recommended to His Excellency the Governor as proper persons to serve on the Commission of the Peace for this county.

At a Court held for Henry county May, 1782, James Lyon is granted 20/- for 100 lbs. of beef for Captain Eliphaz Shelton's company on their march against the Tories.

At a Court held for Henry county March, 1780, William Tunstall, Esq., having resigned his office as county Lieutenant; Archelaus Hughes, Esq., Colonel is advanced to the said office, and Abraham Penn, Esq., Lieutenant-Colonel to the office of Colonel; and James Lyon, Esq., to the office of Lieutenant-Colonel.

At a Court held for Henry county June, 1780. George Waller, Esq., is appointed Major in the room of James Lyon, Esq.

At a Court held for Henry county 29 March, 1783, James Lyon, Esq., produced a commission from the Governor appointing him Lieutenant-Colonel of the Militia of this county, and took the usual oaths.

Deed dated 22 July, 1784, from James Lyon to John Fletcher, 36 acres of land on Matthews Creek in said county of Henry.

Deed dated 22 July, 1784, from James Lyon of Henry county to James Mankin, 216 acres of land on north side of Russell creek in said county.

MEMORANDA.

I.

This College of Arms is the Official Court of Heraldic Registry of America, wherein armigerous right and rank are established and where symbols are added to the arms of those proven under seal, that the true may be known from the false.

On account of the prevalence of fraud in American ancestry and arms, no claims of distinction thereby are accepted anywhere unless the titles by which they are held are guaranteed by the Heraldic Court of the College of Arms. Costly books on "Famous Families of America" have thus become so worthless by the admixture of the false with the presumably genuine, that their arms and rank are unworthy of notice, and if borne without warrant, are reckoned, in England and America, to be warrantless through inability to obtain the seal of the Commissioners of the Heraldic Court and the symbol of authentication of the College of Arms.

II.

No Heraldic Court will certify to descent from armigerous ancestry unless probative proof is given. Circumstantial evi-

dence of bearing the same name and tradition of origin in the same locality, with official, gentry and proprietary condition in every generation of the family chain, are deemed worthy to give right to bear the same arms, but with a symbol of difference to show that the right, though conceded, is circumstantial rather than documentary.

In like manner, the College of Arms of Canada follows the same law by regarding the *condition* of the *First American Ancestor* as the *criterion* of his *parental condition in Europe* in the acknowledgment of traditionary and circumstantial armigerous descent and rank.

MARKS OF AUTHENTICATION.

I.

Families of the Baronets of Nova Scotia (signed for by the Earl of Galloway in 1908; of the Seigneurs of the Empire (represented by the Duke of Veragua); of the Bannerets of Quebec (represented by the Baroness Dorchester, who founded the Dorchester decoration of the order); of the Seigneurs of Canada and Louisiana (represented by the Baron de Longueuil); of the Manorial and Titular Grantees of America (represented by the Brents of Maryland, next of kin to Lord Baltimore); of the Equestors of the Yellow Rose, Knights of the Golden Horseshoe of Virginia; of the Royal and Military Order of the Mountain Eagle, etc.—all confederated in the Aryan and Seignorial Order—are granted a special coronet over the arms, and are eligible to the Dorchester Decoration of the Empire in the male line, family name of any of the above distinctions. So are those holding matriculation papers from the Heraldic Courts of the Seignorial Nobility of Europe.

II.

First Ancestor to America before 1783, who used armorial seal or who was put on the list for Royal Provincial Council by order of the King, gives Consular rank to his family; to whose registered descendants of family name the Court decrees the *Consular Button* of rank, with *azure octofoil* added to recorded arms.

III.

First Ancestor to America before 1783, who was a landed proprietor and military or civil officer, gives Burgess rank with the button, and red octofoil to such arms as circumstantial evidence before the College decides.

IV.

First Ancestor to America after 1783, who was a man of property and station, and acknowledged by signed and sealed letters of an armigerous family of Europe, duly recorded there to be one of themselves, gives to his registered descendants of the name, the button of Alumna! rank, and the green octofoil of authentication is added to their registered arms.

V.

Those receiving the Button and Diploma of the Heraldic Court of the College of Arms are armigers of the same, ranked with the Armigerous Nobility of Europe by international treaties of comity. Armigers of 16 quarterings are admitted to the Seignorial Order and Decoration.

COURT DRESS.

The Seignorial Order has its own Dress and Decoration of the Empire. The Armigers wear the conventional black dress, but with gilt buttons and epaulettes; dress sword; blue, red or green sash, rosette and button of Consular, Burgess or Alumna! Degree; black felt hat with gilt band; blue, red or green feather.

THE BARONETS OF NOVA SCOTIA.

Their Family History and Armorial Bearings.

From the Archives of the College of Arms of Canada.

In 1611 all the country from Lund Island to the St. Lawrence had been ceded by King James to William Alexander, Earl of Sterling, who was created a Viscount of Canada. The land was divided into feudal fiefs called Baronetcies, the titles of which were conferred on these gentlemen of armigerous race who contributed one thousand pounds each, and who agreed on being invested with the title of Baronet, to occupy the fief in that Province and to sit in the Council of the same as a magistrate.

In 1632, what part of this grant had not been occupied by democratic Puritans, was ceded to France by the treaty of Breda (Acadia), and did not become again the property of the British Crown until 1713 by the treaty of Utrecht. Between 1632 and 1703 (when the last title of Baronet of Nova Scotia had been granted by Queen Ann, the last of the Stuart sovereigns), more than 125 Baronetcies had been created; but while their descendants bear the title of Baronet to-day in Britain, they are not fully and legally possessed of the same until they perform their duty in registering in Canada, according to the terms of the Charter of creation of the Baronets of Nova Scotia. On their registration in the College of Arms of Canada, they are at once eligible to the Council or Senate, with other Seigneurial and armigerous noblesse, and by special concession place over their shield a coronet of thistles alternating with eight balls argent, five being seen in front when emblazoned with the arms.

The following are those families whose historical outlines have been collected.

MACKAY OF FAR.

Sir Donald Mackay of Far was made a Baronet of Nova Scotia in 1627, and elevated to the peerage as Baron Reay in

1628. His wife was Barbara, daughter of Kenneth Mackenzie, Baron Kintail. From him amongst his other descendants who bear right to the Order and the present title was Lieut.-General Alexander Mackay, Commander-in-Chief in Scotland in 1780.

The family descend from Ode Mackay, who obtained extensive territorial grants in Caithness and Sutherland in 1499 and 1507. He was killed in the battle of Flodden and was succeeded by his son Donald, a very valiant and able military commander, from whom came in the fifth generation the first Baronet of Nova Scotia.

Arms.—Azure, on a chevron between three bears' heads coupé argent, muzzled gules, a roebuck's head erased, between two hands issuant from the ends of the chevron, each holding a dagger ppr.

Crest.—A dexter arm from the elbow, erect, holding a dagger in pale ppr., pommel and hilt or.

Motto.—"Manu forti." Seigneurial coronet under a Baronial one.

ELPHINSTONE OF LOGIE.

Sir James Elphinstone of Logie, Baronet of Nova Scotia, 2 Dec., 1701.

Sir John, 4th Baronet died in 1743. His heiress married General Robert Dalrymple.

Arms.—Argent, on a chevron sable, between three bears' heads, erased gules, an episcopal mitre of the first, all within a bordure gules.

Crest.—A dexter hand holding a writing pen full feathered ppr.

Motto.—"Sedulitate." Seigneurial coronet.

ACHESON OF GOSFORD.

Archibald Acheson of Gosford was made a Baronet of Nova Scotia in 1628. He was Solicitor-General and Secretary of State for Scotland. From him descended Sir Archibald,

who was elevated to the peerage of Ireland where his family held lands, as Baron Gosford of County Armagh (1776), and Viscount Gosford (1785). His son Arthur was created Earl of Gosford in 1806, from whom descends the present possessor of all these titles.

Arms.—Argent, an eagle displayed with two heads, sable; beaked and membered or.

Crest.—A cock gules standing on a trumpet or.

Motto.—"Vigilantibus." Seigneurial coronet beneath an Earl's coronet.

ATCHISON OF GLENCAIRNE.

Sir Archibald Atchison of Glencairne was made a Baronet of Nova Scotia, January 1, 1628. The Atchisons of Mount-eagle and the Earl of Gosford were of the same ancestry as of Glencairne.

Arms.—Gules, an eagle displayed with two heads, sable, beaked and membered or; on a chief vert, two mullets of the field.

Crest.—A cock gules on a trumpet or. Seigneurial coronet.

OGILVY OF INVERQUHARTY.

Sir John Ogilvy of Inverquharty was made a Baronet of Nova Scotia in 1626. His wife was Ann, daughter of Sir Alexander Irvine of Drum. This family, like most of those noble families of Scotland that held honour dearer than lands and treasure and as the fount of their nobility, was legitimist in 1715 and in 1745. From him through illustrious and honorable generations is descended the present Baronet of Nova Scotia, Sir Reginald Ogilvy, Hon. Colonel of the Forfar and Kincardine Artillery.

