the coast. He had friends in Norfolk and it is said that he came to Virginia in the same vessel with the Whittle family.

John J. Burroughs, Capt. Elzy's son, was a lad of twelve when his father came to Norfolk. At seventeen, he secured a position with the Clerk of the Hustings Court and two years later on February 25, 1817, qualified as deputy to Colonel William Sharp, the clerk. On September 6, 1819, he became deputy to William T. Nimmo, County Clerk of Princess Anne County. After Mr. Nimmo's death, John Burroughs became the clerk of the county and circuit courts and held that position for forty-eight years, one of the longest terms in our history.

A son of each of the two marriages of John J. Burroughs, Sr. fought in the War between the States, but in 1869 returned to Norfolk and formed a partnership to practice law. William H. Burroughs was the son of John J., Sr. and Eliza Thomson and brother of Major Edgar Burroughs. He graduated from William and Mary Military College at Williamsburg in 1851, taught school until 1853, when he began to study law. He was admitted to the bar in 1854. After his service in the war, he taught law to his half-brother, John J. Burroughs, Jr., son of his father and Ann Nimmo Land Burroughs. John J. passed the bar examination in 1866. Before practicing with his brother, he had an office in Princess Anne where his brother William had been practicing before the war. Together the brothers practiced law in Norfolk, and in 1894 John J. Burroughs was elected police justice, serving for one term. William H. Burroughs was Judge of the Corporation Court of Norfolk for several years.

When John J. Burroughs, Jr. was a young man he was Clerk of the Court of Princess Anne County, remaining for 48 years (1821-1869). During this time, in 1832, he prepared for President J. P. Cushing of Hampden Sydney College the record of the trial of Grace Sherwood in 1705 for "Witchcraft". It was published by the Virginia Historical Society in their collections.

The most extensive records in history, however, are given to the story of Major Edgar Burroughs, brother of the two men just mentioned. On December 4, 1863, the New York Times printed:

"Burroughs is a noted man in Princess Anne County. He ran against Henry A. Wise at the State Convention, which was held in the <u>Spring</u> of 1861. He is a Methodist Preacher, and is said to possess great wealth."

At the breaking out of the war, he raised a cavalry company in Princess Anne and entered the Confederate service. Major Burroughs was captured and confined in a cell with two negroes with small pox. His family and friends did their best to rescue him, saying he had been betrayed by a negro orderly and turned over to the Yankees. He was shot by the Yankees in 1864, the 26th of January.

The old family home in Princess Anne County was Cedar Grove and it was to this house the brothers returned after the war.

BYRD FAMILY

Colonel William Byrd, born in London in 1649, son of John Byrd, a jeweler, or as called by the British, a goldsmith. The family is said to have originated in Cheshire on the border of Wales.

The uncle of William, Thomas Stagg, died in Virginia in 1670, and William, as his heir, came to the colony as a youth of twenty-two years in 1671. The estate was a huge boundary of rich land on the James River. To this William added many more thousands of acres from time to time. For instance, he was granted "a tract of land five miles long on both sides of the James, at the falls near Richmond, two miles deep on the southern shore and one mile deep on the northern shore for watching and warning against the savages on the frontier. The King vetoed the grant as too liberal, but Byrd retained a modest 43,000 acres. He was also granted 1200 acres on Shoekoe Creek, at present in the heart of Richmond.

Colonel William Byrd married Mary, the daughter of Colonel Warham Horsemanden of Kent, England, who had fled to Maryland to escape Oliver Cromwell.

In Bacon's Rebellion, this shrewd colonel managed to keep the friendship both of irascible Governor William Berkeley and Nathaniel Bacon, the fiery "rebel", which was an astonishing maneuver.

Colonel William Byrd II, son of Col. William Byrd and Mary Horsemanden was born March 28, 1674. He added both wealth and fame to the family name. He was educated in law at Middle Temple, London, and through his long and able career acted as attorney for the colony in the endless disputes with the mother country.

Among the manifold activities of this remarkable man are two which must be recounted. He was appointed Chairman of the Commission to establish the accurate and legal boundary between the colonies of Virginia and North Carolina. The other two members of this Commission were Richard Fitzwilliams, a noted surveyor, and William Dandridge, brother of John, who was the father of the wife of George Washington.

On their way to locate the eastern extremity of the line, the Commission spent one night at the home of Colonel William Crawford, whose plantation is now Portsmouth, in the year 1727. Next morning, they crossed the Southern Branch to Ferry Point (Berkley) and came at last to the point on the Atlantic Shore where the boundary was known as Byrd's line.

The other activity of Colonel William Byrd II which interests posterity, was the locating and naming of the City of Richmond, at "Byrd's Warehouse" beside the falls of the James River. This brilliant Virginian died at Westover August 26, 1744.

His son, William Byrd III, born 1728, died in the thick of the Revolution in 1777. He had fought in the French and Indian War for the King. He established Fort Chiswell in Wythe County to protect the settlers against hostile Indians. In his old age he was known as "The grand old Tory", who would not draw a sword against King George. The wealth of four generations slipped through his hands.

The son of William Byrd III was Thomas Taylor Byrd, born 1752. He served in the British army and was, like his father, a Tory. His brother or nephew, resigned a commission in the British Navy, returned to Virginia and enlisted in the Continental army.

Francis Taylor Byrd, son of Thomas Taylor Byrd, was an officer in the American Army in the War of 1812. His brother was killed in action. Richard Evelyn Byrd, I, a second son, was elected to the third constitutional convention in 1850. He was a member of the Virginia House of Delegates 1839-1844, representing Franklin County, the home of the family. In the "War between the States" he served on the staff of General Montgomery Dent Corse of Alexandria. He married Anne, the daughter of Benjamin Harrison of Brandon.

Their son, a fourth William Byrd, but of a separate line, made his home in the new state of Texas, of which he became Adjutant General. When the "War between the States" broke out, he, like his father, volunteered.

Their son, Richard Evelyn Byrd II, was born in Austin, Texas, August 13, 1860, and died October 13, 1925. This Richard returned to Virginia to make his home in Frederick County. He married Eleanor Flood (Bolling), daughter of Major Joel West Flood of Appomattox. He was in the House of Delegates from Frederick County in 1906, 1908, 1910, and 1912. He was elected Speaker of the House 1914-1919 and his oldest son, Harry Flood Byrd, was inaugurated as Governor of Virginia February 1, 1926.

CALVERT

The Calvert family was represented first in Virginia by Cornelius Calvert of Princess Anne County. He came from Lancaster, England. The arms of the family are the same as those of the family of Calverly, which is descended from Alphonseus Gospatrick, Lord of Calverly, whose daughter, Laediana married John Scott, a Scottish gentleman of note who came to England in the suite of Lady Maud when that princess married Henry I of England. The arms of Scott were assumed and borne by their descendants, although the name of Calverly was adopted. This name by corruption became Calvert at a subsequent period. The Virginia Calverts are a branch.

Dr. Lewis W. Chamberlyne m. (1820) Martha Burwell Smith, daughter of Benjamin Dabney Smith (d. 1806) and Sarah (1775-1857) who was the daughter of Rev. Thomas Smith (1737-1789). Dr. L. W. Chamberlyne was the son of Edward Pye Chamberlyne of King William County, Virginia, of "Nugent". Spelling of names was so varied at this period in Virginia History, it is difficult to tell which families were the same.

Leonard Chamberlaine was granted 300 Acres in Gloucester County, October 27, 1653 for transporting six persons. (page 21)

Jonathan Chamberlain came to Virginia as a headright of Richard Kemp, Esq. on April 17, 1643. (page 877)

Christopher Chamberlin came over as headright of Capt. Samuell Mathewes August 1, 1643. (page 882)

William Chamberlin came over as a headright of Peter Knight July 16, 1652. (page 95)

John Chamberline came over as headright of John Williams September 18, 1665.

Capt. Leonard Chamberline was granted 70 Acres New Kent Co. adjoining a former survey of 400 Acres beginning at the corner of Ashwell Batten May 22, 1657. (page 98-145).

Ellen Steele (Perkins) (1846-1876), daughter of Martha Ellen Steele (b. 1821) m. Joseph Perkins of Ohio. Vol. 1 Meade.

Mr. Chamberlaine was a lay reader at old St. Paul's Church and its four chapels during the latter part of the 18th century. In 1799, Mr. Edward Chamberlayne was a delegate to the convention representing "St. John's" parish, King William County. A list of the vestry at "St. Peter's Church" in New Kent County from 1685 to 1758 includes Mr. William Chamberlayne. Vol. II

The organization of "St. Mathew's Church, Wheeling" was accomplished on the 11th of May, 1819. The persons who took part in this organization included Samuel Chamberlain.

In the year 1773, Mr. Richard Chamberlaine of St. Peter's Church, New Kent, conveyed to the vestry for 165 lbs. sterling 588 acres of land. On this land the Rev. Mr. Guilliam lived.

In a listing of the "Names of Some of the Old and Leading Families in Eastern Virginia in Colonial Times and immediately succeeding the Revolution", there is shown the family of Chamberlayne.

In Hottin's "Early Settlers in Virginia" William Chamberlin, sixteen years old, came to Virginia in the ship "Thomas", Henry Taverner, Master, August 21, 1635.

Francis and Rebecca Chamberlaine were living at "Bass's Choice". February 16, 1623.

On the "Muster Rolls of Settlers in Virginia" 1624, are Francis Chamberlin, age 45, who came over in the "Marmaluke" in 1621, Rebecca Chamberlin, age 37, in the "Bona Nova" in 1622, and Francis Chamberlin born in Virginia.

An account of the land "as it standeth in ye church Books" in the parish of "St. James", taken by Church Wardens, December 20, 1679, shows "Capt. Francis Chamberlaine, with twenty servants, twenty acres of land and sixteen negroes.

A list of burials in Elizabeth City County 1624: Mr. Chamberlain's man, July 17, James Chamberlain, August 14.

The invoice of sixty-eight men servants shipped on board, Capt. Charles Gardner, in "Jamaica Merchant", to be sold for ten years. John Chamberlaine, age 20, to be disposed of in the Barbados. Tickets issued at Barbados for departure off this island: April 1, 1679. Marmaduke Chamberlaine, in the ship "Endeavor" for London, James Gilbert, Commander.

From Greer's "List of Early Virginia Immigrants": The Parish of St. Michael's Burials: August 19, 1678, Edward Chamberlain.

He may have been one of the convicted rebels in Monmouth's Rebellion of 1685.

Thomas Chamberlayne of King William County, son of William and Elizabeth Littlepage Chamberlayne of New Kent County, m. Wilhelmina Byrd (1664-1744), daughter of Col. William Byrd of Westover, Charles City County, Virginia.

Elizabeth Chamberlain m. November 21, 1790, Col. John Pickett of "Rose Hill", Mason County, Kentucky.

Hayden, the genealogist, states that on August 17, 1776, a committe was appointed, which included Mr. Chamberlain, to look into the matter of the Reverend Mr. Scott's declaration of fealty to the American Colonies.

CHAMBERLAYNE (CHAMBERLAINE)

George Chamberlaine was born in Warwick County, Virginia in the year 1755 and died 10th July 1792. He married Anne Harlowe Lucas of the same County in 1783. He was a lieutenant in the Virginia Navy (which was later the United States Navy). He served in the defense of his native state throughout the Revolutionary War. After the war he became an officer in the U. S. Custom's House at Norfolk, serving until his death in 1792.

The only surviving son of George Chamberlain and Anne Harlowe Lucas was George Chamberlain II. He was born in Portsmouth, Va. in the year 1784 and died in 1819. He was a ship builder and he married Fanny Lowry Niedham (Needham) of Hampton, Elizabeth City County, Virginia. She was born in 1786. Their son was (from the Bible of William Wilson)—

Richard Henry Chamberlain, who was born 7th of June 1807. He died on 23rd 1879. His wife was Mary E. Wilson, who was also born in the year 1807. She died 17th December 1847. Their children were—

CLARKSON

The name of Clarkson in Virginia is associated primarily with Fauquier County. According to several records, the first of this family of which we have any authentic record in the state is Henry Clarkson of Fauquier County, who married Dorcas Turner January 20, 1772, and whose descendant, William Clarkson (died February 22, 1818) was a liberal supporter of the Episcopal Church and married Mildred Pickett in 1794, using the name Dorcas as a middle name of one of his children. Another son of this Henry was Henry II (born December 1775) who married Ann and had issue. A daughter, Martha Ann, born December 20, 1778, married January 5, 1793, Samuel Ashby. His father was Capt. John Ashby of the Third Virginia Regiment, Continental Line, 1775-1783, (born in Fauquier County), who married Miss Turner.

However, there are some interesting notes from Nugent: "John Clarkson granted 400 Ac. in Charles River County May 7, 1638, (p. 563) At the back creek at the head of his first dividend, due for transportation of eight persons; William Allen, William Hackney, Richard Hole, Elizabeth Huson, Ann Clarkson, Jane Clarkson and Ann Clarkson, widow."

"John Clarkson, 100 Acs. Charles River, October 23, 1637, (p. 488). On the South side of Willoughby's Neck, N. upon the creek and east upon the Baye. Due for adv. of 4 persons, the second year of the plantation of said Charles River.

"Same, 150 Acs, same County, date and page. Butting upon his own land. Transportation of 3 persons, Peter Death, Jon. Bassnet, and James Vocseen (first written Watson)."

There was an old Dr. Clarkson, who lived at Haymarket, in Prince William County, according to "Survey of Fauquier County". The Courthouse is at Manassas.

Fauquier County was established May 1, 1759, dividing Prince William into two distinct counties. Prince William County was taken from King George and Stafford in 1730. King George was taken from Richmond in 1720. Old Rappahannock County, formed from Lancaster in 1656, had passed out of existence.

COCKE FAMILY

The records are not complete but from several sources the following account has been put together.

Richard Cocke of Malvern Hills, Henrico County, came to Virginia prior to the year 1636. He came from Leeds, Yorkshire, England. He is more often referred to as Richard Cocke of Bremo. The assumption is that he built a more pretentious home after living in Virginia a while. His first wife was Mary Ashton and his second wife was Elizabeth whose surname is unknown. The names of his children who have come down to us are—

He married Mrs. Margaret Jones who died in 1718. He was a member of the House of Burgesses in 1679. His eldest son was James Cocke of "Curles" who was born in 1666 and died in 1721. "Curles", his plantation, was in Henrico County. He married Elizabeth Pleasants, born in 1686 and died in 1751. She was the daughter of John Pleasants and Mrs. Jane Tucker, his wife. John Pleasants came to Virginia in 1665 from Norwich, England. James Cocke was a member of the House of Burgesses from 1696 to 1699. He became Clerk of the Court of Henrico in 1791 and held office until 1707.

Elizabeth Cocke was the daughter of James and Elizabeth Pleasants Cocke. She married Elisha Meredith Sr. of "Snow Hill", Hanover County, who was born Spetember 1721 and died May 30th 1796. He was the son of Samuel Meredith Sr. of "Liberty Hall" of New Kent County, born 1698? and died April 4th 1762.

Sarah Cocke married Major Thomas Massie about 1780. She was born on March 8th 1760 at Turkey Island and died at "Level Green" on April 20th 1838. She was the sister of William Cocke and Bowler Cocke who married Tabitha Fry, and the daughter of Bowler Cocke of Turkey Island, Henrico County, born March 7th 1726-7. He was the son of Bowler Cocke I who was born in 1697-8 and who was the son of Richard Cocke III and his wife, Anne Bowler.

COOKE FAMILY

By the similarity of arms, it is reasonable to assume that the Cookes of Whitefield, County Suffolk, England, are of the same stock and identity as the family of Mordecai Cooke who emigrated to Virginia in 1639. The arms on the tomb of Mary Cooke, wife of Thomas Booth, at "Jarvis Farm", Gloucester County, Virginia, are quite similar. Mordecai Cooke first appeared in Elizabeth City County, Virginia in 1645, as a witness in a suit of Selden vs. Galt, for possession of Buckrow Beach (William and Mary Quarterly, Vol. IX). He appears first in York County as guardian of Thomas Thrasher, and in 1648, he was appointed appraiser of the estate of Abraham Turner, who patented on Mobjack Bay 200 Acres in 1643 next to William Debman. This same year he married the widow, Suzannah Peasley. He accounts to Court of York County for seven cows and one calf belonging to Elizabeth Peasley, his step-daughter. He succeeded Michael Peasley as Guardian for Thomas Thrasher, and later as Guardian for Elizabeth Peasley. In the "Maryland Archives", November 9, 1649, Robert Kedger was Attorney for Mordecai Cooke who married the widow and administratrix of Peasley. This is from the records of Provincial Court of Maryland, 1637-1650 (Archives IV, page 505).

On October 2nd 1550 a patent was granted to Mordecia Cooke for 1174 acres, beginning at a point of cleared land at the head of Ware River, on Mobjack Bay, Gloucester County, Va. This land was known as "Mordecai's Mount" and was the first land to be granted to him.

A letter dated Feb. 1st 1914 from Mr. William Cubitt Cooke states that his father was named Mordecai Cooke and that he was born at Horning in Norfolk, England, about 1802; his mother Mary Cubitt; his grandfather was Clement Cooke; and that his brother was Mordecia Cubitt Cooke, M.A., L.L.D., A.L.S., V.M.H., a member of the faculty of Oxford University. He lectured in America about 1912 on "Art and Design." Clement Cooke had a brother named Mordecia, and this name had come down in the family for many generations.

The Cooke family in Suffolk, England as shown by the Hearth Tax Returns for 1773, include: "Giles Cooke, 3 Hearths; Thomas Cooke, 3 Hearths; The Lady Cooke, 10 Hearths; Thomas Cooke, Clergyman, 10 Hearths". Giles, Thomas, and Mordecia are frequent names in the Virginia Cooke Family

Land patents in Virginia show the following to the Cooke family: Mordecia Cooke, years 1650, 1654, 1680, and 1703; Thomas Cooke, 1713, 1714, 1728; John Cooke, 1713, 1728. Mordecia Cooke was the sheriff of Gloucester County in 1698, and he was a Burgess from 1702 to 1714. Thomas Cooke was the surveyor of both Gloucester and Middlesex Counties from 1702 to 1717. Giles Cooke was the Tobacco Agent in 1714, and he was a Burgess - 1722 to 1727.

The Abingdon Parish Register shows that John the son of Thomas and Mary Cooke, was baptized in March 1718. John Cooke married Elizabeth Lee, October 9th 1742. Their children were—

COUPLAND FAMILY

David O. Coupland m. in the year 1775 Ann Harrison (1753-1821) who was the daughter of Benjamin Harrison (1776-1791) of "Berkeley", of Virginia. He was a Colonel of Virginia troops, a Burgess, a Member of the Continental Congress, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, Speaker of the House of Delegates of Virginia, Governor of Virginia and a member of the Constitutional Convention. Ann Harrison's mother was Elizabeth Bassett, born December 13, 1730, daughter of Col. William Bassett of "Eltham". New Kent County. Col. Bassett was the son of William and Joanna Burwell Bassett of "Eltham". He was born July 8th 1709 and died November 21, 1812. He was a Burgess, Vestryman of St. Peter's Parish and married on January 20, 1729, Elizabeth Churchill (1710-1799) who was the daughter of William and Elizabeth Armistead Churchill of Middlesex County.

Col. William Bassett (1709-1812) was the son of Col. William Bassett of "Eltham", New Kent County (1671-1723) and his wife, Joanna Burwell as shown above. He was a Burgess from 1692 to 1702, a member of the King's Council from 1707 to 1711. He was county Lieutenant in 1707 and later Commander in Chief. He was one of the Governors of William & Mary College in 1716 and a member of the Council. Joanna Burwell (1675-1727) was the daughter of Major Lewis and Abigail Smith Burwell of "Fairfield", Gloucester Co.

Col. William Bassett of "Eltham" (1671-1723) was the son of Captain William Bassett, an officer in the Royal Army during the Civil War in England and came to Virginia before 1665. He accumulated a large amount of land in Virginia, dying in 1671. He married in 1670 Bridgett Cary who was born in 1651. She was the daughter of Col. Miles and Anne Taylor Cary of "Magpie Swamp", Warwick County.

Capt. William Bassett was the son of William Bassett of Newport, Southampton County, England who is the first member of the family of whom we have any knowledge. His grave shows that he was buried on December 4th 1646.

COVINGTON FAMILY

Three Covington brothers, William, John and Thomas, came from England with Lord Baltimore to Maryland in the year 1632. Thomas stayed in Maryland and there is a waterfront area at the present time known as "Port Covington" and owned by the Western Maryland Railroad. There is a Covington Street in the Waterfront area of Baltimore which was named after Thomas Covington. William and John left Maryland and settled in the Carolinas

William Covington Sr. was born in 1728 in Essex County, Va. He became a Captain in the Virginia Militia. He married Miss Mary Wall. He settled in Robeson County, N. C. and later moved to Marlboro County. His second child was—

John Covington who was born in the year 1757. He married Elizabeth Thomas and their first child was William Covington who was born 12th December 1777. He lost his first wife and later married Mary Bridges Connor and they lived in Marlboro County, S. C.

Henry Bridges Covington was their second child. He was born in Marlboro County on 17th October 1804. He married Jane Smith and was a Captain in the South Carolina Militia. Their second child was—

Captain Harris Covington who was born on the 25th of March 1835. He graduated from the University of South Carolina in 1856, receiving the first honor in the School of Law. At the Outbreak of Confederate war he enlisted in the Confederate Army and because of his education and his age was soon promoted to Lieutenant. Seeing hard service in the war, he was promoted to Captain. He married Alice Maria Emanuel. With God's help he survived and was able to stand with his general, Robert E. Lee, at Appomattox, the nineteenth of April 1865. He returned to Bennettsville, S. C. and resumed the practice of Law. He was elected to the South Carolina Legislature 1867-68. In 1876 he was a candidate for Congress, and having given his all for his state in the four long years of war he was so bitterly disappointed when he was not elected that his health gave way and he died within the year. His son was—

Rev. Henry Harris Covington D. D., born in Bennettsville S. C. 3rd April 1871. He studied law at University of North Carolina and passed the bar examination before he was 21 years old. Since he could not practice law until he was twenty-one he taught school at Fayetteville, North Carolina. He then practiced law at Charlotte, N. C. and at Bennettsville, S. C.

In his late twenties he became interested in the Episcopal church. He attended the Episcopal Theological Seminary at Alexandria, Va. and received his degree as Bachelor of Divinity. His first charge was the "Church of the Holy Comforter" in Sumter, S. C. There he married Marie Dozier Lee, daughter of Col. and Mrs. Richard D. Lee of Sumter. After serving there as rector for thirteen years he decided to accept a call from Old Saint Paul's Church of Norfolk. He served this church and its parish for twenty years until his death in 1933. He

also acted as Assistant Judge of the Juvenile Court and was Professor of Canon Law at the Episcopal Theological Seminary. He died in Norfolk on the 12th of February 1933. Both he and his wife are buried in the churchyard of Old Saint Pauls. Marie Dozier Lee was born at Sumter on 11th August 1876 and died on 5th November 1960 at Norfolk. Their children were—

EXCURSUS

Lancelot Lee came over to England from Loudon, France, as a companion of William the Conqueror and distinguished himself in the Battle of Hastings. When the estates of that part of the English nobility who followed Harold were

divided by the Conqueror, he was awarded a fine estate in Essex. Another ancestor was Lionel Lee who accompanied Richard Coeur de Lion on his famous crusade to the Holy Land. For his gallant conduct at Acre he was created by the king the first Earl of Litchfield. His armor may be seen today in the Tower of London.

Richard Lee, the third son of Lancelot, by his first wife, was sent over to the Colony of Virginia as Secretary and a member of the King's Privy Council, in the year 1641. He was married twice and was the father of six sons and two daughters. His second son,

Richard Lee II, inherited the Homestead in Westmoreland County and died there on 12th March 1714. The fifth son of this Richard Lee II was—

Henry Lee who married a Miss Bland. They were the grandparents of General Robert Edward Lee. Among the Virginians from Westmoreland County who came to South Carolina and settled upon the High Hills of the Santee, was Richard Henry Lee.

Richard Henry Lee was the forefather of-

Col. Richard D. Lee of Sumter, South Carolina who married Mary Elizabeth Dozier. Their daughter was—

Marie Dozier Lee, who married the Reverend Henry Harris Covington, was the daughter of Colonel Richard D. Lee and Mary Elizabeth Dozier of Sumter S. C.

Dr. Henry H. Covington was quite an individualist and many tales are told about him.

Upon his arrival at Old Saint Paul's Church in Norfolk in 1913, a very fine automobile was presented him by the congregation. His auto was driven by Charles, the butler, house man, and chauffer who had come up to Virginia with the family from South Carolina. When Charles was drafted into the army in World War I, Dr. Covington drove the car himself. He was the world's worst driver. He never changed gears or slowed up at intersections. If another car had the right of way, he kept right on going, jammed on brakes and then backed off, throwing passengers in the car first forward, then shaking them to pieces backing off. Mrs. Covington never uttered a word during these narrow escapes or when he took corners on two wheels. She always leaned way over to the opposite side as if this in some way might keep the car from turning over.

On Sunday mornings directly after breakfast, Dr. Covington always went to his study on the third floor of the Rectory. He had one stiff leg as the result of a broken knee while living in Sumter, so he came down the steps one at a time. As his children heard him start to descend, newspapers and funny papers went in every direction and everyone tore to their rooms grabbing hats, gloves and coats. Everybody had to get into the car *in* the garage because when he backed out there were no stops between there and St. Paul's Church.

News item: Mrs. Louisa Cripen-Milby Johnston died, age 98 years. Born in Eastville, Northampton County, Eastern Shore, January 9, 1805, daughter of Joshua Custis and Anne Savage Garrison.

CUSTIS AND JOHNSTON

James Haynes Johnston was an importer. He was descended from the Johnstons of Annandale, Scotland. The founder of this Scotlish nobility came over with William the Conquèrer at the time of the Battle of Hastings in 1066. James Johnston was the son of William and Sarah Haynes Johnston, daughter of Col. William Haynes, a hero of the Battle of Great Bridge, alive in 1799. William Johnston and his wife Sarah lived at No. 2 Talbot Street, Corner of Main Street. She died in 1807 and he in 1810, leaving one son, James Haynes Johnston.

Mrs. James Haynes Johnston, nee Louisa C. Garrison was a brunette beauty, famous for her charm and vivacity in and outside of Virginia. One of the most colorful incidents of her life was a ball she attended given for General Lafayette at Yorktown upon his return visit to Virginia in 1824. However, on another occasion when she was a little girl of seven or eight, while walking with her father on the Eastern Shore of Virginia, she heard the guns firing at Craney Island where General Taylor drove off the British fleet in the War of 1812.

A sailing vessel was the only means of traveling to New York, so her husband took her up the coast by sea to hear Jenny Lind sing.

Her husband had an importing business in Norfolk. He dealt in Jamaica Rum and imported brandy, which was all he drank himself. Rum was used to manufacture chewing tobacco. He also imported molasses. His warehouses were at Town Point at the west end of Water Street and on a wharf at the end of Commerce St.

When Mr. and Mrs. Johnston entertained for their son, James Haynes Johnston, Jr., then a student at Virginia Military Institute, his entire class of 300 members were invited. All meals were served at her home, and many friends, including the Old National Hotel on Main and Church Streets, provided their sleeping quarters. As a compliment, she was made an honorary member of the V.M.I. student body. She kept this certificate of membership of which she was very proud.

Mr. John William Moore was a Captain in the Confederate Army under General Robert E. Lee. On one occasion, he was entrusted with some highly important dispatches. While he was carrying these across a very high trestle over the Mississippi River, he was overtaken by a long train of cars. He was forced to try to save himself by hanging by his hands from the ties at a very high elevation above the river. The train was moving very slowly and it was only by the show of the greatest fortitude that he was able to hold on and to draw himself back upon the trestle.

This is a fair example of the type of men fighting for their families and their homes against four and five to one manpower and forty to one supplies, equipment and financial resources during the Civil War. The history of their courage and their deeds will still be sung as long as English is spoken.

Mr. Moore's father was an only son, as were his grandfather and great grandfather. They were all killed while riding horses. John William Moore returned to Norfolk after the war and became, in the eighties, business manager of the "Norfolk Virginian" newspaper, a forerunner of the "Virginian Pilot". His death notice stated, "One of the most venerated and respected gentlemen who ever resided in Norfolk."

Mordicai Cooke Boothe, born 1756, married as his first wife, on 2nd of July 1774, Sarah Dabney of King William County.

Benjamin Dabney was executor of the estate of Gregory Smith in 1789.

Caroline Catlett Dabney married in the year 1870, Thomas Charles Baytop, as his second wife. She was born in 1830 and died in 1885.

James L. Dabney married Elizabeth Dade about 1830. She was the daughter of Henry Chew Dade and Catherine Lewis, born about 1785.



John Winchester 1st, who was born about the year 1604 and died 22 August 1689. He came to Maryland from London between 1642 and 1647. His wife's

Samuel Duvall I (born October 1707, died 1775) and Elizabeth Mullikin, daughter of James and Charity Mullikin. Son of—

Mareen Duvall (the younger) and Elizabeth Jacob. Son of-

Mareen I and Susannah, 3rd wife (Va. born) who was the daughter of Benois Brasseur and Marie.

He came to Maryland in 1650's brought here by William Burgess—traces beyond this point are not clear—thought they came from England, where ancestor had come from Normandy. Ancestral home, Laval, France.

EGGLESTON FAMILY

Among the passenger list of the "Transport" which sailed from London in July 1635 were two men named Richard Eggleston, quoting "Andrew Meade" by Baskerville, Old Dominion Press, 1921. The first of this family to come to Virginia, according to "Goode", and settled on Eastern Shore was Richard Eggleston. In 1656 Richard Eggleston, Jr., son of the immigrant, moved to Amelia County and took part in the big fight with the Indians at the Falls of the James. Joseph Eggleston, son of Richard Jr., represented James City County in the House of Burgesses from 1727 to 1730. The name of his first wife is not known, but his second wife was Anne Pettus of Hanover County and the children of his last marriage were—

He must have been a son of Richard.

Anne Pettus, second wife of Joseph Eggleston, son of Richard Eggleston Jr., was the daughter of Dabney and Anne Overton Pettus of Hanover County, Va.

Judith Segar, the wife of Joseph Eggleston Junior, was the daughter of Oliver Segar of Middlesex County. She was born April 20th 1729.

Major Joseph Eggleston was second in command of Lee's Legion (Light Horse Harry) in the Revolutionary War, serving through all of the campaigns in the south. He was a member of Congress in the session of 1798-99.

Mary, sister of Major Eggleston, and wife of Benjamin Ward of Chesterfield was the mother of the beautiful Maria Ward who was the only love of the great orator, John Randolph of Roanoke. She turned down John to marry his cousin, Peyton Randolph, son of Edmund Randolph, born 1753, the first Attorney General of Virginia. He was a member of the convention that framed the constitution of the United States. He entered Washington's Cabinet as Attorney General in 1789, and became Secretary of State in 1794, dying in 1813.

Elizabeth, another sister of Major Eggleston, married, as noted above, Major John Archer, son of Colonel William Archer, military commander of the county. There were four children.

David Quinn Eggleston, lawyer of Charlotte Courthouse, born June 11th 1851, married Susan Daniel, daughter of Samuel Daniel and Mary Booker Daniel. He died October 17, 1909. Daniel, daughter of Samuel Daniel of Charlotte County (1860-1915). His father was—

He earned his LLB at Washington and Lee in 1910 where he taught for several years. He also taught at McGuire's Prep. School, Richmond. He was admitted to the Bar in 1909. He entered the practice of law in Norfolk in 1910 and maintained offices there until 1935.

He was a member of the firms of Baker & Eggleston, Hughes, Vandeventer and Eggleston; and Vandeventer, Eggleston and Black. He was a member of the Virginia Senate 1932-1935 inclusive. He was chairman of the Legislative Commission which drafted the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act. He was a Justice of the Supreme Court of Appeals of Va. from 1935 until 1958 when he became Chief Justice. He retired in 1969.

Mary Meares (1853-1895) was the daughter of Dr. John London and Elizabeth Ashe Holmes Meares. Mary Meares was the eighth-generation from John Swann of Swann's Point, opposite Jamestown Island, who was in Virginia in 1630.

Gabriel Galt (1789-1836) brother of Alexander Galt (1793-1855) was an officer in the War of 1812. He married Betsey Browne. Their son Gabriel Alexander Dickie Galt (1834-1908) was a Physician in the Confederate Army. He was the inventer of Galt's Treplurie, a form of surgical procedure. He married Rosamond Beale, who died in 1898.

John Minson Galt (1785-1814) another brother of Alexander Galt, died in the War of 1812. He married Nancy Herbert. Their son, John Minson Galt, II, was in the Confederate Army. He married Anne W. Land (1814-1884). Their son, Francis Land Galt (1833-1915) was a Surgeon in the U.S. Navy. He resigned his Commission and became Surgeon in the Confederate Navy. He was Surgeon aboard the famous Confederate warship "Alabama".

Alexander Galt (1827-1863) brother of William Richard Galt (1818-1892) was the well known Sculptor. He was a Lieutenant Colonel in the Confederate Army.

James Dickie Galt (1831-1888) was a prominent Physician and Surgeon. He was attached to the 19th Virginia Regiment CSA, Pickett's Division at Gettysburg.

Alexander Dickie Galt (1771-1840) was the son of John Minson Galt (1744-1808) and his wife Judith Craig, daughter of Alexander and Marie Maupin Craig. He married Mary Dorothea (Polly) Galt of Richmond, Virginia. She was descended from Samuel Galt, the immigrant by his first wife, her name unknown.

John Minson Galt (1744-1808) was the brother of James Galt (1741-1800) and son of Samuel Galt the immigrant and his second wife, Lucy Ballard.

Alexander Dickie Galt was attending physician at the hospital in Williamsburg. He lived in the "Galt House". He was a Surgeon in the War of 1812 with the 68th Virginia Regiment.

John Minson Galt (1744-1808), above, was surgeon of the 15th Virginia Regiment of the Continental Line. By the end of the Revolutionary War he was Senior Field Surgeon of all Virginia troops.

He became head of the "Hospital for the Insane" in Williamsburg, Va., and was the first physician to recognize insanity as an illness.

James Garnett, born June 17th, 1692, married secondly, Elizabeth Muscoe who was the daughter of Salvator Muscoe, a lawyer living in Essex County in 1702, born December 28, 1674, and died in 1741, whose wife was Mary . James Garnett was a Burgess in 1734-36, 1738, 1740 and a Justice of Essex County 1720 until 1740. The child by his second marriage was—

Muscoe Garnett, born August 17, 1736, died January 1803, whose mother died at his birth.

