Well done to all involved in these Debutant Balls.





Levi Keam was one of 5 students from the Warracknabeal Secondary College to be chosen to go on a leadership camp in the Yarra Valley During Term 2. The camp was for 9 weeks, but due to COVID restrictions, They had to return home early while the restrictions remain.

At the start of term 2, I headed off to the Yara valley, Haining farm school campus, School for Student Leadership. There were five kids from Warracknabeal that went two boys and three girls. To go you

had to say that you wanted to go then you had to answer some questions and have an interview with the principals, because there were only two boys that put in for it, we basically got straight in. The people who went were Maggie Butcher, Ava Koschitzke, Alylah Zanker, Harry Zwar and myself. The jobs that we had to do while we were there were being on duty every 4th day and we had to do the dishes after each meal and for lunch and dinner you had to serve the people at your table. We also had to do our washing, clean the showers and toilets and mop the floors. The things that I missed while I was away was definitely the farm and probably missing out on playing footy.

One of the leadership activities was first the teacher divided us into groups. These group were random and people were ranked from

richest to poorest so the people who had the most were sitting on a nice table which was me, just out of random luck. The next were just sitting on seats and they were the Australians, the rest were like all the poor people sitting on the floor. We each had a sheet that we read out that applied to our group the people at the top which was me didn't have to do any jobs we got to just sit and watch movies; the Australians had to go and play some sport. The rest of the groups about four of them, one group had to wash the cars, another had to wash the buses, another had to clean up inside and the last one had to go around outside and pick up any rubbish. It was quite fun for us, when they had finished their job we were allowed to tell them what to do. When it got to 12:30 it was time for lunch, so us high people got nicely cooked steaks and a nice milkshake with whipped cream on top, the Australians got a burger each and the rest of the people got to eat rice off newspaper. We then discussed how we could fix hunger in the world and things like that.

Expo was one of our activities that we did, it involved an overnight hike it was an incredible experience. We first had to drive 1 hour and 10 to the campsite which was called Cooks Mill camp ground. When we got there, we had to find a place where there weren't any other people, so that took us a bit because there was lots of other school groups. Once we found our spot to camp, we unloaded the bus and set up our tent on a bit of ground that was almost flat. It took us a while to do that and get organised but when we were we decided to have some lunch, which was wraps with salami and salad. Once we had finished lunch we all climbed into the bus and drove to the park at the bottom of the mountain that we were about to hike. The hike that we were going to do was to ten fathom bridge it was going to take us about two hours to get up there, so we set off and started to walk. It started off flat but then it slowly got steeper and steeper.

The walk was graded at about a 3, so it wasn't too hard but for some it was challenging. We all struggled to keep as a group as some were slower than others but with some stops we managed to

make it to the top. With about 80 meters to go it got really steep and it was just a bit higher up, so one of the teachers walked up and checked it out. It was okay so we climbed on up to the top, it was an amazing view at the top

You could see everything, all the trees and hills, it was beautiful, definitely worth the walk. Once we had been at the top for a bit we had to start heading down so that we weren't going to have to walk in the dark. We seem to head down faster than we did coming up, it was a bit easier to stick as a group. 1 and a half hours later we made it to the bottom and all we had to do now was to walk back to camp. The walk back to camp was around 2 kms, it was very flat compared to the other walk up the hill, so it didn't take us too long. When we got there the time was ticking on and we had to start to cook our dinner, before it got too dark. I was the one cooking in our group of three, we chose carbonara. I first put some noodles in some water and started them cooking while I chopped some broccoli and some mushrooms, once the noodles were done on the trangier I took them off and put the veggies and bacon on. The vegies didn't take that long, so I was soon pouring the cream in, some of it was very hard, but the heat fixed that up. The carbonara tasted pretty good and it filled me up so I was pretty happy. Once we had packed up the trangiers and washed our bowls a bit we started a fire, marshmallows on. When we got it going we all stood around it and talked about what we were going to do tomorrow, everyone thought it would be a good idea to get up at 4:30 to go for a hike to see the sunrise. That was what we did, so we soon went to bed to wake up at 4:30 in the morning. Friday we were all awake at quarter to five and up and getting ready to go. It was very cold only 2 degrees, but we pushed on and got in the bus and car where it was a bit warmer, to travel to the bottom of the next mountain that we were going to climb. Harry and I were the navs so we had the maps and lead everyone up the mountain in the dark, we were all using our torches so that we could see where we were going. We were travelling at a very slow pace but we were moving which was the good thing. It started to get lighter and lighter and we thought that we weren't going to make it but we pushed on and 2 and a bit hours after five we had made it to the top and oh my word it was amazing. You could see the fog and all the other mountains bellow us, and you could see that the sun was nearly coming up, we had made it for sun rise. It is too amazing even to describe in words, I will show some pictures. It was time for some breakfast on the mountain, so I set up my trangier and cooked some porridge. It was quite good actually, before we knew it we had to start to travel back to the bottom, it really didn't feel like it was the same track now that there was day light, it was completely different travelling it night and day. But we did soon make it to the bottom in good time, we drove back to the campsite and packed up our tents and things, so that we were ready to go when needed. We decided that we should go for one last walk. The walk was very close to the camp so we just walked there, the walk was 2 kms and it took us about 50mins just enough time to get back and have lunch before we had to leave to go back to school. We then climbed into the vehicles and drove to pick some of the other group up, and started our 1 hour and 10 drive to school. When we got back we had to pack up and wash everything, and let the tents dry out.

When the state went into lockdown we were told that we were going to have to go home, so that night my mum drove down and picked me up and some of the others from my school and we travelled home and arrived at 12 that night, this was Thursday night. The most challenging thing for me that we did was probably just being student leader for the day, you had to stand up the front and basically run the day. One thing that you had to do was a me in a minute and you had to basically tell everyone a bit more about yourself, and when you are standing in front of everyone, one minute is a long time. The best thing that I did while I was away was probably going mountain bike riding on one of the recharge days. The worst thing that we had to do was probably doing toilet duties and having to clean them.