The family traces its origin to the ancient Mormaers of Angus, one of the seven great hereditary chiefs of Scotland, who in the XI century were granted the feudal designation of Earl on the introduction of the Franco-Norman feudality into Scotland. Gilibrìde, Earl of Angus, tempo. David I

had three sons, one of whom Gilbert assumed the name of Ogilvy from the lands which he held in 1172. From him besides the Baronets of Nova Scotia descend the Earls of Airlie.

Arms.—Quarterly: 1st and 4th, argent, a lion pass. gard., gules, gorged with an open crown, and crowned with a close imperial one, or, for OGI^LVY; 2nd and 3rd, argent, an eagle displayed, sable, beaked and membered gules for RAMSAY.

Crest.—A demi-lion rampant gules, armed azure. Seignurial Coronet.

OGILVIE OF BANFF.

Sir James Ogilvie of Banff, Baronet of Nova Scotia, 30 July, 1627.

Lord Banff bore the title in 1800.

Arms.—As Ogilvie of Carnousie.

Crest.—A lion's head, erased gules.

Supporters.—Dexter, a man in armor with target ppr.; sinister, a lion gules.

Motto.—"Fideliter."

OGILVIE OF CARNOUSIE.

Sir George Ogilvie of Carnousie, Baronet of Nova Scotia, 24 Sept, 1626. Of the family of Lord Banff.

Arms.—Quarterly: 1st and 4th., argent, a lion passant gardant gules, imperially crowned or; 2nd and 3rd., argent, three papingoes vert, beaked and membered gules.

Crest.—A lion's head, erased gules.

NICOLSON OF LASWADE.

Sir John Nicolson of Laswade, Baronet of Nova Scotia, 27 July 1629. Sir Arthur, 7th Baronet was living in 1828.

Arms.—Or, three falcons' heads, erased gules, beaked argent.

Crest.—A demi-lion or.

Supporters.—Two eagles or, armed gules.

Motto.—"Generositate."

NICOLSON OF CARNOCK.

Sir Thomas Nicolson of Carnock, Baronet of Nova Scotia. Various origins have been claimed for this family. Some believe that in the Franco-Norman period they came into Scotland from England; others that they derive their descent from MacNichol, a Highland chief. At any rate, they have been among the noblesse of Scotland as far back in feudal times as most of the great families.

Arms.—Or, a lion's head between three falcons' heads, erased gules; a bordure of the last. Seignorial Coronet.

LEVINGSTON, EARL OF NEWBURGH.

Sir John Levingston, a stanch Cavalier of King Charles I was made a Baronet of Nova Scotia in 1626. His son James, was elevated to the peerage of Scotland as Viscount Newburgh in 1647. For his self sacrifice and devotion to the principles of the constitution and monarchy during the Puritan usurpation he was made Earl of Newburgh by King Charles II in 1660. He married 1st, Catherine, daughter of Theophilus Howard, Earl of Suffolk; 2ndly, Anne, daughter of Sir Henry Poole. Her son Charles had a daughter and heir who married in 1724, Charles Radcliffe, 4th Earl of Derwentwater, which family gave such heroic testimony to its grandeur of soul by its noble sacrifice for the cause of legitimacy in 1715 and 1745. The Radcliffe family, which was of Franco-Norman origin, inherited the Baronetcy of Nova Scotia, from whence it passed to the next heir Lady Ann Clifford, whose only child the Countess Cecelia married in 1757, Benedict, 5th Prince Giustiniani unto whose descendant this title of Baronet of Nova Scotia as well as that of Earl of Newburgh has passed.

The Levingstons descend from a noble of North England who in 1070 came into Scotland and founded the Leving estate, called Leving's-Town. From him descended Sir John Lev-

ingston of Kinnaird, the 1st Baronet, a younger branch of the family of Sir John of Callendar, who was also ancestor of the Earls of Callendar and Linlithgow.

Arms.—Quarterly: 1st, bendy of six argent and gules, on a chief of the last a cross of the first, for BANDINI; 2nd, gules, a tower, ppr., on a chief or, an eagle displayed sable for GIUSTINIANI; 3rd, or, a lion rampant sable for MAHONY; 4th, chequy or and azure a fesse gules for CLIFFORD; 5th, argent on a bend gules between three gilliflowers slipped ppr., two and one, an anchor of the field, all within a tressure flory-counter-flory, vert for LEVINGSTON; 6th, gules, on a bend argent, a grasshopper ppr., for GRILLO, DUKE OF MONTDRAGONE.

Seigneurial Coronet beneath a princely one.

DUNBAR, BANNERET OF QUEBEC.

William Dunbar, was a Major beneath the Royal Standard in the War of 1775-83 in North America, and by the Loyalist Act of 1789 of Quebec was entitled to an hereditary mark of Honour with the other military and civil officers who "joined the Royal Standard before the Treaty of Separation of 1783." This "mark of Honour" was determined by the Aryan and Seigneurial Order to be "Banneret of Quebec of the United Empire." He was son of Sir George Dunbar, Baronet of Nova Scotia of the Dunbars of Mochrum. He married in Canada, a daughter of the Count de Chambaud, and had two daughters, Mariel, who married George Selby, M. D., of Montreal, in whose line the title descends, and Jessy, married to Ralph Henry de La Bruyere of the Royal Engineers in Canada.

Arms.—Same as of Dunbar of Mochrum.

LIVINGSTON OF DUNNYPACE.

Sir David Livingston of Dunnypace, Baronet of Nova Scotia, 30 May, 1625. The last to bear this title was Admiral Sir Thomas Livingston, 1843.

Arms.—Argent, three cinquefoils within a double tressure flory counter-flory gules.

LIVINGSTON OF KINNAIRD.

Sir John Livingston of Kinnaird, Baronet of Nova Scotia, 29 June, 1627, afterwards Viscount Kinnaird. His grandson was Charles, 2nd Earl of Newburgh, died 1694.

Arms.—Argent on a bend between three gilliflowers gules, an anchor of the first, a double tressure flory counter-flory vert.

Crest.—A Moor's head couped ppr. banded gules and argent with pendants argent at his ears.

Supporters.—Dexter, a savage wreathed head and middle with laurel ppr.; sinister, a horse argent furnished gules.

Motto.—"Si je puis."

LIVINGSTON OF CALLENDAR.

Sir Alexander Livingston, Baronet of Nova Scotia, 20 July, 1685. He was son of the Earl of Callendar.

Arms.—Quarterly 1st and 4th for LIVINGSTON; 2nd and 3rd, sable, a bend between six billets or, for CALLENDAR.

Crest.—A dexter hand holding a sword, ppr.

Motto.—"Et domi et foris."

ELLIOT, EARL OF MINTO.

Gilbert Elliot of Stobs, was made a Baronet of Nova Scotia, 19 April, 1700. He was a Lord of Sessions with the title of Lord Minto. His son and successor Sir Gilbert had among other issue Andrew Elliot, Royal Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New York. His eldest son, Sir Gilbert, 3rd Baronet, married the heiress Agnes-Murray Kynynmound of Melgund. His son the 4th Baronet was Viceroy of Corsica up to 1797, Baron Minto and Governor-General of Bengal and Earl of Minto in 1813, from whom descended the present Baronet and Earl who is Viceroy of India, having been the radical-liberal appointee to that position as well as to a former one of Governor-General of Canada, whose term of office was sullied by extreme subserviency to parliamentary radicals in signing the recall of the King's Commander, Lord Dundonald,

at their clamorous instance, and thus ignorantly lowering the prestige of the office which he held, at least, as nominal representative of the King.

The family of Elliot originated on the borders between England and Scotland, and had obtained some renown in the border frays pro and con with the ebb and flow of what fortune might bid for in the wars of the two countries in the ancient days of their separate nationalities.

Arms.—Quarterly: 1st and 4th grand quarters, quarterly 1st and 4th, argent a bugle-horn sable, stringed and garnished gules; on a chief azure, three mullets of the first for MURRAY; 2nd and 3rd, azure, a chevron argent, between three fleurs-de-lis or, for KYNYNMOUND; 2nd and 3rd grand quarters, gules on a bend engrailed or, a baton azure, within a bordure vair for ELLIOT; over all a chief of augmentation argent; charged with a Moor's head, coupé in profile, ppr., being the arms of Corsica.

Crest.—A dexter arm embowed, issuant from the clouds, throwing a dart, all ppr.

Motto.—"Suaviter et fortiter." Seigneurial Coronet under an Earl's.

ELLIOT OF HEADSHAW.

Sir Gilbert Elliot of Headshaw, Baronet of Nova Scotia, 19 April, 1700.

Arms.—Gules, on a bend engrailed or, a baton azure, within a bordure vair.