James Garnett, above, born June 17th, 1692, was married a third time on July 19th, 1740, to Mary Rowzee Jones, widow, who was the daughter of Capt. Edward Rowsee who died January 11th, 1739. The children of his third marriage were—

- 2. Augustine.
- 3. Elizabeth who was born June 20th, 1744.
- James who was born April 25th, 1747, taking his fathers name after his half brother had died, also named James. He married Judith Neal. Issue.

James Garnett married, a fourth time, Margaret Scott. He was a large land proprietor.

Muscoe Garnett, son of James and Elizabeth Muscoe Garnett, born August 17th, 1736, was baptized by the Rev. Robert Rose of Saint Anne's parish, Essex County. He married July 9th, 1767, Grace Fenton Mercer, daughter of John Mercer of "Marlborough", Stafford County, and Anne Roy, his second wife, Grace Fenton Mercer was born 1751 and died 1814.

According to the Muster rolls of Settlers in Virginia, Thomas Garnett, age 40, came over in the "Swan" in 1610; Elizabeth Garnett came over in the "Neptune" in 1618; and Susan Garnett, age 3 was born in Virginia. Hotten, the genealogist, sets forth that in 1623, Elizabeth, Susan and Thomas Garnett were living in Virginia. Greer the genealogist, notes that William Garnett emigrated to Virginia in 1650. No connection has been worked out between these and John Garnett, the Pater Familias above. Mr. Francis Cabell of Warminister, Virginia, includes Garnett in his list of leading families of Eastern Virginia in 1776. Names of the Justices of Essex County from 1695 to 1700 include Captain Salvator Muscoe and James Garnett.

James Mercer Garnett, son of Muscoe and Grace Fenton Mercer Garnett, was born June 8th, 1770, and married Mary Eleanor Dick Mercer, born October 4th, 1774, (died 1837) his cousin (first) and the daughter of Judge James Mercer of the Court of Appeals of Virginia. Their children were—

Mary Ann Wilson was born on July 19th in Surry County. She died August 16th, 1891, at Norfolk, Va. She was the daughter of Dr. George Wilson of Surry County and Mary Ann Drew of Smithfield, Va., his wife.

Dr. George Wilson was born on May 8th, 1790, in Surry County. He died in 1864, the last year of the war. He was the son of—

Soloman Wilson and Anne Riddick, his wife.

Mary Ann Drew was born in the year 1797. She married Dr. George Wilson as noted. She was the daughter of Benjamin Drew and his wife, Mary Ann.

Janie Maigne Gresham was the daughter of Samuel S. Gresham and Emma Maigne. Emma Maigne was the daughter of Henry I. Maigne and Jane R. Basham who were married at Old Saint Paul's Church in Norfolk on May 29th, 1851. She was baptized on April 23rd, 1852.

Muscoe Garnett was born August 17th, 1736. He was the son of James Garnett and Elizabeth Muscoe, his second wife. He was baptized by the Rev. Robert Rose of St. Anne's Parish, Essex County. He married as noted Grace Fenton Mercer on July 9th, 1767, daughter of John Mercer of "Marlborough", Stafford County, and Anne Ray, his second wife. Grace Fenton Mercer was born in 1751 and died in 1814.

Religious persecution had forced Major General John Custis and his wife Joan to leave England and seek freedom and peace of mind in Protestant Holland. They later came over to Virginia and settled in Northampton County on the Eastern Shore in or about the year 1640. Three of their sons acquired land in the same county, Colonel William Custis, General John Custis and Joseph Custis.

Mr. Custis and his wife liked each other less as each year went by. On an occasion while he was carving a very delectable fowl, he would turn to the servant standing behind his chair and remark, "Ask Mrs. Custis what part of the fowl she would prefer?" The servant would return with the reply, "Mrs. Custis says that she would like to have the thigh". Whereupon she would be duly served.

On another occasion whereupon they had had a very unpleasant midday meal, he had had his buggy hitched up and had driven up to his front door. He asked the servant to find out if Mrs. Custis would like to take a ride. Shortly afterwards she came out of their house and got into the buggy with him.

Without a word he drove on to the water's edge. Mr. Custis then turned his horse and drove right out into the bay. On they rode for some time and then when the water began coming up into the vehicle, underfoot, Mrs. Custis broke the solemn silence. "Where are vou going Mr. Custis?". "Going to hell madam" was his sardonic reply. "Drive on, Mr. Custis" she said. He drove on a little further, slowly turned around and drove back to the house. This is the same Mr. Custis who moved to Williamsburg after his wife died. His unusual epitaph in old Bruton Parish Churchyard has caught the eye of many a tourist.

Dances were held at the old Hygeia Hotel at old Point Comfort for many years before the War Between the States. Lieutenant Mullins was stationed at Fortress Monroe. Many young people came down from Norfolk by boat to attend these dances over the weekend. The Hygeia was the social center of the community. Emily Garrison of Bayview (now called Bayville) was among them. There she met Major John B. Mullins, then a lieutenant, who was stationed at Fort Monroe. A romance developed which was culminated.

Numbers of these same young people and many friends of the family attended this beautiful wedding, and enjoyed a most unusual occasion of feasting and merriment. Gathered in the spacious rooms on the first floor of "Bayview", beauty and gallantry tripped the light fantastic to the merry strains of the music. Gracefully the young people danced. Wine and wit flowed freely.

Supper was announced and tables laden with all to tempt the palate were enjoyed by all present. Occupying the center of the table, there was a wedding cake, beautifully ornamental and capped with Cupid. Such an occasion was seldom seen in those days. I am sure could we look in on the lovely bride and her handsome groom, we would see all glasses raised to toast this happy couple, quite unconscious of the clouds of war which lay around them.

In the late afternoon the merry guests went their several ways, in carriages and on horseback.

Lieutenant Mullins returned, shortly, to his home state of Mississippi and there helped raise the 19th Miss. Infantry. He was made a Major and soon joined Lee in Virginia. He never saw his wife again until after the war. He was so badly wounded by an artillery shell while leading his men at Malvern Hill that he had to be carried to Richmond. He lay ill for such a long time that he did not recover until after the war. He was made a Lieutenant Colonel for bravery in the face of the enemy.

James Savage Garrison, Sr., raised fancy horses while he lived at "Bayview". He imported several from Arabia and built a race track of his own. He was so sure of the speed and endurance of his horses that he sent a challenge to the Sporting Circle of New Orleans asking for a race.

New Orleans accepted his challenge.

He traveled by land all the way from "Bayview", with quite a coterie of friends and a sizable group of grooms and servants and two jockeys, and most

important, his great horse "Wagner". He was enthusiastically received and much excitement prevailed over the coming races.

The best of the local horses in New Orleans was "Gray Eagle" who had easily beat all challengers. Sportsmen came from adjoining States to see the much advertised coming race and high bets were placed on their favorite.

"Wagner" was in excellent condition, and as the race was ready to start it did not seem that either horse could lose. James Garrison and his friends were able to cover most of the bets.

"Wagner" beat "Gray Eagle" over the four mile run, decisively and no protest. Much money changed hands that day and there was happiness in the home camp. Later "Wagner" raced every other horse available and won every race.

Both horses and their owners, friends, jockeys and grooms were then taken to Lexington, Kentucky, another great racing center. "Gray Eagle being the more famous of the two horses, was largely backed by the local sportsmen. "Wagner" won again with relative ease.

The happy group returned to "Bayview" at long last and many were the evenings around the fireside that all the details of their great adventure were recounted.

James Savage Garrison, with the proceeds from his two great races was able to buy up the land around the Bayview Plantation until he owned over four thousand acres which included the Thorogood Plantation.

He also had dug a canal from Chesapeake Bay across the sand to Lynnhaven River for the use of the local fishermen who lived on or near the river. Formerly they had had to keep two sets of boats, one on the south side of the river where they lived and one on the beach of the Bay. This canal with tidal water running through it four times in twenty four hours continued to widen. A few storms a year soon made it into a waterway, and now we have Lynnhaven Inlet.

Lynnhaven Inlet does not show on the old maps. The shore line continued from Cape Henry to a very small inlet near Little Creek which was not open all of the time, some two miles west of Lynnhaven.

James and Eliza Garrison were married on the fifteenth of November 1790, George Glenn Garrison and Annie Dalrymple were married on the eleventh of November 1856. The children of Lieut. John Bavy and Emily Garrison Mullins were—

There is a deed from Cantwell Garrison to Littleton Eyre, dated June 10th, 1746. Conveying Hog Island in Northampton County DB 18, P 327 for one hundred thirty three acres.

COPY OF WILL OF JAMES H. JOHNSTON

(Admitted to Probate in the Corporation Court of the City of Norfolk, Virginia, July 7, 1874, Will Book 9, page 110.)

In the name of God Amen, I, James H. Johnston, this being my last will and testament, being in sound mind etc., give my beloved wife Louisa C. M. Johnston the house on Main Street that we live in and all the furniture her lifetime, and if she chooses to sell the furniture and board out the amount of sales to be put out at interest for her benefit her lifetime, this is to independent of what the law allows her as my widow.

I give to my daughters, Mrs. Sarah Ann Keeling and Mrs. Mary Moore my two lots on Main Street next to Pimer (?) Debrees (as laid off) the eldest to take her choice.

I give to my son, James H. Johnston, Jr. the farm I bought of Mr. Capps and which my son now occupies which I value at \$4,600.00, to him and his heirs forever. The remainder of my estate, real and personal to be divided equally among my Daughters, Sarah A. Keeling and Mrs. Mary Moore, and my sons, Thomas I. Johnston, George W. Johnston, and Charles Johnston, and at the death of my wife my dwelling house etc. (?) left to her her lifetime—to be sold and divided among the latter named children.

The property devised to my daughters, Sarah A. Keeling and Mrs. Mary Moore I leave to them for their *individual* use whilst living, and to their children after death so that the creditors of their husbands (or other persons) shall not interfere with their rights, my Executors to manage the same in trust for them. Should, after the foregoing bequests being made, my property amount to more than Forty-six Hundred Dollars for each child, Sarah, Mary, George, Charles and Thomas, then I give to my son James, his proportion of the surplus.

I do hereby appoint my wife, Mrs. L. C. M. Johnston, James H. Johnston, Jr. and Geo. W. Johnson my Executors under this will to sell and dispose and divide the Estate as intended without security. Given under my hand and seal this sixth day of March, 1860.

GOODE FAMILY

Walter Goode of Whitley, was the son of William Goode and Milicent, his wife. He was born between 1500 and 1510 and married about 1540 Joan Whitston, the daughter and heiress of William Whitston. She brought to him the manor of Whitston in North Cornwall.

Richard Goode was their son. He married Isabell, the daughter of Philip and Joan Downe Penkeville who was the daughter of John Downe of Pilton in Devon. Richard was born 1560. According to good authority, there were two sons of Richard and Isabelle, who were—

He settled on the then frontier at a location where Richmond would later be built. He married while in the Barbados., a Miss Mackarness. After a few years in Virginia, she died leaving two sons, Samuel and Robert. John Goode married again in Virginia, Anne Bennet. He died in 1709, leaving his estate to his sons, Robert and John, son of his second wife.

He became a prominent lawyer and filled many public positions. He was appointed Solicitor General of the U.S. in May 1885. He married July 10, 1885, Sally Urquhart daughter of Dr. Richard A. and Mary Norfleet Urquhart of "Strawberry Plains", Isle of Wight County.

John Goode, after finishing college, studied law for two years under Hon. J. W. Brockenbrough of Lexington and was admitted to the bar in 1851. When 22 years old he was elected to the House of Delegates. He was a member of the Virginia Convention of 1860 and was a strong supporter of secession. When war developed, he was appointed a Captain on General Jubal A. Early's staff. He was elected to the Confederate Congress in February 1862 and concluded that he could serve his state better in that capacity, holding this position until the end of the war. In 1865 he moved to Norfolk and was again elected to the Legislature. In 1874 he was nominated for Congress. After a contested election he was seated by a vote of Congress itself, over the claim of the notorious carpet bagger, James H. Platt, Jr., of Vermont. He was re-elected to the 45th and 56th only to be defeated in the next election because of his strong support of the full payment of all of the just obligations of the State of Virginia under the question of the "State Debt Settlement".

While in Congress he was the author of a bill providing for the erection of a monument at Yorktown and for the celebration of the surrender of Lord Cornwallis to the allied armies of Washington and Lafayette. He was made president of the Yorktown Centennial Association. He was a member of the Board of Visitors of the University of Virginia, William & Mary College.

GORDAN FAMILY

Between 1820 and 1829, John Dozier Gordan came to Norfolk from Camden County, N. C. and established a small private bank. He purchased, in 1833, a house which had been built prior to 1812, from the Garrison Family who had moved to Lynnhaven Bay (West side). This house was located on the east end of Bermuda Street, facing south on what was known as Mahone's Lake, with water on three sides. He made considerable improvements to the house and called it Gordan Hall.

The Gordan family lived there until approximately 1915. The property was sold to the City of Norfolk in 1951 as part of a highway development. John D. Gordan married Susan Stratton of the Eastern Shore, Virginia. They both died in the yellow fever epidemic of 1855.

George W. Gordan was their son. He married Ida Johnson of Nashville, Tennessee, whose sister Frances had earlier married James Y. Leigh of Norfolk. They were the daughters of John Bellenjant Johnson and Eliza Baird. George W. and Ida Johnson Gordan had four children—

- John Dozier Gordan II, born 8th November 1879 and died in Norfolk, Va. 16th December 1950.

Charles Grandy was born between 1640 and 1687. He patented land in Lower Norfolk County in the year 1671. He married first, Elizabeth Sawyer who died sometime before 1680. She was the daughter of John Sawyer of Albemarle County, N. C.

Thomas Grandy was their son. He was born before 1666 and died between the years 1732 and 1736. He moved to Albemarle County before 1703. He was a planter of Pasquotank Precinct, Albemarle County. He patented 385 Acres of land in that part of Albemarle which is now Camden County in the year 1727. He married Mary Bassnet who was the daughter of William Bassnet of Lynnhaven Parish, Lower Norfolk County, Va. Their son was—

Caleb Grandy who was born before 1714. He was an Ensign in the Virginia Navy in the year 1755. He died about 1774 and his wife's name is not available. His son was—

Caleb Grandy II who was born before 1750 and died about 1797. He was a merchant and planter in Pasquotank County and one of the first two members from Camden County of the North Caroline House of Commons. He was Sheriff of Camden County 1788 to 1792.

Miles Grandy was his son, who was born before 1776. He lived in Camden and died in 1822. His wife's name is unknown and their son was—

Cyrus Wiley Grandy who was born in the year 1808 and who died in 1874. He was a planter and merchant of Camden County, N. C. He moved to Norfolk in 1884 and became a cotton merchant and banker. He married Anne Lamb Dozier. Their son was—

Cyrus Wiley Grandy II of Norfolk who was born in 1839 and who died in 1919. He was a Major in the Confederate Army and married in 1868, Mary Selden (1843-1918) who was the daughter of Doctor William Selden of Norfolk (1808-1887) and his wife, Lucinda Pope Wilson. Robert Yeo II of Hiamton, Sackville, who died on Monday before the Feast of Saint Peter ad Vinculo in the year 1399. He married Isabella, the daughter and heiress of John Brightley, of Brightley, County Devon. Their son was—

John Yeo of Hiamton, Sackville, who married Alice, the daughter and heiress of William Jewe of County Cabley, Devon. Their son was—

William Yeo of Hiamton, Sackville, who married Hellena, the daughter of William Greenville of Stowe, County Devon. Their son was—

Nicholas Yeo of Hiamton, Sackville, who married Johanna Libb of County Wilts. Their son was—

John Yeo of Hatherly, County Devon, their son, married Anne Honichurch of County Devon. Their son was—

Robert Yeo of Honichurch, who married Mary, daughter of Hugh Gifford of Saint Giles, County Devon. Their son was—

John Yeo of Reede, Parish of Hatherley who died before 1639. He married Rebecca who was the daughter of Henry Roll of Hiamton, Sackville. Their son was—

Samuel Yeo of Saint Peter's Marland, County Devon. His will was dated 1670. He married Elizabeth whose surname is not given and who was living in 1689.

Rebacca Yeo, their daughter, who died in 1739, married in 1684, Samuel Selden. His will is dated 1720. He obtained a grant for a large site including what is now known as Buckroe Beach in Elizabeth City County and sailed from England to Virginia. He was a lawyer, son of Arthur Selden of Meeth, County Devon whose will was dated and proved in 1675, and who married Elizabeth whose surname is also not given. Their son—

John Selden who was born in 1685 in the County of Devon, England. He accompanied his parents to Virginia and owned land in Lancaster and Elizabeth City Counties. He was a lawyer, Justice and the Sheriff of Lancaster County in

the year 1732. He was a Deputy King's Attorney in 1752. He married in 1740 Grace Boswell, daughter of Capt. William Boswell. He died in 1754. The Reverend William Selden of Hampton who was born in 1741, was their son. He had graduated from William & Mary College as a lawyer but later decided to become a Minister of the Church. He went to England and completed all of the necessary subjects. He was ordained by the Bishop of London in the year 1771. He was then assigned as rector of old Saint John's Church in Hampton and served from 1771 until his death in 1783. He had married in 1767, Mary Ann Hancock, daughter of John Hancock of Princess Anne County, Va. She died in 1800. Among their children was—

Doctor William Boswell Selden who was born in 1772. He was educated as a physician in Philadelphia and in Edinburgh, Scotland. At 26 years old he moved to Norfolk and set up his shingle as a physician. Four years later, in 1802, he married Charlotte Colgate who was born in 1781. She was the daughter of Robert Colgate who had emigrated from England to Maryland. Charlotte Colgate Selden died in the year 1870. Their son was—

Doctor William Selden who was born in 1808 in Norfolk. He was educated in his academic work at the University of Virginia. He then studied medicine at the University of Pennsylvania and after winning his degree pursued his medical education in both London and Paris. He was a surgeon in the Confederate Army, having command of the extensive army hospital at Liberty, Virginia. When the war was over he came back to Norfolk where he became quite prominent. He married Lucinda Pope Wilson who was born in 1814 and died in 1901. She was the daughter of Doctor Daniel Wilson of Louisville, Kentucky. Doctor William Selden died in the year 1887. Their daughter was—

Mary Selden who married in 1868, Cyrus Wiley Grandy, as noted elsewhere.

GRINNAN

Hayden's "Virginia Genealogies" relates that in an old book still preserved in the Virginia line, there appears "John Glassell, his book, gotten in a gift, 1620".

The parish records of Torthorwald which began in 1696 show the Glassels as tenants of the Queensberry Douglases in the village of Rucan. The first Glassel that I have found as a landowner was John, the father of the Duchess of Argyll, who bought "Longniddry", 16 miles from Edinburgh, in 1782.

Family records show him marrying Mary (or Marion) Coalter. The Torthorwald parish register shows him marrying October 21, 1697, Marion Glassell. Their son Robert II married November 27, 1735, Mary Kelton, daughter of Mathew Kelton in Torthorwald town. Their children born in Rucan were:

John Glassell, born in Ruchan (Rucan) and Helen Buchan (1750-) came to Fredericksburg before the Revolution. There he was a merchant of large enterprises and fortune. At the beginning of the war, he deeded to his brother, Andrew, in fee simple, all of his property in America and returned to Scotland. There was an only daughter, an heiress.

Helen Buchan, wife of John Glassell, was the daughter of John Buchan of Letham and his second wife, Anne, youngest daughter of Charles Broun and Joan Broun, heiress of Coalston and granddaughter of Sir Patrick Broun.

John Buchan of Letham was eldest son of George Buchan of Collegehead and Kello. He died 1792.

George Buchan of C & K was baptized November 16, 1682 at Aberdeen and died March 5, 1760. He married Miss Hay, daughter of Hay of Balbethan, in the County of Aberdeen. He was the son of John Buchan, a younger son of the House of Auchmacoy, Aberdeen, and Margaret Menzies, m. June 7, 1679 of the House of Menzies of Pitfaddels, Aberdeen.

Andrew Glassell III (Robert II, John I) born in Gallaway, Scotland, died in Virginia July 4, 1827; in October 21, 1776 he married Elizabeth Taylor, born September 22, 1755, died July 4, 1828, daughter of Erasmus and Jane (Moore) Taylor of Orange County, Virginia. Erasmus Taylor was the son of James and Martha (Thompson) Taylor of Culpeper County and brother of Zachary Taylor who was Grandfather of General Zachary Taylor, 12th President of the U.S.A., and thus the great grandfather of Sarah Knox Taylor, who m. the Hon. Jefferson Davis of the Confederacy. Andrew Glassell migrated to Madison County where he built the fine home known as Torthorwald on the upper Robinson River. He knew his grandmother, Mary Coalter Glassell who lived in the reign of Charles

II and James I. Mr. Glassell, at his death, left a lengthy paper, addressed to his children urging them to become followers of the Master, whom he had served for so many years.

BRYAN

Mr. Joseph Bryan of St. Paul's Parish, Colleton County, South Carolina planter, is so styled in a deed of 1731. He came to S. C. from Great Britain prior to 1800. (born about 1760, died Feb. 9, 1832 - 1833) in S. C. m. in England c.r. 1695 Janet Cochran (- October 3, 1708). The only printed record of him is found in the Report of the Commission of S. C. to examine into the disputes between that colony and the colony of Georgia - March, 1732. Mr. Joseph Bryan himself, with four of his lawyers, gave two months work to the colony of Georgia at Savannah, (White p. 324).

Hugh Bryan II, son of Joseph of Janet Cochran (1699 - December 1, 1753).

Hon. Johnathan Bryan II (Joseph) born S.C. September 12, 1708-March 12, 1788 Brampton, Ga.) m. Mary Williamson, October 13, 1837. She was the daughter of his brother's third wife (Hugh). In 1754 he was made a member of the first Royal Council under Governor Reynolds. Siding strongly with most of the colonists, he was a leader in the fight for liberty against Great Britain. He was a fervently religious man. He represented the district of Savannah in the Provincial July 4, 1775. Later, in 1793, when a new county was formed, it was named for him.

Joseph Bryan III (Johnathan II, Joseph I)(August 22, 1746 "Walnut Hill", S. C. - 1774 on his plantation on "May River"). He m. Elizabeth Pendarvis (May 23, 1755 - April 5, 1804), daughter of Josiah Pendarvis and grand-daughter of Col. Richard Bedon.

Hon. Joseph Bryan IV, their son (Josiah III) (August 18, 1773 May River, S. C. - Sept. 1812) m. April 9, 1805, at the house of her uncle, General Benjamin Chambers, Chestertown, Md., Delia Forman (March 4, 1788 - December 16, 1825) daughter of General Thomas Marsh Forman of Rose Hill, Cecil County, Md. who served so gallantly in the Revolutionary War. He was son of Ezekiel Augustine Forman, and grandson of Thomas Marsh, from whom he inherited Rose Hill. Joseph Bryan was educated at Princeton, N. J. and Cambridge, England.

John Randolph Bryan V, U.S.N. (Joseph IV, Josiah III, Johnathan II, Joseph I) of Gloucester County, Virginia (March 23, 1806 at Wilmington Island,

Ga. - died U. Va. September 13, 1887). He m. at Chatham, Virginia, January 27, 1830, Elizabeth Tucker Coalter (June 25, 1805 - March 28, 1856 at Eagle Point, Va.), daughter of Hon. John Coalter, Judge Virginia Court of Appeals, and his wife, Anne Frances Bland Tucker, daughter of Hon. St. George and Frances (Bland) Tucker. Her grandmother, Frances Bland, was daughter of Theorderick and Frances (Bolling) Bland, and the widow of John Randolph. She was, therefore, the mother of Hon. John Randolph of Roanoke. In 1822 he entered Yale, and receiving an appointment, he entered the U.S. Navy in October 4, 1823. He resigned and moved to his farm on the Severn River in Gloucester County in 1831. His brother Thomas Marsh Forman Bryan (1809 - 1875) m. Florida Troup, daughter of Governor George M. Troup of Georgia.

John Buchan, a younger son of the House of Auchmacoy, County of Aberdeen, married June 7, 1679, Margaret Menzies of the House of Pitfaddels, Aberdeen. Their son—

John Campbell, 7th Duke of Argyll (Duchess of Argyll 1777-1847).

Andrew Glassell III (Robert II, John I) born Galloway, Scotland, October 8, 1738 and died in Virginia, July 4, 1827. He m. Elizabeth Taylor, (born September 22, 1755 and died July 24, 1828). She was the daughter of Erasmus and Jane Moore Taylor of Orange County, Virginia. Erasmus Taylor was the son of James and Martha Thompson Taylor of Culpepper County and brother of

Zachary Taylor, grandfather of General Zachary Taylor, 12th President of the U.S. Andrew Glassell emigrated to Madison County, where with imported mechanics he built a large brick residence on the upper Robinson River, known as "Torthorwald". He knew his grandmother, Mary Coalter Glassell.

GWATHMEY FAMILY

The Owens of Anglesea are a branch of the family which is in direct descent from Owen Tudor. He was an ancestor of the Royal House of Tudor.

Owen Gwathmey (Gwalchmai) lived on the island of Anglesey in North Wales. Becoming interested in the new world, he left Wales during the late sixteen hundreds. He came to Virginia and settled first in Gloucester County. He soon made friends among the local people and met and later married the widow Cluverius.

Richard Gwathmey was their son, raised under the traditions of plantation life. He married Diana Moore and striking out for himself, settled at "Canterbury" in King and Queen county. Their children were six daughters and one son—

Owen Gwathmey, who was probably sent to England for his education as he met and married Hanna Temple. He must have carried on the business of running the plantation. Hanna Temple was the daughter of Sir Joseph Temple of England.

Temple Gwathmey I was their son. He married Anne Baylor on 30th September 1774. She was the daughter of John and Mollie Brooke Baylor. Their son was—

Temple Gwathmey II, who married Anne Watts on the 5th September 1811. Their son was—

Mr. Gwathmey was a practicing civil and construction engineer who operated in Norfolk and in adjoining states. He lived on Warren Crescent where his family was raised.

He practiced first in New York City in 1902 at the old Skin & Cancer Hospital. He soon became interested in anesthesia. He married in 1890, Margaret L. Riddle of Nashville, Tenn. There were two children, Mary Tayloe Gwathmey of Virginia Beach, Va. and William Riddle Gwathmey, retired, of Donna, Texas. In the year 1914 he wrote a highly authoritative and far reaching work entitled "Anesthesia". He founded and was the first president of the American Society of Anesthesists. He was a captain in

the medical corps in the first World War, instructing the English, French and Americans and developing new forms of anesthesia.

Edward Tayloe Gwathmey practiced law in Norfolk for many years. He married Margaret Cabell Smith, daughter of Francis Henry Smith and Mary Stuart Harrison, his wife. Doctor Smith was the professor of Natural Philosophy of the University of Virginia. He died in 1928. The children of E. Tayloe Gwathmey and Margaret Cabell Smith, his wife, were—

HARRISON

Benjamin Harrison served as Clerk of the Virginia Council circa 1629. He moved into a plat of land for which he held a patent in 1635. His wife was named Mary and there were two known children. He was a Burgess in 1642. He died in 1648.

In Surry County are listed Peter and Benjamin Harrison. Benjamin Harrison, the son of the first Benjamin, was born September 20, 1645. He was a member of the "King's Council" and was sent to England as a Commissioner for the Colony to register complaints against Blair. He donated five acres of land for a chapel. He was a good churchman of Surry County and left in his will "for ornaments" for the chapel where he was buried, dying January 30, 1712.

He married Hannah Churchill who was born February 13, 1651, and died February 16, 1698. The issue of this marriage was—

- Sarah Harrison, (August 14, 1670, died May 5, 1713) m. Rev. James Blair, minister of Jamestown Parish; Commissary of the Bishop of London for Virginia and President of the College of William and Mary. He died in 1743 and there was no issue.

William Capp, the progenitor of the Capps family, the "S" being added to the name later, was a member of the House of Burgesses in 1619, representing Kecoughtan in the first General Assembly of Virginia. His plantation was called "Little England", a part of Kecoughtan, which is now Hampton. In 1623 he moved to property adjoining Adam Thorogood (Thoroughgood) and William Claiborne in Elizabeth City County, now Princess Anne County (Virginia Beach). He was the great-great-great-great-grandfather of Elizabeth Josephine (Betsy) Capps. His son, Richard Capps, (1654-1720) was sued by his neighbors, James and Grace Sherwood, in 1698, in the famous witchcraft trial.

Lieutenant James Kirkpatrick USN, husband of Elizabeth Hemmingway, was born on August 20, 1897, at Lexington, Kentucky. His parents were Rev.

James Kirkpatrick and Martha Maria Dudley. He was married on June 21st, 1924, and died in August 1934 as previously noted.



HOGGARD FAMILY

In Colonial Days, Thurmer Hoggard I and his wife, Susanna Thurmer were married in England and came over to Norfolk County, Virginia to claim property which had been left him by his father, Peter Hoggard who died in 1748. There was long litigation in Warwick County in which Peter Hoggard was involved as was also his wife. They had four sons, - Thurmer, Nathaniel, Samuel and Peter. Susanna died before 1773 and Thurmer in 1779. Among the articles which they brought from England were some young Poplar trees and their family silver which was marked "TSH" and which was still in use at Poplar Hall in 1898. He was a Captain of militia in 1774 and saw much service in the Revolution. In 1760 he started buying additional land around the home place. Deeds were recorded from Colonel Edward H. Moseley, Langley, Robert Clark, Jacobs and Parks. In his will he left "To my son Nathaniel, six slaves, my new sword, new gun and pistols, my large bible, Murray's Instructions on Shipbuilding, and all of my drafts and drafting instruments, eight English pounds for the education of my nephew, Peter Hoggard; and forty shillings for the education of Francis Thorowgood who is now an apprentice to me."

During the War of 1812, Thurmer Hoggard II had built 2 merchant brigs which were tied to the wharf. The sudden arrival of British troops burned them before they could be gotten away. Their hulls were still visible after 1900. Thurmer II died without heirs.

Nathaniel Hoggard, his brother, inherited the homestead and all of his father's land. He also was a shipbuilder and plantation operator, raising much cotton. A Captain of the Fourth Virginia Regiment of the line, during the Revolution, his sword long hung over the fireplace, until the year 1951. He was a Trustee and vestryman of the Church until he died. The census of 1785 listed him with 3 white souls, 2 dwellings and 9 lesser buildings. He married Mary Gardner and their children were—

- 1. Joseph, who died young.
- 2. Susan, also died young.
- 3. Elizabeth, who married 1st Mr. Whitehurst and 2nd, Mr. Plume for whom Plume Street in Norfolk was named.
- 4. Mary, who married Charles Sayer.

- Susanna II, who married in 1798 Thomas Moran for whom Moran Ave. in Norfolk was named.
- 7. Thurmer Hoggard III, who married in 1808, Harriet Harding. She died in 1824 and he in 1835. He furnished lumber for the Gosport Navy Yard, mostly big timbers, oak and hand hewn which he would buy around the state. He was treasurer and vestryman of Lynnhaven Parish. He was County Clerk when the court house was in Kempsville.

According to the tax records, Thurmer Hoggard owned twenty slaves. Thurmer, his son, owned four slaves and Mary Hoggard owned nine. In 1811, Thurmer owned 300 Acres of Land, Mary Hoggard owned 320 Acres of Land, Susanna Hoggard owned 100 acres of Land and Dianna Hoggard owned 98 Acres of Land. All descendants of Thurmer Hoggard 1st were born in old "Poplar Hall", many buried in the graveyard there. The house was occupied by the British during the War of 1812 and by a Union officer and 16 men during the blockade days of the War between the states. The wharf and old boat house shown in the sketch are thought to be the scene of one of the first Navy Yards in Virginia.

Thurmer Hoggard IV was the oldest son of Thurmer Hoggard III. He was born in 1819 and married in 1843, Elizabeth Frances Cornick who was born in 1817 and died in 1891. He served as vestryman in Lynnhaven Parish from the age of 24 until he died. He was also treasurer. The pecan trees in the garden on the side and back of the house were planted by Elizabeth when she came to Poplar Hall as a bride.

In the year 1854, during the great yellow fever epidemic, many prominent Norfolk families moved out into the country to escape the plague. They spent the long summer in tents of various kinds upon the great lawn of Poplar Hall with permission of the generous landlord. There was a very clear cool spring of excellent water on the place. Many enduring friendships were started here under such tragic circumstances.

Thurmer Harding Hoggard, the fifth Thurmer, was born in 1844, and died unmarried in 1907. He inherited the home. Thurmer and his brother, Horatio Cornick Hoggard, both survived the Confederate War. He was also a vestryman and the Treasurer of the old Lynnhaven Parish Church. Both brothers were wounded at the Battle of Yellow Tavern in 1864. Thurmer was shot through the stomach and lay in a ditch of water for 48 hours until the field was retaken by the gallant Southern troops. After long months his health was restored.

Captain Horatio Cornick Hoggard who was born in 1846 had incurred a bad shoulder wound at Yellow Tavern and was taken prisoner. He was held at Hampton and then at Point Lookout for ten months. He had fought in 63 battles and skirmishes, having been made a captain at the age of nineteen. He married Mary Nash Herbert, "Miss Mollie", who was born in 1848, daughter of E. H. Herbert and his wife, Margaret. She died in 1916 and he in 1919. He received the plantation known as "Waverly". Other children of Captain Horatio Cornick Hoggard and Mary Herbert Nash were—

- Margaret Whitehead Hoggard who was born in 1848 and who died in 1875, "Miss Margie".
- Mary Wilson Hoggard who was born in 1850 and died unmarried in 1930.
- Thomas James Hoggard who was born in 1852 and died in 1915, married Emma J. Etheridge.

The last two sisters inherited "Poplar Hall".

Margaret Whitehead Hoggard, born 1848, married Henry Frank Bell who died in 1875. Their son was Harry Layfield Bell who was born in 1874. He married Matilda Alexander of Pittsburg, Penn. There were no children. Because he actually lived at Poplar Hall all of his life, his aunts gave him one third interest in the property. He died there in the eighteen forties. His wife lived until 1875. Title to his interest passed on to his wife. In a forced division of the property it had to be sold so that she could recover her equity. The Hoggard Family were members of Old St. Paul's Church in Norfolk.

John Coke, who was born on 6th April 1704, and Sarah Hoge who was of French extraction. This John Coke emigrated to Virginia and was known as John Coke of Trusley.

