MEMORIES OF BRIM FROM SUZI HEAL (JENNINGS)

My Grandparents moved to Brim when they bought the Hotel around 1965. My parents, along with their two children Melinda and Stewart, moved with them. I was born in Beulah in 1966.

My first memories of growing up in Brim are when we lived at 21 Swann Street, in the Green House. Mum was out the back in the "laundry", which was a dirt floor shed, doing the washing. She was teaching me to wash the clothes, put them through the wringer, into the cement tub to rinse then back through the wringer again. I certainly appreciate our modern appliances of today, washing took all day!

Well this day, it was a hot summer day and we had a visitor, a snake. I had to run next door to Aunty Jean and Uncle Ralph Crisp for help. He came with a shovel and that was end of the snake.

I had lots of Aunties and Uncles, yet none of them related to me. Its just how it was with adults, they were all Aunty and Uncle out of respect and they didn't want to be called Mr or Mrs. Aunty Jean was wonderful, I used to go to her house a lot and she would teach me piano. I would watch her in the kitchen and the garden, then we would sit on the veranda and sip tea from the saucer.

We soon moved all the way to number 27 Swann Street, the White House with blue shutters. Both houses are across the road from the primary school. The school was essentially two buildings joined together with an office, aptly named the Big and Little rooms. I remember playing shop under the peppercorn trees, where you could "buy" leaves, pink or black peppercorns and rocks. Many a game of marbles were played too. I used to rush to get to school early for a game of cricket, or swings on the monkey bars before the kids from the farms would get there. The small bus would first go to the East kids, drop them off, then go out to the West. Every Monday morning we would stand in two lines smartly at attention, and raise the National Flag and sing the anthem, then inside for "news". Once a week was ABC Music over the radio and we would sing along to "Windy" and "You can't roller skate in a buffalo herd". Can't forget getting the milk delivered to the school for morning recess and placing lunch orders with Mr and Mrs Earle at the milk bar on a Friday.

Mum had a part time job at the Post Office working for the Schergers and later the Dunkleys. I remember going there after school and helping her. When I was older I used to help on the telephone exchange. It's strange that 10 years later I would join the Navy as a Radio Operator. I didn't realise it but many years later, whilst reading/listening to Morse code, the party lines on the exchange were in fact Morse. That's when people shared the same number but only answered if the ring tone was theirs, for example 16N was one long one short ring, 16S was three short rings.

Winters were spent playing netball and football, summer playing tennis, cricket with my brother and swimming in the local dams or when the creek was running, sitting on the weir and finding trees to make Tarzan ropes to swing off and jump into the water. Many a weekend out on the Quicks or Pumpa's farms yabbying and the annual Silver Circle where there were chook chases and egg/spoon races. Simple fun for every family in the community. We were usually raising money for something, new lights on the oval, new footy sheds, upgrade for the hall, something.

When I was 12 we moved into the Brim Pub and I started high school in Warrack. I did a lot of babysitting and a lot work in the hotel. I continued to play netball and was president of the club at 15. If it wasn't for Charmaine Fisher, who actually did all the work, it would not have turned out as well as it did. I played footy in the mini's but as soon as I started to look like a girl, I wasn't allowed to play anymore. How the times have changed, for the better.

It was a great childhood, out all day and only coming home to eat or because the street lights had come on! Thank you Brim, you are a great little town. Brim epitomises the saying 'it takes a village to raise a child'.

We moved to Warrack in the early 80's and continued with sport and working in mum and dads pub, the Warracknabeal Hotel. As soon as I turned 17 I applied for the Navy and was accepted on my 18th birthday. 6 weeks later I was at HMAS Cerberus, on the Mornington Peninsula. I was in training for about 12 months then got my first posting to HMAS Harman in Canberra. My primary work consisted of secure networking and lots and lots of typing and distribution of signals. I did shift work, in a communications centre, doing 2 days, 2 nights, 4 days off for a couple of years. Then I moved to Darwin, still doing shift work, but a much larger facility. The communications there was directly with the Ships and I learnt Morse code and did a lot more radio work with the smaller ships in the Navy. This was one of my favourite jobs in the navy. I continued to play a lot of sport travel around the NT discovering the beautiful national parks.

I went back to Canberra where I married my husband Rohan, who is also a sailor. We had our first child, a boy Darren, and bought our first home. A couple of years later, we moved back to Darwin for a different job

but still in communications. We only stayed there for a year, but it was long enough for us to have another child, another boy, Michael. On offer of promotion, we moved to HMAS Cerberus. This is where my husband and I fell in love with the lifestyle of a country area as Crib Point and Hastings are small communities, not unlike Brim and Warracknabeal. We decided that this is where we would set roots and raise the kids. Rohan continued to travel with the Navy and I stayed at Cerberus where there was plenty of work for me. I stayed here with the boys and he served on ships, sometimes away for 8 months at a time. It was hard, but we managed with the support of friends and Navy family. We are still living in Crib Point and we are close to retirement. We have been back to Brim and Warrack a few times and it makes me smile every time I think about growing up there.

MARTIN FAMILY:




During isolation Susan has enjoyed spending extra time in the garden and is currently attending to tomatoes and strawberries in her hothouse.

WORLD WAR 2 VETERAN RECOGNISED



On the 75th anniversary of the end of World war 2, all living veterans were recognised with a certificate and medallion. Merwyn Wardle who recently turned 96 was one veteran recognised.

Merwyn joined the RAAF when he was 18 years old, in March 1943 and worked on the Avro Anson aircraft. He trained in Melbourne before working at the base in Mount Gambier. He was then transferred to Darwin for three months before being re-assigned back to Melbourne.

While serving, they were all given an allowance of beer each week. As Merwyn did not drink alcohol, he would sell his beer and buy soft drink with the money.

Merwyn was promoted to a leading aircraftman during his service. He was discharged in September 1945, and returned to the family farm in Brim.