Crest.—A dexter hand issuant of a cloud, throwing a dart, ppr.

Motto.—"Non eget arcu." Seigneurial Coronet.

ERSKINE, EARL OF MAR AND KELLIE.

Sir Charles Erskine of Cambo was made a Baronet of Nova Scotia, in 1666. He was Lyon King of Arms of Scotland. His father was Sir Thomas Erskine of Gogar, Earl of Kellie, whose father, the 5th Lord Erskine was Guardian of

King James VI and Governor of Stirling Castle. Sir Alexander, the 2nd Baronet was also Lyon King of Arms for Scotland 1681. His wife was a cousin, Ann Erskine, daughter of Alexander, 3rd Earl of Kellie. Sir Charles Erskine, 6th Baronet of Nova Scotia, on the extinction of the direct line of the Earls of Kellie succeeded as the 8th Earl in 1795, and on his death, unmarried in 1799, his uncle, Thomas, son of Sir Charles the 6th Baronet, succeeded as 9th Earl of Kellie, since which time the succession has been direct to the present day.

The family of Erskine, probably Franco-Norman like most of the feudal aristocracy, took their name from the lands of Erskine on the Clyde, which they held in feudal tenure as early as the days of King Alexander II. Henry de Erskine was Baron in 1220. From him came Sir Robert de Erskine, Grand Chamberlain of Scotland 1356, and Constable of Sterling Castle after 1368. From him came Sir Robert who was Earl of Mar in 1438, and from him came John, Earl of Mar, Secretary of State for Scotland in 1706, who raised the Standard for legitimacy and the Stuarts in 1715. He was granted the title of Duke of Mar with the parchment to sign of the Marquisate of Garioch by King James VII, the latter title of which he bestowed on his relative John Erskine de Mar, who, on the failure of the Cause fled to America and landed at Kittery on the coast of New England in 1719, with whose posterity the legitimist title rests.

Arms.—Quarterly: 1st and 4th, argent a pale sable for ERSKINE; 2nd and 3rd, a bend between six crosses-crosslet fitchee for MAR; over all a shield gules, thereon the Royal Crown of Scotland within a double-tressure flory-counter-flory or.

Crests.—A hand holding a dagger ppr. for ERSKINE; another with a dem; lion gules, armed argent for KELLIE.

Mottoes.—"Je pense plus" for ERSKINE, 2nd "Decori decus addit avite" for KELLIE. Seigneurial Coronet under an Earl's Coronet.

ERSKINE, EARL OF ROSSLYN.

Charles Erskine of Alva, was made a Baronet of Nova Scotia, 30 April, 1666. His father was Sir Charles of Alva, 4th son of John Erskine, Earl of Mar, K.G., Treasurer of Scotland, by his marriage with Mary, daughter of Esme Stewart, 1st Duke of Lenox. His descendant, Sir James St. Clair Erskine inherited the Earldom of Rosslyn by the death of his maternal uncle, Alexander Wedderburn, Lord High Chancellor of Gt. Britain, who was the 1st Earl of that name. The present Earl and Baronet as well as younger lines in America are descended from this bearer of the title. A sketch of the family has been given elsewhere.

Arms.—Quarterly: 1st, argent, a cross engrailed sable for ST. CLAIR; 2nd, argent, a pale sable for ERSKINE; 3rd, azure, a bend between six crosses-crosslets fitchee or, for MAR; 4th, argent on a chevron gules, between three roses of the last barbed vert, a fleur-de-lys of the field for difference, for WEDDERBURN.

Motto.—"Fight." Seigneurial Coronet beneath an Earl's.

GRANT, EARL OF SEAFIELD.

Sir Ludovico Grant succeeded to the Baronetcy of his uncle Colquhoun, Baronet of Nova Scotia (which was conferred in 1625), in 1704. He married Margaret, daughter of James Ogilvie, Earl of Seafield and Findlater, and his posterity on the extinction of the Ogilvie name succeeded to that title, while holding the Colquhoun title of Baronet of Nova Scotia, but there are younger lines of Grant in America, who are entitled through this line to enrollment in the Aryan and Seigneurial Order. The family of Grant has been given under the Barony and Seigneurie of Longueuil in these papers.

Arms.—Quarterly: 1st and 4th grand quarters, quarterly, 1st and 4th, argent, a lion passant guardant gules imperially crowned ppr. for OGILVIE; 2nd and 3rd, argent a cross engrailed sable for ST. CLAIR; 2nd and 3rd, gules three antique crowns or for GRANT.

Seigneurial Coronet beneath an Earl's.

LYON FAMILY.

Contributed by Dr. J. L. Miller.

Bible records of Col. James Lyon, Sr., of Henry County, Va., now in possession of Mrs. Helen Deas of New York City, a daughter of Hon. Francis Strother Lyon of Alabama, shows the following:

"Col. James Lyon, born in March, 1736, departed this life the 29th Dec., 1817, in the 81st year of his age." (In Stokes County, N. C.)

"Christiana Lyon (1st), wife of Col. James Lyon, died Feb. 23, 1784."

"Maj. Stephen Lyon, oldest son of James and Christiana Lyon, departed this life on the 20th of May, 1820, in Granger County, Tenn."

"Humberson Lyon, departed this life the 20 July, 1793."

"Sarah Lyon, second wife of Col. J. S. Lyon, departed this life 6th August, 1815, in Stokes County, N. C."

"James Lyon, born in Henry County, Virginia, Dec. 25, 1778, died in Stokes County, N. C., August 30, 1849. Son of Col. James Lyon." James Lyon, Jr., married in April, 1797, Behethland Gaines and had sons James Gaines Lyon and Francis Strother Lyon, both of Alabama.

Feb. 28, 1795, James Lyon, Sr., purchased a tract of land in Patrick County, Va.; and Dec. 25, 1797, James Lyon, Sr., James Lyon, Jr., and Miller Easley conveyed the same to Gabriel Penn. No other Lyon appears in the Patrick records until in 1863 the inventory and sale bill of the estate of a James Lyon was recorded.

The Preston Register shows that a Stephen Lyon was killed by the Indians in 1754 on the Holston River, in Washington County. He may have been a brother of James Lyon of Henry County, and may have been the father of the Kentucky Lyon emigrants.

The Journal of Capt. Robert Wade shows that a James Lyon was a member of his company of men who made an expedition on New River against the Indians on Saturday, August 12, 1758. Perhaps this was James of Henry County, who at that time might have been a resident of Washington.

The old Fincastle surveys show that a Humberson Lyon had a survey on May 26, 1774, for 343 acres of land on the North Fork of Holston River, in what later was Washington County. The Military rosters of this county for 1777-1782 give the names of Lt. Humberson Lyon, Capt. Humberson Lyon (probably the same man), and Lt. William Lyon. Summer's Hist. of Southwest Va. gives in a list of those killed at the Battle of King's Mt. the name of Lt. Humberson Lyon.

THE KENTUCKY LYON FAMILY.

Joseph Lyon, was settled on Lyon's Run, Mercer County, Ky., in Dec., 1775, when he with 83 other inhabitants of "that part of North America now dominated Transylvania" signed and sent to the Virginia legislature an energetic protest against

the unreasonable demands of Col. Richard Henderson and his company, and praying to be taken under the protection of the government of Virginia.

In 1785 he contributed to the erection of "New Providence" Presbyterian church in Mercer County, also to be used for school purposes.

Sept. 26, 1803, Joseph Lyon and wife Jane conveyed to Ezekial Lyon, 80 acres "on Lyon's Run," Mercer Co., Ky. When this land came into his possession can not be learned. The 80 acres was but a part of the tract. July 24, 1803, Joseph Lyon purchased 250 acres on McAfee's Run, Mercer County; and July 22, 1810, a tract of 150 acres on Lyon's Run.

Sept. 18, 1833, John Lyon gave to brother Robert Lyon a quit-claim deed to their father Joseph Lyon's estate.

Oct. 4, 1842, Joseph Lyon's heirs, viz.: Nancy Kennedy, Stephen, George, John, and Robert Lyon, by Commissioner made partition deeds to John and Robert. Stephen Lyon (my great grandfather) married in 1819 Anne Curran, daughter of James and Sarah McAfee Curran, and granddaughter of Robert McAfee, the younger of the McAfee brothers, famous as early explorers and settlers in Mercer County, Ky. She was a niece of Gen. Robt. Breckenridge McAfee, who was Lt-Gov. of Kentucky 1824-'28, a member of the two branches of the Ky. Legislature for twenty years, U. S. Minister to the U. S. of Colombia 1833-'37, etc.

Ezekial Lyon, supposed to have been a brother of Joseph Lyon, was also settled in Mercer County for several years prior to 1800, though the deed for his first tract of land in this county is not of record in the county except when he conveyed it away later. Dec. 26, 1797, is the date of first deed Ezekial Lyon recorded in Mercer. However, his son David Lyon had a deed for 100 acres on Salt River, Mercer Co., Va., from Geo. & Susannah McAfee on Apr. 28, 1789. And Ezekial's son John Lyon had a deed for 130 acres in Mercer Co., Ky., from Heirs of Job Hale on May 26, 1795.

