3. Christmas – God in the flesh: The Grace of God

Dear Listeners,

The Lord Jesus, whose birth we remember and celebrate this week, before His birth was very much involved with the creation of the world, as we have seen previously in the first chapter of the gospel according to John. Everything was made through Him; so, He knows everything about the moon and its positions, the flowers and their structure, the body and its veins and arteries; you name it! He made it all! Now He, the Word, the Creator of all things, He came into the world, to become the Saviour of this world! That's grace! Yes, that's grace so much, because He knows this world, the troubles of this world; He knows us, inside and out! He knows what went wrong with us when we sinned, what misery and pain came of it; He knows the body, which He made, and sees what's wrong with it and what it takes to heal it, restore it. He knows the world at large, the relationships in the world, the misery of the world, and He knows exactly what He would have to do to save this world. Yes, even when I die and return to dust, He knows as no other what He has to do to bring that dust together again. He's done so before! He knows every aspect, gene, DNA, and speck of dust of me!

In the *manger*, dear listeners, you see your <u>Creator</u>! He *knows man*, He knows <u>us</u>, better than we know ourselves! There is no better Saviour than *He*; no one could better recreate us than *He* who created us! What glorious <u>grace</u> it is, therefore, that He came! Who? <u>God</u>! God, who said, 'let there be <u>light</u>, and there was light.' <u>He</u> came: <u>God</u>, who is the light of the world! Who came? <u>God</u>, who is the <u>life</u> of man; who gave life to the plants, the animals, to man. <u>He</u> came, who said, 'I am the <u>life</u> of the world!' He came to remove the <u>darkness</u> from the world, which <u>sin</u> had brought upon the world. He came to bring life into the world where <u>death</u> reigned due to the sin in the world! That's what John tells us in his Christmas account: Jesus Christ came from <u>God</u> as the <u>light</u>, as the <u>life</u>, to restore it! 'I am the resurrection and the life,' He said, and 'I am the bread of life,' etc. etc. <u>Grace</u> upon <u>grace</u>! Overwhelming! <u>Grace</u> in abundance!

Yes, and the fact that John calls Him the <u>Word</u> also highlights His *grace*: He came to <u>re</u>create through the *Word*! He came to speak with the *Word*! He came into a dark and silent world to <u>speak</u>! I'm sure we all know what feeling that is: a dark and silent world (or else ask a widow or widower, when they come home to an empty house, what that is like). Jesus came as the *Word*, to <u>speak</u>: "I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people." Jesus came as the *Word*, urging us, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." Jesus came and entered the gathering of the disciples, <u>saying</u>, "Peace be with you! Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone his sins, they are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven." Jesus came to <u>assure</u> us, "And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." <u>He</u> did, for He is <u>life</u> and <u>light</u>, who brings this light and life through the <u>Word</u>! He speaks, to <u>you</u>, to your <u>heart</u>, to give you light and life! That's <u>grace</u>!

Jesus Christ, dear listeners, gave us *grace* upon *grace* from the *fullness of God*. He was God; He came from God; He was with God, as He Himself testified, "I and the Father are one!" "Before Abram was, I am," He said, and He came from *God* to save the children of Abraham. He came to give us *grace* upon *grace*, Jesus, the baby in the manger: *Immanuel*, *God* with us! He is the fulfilment of Isaiah's prophecies: "Wonderful Counsellor, *Mighty God*, everlasting Father, and Prince of peace!" That is *Jesus*: *grace* upon *grace*, bringing the one gift of grace after the other, coming to us from the *fullness of God*: He is the Creator, He is the light, He is the life, He is the Word, and He is God Himself; and He is coming into the world to manifest to us the *fullness of God's grace*!

Indeed, for then John says (and that's the <u>heart</u> of the gospel, as we have seen last week!), then this grace of God came so close, so very <u>close</u>, when the Word became <u>flesh</u> and dwelt among us. Remember, He came into our weak and mortal flesh; He came to dwell among us, assuming our flesh and blood, in the form of a servant, a slave! <u>God</u>, who is Creator, light, life and the Word, did not remain in His exalted height but humbled Himself and came to us, true man! Yes, He <u>dwelt</u> among us; He didn't just make an appearance, He pitched His <u>tent</u> with us, literally. God with <u>us</u>! In all humbleness and tenderness, He came to us as the babe in the manger! That's <u>grace</u>! He came to show us His glory: the <u>glory</u> of God shone around the shepherds, and they were terrified, for in the OT people were afraid to see the glory of God, which blinded them (even its radiance as it shone from Moses' face!). Yet, here, in <u>Jesus</u> you can see the glory of God and not be blinded; yes, with the angel a great company of the heavenly host appeared, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to men on whom His favour rests."

<u>We</u> have seen *His glory* too, John reports as well: remember – at the wedding at Cana, at the mount of transfiguration, at the grave of Lazarus, and at His resurrection! Time and again: grace upon grace God's glory shone around Him. It was the glory of the only-begotten Son of God, John adds. He was *God*, as we have seen already; and yes, He was the *Son* of God! God sent His *Son*, His only One, His *beloved*, as He expressed at the baptism of Jesus. He was in the *bosom* of the Father, literally (at the *Father's side*, denoting how *close* and *intimate* He was with the Father). God didn't just sent the *Word* to save us, *practically* speaking, *effectively* working; no, He sent His <u>Son</u>, the Son of His *love*, because He so *loved* the world, and because He wanted to *save us* in His love! That's why John said it already: full of <u>grace</u> and truth! From the *fullness of God's grace* He manifested Himself in His whole life as the *true grace* of God – <u>true</u> grace, i.e. in Him we see God's grace in all its sincerity, integrity, and honesty! God *means* it what He says; God *means* to show His grace, truly! What great a *Saviour* we have! May this gospel of His love and grace give you a blessed and joyous Christmas!