Robert Coke Esq. whose wife's name is not available, was the father of John Coke of Trusley. Robert Coke, Esq., and the son of Richard Coke, Esq. of Trusley who died in 1664 and Catherine Charlton, his wife. She was daughter of Robert Charlton Esq. and sister of Sir Job Charlton, Speaker of the House of Commons.

Robert Charlton, Esq. was of Whitten, County Stropshire. He married Emma, the eldest daughter of Thomas Harby, Esq. and sister of Sir John Harby, Bart.

Thomas Harby Esq. of Adston married Catherine, the daughter of Clement Throckmorton Esq. and Catherine, his wife, who was the daughter of Sir Edward Neville, Knight, who was the second son of Lord Abergavenny.

Clement Throckmorton was the son of Sir John Throckmorton, Knight, and his wife, the Honourable Catherine Vaux. She was the daughter of Lord Vaux and Elizabeth FitzHugh (her second husband). Elizabeth's first husband had been Sir William Parr, Knight. The son of Elizabeth's first marriage was Sir Thomas Parr who had two daughters—

HUGHES FAMILY

The emigrant Jessie Hughes was a French Hugenot who came to this country between 1675 and 1700, with his wife who was also a Hugenot. He had escaped from France in an open boat, alone, across the English Channel, at the age of fourteen, and lived in England for several years. Jessie Hughes acquired land in Virginia and their plantation was known as Hughes Creek which remained their home place for four generations. Through the years their descendants fought in the Revolution and later in the War of 1812.

One of the sons of Jesse Hughes was David who also lived in his father's home. Among David's children was the first Robert Hughes. The son of Robert Hughes was Robert Hughes Jr., who married Anne Hartwell. Their son was David Hughes of "Muddy Creek Plantation" in Powhatan County. He was a captain in the Revolutionary War and married Judith Daniel. One of their sons was Jesse Hughes, born 1758 and died in 1822. He married Elizabeth Morton who also died in the year 1822. He was a lawyer and made his home at "Muddy Creek".

Their son was Robert William Hughes, born in 1821 and died in 1901. He married Eliza M. Johnston and moved to Norfolk. He was later appointed Judge of the Eastern District of Virginia. He was a writer and an editor for several newspapers in his earlier days. The older son of Judge Robert William and Eliza Johnston Hughes was—

Robert Morton Hughes, born in 1855 and died in 1940, married Martha Smith of Williamsburg. She was the daughter of Judge Sydney Smith and Virginia C. Bucktrout. He (Robert Morton Hughes) was a man of wide interests and accumulated a library that drew much attention. He was much interested in the College of William & Mary throughout his life and did much to help carry the old institution along. He willed to the college the Virginianna Collection of his library. The son of Robert Morton and Martha Smith Hughes was—

Robert Morton Hughes Jr., who was born in 1880 and died in 1951. He graduated in law from University of Virginia in 1907. He was engaged in the practice of law in Norfolk. He married Caroline Wright Kennedy, the daughter of Philip Pendleton Cocke Kennedy, of Charlestown, West Virginia, and Selina Anderson Frizell. He gave the rest of his father's library to Old Dominion College which named their collection Hughes Library in honor of his father who with two other gentlemen had been greatly instrumental in bringing this branch of William and Mary College to Norfolk. JOHNSTON FAMILY

James Haynes Johnston was an importer. He was descended from the Johnstons of Annandale, Scotland. The founder of this Scotlish nobility came over with William the Conqueror at the time of the Battle of Hastings in 1066. James Johnston was the son of William and Sarah Haynes Johnston, daughter of Col. William Haynes (or Haines), the hero of the Battle of Great Bridge, alive in 1799. William Johnston and his wife Sarah lived at No. 2 Talbot Street, Corner of Main Street. She died in 1807 and he in 1810, leaving one son, James Haynes Johnston.

Mrs. James Haynes Johnston, nee Louisa C. Garrison was a brunette beauty, famous for her charm and vivacity in and outside of Virginia. One of the most colorful incidents of her life was a ball she attended given for General Lafayette at Yorktown upon his return visit to Virginia in 1824. However, on another occasion when she was a little girl of seven or eight, while walking with her father on the Eastern Shore of Virginia, she heard the guns firing at Craney Island where General Taylor drove off the British fleet in the War of 1812.

A sailing vessel was the only means of travelling to New York, so her husband took her up the coast by sea to hear Jenny Lind sing.

Her husband had an immense importing business in Norfolk. He dealt in Jamaica Rum and imported brandy, which was all he drank himself. Rum was used to manufacture chewing tobacco. He also imported molasses. His warehouses were at Town Point at the west end of Water Street and on a wharf at the end of Commerce St.

When Mr. and Mrs. Johnston entertained for their son, James Haynes Johnston, Jr., then a student at Virginia Military Institute, his entire class of 300 members were invited. All meals were served at her home, and many friends, including the Old National Hotel on Main and Church Streets, provided their sleeping quarters. As a compliment, she was made an honorary member of the V.M.I. student body. She kept this certificate of membership of which she was very proud.

Mr. John William Moore was a Captain in the Confederate Army and stationed near Vicksburg. On one occasion, he was entrusted with some highly important dispatches. While he was carrying these across a very high trestle over the Mississippi River, he was overtaken by a long train of cars. He was forced to try to save himself by hanging by his hands from the ties at a very high elevation above the river. The train was moving very slowly and it was only by the show of the greatest fortitude that he was able to hold on and to draw himself back upon the trestle.

This is a fair example of the type of men fighting for their families and their homes against four and five to one man-power and forty to one supplies, equipment and financial resources during the Civil War. The history of their courage and their deeds will still be sung as long as English is spoken.

Mr. Moore's father was an only son, as were his grandfather and great grandfather. They were all killed while riding horses. John William Moore returned to Norfolk after the war and became, in the eighties, business manager of the "Norfolk Virginian" newspaper, a forerunner of the "Virginian Pilot" His death notice stated, "One of the most venerated and respected gentlemen who ever resided in Norfolk."

J. Frank George m. Mary Minetree and their son, J. Frank George, Jr., m. Susanne Lewis, daughter of Frederick J. Lewis of Norfolk. J. Frank George, Jr., was a Major in Patton's tank corps in World War II. Their daughter, Susanne Lewis George married Barton Myers III.

In 1792 John Johnston, with his wife and mother-in-law, moved to Virginia, and after looking over the pleasant Tidewater section, chose for a homestead the site that is now the eastern portion of Larchmont.

There John Johnston built the small house that in later years came to be known as the Weir home, Lebanon.

Mrs. Mary Wooten Moody, John Johnston's mother-in-law, died first, and was buried in a spot which became later the family burying ground.

Ethan Allen, son of the Revolutionary War hero, was living in Tidewater, Virginia as the Johnston girls, Mary Susan and Martha Washington Johnston, reached womanhood.

This Ethan Allen, Junior, married first Mary Susan, who bore him Ethan Allen, III. Mary Susan died, and Ethan Allen, Junior, married her sister, Martha Washington Johnston.

Descendants Traced

John and Mary Byard Johnston died, and became the second generation of the burying ground. Mary Susan Allen became the third.

JORDAN FAMILY

Samuel Jordan, the ancient planter, came to Virginia in 1610, from England. He and Samuel Sharpe were the first two Burgesses from Charles City County to attend the First General Assembly held in the Colony of Virginia. This was in the year of 1619. He acquired property and named it "Jordan's Journey". The head land was called "Beggar's Bush." In a land grant to John Woodlife on 24th of August 1637, the description refers to "East upon Samuel Jordan's land"

In a list of Patents granted to Settlers in Virginia (page 267) by Hotten, we find under "The Corporacon of Charles Cittie" a list of Patents in the Territory of Great Weyonoke, four hundred and fifty planted acres owned by Samuel Jordan.

His wife was named Sisly. He died in "Jordan's Journey" in the year 1623.

His son, Thomas Jordan, was born in England in 1600. He came to America in the ship 'Diana' and his name is recorded in the 'Census of Virginia of 1623. He was a soldier who served under Governor Sir George Yeardley. He married Lucy Corkes and among their children was Thomas Jordan 2nd who was born in the year 1634.

Thomas Jordan 2nd married Margaret Brashara and they had ten sons as set forth in the personal papers of Fort Boykin, near Smithfield, Va. He died 1699 or 1700. Their son was—

Mathew Jordan who was born in 1676 and married Dorothy Buskin, a widow. A copy of his will may be seen in Will Book 5 Isle of Wight County (1745-1752), Blanch Adam Chapman, page 137. The son of Mathew and Dorothy Buspen Jordan was—

Josiah Jordan who married Mourning Wrix (Ricks). His will is recorded at the Isle of Wight Court House on page 30 of Blanch Adam Chapman's account of bonds published in Isle of Wight County. Their son was—

Arthur Smith Jordan, their son, was born on December 19th, 1819 at "Macclesfield", near Smithfield, Va. He married on May 30th, 1850, Margaret Jessie Perry at "Park View", her mother's home was in Perquimans County, N. C. Margaret was born on May 9th, 1831 and died in March 1905. Their mother came to America later, to visit her brother, Ellwood Shannon, who lived in Philadelphia. She probably brought Thomas and Nellie with her for they lived with uncle and auntie Shannon. Walter who was the elder was given to his uncle Walter, a clergyman of the Church of England in Northern Ireland. When he grew old enough, this uncle Walter wanted his nephew Walter to enter the ministry. Young Walter, however, did not agree so he was sent to another uncle, John F. Irvine who lived in New Orleans, La. He was a cotton merchant.

John F. Irvine's sister was a Mrs. Roddy who had also come to America and lived near Natchez to be near him. Her father and her three daughters came with her, Annie, Ellen and Lizzie. Thomas Irvine had been the Head Professor in a Naval Preparatory School.

His Uncle John sent Walter back to England to see if he liked the old country. Having lived in New Orleans and Natchez, he wasn't happy. After two years, at the age of 19, the War Between the States having broken out he joined at once the Louisiana Artillery C S A. Stationed near Sewell's Point, Va., he attended services one Sunday at Christ Church where Alexander Bell met him and brought him home to dinner. There he met Margaret Soutter Bell, the only daughter. After many visits to the Bell family, he became engaged to Margaret. He returned after the war and they were married at Christ Church on November 5th, 1868. They first lived in New Orleans but returned to Norfolk in 1872. Their children were—

- 1. Margaret Bell Irvine.
- 2. Charlotte Falconer Irvine, born in New Orleans on March 28th, 1872.
- 3. Grace Irvine.
- 4. Walter F. Irvine Jr.
- 5. Alexander Bell Irvine.

Charlotte Falconer Irvine married on June 25th, 1896, James Matthias Jordan of Gates County, N. C., and later of Norfolk.

KEELING FAMILY

One account states that Adam Keeling was a godson of Adam Thorowgood and that he obtained a land grant for 100 acres on Back River in the year 1635.

Ensign Thomas Keeling, presumably his son, came to Virginia from England and settled in Elizabeth City County. He came on the ship "Hopewell" which landed in Virginia in 1628, according to Nugent. He married Ann Bray and was a vestryman in the Lower Norfolk County Church in 1640. He settled first in Elizabeth City County, as noted, and moved to Lower Norfolk County in 1632. He became an Ensign in the militia. Among their children were—

- 1. Adam Keeling.
- 2. Elizabeth Keeling.
- 3. Edward Keeling.
- 4. Thomas Keeling.
- 5. Alexander Keeling.
- 6. Thorowgood Keeling.

In her will Ann Bray Keeling stated that her husband had died and so had her two sons, Edward and Thomas, leaving Alexander as the surviving heir of her husband and herself.

Adam Keeling, son of Ensign Thomas and Ann Bray Keeling, married in 1672, Ann Martin, the daughter of John Martin who died in 1683. He built the beautiful home known as "The Dudleys", which stayed in the family until 1884 when it was sold to John Avery.

Elizabeth Keeling made her will in 1670 leaving her property, real and personal to her two youngest brothers, Alexander and Thorowgood, and to her father-in-law, Mr. Bray.

Anne Bray Keeling, (sometimes spelled Ann) wife of Ensign Thomas Keeling, made a deed in the year 1682 to her son Alexander and to her son Adam's daughter, Anne Keeling.

Captain Adam Keeling, son of Ensign Thomas Keeling, as noted, made his will in 1683. At this time his mother lived on his property at London Bridge. He bequeaths—

- 1. To his daughter Anne, 1200 acres, etc. She married Mr. Lovett.
- 2. To his daughter, Elizabeth, 300 to 400 acres near Machipungo (now Pungo).
- To his son John, 1400 acres that formerly belonged to his father-in-law, Mr. John Martin, etc.
- 4. To my son Thomas, the home plantation etc. and, the Plantation called "The Dudleys", which is near 400 acres.

John Keeling, son of Captain Adam Keeling, who was the son of Engisn Thomas, patented in 1862, 2137 acres in the Parish of Lynnhaven, 700 acres of which was located on Oliver Van Hick's Creek.

Thomas Keeling, son of Ensign Keeling, married Mary Lovett, daughter of Lancaster and Mary Lovett. There were three surviving sons of Thomas and Mary Lovett Keeling—

- 1. Adam.
- 2. John.
- 3. William.

This Adam Keeling made a will in 1771 leaving a plantation to his grand-son, Adam.

Thomas Keeling was the son of this Adam Keeling. His wife's name is not available.

Adam Keeling who made his will in 1805 was the son of Thomas Keeling and the grandson of the Adam Keeling who made his will in 1771. In this will of 1805, Adam Keeling leaves his property to his two sons, Adam and Soloman.

Included in the property left by Captain John Keeling to his son John Keeling was the tract called "London Bridge". A part or all of this land was called "Broadfield". This was left to *Henry Francis Keeling*, the name of whose wife is not known. His son was—

Henry Francis Jr. who inherited "Broadfield". His wife's name is also unknown to writer.

Thomas Keeling was the son of Henry Francis Keeling Jr. Thomas married Delia Hunter. The children of Thomas and Delia Hunter Keeling were—

- Mary Frances Keeling who was born in 1897.
- 2. Margaret Haynes Keeling who was born in 1900.
- 3. Henry Thomas Keeling who was born on the 14th of June 1907.

Delia Hunter had, besides a brother, four sisters, as follows-

- 1. Kate Hunter who married Doctor Gibbs.
- 2. Mary Hunter.
- Lilly Hunter who married Mr. Sawyer.
 - 4. Jane Hunter.

Henry Thomas Keeling married in 1935 Clarice Maria Thomas of Hamden, Connecticut. Clarice Maria Thomas was the daughter of Warren Dallas and Clara Gorham Thomas. Warren Dallas Thomas was of the town of Hamden, adjoining New Haven, Connecticut. He was the son of E. Wilbert Thomas and Jennie Allem of New Haven.

The children of Henry Francis Keeling Jr. who inherited "Broad Field" were—

- 1. Thomas Keeling, as noted above.
- 2. Margaret Keeling, who married Mr. Haynes.
- 3. Roberta Virginia Keeling, who is unmarried.

LANGHORNE

Owen Lacharn of Saint Bride's House married Elizabeth de Brian (Brienne) who was the daughter of Guy de Brian and Joan, daughter of Sir John de Carew, knight, Lord Deputy of Ireland, who died in 1362. Guy de Brian was the son of Sir Guy de Brian, 57th Knight of the Garter, and his wife, Elizabeth de Montacute (1301-1344).

Sir Guy de Brian was Lord High Admiral in the reign of Edward III.

Elizabeth de Montacute was the daughter of William de Montacute (1301-1344), 1st Earl of Salisbury, 3rd Baron Montacute and appointed Marshall of England on September 20th, 1338.

William de Montacute was the son of William de Montacute, 2nd Baron de Montacute and his wife, Elizabeth who was the daughter of Peter de Montfort.

William de Montacute, the Elder, was the son of Simon de Moncute who was granted a Barony in 1300 and an Earldom in 1337.

Joan Lacharn was the daughter of Owen Lacharn of St. Bride's House and Elizabeth de Brian, his wife, noted above. She married Philip Crabhole. Their daughter was—

Joan Lacharn Crabhole who married Philip Lacharn, her cousin, of Saint Bride's House, who was the son of Thomas Lacharn of St. Bride's House. Their son was—

Thomas Lacharn of St. Bride's House who married Elizabeth, the daughter of John Russell of Hays Castle. Their son was—

David Lacharn of St. Bride's who married Jenet, the daughter of Sir John Wogan, Lord Deputy of Ireland. Their son was—

Owen Lacharn of St. Bride's House - (One account says that he married Jenet the daughter of Sir John Wogan, and, that David, his father married Elizabeth, the daughter of Philip Eliot.)

Frances Lacharn of St. Bride's House, the son of Owen Lacharn who married Catherine who was the daughter of Henry Wirriott of Orielton, and died in 1550. Their son was—

Rowland Lacharn of St. Bride's House who was High Sheriff of Pembrokeshire from 1568 to 1578. He married Jenet who was the daughter of John Phes. Their son was—

John Lacharn of St. Bride's House who was a Member of Parliament and High Sheriff in 1586. He married Lettice, daughter of Sir John Perrot, Knight, Lord Deputy of Ireland who died in the Tower in the year 1592. Their son was—

Francis Lacharn who was High Sheriff in the year 1630. He married Jenet Owen who was the daughter of Sir Hugh Owen of Orielton, Knight, and his wife, Elizabeth Wirriott, heiress.

Vaughan Lacharn who was the son of Francis Lacharn of Pont Vaen and Janet Owen, his wife. He married Lettice, daughter and heiress of James Vychan of Pont Vaen.

John Lacham, their son, was the first to use the name of Langhorne for his surname. He married Ann Griffith, the daughter of Griffith of Hawkwell. Their son was—

John Langhorne, the Second, who was a Member of the Virginia House of Burgesses from Warwick County in 1675-76. In 1681 he patented a tract of about 2000 acres on the James River in that county and built his home which was known as "Gambell". He had been a Lieutenant in the King's Army in the fighting in Ireland. His son was—

Major William Langhorne of "Gambell" who was sheriff of Warwick County in 1727-28 and in 1748 was made a Burgess from that county. He was a Justice of the Peace in 1750. He introduced a famous bill while in the House of Burgesses, known as the "Doctors Bill". Under it no man was to practice medicine without registering with the Commonwealth. This cured a raft of evils. He was born about the turn of the century and the last deed acknowledged by him, of which there was a record, was to his son Maurice in the year 1756. He married Anne Wade, who was the daughter of Armiger Wade of York County.

Maurice Langhorne, son of Major William and Anne Wade Langhorne, was a Member of the House of Burgesses from Warwick County in 1771, 1772 and 1774. He was a member of the Committee of Safety for Warwick County in 1775 and 1776, and, a Member of the Convention of 1775. He married Elizabeth, the daughter of Col. Henry and Martha Cary Scarsbrook.

Captain William Langhorne, son of Maurice and Elizabeth Langhorne, was born on January 22nd, 1769. He married on September 25th, 1794, Martha Holladay who was the daughter of Joseph and Patience Holladay of "Indian Fields", Nansemond County, Va. Their son was—

Maurice Blow Langhorne, attorney, who was born at "Indian Fields" in April 1796. He married in the year 1820 Charlotte Wilson, daughter of William and Nancy Wormington Wilson of Portsmouth, Va. He was Deputy Clerk of the Superior and Inferior Courts of Norfolk County and Commander of the Light Infantry Group of Portsmouth. In 1824, when General Lafayette visited the city, he was in command of the troops who escorted the General from the wharf to the City Hall. He died on July 24th, 1825, in the 28th year of his age. The children of Maurice Blow and Charlotte Wilson Langhorne included—

- 1. William Sylvester Langhorne, born in 1821.
- 2. Mary Anna Langhorne who married Captain James Riddick, C S A.
- 3. Lucrece Langhorne who married Colonel Henry Clay Hudgins, C.S.A.

William Sylvester Langhorne, born 1821, who was taken into the Confederate Army in 1861, joined the "Old Dominion Guard". After serving throughout the entire war he was honorably discharged at Houston, Texas, on May 21st, 1865. He was married in 1844 to Lucrece Peillon Bilisoly who was born in 18 She was the daughter of Joseph Antonio Bilisoly and Eliza Ann Benson, his wife. Their son was—

Maurice Bilisoly Langhorne Sr. who was born in the year 1845. He joined the Confederate army at the age of sixteen on March 10th, 1862, and after many battles was able to survive, receiving his honorable discharge at Houston, Texas May 21st, 1865. He married in 1871 Rosalie Bilisoly, born 1850, daughter of Charles Andre and Rosalie Bourke Bilisoly of Portsmouth, Va. Maurice Bilisoly Langhorne Sr. became a prominent banker.

The children of William Sylvester and Lucrece Paillon Langhorne were-

- 1. William Sylvester Langhorne Jr. who was born in 1876.
 - 2. Rosalie Langhorne who was born in She married
 - 3. Maurice Bilisoly Langhorne Jr. who was born in 1872.

Maurice Bilisoly Langhorne Jr. married Mary Dodd Jenkins, who was the daughter of Thomas Green and Lucy Clarine Dodd Jenkins of Raleigh, N.C. The Dodd family came from Portsmouth, Va. The children of Thomas and/Lucy were—

William Thomas Langhorne, born 1915, graduated from Belmont Abbey College of North Carolina. He married in 1949 Edythe Campbell Harriss, daughter of Frederick Pembroke Harriss and Elizabeth Campbell Harris, his wife. There were two children—

Joan Lacharne Crabhole was the daughter of Owen Lacharn and Elizabeth de Brian.

Joan Crabhole Lacharn was the daughter of Philip Crabhole and Joan Lacharn.



LAWSON

Thomas Lawson settled at a very early period in Virginia. His name is mentioned in a printed book (Hanson's Maryland). "Sent out by the Treasurer and Council in this present year 1620." He married Miss Bray and had sons, Anthony and George Lawson.

Col. Anthony Lawson was appointed Sheriff of Princess Anne County by John Blair, Commander in Chief of the Colony and Dominion of Virginia. He served in the army of Virginia under Governors William Berkeley, Herbert Jeffrys, and Henry Chichilsy. He was conspicuous in the suppression of Bacon's Rebellion in 1676, which was the first attempt to gain freedom from tyranny by the American Colonists.

RESUMÉ LEE FAMILY

Colonel Richard Lee of Stropshire, Langton, Essex County, England, came to Virginia in 1641 and settled on Poropotank Creek in Gloucester County, that part which was originally York County. His wife and family came with him. She was Anna, the daughter of Richard Owen. Besides being a Burgess he was made Attorney General and Secretary of the colony and a member of the King's Council. His plantation was named "Paradise". He bought many headrights and procured many settlers for the colony. Some authorities say that his wife's name was Anna Hancock who died in 1695. He mentions in his will sons Richard, Charles, Hancock, William and Francis and daughters Elizabeth and Anne.

Hancock Lee, son of Colonel Richard, was a Justice of Northampton County in 1667. He moved to Northumberland County in 1668 where he built his new home called "Ditchley". He married first, in 1675, Mary Kendall, the daughter of Colonel William Kendall of "Newport House" in Northampton County. He married secondly, Mary Allerton of Westmoreland County.

Richard Lee II also a son of Colonel Richard Lee, was the father of-

Henry Lee III, who was born in 1691 and lived at "Lee Hall" on the Potomac River. He was son of Richard Lee II and married Mary Bland. Their son was—

Henry Lee IV, of "Leesylvania", Prince George County, born 1729 and died in 1787. His son was—

General Henry Lee, known as "Light Horse Harry Lee, born in 1756, married Lucy Grimes.

Edmund Jennings Lee, Sr., was their son.

Edmund Jennings Lee, Jr. was the son of Edmund Jennings Lee, Sr.

Charles S. Lee, was the son of Edmund Jennings Lee Jr. and his wife, Sallie.

Edwin Gray Lee, was the son of Charles S. and Sallie Lee. He married Margaret H. Page. He was born at "The Anchorage" in 1870. He married Elizabeth Parker Nash.

Herbert Nash Lee, was their son who was born in 1903. He married first Charlotte Price who was the daughter of Milnor Price of Norfolk. No children. He married secondly Margarite Whitehead who was the daughter of Hugh Grigsby Whitehead of Norfolk.

Margaret Page Lee, was the daughter of Edwin Gray Lee and Margaret H. Page, his wife. She was born in 1902 and married James E. Hitch of Norfolk.

Margaret H. Page, was the daughter of Mann Randolph Page and Anna Beall. Elizabeth Parker Nash, was the daughter of Dr. Herbert M. Nash and Mary A. Parker. Doctor Herbert M. Nash, was son of Thomas Nash and Adela Herbert.

LEIGH FAMILY

The first name that is available of the Leigh family in the sougheast part of Virginia is *Dr. William Leigh* who lived in Portsmouth, Va. He was born in 1769, a few years before the Revolutionary War. He married Sarah H. Purviance of Philadelphia, Pa. She was born in the year 1781 and she died on July 26th, 1803. Their son was—

John Purviance Leigh who was born at 139 East Main Street, Norfolk on March the fourth 1800. He died on February 22nd, 1865, at Norfolk. He married on March 31st, 1823, Frances Haynes Land at her home in Princess Anne County. She was born on March 28th, 1803 and died quite a young woman on January 27th, 1836. She was the daughter of Captain Renautus Land and Frances Brock, his wife, both also of Princess Anne County. Captain Land died on April 4th, 1823. Their son was—

John Purviance Leigh Jr. who was born on February 4th, 1834. He married on April 23rd, 1861, Fannie P. Cowdery who was born on July 23rd, 1841 and died on July 6th, 1866. She was the daughter of Dr. George Washington Cowdery of 163 East Main Street, Norfolk.

The storm clouds of war were upon them. Fort Sumter had been under bombardment since April 12th, just nine days before their wedding day. John and Fannie well knew what lay ahead for them. Should they not sieze what happiness they could before John had to go? Against the great Monster of the North, like thousands of others his chance of returning was slight indeed.

Doctor George Washington Cowdery was the son of Doctor Johnathan Cowdery of the U.S. Navy who lived at 16 Cumberland Street, Norfolk, who was born April 22, 1762 in Sandisfield, Massachusetts and who died in Norfolk on November 20th, 1852. His wife was Elizabeth Riddick of Whitehave, England who was born on April 22nd, 1777.

Doctor George Washington Cowdery married Emily Jane Southgate who was born on December 18, 1817 in Baltimore, Maryland and died before 1861. She was the daughter of John Southgate of No. 34 South Catherine Street, Baltimore, born 1773 and died June 5th, 1861. John Southgate's wife was Frances P. McCauseland who lived in Baltimore.

Doctor Southgate Leigh of 526 Shirley Avenue, Norfolk, was born May 21st, 1864, in Campbell County, Va. He was the son of John Purviance Leigh Jr. and Fannie P. Cowdery Leigh, his wife. He married on September 20th, 1905, Alice Creekmore of Princess Anne County, born September 29, 1877, died July 15, 1945. She was daughter of John Franklin Creekmore of Princess Anne County, born August 21, 1835, died February 28, 1895. He was son of Horatio and Sarah Turten Creekmore. She was born April 15th, 1802, daughter of Abner Turten and Sarah Ferebee, his wife. They were all from Princess Anne County, Virginia.

John Franklin Creekmore married Sadie Morse of Princess Anne County who was born April 27th, 1837, and died May 13th, 1909. Her parents were also from Princess Anne County.

Doctor Southgate Leigh Jr. was the son of Doctor Southgate Leigh Sr. and his wife, Alice Creekmore. He was born on September 19th, 1906. He married on November 3rd, 1936, Maud Paine Winborne, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Winborne of Norfolk.

Frances Mason, their daughter, married about 1675, George Newton. He died in 1694.

Colonel George Newton, was their son. He married Apphia in 1706. He was born in 1678.

Frances Newton was their daughter. She married Paul Loyall who was at one time Mayor of Norfolk City. He died in 1807. Their son was—

George Loyall, who was at one time Mayor of Norfolk City. He married Sarah Willoughby who died in 1808. He died in 1810.

Senator George Loyall was their son. He was born on 29th of May 1789. He married Margaret Mason Pollard (Kelley) who was born in 1793 and died in 1855. Their son was—

Benjamin Pollard Loyall, who was born on 11th of February 1833. He married Imogen Thompson who was born on January 29th, 1836, and died on 28th of October 1879. He was a Captain in the Confederate Navy and lived until 1923. Their son was—

William Henry Thompson Loyall, who was born on the 6th of May 1869. He married Nan Charlotte Ramsey who was born in 1874. She died in 1952.

Alice Ramsey Loyall, was their daughter. She was born on 11th of April 1906. She married James Brown McCaw Jr. who was born on 1st of October 1905. Their children are—

- Anne Ramsey McCaw, who married Leon Glenn Smith on 24th July 1959 in Christ and Saint Luke's Church, Norfolk, Va. Their children are—
 - (a) Lee Ramsey Smith, who was born in 1960.

MANN FAMILY

The earliest member of this family was probably a brother or uncle of John Mann whose daughter married Colonel John Page. Her name was Mary Mann and she was an only child. Because records in Williamsburg were destroyed during the War Between the States, no proof or details of this Revolutionary period of the Mann Family can be given.

It is definitely known that John Mann, Clerk of Circuit Court of Williamsburg and James City County, married Mary Hunter Bowers (born about 1808; died April 8, 1893). Her father was John Bowers, who (this is recorded) had a pew in Bruton Parish Episcopal Church. They were married in Williamsburg. Their son was—

Edwin Murray Mann (born April 22, 1840 in Williamsburg, Virginia; died October 3, 1885 in Petersburg) m. Martha (Pattie) Burton Cowles born March 6, 1843, Mecklenburg County, Va.; died December 7, 1885 in Petersburg. Their children were—

FONTAINE MAURY

The Edict of Nantes was signed in that city by King Henry IV of France on April 30,1598. Under its terms all protestant Frenchmen were allowed the free exercise of their religion and all offices of state were thrown open to them. This edict which had been the law of the land for almost a hundred years was formally revoked by King Louis XIV, on October 20th, 1685. As a consequence of this arbitrary and fatal act approximately four hundred thousand French people emigrated to England, Holland and America. Some went to other protestant countries. Many came to Virginia and helped to build the fine race of men that the Old Dominion has furnished the nation.

John de la Fontaine, of noble origin, was born in the Provence of Maine, France, about the year 1500. He held a Commission in the household of King Francis I. He held this high honor throughout the reigns of Henry II, Francis II, and in the second year of Charles IX, when he voluntarily resigned. He and his father had joined the protestant faith about the year 1535 and he had married, having four or five sons. Under the Edict of Pacification, dated January 17th, 1561, he was deceived into returning to his paternal estates in Maine. There with the usual duplicity of the organized church, he, his wife and his eldest son were tortured and martyred in the year 1563.

Jacques de la Fontaine, his second son, born 1549 and died in 1633, lived at Rochelle and accumulated property worth nine thousand livres in that date. He was married twice and left a son, the Reverend James de la Fontaine who was pastor of Vaux and Royan. He married first, in 1628, Miss Thompson who died in 1640. He married secondly Marie Chaillon. His son, the Rev. James de la Fontaine II, was born April 7th, 1658 at Jenouville. Of this estate and that of Jaffe, he became possessed. He received his Master of Arts Degree from the college of Guienne and was imprisoned in 1658. After the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes he managed to escape to England with his sister, Elizabeth and his niece, Janette Fontaine. They landed on December 6th, 1685.

He was admitted to Holy Orders in the Protestant Episcopal Church, the Synod at Taunton on June 10th, 1688. The children of James II, the Reverend, Fontaine and Anne Elizabeth Boursiquot, his wife, (whom he married in 1686) included—

- Mary Anne Fontaine, born April 12th, 1690, at Taunton, England and died December 30th, 1755, in Virginia. She married October 1716, in Dublin, Ireland, Mathew Maury of Castel Mauron, Gascony, who emigrated to Virginia in 1718.
- The Reverend Francis Fontaine, M.A., born September 16, 1697, son of Rev. James and Anne Elizabeth Fontaine, was the Professor of Oriental Languages of William & Mary College in the year 1729. He was later the rector of the York-Hampton Parish of Virginia, and died in 1749.

John Francis Marshall was the son of John Francis Marshall born about 1840 in Charleston, S. C. and Josephine Downs, his wife, who was born in Alabama and died in 1914 at Waco, Texas. They were married about 1870 and he died at Waco, Texas, c-1870.

McBLAIR FAMILY

A great number of Southern young men believed that the City of Baltimore held a very promising future in the generation just prior to the Confederate war. Hundreds had procured employment almost as soon as they arrived and they quickly sent back the good news to their communities. This movement continued right up to the beginning of hostilities.

The state of Maryland furnished four regiments for General Lee's army and kept them pretty well recruited, until the eastern part of Virginia was entirely occupied by Union troops. This process went on by night for several years afterwards. Their most famous officer was "General Maryland Steuart". The whole state of Maryland was largely sympathetic with the South.

Among these Maryland officers was Captain William McBlair, C S A, of the City of Baltimore. He had married on the 24th of April 1843 Virginia Louisa Myers of Richmond, Va. Their children were—

- George Myers McBlair, born 7th of August 1850. He married Cornelia Grigsby Irwin.
- 2. William McBlair, who moved to Saint Louis, Missouri, and married there.

McCORMICK FAMILY

Hugh Milton McIlhany's "Some Virginia Families" gives an account of the McCormick family, from which the following account is partly taken.

Doctor John McCormick came over to Virginia from Ireland between the years 1730 and 1740 and was the founder of this family in America. In the Orange County Virginia records there is a deed dated May 21st, 1740, from Just Hite to John McCormick of Orange County for 395 acres of land. Later John McCormick took up other grants in that part of Orange County. Later these holdings became a part of West Virginia under Lincoln's arbitrary division of the old state of Virginia. It was on the Hite tract, near "Summit Point", that John McCormick built "The White House" in 1740. There he and his wife, Anne, lived and raised their family of eight children.

Francis McCormick was one of their sons. He was born 1734 and married as his first wife, a Miss Province. Their second son was Thomas McCormick who died in 1816. He married Anne Frost who was born in 1763 and died in 1815. Thomas built a home which was known as "Weehaw".

Dawson McCormick, born October 19, 1786, was the son of Thomas and Anne Frost McCormick. He married Florinda Milton who was born at "Milton Valley" on October 28th, 1802, and died April 7th, 1836, at Winchester.