Ezekial Lyon's will prob. in July, 1839, left good estate to wife, Martha and sons and daughters. Stephen, John, David,

William, Polly Cochran, Sally Renear, Elizabeth Cochran, and Susan Lyon, and the children of a deceased daughter who had married Jos. McGee.

The Mercer records contain much other data of the later descendants of Joseph and Ezekial Lyon, among whom the names of James and Stephen appear.

HILL OF MIDDLESEX.

In the "Baltimore Sun" of March 1, 1908, an erroneous pedigree of the early history of the Hill family was published. The following data has been compiled from the existing records of the county:

There were two families of the same name residing in Middlesex, viz.: Thomas Hill and his wife Ann, of whom we are about to speak, and a William Hill, who also had a wife Ann. What degree of relationship existed, if any, between these two men the records do not show.

The "Sun" pedigree states, without the least attempt at authority, that "Thomas Hill married Ann Russell, who was descended from Sir William Russell, or John Russell, who came to Virginia about 1620." Such an assertion is ridiculous. There was no Sir William or Sir John Russell in Virginia at that date, or, in fact, at any other date. It is quite possible that Thomas Hill did marry an Ann Russell, as there was a family living in Middlesex of that name, and Thomas Hill's grandson was named Russell Hill. The "Sun" writer also states that Thomas Hill's father was William Hill. There was a William Hill who was buried in the churchyard of Christ Church 12 Feb., 1669, but there is no evidence that he was the father of Thomas. According to the parish register and the will and deed books, Thomas and Ann Hill had the following issue:

1. Mary, born 14 Feb., 1678.
2. Rebecca, born 30 August, 1682.
3. William, baptized 20 July, 1684.

4. Rebecca (2nd of the name), born 28 Nov., 1686; m. 31 Dec., 1704, to John Hughes.

6. Richard, born ———.

Several of the early record books of Middlesex have been lost, and the will of Thomas Hill is missing. From the Court Order book we find that "Mr. Thomas Hill was a member of the county militia 23rd November, 1687." Richard Hill, a son of Thomas, left a will dated 18 Jan., 1731, probated 2 May, 1732. He left no living issue, and devises most of his estate to his brother William and the latter's children.

William Hill, son of Thomas and Ann Hill, married 7 Sept., 1710, Frances Needles. According to the "Sun," she was a daughter of John Needles and his wife Elizabeth Mann. This is a mistake. There is no record of the above named having a daughter Frances; it was Mr. William Needles and his wife Dorothy who had a daughter named Frances, born 19 March, 1690. (Par. Reg.) Issue of William Hill and his wife Frances:

Russell Hill, 4th son of William and Frances Hill, married 11 April, 1738, Anne, a daughter of Stokeley and Ann Towles of Middlesex, born 23 April, 1719. They moved to what is now Culpeper and had issue:

1. Frances, born 25 Feb., 1738; died 12 March, 1738.
2. William, born ———: married Mary Jane Wood.

3. Henry, born 1743.
4. Frances, 2nd of the name, born ———.

Henry Hill, 2nd son of Russell and Anne Hill, died 12 Sept., 1815. He married Ann Powell, born 10 March, 1752, a daughter of Captain Ambrose Powell, born 18 Sept., 1713, died 18 Sept., 1788; married 10 March, 1752, to Mary Bledsoe, who died 10 Jan., 1802, a daughter of Captain William Bledsoe and Mary, his wife. Henry Hill served as Captain in the Revolutionary War from 1777 under Col. James Barbour (War Dept., File S, 7771). According to the family records, he was promoted to the rank of Colonel, and served under "Light Horse" Harry Lee. Henry Hill and his wife Ann had issue:

1. Colonel Robert Hill, born 7 Oct., 1772; died 14 Aug., 1824; married Judith Chapman and left issue.
2. Frances, born 5 August, 1775; died 1853; married Henry Field and left issue.
3. William, born 11 May, 1779; died 10 July, 1803.
4. Henry, born 5 October, 1782; died — Feb., 1846; married Mattie Payne.
5. Captain Ambrose Powell Hill, born 13 March, 1785; died 26 Feb., 1858; married 10 Feb. (1st wife) Fannie Twyman, born 27 April, 1789; died 18 Sept., 1820; daughter of William Twyman, born in Culpeper in 1754, and was Orderly Sergeant in the Revolution from 1777 to 1781, being at the siege and surrender of Yorktown. Captain Ambrose Hill was Captain of the Culpeper Minute Men during the War of 1812; member of the State Legislature and Senate for 20 years. He left issue.
6. Ann, born 5 Oct., 1786; died 30 Sept., 1842; married Rev. Thornton Stringfellow.
7. Thomas, born 3 Oct., 1789; died 5 Jan., 1857; married Frances R. Baptist, and was the father of the celebrated Confederate General Ambrose P. Hill, born 1825; killed at Petersburg, 2 April, 1865.

Needles Hill, born 12 August, 1725, son of William and Frances Hill; married 1st Jane Morgan, by her he had a son Humphrey, born in 1755. It is evident he married 2nd Letitia Morgan, Marriage Bond, 4 Oct., 1758, who may have been a sister of Jane. The will of William Morgan of Midd., probated 3 April, 1764, mentions his daughter Letitia Hill and his son-in-law Needles Hill, who was one of the exors. Needles Hill had three known children, the first at least by Jane:

3. Mary.

WAR DEPARTMENT RECORDS.

Christopher Freeman, served as soldier in the Virginia Infantry, Revolutionary War. His name appears on a list of soldiers of the Virginia Line Continental establishment, which shows that a certificate for 29 pounds 12 shillings, the balance of his full pay, was on December 1, 1785, received by a Mr. Wilkins. (Adjutant General's Office. 1763928 A.)

William Twyman of Culpeper, served as Orderly Sergeant in the Revolutionary War. Enlisted August or September, 1777, for 2 months and served under Captain Henry Hill, James Barbour Pendleton, Colonel. Re-enlisted Jan., 1781, for 2 weeks under Captain Henry Towles. Re-enlisted May, 1781, for 2 months under Captain Joseph Wood. Re-enlisted Sept., 1781, for 2 months under Captain James Clark, Colonel Allcock, commander. Was engaged in the siege and surrender of Yorktown. He was born in 1754 and made his application for pension 27 Sept., 1832, from Madison County. His claim was allowed. He was alive in 1840, as given in the Revolutionary Census taken in that year. (Department of Pensions. S. File 7771.)

NOTES AND QUERIES.

Another book on the Carters of Lancaster County is on the press. Dr. J. L. Miller, of Thomas, West Va., is the editor and compiler. The present volume concerns the descendants of Captain Thomas Carter, of "Barford," Lancaster, 1652. It gives side lights on many prominent Virginia families and is compiled from data gathered from original public and private records. From our own personal acquaintance with the author, we can assure subscribers that they will obtain a book that is reliable in what it sets forth on the family history.

We frequently receive letters from clients in which they say: "I wrote to the county clerk, but he did not reply. Can you tell me the reason?" Yes, there are several reasons. In the first place, the clerk is not a genealogist. He is paid to do the duties of his office, not to hunt pedigrees. Secondly, the queries as a rule are so garbled that it would require an expert to find out what was wanted. Finally, the old Virginia clerk with his courtly manners is fast disappearing, and the political appointee holds his office. When you find a politician who is willing to do some hard record searching for a few dollars, let us have his name. We can keep him busy ourselves.

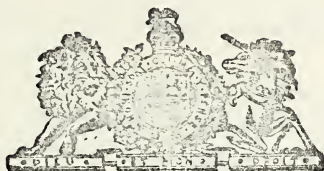
The lax method of keeping the old records in many of the Virginia court houses will cost the historian dear before many years are past. Last May the records at Williamsburg were destroyed by fire. They were simply invaluable, as many of them were copies of wills, the originals of which had previously been destroyed by fire at the burning of Richmond. A few years ago, we compiled a small book on the wills then at Williamsburg. Only 100 copies were printed, so that the holders of copies are lucky indeed to possess one. The angel of fire is hovering over several other court houses that we wot of.

We now possess a complete MS. copy of the old Farnham Parish Register, Richmond County, births, deaths and marriages from 1672 to 1800. Clients desiring copies of extracts may have same—for a consideration.

We do not send any of our printed books on Virginia on approval. There are too many "dead beats" hunting pedigrees to suit us. We would like to hear from the D. A. R. person living in Bardstown, Ky., who purchased a book from us three years ago, and to the sending of some half dozen communications, registered letters included, she does not deign to reply. We constantly receive orders for books on approval, the would-be purchasers saying they belonged to the Colonial Dames or the D. A. R., using these organizations as a sort of Bradstreet. It makes no difference to us. The rule is cash in advance, or no book. Unreliable persons frequently belong to reliable societies. We could name quite a few.

