LIBRARY DROP-OFF FOR BRIM



<u>Library services coming to Brim</u>: Yarriambiack Libraries have now launched a 'Words on Wheels' timetable, where library services will travel to outlying areas in a two week rotation.

Lenders will be able to borrow books, magazines, audio books and DVDs on a regular basis.

This service commenced on the week commencing July 20th, and will run on Wednesday and Friday each week. Wednesday of the first week, the service will travel to Beulah in the morning and Woomelang in the afternoon, and on Friday to Minyip and Murtoa. The second week the service will travel to Patchewollock and Hopetoun on the Wednesday with drop offs at Yaapeet, Speed and Lascelles, and Rupanyup on Friday.

On the Wednesday of the first week there will be a drop off at McPherson's General in

Brim store before 9am. Anyone wishing to borrow through this service can collect them and return them at the store in Brim. Anyone wishing to borrow articles — whether it is a specific title or on a certain topic will need to order them through the library or on the forms left at the shop, and they will be then dropped off in Brim and can also be returned to the library collection box in Brim. Those borrowing through Brim will receive a 'book delivery card" with their mail to inform them that their library delivery has arrived. CORONAVIRUS ISOLATION.

My name is **Isabel Lindsay** and I am a second year teacher working in Nhill. This year I am teaching grade 5/6 and I have a small class. At my school each student is provided with an iPad which has been very useful during remote learning. But technology is only good when it is working. We have faced many issues during remote learning such as NBN connection/internet issues, updating apps, blocking apps, delivering tasks through Seesaw, providing feedback, making videos, trialling zoom meetings and lessons, students not completing any work, students wanting more work and parent expectations. In a classroom, the parents usually only witness the end product of their child's learning however they are now a part of the audience.

During the first remote learning stint, I worked from school every day. Now however, I am working from home two days a week. No one tells you when you want to be a teacher that you will face a global pandemic and be expected to fill the roles of technical whiz, counsellor, philosopher, a shoulder to cry on, TV presenter and telemarketer. Not to mention with all these roles, you are on call 24/7. With remote learning 2.0 it has been a lot easier for the students to understand their learning and fall into a routine at home. I have made many adjustments to how I deliver their learning and provide more hands-on activities. I also tried to change the platform we were using however that didn't quite work. I am also becoming a great multitasker, a day of remote learning looks like 200 notifications to sort through and give feedback on, which are coming through sporadically starting at 6am till 6pm at night, yard duties, supervising, lesson planning, and uploading content for the next day. I feel as a teacher you are always reflecting on ways to improve your teaching and to accept that it is okay if something doesn't go to plan.

The best thing about remote learning I have found is that you don't have to deal with behaviour, so that makes your job easier. I bet the teachers that taught me wished they had this opportunity. However, the workload has increased as you are always adapting or researching new ways to deliver your planned learning outcomes to ensure that students are engaged at home. I do look forward to when I can be back into the classroom face to face with my students but for now we all need to do the right thing and that is to stay home and abide by the rules. Even through all the struggles of this year, I do believe that as you gain more experience as a teacher you love your job more and more each day.

Patrick Lindsay has commenced a University course at Latrobe University in Bundoora. Here is his experience of University with COVID 19.

In Early February I headed down to Bundoora to start my University life at Latrobe. The first two weeks were Res Fest and O week a good chance to meet new people from all across Australia and world all eager to start the new year. I started face to face classes in the third week and did a total of two weeks and one day of face to face classes before the dreaded email that came Monday afternoon saying that students will have the rest of the week off as they convert the classes to online. During the final week quite a few students who are doing study abroad had to return home, as their university had told them to return. I returned home on Thursday with plans to travel back and get the rest of my things on the Tuesday but with restrictions tightening on the Sunday night, I handed my card to my mate to hand in to accommodation services and eat the food in my fridge.





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NEW TENNIS AND NETBALL COURTS FOR BRIM

The Brim Sports Centre Committee are delighted to announce that their application to the Victorian State Government for a Major Project Grant has been successful. The huge \$775,000 Project will see the proposed complete redevelopment of the Tennis & Netball courts in Brim go ahead after years of ongoing maintenance and headaches.



Club Secretary Graeme Holland along with committee member Hugh Keam worked tirelessly through the months of May and June putting together a comprehensive application document. They worked closely in conjunction with the Yarriambiack Shire who included the Brim Project proposal with other major project plans set out for two other towns located in the municipality. The overall Yarriambiack windfall is in excess of \$2m.

Graeme Holland said "The project we are undertaking is to dismantle and demolish our current tennis/netball court including existing fencing and lighting; dig out the current site to an appropriate depth, lay geologically sound foundations eliminating any future surface

problems, then construct a concrete slab and Rebound Ace playing surface consisting of 3 tennis courts and 2 netball courts. The project will also include player/admin scoring shelters at each end and finished off with Full LED lighting and fencing. We hope to have the Project completed within the next 9 months.

A big congratulations goes to our Brim Sports & Social Club Committee and the project subcommittee of Chris McPherson, Graeme Holland, **Hugh Keam and Mathew Crisp** for work that has gone into the project plans.
