

# **How to Share Your DNA for Family History Month**

October is Family History Month and we want to encourage you to celebrate. We'll have plenty of fun ideas on the site, but for starters, we want to highlight 3 DNA features you may not have seen yet.


#### 1. Facebook Share

You asked for it, and it's now possible to share your ethnicity results 3 different ways: Facebook, email, or copying the link to use on Twitter. See the steps below:

- a. Go to your DNA homepage.
- Click the Share button in the white box next to your ethnicity estimate (see example on right).
- Choose the way you would like to share your results.
- d. Share on Facebook and tag AncestryDNA by: #AncestryDNA

**Tip:** Share as many times as you want.





### 2. Share DNA results with another account

Want to share more than the ethnicity results with a family member? You can. Similarly, to family tree invites, you can share DNA results to other accounts and give a level of access, guest,

editor or admin. This way you both have access to see and participate not only in the ethnicity results but cousin matching as well. See the step by step details on how to share results with another account here.



**Tip:** Go to your Settings tab on your DNA homepage to access this feature and see how invites you have sent and who has accepted them.





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### 3. Shared Matches

Last month we released a new matching feature that lets you see matches you have in common with any one of your matches. The list will include 4th cousin matches or closer. When you click View Match, the Shared Matches filter appears on the detail page for each of your matches. If you need help, click on the question mark for more information.



**Tip:** Use this feature in conjunction with your Shared Ancestor Hints to see which of your matches also share a match you already have an identified common ancestor with. This can help identify where the connection could be for those matches who have a private tree or no tree at all. For example, if you have a 4<sup>th</sup> cousin match where you have identified the connection, click on Shared Matches to see what other cousin matches you two have in common. Chances are they, too, come from that same line or an ancestor in that same family. This new tool is great for finding new leads to explore.