Some ten years ago, the editor when at Amelia Court House copied the marriage bonds, some 350 in all. No more could be found, and it was supposed there were no others. The abstracts were published in Vol. IV. Va. County Records. An overhauling of the Court records was made recently and a number of packets of bonds was discovered. The result of the find is now given in the present number of the Virginia County Records, supplementing the previous bonds as published in Vol. IV.

Very few of the more recently appointed Clerks know much about the old records. Last summer, when at Warsaw, Richmond County, the Editor obtained permission to hunt through an old cupboard, which the Clerk assured us contained nothing but poll lists and papers of little value. After grubbing amongst the dust of years, we had the pleasure of unearthing some dozen packets of old marriage bonds, the earliest dating from about 1744. What we did with the find will be revealed in some future number of the Quarterly.



COLLEGE OF ARMS OF CANADA.

By Edict of King Louis XIV. in 1664: Confirmed by Royal Commission of the Appeal of Malta of 1877.

Under Council of the Aryan and Seignerial Order of the Empire in America.

MEMORANDA.

I.

This College of Arms is the Official Court of Heraldic Registry of America, wherein armigerous right and rank are established and where symbols are added to the arms of those proven under seal, that the true may be known from the false.

On account of the prevalence of fraud in American ancestry and arms, no claims of distinction thereby are accepted anywhere unless the titles by which they are held are guaranteed by the Heraldic Court of the College of Arms. Costly books on "Famous Families of America" have thus become so worthless by the admixture of the false with the presumably genuine, that their arms and rank are unworthy of notice, and if borne without warrant, are reckoned, in England and America, to be warrantless through inability to obtain the seal of the Commissioners of the Heraldic Court and the symbol of authentication of the College of Arms.

II.

No Heraldic Court will certify to descent from armigerous ancestry unless probative proof is given. Circumstantial evidence of bearing the same name and tradition of origin in the same locality, with official, gentry and proprietary condition in every generation of the family chain, are deemed worthy to

give right to bear the same arms, but with a symbol of difference to show that the right, though conceded, is circumstantial rather than documentary.

In like manner, the College of Arms of Canada follows the same law by regarding the *condition* of the *First American Ancestor* as the *criterion* of his *parental condition in Europe* in the acknowledgment of traditionary and circumstantial armigerous descent and rank.

MARKS OF AUTHENTICATION.

I.

Families of the Baronets of Nova Scotia (signed for by the Earl of Galloway in 1908; of the Seigneurs of the Empire (represented by the Duke of Veragua); of the Bannerets of Quebec (represented by the Baroness Dorchester, who founded the Dorchester decoration of the order); of the Seigneurs of Canada and Louisiana (represented by the Baron de Longueuil); of the Manorial and Titular Grantees of America (represented by the Brents of Maryland, next of kin to Lord Baltimore); of the Equestors of the Yellow Rose, Knights of the Golden Horseshoe of Virginia; of the Royal and Military Order of the Mountain Eagle, etc.—all confederated in the Aryan and Seigneurial Order—are granted a special coronet over the arms, and are eligible to the Dorchester Decoration of the Empire in the male line, family name of any of the above distinctions. So are those holding matriculation papers from the Heraldic Courts of the Seigneurial Nobility of Europe.

II.

First Ancestor to America before 1783, who used armorial seal or who was put on the list for Royal Provincial Council by order of the King, gives Consular rank to his family; to whose registered descendants of family name the Court decrees the *Consular Button* of rank, with *azure octofoil* added to recorded arms.

III.

First Ancestor to America before 1783, who was a landed proprietor and military or civil officer, gives Burgess rank with the button, and red octofoil to such arms as circumstantial evidence before the College decides.

IV.

First Ancestor to America after 1783, who was a man of property and station, and acknowledged by signed and sealed letters of an armigerous family of Europe, duly recorded there to be one of themselves, gives to his registered descendants of the name, the button of Alumnal rank, and the green octofoil of authentication is added to their registered arms.

V.

Those receiving the Button and Diploma of the Heraldic Court of the College of Arms are armigers of the same, ranked with the Armigerous Nobility of Europe by international treaties of comity. Armigers of 16 quarterings are admitted to the Seignourial Order and Decoration.

COURT DRESS.

The Seignourial Order has its own Dress and Decoration of the Empire. The Armigers wear the conventional black dress, but with gilt buttons and epaulettes; dress sword; blue, red or green sash, rosette and button of Consular, Burgess or Alumnal Degree; black felt hat with gilt band; blue, red or green feather.

SOME PROVINCIAL FAMILIES OF NEW YORK RANKED IN THE
NOBLESSE OF CANADA AS BANNERETS OF QUEBEC
IN THE ARCHIVES OF THE COLLEGE OF ARMS
OF CANADA.

Among the early members of the various orders which were made nobilities on the American Continent are enumerated the Caciques and Landgraves of the Carolinas, the Lords-Patrons of New Netherland and New York, the Seigneurs of Canada and Louisiana, the Lords of the Maryland and South Carolina Manours, the Baronets of Nova Scotia, the Bannerets of Quebec, the Equestors of the Yellow Rose, etc.

The State of New York and adjoining country were rich in these Bannerets of Quebec. They as a body were raised to the rank of a nobility—a fact not known generally—and it gives additional interest in the statement to the great number living in New York who are descended from these eminent personages. At the present time, the English administration in Canada, under tutelage of that in England, wishes the fact to be forgotten that the Loyalists were made a nobility, or to be regarded as a “fiction” of the law to be observed in the non-observance. But the royal ordinance remains, and the administration has never dared to abrogate it. The lack of faith in these observances of obligations, especially under the House of Hanover, was great enough to have caused the American revolt against the infringement of Colonial charters and constitutions in 1775 and the war for independence in 1776, and has been great enough ever since to wish to undo the Loyalist Act of 1789 creating the Loyalists a nobility, which was done in a moment of hasty enthusiasm. This Act passed at Quebec under signature of the Governor-General Guy Carleton, Lord Dorchester, and that of his council of the Seigneurs of the Country and his other advising officers declared it to be the intention to “put a mark of honor on those families that joined the Royal Standard in America in the late war” (1776-83). The reason for this is declared in the Act to be that they should be distinguished from other colonists in the

country on account of their noble and distinguished services. It is but just to say that this Loyalist Act making of those "who joined the Royal Standard" a nobility was done by themselves and their friends the Seigneurs of Canada when they were in possession of the government and no administration since has dared undo the act. Moreover, it was acknowledged—with bad grace, no doubt—by the King George III. But the English themselves failed to see in this loyalty and devotion any other attribute than a servile obedience to the government. They could not—much less their stupid and bull-headed leaders—appreciate the fact that the noblest of these so-called Loyalists were loyal to their colonial charters, against whose infringements most of them had stood—even against the infringements by the British parliament itself up to 1778, and after that time, with the parliament that had abrogated the infringements and against the revolutionists who were altering the colonial charters which they were claiming to defend, and establishing a democracy contrary to their previous pledges and engagements with the people of the colonies themselves.

Had these Loyalists, loyal as they were to the colonies to which they belonged and to the charters of those colonies, instead of joining with the Crown and Parliament in 1778-83, united among themselves to form a party in the colonies for independence along the line of the meaning of the original charters, it can not be doubted but that their strength and influence would have caused a better form of government to have been chosen than the one at present in the United States.

A brief sketch of a few of these loyalists will show their importance. And their descendants, by the Loyalist Act of 1789, have the rights of precedence as a nobility in Canada.

Theophilact Bache, vice-president of the New York Chamber of Commerce in 1782, whose brother Richard married Sarah, daughter of Dr. Benj. Franklin, was true to the Crown. While the colonies were making a constitutional struggle for their rights, he was with Lewis and Jay, a member of the committee of correspondence. But when they decided to rebel and form a republic, he stood staunchly for his royalist prin-

ciples. At one time the revolutionists held him a prisoner in New Jersey. His kindness even to adversaries in that war was "worthy of respect." He died in New York in 1807.

The Barclays of New York are mentioned as "Americans of royal descent. The bluest blood of New York Society is said to be derived mostly from Barclay affiliation. Rev. Dr. Henry Barclay was rector of Trinity in 1765. His daughter Nancy married Col. Beverly Robinson, a loyalist and father of Sir Frederic Robinson, of Toronto. His son, Thomas Barclay, was a major under Sir Henry Clinton in 1777, who left the country with the British, but returned and died in New York in 1830. He was father of Col. De Lancey Barclay, who distinguished himself at Waterloo and was A. D. C. to King George IV.