Francis McCormick, born 1734, married as his second wife, a Miss Frost and had one son—

William McCormick who was born March 31st, 1819, married Elizabeth Rice, as his first wife. They had four children among whom were—

- 1. Mary McCormick who married John Culver of Montgomery, Maryland.
- 2. Province McCormick who was born on September 10th, 1799, and died on July 4th, 1873. He married on November 10th, 1831, Margaretta Holmes Moss. He was a prominent lawyer in Frederick County, being Commonwealth Attorney for 25 years. Their ninth and last child was—

Marshall McCormick, born January 29th, 1849. He was a graduate of the University of Virginia and was Mayor of Berryville three times. He married Rosalie Taylor of Alexandria.

Virginia Taylor McCormick was their oldest child. She was born at "Edgewood" in Clark County on May 2nd, 1873. She married Doctor James Jett McCormick who was born at "Claremont" on September 18th, 1868. He graduated from the Virginia Military Institute and from the Medical school of the U of Va. He was the son of—

Edward McCormick, born at "Weehaw", Clark County, October 16th, 1786, who was the son of Dawson McCormick and his wife Florinda Milton and the grandson of Thomas McCormick. Edward McCormick's second wife was Ellen Lane Jett. He owned the plantation of "Claremont".

McINTOSH FAMILY

George McIntosh, was a successful merchant of Norfolk who was born 31st December 1768 in Edinburgh, Scotland. He married Elizabeth Mason Walke, who was born 14th February 1784 at "The Ferry" plantation in Princess Anne County, Va. She was the daughter of William Walke, born 17th of February 1762 and Mary Calvert, his wife, who were married in 1782. Their surviving children were—

MEREDITH FAMILY

Quoting G. Brown Goode in his "Virginia Cousins", Meredith is an old Virginia name. In Wales the family of which the Virginia Branch is an offshoot, claims descent from Eunydd Gwerngwy, a chiefton of North Wales who was head of one of the fifteen tribes. Rowland Meredith of "Arlington" who lived early in the fifteenth century, was one of the first to assume the surname. Surnames, sometimes called family names, had not come into general use. When a man was called John of Winchester it meant he was John of or from the town of Winchester. George of Durham meant that George was from Durham.

The word apt was Welch for son of. Accordingly when Henry VII was chosen by the two contending factions to be King of England at the end of the War of Roses, his name was Henry apt Tudor apt Meredith. The last two words were left off and he became Henry Tudor.

Thomas Meredith, Gentleman, lived in the shire of Carnarvan in the northern part of Wales. He was very interested in the new colony of Virginia. Under the recently enacted headright law, any person procuring settlers, either by persuading them, or paying them to start life over again in the freedom and opportunity of this promising country, would receive a grant of fifty acres of land for each man, woman or child who came over.

During the course of fifteen years Thomas Meredith obtained more than eighty settlers. For this he received more than four thousand acres of land, mostly in New Kent county, Virginia. In 1656 Thomas Meredith with his family sailed the ocean to take possession of these fine lands. As time went on he was succeeded by two of his sons, *Thomas Jr. and Robert*, and his grandson *Samuel Meredith Sr.* All of these lived upon the same land which had been granted to Thomas Sr.

The county records show that Samuel Meredith Sr. who was born about 1698 and died in 1762 married Margaret and was survived by one daughter and two sons, as follows—

- Ruth Meredith, born in 1720 and died in 1744, married in the year 1738, Colonel Samuel Jordan. He died in 1789, leaving 3 daughters—
 - (a) Margaret.
 - (b) Mary.
 - (c) Ruth.
- 2. Elisha Meredith Sr., of "Snow Hill", Hanover County, was born in 1721 and died in 1796. He married Elizabeth Cocke, daughter of James Cocke of "Curles", Henrico County.
- 3. Colonel Samuel Meredith of "Winton", Amherst County, Va., who was born in 1732, the same year in which General George Washington was born. He married Jane Henry, sister of the great silver tongued orator

of the Revolution. We must remember the state's greatest fire-brand who inspired the American people to win their freedom from England, Patrick Henry. Colonel Meredith served under General Washington in the French and Indian War and personally raised a regiment of troops in the Revolution. Beautiful "Winton" (see picture further on page 272) still stands near Amherst Courthouse.

Captain Elisha Meredith Jr. was the son of Elisha Meredith Sr. He was born 1756, died 1796. He was an officer of the Continental Line for more than three years, entitling him to be a member of the "Sons of the Cincinatti". He married Anne Layne Clopton, daughter of Captain William and Elizabeth Dorrall Clopton. Elizabeth Dorrall was the daughter of Edmund Dorrall of Kentshire, England. William Clopton was the grandson of Captain William Clopton of "Roslin", New Kent County.

The children of Captain Elisha Meredith Jr. and Anne Layne Clopton were—

- 1. John Meredith, born September 3rd, 1781, who married Sarah Dandridge who died in 1810.
- 2. Dr. William Meredith, born 15th January 1784. He married Sarah Gardner. He died 1875.
- 3. Robert Meredith, born 20th May 1789. He married Mary T. Anderson. He died in 1821.
- Dr. Reuben Meredith, born 24th May 1791. He married Mary Letitia Clarkson. He died 1840.
- Thomas Meredith, born 8th July 1795. He married Emily Winston. He died in 1842.

The children of Dr. Reuben Meredith and Mary Lititia Clarkson, his wife, were—

- 1. Rev. William Clarkson Meredith, born 14th December 1822, Captain Confederate States Army, married, 1st Sarah Pocahontas Bolling. His fourth wife was Frances Randolph Page. He attended the University of Virginia and the Episcopal Theological Seminary at Alexandria. In 1861, as rector of St. James Episcopal church in Winchester, he tended his resignation and joined as a private the company of men who were leaving to join Lee's Army. After four long years of arduous fighting and the end came, he led back to Winchester, as Captain, what was left of his old company, about 20 men. There he took up his duties again as rector of his old church. He died 1st November 1875.
- 2. John Scott Meredith, born July 29th, 1824. He attended V.M.I. and graduated in law at University of Virginia. He was 1st Lieutenant, 4th Infantry, C S A. In 1862, his captain being absent, he led his men through the ordeal of Second Manassas, capturing the objective to which they were assigned. When the regiments were lined up for Retreat (the last formation of the day, called to determine how many men were left for the next day's fighting), the Captain appeared from somewhere and stood in front of the company to take the first sergeant's report. When this was given and the sergeant had returned to his position, 1st Lieutenant Meredith stepped in front of the Captain and gave the order "Gentlemen, at ease", "I want to present to you the yellowest

coward in the Confederate army, your Captain." He then turned and pointed to the Captain. The Captain turned red, and, ordered the first sergeant to "Arrest this officer and hold him under heavy guard until sun up, when he will be tried for rank insubordination, and shot."

During the night the men released Lieutenant Meredith and accompanied him beyond the lines of the regiment. He made his way all the way south to Charleston where he procured passage on an English blockade runner. Arriving in London he associated himself with a group of other Confederate sympathizers. These men spent their entire time endeavoring to persuade the British government to assist the Southern States, in every way possible. After the war was over he returned to his home in Stafford County, Va. He never married.



Reuben Meredith, M.D., of Hanover County, Virginia. He was a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania.

3. Henry Clarkson Meredith I, born 11th August 1826, attended the Episcopal High School at Alexandria, graduated from the University of Virginia, obtaining his law degree. He decided that his best opportunity in the profession of law would lie in the fast developing State of California. Travelling by train to Kansas City, he joined a wagon train and after long weeks reached Virginia City, California, carrying his law books with him. He set up his office there and began his practice. This was silver mining country and the men in his town had all gone off to work. Suddenly a large group of Indians appeared upon the scene. They butchered and burned everyone and everything in sight, carrying off with them all of the young women and girls. When the news got around.

Henry Meredith organized a posse of all of the men available and near grown boys, procured rifles and horses for them and started out in pursuit of the Indians. The Indians' tracks were not hard to follow. At the end of the second day they were closing in on them. The Indians led them through a level opening into a large field surrounded on all sides by mountains. A great number of Indians then began closing in on them from all sides. With the horses that were left, it was decided that their

owners should mount at once and make a dash for the opening through which they had come. Those who were left were to fight it out with the savages exacting as great a toll as possible from them. The riders succeeded in making their way through the Indians and escaping by way of the opening that they had come through. Henry Meredith gave his horse to the young brother of the lady he was going to marry. A monument was erected in Virginia City for him and his men and still stands today.

- 4. Anne Elizabeth Meredith, the only daughter, born 14th October 1828, died 29th January 1899, unmarried.
- 5. Dr. Samuel Meredith, born 3rd December 1830, attended Episcopal High School and obtained his medical degree at University of Pennsylvania. He was assigned to the Base Army Hospital, C.S.A., joining Stuart's Cavalry for the last three years of the war. He married Sarah Lewis Bowyer. He died in 1865 and left an only daughter, Virginia Preston Meredith, who was born 2nd August 1862 and married Louis Phillips Holladay.
- Steptoe Pickett Meredith, M.D., born 19th March 1833. He married Miss Ballenger. He served in the Confederate Army and lived for a while in Stafford County, Va. He later moved to California where he died in 1876.
- 7. Rev. Jaquelin Marshall Meredith, was born 16th March 1835. He was educated at the Episcopal High School and the Episcopal Theological Seminary. He was chaplain and scout of the 47th Virginia Infantry, C. S. A. He was in many battles and talked of the terrible carnage at Gettysburg. He later had published an article on General Heath (Heth)'s part in the Battle. He married Ellen Monroe Bankhead in 1857, daughter of Dr. William Bankhead of Caroline County, Va. and his wife, Dorothea Butler Brayne Minor of Port Royal, Va. Their children were—



Rev. Jaquelin Marshall Meredith. He was Chaplain of the 47th Virginia Infantry. He was called by the Vestry of old Aquia Church, Stafford County, and served there for 15 years.

(a) Dorothea Minor Meredith, who was born in 1858. She married Captain James William Gerow and they had one son, born 30th

October 1885, Jaquelin Meredith Gerow.

(b) Henry Clarkson Meredith II, born 1860. He attended Episcopal High School. In a snow ball fight he was leading one side against the other. The boys divided into two sides. He was struck in the jaw by a snow ball loaded with a rock, which injured him so that infection set in and killed him in a few weeks.

- (c) William Bankhead Meredith M.D., born 29th March 1862, graduated Medical College of Va., married Miss Minne Mullins, daughter of Colonel John Bailey Mullins and Emily Garrison (wife). Colonel John Bailey Mullins of the 19th Mississippi Infantry, Confederate States of America, was severely wounded at the Battle of Malvern Hill and lay in a hospital in Richmond until hostilities were over.
 - (d) Jaqueline Marshall Meredith Jr., born in 1864. He married first Miss Jessie Hodges and secondly Miss Lina Smith, both of Norfolk. He left one son, Jaquelin Marshall Meredith III, of Virginia Beach.

(e) Samuel Meredith, born 1866. He attended the Episcopal High School and graduated in law at the University of Virginia. He died

in 1897, a victim of typhoid fever.

(f) Reverend John Scott Meredith, born in 1868. He attended the Episcopal High School and Washington and Lee University. He next graduated from the Episcopal Seminary. He married Miss Sarah Clarke of Lexington, Kentucky.

(g) Rev. Reuben Meredith, born in 1870. He attended the Episcopal High School and Graduated from the Episcopal Seminary. He

married Miss Frances Rives of Dinwiddie County, Va.

(h) George Minor Meredith, born in 1871. He graduated from Episcopal High School and the Medical College of Virginia, obtaining his diploma in Pharmacy. He married Miss Elizabeth Madison Morrison, daughter of Hackley Morrison of Petersburg.

(i) Reverend Elliot Benger Meredith, born in 1873. He graduated from the Episcopal High School and the Episcopal Seminary. He married Miss Esther Montague of Fredericksburg, daughter of Dr. Montague.

- (j) Ellen Nora Meredith, born in 1875, married Rev. Maxwell Robeson.
- (k) Mary Clarkson Meredith, born in 1878. She married Richard Cassius Lee Moncure of Stafford County.

The Reverend Jaquelin Marshall Meredith together with the vestry reestablished old Aquia Church on old highway No. 1 near Stafford Court House, Virginia in the year 1865. He contributed a very good amount from the inheritance money which he had. New floors had to be laid, all new pews, choir stalls, communion rail and all other chancel furnishings and equipment. The reopened church, by the end of one year had ninety members. The Union soldiers had used the church as a stable.

Among all of sons of Reverend Jaquelin Meredith, Dr. William B. Meredith was foremost advocate of the teachings of Jesus Christ. They were his goal

together with his service to the sick and suffering among the poor.

THE ROBERT HUNT WING, TALBOT HALL, DIOCESAN CENTER

As the photograph shown above illustrates, the Robert Hunt Wing of our Diocesan Ceter is very nearly completed and the finishing touches will have been given it by the builders about the tenth of July. Then as soon as the equipment for the interior is received and installed the Wing will be put to the use for which we have so long needed it.

The kitchen will provide food for more than 200 persons at a time and the spacious dining hall will accommodate that number for meals and for large conference gatherings. On the second floor are twelve bedrooms which will provide sleeping accommodations for fifty-six persons with baths and with toiler facilities at one end and a linen room at the other.

Religious persecution had forced the two brothers, Major General John Custis and Colonel William Custis to leave England and seek freedom and peace of mind in protestant Holland. John with his wife, Joan, came over to Virginia and settled in Northampton County in or about 1640. Three of his six sons, and his daughter, acquired land in the same county. Col. William, his brother, came to Virginia at the same time or shortly afterwards. He is said to have been born in Holland, but, if so, the father of John and William, was the one who fled England as a protestant, in 1633.

Anne Lane Clopton (William III, William II, William I, the immigrant) married 3 February 1779, Captain Elisha Meredith Jr. of "Snow Hill", St. Paul's Parish, Hanover County (1756-1796). As noted she was the greatgranddaughter of William Clopton, Gentleman, born in 1655, in County Essex, England, and his wife, Ann Booth, born 1647, who lived in New Kent County, Virginia. Their graves are in old St. Peter's Churchyard.

William Clopton was descended from the following Magna Carta Sureties according to the records as set forth by Lucy Lane Erwin in her book, "The Ancestry of William Clopton of York County, Virginia", published in 1939 by The Turtle Publishing Company of Rutland, Vermont.

MOSELEY FAMILY

The Moseley's came to Virginia in 1649 with a grant far up on Broad Creek in Lower Norfolk County. Upon this land was built their home known as "Rollenston" which they named for their ancestral seat "Rolleston Hall" in Staffordshire, England. They brought their coat of arms and family portraits. The emigrant, William Moseley, an English merchant of Rotterdam, in applying for a grant, listed among his headrights Suzanna, his wife, sons Arthur and William and daughter Suzanna. Suzanna, wife of William Moseley, sent by a trusted servant some of her jewels to the wife of Governor George Yeardley asking her to purchase and send to her some much needed cattle for her plantation, and, justly complained when the Governor's son, Francis, delivered to her considerably less than she felt she was entitled to. William Moseley and his wife Suzanna died in 1655.

Edward Moseley (1661) was Colonel, and Justice of Princess Anne County. He was High Sheriff 1707-1708. He was a member of the court which tried Grace Sherwood for witchcraft in 1706. He was a "Knight of the Golden Horseshoe" 1710-1722 and a member of the House of Burgesses. He married Mrs. Bartholimew Taylor, nee Frances Stringer, daughter of Colonel John Stringer of the Eastern Shore of Virginia.

Present at a Vestry meeting October 30, 1733, were Mr. Henry Barlow, minister, Colonel Anthony Walke and Captain Francis Land, wardens, Captain John Moseley, Mr. Burroughs, Charles Sayer, Captain Francis Moseley, Mr.

James Nimmo, Captain Jacob Elligood, Major Maximillian Boush, Captain Henry Moore, Mr. John Bonney, and Mr. John Gornto, Vestrymen.

In the Princess Anne County in 1705, Grace Sherwood was tried at the Court House on "The Ferry" plantation for witchcraft. She was found guilty and ducked in a charming branch of the Lynnhaven River, ever since known as "Witch Duck". The prosecution was conducted by Maximillian Boush for Her Majesty, Queen Anne. He received for his fee 5,000 lbs. of tobacco. The trial lasted for six months. She was incarcerated in the Gaol of the county adjoining the old court house on "The Ferry" plantation and all of the proceedings are of record.

Hillary Moseley's will was recorded August 5, 1730. His son, Edward Hack Moseley was burgess from Princess Anne County 1771-1779. He was Colonel, and Sheriff of the County and a vestryman. He was a loyalist in the Revolution and a friend of Benedict Arnold. His wife, Mary Bassett was of "Eltham".

A copy of an unusual deed by him states: "To all to whom these presents may come, I, Edward Hack Moseley of the County of Princess Anne, for consideration of the regard I bear him, do grant and confirm unto Anthony Walke, June., one mulatta girl named Betty, about 18 years old, to have and to hold unto his heirs and assigns, and to his and their own proper use. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal."

Thomas Nash I was born in Monmouthshire, Wales, about 1638. He came to Virginia in the year 1661 with his wife, Eleanor, three children and four white servants. He settled in Norfolk County prior to 1665. Jointly with Richard Taylor, he received a Land Grant for 446 Acres in Lower Norfolk County on the 6th of November 1665, near the head of Julian's Creek. His Inventory was recorded in Norfolk County in 1672-1673. He was a planter and shipbuilder. His son—

Thomas Nash II who was born in England 18th of March 1666-1667, married about 1688, Ann, the daughter of William and Ann Nash Etheridge. Ann Nash was the daughter of Dorcas Nash. William Etheridge died in Norfolk County in 1716. Thomas Nash II was clerk of the Southern Chaple in 1728 and was one of the Executors of the will of William Etheridge. 
Annie Lee Nash, born June 9th, 1871, daughter of Colonel Camillus Albert and Mary Fannie, his first wife, married Jefferson Thomas Francis on November 14th, 1894. Their son, Camillus Nash Francis was born August 20th, 1895. Annie Lee Nash married the second time Edward Love Toone of Boydton, Va., on August 5th, 1902.

Albert Rowland Nash, son of Colonel Camillus Albert and Mary Fannie, his first wife, was born October 24th, 1869. He married Lula Francis Carroll January 15, 1896, and died November 1909.

Camillus Albert Nash II who married Mary Fannie on December 26th, 1866, was born in Norfolk County. He was a member of the Norfolk Light Artillery Blues in the War between the States. He was wounded in the hip in the Battle of the Crater on July 30th, 1864. He returned from the hospital and rejoined his outfit in time to be more seriously wounded at the Battle of Davis' Farm compelling him to retire. After the war he joined the 4th Virginia Regiment working his way up by promotion until he was made colonel on October 7th, 1890.

Dr. Herbert M. Nash of Norfolk was a graduate of the University of Virginia in 1852. He stood high in the community as a practicing physician and surgeon. His father was Dr. Thomas Nash VI, who was born in 1805. His grandfather was the fourth Thomas in descent from Thomas Nash I and was known as Captain Thomas Nash of the War of 1812. He was also the father of Governor Abner Nash of North Carolina.

NEWTON FAMILY

Quoting the Virginia Gazette of November 26th, 1736 "The Inhabitants of Norfolk Town had partitioned the Governor for a Charter to incorporate them." This was granted and by an Act of the assembly, there was created the "Borough of Norfolk", which was to be governed by a Mayor, a Recorder and eight Aldermen; who have the power to hold a "Court of Hustings" etc., and to choose sixteen Common Councilmen.

Samuel Boush, Gentleman, was nominated for Mayor and Sir John Randolph for Recorder. The Mayor dying soon after the charter was granted, he was succeeded by George Newton, Gentleman. Sir John Randolph attended one meeting and then lost interest and a deputy, Henry Tazewell of James City County was appointed in his stead.

Samuel Boush, Esq., three years after his appointment as Mayor, presented to the parish the grounds now occupied by Old Saint Paul's Church, including the old grave yard.

George Newton, came to Virginia before the year 1670. He married between the years 1673 and 1677, Frances Mason, daughter of Colonel Lemuel Mason of Lower Norfolk County. He patented 1000 acres of land in Lower Norfolk County on the Southern Branch of the Elizabeth River in the year 1684. The surviving children of George and Frances Mason Newton were—

- 1. George II who married in 1706, Apphia, daughter of Colonel James Wilson of Lower Norfolk County.
- 2. Nathaniel, High Sheriff of Norfolk County 1730-1731, and of Princess Anne County in 1741.
- 3. Lemuel who died in 1721. He was the Surveyor for Lower Norfolk and Princess Anne Counties in 1708. He patented several grants of land. He married Margaret Thruston and left a son, Nathaniel II who conveyed land to his Uncle, George Newton II.
- 4. Thomas who left Virginia for the Barbados.
 - 5. Elizabeth who married Mr. Benbow and went with him to live in London, England.
 - 6. Wilson who married Rebecca Elligood. He was Mayor of Norfolk in 1751.
 - Thomas, born March 14, 1713, died December 13, 1794, He married Amy Hutchings.

Authorities differ as to the number of children of George I and Frances Mason Newton, one giving only the first three above.

George Newton II was Justice of Norfolk County, High Sheriff in 1728-1729, and on November 18th, 1736, he was elected Mayor in place of Samuel

Boush who had died, as noted above. He was again elected Mayor in 1742 and was a member of the House of Burgesses in sessions of November 1711, November 1714, May 1723 and May 1726.

The Will of George Newton II of Norfolk County, dated May 30th, 1753-

To wife, Apphia, lot and house where I now live (in Norfolk), and lots where John Duprey, Mr. Greenleafe and Mr. Hardin dwell, and the stone house Mrs. Taylor and Captain Willoughby rent, and the stone house Mr. John Boyd and Mr. Atchison rent of me, and the stone house Mr. Andrew Sprowle rents, all household goods, use of negroes for her life; plantations called Rosses, McKays and Creekmans, being 500 acres, also plantation called Salter, for her life. To son Thomas, after his mother's decease, Plantation called Rosses, etc., and all of the land except one on the main road out of Norfolk called Salter's, and the lot he lives on and the next lot, only son Wilson Newton to live in the house he now is in during his mother's life, and after her decease, the lot I now live on and the lot Mr. John Duprey lives on and the next lot, and the plantation called Ellisesland, land called Owen Daughestie and down the neck called Sparrow, being about 600 acres in all and all land on the south of the main road out of Norfolk, about 30 acres. To son William Newton one acre of land on the N.W. of the road from Norfolk and 25 pounds. To daughter Frances, wife of Paul Loyall, negro boys Lawrence and Tomb, and 20 pounds. To grandson George Cook at 21 years of age, the boy Quash. To daughter Elizabeth Benbow, who is now in England, 50 pounds. To wife 20 pounds, cattle on plantation, etc. Sons Thomas and Wilson to divide negroes after wife's death and they to be executors. Witnesses, etc.

Thomas Newton III was educated at W & M College and was a man of much prominence in his community. He was Mayor of Norfolk in 1747 and later was a member of the valiant organization known as "Association of Merchants, Burgesses, etc." which met in Williamsburg in 1770, to seek means to protect liberties and rights of the colonists. All of his children died in infancy except Thomas and Cincinnatus who represented Norfolk in the State Legislature.

Children of Thomas III and Amy Hutchings Newton included-

Thomas Newton IV was born May 15, 1742, married Martha Tucker October 7th, 1767. She was the daughter of Robert Tucker of Norfolk. He was one of the leading men of Virginia, a member of the House of Burgesses from Norfolk

County from 1765 to 1775, and a member of the Conventions of March, July and December 1775 and May 1776. He championed the American cause and was a member of the Committee of Safety of Norfolk Borough. In 1781 he was in command of the militia of Norfolk Borough as Colonel. He was in charge of furnishing supplies to the French Fleet during the siege of Yorktown. He died September 11th, 1807.

Children of Colonel Thomas IV and Martha Tucker Newton were-

- Thomas V was born in Norfolk November 21, 1768. He married first Mrs. Myers, a widow from Barbados; secondly, Margaret Poole, daughter of Benjamin Jordan. He died October 7, 1847.

 - Sarah, born December 11, 1776 in Southampton County. She married James Taylor.

She was his second wife and a widow of Willis Wilson.

A certificate is granted the said Samuel T. Northern for obtaining letters of probate, etc.

Nicholas Page was known to have lived in Essex, England in the year 1490.

Henry Page of Wembley, Parish of Harrow was his son. The Parish of Harrow is in County Middlesex, England. He was born about 1500 and married about 1525. His son was—

John Page who was born in 1528, at Wembley. He married in about the year 1553, Awdrye, the daughter of Thomas Redding of Hedgeston, County Middlesex, England. There were two known sons—

John Page II who was a Master of Chancery who was living in 1634.

Richard Page whose will was proven on the 6th of December 1642. He married twice and one of his wives was named Frances. By her he had many children, one of whom was—

Thomas Page who was born about the year 1597 at Uxenden. He married about 1622 but his wife's name is not available. His son was—

John Page III who was born in 1627 at Sudbury, Harrow, County Middlesex, England. He crossed the ocean and settled in Virginia in the year 1650. He married, about 1656, Alice Luckin of County Essex, England, who was a descendant of Baronet Luckin. John Page III died on the 23rd day of January 1692 at the age of sixty-five. Alice died in Williamsburg on the 22nd of June 169. According to available records, John and Alice Page left two sons—

Francis Page was a Captain of Militia. He married about the year 1682, Mary Diggs, the daughter of Edward Diggs of Hampton Parish, Virginia. Francis and Mary Diggs Page had only one surviving child—

Elizabeth Page who married John Page of York County, Virginia. She died apparently at childbirth in her twentieth year.

Matthew Page of "Rosewell", Gloucester County, second son of John and Alice Page, born in 1659, was a Member of the Council of Abington. He died on 9th of January 1703. He was a Member of the Original Board of Trustees of the College of William and Mary, and of the Colonial Council of Virginia, in the reign of Queen Anne. He married, about 1689, Mary Mann, only surviving child of John and Mary Mann of "Timberneck", Gloucester County. He moved from Abington to "Rosewell". Mary Mann died 27th of March 1707 in her 35th year. Of their four children only one survived—

Mann Page of "Rosewell" who was born in 1691. He died there on the 24th of January 1730. He married when he was twenty one years old, Judith Wormeley, who was but 17 years old. She was the daughter of Ralph Wormeley,

Secretary of the Colony of Virginia. She died "after thirty hours of the bitterest pangs of death" following the birth of her third child who died also shortly afterwards also on 12th December 1716. The surviving children of Mann and Judith Wormeley were—

John Grimes of Middlesex County who was a member of the Colonial Congress during the reign of George 1st. The surviving children of Mann Page II of "Rosewell" and Alice Grimes, his first wife were—

Colonel Nathaniel Burwell first lived at "The Grove" in James City County, near Williamsburg.

John Page of "Rosewell", Gloucester County, eldest son of Mann Page and Alice Grymes, his first wife, was the first of the family to settle in Virginia. He was born 17th April 1744, and died 11th October 1808. He was buried in the churchyard of old St. John's Episcopal Church near the east side entrance. He called himself John Page Jr. He was educated at William & Mary College. He was a very studious theologian, a patriot, a soldier and although a politician always trustworthy. He married about 1768 Frances Burwell, daughter of Colonel Robin Burwell of Isle of Wight County and his wife, Sallie Nelson. She was the child of Thomas Nelson of Yorktown. Colonel Robin Burwell was the brother of Betty Burwell who was the wife of President Nelson (President of the Colonial Council).

John Page of North End, second son of Hon. Mann Page and Judith Carter, his second wife, was born about 1720. He moved from "Rosewell" to "North End", Gloucester County. He married, as noted, as his first wife, Jane Byrd, daughter of Colonel William Byrd of "Westover" on the James River in Charles City County. He married as his second wife, Maria Taylor of Kensington, England. He received a good legal education and was a member of the Colonial Council of Virginia, in place of his elder brother, Mann Page of "Rosewell". During the early part of the reign of George III, he is listed as a Visitor of the College of William and Mary.

Note: Colonel William E. Byrd, father of Jane Byrd, married first, Lucy Park, daughter of the British officer who brought the news of Victory at Blenheim to Queen Anne.

PARKS (PARKE) FAMILY

Quoting Frank Sylvester Parks' "Parke family of Massachusetts". Richard Parke was living at Cambridge, Mass. in the year 1635. He was a large land owner and a miller by trade. He sailed from London in the ship "Defence" accompanied by his family, on about the tenth of August 1635, arriving at Boston on the third of October 1635. His wife was named Margery and their children were—

He was present at the capture of Burgoyne. He was transferred later to the main Continental Army and was at the battles of Trenton, Princeton and Brandywine. Marshall Parks, eldest son of Leonard and Betsey Parks, was born at Lincoln, Mass. on 19th of February 1786, as noted above, and died in Norfolk, Va. on the 19th of January 1840. He married first, Sally Cushing of Salem, Mass. There were no children by this marriage. He married secondly, Martha Sweney Frances Sayer Boush at Norfolk, Va., on 19th November 1817. She was the great-granddaughter of Samuel Boush, the first Mayor of Norfolk, and the man who was the donor of the land which now is the churchyard of Old Saint Paul's Church in Norfolk. This is the church that was shelled by the British Governor, Lord Dunmore, in 1776. He had his ships anchor in the river at the foot of Church Street and fire directly at the hallowed edifice, hoping to destroy the morale of the people. Marshall Parks II followed his father as manager of the Dismal Swamp Canal Company. He was instrumental in building the Albemarle & Chesapeake Canal which allowed vessels to come and go from the waters of North Carolina to Norfolk. He promoted the building of a narrow-gauge railroad from Norfolk to Virginia Beach and erected on the water the first hotel, called "The Hollies". He was the instigator of the present standard gauge railroad and the building of the far famed Princess Anne Hotel. He served at length as a member of the Norfolk City Council and for one term in the State Legislature. He was a Commodore in the Confederate Navy. He died at Norfolk 12th June 1900. The children of Commodore Marshall and Sophie Jackson Parks were—

Elisha Parks was born in Concord in 1725 and died in Westfield in 1778. He married Mary Ingersoll. He was a soldier in the French & Indian War and in the Revolution. He was a delegate to the First, Second and Third Provincial Congresses. Their son was—

Warham Parks, who was born at Westfield, Mass. in 1752 and died at Charlestown in 1801. He married, secondly, Rebecca Gorham, 20th of December 1791 the daughter of Nathaniel Gorham. He graduated from Harvard in 1773, and took a prominent part in the affairs of his day. He was a member of Congress and later Minister to Brazil. When the Revolutionary War broke upon the scene, he immediately organized a company of men and reported for duty. During the war he was promoted to Major. He maintained his military status until his death, by that time having been made a General of Militia. He was elected to the State Government as a Selectman several times. PICKETT FAMILY

The Pickett family of Fauquier County, Virginia is of French Hugenot extraction and came to Virginia in the seventeenth century. The first of record were Henry and Sarah Pickett of Essex County. There were six sons and one daughter: William, Mace, George, James, John, Thomas and Martha. John Pickett's will is dated 1765. In a deed book of Fauquier County, December 12, 1698, a deed cites Amiss and wife to Henry Pickett. The land in the deed descended from Henry to his son William who died in 1743, and under William's will to his nephew, William Pickett of Fauquier, (page 187). The will of William Pickett of Essex County, dated October 10, 1743, states ''To wife Sarah, 12 Negroes, to cousin Henry Pickett (nephew) son of John Pickett, Sr., my plantation etc., to nephew (cousin) William Pickett, son of John Pickett.'' One page 75 of the deed book, John Pickett and his wife Mary of Caroline County are mentioned beside the date August 15, 1746.

The "Colonial Dames' Book" cites Martin Pickett as an ancestor of these Picketts. He was a lieutenant in the French and Indian Wars in 1761, and a member of the Convention of 1776. He became Colonel.

William Pickett, the son of Henry and Sarah, lived in Hamilton Parish, Fauquier County and died in 1766. He married Elizabeth Cooke, daughter of Mordecai and Elizabeth Buckner Cooke of Gloucester County.

Colonel Martin Pickett of "Paradise", Fauquier County, the oldest son of William and Elizabeth Cooke Pickett of Fauquier, born December 25, 1736, in King George County, died 1804. He represented Fauquier in the great "Convention of 1776" which assembled in Williamsburg and declared the State of Virginia to be independent from the British Empire and a Sovereign State. He also represented his county in the Convention of 1788 which accepted the Constitution of 1787 for the new United States.

He served in the French and Indian War of 1761 as Lieutenant in Captain William Edmund's company of Virginia troops, and in the Revolutionary War as Lieutenant Colonel of the Third Virginia Regiment of Infantry, Captain Thomas Marshall in command.

He was tax Commissioner of Fauquier County in 1782, High Sheriff in 1785, and gave the land on which City Hall of Warrenton was built. He married Ann Blackwell May 31, 1764. She was the daughter of Col. Joseph and Lucy Steptoe Blackwell of Fauquier County. She was born 1747 and died about 1800.

Another son was Colonel George Pickett, the seventh child, born 1752, or 1753, who served in the Revolution as a drummer, Second Virginia Regiment. Later he was a merchant in Richmond. He married Margaret Flint of Philadelphia.

Two generations later, General George E. Pickett, born January 25, 1825, in Richmond, Virginia to Colonel Robert and Mary Pickett, graduated at West

Point in 1846. He was with the Eigth U. S. Infantry in the Mexican War. Answering the call of his State, he joined the Confederacy as Major of artillery March 16, 1861. He was a Major General by October 10, 1862. The famous charge of his men at Gettysburg, of which he disapproved, placed his name in history.

Judge Richard Elliott Parker and Elizabeth Fooshee, his wife. He was the son of William Harwar Parker and Mary Sherman, his wife. Judge Parker was born in Westmoreland County, Va., December 27th, 1783, and died on September 9th, 1840. He was a prominent lawyer and the first to represent his county in the Legislature. At the beginning of the War of 1812, he was a Colonel of Militia of the 35th Virginia Regiment. As Commander of most of the Militia defending the Northern Neck of Virginia from British attacks during 1813-14, doing-active and valuable service. After the war, he resumed the practice of law and on July 28th, 1817, was elected Judge of the General Court, thus becoming the second Judge Richard Parker. On December 12th, 1836, he was elected United States Senator from Virginia. On March 4th, 1837, he resigned to become a member of the Supreme Court of Appeals of Virginia. He refused the Cabinet office of Attorney-General of the United States proffered him by President Van Buren.

Elizabeth Fooshee was the daughter of Dr. William Fooshee who was a surgeon in the Revolutionary War with the rank of Major. His family was of Huguenot extraction, he being born on the Northern Neck of Virginia, October 26th, 1749. He was educated in medicine in Edinburgh, Scotland. He was Mayor of Richmond in 1782 and a member of the House of Delegates in 1791-1803. He was a member of the Council of State 1799 until 1805.