Five of the most prominent members of the Bayard family that claim to trace their ancestry to the same source as that from which arose the great chevalier Du Terrail de Bayard, "sans peur et sans reproche," were loyalists. In 1782 John Bayard was lieutenant-colonel of the King's Orange (N. Y.) Rangers. Robert was royal judge in admiralty in 1782 and his estates were confiscated by the republicans. Samuel was a signer to the crown in 1774 and in 1782 was major of the King's Orange Rangers, and his son Samuel was deputy secretary for the Crown in 1782. Samuel Vetch Bayard was a Crown officer and settled in New Brunswick. Col. William Bayard, of North River, had his property confiscated because of his royalist principles.

Fourteen of the landed proprietors of the Brickerhoff name of Queen's Co. testified to their unalterable allegiance to royalty in 1776. Few in 1776 could exceed the fame of the Coldens, chief of whom was Cadwaller Colden, Surveyor-General of the colony, and member of the King's council. He was lieutenant-governor in 1761. His son David, who married Ann, daughter of John Willett, of Flushing, had his property taken by the democrats and went to England. He was father of Cadweller D. Colden, one of the most eminent of New York

lawyers, who, with de Witt Clinton, promoted the Erie Canal. He died in Jersey City in 1834. John, another of the Coldens, was a loyalist captain of New Jersey Volunteers, and his relative, Thomas Colden, was captain in the Pennsylvania Loyalist regiment.

Thirteen of the Cornells of Queen's Co. acknowledged allegiance to the Crown in opposition to the democrats in 1776, from one of whom is descended the founder of Cornell University.

In 1775, John Cruger was President of the New York assembly and that year addressed a letter to Gen. Gage on the threatened uprising of the democracy. His relative, John Harris Cruger, who married a daughter of Col. de Lancey, was a royal counsellor. His property was confiscated for his loyalty.

If any colonial family deserve the term of "Noble" it is that of de Lancey. James de Lancey of New York was colonel of a loyalist regiment, and fought for the Crown, settled in Nova Scotia and was a member of the council of that colony. His cousin, James de Lancey, an officer of Oliver de Lancey's loyalist regiment, was afterwards collector of His Majesty's Customs at New Providence. Oliver de Lancey whose brother James was at one time chief-justice and Lieut.-Gov. of New York and whose father was of the French noblesse, became a general on the side of the Crown. He went to England at the close of the war and was a member of parliament. His daughter married Sir Wm. Draper. His son Oliver, Jr., was Adj.-Gen. in the British Army. His cousin, Stephen, was a loyalist colonel and afterwards chief-justice of the Bahamas. His wife was a daughter of Dr. Barclay of New York, and their son was an A. D. C. to Lord Wellington at Waterloo.

The de Peysters have continued at the head of affairs. Their descent from the counts de Tourhaute in the Netherlands and the claim that family have on that title, rank them with the colonial nobility. Capt. Abram de Peyster was second in command of the King's troops at the Battle of King's

Mountain in 1780. His life was saved in that battle by a gold doubloon in his pocket shielding him from a republican bullet. He went to St. John in 1783 and was colonel of the New Brunswick militia and treasurer of that province. His relative, Capt. Frederic de Peyster, of the New York loyalists went also to St. John where he received a grant of land and was a magistrate. He returned to New York where he died in 1828. From him was descended the late Frederic de Peyster, LL.D., President of the New York Historical Society and father of the late Gen. John Watts de Peyster, the noted author on military topics who was also a member of the United Empire Loyalist Association of Canada.

At the house of James Graham, of Ulster County, a number of the adherents of King George met in 1775 and raised a royal standard on a staff seventy feet high. On the staff was the following inscription: "In testimony of our unshaken loyalty and incorruptible fidelity to the best of kings: of our inviolable attachment to the parent state and to the British constitution: of our abhorrence...of a republican government...seditious meeting and execrable mobs...this stand is erected by a number of His Majesty's most faithful subjects in Ulster County on the 10th February, in the 15th year of the reign of our most excellent sovereign, King George III." This family of Graham claim descent from a younger son of the Duke of Montrose.

The Harpers of Queen's Co. who suffered for their loyalty were represented by James and Thomas. From this family are descended the Harper brothers who have established one of the greatest publishing houses in the World.

In 1782, Francis Kearney was major in the Pennsylvania loyalist regiment and Michael Kearney was searcher in the superintendent's department of New York under the Crown. Gen. Philip Kearney came of this stock and was related to the de Peysters.

Twenty-two of the Lawrences of Queen's were royalist associates from 1776 to 1779. One of them was a colonel and another was a captain under the Crown. A large estate in

England was in the property of this family and some sort of connection existed between them and the Hydes, Earls of Clarendon.

There were more of the great Livingston family for royalty than for republicanism in 1776. Their descent from a noble Scottish house; their possession of the manour of Livingston on the Hudson; their connection with persons and things high and ennobling must have had their due weight. Henry Livingston was an officer of royalist cavalry in South Carolina in 1782. John, Jr., was seized by the republicans at Jamaica, N. Y., in 1776 for his royalist principles and made a prisoner. Gilbert was a captain in the American Loyalist Legion. John was a captain in the King's American Regiment and Philip was a Crown officer in 1780 at New York.

Roger Morris, one of the manorial family of that name, whose wife was a daughter of Frederic Philipse, had served in the French war on staff of Gen. Braddock. In 1775 he was a royal counsellor. He was a colonel under the Crown. His large estate in New York was not entirely confiscated, for his son, Capt. Henry Gage Morris, R. N., in 1809 in behalf of his two sisters and himself sold their revisionary interest to John Jacob Astor for £20,000 sterling, for which Mr. Astor received from the state of New York \$500,000 in 1828. Another son was Capt. Amherst Morris, so named for his god-father Lord Amherst. It is said that Washington came a-courting Mrs. Morris when she was Miss Philipse but he was not deemed an eligible *parti*.

Among the leading members of the Ogdens who were true to the Crown in 1776, were the Hon. Benjamin Ogden of Westchester Co.; Isaac, barrister at New York; Jonathan of whom it was written that he was "Among the faithful and intrepid band of loyalists, who for their unshaken attachment to the throne and constitution of Great Britain suffered much in their early days." Peter, who was secretary of the New York Police Department in 1782; the Hon. Robert, at one time President of the New Jersey Assembly and last the most illustrious of all, the Hon. David Ogden, Royal Coun-

sellor, judge of the N. J. Supreme Court and member of the N. J. Loyalist Society of 1779. He planned the outline of a government for America. It was as follows: "That the right of taxation of America by the British Parliament be given up: that the colonies be restored to their former constitutions; that each colony have a governor and council appointed by the Crown and a house of representatives elected by the freeholders: that an American parliament be established, to consist of a Lord-Lieutenant, Barons (to be created for the purpose by His Majesty): a house of commons to be elected by the assemblies of the various colonies: which parliament to be styled 'The Lord Lieutenant, the Lords and Commons of the British Colonies of North America.'"

The Philipscs were among the founders of New York. Frederic Philipse came from Holland in 1658, bringing money, plate and jewels and the patents of two patroon-lordships on the Hudson, called Philipsbourg and Fredericksbourg. The former contained 150 square miles, the latter 240. He owned many houses in the city; he laid out lots and streets and built a town residence. His four children were Frederic, Philip, Susan married to Col. Beverly Robinson and Mary married to Col. Roger Morris. The son Frederic was a colonel and a member of the provincial assembly. In 1775 he attended a republican meeting only to declare that his purpose in coming was "To protest against its illegal and unconstitutional proceedings." He retired to England later on rather than see a republic established. His nephews and nieces inherited the property.

The Hon. John Rapalje of New York, was a royal signer in 1775 as well as sixteen others of the name living in Queen's Co.

Jacob Schureman was so inimical to republican institutions that he left New York in 1783 and settled in Prince Edward's Island. From him is descended Mr. Schureman of the Philippine Commission. The family claim the title of baron von Schureman, deriving it from a German ancestor.

The Hon. Peter Tenbroeck was a royal signer in 1775: he was magistrate of Tryon, Montgomery Co., N. Y.

Richard Townsend, of North Hempstead was a distinguished royalist in 1782. Twenty-two of the name in Queen's testified their allegiance to Lord Howe in 1776. John, magistrate at Oyster Bay and Benj., an ensign of the New York Loyalist Regiment, completes this family's list:

Of the old Knickerbocker Vans, there were Joost Van Brunt of Jamaica; the leader of the Van Buskirks among them, Col. Abram, who commanded the N. Y. Loyalist Regiment; Anthony Van Dam; James Van Deusen; Lieut. Wm. Van Dumont; Col. Gabriel de Veber of the Prince of Wales' American Regiment; Gabriel and Capt. Wm. Van Horn and thirteen Van Nostrands of Queen's Co. The name of Van Courtlandt, replete with the glories of colonial belongings and manorial dignities stands prominently forth. Hon. Philip Van Courtlandt of Westchester, was a major in the N. Y. Loyalist Regiment in 1782. One of his daughters married Sir Edward Buller, R. N., and another, Capt. Evans, of the British Army. One of the sons, Philip, Jr., was an ensign in his father's regiment. The home of the race, Courtlandt Manour, is one of the most famous in America, and is the only patronate in possession of the original family.

The Hon. Peter Van Shaack of Kinderhook, was obliged to seek shelter in England on account of his royalist views. He returned to New York after 1783 and became a leading member of the legal profession. He died in New York in 1832, and an account of his life was published by his son.

Nearly all of the Watts were royalists. They were connected with the Earls of Cassilis in Scotland. The Hon. John Watts, Royal Counsellor of N. Y., had a daughter married to Sir John Johnson, and his son served in the loyalist corps raised by Sir John. His relatives, George and George, Jr., of Queen's, were royal signers in 1776.

It is natural that the Zabriskies should have been on the same side since they claim descent from the Kings of Poland. The most prominent of them in 1776 was Hon.

John Zabriskie, magistrate, whose estate in New Jersey was taken by the republican congress and given to Baron von Steuben in reward for services. Peter Zabriskie was on the loyalist correspondence committee in 1774.

Agnew, Stair, of Virginia. Born, 1754; died, 1821. Son of Rev. John Agnew, of Virginia. Captain Queen's Rangers. After the peace, settled in Frederickton, New Brunswick.

Aikman, Alexander. Born, 1755, in Scotland; settled in South Carolina. Died in 1838 in Prospect Pen, St. Andrews. Was printer to House of Assembly and to the King.

Allen, William. Born, —; died, 1780, in England. Was chief-justice of Pennsylvania, until the approach of the revolution, when he went to England.

Allen, William, of Pennsylvania. Born, —; died, —. Son of Chief-Justice Allen. In 1778 raised a corps called Pennsylvania Loyalists, and was commanding officer. In 1783 was one of the grantees of St. John, New Brunswick.

- Allen, Andrew, of Pennsylvania. Born, 1750; died, 1825. Son of Chief-Justice Allen. Was under protection of Gen. Howe in 1776. After the peace, settled in London and died there.
- Allen, Isaac, of Trenton, New Jersey. Born, 1741; died, 1806. Was in military service of the Crown. Lieutenant-Colonel 2d Battalion, New Jersey Volunteers. After the peace, settled in St. John, New Brunswick. Was one of the grantees of that city.
- Allen, Jolly, of Boston. Born, —; died, 1782. Left Boston in 1776 with the Royal Army. Died in England.
- Allison, Edward, of Long Island, N. Y. Born, —; died, —. Captain in De Lancy's 3d Battalion. At the peace, settled in New Brunswick.
- Althouse, John, of New York. Born, —; died, —. In 1782 was captain in the New York Volunteers. At the peace settled in St. John, New Brunswick, and was one of the grantees of that city.
- Ambrose, Michael, of New York. Born, —; died, —. In 1782 was a Lieutenant in the Prince of Wales' American Volunteers. At the peace settled in New Brunswick, and died at St. Martin's.
- Anderson, Samuel, of New York. Born, 1735; died, 1836. At the beginning of the revolution entered the service of the Crown, and was Captain under Sir John Johnson. In 1783 settled near Cornwall, Canada, and died there.
- Anderson, William, of West Chester, N. Y. Born, —; died, —. At the peace settled in Shelburne, Nova Scotia, then in St. John, New Brunswick, and was one of the grantees of that city.
- Anderson, Peter, of New York. Born, 1783; died, 1828. Was a Loyalist Associate. At the peace settled in St. John, New Brunswick, and was one of the grantees of that city.
- Anderson, Joseph, of New York. Born, 1760; died, 1853. Lieutenant in the King's regiment of New York. He was

- known as "one of the last survivors of the United Empire Loyalists."
- Anderson, James, of Boston, Mass. Born, —; died, —. Was Captain of the Scotch Co. at Boston, Mass. Died in Canada.
- Andrews, Samuel, of North Carolina. Born, —; died, —. Was Major in the Loyalist militia. In 1781 he raised a company and joined Lord Cornwallis. In 1785 he settled in Shelburne, Canada.
- Ansley, Ozias, of New Jersey. Born, 1753; died, 1828. Was Ensign in the 1st Battalion New Jersey Volunteers and Adjutant of the corps. At the peace settled in New Brunswick, later returned to Staten Island, N. Y., where he died.
- Atkins, Charles, of Charleston, South Carolina. Born, —; died, —. Received a military commission, and in 1782 was an officer in the volunteers. At the peace, settled in London, where he died.
- Anderson, Samuel, of Maryland. Born, —; died, —. Was Captain of the King's Rangers.
- Alstyn, P. Van, of New York. Born, —; died, —. In 1775 was magistrate at Kinderhook. In 1780 was Captain in Cuyler's Corps stationed on Long Island.
- Allicock, Charles John, of South Carolina. Born, —; died, —. In 1782 was a Lieutenant in the South Carolina Cavalry.
- Anderson, John, of South Carolina. Born, —; died, —. Was Captain of the King's Rangers.

COLLEGE OF ARMS OF CANADA.

In Washington, on the evening of Nov. 16, there was a meeting of the Imperial Order of the Yellow Rose, being the organized descendants of those families entitled to the Consular, Burgess and Alumnaal registry of the College of Arms of Canada, but who in addition trace through some line to Royal ancestry. This order is under the presidency,

as "Chief Regent," of Dr. J. G. B. Bulloch, Pursuivant of the College of Arms of Canada, who was present and conducted the meeting. The Hon. Thomas Scott Forsyth, Registrar-General of the College of Arms of Canada, was the guest of the evening.

At the meeting was announced the opening of the Seigniorial Court and Council to take place at Montreal, Sept. 10-15, 1912, at which all families capable of registering in the manorial, titular, consular, burgess or alumnal rank of the College of Arms of Canada are entitled to be represented in the imperial pageantry of that occasion. For that purpose committees are being formed of ladies and gentlemen in the various states under the leadership of Dr. Bulloch, 2122 P St., N. W., Washington, D. C.

Each family after registering its rank and pedigree in the College of Arms of Canada and receiving its diploma and certificate prepares its own banner to be borne in the pageantry. The pole of the banner is 6 feet long, covered with gilt paper. The cross-piece is 2 feet long, covered the same, and fastened to the pole 6 inches from the top. The cloth on which the family arms is painted is 2 feet square and the family shield is 1 foot wide by 1½ feet deep. The color of the cloth is the same as the most prominent object in the family shield. The octofoil of rank is painted at the base of the family shield and again in a 6 square inch space at the right corner of the banner itself.

In the march past the throne in the great edifice in Montreal where this court is held, the members of each family present march with their own banner in line to be presented and then to their seats reserved for them. The men dress according to the rule published in last issue and the women and children according to choice, but with their appropriate sashes, etc.

The imperial order of programme is led by the Bearer of the Sword of State; then comes the Bearer of the Sceptre of Dominion; then the Imperial Standard of Charles V of 1540. Under a canopy on a litter borne by four beautiful

daughters of the Seigneurs repose the Crown of Empire with the Scroll of Laws tied with yellow, blue, red and green ribbons. The military orchestra play the Imperial March. Then follow the Seigneurial, armorial, titular, consular, burgess and alumnal families with their banners. When they arrive at their places the Crown, Sceptre and Scroll are deposited at the top of the throne. The military salute of swords is given. The Imperial Hymn, "God Save the Emperor," is chanted in Latin, while incense is burnt, and the interesting ceremonies begin. This will be the most illustrious assemblage ever held in America, since it will be that of the families that founded the feudal and splendid civilization of Europe in America under the Crown and according to the institutions of the ancient empire.

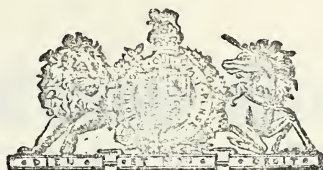

Will of Joseph Mayo of Henrico (no date and no probate).
 Legatees, wife, Frances; unborn child, daughter Frances
 Moseley. William Moseley, Sr., executor.