Anne Isabel Harmason was the wife of Dr. William Fooshee and the mother of Elizabeth Fooshee. She was the daughter of Kendall Harmenson and Anne, his wife.

Kendall Harmanson was the son of John Harmanson and was granted a bond to marry Isabel Harmanson, the daughter of Colonel George Harmanson under the date of October 8th, 1723. His father, John Harmanson, left to "His son John all plantation on Seaboard side and 200 acres Roages Island, and 500 acres plantation in Accomack I got by his mother, my loving wife, Susannah."

Isabel Harmanson was the daughter of Colonel George and Elizabeth Yeardley Harmanson.

Colonel George Harmanson was the son of Thomas and Joane Harmanson. He was sworn in as sub-sheriff of Northampton County in 1697, and 1698. He was commissioned as Justice in 1703, 1704, 1705, and 1706. He was a Burgess from Northampton in 1720-22 and in 1723-26. His will was probated October 14th, 1735.

Elizabeth Yeardley was the daughter of Captain Argoll Yeardley and Sarah Michael, his wife.

Captain Argoll Yeardley was the son of Colonel Argoll Yeardley and Ann Custis, his wife.

Colonel Argoll Yeardley was the son of Governor Sir George Yeardley and Lady Temperance Flowerdieu, his wife.

Sir George Yeardley came to Virginia in 1609, as Deputy Governor. His wife was the daughter of Anthony Flowerdieu and the niece of Baron Edward Flowerdieu, who lived in County Norfolk, England. Sir George was descended from a family known as the Lords of Yeardley. He had served with distinction in Holland in the War Against Spain. He served as Deputy-Governor until 1617. He served as Governor from 1618 until 1621 and from 1626 until he died. He was a knight, born in England in the year 1577 and died in 1627.



Henry Seawell came to Virginia prior to the year 1632 and from later noted information received a grant of land which included "Seawell's Point."

The mayor of the City of Coventry in England in the year 1606 and again in 1616 was Henry Seawell. This is probably the same man. Henry Seawell, the first of the family who came to Virginia, married Alice Willoughby who was the daughter of Thomas Willoughby who came to Virginia in 1610. The latter was later a Justice, a Burgess, and Councillor for Elizabeth City County. Henry Seawell became a Magistrate in Lower Norfolk County. He and Captain John Sibley were authorized to build a church at Seawell's Point in 1640.

Henry Seawell was a merchant and a Burgess for Elizabeth City County in 1632 and for Norfolk County after the separation from Elizabeth City County in 1639. The Court ordered that expenses should be paid by the Colony for the burial of both Henry and his wife in the year 1644 and decreed that their remains should be interred in the chancel of the church.

Henry Seawell and his wife, Alice Willoughby, were married about 1632. Their known children were—

- Alice Seawell, who was born in 1634. She married Lemuel Mason, son of Francis Mason.
- 2. Henry Seawell Jr., who was born in 1639 and died in 1672. He did not marry.

There was a *Thomas Seawell* who patented land on the Pocoson River in York County in 1635. He patented other lands in Gloucester County in 1642. In the year 1671 Thomas Seawell (probably Thomas II) married Mary, the widow of John Hansford, in 1678. According to the register of old Abington Church their children baptized were—

SEGAR FAMILY

Oliver Segar came to Virginia in 1653 and settled in Lancaster County, in that part which was later Middlesex. His will is dated January 1658 and it was probated March 30th 1659. His wife was named Eleanor and he left two sons, Oliver Jr. and Randolph, and one daughter, Elizabeth. Eleanor remarried on October 30th, 1663, Humphrey Owen. After his death she married Humphrey Jones.

Oliver Segar Jr. married but had no children. His will was dated November 1699.

Randolph Segar married in 1678 Mary the daughter of Humphrey Jones, his step father, who brought him considerable property and was executor of her father's estate in 1685-1686. She died in 1690, leaving a small daughter. He married secondly June 2nd 1691, Ann, the widow of Captain Oswald Cary. His children were by his first wife—

- 1. Winifred Segar, born March 14, 1679. She was mentioned in her father's will.
- 2. Catherine Segar, born February 5th, 1681.
- 3. Oliver Segar, born March 23rd 1684. He died in 1741.
- 4. John Segar, born 1685. He was baptized May 25th 1685. He died in 1740.
- William Segar, born 1689. He married Anne Simco and had seven children.

The name of Randolph Segar's home plantation was 'Jamaica'. There he died in 1694. Ann, his widow submitted to the court at Middlesex a completed inventory of that part of his estate which had been left to her in February 1700 and it was ordered recorded. Later she married a third time the Reverend Samuel Gray, rector of Christ Church. Randolph and Ann Segar's sons—

Oliver was Justice of the Peace and Sheriff of Middlesex. He married Jane *Nicholas* in 1724, and leaving eight children, he died in 1741. John's will was probated January 6th 1740 in which he named as legatees his wife Jane Nicholas Segar, his brothers Oliver and William and others. John was a Captain of Militia and evidently left no issue.

William Segar married December 15th, 1715, Anne Simco and their children were—

- 1. Randolph, born October 16, 1716 and died without issue.
- 2. Catherine, born February 25th, 1718.
- 3. Anne, who was born May 15th 1721.

William was a sizeable landholder owning more than one hundred acres. At the May Court of 1741, Anne the daughter of William, was permitted to choose her guardians and she selected Charles Wortham and Randolph Segar. Anne Segar, the widow was made guardian of the younger children. (Will Book B Page 30 1740-48 Middlesex County Records). Anne, daughter of William, died between 1790 and 1793 and left her property to her nephews Randolph, son of William; William, son of Thomas; Thomas, son of Thomas, and William, son of Oliver; and to her nieces Ann, daughter of John; and Elizabeth, daughter of John. She left a servant to her brother Thomas.

Thomas Segar, born August 27, 1738, married in 1764 Mary (supposedly Miller) of Lancaster County, Virginia. Their four known children were—

- Thomas Segar Jr. born 1766 who owned 363 acres in Middlesex County and died 1803. Among his children the only one of whom we have a record is John. He left property to his aunt, Ann Segar.
- William Segar who was born on 20th February 1769. He married Penelope Meacham, in the year 1799. He owned 230 acres of land which was a part of the original home plantation, "Jamaica". There were two known children, Cyrus and Polly Meacham Segar. Penelope Segar, widow, was still living in 1829 in Essex County.
- 3. John Segar who was born on 13th of March 1771, and baptized on 24th of March 1771.
- 4. Richard Miller Segar who was born on 16th 1782 and married Polly Roane 16 January 1812.

Cyrus Segar, son of William and Penelope Segar, was born about 1801 in Middlesex County. He married 22 May 1830 Maria E. D. Foster who was born about 1812. He died in 1839. Their children were—

GATEWOOD

Thomas Carr of "Bear Castle" Caroline County, Va. was born in 1678 and died on 29th May 1737. He was a member of the House of Burgesses from King William County 1727-1734. He married Mary, daughter of Cornelius Dabney in the year 1704. Their daughter—

Susan Carr married John Minor 1st (Virginia Magazine VII page 222). Their son was—

John Minor II who was born on 3rd of November 1735 and died on 21st March 1800. He married Elizabeth Cosby. (According to William & Mary Quarterly V - IX page 53.) Their daughter was—

Barbara Minor who married Kemp Gatewood (William & Mary Quarterly VIX page 53) who was the son of William Gatewood whose will was dated 7th June 1825 and probated in December of the same year.

William Gatewood was the son of John Gatewood Sr. of Essex County whose home and plantation was known as "Benlomond". The house and a good part of the plantation was left to Kemp, his son.

John Gatewood Sr. was the first member of the family to arrive in Virginia. He obtained a grant for 450 acres of land in South Farnum Parish of Essex County which was dated 7th September 1729. His will was probated in Essex County 19th February 1750. He left five sons who were John, Richard, William, Isaac and Phillip.

William Lowry Gatewood and his three sisters, Susan, Sarah and Mary E. were the surviving children of Kemp Gatewood and his wife Barbara Minor. The will of Kemp Gatewood was probated on 19th September 1836 left "Benlomond" to his widow, who in turn left it to her daughter, Sarah who married Judge Muscor Garnett. In this way "Benlomond" passed from the Gatewood family to the Garnett family. William Lowry Gatewood moved in 1839 from Essex County to Middlesex. He married Lucy Street of Urbanna and built their home known as "Jamaica". Their children were—

SELDEN FAMILY

The first member of this family from whom we can trace a direct line is John Selden who was born in 1550 and died in 1616. He married Margaret Baker, who was an heiress and the daughter of Sir Thomas Baker of Rushington, England. Their surviving children were—

John Selden, born 1584, was a great student, graduating from Oxford, with many later years given to literary occupations and the profession of law. He was released when he was in his forties and proceded with his literary work, acquiring much fame. He married Lady Kent who was Elizabeth, countess dowager of Kent. He died in 1654 and she in 1651.

Arthur Selden married Elizabeth. He was mentioned in his brother's will (Richard) dated 1668. Arthur and Elizabeth Selden had three children—

- Joseph Selden of Hatherleigh who married Mary who was executrix of his will 1691.
- 2. Sarah Selden who was baptised in the year 1661.
- 3. Samuel Selden who was born 1662-1664 and who married Rebecca Yeo.

Samuel Selden and his wife, Rebecca Yeo, came to Virginia between 1690 and 1699. There were six children all born in England. Of their four sons, only John and Joseph had issue. The Seldens' land grant was for what is now known as Buckroe Beach. Quoting Edna Mae Selden, from whose book "Selden and Kindred of Virginia", 1941, much of this information is taken—"John Selden, son of Samuel and Rebecca, was born in England. His will was probated in 1754. His second wife was Sarah Ball, daughter of Captain Richard and Sarah Young Ball of Lancaster County, Va. They left one known son, Richard Selden who was born in 1721 and died in 1789. He married on November 23rd, 1741, Mary Ball who was born on April 6th 1721. (She was the daughter of James and his second wife, Mary Ann Bertrand Ball.) Their children were—

Richard Selden, born 1721 and died 1789, married secondly Elizabeth Chinn. He lived and died in Farmville. No issue. John Selden married the third time in 1740, Grace Boswell, the daughter of Captain William and Eleanor (Corprew) Boswell. There were five children including two unmarried girls, Elizabeth and Eleanor. Their sons were—

- John Selden, second son of John and Grace (Boswell) Selden married in 1760, Elizabeth, daughter of the Rev. James and Ann Wallace of "Erroll" on Back River.
- 3. Reverend William Selden, third and last son of John and Grace Boswell Selden, was born in 1741 and died on June 25th, 1783. He graduated from William & Mary College and began the practice of law. He then decided to join the ministry and left for London where he completed the necessary requirements and was ordained an Episcopal minister. Returning to Virginia he was assigned to the church in Hampton which he served from 1771 to 1783. He established a school for boys, giving them a fundamental education which included language, mathematics and philosophy. His will was probated October 25, 1799. He married on November 22nd, 1802, Charlotte Colgate, who was born near Maidstone, Kent, England, on January 4th, 1781 and died at "Sherwood", Gloucester County November 16th, 1870. She was the daughter of Robert Colgate who was the son of John Colgate, born in 1729. He was the son of the Reverend Stephen Colgate, a baptist minister, born about 1700, of Horsham, Sussex, England. Robert was a university graduate and farmer who married on March 26th, 1780, Sarah Bowles. Involved in political trouble, he sold his property and with his wife Sarah sailed from London on March 16th, 1795. They lived in New York where he died in 1826 and she in 1845.

Dr. William Boswell Selden built his home in Norfolk in 1807 on the corner of Freemason and Botetourt Streets. It was used as headquarters for the Union Commanders during the war between the states. During his last visit to Norfolk, General Lee stayed at this house as a guest of Dr. Selden who was a surgeon in the Confederate army. Dr. Selden attended the University of Virginia and the University of Pennsylvania from which he graduated in 1830. The children of Dr. William Boswell and Charlotte Colgate Selden were—

SHARP FAMILY

James Sharp, first of the family in Virginia, came over in 1621. State archives show that "He was returned to the House of Burgesses in 1635, implying that he had been a member at an earlier date. He married Elizabeth Maynard Royster of Henrico County.

William Sharp was probably one of the younger sons of this couple. Records show him to be a son and he was born on January 15th, 1777. He married Mary Willoughby, daughter of William and Margaret Marnix Willoughby who are buried in Old St. Paul's Churchyard. He was a Colonel in the War of 1812, commanding the 9th and then the 54th regiments. William Sharp married Mary Willoughby on January 21st, 1801. The Colonel served under General Robert Barraud Taylor and later under General Wade Hampton. He settled in Norfolk and became Clerk of the Courts. John Marnix was born in Gloucester County. He commanded a West Indian vessel in 1776. Colonel William Sharp graduated from the Naval Academy in the class of 1841.

The son of William and Mary Willoughby Sharp was-

William Willoughby Sharp, born in Norfolk, October 28th, 1801, and died in Norfolk, June 9th, 1871. He married on December 23rd, 1824, Mary Anne Lewis Schoolfield, daughter of Doctor Joseph N. and Mary Anne Lewis Schoolfield of Worcester County, Maryland. (Mary A. L. Schoolfield was born in Portsmouth July 1st, 1809 and died in Norfolk June 2nd, 1895). He was a lawyer and became president of the Exchange Bank of Virginia. After the war he was a director of the Citizen's Bank of Norfolk, established in 1867. Children of William Willoughby and Mary Anne Lewis Schoolfield Sharp were—

- Captain William Sharp, born March 16, 1826, in Norfolk, died October 10th, 1910 in Norfolk. He married Eliza Darragh Williams, December 20, 1855. William S. Forrest 1853-

To Major Hunton, Commandant, The Officers of the Cavalry, In the U.S. Services at Norfolk.

Among the officers and private soldiers assembled and in service at Norfolk during the last war with England, there were, in addition to those mentioned, many men who were ornaments to society and whose great worth of character reflected honor and dignity upon the stations they were called to fill.

The 9th Regiment was commanded by Colonel William Sharp. It was said, among friends, by an officer who served under him during the campaign at Norfolk - "He was a gentleman, a patriot and a chivalrous officer. He was tall, straight as the barrel of a rifle, and sharp indeed was the look from his dark eye. I loved him truly, as did the whole of the regiment. He was careful of the health of his troops and vigilant in all things becoming a good officer and soldier". Colonel Sharp was highly complimented by Wade Hampton, a distinguished General Officer, and the movements of his regiment were spoken of in terms of great commendation.

"Muster Rolls of Settlers in Virginia" by John Camden Hotten, published by the Genealogical Publishing Company of Baltimore, 1962, shows - The Muster of William Sharp.

William Sharp, aged 40 years, who came to Virginia in the "Starr", in May, (year not given).

A local newspaper editor writes October 15th, 1905 that in the death of Mr. Charles Sharp—

"The city loses one of its most distinguished citizens, and the legal fraternity one of its brightest ornaments". Mr. Choate, recent Ambassador to the Court of Saint James, and a personal friend of Mr. Sharp, whom he frequently visited in years gone by, said that in the course of all of his experience he never met with a brighter intellect, or a more entertaining and lofty personality than that embodied in Charles Sharp, of Norfolk, Va. The value of such commendation when the quality of Mr. Choat's associations is considered, for this gentleman has truly moved among the elect of the earth.

"Socially the city of Norfolk has suffered a lamentable deterioration in the last fifty years. From the period of the Revolution up to the time of the conflict between the States, the society of this city was of such quality as to gain attention throughout this entire country and England. Scores of distinguished people lived here, and a list of names would recall much of the history of this nation, its glories of statemanship, literature and arms. In Mr. Sharp's prime, Norfolk's society was especially brilliant and distinguished, but in that eminent assemblage none was more respected and revered than the man who passed away a few days ago. He was a shining light in a brilliant galaxy, and with his passing the curtain falls upon the last of a line of gentlemen whose grace, dignity and true chivalry made the name of Virginia illustrious throughout the English speaking world.

"To those who venerate the mighty past, and who sometimes dwell upon the things that have gone before, the death of a man like Mr. Sharp must have a mournful and peculiarly pathetic interest in that it severs the chain of living continuity between us and the people of whom he was last representative, and who, with him, have passed into the misty shadows of written history.

"Death confers a brevet rank upon the humblest private in the walks of life, but upon some men it confers majesty, and those who knew the character and the spirit of the gentleman who has recently passed away from among us will realize it. In an age when religion is largely a matter of speculative accommodations, when the highest intellects passively give way before the assaults of materialistic doctrines, it is like an anchor of hope in the storm of doubt, to find a man of transcendent intellect like Mr. Sharp, facing the world with a sure and childlike faith in the maker of all things and the divine hope of life everlasting. Of profound, discriminating and penetrating mind, he had read and digested all the philosophies and arguments directed against the Christian Religion, and analyzed

and dissected them, to find that single sentence of Him who said "I am the resurrection and the life", was mightier than them all. Thus he lived, and thus he died, and such a death is majestic.

"From a worldly point of view, the great fault of Mr. Sharp was his mod esty. He cared absolutely nothing for fame and still less for money. He shrank from commendation, from praise, and even from the gratitude his charity inspired. Had this not been disposition, he would undoubtedly have made his way to the highest positions of life. In fact, he is known to have refused gifts which most men would have struggled for. In law, in statesmanship, and in literature he was brilliant to the point of genius. There is no writer in the city of Norfolk today in any respect comparable to him. One of his articles written years ago, entitled "The Future of England in India", was published, as we remember, in the 'New York Commercial'! It was copied by the English papers from which it met the eye of the then Prime Minister of England. He immediately wrote Mr. Sharp a personal letter in which he stated that it was the "Most brilliant and complete analysis of the situation that had ever appeared". He added his regrets at not being personally acquainted with the gentleman who could produce such work.

"In short, hte man whose death we chronicle, was of that extremely rare kind known as evenly balanced. His qualities of heart were no less than those of mind. We doubt if he entertained a vulgar or sordid idea in his life. He was great without aggression, grand without ostentation, charitable without display, beloved and respected by all who had the privilege of knowing him.

"Among his wonderful gifts was that of a marvelous memory. He could read a pretentious book through to the end, close the book, and without a single note, take up each chapter in rotation and write his criticism. This was frequently of more value than the work itself.

"His writings were full of the most apt and pointed quotations. Asked once by a friend if he did not have difficulty in the selection of these, he replied "Not at all. It is rather an embarrassment of choice." To such an extent did the resources of his memory support his creative faculties.

"We hope to be permitted the privilege of reproducing some of Mr. Charles Sharp's literary work in the columns of this paper."

Sixty-six acres of land were granted to *Thomas Shepherd* in Northumberland County on the fifth of July 1653 as a reward for his share in obtaining settlers for the colony of Virginia. He settled in Cherry Stone Creek, Northampton County in 1680. His wife's maiden name was Ann. Her surname is not available. Their son was—

Reverend John Moncure 1st, was born in 1689 or 1690 in Kinoff County, Mearns, Scotland. He married on 18th of June 1741 Frances Brown, born 29th July 1713, in Charles County, Maryland. He was an Anglican minister and the first rector of old Aquia Church near Stafford Courthouse. He was the great grandson of Jean Moncoeur, a Huguenot refugee from Clermont, France, who had fled to Scotland after the massacre of Saint Bartholomew's Day. He died in March 1764 and they were both buried under the chancel of Old Aquia.

Frances Brown was the daughter of Doctor Gustavus Brown and Frances Fowke of "Rich Hill", Charles County, Md. She died at "Clermont", Stafford County, Va. in the year 1770.

Doctor Gustavus Brown, was born the 10th of April 1689 in Dalkeith, Scotland. He married in 1710 and died in April 1762. He was the son of Gustavus Brown and Jane Mitchelson.

Frances Fowke was born 2nd of February 1691 in Charles County, Md. She died on 8th of November 1744 at "Rich Hill". She was the daughter of Col. Gerard Fowke II, and Sarah Burdett. Colonel Gerard Fowke II, born 1662, died 1734, son of Colonel Gerard Fowke I and Ann Thorowgood, daughter of—

Gustavus Browne, who was born about 1640-1650 at Dalkeith, Scotland. He married, as noted, 1670-80, Jane Mitchelson, daughter of George Mitchelson and Isabel Elphinstone. Gustavus Brown was the son of the Reverend Richard Brown born about 1610 of Dalkeith, Scotland.

WALLACE

Mary Ashby Wallace, was the mother of Marguerite Gascoigne Moncure, born 14th June 1917. Her parents were Doctor Gustavus Michael Wallace and Dora Ashby Green.

Doctor Gustavus Michael Wallace, was born on 15th of February 1849 at the family home, "Ellerslie", in Stafford County, Va. He married Dora Ashby Green on 25th of June 1872. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree and his Master of Arts degree at the University of Virginia. He won his M. D. degree at the University of Maryland. He died in 1937.

Gustavus Brown Wallace, born 26th January 1810, was the father of Dr. Gustavus Michael Wallace. He was a member of the Virginia State Legislature for some years. He was born at "Liberty Hall" in Stafford County. He married Emily Travers Daniel who was the daughter of Travers Daniel and Mildred Stone, his wife. She was the daughter of the Honorable Thomas Stone, a signer of the Declaration of Independence. Gustavus Brown Wallace was the son of John Wallace and Elizabeth Nooe.

John Wallace, was born on 19th January 1761 at "Ellerslie" in Stafford County. He was married in the year 1792 to Elizabeth Nooe, as noted. He died on 4th of May 1829 at "Liberty Hall". He was the son of—

Doctor Michael Wallace, who was born 11th of May 1719 at "Galrigs", Scotland. He was married on the 27th of April 1747, probably at Falmouth, Va.

His wife was Elizabeth Brown, born 5th October 1723 in Charles County, Maryland. He died in the year 1767. Elizabeth Browne was the daughter of Dr. Gustavus Brown II and Frances Fowke. Dr. Michael Wallace was the son of—

William Wallace, who was born about 1645. He died the 8th of August 1713 at Glasgow, Scotland. He was the son of—

William Wallace, who married Margaret Stewart. The Wallace line goes back to John Wallace, youngest son of Sir Malcolm Wallace of "Elderslie", Scotland.

In the year 1291 Edward 1st of England ordered the Scottish Barons to swear fealty to him. Sir Malcolm Wallace refused.

Sir William Wallace, was born about 1276. He was Sir Malcolm's son and John Wallace's brother. He was the heroic defender of Scottish rights and Scottish independence.

Dora Ashby Green, was born in 1854 at "Greenwood" in Culpeper County, Va. She died in May 1937 at "Ellerslie", Stafford County. She was the daughter of George Mason Green and Elizabeth Ashby, his wife.

George Mason Green, was born on 27th of August 1822 at "Greenwood" in Culpeper County. He married on 29th of November 1848, Elizabeth Ashby who was the sister of General Turner Ashby. General Turner Ashby was General Robert E. Lee's famous artillery commander who was killed at 22 years old. Elizabeth Ashby was born on the 4th of July 1825 at "Rosebank", Fauquier County, Va. She died quite young, at childbirth. George Mason Green was the son of—

Judge John Williams Green, Justice of the Supreme Court of Appeals of Virginia, and Million Cooke. She was the granddaughter of George Mason of Gunston Hall, author of the Bill of Rights of the Constitution of the United States.

Elizabeth Ashby, was the daughter of Colonel Turner Ashby of the War of 1812, and Dorothea Farrar Green.

STRIBLING FAMILY

Information from "Some Virginia Families" by Hugh Milton McIlhany Jr. 1903.

Thomas Stribling came to Virginia about 1700 and settled in Stafford County. On July 11th 1727 there was a grant issued to Thomas Stribling of Stafford County for 1050 acres on the middle grounds 'twixt Broad Run of Occaquan and Bull Run, lying in that part of Stafford which shortly afterwards became Prince William County. Here he resided in Dettinger Parish for about twenty years, removing then to Frederick County. In 1752, Thomas Stribling of Prince William, Gentleman, purchased six hundred acres near Winchester. He died in 1755, his will being recorded in Prince William County. His sons, Francis and Taliaferro Stribling, qualifying as executors. His estate in Frederick County was appraised on May 3rd, 1755, and that in Prince William County on May 26th, 1756.

Shortly after 1715, he married Elizabeth Taliaferro, daughter of John Taliaferro of Essex who had represented his county in the House of Burgesses in the year 1699. Francis Stribling and Dorothy, his wife, were living in Prince William County in the year 1775. Three of the known sons of Thomas Stribling were Francis, Taliaferro and William, as these were named in the will of their uncle, Robert Taliaferro of Essex which was approved on June 21st, 1726.

Francis Stribling owned that part of his father's estate which lay within the County in which he was living. Taliaferro was born in Stafford County about 1723. In early manhood he moved with his father into Frederick County, and at the latter's death, he inherited the six hundred acre plantation mentioned above. Taliaferro's wife was also named Elizabeth. They sold this six hundred acres on November 7th, 1771, having purchased on October 16th of the same year an estate called "Hopewell", which at his death descended to his son Francis. His will which was recorded in Frederick County on December 7th, 1771, sets forth his personal estate, which included thirty negroes, and which was appraised for 1569 Lbs.

Taliaferro and Elizabeth Stribling left six children-

- 1. Francis.
- 2. Taliaferro.
- 3. Ann.
- 4. Thomas.
- 5. William.
- 6. John.

Francis Stribling, the eldest son of Taliaferro and Elizabeth, born in 1756 in Frederick County and dying at Hopewell September 6th, 1823, married Nancy Tate, daughter of Magnus (1732-1808) and Mary R. McCormick (1736-1810) of Belvedere, near Charlestown, West Virginia. Francis Stribling acquired con-

siderable wealth and landed possessions. His son, Dr. Taliaferro Stribling, qualified as executor of his will, giving a bond for \$70,000.00. In his will he mentions his children — Erasmus, Taliaferro, Francis, Magnus, Thomas, George W., Nancy Neill and Margaret P. Pennypacker, the children of his daughter, Mary T. Crawford, deceased; and the daughter and only child of his son, Sigismund, deceased.

Erasmus Stribling, born 1784, the eldest son of Francis and Nancy Tate Stribling of Frederick married Matilda Kinney (born 1789) April 23, 1807. She was the daughter of Jacob and Ann Morris Kinney of "Oak Hill" near Staunton. He studied at Washington College, Lexington, and graduated in law. Being attracted by business, he soon became a merchant in Staunton and succeeded well. "Stribling Springs" was one of his adventures. He was appointed Clerk of the County Court of Augusta August 29, 1812.

John Wayt Stribling, youngest child of Erasmus and Matilda Kinney Stribling, was born in Staunton, April 1st, 1824, and died in Orange County February 17th, 1864. He married May 17, 1849, Anne McCormick, daughter of Dawson and Florinda Milton McCormick. Dawson McCormick was born at "Weehaw", Clark County, October 19, 1786, and died at "Cleremont" on March 26, 1834. He was a planter living near Berryville. Florinda Milton was born at "Milton Valley", October 28, 1802, and died April 7th, 1836. She married, April 15, 1824, and was the daughter of John Milton of Prince William County and his wife, Ann Stribling of Frederick County, born about 1760, and died at "Milton Valley", January 15, 1811. These last two were married July 20, 1782, he having been born about 1758 and died March 17th, 1718, at his home, "Milton Valley".

Edward McCormick Stribling was the son of John Wayt and Anne McCormick Stribling, who was born at "Hopewell" June 1st, 1784. He was born in 1859, died 1892.

Edward McCormick Stribling, as noted above, was born in Staunton, June 1st, 1859, and died in Washington, D. C., March 25, 1892. He married in Berryville, January 11, 1883, Lydia Kownslar who was born in Berryville May 22, 1856. She was a sister of Randolph Kownstar, a planter who lived near Berryville. The three surviving children of Edward McCormick and Lydia Stribling were—

- Edward McCormick Stribling, born in Berryville circa June 4th, 1885.
 He married first Cornelia McBlair of Norfolk, daughter of Captain and
 Mrs. George McBlair. No issue. He married secondly Mrs. Marie
 Maubry Taylor, widow of George Debree Taylor, and again no issue.
- John Wright Stribling, born in Berryville, April 5th, 1887. He moved to Norfolk and married, Mr. Wickham Taylor, Sr. Their children were—
 - (a) Louise Taylor Stribling, born 30th March 1913, married 24th October, 1958, Levin Lyttleton Waters, son of Colonel Henry J. Waters and Emily Wilson, his wife, of Princess Anne, Maryland.
 - (b) Captain John Wright Stribling Jr., U.S.N. retired, born May 1st, 1922, married Shirley Carter Williams, daughter of Judge Philip Williams and Gladys George, his wife, of Winchester, Va. The children of Captain and Mrs. Stribling are—

- (a1) Shirley Carter Stribling, born 11th January 1945. She married on 6th January 1968, William Thomas McCutcheonge.
- (a2) Ann McCormick Stribling, 2nd November 1947.

STUART FAMILY

Archibald Stuart was born in Londonderry, Ireland, during the latter part of the 17th century. He married Jane or Janet Brown who was the sister of John Brown, Presbyterian Minister, ancestor of the Browns of Rockbridge County, Va. In 1726 or 1727 he came to America with two children who were born in Ireland, Thomas and Eleanor. His two younger children were born in America, Alexander and Benjamin. He died at his home in Augusta County in 1761 and his will was admitted to record on 17th November 1761.

Major Alexander Stuart was the second son and third child of Archibald Stuart Sr. and Jane Brown, his wife. He was born in the Western part of Pennsylvania on 27th of August 1734. When four years old he accompanied his parents in their move to the valley of Virginia, to Augusta, Rockbridge and Monroe counties. He took an active and valiant part in the War for Independence, the Revolution. He was a man of uncommon intellect, energy and enterprise. He contributed to the Washington and Lee University. He married a second time Mrs. Paxton, nee Mary Moore. He died at the age of ninety years, circa 1824. Among his children was—

Judge Alexander Stuart who was born on 11th May 1770. He lived for some time in Cumberland County, Va., and was elected a member of the Executive Council of Virginia. He married first Anne Dabney, daughter of George Dabney and Elizabeth Price, who was the daughter of John Price and Mary Randolph, daughter of Colonel William Randolph and his wife, Anne Beverley, daughter of Peter Beverley. Peter Beverley was the oldest son of Major Robert Beverley, the first of his name to come to this country in 1663 from Yorkshire, England. Judge Stuart married secondly Mary Gassaway of Annapolis, Md. He married thirdly Jane Johnson.

Leaving Virginia in midlife, he took his family to Illinois where he soon was appointed judge of the U.S. Court. After living there for some time he decided that he wanted to return to the South so he moved again, this time to the new state of Missouri. Soon he was made U. S. Judge in Missouri. After a few years he was made Judge of the Circuit Court of Missouri. Of a restless nature, he resigned and entered politics and was soon elected to the Legislature. Later he was promoted to Speaker of the House of the State of Missouri. In December 1832 he died on a visit to the family of his deceased brother at Staunton, Va. and was buried in old Trinity churchyard there.

The surviving children of Judge Alexander and Anne Dabney were—

- 1. Archibald Stuart.
- 2. Anne Dabney Stuart.

Hon. Archibald Stuart was born 2nd December 1795 at Lynchburg. He was an officer in the War of 1812 against England. He married Elizabeth Letcher

Pannill of "Chalk Level", Pittsylvania County, Va. She inherited the "Laurel Hill Plantation" from the Letcher family. She was born 4th January 1801, the daughter of David Pannill who was born on 10th January 1772, and, Elizabeth Letcher. Elizabeth Letcher was the daughter of Colonel William Letcher who was born in 1760 and his wife, Elizabeth Perkins who was the daughter of Colonel Nicholas Perkins. Archibald Stuart was elected to the Virginia Legislature and was a member of the famous Convention of 1850. He was one of the four members living east of the Blueridge who favored representation in the State Legislation based upon the number of white people living in each district. He represented the Patrick County district in Congress during the exciting period of "Nullification". He was the representative attorney in his part of the state. He died in September 1855 at sixty years old.

Major General JEB Stuart, C.S.A., was the son of Archibald Stuart and Elizabeth Letcher Pannill, his wife. He was born at "Laurel Hill", Patrick County on 6th February 1828. He attended Emory and Henry College for two years and then graduated from "West Point" in 1854. He at 26 years old was the youngest Major General ever commissioned since the days of Nepoleon Bonaparte. His talents for command combined with his fearless charges left him no rivals. His dashing appearance and courteous behavior endeared him to the hearts of the ladies throughout Virginia. He married Flora Cooke who was daughter of General Phillip St. George Cooke. He was killed at the battle of "Yellow Tavern" in Northern Virginia while resting a moment sitting on the ground in the woods, by a Union trooper riding by. This was on 12th May 1864.

Jeb Stuart and Flora Cooke left two children-

- 1. Capt. Jeb Stuart II.
- 2. Virginia Pelham Stuart.

Upon graduation from West Point in 1854, Jeb Stuart was given a commission in the United States Army as a second Lieutenant. He served with a cavalry regiment in Texas and later was transferred to the Western Frontier. There he was severely wounded in a battle with the Cheyenne Indians in 1857.

When the storm clouds of the pending war between the States were gathering fast, he had to make the decision. He resigned from the U. S. Army and traveled home to help to defend his native state. He had been present at Harper's Ferry in the capture of John Brown. He was given a commission as Lt. Colonel in the First Virginia Cavalry, C. S. A.

Flora Cooke was born 3rd January 1836 at Jefferson Barracks, Saint Louis. She died 10th of May 1923, at Norfolk, to which city she had moved in 1899, General Phillip St. George Cooke, U. S. Army, was born 13th January 1809 at "Glengarry", Leesburg, Va. He married 25th October 1831, at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, Rachael Wilt Hertzog who was born on 25th August 1811 at Philadelphia, Penn. He died 20th March 1895 at Detroit, Mich. and she died 15th February 1896 also in Detroit. They both were buried at Elmwood Cemetery in Detroit.

Virginia Pelham Stuart, daughter of General JEB Stuart and Flora Cooke, his wife, born in 1862, married Robert Page Waller Sr. Their children were—

1. Flora Stuart Waller, who married Johnathan W. Old. Their children are—

- (a) Johnathan W. Old Jr., born 30th 1927. He married Mary Graham Hall of Roanoke.
- (b) Elizabeth Adams Old.
- 2. Mathew Page Waller Jr. who married Helen Baker, daughter of Dr. Benjamin Baker.
- 3. Elizabeth Adams Old.
- 4. Virginia Stuart Waller who married Jack Davis and moved to Richmond.

General Phillip St. George Cooke, was the son of Dr. Stephen Cooke who was born in Philadelphia about 1750 and Catherine Esten, his wife. She was born on Christmas Day about the year 1766 in Bermuda. They were married in 1782. She was the daughter of the Honourable John Esten, the English Governor of Bermuda. She died in 1838 or 1839.