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- Will of Matthew Moseley, dated November 9, 1768 (the inventory of his estate recorded 1769). Legatees, wife, son Blackman Moseley, each of his children; mentions land where testator's father then lived; son William, son Joseph (including land testator bought of his (the testator's) brother Joseph), daughters Frances and Martha, wife Martha. Wife and John Archer, Jr., executors.
- Account October 7, 1772, February, 1773, with the estate of William Moseley, deceased, and inventory filed by Joseph Moseley, executor. He refers to "My father's bond," so Joseph Moseley was probably son of William.
- Will of William Moseley, date July 10, 1778. Legatees daughter, Sarah Marshall; grandmother, Sarah Marshall; granddaughter, Sarah Moseley; granddaughter, Frances Moseley, daughter of son William; grandson, Matthew Moseley; grandson, Thomas Moseley; grandson, John Moseley; to son Matthew's four children the four negroes son Matthews had the use of, to go according to said Matthew's will; great-grandchild, Matthew, son of Blackman Moseley; daughter-in-law, Mary, widow of William Moseley; granddaughter, Elizabeth Featherstone, son Matthew's three sons. Grandson, Blackman Moseley, and William Walthall, Jr., executors.
- Will of Matthew Moseley, dated March 7, 1789 (probably proved in same year), gives all estate to cousin, Blackman Moseley, and makes him executor, "he being in low circumstances in the world (i. e., poor)."
- Will of Thomas Moseley, dated March 4, 1780. Legatees, mother to have whole estate while she lives, and at her death to be divided between his sisters, Sarah and Frances Moseley. Blackman Moseley, executor.
- Will of Drury Ragsdale, dated November 17, 1749 (inventory recorded June 24, 1750). Legatees, wife Margaret, unborn child; brother, Joseph Ragsdale. His Lunenburg land to be sold. (To his family belonged Drury Ragsdale, of Virginia, who was a captain in the First Continental Artillery in the Revolutionary War.)

- Will of Littlebury Royall, dated July 10, 1749. Legatees, sons Joseph, Littlebury and John, wife Mary. Wife and brothers, Richard and John Royall, executors.
- Will of Caleb Ware, dated June 28, 1740, proved March 22, 1749. (This will had been disputed). Legatees, Matthew Branch, Sr., John Branch, Sr., Mary, wife of James Branch; Mary, wife of William Puckett, deceased; Matthew Branch, Jr.
- Will of William Gay, dated March 1, 1749, to wife Elizabeth, all lands in Chesterfield and Cumberland counties, and all rest of estate. (Dr. William Gay married Elizabeth, daughter of Major John Bolling, of "Cobbs." For descendants, see Robertson's "Pocahontas and Her Descendants.")
- Will of Elizabeth Cary, dated May 31, 1750. Legatees, Mrs. Judith Bell, £100 current money and my gold watch, chain and seal; Mrs. Sarah Spiers, £100; Ann, daughter of Archibald Cary, £100 current money; Henry Bell £500 current money, to be laid out in land and negroes; John Brickenhead, peruke maker, in Old Street, near St. Luke's Church, London, £200; goddaughter, Betty Cary, £20; Rev. Mr. Fraser, my waiting man James; godson, George Fraser, £20. (This was the widow of Henry Cary, of "Amphill," Chesterfield county, and the mother of Archibald Cary of Revolutionary fame, who on his mother's death, removed from Cumberland county to "Amphill." Henry and Elizabeth Cary also had two daughters—Judith, who married David Bell, of Buckingham county, and Sarah, who married ——— Spiers, a Scotchman.)
- Will of Henry Cary, dated May 27, 1748. By a marriage contract with his wife, Elizabeth, he agreed to leave her £1,000 in money, and he therefore bequeaths her that amount in sterling, and also £220 current money in consideration of the like amount he had received from the sale of her house in Williamsburg. He also bequeaths to her for her life all the household goods and plate he

had received with her, and at her death to son Archibald; also to wife, Elizabeth, a negro man named James he had received with her. In consideration of a marriage between his daughter, Judith, and David Bell, he had put said Bell in possession of 3,000 acres on Hatcher's Creek, in Albemarle (now in Buckingham), part of a larger tract, with thirteen negroes, and all cattle, utensils, etc., on said land, he now confirms said gift; but if he (the testator) should die before his wife they are to lay off 1,000 for the use of his (the testator's) wife and daughter, Judith Bell, during their lives, and the said slaves to be for the same purpose, and after the death of David Bell and Judith, his wife, said land and slaves are to descend to testator's grandson, Henry Bell. NOTES ON THE COWHERD AND TWYMAN FAMILIES.

THE COWHERD FAMILY.

In 1066, when William the Conqueror skimmed the cream of his country, culled out the most energetic of warmen, gathered around him the nobles and knights of Normandy and all France, marched into England, killed King Harold and took possession of England, "he built on the spot where Harold fell" an abbey in memory of his triumph, which he named Battle Abbey. It was intended for 140 Benedictine monks. In this abbey was preserved by the monks a so-called "Roll of Battle Abbey," believed to be a list of those eminent persons

who accompanied the Conqueror to England. The English historian, Rev. Joseph Hunter, believed this roll was of those only who brought families. Hollinshed and Stow each had copies, but they were not alike. However this may be, in one list, at least, will be found the names De Montague, De Buford, De Lacy, De Colbie, Twimyn and De Co-wert (later Co-ward and finally Coward and Cowherd).

History tells us that when the army of the Conqueror came to England it brought the Norman fashion of naming a rich man from his property and a poor man from his trade. Thus these men got their names from Beaufort Castle, Montecute or Montague Castle. Roger de Colbie (Colby) owned the estate and village of Colbie. William de Cowert owned the village of La Cowert. Take almost any of the first settlers of Virginia and you will find the name spelled in several different ways—Barbor, Barber and finally Barbour. So with Colbie, Colby; Cowert, Coward, Cowhard, Cowherd and even Choward (see "British Family Names and Their Meaning").

Both Burke and Sir Henry St. George, in their "Armory" and "Visitations," give the same arms and crest for the Coward or Cowherd family, as follows: Arms—Azure on a chevron gules 3 martlets or; on a chief of the second, a cannon of the third. Crest—A demigrayhound sable, holding between his paws a stag's head argent, attired or.

Sir Henry St. George, in his "Visitation of West Penard, Somersetshire, England," gives the above arms, crest and pedigree of the family of John Coward. From that family came Jonathan Coward to Virginia. His son, Jonathan, married a Miss Colby and had several children, one of which was James, who changed the spelling to Cowherd. His name as an officer in the War of the Revolution is on record at the War Department, and is spelled both ways. He was a man of large estate in several counties in Virginia. Mr. Crozier, in his "Virginia County Records," Vol. 1, mentions him a number of times in lists of deeds given for various tracts of land sold by him in Spotsylvania county, Va., in 1734; witnesses were his

- friends, Robert Slaughter and Zachary Taylor. The same writer states that he served three years in the Continental Line. He was vestryman many years of St. Mark's Parish.

James Cowherd, son of Jonathan Cowherd and his wife, Frances Colby, married Elizabeth Lacy and had Jonathan, who married Frances Kirtley, daughter of Francis Kirtley, who was Captain in 1755. They had nine children:

Christopher Holmes Freeman, born in Gloucester Co., Va., married Elizabeth —— and settled in New Kent Co., Va. Later he moved to Spottsylvania Co. and settled at a place called "Ilwordford" on the Rappahannock River. He named his large estate "Travelers' Rest." He is on record at the War Department in Washington, D. C., as having served in the war of the Revolution. Was he an officer? He had six sisters, one of whom married a Pollard, one a Rogers, one a Clark, one a Mansfield, one a Meriweather and one married John Walker of the Isle of Wight Co., Va., who had a son, Freeman Walker, who married Sarah Lorton Minge, daughter of David Minge of Charles City Co., Va. (they were cousins). Her brother, John Minge, married Sallie Harrison of Berkley. Thomas, the first son of Christopher Holmes Freeman, m. Susan, daughter of John and Frances Latham, granddaughter of John and Susan Latham of Caroline and Spottsylvania Co., Va. Another son married Miss Claiborne and had Claiborne, George and others.

Thomas and Susan (Latham) Freeman had Gabriel, b. 1781, d. April 23, 1852, m. March 7, 1826, Sarah (his 2nd wife), daughter of Rev. Thomas Harrison, b. 1750, and his wife, Sarah Harrison (his cousin), daughter of Cuthbert Harrison, member of Committee of Safety for Gt. Wm. Co., Va., and later Capt. of a company of cavalry (James Close Burgesses, p. 90). Hening mentions Thomas Freeman and Philip Latham as "Gentlemen app't by the General Assembly as trustees for a town to be named Jefferson, in Culpeper Co., Va. They were authorized and empowered to lay off $\frac{1}{2}$ acre lots on 25 acres of land given by Joseph Crows. They are to make rules, settle disputes, etc. They were also trustees, etc. for the town of Stevensburg in the same co., Vols. 1 and 15. Another son, Archie Freeman, m. Miss Welsh and Holmes Freeman, another brother of Thomas, m. Miss Robinson. His son, Col. Edward Freeman, m. Martha Bolling of Petersburg, Va. (the widow of Slaughter).

TWYMAN FAMILY.

George Twyman, the first of the name in Virginia, was a resident of Middlesex County. He was dead in 1703 as the inventory of his estate was filed the 3d of May that year. His wife was Katherine ———. A MSS. pedigree compiled by William the grandson of George Twyman in 1811, states that his grandmother was Katherine Montague of Middlesex. She was in all probability gt. granddau. of Peter Montague. The widow m. 2d 5 Sept. 1705 Philip Warrick by whom she had issue.