Rachael Wilt Herzog was the daughter of Joseph Herzog who was born in Philadelphia, and who married on 20th of January 1798 Catherine Wilt who was born on 24th of September 1775. She died on the 11 November 1861 in her 87th year at Collingville, Illinois.

Captain JEB Stuart II, was born 26th June 1860 at Fort Riley, Kansas. He was married at old St. John's Church in Hampton, Va. He served in World War I, having previously seen service in the Spanish - American War. Returning to the States, he was appointed Collector of Customs for the Port of Newport News under President Theodore Roosevelt. He was a Director of the Jamestown Exposition in 1907. Later he was sent by the Texaco Corp. to South Africa as an expert oil statistician.

He married on 21st July 1886 Josephine Phillips who was the daughter of Colonel Joseph Phillips of the Third Texas Cavalry, C. S. Army. She was born 3rd February 1862 on old Holt Street in Norfolk in the days of its prime. She died at Fort Washington, N. Y. and was buried at Arlington National Cemetery under auspices of the Colonial Dames of America.

The children of Capt. J.E.B. Stuart II and Josephine Phillips were-

- Marrow Stuart, born 28 May 1889 at "Old Trout Home" in Staunton, Virginia. She married Drewry McRee Smith.
- 2. Flora Stuart, born 16th June 1890.

The son of Marrow Stuart and Drewry McRee Smith was Drewry McRee Smith Jr., who married Faith Samson of Morning Sun, Iowa. Their children are—

- 2. Drewry McRee Smith III, born 30 August 1952.

The children of Elizabeth Letcher and Rorer James were—

Joseph Phillips Sr. was born on 14th June 1804 at Hampton, Va. He married (his first wife) Mary Curle Sheppard, born 16th September 1801 at Hampton, and died 12 January 1847 at Hampton. She was the daughter of John Sheppard and Rebecca Armstead, his wife, who was born in 1845 and died 9th January 1870 at "Foxhill", Hampton. Joseph Phillips Sr. was the son of Benjamin Phillips born 10th September 1760 and died in 1818. The family came from Accomac County, Va., to Elizabeth City County, Va., in 1803. Benjamin Phillip's wife was Ruth Boggs who was born on 22nd October 1759, was married about 1780 and died in 1837.

Colonel Joseph Phillips Jr. was born about 1833 at Hampton, Va. He was married about 1856 in Warwick County, Va. to Mary Marrow. He died in a battle skirmish at Donaldsonville, Louisianna. Mary Marrow was born on 10th March 1838 in Warwick County, Va. She died on 9th May 1911 and was buried in old Saint John's Cemetery, Hampton. Their surviving children were—

Mary Curle Sheppard was the daughter of John Sheppard as noted above who was buried at Back River, Hampton, which is now a part of Langley Field. Rebecca Armstead, his wife, (her first marriage) was daughter of William Armstead whose will was probated 24th November 1774, and his second wife, Ann Wallace.

Robert Armstead was son of Major William Armstead whose will 17th February 1715-1716, and his first wife, Rebecca Moss. Her will was probated in 1758.

Major William Armstead was the son of Anthony Armstead and his first wife, Hannah Ellison who was the daughter of Dr. Robert Ellison. (See Enc. of Va. Biography, Vol. 1, page 229).

Captain Anthony Armistead of Elizabeth City County was the son of William Armstead, the immigrant, who with his wife Anne came to Virginia about 1640. Another account says that Anthony Armistead's first wife was Hannah Ellison, daughter of Doctor Robert Ellison of James City County, Va., and formerly from St. Mary's Parish, Maryland. He probably had two wives.



TALBOT FAMILY

Thomas Talbott, age 20, came over to Virginia in the ship "America" on 23rd June 1635. The ship's Master was Captain William Barker. He left from Gravesend, England, having certified the comformitie of all of his passengers to the orders and discipline of the Church of England.

Will Book #1 of Norfolk County, Va. is illegible.

Will Book #2 shows the will of *Isaac Talbot*. He had lately purchased land from John Talbot. Mentioned as the owners of adjoining land are John Willoughby Sr., and Captain Paul Loyall. He devises property to the following—

- 1. Wife, Elizabeth Talbot.
- 2. Daughter, Elizabeth Talbot.
- 3. Daughter, Ann Talbot.
- 4. Son, Kedar Talbot.
- 5. Brother, Thomas Talbot.

The will is dated 6th April 1774 and is witnessed by Soloman Talbot.

In Will Book #2 William Talbot under the date of 2nd of August 1776 leaves property to the following—

Thomas Talbot, of the County of Norfolk was a shipwright. He purchased land from William Willoughby. His wife was Mary Talbot. Their children were—

- 3. Sucky Talbot, who married Mr. McLean.
- 4. Mary Frances Talbot, who married Mr. Eilbeck.

Will of Soloman Butt Talbot, was dated 1st January 1800. His wife was Mary and his brother was Henry Talbot as noted above. The children of Soloman and Mary Talbot were—

Soloman was so impressed by the extravagant waste of money and property which had been left by his father to his sisters, by their husbands that he provided only an annuity for Mary Diana. "It is my will that all of my money and property and that received from my outstanding debts (debtors) may be laid out in completing and finishing the home on Tanner's Creek which I have begun for my son, Thomas Talbot."

Will of Henry Talbot, son of Thomas and Mary Talbot and brother of Soloman, now of the City of Norfolk, formerly of Norfolk County, devises as follows—

"To my son, Thomas Talbot, half my farm called "Talbot Hall" which is bounded as follows — on the north of Crab creek, an arm of Tanner's Creek, and is the land which belonged to James H. Powell in his lifetime; on the east by the main road leading from the Tanner's Creek drawbridge to Seawell's Point and Willoughby; on the south by a roadway now called "Minton's Road" to the yard attached to the house on the Southern Parcel of said Talbot Hall tract, which I have hereinafter devised to my son, Minton Wright Talbot, and which I now designate as the Minton Tract; and on the west and southwest by Tanner's Creek and a narrow lane or cart path, to be called the Brothers' Road, which extends northwardly and along the eastern line of said yard, and continues from the northeastern corner of said yard, northwestwardly to a bridge over the creek or stream, which runs up in an eastwardly direction to the south of the yard attached to the dwelling formerly occupied by me.

On the land thus devised to my son, Thomas Talbot, is the said dwelling formerly occupied by me as aforesaid. The said lane or Cart Path called the ''Brothers' Road.''

I give and devise to my two sons, Thomas Talbot and Minton Wright Talbot, jointly, to be used by them and their assigns and heirs jointly forever. It, the Brothers' Road, must be made 15 feet wide from the said bridge to the western terminus of the aforesaid Mintons Road."

- 3. My son, Minton Wright Talbot, etc.

TALIAFERRO FAMILY

One of the Knights who crossed over the English Channel with William the Conqueror was named Taliaferro. This family furnished two Generals and many other officers to the Confederate Army.

Robert Taliaferro, Gentleman, was the first of this name to settle in Virginia, He was born about the year 1626 and died in 1687-88. He signed as a witness to a will in 1647 in York County. He received large land grants in several counties. He married Sarah Grymes who was the daughter of the Reverend Charles Grymes of "Grymesby" which was on the Piankitank River and other holdings. The known children of Robert and Sarah Grymes Taliaferro were—

TAYLOE FAMILY

This family is in no way to be confused with the Taylor family which is stated very definitely by W. Randolph Tayloe, the genealogist. The following account is taken from his book "The Tayloe's of Virginia", in most part—

Colonel William Tayloe came to Virginia in the first half of the seventeenth century and settled in York County. Quoting 'Nugent'—"John Utye, Gentleman, and Mary, his wife, of the one part, and, William Tayloe, Gentleman, of the other part, witnesseth: For divers good causes, especially for a valuable consideration to them already paid etc. assign all of their rights etc., of two patents, unto Captain John Utye, father of said John, dated fifteenth of March 1630 and the fourth of March 1638; all howses, edificies, buildings, orchards, gardens etc. 8 April 1640, page 717. Signed: John Utye and Mary Utye. Witnesses: Nicholas (his mark) Jarnew, Jonothan White, Abraham English and Richard Lee.

Colonel William Tayloe was a member of the House of Burgesses for York County 1643 and 1647. He was a member of the Council 1651 and 1655. He had no issue, however, his nephew, Colonel William Tayloe II, of Richmond County, came to Virginia in the second half of the seventeenth century and settled in the old county of Rappahannock, that part which is now Richmond County. In 1704 he was Colonel of Militia of Richmond County and put down a threatened uprising of the Indians. He was a Burgess for Richmond County for the years, 1700, 1701, May 1702, June 1702 and 1706. There is no information concerning his descendants, if any.

Joseph Tayloe, brother of Colonel William Tayloe II, married Barbara Billington, daughter of Luke Billington. There were three children—

- 2. Anne.
- 3. Elizabeth.

Land patented by Colonel William Tayloe II of Richmond County included that upon which was built the famous "Mount Airy" which is in the family even to this day. He married Ann, the daughter of Henry Corbin of "Buckingham House", Middlesex County. He was a Member of the Colonial Council. Their surviving children were—

- Elizabeth Tayloe, born 1686, who married John Wormeley I, of "Rose-gill". She was the mother of Ralph Wormeley IV who was born in 1715 and died in 1790. Their son, Ralph Wormeley V married Eleanor Tayloe, daughter of John Tayloe II in 1772.

John Tayloe I, born 1687 and died 1747 was a Member of the Colonial Council from 1742 to 1747 and was an extensive property owner, including land in Prince William County near Dumphries. He married Elizabeth, the daughter of David Gwynn, widow. His will was dated 3rd January 1744 and proved in November 1747. Executors were John Tayloe II and his first cousin, Thomas Lee. Colonel Thomas Lee was the son of Major Richard Lee and Letitia Corbin, his wife. This Colonel Thomas Lee was Commander in Chief and President of the Colony of Virginia.

The surviving children of John Tayloe I and Elizabeth Gwynn, his wife, were-

- 2. Betty Tayloe who was born 1719 and died 1784, married her cousin, Richard Corbin of Laneville who became Receiver General of Virginia.

John Tayloe II was born 8th of May 1721 and died 19th of April 1779. He was educated in England. He was the builder of "Mount Airy" as noted above and was a "Signer" at 23 years old, of the Treaty of Lancaster in 1744 with the six nations, Indians . . . He was also a Trustee of the Town of Dumphries in Prince William County. He was a great horseman, being the owner of the celebrated horses, "Salina", "Yorick", "Jolly Roger", "Jenny Cameron" and others.

Governor Dunmore appointed him to the Council in 1757 and he was elected to the first Council of the State of Virginia under the first Governor, Patrick Henry. He married Rebecca, daughter of Colonel George Plater of "Sotterley", St Mary's County, Maryland. She was the sister of the Hon. George Plater, Governor of Maryland, and, the widow of James Bowles by whom she had three daughters, Mrs. Warner Lewis, Mrs. William Armistead and Mrs. Ralph Wormesley IV (His second wife). The will of John Tayloe II was dated May 22, 1733, and proved July 1779. The children of John Tayloe II and Rebecca Plater were—

- Elizabeth Tayloe who was born in 1750 and died in 1825. She married Edward Lloyd IV of "Wye House" in Maryland. He died in 1796.

When the war broke out, he left school and joined "Lee's Rangers", serving two years with the 9th Virginia Cavalry. He was promoted to Adjutant of the Regiment, in which position he rendered outstanding service. He married Bettie Payne Wirt and when the war was over, he began the practice of Law. He was soon elected Commonwealth Attorney. He was elected to the Virginia Legislature. He died 7th November 1910. Their children were—

He had been at the Institution only one year when General "Stonewall" Jackson ordered the cadets to join him and they took valiant part in the coming battle of "New Market". He later joined Mosby's Rangers where he was active until the war was over. In 1865, he left his bleeding homeland to take his chances in Chicago. He entered the merchantile business in which he remained until he died 15 August 1934.

John Tayloe III, son of John Tayloe II, and Rebecca Plater, (1771-1828) was educated at Eton and Cambridge in England, where he established lasting friendships with such fellow students as General Wellington, George Canning who became Prime Minister of England and Edward Thornton who was afterwards British Minister to the United States. Through these he had access to England's best social circles and his life was made very pleasant. He returned to Virginia in 1791 and became a successful businessman. He was interested in husbandry, transportation, shipping and banking. He built the original Willard's Hotel in Washington City, long famous among visitors of that city. He was a senator in the Virginia Legislature for nine years.

When quite young, he was Captain of Dragoons under General Light Horse Harry Lee. In 1799 he was appointed Major of Light Dragoons, U.S.A. by President John Adams. When the War of 1812 broke out, he was made Colonel of the Cavalry of the District of Columbia. He was one of the founders of St. John's Episcopal Church in Washington. He married October 4th, 1792, Anne (1772-1855) daughter of Benjamin Ogle I of "Belair", Prince George County, Maryland. They were the parents of fifteen children, as follow—

George Plater Tayloe (1804-1897) son of John Tayloe III of "Mount Airy", when grown, moved to "Big Lick", Va. which is now named Roanoke. He married Mary Elizabeth Langhorne, daughter of Colonel William Langhorne. His home was built in 1833 and known as "Buena Vista". He had a great part in the establishing of Hollins College and for its growth and prestige throughout the South. He was a member of the convention that passed the Ordinance of Secession which was carried by only one vote, and this after Lincoln had demanded ninety thousand troops of Virginia to help crush the gathering of armed forces in the states south of Virginia, necessitated by threats of invasion by the Washington government.

George Plater Tayloe attended V.M.I. and then moved to Alabama. The children of George P. Tayloe and Mary E. Langhorne, his wife, were—

- 1. John William Tayloe also attended V.M.I. and when the War Between the States broke out he raised a company of Cavalry and joined "Jeff Davis' Legion", Hampton's Division. Later he was assigned to the staff of General D. H. Hill. He distinguished himself at the Battle of Seven Pines and was promoted to Major. In 1863 he was named Adjutant of the 2nd Virginia Cavalry.
- At the end of the war he moved to Birmingham and married Lucy Beverley Randolph of Greensboro, Alabama. He died in 1904 leaving an only daughter, Anne Randolph Tayloe.
 - 2. George Edward Tayloe who graduated from V.M.I. in 1858. He raised a company of infantry and joined the 11th Alabama Infantry. Through many hard fought battles he rose to full colonel of the 11th Alabama. He was severely wounded in the fighting around Richmond. Throughout the entire war he showed unusual ability in protecting his men and was able at the surrender at Appomattox, with proper military bearing, to lead 1033 men, after those last days of little ammunition and less food. He received Grant's first Flag of Truce and was quoted by one of his officers as saying "I have a consolation that I will carry to my grave, and that is that on the very morning of the surrender at Appomattox, I gave them a damn good whipping. I never saw my men fight better. We were driving them most handsomely from my brigade front when the order came to cease fire. I never dreamed of surrender".

Colonel Tayloe moved to Orange County after the war. He married Delia Smith Willis, daughter of George and Sallie Innes Smith Willis of "Wood Park". She was the great granddaughter of Lady Margaret Stirling, and married Doctor David Forbes, who came to Dumphries in 1774. Delia Willis' Ancestry traces back to the best in England through Maria Horsmanden, wife of William Byrd I and through Mildred Reade, wife of Colonel Augustine Warner. The children of Colonel Edward and Delia Smith Willis Tayloe were—

- 3. James Langhorne Tayloe, son of George Plater and Mary E. Langhorne Tayloe, was born at Buena Vista in 1841. He attended the Episcopal High School in Alexandria 1854-55. He graduated from the United States Military Academy in 1860. On June 6th, 1861, he resigned and was appointed a Midshipman in the Confederate States Navy. He commanded the Steamship "Fawn" in 1861 and in early 1862 he was was appointed Lieutenant. He was killed in action aboard the Confederate gunboat, "Raleigh" in the battle of Hampton Roads. The "Raleigh" had one gun but accompanied the "Merrimac" on her first trip into Hampton Roads. He witnessed the sinking of the Federal "Ship of the Line" Cumberland. The Federal Ship "Congress" was driven ashore and struck her colors, running up the white flag. Captain Buchanan of the "Merrimac" ordered cease fire and sent a small boat under command of Lieutenants Tayloe and Robert Minor to board the burning "Congress". The Captain of that ship violated international law and fired on the small boat. Among the killed and wounded were both officers. Captain Buchanan was much disturbed by this treachery and opened fire on the cowardly ship.
- 4. Lomax Tayloe, C.S.A., son of George Plater Tayloe, was born in 1842. He attended Episcopal High School 1854-58, and the University of Virginia 1860-61. He began his service in the Confederate army as a color sargeant of the 2nd Virginia Cavalry. He acted sargeant major at "Leesburg" and was promoted to Lieutenant at "Shepherdstown" and at the "Bristoe Station". At "Harrisonburg" he captured a Federal captain. He was killed at Raccoon Ford in October 1863. The name of Lomax Tayloe appears on a Confederate monument at Episcopal High School.

RICHARD TAYLOR FAMILY OF NORFOLK

This Taylor Family came from a small place in Lincolnshire, England, called Long Sutton. Many of them are buried there in the churchyard. The first of whom we have any record is *Richard Taylor*, who was born in 1735 and died in 1784. He married Mary who was born in 1740 and died in 1809. They are buried in St. Mary's Church at Long Sutton. Two of their sons were Richard II, born 1771 and died in 1827, and John. They both migrated to America but John returned to England and died there.

Richard Taylor II married Elizabeth Calvert, daughter of Captain John Calvert of the Virginia Navy. She was born in 1776 and died in 1861. Their children were—



With high intelligence and great industry he became a very wealthy man. He owned plantations in Brunswick, Charles City, Goochland, New Kent, Surry and Hanover Counties; storehouses and warehouses, lots in the towns of Blanford, Yorktown and Williamsburg; slaves, imported furniture, household silver, horses, cattle and other live stock. He was clerk of York County from 1707 to 1733, member of the King's Council in 1733, left the little Yorktown Church a silver flagon and chalice and much goods to be destributed among the poor. He gave the College of William and Mary the sum of five hundred pounds for the education of two young men to be fitted for the Church of England. He married in about the year 1720, Mary Armistead Burwell, widow of James Burwell, and the daughter of the Honorable William and Ann (Lee) Armistead. Their surviving children were—

ROBERT BARRAUD TAYLOR

Robert Taylor, the first of this family of whom we have a record, was of English descent. He came to Virginia from the West Indies. He first settled in Isle of Wight County and later moved to Norfolk. By smart attention to his business, he became a popular and a prominent merchant.

He married Sarah Barraud on the 27th of September 1771. Her father was Daniel Barraud, a French Huguenot, who had sought religious freedom in this country.

He was elected mayor of Norfolk for three terms. Both Robert Taylor and Daniel Barraud owned property in Norfolk and took an active part in all local matters.

Robert Barraud Taylor, attended the private school of Doctor Alexander Whitehead in Norfolk. He was enrolled at William and Mary College in Williamsburg from 1771 through 1773. He later studied law under John Marshall who later became Chief Justice of the United States. He was admitted to the Bar in the Hustings Court of Norfolk on the 24th of November 1794.

He married Nancy Ritson, daughter of Thomas and Martha Willoughby Ritson. They had two sons—

- 1. Robert E. Taylor, distinguished member of the Norfolk Bar.
- 2. William E. Taylor, educated as a lawyer, who became a valiant officer of the Confederate army.

He was early associated with the State Militia. As Captain, he organized a troop of cavalry. Six years later, in 1812, he had been promoted to Colonel. As the second war with Great Britain got under way, he was appointed Brigadier General and put in command of all militia in the Norfolk and Portsmouth sector. He was in command at the Battle of Craney Island in which the British fleet sent ashore a large number of men intent upon dislodging or capturing the American forces. Taylor backed away until he was out of range of the guns of the British fleet. Then he attacked with strategy and much vigor. The rifle fire of the Americans was superb. The British lines wavered. They began to fall back and soon withdrew, all the way back to their ships. Shortly afterwards the entire fleet weighted anchor and left Norfolk.

In recognition of his victory, General Taylor was offered a permanent commission in the United States army. He declined the honor and returned to civilian life in 1814.

When General Lafayette made his return visit to Norfolk in the year 1826, he was entertained by General Taylor.

General Taylor was a member of the first Board of Visitors of the University of Virginia.

He represented Norfolk in the General Assembly and was a delegate to the Constitutional Convention of 1829-30.

General Taylor was elected judge of the General Court and Circuit Superior Court of Law and Chancery of the first circuit of Virginia. It was composed of seven counties and the city of Norfolk. He took the Oath of Office on the 29th of April 1831. He died in 1834, at sixty years of age. He had quickly the reputation of an able and upright judge.

The family bible from which the date of his birth and other pertinent facts were obtained is now in the possession of one of his direct descendants, Mrs. Henry Dupont Baldwin, nee Margaret Eyre Taylor.

WASHINGTON TAYLOR FAMILY

Richard Taylor I was born in the year 1735 in the town of Lincolnshire in England. He died in the year 1784. His known sons were Richard and John who emigrated to Virginia and settled in Norfolk about the year 1797. After acquainting themselves with local conditions and business prospects, they decided to enter the field of importing and merchandising dry goods which were to include silks, muslins, broadcloth, woolens, brocades and other kindred items.

Richard II, being the more romantic of the two, after becoming acquainted with many of local families, soon became an admirer of the daughter of John Carr and Margaret Walke Calvert, Eliza. The young lady accepted his attentions and they were duly married. She was born in 1772. They were the parents of a good many children including John Carr Calvert Taylor, who was born August 31st, 1811 and died January 31st, 1852. Richard Taylor II died in 1827, and Eliza Calvert Taylor in 1860.

John Carr Calvert Taylor married Eloise Williamson Jones who was born in Petersburg on July 17th, 1812, and died on March 13th, 1907. She was the daughter of George Hamilton Jones, born May 1st, 1775, and Eliza Wright who was born on October 2nd, 1752, in the County of Southampton. She died on August 23rd, 1914. George Hamilton Jones was the son of Colonel John Jones of Brunswick County who was born in 1738. George Hamilton Jones and Eliza Wright were married on August 4th, 1797. TAZEWELL FAMILY

James Tazewell, according to the Parish Register, was living at Lymington, Somersetshire, England in 1690. He married Anne Kingsmill of Andover. (In the church yard there is the tomb of a Tazewell who died in 1706 which bears a coat of arms.) One of their sons was—

William Tazewell who emigrated to the Colony of Virginia in 1715 and settled in Accomack County. He was a lawyer, and, he married Sophia Harmanson who was the daughter of Henry and Gertrude Littleton Harmanson. Gertrude Littleton was the daughter of Colonel Southey Littleton. One of the sons of William and Sophia Tazewell was named—

Littleton Tazewell who was trained in the Secretary's Office under Secretary Nelson. He married Mary Gray who was the daughter of Colonel Joseph Gray of Southampton County. Littleton Tazewell sold his home in Southampton and moved to Brunswick County. After becoming established there for a time, he was appointed Clerk of the Court. He died at the early age of thirty-three. Among his children was—

Henry Tazewell who was of Brunswick County (1753-January 24, 1799) married January 13th, 1774, Dorothea Elizabeth Waller who was born September 2nd, 1754, and died May 13th, 1777, just 23 years old. She was the daughter of Judge Benjamin Waller of Williamsburg who presided over the General Court from 1779 to 1786. Henry Tazewell became a Judge of Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals and U. S. Senator. Their son was—

Littleton Waller Tazewell who was born in Williamsburg on December 17th, 1774. He graduated from the College of William and Mary on July 31st, 1792, with a Bachelor of Arts degree. He began the study of law in Richmond under Mr. Wickham and after some years of experience and practice, moved to Norfolk in 1802. There he met and married Anne Stratton Nivison, the daughter of Colonel John Nivison of Norfolk.

Tazewell's ability was soon recognized and he was elected to the Virginia Legislature where he made quite a name for himself. He was next elected to the House of Representatives and there by his clear thinking and firm stand on all matters for the protection of the people and the good of the country he soon won the full confidence of most Virginians. He served in the Senate for many years, making close friends with most of the leaders. Following his convictions, he had voted for a strong resolution which was critical of President Andrew Jackson. Later, when there was a great turmoil over the legality of this action and the Legislature of Virginia passed a resolution instructing the Governor to direct the Senators from Virginia to vote in favor of Expunging the Resolution, Senator Tazewell refused to do so. He accordingly tendered his resignation.

Senator Tazewell was by this time about sixty years old and felt the strain of the demanding office that he was holding. He had served his state long and

well and was entitled to be relieved of his duties. He retired and with his family returned to Norfolk where he resumed his practice of Law.

When the election of a Governor next came up in Virginia, the general public felt that this honor should be confered upon him. He advised his friends that he did not desire the office but if elected he would serve. He did nothing to further the campaign nor did he make a single speech, and yet he was elected by a good majority. He carried his family to Richmond and took possession of the Executive Mansion.

About two years after he had become Governor an unusual situation had taken place in the United States Senate and among the electorate of the State of Virginia and in other states. The Whig Party had lost a great deal of its strength and a pro-Jackson legislature had been elected in Virginia and in other states. The time was ripe to introduce legislation both in the several states and in the United States Senate to nullify the extensive criticism of Andrew Jackson. The Expunging Resolution was introduced in the Senate and the Legislature of Virginia passed a resolution instructing the Governor to direct the Senators from Virginia to vote in favor of the Expunging Resolution. In as much as he had voted for the original critical resolution, Governor Tazewell refused to be so vacillating and stood his ground. Shortly thereafter as no moves of conciliation were made, he resigned from the office of Governor.

He returned to Norfolk and to the practice of Law, about the year 1836. He and his wife had four daughters and two sons, Henry and John, neither of whom left any male heirs.

John Nivison Tazewell, son of Littleton Waller and Anne Stratton Nivison Tazewell, attended Harvard, Princeton and the University of Virginia. He practiced law in Norfolk and was never married. He was a member of the state legislature and the first Board of Visitors of the Virginia Military Institute. He was Colonel of the old Fifty-fourth Regiment of Virginia Militia. He owned what is known as the Bradford farms, extending from Chesapeake Bay to what is now known as Bayside, taking in all of the property occupied by Chesapeake Beach. He died about 1870.

The school buildings at Lexington were burned by Union General Hunter. The cadets were barracked at the old alma house which was at the end of Franklin Street. His grandfather had lived at the other end in the Governor's Mansion.

THOROUGHGOOD FAMILY

John and his wife, Lucking, were the first of this family named in available English records. Their son was Robert Thorogood and his son was—

Rev. William Thorogood who married Anne Edwards. He was the Commissary, the Bishop of Grindelbone County, Norfolk, England. Their son was—Sir John Thorogood.

Captain Adam Thoroughgood came to Virginia the first time as a lad of eighteen in the year 1621, in the good ship "Charles". He returned to England and later, in 1635, came back to Virginia with his wife, who was Sarah Offley, and son Thomas and Dann. He served as a Burgess from 1634 to 1637. He was appointed to the Governor's Council in 1636. He had many land grants beginning in the year 1635 with 5350 acres "lying Northly upon Chesopean Bay". His will dated 1639/40. Children of Adam and Sarah Thoroughgood were—

Adam Thoroughgood House

A trip through the Adam Thoroughgood House is an unforgettable journey back to the nation's first frontier. This is America's oldest brick home believed built in 1636, and takes its name from its builder, who came to Virginia as a 17-year old indentured servant in 1621. Our first permanent colony was then only 14 years old, the New World a raw, untamed wilderness. In three years, brave and ambitious Adam Thoroughgood repaid his indenture and became a man of property, then returned to England. Four years later he brought 105 settlers back to Virginia, among them his young wife Sarah and Augustine Warner, ancestor of George Washington and Robert E. Lee. Adam Thoroughgood prospered as a tobacco planter. He became a member of the Jamestown House of Burgesses and is credited with exploring and naming Norfolk.

John Thorogood, second son of Colonel Adam Thorogood II and Frances Yeardley, his wife, married first Margaret Lawson, daughter of Colonel Anthony Lawson, and secondly, Miss Sayer. His will which was proved in 1702 mentions a sister, Mary, brothers Stephen and Anthony, and, a half-brother, Thomas Walke.

Mary Anne (Margaret) Thorogood married, as noted above, secondly, Thomas Walke. She died in 1761. Their daughter—

Margaret Walke, (Mary Anne), married John Calvert in 1739. He was son of Cornelius Calvert.

Mary Calvert, their daughter, married Dr. William O'Grady in 1795 in Limerick, Ireland. Two of their daughters were—

- 1. Margaret O'Grady married, in 1818, Colonel Albert Allman of Norfolk.
- 2. Honoria O'Grady married John Barraud U.S. Navy.

Elizabeth Taylor Allman, daughter of Colonel Albert and Margaret O'Grady Allman married Judge George Blow of Norfolk.

Mira Barraud, daughter of Honoria and John Barraud U.S.N., married John Young Stock Mitchell of Charleston, S. C. and Norfolk. Their children were—

- 1. John Young Stock Mitchell of Norfolk who married Alice Bell.

- 3. Frank M. Mitchell who did not marry.

Captain Adam Thorogood removed to Lynnhaven Bay in old Princess Anne County in about the year 1630. He was a member of the Council in 1637 and was presiding Justice of the County Court of Lower Norfolk. He died in the spring of 1640.

Sir George Yeardley, Colonial Governor of Virginia, married Temperance West who came to Virginia in 1610 in the good ship "Falcon" a few months before her future husband arrived. (He was knighted in 1618.) He came over in the "Deliverance". They were married several years later and their first child was—

Argall Yeardley who was born about 1621. He married about 1640 but the name of his first wife is not available. She died early. He married secondly Anne Custis of the English family of Political refugees then in Holland. He was a member of the Council and was appointed "Commander of the Militia of Accomac" which then comprised all of Eastern Shore. When 21 years old he married the widow, Sarah Offley, but there was no issue. Surviving children by his second wife, who was the daughter of John Custis, member of the Colonial Council of 1677, were—

- 1. Argall Yeardley II.
- 2. Rose Yeardley.
- 3. Francis Yeardley.

Argall Yeardley III, son and heir of Argall II, married Sarah Michael, daughter of John Michael, of the Commission of Northampton County and

Elizabeth Thorogood, his wife. Children of Argall III and Sarah Michael, his wife, were—

- 2. John Yeardley, who died young.
- 3. Elizabeth Yeardley, who married George Harmonson.

TUCKER FAMILY

Henry Tucker of Bermuda married Annie Butterfield, presumably also of Bermuda. They were both of English descent. Their son was—

Saint George Tucker (1752-1828) who was sent to William & Mary College in Virginia, at Williamsburg, to study law under Wythe. While there he heard the oratory of Patrick Henry and was very much impressed. As the storm clouds gathered he left for his home, very much in sympathy with the colonists. With two other compatriots he hired a sloop and loaded it with gun powder of very questionable ownership. They set sail for Virginia where they proceded to find the proper revolutionists. They sold their gunpowder for enough to fully pay for all of their expenses. They proceeded at once to get in touch with the newly formed Continental Army. His sister, Mrs. Nancy Tucker Lawson, was the subject of one of the famous Romney portraits.

He married Frances Bland who was the widow of John Randolph and the daughter of Theoderick Bland. Theoderick Bland was the son of Richard Bland whose wife was the daughter of William Randolph of Turkey Island and his wife, Miss Bennett. She was the daughter of an early colonial governor.

Note: Three of the sons of John Randolph and Frances Bland were-

- 1. Theoderick Bland Randolph.
- 2. Richard Randolph,
- 3. John Randolph of Roanoke.

Saint George Tucker rose to be a full colonel in the Continental Army. He saw heavy service and was wounded at Guilford Courthouse, N.C. Returning to service he was wounded again at Yorktown when serving on the staff of General Lafayette. After the war was over he returned to his home in Williamsburg, now known at the Tucker House. In 1790 he was given by the college of William & Mary an LLD degree. He was Professor of Law at the college for many years. The son of Saint George and Frances Bland Tucker was—

Henry St. George Tucker, born in 1780 and died in 1848. He graduated in 1802 from William & Mary College in law and in the humanities. He settled in Winchester and there began the practice of Law. He married in 1806 Ann Evelina Hunter. He was made counsel for the estate of Lord Fairfax and the important business thereto attendant. He was elected to the General assembly of Virginia, resigning when the War of 1812 was declared. As the commander of a troop of cavalry he took part in the defense of Baltimore where the British were turned back in 1814. He was next elected to Congress and later on appointed a Brigadier General of Militia by the Virginia Legislature. Opposing a raise in pay for congressmen, he resigned in 1819 and was soon elected to the Virginia Senate. He then introduced a bill for the gradual freeing of slaves which lost by only one vote. In Winchester he established a law school of his own. He was appointed President of the Supreme Court of Virginia. From this he resigned to become professor of law at the University of Virginia. There he established the well known "Honor System" which purports to be the first in the civilized world.

Anne Evelina Hunter was the daughter of Moses and Anne Stephen Hunter. Judge Henry St. George Tucker and Ann Evelina Hunter had six sons and two daughters which included—

- 1. Dr. David Hunter Tucker, who was born in 1815 at Winchester, Va.
- 2. Nathaniel Beverley Tucker, who was born in 1820 at Winchester.
- John Randolph Tucker, who was born on 24th December 1823 at Winchester.
- Colonel Henry St. George Tucker, who was born in 1828 and died in 1863.
- Thomas Tudor Tucker, who died in 1880. He served in the Confederate Army.
- 6. Alfred Bland Tucker, who was born on 4th October 1830 and died in 1862. He was a physician who was in charge of a hospital in Georgia at 32 years old. He moved to Missouri and then to Colorado.

Note: The parents of Henry Tucker who married Frances Tudor of N.Y. and who was born in 1683 and died in 1754, were—

Saint George Tucker who was born in 1651 and who died in 1710 and Jane Hubbard.

Nathaniel Beverley Tucker, born 1820, married Jane Shelton Ellis who claimed descent from Adam Thorogood and Governor George Yeardley. He dropped his Christian name, Nathaniel and called himself Beverley Tucker. (Jane Shelton Ellis was the daughter of Charles Ellis of Richmond). He attended private schools in Richmond and then the University of Virginia. President Buchanan appointed him United States Consul to Liverpool. The responsibility of this office he carried with much satisfaction until Virginia was invaded by union troops in the War Between the States. He felt that duty called him to defend his native state and his people. President Davis sent for him and commissioned him Colonel. He and Mr. Gifford were sent to England and France, reaching the latter in November of 1861, to obtain medicines and money if possible for the Confederacy. He returned to Virginia about a year later and was then sent to Canada to try to trade cotton for beef to be shipped in British vessels. Being infamously accused with others of being in a plot with Wilkes Booth to assassinate Lincoln, he could not enter the United States for several years.

Jane Shelton Ellis was a loyal and understanding wife. Their children were—

- 1. James Ellis Tucker, born near Winchester in 1844.

James Ellis Tucker, was color bearer of Fitzhugh Lee's Cavalry. He was wounded three times. He was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant during the last

year of the war. When the war was over he went to Canada and found his father.

Andrew Johnson, the new president, issued a proclamation which offered a reward for Jefferson Davis and four others, dead or alive, including Ellis Tucker. He had to remain out of the country until the new law was passed. He married Laura Harris and they had two sons, Burling Tucker and Beverley Tucker. After a few years Laura died and the boys went to live with their grandfather.

President Harrison appointed James Ellis Tucker appraiser at the Custom House at San Francisco. He held this office through the administrations of both Harrison and Cleveland. He was then given the job of organizing the appraiser's office for the Port of Honolulu. He married secondly Maye Bourn of San Francisco. There were no children. On one of his visits to Virginia, he came to congratulate his brother, Beverley Dandridge Tucker, upon being elected as Bishop of Southern Virginia. He was buried in the churchyard of the Episcopal Chapel of Saint Mary the Virgin in San Francisco.

Beverley Dandridge Tucker, lived his early years in Virginia. When his father was appointed U. S. Consul to Liverpool, together with his brothers, James and Randolph, he was sent to Mr. Selligs School in Vevey, Switzerland. There they were when Lincoln forced the Southern States into war. Within a few months James left school to make his way across the ocean and through the Union blockade to join the defenders of his state and his home. In Paris he met his father who gave him important papers to be delivered to President Jefferson Davis in person. He procured passage on an English blockade runner bound for Wilmington, N.C. As the ship neared the port by night she was sighted and fired upon when about three miles from shore. Knowing the importance of the papers which he was entrusted with, had to make a quick decision. Conscious of ability as a swimmer and seventeen years old he slipped over the side of the ship and headed for shore. Finally reaching land, he began the long trip to Richmond by means of any transportation that he could find. He delivered the papers to President Davis in person. He then joined Otey's Battery and served until the end of war.

The next period of Beverley Tucker's life was one of exile, living first in Canada and later in Mexico. In the latter country he was correspondent of the London Standard publishing Campany and the Cincinnati Enquirer. Already his son James had reached Mexico, not being able to stand school any more after living as a man for about four years. He had accepted an offer by Colonel Talcott to join his engineering corps in building a railroad from Vera Cruz to Mexico City. He then entered the Episcopal Seminary at Alexandria. After graduation from the Seminary, he married Maria Washington who lived at Mount Vernon and was daughter of John Augustine Washington.

As Maximilian was about to lose his throne, Beverley and his son James, through the courtesy of French Officers, joined other refugees and reaching Vera Cruz took ship for Canada, in March 1867. Again in Canada, he was soon joined by his wife and daughter. In 1871 the family went back to Washington, Johnson having issued his amnesty proclamation in 1868.

He was soon invited to a large reception by Secretary Hamilton Fish. Mr. Fish took him up to meet the President, General Grant. Grant was very cordial and extended his hand which Mr. Tucker took.

Beverley Tucker bought a house at Beverley Springs in West Virginia, a place where all of the family could get together in the summer time. He was a strong supporter in Grover Cleveland's first campaign. President Hayes appointed him Minister to Haiti.

John Randolph Tucker, born 24th December 1823 at Winchester, was the son of Judge Henry St. George Tucker and Evelina Hunter, his wife. He was named for John Randolph of Roanoke, his half-uncle. He graduated in law from the University of Virginia. He was elected in 1891 president of the Virginia State Bar Association and in 1893, president of the American Bar Association. He received the Degree of LL.D from William & Mary, Harvard, Yale and Union College of New York. He wrote his "Tucker on the Constitution". He was a member of Congress from 1875 through 1887 and a great constitutional lawyer. He was professor of law at Washington & Lee University, where the Tucker Building was named for him. He married Laura Powell of Loudoun County, Virginia.

Tunstall was a very active member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church where he was a member of the Vestry. He married Elizabeth Walke Williamson who was born on 6th of December 1821 and died on the 8th of February 1872. He practiced in Norfolk with his brother and died of yellow fever on 24th September 1855. He married Virginia Waller of Williamsburg on 22nd December 1852. She was the daughter of Littleton Tazewell Waller and Margarita Sharp, his wife. The children of Richard Baylor Tunstall and Virginia Waller, his wife, were—

He studied medicine under his father for many years and became one of the leading practitioners in Norfolk. He married on 27th of April 1876, Anne Dornin McIntosh. She died on 7th January 1895. She was the daughter of Captain Charles Flemming McIntosh of the U.S. and Confederate Navies. Captain McIntosh was born in October 1813 and died on the 13th of May 1862 in New Orleans, mortally wounded in a naval engagement with highly superior Union forces. WILLIAM TYLER OF CAROLINE COUNTY, VA.

William Tyler and his wife, Elizabeth Keeling, daughter of Richard Keeling of Caroline County, were living in Caroline County, Va., prior to the year 1750. She died in 1791. Among their children was William Tyler II, wife unknown. Among the children of William II were—

- Captain George Tyler who married Judith Terrell who was born 6th February 1750. He served throughout the Revolutionary war and died 18th January, 1833.
- 2. Elizabeth Tyler, who married George Terrell, brother of Judith.

Captain George Tyler and Judith Terrell, his wife, lived at "River Bend" in Spotsylvania County. They had three sons who were officers in the Revolutionary War. One of these was Captain George Tyler II who commanded a company at Yorktown and witnessed the surrender of Lord Cornwallis. His wife's name is not known. Among their children was—

Henry Tyler who was born in Caroline County on 11th January 1791 and died 23rd September 1866. He married on 22nd August 1816, Lucinda Coleman, daughter of Spencer Coleman and Elizabeth Garland Goodwin of "Pine Forest", Spotsylvania County. The Tylers lived at old "Blenheim" where he was born. In 1840 they moved to Saint Louis, Mo., taking their other children with them, leaving "Blenheim" to George, their eldest son. Lucinda died 2nd April, 1867.

George Tyler of "Blenheim" was born on the 13th of December 1813 and died November 11th in 1889. His first wife was Jane Coleman DeJarnette, daughter of Daniel DeJarnette and Jane Coleman, his wife. His second wife was Eliza Hoge, only daughter of General James Hoge and his wife, Eleanor. Eliza Hoge died 11th August 1846. George Tyler represented Caroline County in Virginia Legislature before and during the War Between the States.

James Hoge Tyler, Governor of Virginia, 1898-1902, after serving as state senator and Lieutenant Governor, was their only son. He was born in 1846. He married Sue Montgomery Hammett of Montgomery County 16th November 1868. She was the daughter of Colonel Edward and Clementina Venable Craig Hammett. Governor Tyler was a prominent stock raiser. His home was called "Halwick" and it was located in Radford, Va. He founded the Presbyterian Church in East Radford which was later named "The Tyler Memorial Church".

Stockton Heth Tyler was the son of Governor James Hoge Tyler and Sue Hammett, his wife, was born at "Bell Hampton", Pulaski County, Va. on the 13th of September 1874 and died 5th September 1943. He married on 16th November 1904 Nelle Louise Serpell, daughter of Goldsborough McDonnell Serpell and Georgiana Clarke, his wife of Norfolk. Their children were—

- Goldsborough Serpell Tyler Jr., born 9th January 1906. He married Katherine Parish of Norfolk.
- James Hoge Tyler III, born 21st May 1910, who married 24th June 1936, Mable C. Burroughs, daughter of Charles F. and Mable Chamberlain Burroughs. Their children are—

TYLER FAMILY EXCURSUS #1

The Hoge family is quoted from "Listen to the Mocking Bird" by Daniel Dunbar Howe of 343 Tophill Road, San Antonio, Texas, 1961.

In 1927, Mr. James Fulton Hoge published "The Family of Hoge", a compilation of a manuscript by James Hoge Tyler, Governor of Virginia, with additions and corrections by James Fulton Hoge.

"About the close of the seventeenth century, 1682, a young man named William Hoge, a son of Sir John Hoge, who was a son of George Hoge, a son of Sir George Hoge of Musselboro, Scotland, evidently in good circumstances, came to America on account of religious persecutions under the Stuarts. He first lived in Perth Amboy, then Delaware, then the Cumberland Valley of Po and finally in Frederick County of Virginia. He married Barbara Hume, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hume of Paisley, Scotland, who had died on the voyage to America in the ship 'Caledonia'."

James Hoge, the sixth child of William and Barbara Hoge was born in 1706. He married, first, Agnes Crawford, and secondly, Nancy Griffith. He was a man of great energy, deep understanding and sincere piety. He died in 1795.

James Hoge II, son of James and Agnes Crawford Hoge, was born in 1742. He married in 1768, Elizabeth Howe, daughter of Joseph and Eleanor Dunbar Howe. She was born in 1751 and died in 1835. James and Elizabeth were buried at Sunnyside, the old Howe burying ground in Pulaski County. He died in 1812.

General James Hoge, the ninth child of James II and Eleanor Howe Hoge was born on the 23rd of July 1783. He married on the fifth of June 1810, another Eleanor Howe who was born in 1792 and who died in 1856. He was a Brigadier General of Virginia Militia, receiving his commission on 19th February 1831. He commanded an area in the War of 1812 which included Norfolk and Craney Island, probably with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. He built his family a brick house known as "Bill Hampton" near his father's home in Caroline County. He died in 1856. The second child of General James and Eleanor Howe Hoge was—

Eliza Hoge who was born in 1815 and married George Tyler on 19th of October 1844. Eliza Hoge Tyler died in 1846. This George Tyler was a representative from Caroline County in the Legislature in 1861. He was born in 1817 and died in 1889.

EXCURSUS #2

Doctor John Woodson and his young wife, Sara Winston, both of London, came over to Virginia on the ship "George" in the year 1619. Their names appear in the census list taken the 16th of February 1623 as living at "Fleurdieu Hundred". Dr. Woodson was murdered by the Indians in the massacre of 1644. They left two known sons, Robert and John.

Robert Woodson who was born in 1634 at Fleurdieu Hundred, about 30 miles above Jamestown on the James River, married about 1656, Elizabeth Ferris, the daughter of Richard Ferris of "Curles". He was a member of the House of Burgesses and a Colonel in the Virginia Militia. Their son was—

John Woodson who was born about 1658 at "Curles", Henrico County, Virginia. He married Judith Tarleton, the daughter of Stephen Tarleton of New Kent County, Va. He died in 1715. Their son was—

Tarleton Woodson who was born about 1681 in Henrico County. On 17th of April 1710 he married Ursula Flemming. She was the daughter of Charles and Susannah Tarleton Flemming of New Kent County, Va. Charles Flemming was the son of Sir Thomas Flemming of Scotland who was the son of the Earl of Wigton. Tarleton Woodson held the rank of Colonel in the Virginia State Militia. The date of his will was 4th December 1761. It was drawn in Chesterfield County and he died shortly thereafter. Tarleton and Ursula left a daughter who was—

Sara Woodson who was born in Henrico County about 1716. She lived until after 1761. She married on the third of April 1744, as his second wife, Henry Terrell, a lawyer and planter who was born 1690 in St. Paul's Parish, Hanover County. He died in 1760. Their daughter was—

Judith Terrell who was born on the sixth of February 1750 in Caroline County, Va. She married in about the year 1775, Captain George Tyler, born in 1755 and died in 1833.

Gilbert de Clare, who was born 2nd September 1243. He was the Earl of Gloucester who married as his 2nd wife, Joan Plantagenet who was born in 1272. She was the daughter of Edward 1st, England's greatest King, and his first wife, Eleanor of Castile, daughter of the King of Spain, Ferdinand III and Joanna, His Queen. The daughter of Gilbert and Joan was—

Eleanor de Clare, who married first, Hugh le Desponser in the year 1337. Their daughter was—

Isabel le Desponser, who married on the ninth of February Richard FitzAlan, the 5th Earl of Arundel. He died in 1376. Their daughter was—

Philipa FitzAlan, who married Sir Richard Sejeaux. Their daughter was—

Elizabeth Sejeaux, who married Sir William Marney. Their son was Sir John Marney.

Sir John Marney married Agnes Throckmorton. Their daughter was—

Ann Marney who married Sir Thomas Tyrrell of Heron. Their son was-

Sir Thomas Tyrrell who married Elizabeth le Brun. Their son was-

Sir William Tyrrell who married Elizabeth Bodley. Their son was-

Humphrey Tyrrell who married Jane Ingleton. Their son was-

George Tyrrell of Thornton who married first Eleanor Montague. Their son was—

NOTE — CONCERNING EXCURSUS #3

Saire de Quincy was the son of Robert de Quincey (Quincy) and his wife, Maud de Saint Liz. She was probably the daughter of Simon de Saint Liz and Maud, his wife. Saire was born prior to 1154 and he died on the 3rd of November 1219. He was the first Earl of Winchester and a Surety for the Observance of the Magna Charta. He married in 1204, Margaret, the daughter of Robert de Bellmont, third Earl of Leicester.

Margaret de Quincy, their daughter, married before 21st of June 1221, as his second wife, John de Lacie, Surety for the Magna Charta. He died 22nd of June 1240.

Maud de Lacie, their daughter, married on the second of February 1238, Richard de Clare, who was born in the year 1222, Earl of Hereford. He died in 1262. He was the son of Gilbert de Clare, (1182-1230), Surety for the Magna Charta, and grandson of Richard de Clare, also Surety for the Magna Charta.

Gilbert de Clare II, son of Maud de Lacie and Richard de Clare, was born on 2nd of September 1243 and died on the 7th of December 1292. He was the Earl of Hereford and Gloucester who married as his second wife, Joan Plantagenet.

EXCURSUS #4

Charles Martel was ruler of the Franks under several weak kings. He ruled with so much justice that he was able to make his office hereditary in his family. He made himself famous by his great victory over the Saracens in October 732, having summoned all Christendom to his aid. He was the son of Pepin Heristal, mayor of the Palace. He won the great Battle of Tours by his determined drive and cold ability as a leader. Back across France he drove the fanatical Mohammedans, pressing them the while. Through the Pyrenees back into Spain he drove them, never to return to the sunny fields of France.

Pepin the Short, King of the Franks, was his son, who died in 768. He in turn was the father of—

Charlemagne, King of the Franks and later Emperor of the West. He was born in 742. He was strong and of great stature. He was exceedingly amiable, a good father and a generous friend in his private life. He died on the 28th of January 814. He was succeeded by his son—

Louis I, The Debonaire, who was born in 778, and, succeeded his father in 814. He married first, Ermengarde, daughter of Ingram, Count of Hasbanis. He married 2ndly, Judith of Bavaria. He succeeded to his father's titles when the latter died. In 829, in consequence of the urgings of Judith who had borne him a son, he divided his empire again and caused such a prolonged and costly civil strife that it eventually brought about his death. He was succeeded by his eldest son. He died in 840.

Lothaire, his son, whose title had been "Earl of Germany", married Ermengarde of Alsace.

Emergade, their daughter, was the wife of a nobleman named Gislebert.

Regnier, Count of Hainault, was their son. He married Albreda. He died in 916.

Gislebert, Duke of Lorraine, was their son. He married Gerberga. He died in 930.

Albreda of Lorraine was their daughter. She married Renaud, Count of Raucy. She died 973.

Emertrude Roucy, their daughter, married Alberic II, Count of Macon. She died in 975.

Bertrice Macon, their daughter, married Geoffrey I de Gastincia.

Geoffrey II, de Gastincia, their son, married Ermangarde D'Anjou.

Fulk IV, Count d'Anjou, their son, was born in 1043. He married Beatrice de Monfort. He died in 1109.

Fulk V, Count d'Anjou, was born in 1092. He was the son of Fulk IV and Beatrice. He married Ermangarde de Maine who died in 1126. They were the parents of—

Geoffrey Plantagenet, who was born in 1113, and died in 1151. He married, the Princess Matilda of England, daughter of Henry I of England. Their son was—

Henry II, King of England, the first Plantagenet King of England, who was born in 1133 and died on 6th July 1189. He married in 1152, Eleanor of Acquitaine, former wife of King Louis VII of France. He ranks among England's greatest Kings. He partitioned England into four Judiciary districts and reestablished trial by jury. His second wife was Eleanor of Guienne. The youngest son of Henry II and Eleanor of Guienne was—

John, King of England who usurped the throne from his brother Richard. He married Isabel, daughter of Aymer de Taillefer. In 1205 his great quarrel with the Pope began. John's arbitrary proceedings and his suspected murder of the rightful heir to the throne finally exasperated the nobles to the extent that they marched upon and compelled him to sign the Great Magna Charta.

Henry III, son of John and Isabel Angouleme, King of England, was born on first of October 1207, succeeding his father in 1216. The Earl of Pembroke acted as his guardian and as Henry approached manhood he showed a character quite unfit for the high office which he held. He married first on 24th of January 1229, Philippa, daughter of William, Count of Holland and Hainault. In 1236 he married Eleanor of Provence which greatly increased the dislike of him by his

nobles and his subjects. The nobles arose under Simon de Montford, husband of the King's sister. A battle was fought near Lewes and Henry was forced to endorse the Magna Charta. A convention was called for the future settlement of the kingdom, and, in 1265, the first genuine House of Commons was summoned. Henry died in 1272. His son was—

Edward 1st, King of England, born 17th June 1229. He married first, Eleanor of Castile in England's greatest royal romance. They had ten children. These two are buried in Westminister Abbey. Edward married secondly Margaret of France, by whom he had two sons.

Edward II was the son of Edward I and Eleanor. He was born on 25th April 1284 and he married on 28th January 1307/8, Isabella, daughter of King Philip IV of France. He was murdered on the 21st of September 1327. Edward II was the first English Prince of Wales. He was an agreeable person with a good disposition. He was succeeded by his son—

Edward III, King of England, was born in 1313 at Windsor. He was proclaimed King in 1327 under a Council of Regency while his mother's (Isabella) paramour, Mortimer, really possessed the real power of the kingdom. The oppression of Mortimer became so intolerable that a general confederation was formed against him. He was seized by this general confederation of the nobles and executed on the 10th of October 1330. Edward, now seventeen, turned his attention to Scotland. With a well organized army he defeated the regent, Douglas, at "Halidon Hill" in July 1333. Edward's attention was now diverted by the prospect of succeeding to the throne of France. Other claims thwarted Edward's. Incensed, he collected a large army and accompanied by his son, the Black Prince, crossed over to France. The vicious battle of Crecy followed on the 25th of August 1346, which was succeeded by the siege of Calais. The Black Prince showed such military genius and drive that he penetrated all the way to the heart of France and fought the famous Battle of Poitiers and took King John of France a prisoner. In a peace agreement the English were given several provinces and districts of France which were entrusted to the Administration of the Prince of Wales (the Black Prince). King Edward died a year after his heroic son, on the 21st of June 1377. His sixth son was-

Thomas of "Woodstock", Knight of the Garter, who married in 1376. Alinore de Bohun, who was the daughter of Humphrey de Bohun. Their daughter was—

Ann Plantagenet, Countess of Buckingham, who married thirdly, Sir William Bourchier, Count of Eu of Normandy. Their son was—

Sir John Bourchier, Knight of the Garter, who married Margery Berner. Their son was—

Sir Humphrey Bourchier who died in 1421. He married Elizabeth, the daughter of Tilney (Freder) of Boston County, Lincoln. Their daughter was—

Ann Bouchier who died on the 29th of September 1530. She married Thomas Fiennes, Knight of the Bath, Eighth Baron Dacre. He died on the 9th September 1533.

Alice Fiennes, their daughter, married Anthony Duckett, Esq. of Yorkshire. She was his 2nd wife.

Allen Duckett, their son, married Joyce Hungate, daughter of Henry Hungate Esq. of Saxon Hall, York. Their daughter—

Ann Duckett, of Saxon Hall, York, married John Beale of London. Their son—

Colonel Thomas Beale, was born in 1619. He married Alice (surname not available) and came to Virginia in 1640, settling in York County. He was a member of the King's Council for 26 years. He was Governor of the Fort at Point Comfort. He was Colonel of the Virginia Militia and a member of the vestry of Bruton Parish Church. He died in the year 1702 and was buried in the garden of his plantation.

Ruth Beale, the daughter of Colonel Thomas and Alice Beale, married John Tiplady of London who came to Virginia in 1639. He died circa 1669 and her will was proven in 1698.

Captain John Tiplady, their son, was born in Virginia. He married first, the mother of their daughter, Rebecca. He married secondly, Rebecca Wythe. He was Captain of the Militia, Justice of the Peace of York County and Burgess from York County in 1677. Will proven 1689.

Rebecca Tiplady, his daughter, was born in York County. She was married before 1696, to Peter Goodwin, the son of Major James Goodwin. His will was proven in York County, Va. on the 21st of March 1731. Their son was—

James Goodwin, who married as his second wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Chapman Crisman. She was born in 1709 in York County. Her will was proven in June 1782. His will was proven in 1757. Their son was—

Robert Goodwin who was born in 1739. He married Jane Tulloch on the eleventh of December 1766. He died in the year 1789 in Trinity Parish, Louisa County, Virginia.

Elizabeth Garland Goodwin, their daughter, was born in Louisa County on the second of May 1768. She married on the 22nd of May 1787, Spencer Coleman of Pine Forrest, Spotsylvania County, Virginia, who was born about 1762. Their daughter was—

Lucinda Coleman who was born at "Pine Forrest" on the 26th of October 1800. She married in Louisa County, on 22nd August 1816, Henry Tyler, They lived at "Blenheim" Caroline County, Va. and moved later to Missouri, about 1840. He died on the 23rd of September 1866.

George Tyler, their son, was born at "Blenheim" on the 13th of December 1817. He died 1889.



Thomas Walke, first of the name in Virginia, 1662, came to Norfolk from the Barbadoes. A patent of 300 acres was granted him by Provincial Governor, Lord Howard. State Land Registry Office shows 194 acres on south side of Elizabeth River, Norfolk County granted by Governor Edmund Andros (April 29, 1693). He was Justice of the County Court 1715-1718 (?) He married, in 1689, Mary Lawson, daughter of Lt. Colonel Anthony Lawson of Norfolk County and left issue—

- 3. Mary Walke.

His executors purchased from his estate, under the terms of his will in 1697 for 150 pounds sterling the land upon which "Fairfield" in Princess Anne County was built for Anthony Walke I (later known as Colonel Anthony Walke I). It became the seat of this branch of the Walke family. He was for many years a member of the House of Burgesses, and Judge of the Princess Anne County Court, dying November 1768 in his 76th year. WASHINGTON - CUSTIS

In 1659, John Custis was Sheriff of Northampton County, Va. He had received his nationalization papers the same year. He was of English parentage, but had come to Virginia with his brother, Colonel William Custis, from Holland where his family had sought refuge as Protestants from England. In later years, Major John Custis was a practicing attorney in Accomack County. In 1650, Captain Edmund Custis, sixth son of Major John, with Claiborne and Gov. Richard Bennett were given an armed fleet with which to reduce the plantations within the Bay of Chisopiock to obedience to Parliament. When the Revolution broke, Capt. Edmund Custis had returned to London, England, to live.

In 1677, when Governor Berkeley arrived, instead of the people receiving him with open arms, they began to make terms with him for redress of their grievances and for liberty of trade against the acts of Parliament. Governor Berkeley did promise the County of Accomack, as well as the rest of Eastern Shore, that it should be free of all county tax for twenty-one years. This was brought about by Major General John Custis and other influential citizens. Governor Berkeley stayed at "Arlington", the home of John Custis while in Northampton County, Virginia.

In 1687, the son, Captain John Custis, became Collector of Customs with Lt. Col. John West for Accomack and Northampton. In this he was tyrannical. He was a member of the Council and a holder of various other offices. He was a charming host at his home "Arlington". In his will of 1691 he requests that 100 pounds sterling be set apart for the maintenance of his grandson, John Custis, who lists accounts of his tobacco in 1760 and 1769 as a well-to-do Virginia planter, but at this time at school in England. In 1703, Madame Tabitha Hill, widow of John Custis II, stated that she would assume the cost of the grandson's education, provided his father did not send him to Oxford.

Several planters were sending their sons to William and Mary College in Williamsburg, Virginia. Among the patrons of this new institution were Capt. John Custis, Nathaniel Littleton, whose grandfather Nathaniel had come over with the first colonists to Virginia, and Thomas Savage. The latter was among the founders of Phi Beta Kappa at the college. Mr. Littleton wrote in his will 1702-3, requesting that his wife keep his son Southy at school four years at William and Mary, or longer if he desired it.

The son of Capt. John Custis, who became a General, Colonel John Custis, married Margaret Michael, daughter of John Michael, Sr., but his second marriage was with Sarah, daughter of Colonel Southy Littleton (above). On February 2, 1695, he gave his age as forty in a deposition. His oldest son was known as John IV and was the heir to "Arlington" and was buried there. William Byrd noted in his diary, "Arlington is a great house, within sight of the Bay and really a pleasant plantation, but not kept very nicely. Here were the worst servants that I ever saw in my life." The house burned later and John Custis IV moved permanently to Williamsburg, but was buried on the old place.

George Washington Parke Custis, grandson of Martha, who married George Washington, the first president, lived at Mount Vernon until the death of his grandmother. He married Mary Lee Fitzhugh. About 1805, he built the beautiful mansion overlooking the Potomac and named it "Arlington" after the ancestral Custis home on the Eastern Shore.

Colonel John West Jr. was the son of-

The Honorable Colonel John West, and Anne, his wife. He was the son of-

Thomas West, 2nd Lord De La Ware, who was born about 1550 and died in 1602. He married Lady Anne Knollys, who was the granddaughter of Mary Boleyn. Mary Boleyn was the sister of Anne Boleyn, one of the wives of King Henry VIII. Thomas West was the son of—

William West, who was created Lord de le Warr on 5th of February 1568. He died in 1595. His wife was Elizabeth Strange, who was the daughter of Thomas Strange, Esquire.

Archer Payne, who married Martha Dandridge, was the son of-

George Payne, who married Mary Woodson and who died in 1744. He was the son of—

William Payne, who married Susannah Merriman.

Governor Alexander Spottswood, (1676-1740) married Anne Butler Brayne, daughter of Richard Brayne and granddaughter of the 11th Earl of Ormond. He was the son of—

Robert Spottswood, Barrister, Lord President of the College of Justice. He was executed Covenenters. His father was—

Katherine Custis Oldfield, wife of Dr. Dandridge P. West, was the daughter of Charles Belding Oldfield and Frances May Wise, daughter of Smith Edward

Wise and Lucy Frances Borum. Lucy Frances Borum was the daughter of Thomas R. Borum and Eliza N. Marchant. Thomas R. Borum was the son of John Borum and Frances Stubbs Robins who was the daughter of Thomas Robins and Mildred Stubbs. Thomas Robins was the son of William Robins and Elizabeth Coleman. William Robins was the son of John Robins and Jane Throckmorton. John Robins, son of Dr. Thomas C. Robins and Mary Hansford. He was the son of John Robins Jr. and Alice, member House of Burgesses.

James Wichard (Wishard) settled in Lower Norfolk County in the year 1654. He married Elizabeth Langley, the daughter of William Langley, Sr., who died in 1676, and Joyce, his wife. James Wichard died in February 1679/80.

Thomas Wishard, son of James and Elizabeth Wishard, was born in Princess Anne County, Va. He married Mary Kempe who was the daughter of John Kempe. Thomas Wishard's will was probated on the 5th of February 1728/29.

John Whichard (Wishard), son of Thomas and Mary Kempe Wishard, lived in Princess Anne County. He was a Justice in 1735 and was Sheriff in 1738. He married Frances Hancock of Princess Anne County, daughter of William Hancock of Lower Norfolk County who died 17th May 1687 (probate). John Whichard (Wishard) died in January 1740-41.

John Whichard (Wishard), son of John Wishard and Frances Hancock, his wife, born and lived in Princess Anne County. He married on 13th September 1732 (gave bond) at Norfolk County, Va., Joyce Langley, the widow of L. Thelaball. She was the daughter of William Langley Jr. of Norfolk County, Va., Captain of Militia, a Justice and a Burgess and he died 16th May 1718 (Probate). His wife was Margaret Thelaball, daughter of James Thelaball, a Huguenot who arrived in Virginia in 1648, in Lower Norfolk County. He died 15th September 1683 (probate). James Thelaball's wife was Elizabeth Mason, the daughter of Francis and Alica Mason. Francis Mason was born in England in 1595 and came to Virginia in 1613. He died in Lower Norfolk County 15th November 1648 (Adm). He was a Lieutenant of Militia, Justice of Peace, Sheriff and Churchwarden. John Whichard moved to Beaufort (Pitt) County, N. C. in 1750.

Soloman Whichard, son of John and Joyce Langley Whichard, was born in Princess Anne County, Va. He also moved to Beaufort (Pitt) County, N. C. in 1750. He married Margaret Jones and he died 14th August 1780. (Last record).

John Whichard III, son of Soloman and Margaret Jones Whichard, was born in Pitt County, N. C. He died on 22nd April 1843 (Division of Estate). He married Frances Elizabeth James. In 1761, Pitt County was carved out of Beaufort County, N. C.

Soloman Whichard, son of John and Frances Elizabeth Whichard, was born on 4th September 1789 in Pitt County, N. C. He married on 8th February 1827, Nancy Fleming, daughter of David Fleming. Soloman Whichard died on 2nd February 1851 in Pitt County, N. C. Nancy Fleming was born in Pitt County, N. C. She died 12th January 1846, in Pitt County. Soloman Whichard was a private in Eason's Company N. C. Militia in the year 1813.

Willis Randolph Whichard, son of Soloman and Nancy Fleming Whichard, was born on 16th March 1833 in Pitt County. He died 10th September 1900. He married Mary Ann Amanda Gorganus, born 15th December 1845, daughter of Henry Gorganus, born 12th February 1818, died 1898, and Lucinda Rogers, daughter of William Rogers of Pitt County, N. C. Mary Ann Gorganus died 20th July 1931, Pitt County, N. C.

Willis Randolph Whichard and Mary Ann Amanda Gurganus, his wife, had the following children—

Note: Mrs. Willis R. Whichard was the daughter of Henry Gurganus. She was born in Pitt County, N. C., in the year 1818. Her mother was the former Loucinda Rogers, the daughter of William Rogers. Mr. Rogers Dey Whichard has recently retired from Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Va. In his possession are the spinning wheel of Loucinda and the fowling piece of her father, William Rogers.

Willis Randolph Whichard was a member of Company E of 55th N. C. Infantry, C. S. A.

Claud Linden Whichard, son of Willis Randolph and Mary Ann Gurganus Whichard, was born 1st September 1867 in Pitt County, N. C. He married on 4th December 1901, Annie Wortham Dey who was born on 21st of April 1809 at Norfolk, Va. She was the daughter of George Walters Dey, 2nd Lieute-

nant Company B 54th Virginia Infantry, C.S.A., who was born 27th October 1835, and died 1st March 1925. He married 7th November 1859 Mary Jane Toy who was born on 12th February 1838 at Norfolk, and died 15th November 1908.

Mary Jane Toy was the daughter of Thomas Dellam Toy and Amelia Ann Rogers, his wife. He was born on 20th March 1814 and she on 8th November 1816. They were married on 21st June 1835. He was born in Norfolk County and she in the city. He died 28th of May 1879 and she died on 13th December 1873, both in Norfolk.

Rogers Dey Whichard, son of Claud Linden and Annie Wortham Dey Whichard, was born on 10th December 1902 at Norfolk. He married 11th November 1933, Virgilia Mason Nash, who was born on 22nd January 1909 at Norfolk, Va. She was the daughter of Francis Fitzhugh Nash, born 5th February 1870 and Annie Celeste Jones, born 20th December 1874.

Francis Fitzhugh Nash was the son of John Leroy Nash and Columbia Martha Thompson, his wife, born 1st February 1844 in Princess Anne County. John Leroy Nash was a private in Company I, 15th Virginia Cavalry, C. S.A. He was born on 4th March 1840 at Norfolk, married 16th August 1866. He was the son of Richard Nash, born 31st March 1803 and died 23rd April 1855, and Camilla Jolliff, his wife, who was born 20th October 1804 at Norfolk. She was the daughter of Richard Jolliff and Mary, his wife.

Richard Nash was the son of Caleb Nash and Betsey Boushell, his wife, both of Norfolk County. They were married on 8th August 1795. Caleb Nash died on 20th of August 1827. He was the son of Thomas Nash IV and Mary Portlock, his wife.

For futher reference see the main line of the Nash Family.

Columbia Martha Thompson was the daughter of Francis R. Thompson and Amy F. Burroughs. Francis R. Thompson was born 9th March 1804 in Princess Anne County and Amy F. Burroughs was born on 13th November 1814, also in P. A. County. They were married on 28th July 1836. He was the son of William Thompson and Anne Ottley who were married on 1st March 1803 in Norfolk, Va.

Amy F. Burroughs was the daughter of William C. Burroughs and Frances, wife. She was born 18th November 1814 in Princess Anne County. She died 18th November 1891.

Annie Celeste Jones was the daughter of William Mordecai Jones and Martha Jordan Lee, of Nansemond County who were married on 23rd December 1868.

William Mordecai Jones was Captain and Assistant Quartermaster of Magruder's Brigade C.S.A. He was born on 21st of January 1840 in Greenville County, Va. He married Martha Jordan Lee on 23rd December 1868 and died on 15th April 1909 at Norfolk. He was the son of Mordecai Jones, born in 1804, of Greenville County and Martha Randolph Grigg who were married on the sixth of November 1934 in Greenville County, the son of John Mason Jones and Nancy Young, his wife. He died in 1856.

John Mason Jones of Greenville County, Va. was born on 13th of October 1835 (Probate). He married on 20th February 1804, Nancy Young who was

born in 1770 and died in 1825. He was the son of Mordecai Jones of Brunswick County, born 22nd July 1744, died 23rd December 1805, and Mary Mason, his wife.

Mordecai Jones of Brunswick County, Va. was born on 22nd July 1741 and died on 23rd December 1805 (Probate). He married Mary Mason. He was the son of—

Richard Jones of Charles City County, Va., who was born in 1639 and died in 1671 in Jamestown. He married Martha Llewelyn, daughter of Colonel Daniel Llewelyn who was born and died in Essex, England, and his wife, Caroline. Colonel Llewelyn was a Justice, Burgess, etc. of Charles City and Henrico Counties. His will was dated 11th of March 1663/4. He was the son of—

William Jones of Charles City County, Va., who was born in 1612 and died in 1690 in Jamestown. He married Emily Betts. He was the son of—

Richard Jones of Warwickshire, England, who was born in 1580 and died in 1660. He married Sarah Griffin.

Nancy Young, wife of John Mason Jones, born 1770 and died 1825, was the daughter of Francis Young of Brunswick County and Elizabeth Bennett, his wife, of Isle of Wight County.

Francis Young of Brunswick County was born in 1713. He was Clerk of the Court and married in 1754, Elizabeth Bennett, daughter of James Bennett and Elizabeth Peyton, his wife. He died in Isle of Wight County. Francis Young was the son of Michael Cadet Young and Martha Sadler, his wife.

Michael Cadet Young was born in Bristol, England, in the year 1679. He married Martha Sadler in 1709. He died in 1759 in Brunswick County, Va. He was the son of Francis Young of Bristol and Martha LeGros, his wife.

Francis Young was born in Bristol, England, in the year 1644. He married in 1669 Martha LeGros. He died at the Battle of Blenheim in 1704. He was the son of—

Nathaniel Young of Bristol and his wife, Sarah Alexander who were married in 1634.

Captain Daniel Llewellyn was a burgess, justice, and, Commissioner of Militia of Henrico and Charles City Counties from 1642 until 1663. He was born in and died in 1664 in Chelmsford, Essex, England, having returned there. His will proved in London.

The Reverend Richard Jones who was the son-in-law of Captain Llewellyn, was minister of Martin's Brandon Parrish, Charles City County from 1650 to 1656. His son was—

Captain Richard Jones who lived first in Prince George County (Bristol Parish) and then in Brunswick County where he died in 1747. From him William M. Jones was the fifth in descent.

John Leroy Nash of Kempsville, Princess Anne County, son of Richard and Camilla Jolliff, born in 1840, married in 1866 Columbia Martha Thompson (1844-1914). J. L. Nash was in Company B 14th Batallion, Virginia Cavalry C.S.A. and later in 15th Virginia Cavalry. He was present at Appomattox. John and Columbia Nash had six children, three of whom left issue.

Charles Rogers married Mary Stanhope, probably in 1796. He died 27th November 1821 (probate) in Norfolk, Va.

Mary Stanhope was born in 1776 and died 19th July 1832 in Norfolk. She was the daughter of William Stanhope who was a Captain of Militia in Loudown County, Virginia in the year 1778. He died about 1780. His wife's name was Elizabeth (surname not available). She was born in 1751. She died at Norfolk on 21st October 1839.

Annie Wortham Dey, wife of Claud Linden Whichard, was the daughter of George Walters Dey, born 27th October 1835 at Norfolk, Va. He married in November 1859, Mary Jane Toy, as previously noted.

William Dey, father of George Walters Dey, was born on 23rd of December 1809 in Princess Anne County. He died 6th January 1857 in Norfolk, Va. He married Margaret Catherine Walters on 20th December 1832. She was born on 19th July 1814, in Norfolk, and died 4th of June 1890 at Norfolk. Her father was George Walters, seaman aboard the U. S. Frigate "Constallation" whose Captain was Thomas Truxton, 1798-1799. He died on 27th March 1815, (probate) at Norfolk. William Dey was the son of—

William Bates Dey who was born on 11th April 1780 at Shrewsbury, N. J. and died in 1832 in Princess Anne County. His wife's name was Susan Spratley who was born on 15th March 1790 at Norfolk, Va. They were married 9th April 1809. She died 22nd February 1853 at Norfolk. His father was—

Lewis Dey who was born on 21st March 1758 at Shrewsbury, Monmonth County, N. J. He was baptized on 7th May 1758 at Christ's Church, Shrewsbury. He married in 1779, Agnes Bates. He died 25th October 1816, Princess Anne County. Agnes Bates was baptized 17th May 1757 at Freehold, N. J. She died in 1790 Shrbs., N. J.

WHITTLE FAMILY

The Whittle family came to Ireland from England and settled in Antrim. The first name available for this record is Luke Whittle.

James Whittle I married in the Parish of Plenavy on 29th June 1726 Elizabeth Donaldson who was his first wife. He married a second time a Mrs. Campbell who was a widow and they had a son who was James Whittle II. He had his own ideas about things and was at one time the only liberal member of the Dublin County Council. He married Mary McNiece who was buried on April 2nd, 1795.

This couple had eight sons and one daughter whose name was Jane. She was born about the year 1768 and was married on 12th November 1799 to "Old Mister William Chaine", formerly of Potglenore, County Antrim. He moved to Muckomore, County Antrim, to enter the linen business of Messrs. Wallace & Whittle. He was a very successful trader, born perhaps in 1777. He married when he was 19 years old and died in 1862 at 84 years old. His wife, Jane, was supposed to be about 16 years older than he and married against the wishes of her family, but she lived very happily.

Her older brother, Conway Whittle, came to the United States about 1783 and found his way down to Norfolk where he wooed and won Frances Munford. They had a son, Conway II, and two daughters. Fortesque Whittle, born 1789, another brother of Jane's came over to this country about 1800 and found and married Mary Ann Davies, born 10th March 1804. They moved to her home in Mecklenburg County. There were nine sons and three daughters.

One of these sons was the Right Reverend Francis Neice Whittle who reached the high office of Episcopal Bishop of Virginia. He was born 7th July, 1823 and married Emily Fairfax, a descendant of Lord Fairfax. There were five children.

Another son of Fortescue and Mary Ann Davies was William Conway Whittle who was Captain William Conway Whittle of the Confederate Navy, born 1805 and died March 6th, 1878. He had been an officer in the U. S. Navy when the war broke out and had resigned. He was placed in command of the port of New Orleans which he defended gallantly until overwhelmed by the great superiority of ships and men of the Union forces. Brigadier General Armstead, C.S.A. in his official report of the battle of Malvern Hill, July 1st, 1862, says—

"Major Cabell, 38th Virginia, noticed the fall of Colour Sargeant Tapley and five others after him, each of whom successfully grasped the Colours and bore them in the charge, and, each of whom was severely wounded or killed. Lieutenant Colonel Whittle then took the Colours and gallantly bore them forward, when he too, while considerably in advance of the regiment, was severely wounded.

"Captain R. T. Daniel, Adjutant of the Fifth Kentucky, being on furlough, volunteered for the fight and was assigned to the command of Company F. He grasped the Colours and cooly and calmly waving them, appeared not to be moving a muscle, save the motion of his arm. He was calling to the Company which he so well commanded to rally around them, when he fell pierced by three balls. As he fell he drove the staff into the ground, still holding it upright until Colonel Edmunds took it from his faltering hands."

This was the great war in which the odds were five to one in man power and forty to one in Materiel, and, which brought forth the greatest exhibition of bravery and tenacity ever shown by the Anglo-Saxon race.

Catherine Pendleton was the daughter of Philip and Isabella Hart Pendleton of New Kent County, Va., and the granddaughter of Henry Taylor of Norwich, England.

James Taylor II was the son of John and Catherine Pendleton Taylor. He married Ann Pollard. Their children were Elizabeth who married a Mr. Johnson, and John. This John was known as the Honorable John Taylor who was born in Orange County in 1750 and died in Caroline County on 20th August 1824. He was a graduate of William & Mary College and married Lucy Penn, daughter of John Penn, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, and a granddaughter of Moses and Catherine Taylor Penn. He was a Delegate from Caroline County in 1781 and was appointed Colonel of Cavalry of the Virginia Line. In 1792 he succeeded Richard Henry Lee in the United States Senate, from which honor he resigned after one year. He served an interim term 1803 and again from 1822 to 1824. He was chosen a Presidential Elector in 1797 and in 1805. He was a close friend of Thomas Jefferson. Taylor County was named in his honor. The surviving children of James II and Catherine Pendleton Taylor were—

- William Penn Taylor of "Hayfield", Caroline County who married Elizabeth Moore, daughter of Bernard and Lucy Ann Hebard (Leiper) Moore.
- George Taylor of "Horn Quarter", King William County, who married first Catherine Randolph, daughter of William Randolph of "Wilton". Their children were—
 - (a) Lucy Taylor who married Charles Carter Lee, son of Henry and Ann Hill (Carter) Lee. He was a member of the Virginia Council and an author and poet. He was the brother of General Robert Edward Lee of Confederate fame.
 - (b) Ann Taylor who married Stephen Decatur Whittle who was Secretary of the Virginia State Convention of 1849-1850. He was the son of Fortescue and Mary Anne Davies Whittle.
 - (c) Eliza Taylor who married Mr. Gilliam.
 - (d) John Penn Taylor who was born in 1838 and educated at the University of Virginia. He left college to join the Confederate Army. Against odds he survived the war and took up farming for a living, settling in Hanover County.
- John Taylor who was born in 1810, at Port Royal, Caroline County. He was educated at the University of Virginia, attending same 1827 through

1829. He became a farmer and lived in Rappahannock County. He married first Miss Woodford and secondly a Miss Gordon. For further reference see Taylor Family.

Dabney—James Cabell Dabney, born October 8th, 1875, at Charlottesville, the son of Dr. William Cecil Dabney and Jane Bell Minor, his wife. He married Mary Beverley Whittle on March 30th, 1910 at Norfolk. He died November 16th, 1961. She was born February 9th, 1879 at Norfolk and died there March 4th, 1941. They were buried in Cedar Grove Cemetery. Their surviving children were—

Randolph—Thomas Isham Randolph of "Dungeness" was the son of General Isham and Jane Rogers Randolph. He married Jane Cary, the daughter of Colonel Archibald and Mary Randolph Cary. Colonel Archibald Cary was born 1720 and died 1787. He lived at "Ampthill", the home of his father, Henry Cary in Chesterfield County.

Colonel Archibald Cary Randolph was the son of Thomas Mann Randolph and Mary Cary, his wife, of "Tuckahoe", Goochland County. Thomas Mann Randolph was the son of William and Maria Judith (Page) Randolph. Colonel Archibald Cary Randolph, born 1769 at "Dungeness" on the James River in Goochland County. He died 14th November 1813 in Clarke County, Va. He married first Lucy, daughter of Colonel Nathaniel Burwell of "Carter Hall", Clarke County; and, secondly, Susanna Grymes, who was the daughter of Philip and Mary Randolph Grymes of "Brandon, Middlesex County. Their complete family was—

- Philip Burwell, who married first, Elizabeth Page, daughter of Robert and Elizabeth Carter Page; second, Susan R. (Nelson) Welford, widow of William Welford. No issue.

Children by the second marriage—(His second wife was Lucy Page Baylor, widow of Colonel George W. Baylor and the daughter of Mann and Anne Tayloe Page of "Rosewell", Gloucester County.)

Major Beverley Randolph was the son of William Randolph who married on 11th of September 1792, Lucy Bolling Randolph who was born 7th November 1775 and died 6th March 1841. William Randolph was born 1st January 1770 at "Chillowe", Cumberland County. He died 5th May 1848. He was the son of Thomas Mann Randolph and his first wife, Anne Cary Randolph. William Randolph was also the father of William Fitzhugh Randolph who married on the 11th of September 1817 Jane Cary Harrison.



WILLCOX FAMILY

In the older records of this family the name is often spelled with only one "L". However for the purpose of family history continuity double "L" will be used.

The name of Willcox was first found in Charles City County under the date of May 15th, 1706. Captain John Willcox sailed ships from England to Virginia from the year 1682 to 1716. He operated from a wharf called "Swinyards" in Charles City County. He was master of the ships "The Lyon" and the "Exeter" The record shows that in the year 1714, his son, John Willcox Jr. sailed with him from England to Virginia. References are "Executive Journals of the Council of Colonial Virginia", Diary of William Byrd and the Journals of the House of Burgesses 1712-1726.

Captain John Willcox Jr. was born about 1690. From the year 1737 to 1755 he was Master of ships sailing from England to the upper district of the James River. Some of his ships were the "Restoration", the "Rappahannock" and the "Sydenham". He acquired land in Charles City County and married there. His wife was probably a Miss Major as the name comes down through the family. His sons were John Willcox (Charles City Militia in 1779), William Willcox (Inventory of Estate 1799), Major Willcox (Inventory of Estate 1798), Thomas Willcox (Inventory of Estate 1773), and, Edward Willcox who was a student at William and Mary in 1753; all of whom are the first Willcoxes found in the records of Charles City County.

Mrs. Hannah Willcox, wife of Major Willcox, made her will July 25th, 1799. It was probated on December 18, 1800 in Charles City County, and mentions her dead son Edward and sons Hamlin, Major, Littleberry, John Vaughan and Thomas, and, her grandson Edward, son of Hamlin and her grand-daughter, Nancy Harwood.

Major Willcox was a Captain in the Continental Army in 1779. In 1780 he was Commissioner of Charles City County. His Estate was appraised in 1798 with John Major as one of the appraisers.

Hamlin Willcox, son of Major and Hannah Willcox, was recommended for Collector of Taxes in 1794 by John Tyler of Greenway. He was on the tax list for 1812. He married first, Suzannah Allen, a widow, who was the daughter of Colonel James Shields and his wife, Suzannah Page, who was born December 26, 1745 and was the daughter of John and Mary Page. The children of Hamlin and Suzannah Allen Willcox were—

- 1. Edward Willcox, M. D., born 1796 at "Riveredge".
- 2. John Vaughn Willcox, also known as "Major".

Children of Hamlin Willcox and his second wife, name unknown, were-

 Colonel James Willcox of "Buckland" who married in 1843, Virginia Christian, daughter of Robert Walker Christian (1790-1846). Thomas Hamlin Willcox of "Northend" and "Belair", Commonwealth Attorney of Charles City County and a member of the State Legislature. He married a Miss Clarke but had no children. He adopted his nephew, Thomas Wyatt Willcox, son of Dr. Edward Willcox.

Dr. Edward Willcox, born 1796, lived at "Riveredge". He was a member of the vestry at Westover Church. He married Jane Christian (his first wife), daughter of Dr. Jordan Collier Christian and his wife, Jane Warren. Their children were—

He was a Captain in the Confederate Army and a member of the Vestry of Napsico church. The son of Thomas Wyatt and Martha Ruffin Claiborne Willcox was—

Thomas Hamlin Willcox, born October 4, 1859, moved to Norfolk and married October 15, 1885, Mary Cary Ambler. She was born September 22, 1861 and was the daughter of Reverend Thomas Marshall Ambler and his second wife, Margaretta Sharp of Norfolk. Her genealogy line is — Reverend Thomas M. Ambler (6), Thomas M. Ambler (5), John Ambler (4), Edward Ambler (3), Richard Ambler (2) and Edward Jaquelin of Jamestown (1).

John Vaughan Willcox, born about 1779, son of Major and Hannah Willcox, married Mary Poythress about 1804. Their children were—


Edward Willcox, who died in 1796 in Petersburg was the son of Major and Hannah Willcox. His will mentions his mother, Hannah, and his five brothers. Hamlin, Major, Littlebury, Thomas and John.

Thomas Hamlin Willcox of "Northend" and "Belair", born about 1800, married Miss Clarke but they had no children. This couple adopted their nephew, Thomas Wyatt Willcox, son of Dr. Edward Willcox, who was an orphan and who stayed with them as long as they lived. Thomas Hamlin Willcox was Commonwealth Attorney for Charles City County and a member of the State Legislature. He was killed in Richmond in 1870, in the great Capitol Disaster in Richmond (fire).




Judge Thomas Hamlin Willcox, born 1859, and Mary Cary Ambler, his wife, had six children—

WILLIAMS FAMILY

The family of Mr. John N. Williams:

Williams is a very old Welch name. The most prominent family was the House of Williams of Penryhn. The Coat of Arms is a sable bon rampant on a field de'argent. The crest is a cock, ready for fight. The motto is "Cognosco occasionem". Also a Welsh motto "What God willeth will be." Sir Richard Williams, grandfather of Oliver Cromwell, assumed the name Cromwell.

The first of this family in Virginia was William Walter Williams, who died in Fairfax County about 1807. His plantation was near Frying Pan Baptist Church where the family lived for many years until moving to Missouri in 1830. Among his children was William Walter Williams II who died about 1807.

The children of William Walter Williams II and Henrietta Wheeler, his wife were—

WHEELER

John Wheeler is the ancestor of the Maryland Wheelers. It has not been determined whether he came from England or from Virginia. A survey was made for him of four hundred acres in Charles County on the 23rd of August 1662. This shown in Book No. 5, page 400, of the Maryland Archives. Again on page 551, Vol. II of the Archives, Captain John Wheeler of the militia is granted for services 2000 lbs. of tobacco. He was a Justice for Charles County in 1687 and a Commissioner of Port Towns. He died before January 8th, 1694.

WILLOUGHBY FAMILY

The following information concerning the Willoughby family in Virginia and in England has been obtained from Hotter's Muster Roll of Settlers in Virginia Manuscript, The Virginia Historical Magazine, The William & Mary Quarterly, Sainsbury's Virginia, The New England Historical and Genealogical Register and records of Mr. William Sharp of Norfolk and those of Anna Robinson Watson. Mr. Sharp contributes "The Eldest Historical Families in England are, (according to Macaulay) Aubrey, DeVere and Willoughby, and it is very satisfying that one can be certainly traced beyond a thousand years."

"Take for example the Willoughby Family. The first of that name was the royal Danish line of England. Even before Egbert and the Heptarchy Kingdom of England, the country was divided into seven principalities, rather than kingdoms, of which the most powerful for many years was the Danish, especially under the celebrated Canute and Sweyn, they being the most formidable of those monarchs. After that time came the Thanes as local descendants of the Sovereigns.

"William the Conqueror was induced to invade England by reason of the hostility of the Dutch element to the Saxon Kings, the last of whom was the unfortunate Harold, whose father was a son of the Saxon Earl of Kent. To secure the powerful co-operation of the Thane of Merlitor, the Dutch element was merged into the left wing of the Norman army, which was commanded by the eldest son of Merlitor. That young man, as a reward for his military services, was elevated to a Baronetcy and took the name of Sir John de Willoughby. Within a hundred years thereafter, Sir William de Willoughby became an aide-de-camp of Richard, Coeur de Lion, in the Crusades. Afterwards he married the daughter of the Royal Aide-de-Camp, a Norman Knight, Sir John Beke of Eresby.

On their return from Palestine, Sir William de Willoughby was made Baron Willoughby de Eresby. From him descended the Norman families of Willoughby, Duke of Ancaster, the Baronial families of Baron Willoughby of Parham, of Willoughby of Middleton, of Baron Willoughby de Brake, Baron Willoughby Drummond and others. The famous colonizer, Captain John Smith, had been on the staff of General Lord Willoughby, who commanded the army of the Continent of Europe, before the discovery of Virginia.

Captain Smith was born at Willoughby in Lincolnshire. The terminal, 'by', as in Willoughby or Eresby, is the Dutch word for town. Sir Percival Willoughby, one of the chiefs of the "London Society for Colonizing Virginia", was a descendant of Lord Willoughby of Middleton, and of course, Lord Willoughby of Eresby. Under the Constitution of the Society, fifty acres of land per person were allotted to patrons of the enterprise who imported at their own expense, persons to the colony. Active in this was Thomas Willoughby, the patentee who later settled in Norfolk County, Virginia, after 1621. He became the owner by Royal grant patents of 12,000 acres of land on Hampton Roads and Willoughby Bay, and it is said that through the influence of his kinsman, Sir Percival, this Thomas Willoughby afterwards acquired by patents 3000 acres on the Atlantic

Shore of North Carolina. This same Thomas Willoughby of 1621 afterwards acquired 200 acres now constituting the most valuable part of the City of Norfolk.

At the close of the American Revolution the legislature abolished all entails. From 1635 up to the passage of that law, the 12000 acres on Willoughby Bay were held mainly by the descendants of the original settler, and the bulk of the manor property was not sold before the year 1890. Seven generations of this family lie buried in the same cemetery at the heel of Willoughby Spit.

The following information is taken largely from Vol II of the "Seldans of Virginia" by Mary Selden Kennedy 1911. "Captain Thomas Willoughby came to Virginia in 1610 in the Prosperous. He was a Justice in Elizabeth City County in 1628. He was a member of the House of Burgesses from 1629 to 1632. He patented large tracts of land in Lower Norfolk County and lesser ones in Elizabeth City County. He went back to England and returning to the colony later claimed as headrights, Alice Willoughby, presumably his wife, and Thomas and Elizabeth, his children. He died in 1658."

Thomas Willoughby II was admitted as a member of the Merchant Taylor's School in London in 1644. He married in 1660, Sarah, the daughter of Richard and Ursula Thompson, of Northumberland County. A patent for land in that county was granted 1649 to Richard Thompson. He, dying, left the land to his two daughters, Sarah Willoughby and Elizabeth Presley. Thomas Willoughby II died in Lower Norfolk County in 1672. His widow, Sarah, whose will was dated 1673/74, recites as sole legatees, a son, Thomas III and a daughter, Elizabeth III.

Elizabeth Willoughby, daughter of Thomas I, married in 1659, as his second wife, Simon Overzee, a Dutch Merchant, who died 15th August 1660. She married as her second husband, in March 1661, Major George Calclough of Northumberland County who died within two years. She married for a third time Isaac Allerton II of Westmoreland County who was a son of Isaac Allerton I, a passenger on the Mayflower in 1620. The will of Isaac Allerton II probated December 1702, names a son, three daughters and a grandson; - Willoughby Allerton, Mary, Sarah and Frances.

Thomas Willoughby III, son of Thomas Willoughby II and Sarah Thompson, his wife, was Justice of Lower Norfolk County in 1699. He sets forth in a deed that he was the son and heir of Lt. Col. Thomas Willoughby of the same county. He married Mary Herbert. Mary was the daughter of John Herbert. She died 1753. Their children were—

- 1. Thomas Willoughby IV.
- 2. A daughter who married the Reverend Moses Robertson.
- 3. Sarah who died unmarried in 1740.

Mary Allerton, daughter of Isaac II and Elizabeth Willoughby married about 1688, John Newton Jr. of Westmoreland County, and later Stafford County. He died October 1699 and Mary died April 1700. Issue—

- 1. William Newton who married Elizabeth Berryman in 1709.
- 2. Allerton Newton, mentioned as deceased in his grandfather's will.

Sarah Allerton, daughter of Isaac II and Elizabeth Willoughby, married Hancock Lee who died 1729 and was buried at Ditchley, Wocomico, Northumberland County. She died in May 1731, at the age of sixty.

Frances Allerton, daughter of Isaac II and Elizabeth Willoughby, married Samuel Travers. There were three children—

- 1. Rebecca who married Charles Colston.
- 2. Elizabeth.
- 3. Winifred.

Major Thomas Willoughby IV married Sarah died in 1753. Their children were—

He

- 1. John Willoughby V.
- 2. Thomas Willoughby V.

- 5. Allerton Willoughby.

John Willoughby V was the eldest son of Major Thomas Willoughby IV of Willoughby's Point, Norfolk. John Willoughby seems to have joined the British forces under Dunmore. He died in 1776. He left his plantation at Willoughby Point to his eldest son John. He left his coat-of-arms and gold seal ring to his son Thomas. One James Willoughby, probably a kinsman, served as a sergeant in the continental line and was killed at Brandywine. His heir was his only brother, Samuel of Norfolk. The wife of John is not known. He had two known children—

- 1. John, the eldest.
- 2. Thomas.

In the year 1767 Henry Willoughby of the Virginia family became the Seventeenth Lord Willoughby by an act of Parliament. He recovered the Manors of Willoughby after a contest in the House of Lords. One of his family in Westmoreland was Willoughby Newton.

The Taylor Family, of which General Robert Barraud Taylor was a member, inherited the Manor Estate at Willoughby Bay. It stayed in possession of the Taylors until taken over by the Federal Government and is now part of the Norfolk Naval Operating Base.

The story of the Willoughby Family by Ruby Haskins Ellis was published some years ago.

Tradition has it that the first Willoughbys had their habitat in a most inviting nook, down beside the willows. Hence the name of Willoughby.

The family has the distinction of tracing their ancestry back to the Danish Kings of England, even before the coming of William the Conqueror. In order to secure the powerful co-operation of the Danish Element, the Conqueror placed at the head of the Danish army the eldest son of the Thane of Merlitor. As a reward for his military services that young man was elevated to a baronetcy and assumed the name of Sir John de Willoughby.

Almost one hundred years later, during the Crusades, William de Willoughby, a descendant of Sir John, became aide de camp of Richard Coeur de Lion. He

was made Baron de Willoughby, of Eresby. From William descended many distinguished families, the Willoughbys of Middleton, of Parham and many others.

The famous Captain John Smith, of Colonial fame in America, was at one time a member of the staff of General Lord Willoughby, who commanded the British army on the Continent of Europe. Captain Smith was born at Willoughby in Lincolnshire.

The distinguished American Colonizer by the name of Willoughby was Sir Percival, a descendant of Lord Willoughby of Middleton and of William de Willoughby of Eresby. Sir Percival was one of the most important members of the London Society for Colonizing Virginia. This Company allotted 50 acres of land to each patron who imported at their own expense persons to people the colony. Thomas Willoughby in this way became owner of Royal patents of twelve thousand acres near Hampton Roads and Willoughby Bay. At Willoughby Point lie buried seven generations of the family and connections.

Captain John Smith, of Jamestown fame, was born in the town adjoining or on the estate of Sir Thomas Willoughby in England and the latter had much to do with Smith's voyages. When he came to Virginia in 1607, it is believed that he brought with him one of Sir Thomas' sons, aged 14 years. Whether this same one or another of the name came over in 1620-1 on the same ship with the Sharps, I know not, although such is claimed. At one time the Willoughbys owned practically all of the Norfolk of that day, but, as they raised only daughters rather than sons it has been very hard to find out much about them. The last male of the original line, Major James Sharp (whose military record is available from the War Department) died about 1845. He and his mother are the only Willoughbys buried in the old Norfolk Cemeteries.

William Willoughby and his wife, Margaret (Marnix) Willoughby, are buried in St. Paul's churchyard. They were the parents of Mary Willoughby who married Colonel William Sharp. It is believed that most of the family's early members were buried in the family burying ground on the estate which was at the head of Willoughby Bay, now filled in and a part of the Air Station at the Naval Base. However you will see the large Willoughby Oak, surrounded by a fence and a tablet marking its history within the Naval Base confines.

The Willoughbys are still a very prominent family in England. One of them was a Lady in Waiting at the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II.

Lord Willoughby's son, Captain Thomas Willoughby (came to Virginia 1607 with Captain Smith). He was the grandson of Colonel Thomas Willoughby.

William Willoughby married Margaret Marnix, whose father was John Marnix, born in Gloucester County, Va. John Marnix commanded a West Indian vessel in 1776.

⁽a) Mary married William Sharp (Colonel) See Sharp.

- 2. Henry Willoughby (Seventeenth Lord Willoughby by Act of Parliament (note*) (date 1767 of this makes him the brother of Wilpiam, but this should be checked).

*Note on Willoughby Dr. Squires in the Norfolk Ledger Dispatch, Friday, September 18, 1942.

... The record, in brief, reads:

"Captain John Smith, who served on the staff of General Lord Willoughby in the Netherlands Campaign, brought Thomas Willoughby to Virginia when that boy was only 14 years of age. He was the founder of the Willoughby family in Virginia. When the lad grew to manhood he received a patent for 12,000 acres of land on the southern shore of the Chesapeake by royal patent from James I. From him a number of the old families of Norfolk and vicinity are sprung, among others, General Robert Barraud Taylor. And the Taylors still held the Manor Estate on Willoughby Bay.

"In 1767 Henry Willoughby of the Virginia heirs became the Seventeenth Lord Willoughby by an act of Parliament. He recovered the Barony and manors of Willoughby after a contest in the House of Lords. Willoughby Newton of Westmoreland is one of the connection."

It should be added that the land on Willoughby Bay in possession of the Taylors in 1888 is now a part of the Norfolk Naval Operating Base. (Full quotation including Sharps in *SHARP* file)



BENJAMIN FRANKLIN WILSON FAMILY

Benjamin Franklin Wilson II was born on 9th December 1834. He married first Maria Frances Edwards who was born in Surry County, Va. 25th February 1845. She was the daughter of Albert Sterling Edwards, M.D. of "The Borough", the family plantation within sight of Surry Courthouse, and, his wife, Marie Louisa Seawell. He married secondly Maria Mildred Seawell, double first cousin of his first wife, who was born on 18th December 1847. She was the daughter of Watt Worthington Contesse Seawell of Greenway, Gloucester County, and Jane Rebecca Edwards, his wife. He came to Princess Anne County just after the War Between The States and purchased a farm on the Indian River Road, extending from the eastern branch of the Elizabeth River southward. Besides truck farming he built several large hothouses and raised early plants which he sold to the farmers for some distance around. He specialized in tomato plants and was very successful in his enterprise. His children by his first wife were—

Charles Bonner Wilson was also a mining engineer.

WOODHOUSE FAMILY

John Woodhouse was the master and owner of quite an estate at Waxham, County Norfolk, England. His wife was Alice Craft. Their son was—

William Woodhouse who was made a Knight by Queen Elizabeth. He married first, Ann Rupp, who died without issue. He married secondly Elizabeth Calthorpe who was the daughter of Sir Phillip Calthorpe and Anne Boleyn, his wife, who was the sister of Sir Thomas Boyleyn. Sir Thomas Boyleyn was later created Earl of Wiltshire and Ormonde. He was the father of Anne Boleyn who became the wife of King Henry VIII and Queen of England.

Children of William Woodhouse and Elizabeth Calthorpe were-

- 1. Sir Thomas Woodhouse who married Ann Wooten.
- Sir Henry Woodhouse I, who married first, Ann Bacon, daughter of Sir Nicholas Bacon, a direct descendant of Edward I, King of England. Sir Henry Woodhouse was born in 1556 and died in 1624.

Sir Henry Woodhouse I was knighted by King James I and was in residence on his estate at Waxham, County Norfolk. He was Keeper of The Great Seal under Queen Elizabeth.

Sir Nocholas Bacon was awarded by the Crown several other manors in the Counties of Norfolk and Suffolk. In the year 1578 he was knighted and he was the first knight promoted to the title of Baronet upon the creation of that order on 22nd of May 1611. He was born in the year 1540 and married in 1564 Anne Butts who was the daughter and heiress of Edmund Butts of Thornage, County of Norfolk. She died in 1616. Their children were—

- 1. Sir Edmund Bacon who was the Second Baronet.
- 2. Sir Robert Bacon who was the Third Baronet.
- Sir Butts Bacon who was the First Baronet of Milden Hall in Suffolk, who was created a Baron 29th July 1627. He married Dorothea, daughter of Sir Henry Warner of Middlehall, who died in September 1657. She died in May 1661. There were three daughters of Sir Nocholas Bacon and Anne Butts.

Henry Woodhouse III, son of Henry II and Judith Woodhouse, married Mary (Spangler (?). With her and their daughter, Elizabeth, he came to Virginia in the year 1637. He received a grant for 500 acres of land from Sir John Harvey, Governor of Virginia. This land lies "within the mouth of the second bay proceding from Long Creek on the eastern side of the Chesapeake." It has been identified as the western shore of Linkhorn Bay, stretching westwardly. Henry Woodhouse III was born in 1607 and he died in 1655. His and Mary's children were—

- Henry Woodhouse IV who was born in 1639 and died in 1687-8. He married Sarah Keeling who was the daughter of Ensign Thomas Keeling.

Henry Robert Woodhouse was born 11th December 1811. With slave labor he built the "Old House" at Alanton, Princess Anne County, which is still standing. His grandparents were Sir Henry and Anne Bacon Woodhouse, noted above. His father was Arthur Sayer Woodhouse and his mother was Jane Byrd Woodside Woodhouse. He married Mary Pebworth. They had twelve children among whom was—

Robert Woodside Woodhouse, the name of whose wife is not available. Robert Woodside Woodhouse Jr. was their son. The name of his wife is also not known.

Robert Woodside Woodhouse II, M.D., (father of the late Dr. Robert W. Woodhouse of Virginia Beach, born 24th June 1885) was born on the 8th June 1854. He died on 11th December 1923. He married Betty W. James who was born on 16th December 1854. They had six children among whom were—

- Edward James Woodhouse, who was born on 9th January 1884 and died 4th November 1967.
- Robert Woodside Woodhouse Jr. M.D., who was born on 24th June 1885 and died on 27th July 1967. He married Helen Wilson of Virginia Beach who was born 17th February 1898. Their wedding took place on 15th November 1930. She was the daughter of Charles Westley Wilson and Annalisa Dering also of Virginia Beach. Helen Wilson Woodhouse died on 27th November 1967.

POPLAR HALL

It was about the year 1640 that the first member of the Hoggard family came to this country. Shortly after that, he obtained from the Crown a tract of land in Tidewater Virginia.

Tradition says that the place name, Poplar Hall, originated from the numerous and very fine poplar trees planted about the house; there is also a story that these trees were brought from England. This, however, seems almost impossible. To begin with, the ships of the seventeenth century were too small, navigation was too difficult and absolute necessities were so essential, that the early colonists could not afford to consider anything else. But, even if the trees were imported and were put out, two centuries later not one of the original growth of poplars remains. Their place has been well taken by pecan trees, which shade the lawn; and add to this, their great commercial value.

The house, a plain brick structure, stands on a slight elevation directly on the shores of Broad Creek, a tributary of the Elizabeth River, which flows through Norfolk County. Though once far from civilization, the dwelling is now almost in the heart of the city of Norfolk. The exact date of its building is not known, but interior and exterior work and design, the type of brick used, and the general atmosphere of the smaller buildings, would seem to place it about 1645.

The large garden, which was used both for flowers and vegetables, still has the original square central beds bound by long, narrow borders on each side. Its dominant feature is a very beautiful and unusual Persian lilac, which stands ten feet high and throws out its graceful branches with a span of twelve feet from the ground upward.

And there are many roses of the old varieties at Poplar Hall. But in the culture of roses, this garden has kept pace with the times. Nearly all of the old-fashioned flowers bloom here at their various seasons, but the lily of the valley, which has naturalized, has spread about the garden in almost tropical luxuriance and is easily the one flower thought of in connection with Poplar Hall. It has been said that at least one acre could be planted out from the lily of the valley roots in this old garden.

Seven generations of one family have lived under this hospitable roof. More than one war has passed over it and left it still unscathed. The fires which wrought such havoc in the city of Norfolk seem to have respected both the age and dignity of "this pleasant country seat on Broad Creek's flowing tide."
