Ps. 139: 13-18

"The Sovereign Creator knows you."

The Sovereign Creator knows you. That is the truth that David wants to bring out in Psalm 139. God created the world, and he is intimately involved in all the processes of the world since then. His work includes the work of transforming a baby from unformed tissue to a fully developed little human. David responds to this knowledge with joyful gratitude to the Lord for the gift of life.

There is a deep human need that Psalm 139 addresses; the need to be known. People struggle with this. We want to be known, and yet we want to hide. We fear that others will use their knowledge to hurt us. We are divided. Facebook provides an interesting example of this. An individual may hide behind a profile where they create a public image that demonstrates all of their best traits. And yet Facebook also gives people a place to known. That is its fatal attraction. Even though, on the one hand, people hide their true selves on Facebook, they share intensely private things that they would not quickly share in person. People want to be known. They want to be understood.

God knows you. He knows you inside and out. He formed your inward parts. That means that he formed both the physical you, your kidneys, your heart and all the tubing that binds those things together. At the same time, he developed the emotional you. He knows what moves you, what hurts you, your good tendencies, and your destructive tendencies.

If you don't know the goodness of God this truth is intensely frightening. God knows your anger, the times when you lash out in your mind against your friends and family. God knows your lust, your hidden desires when you claim to desire and love only one person. God knows your greed, your discontent with the gifts that you have been given; your body, your family, your possessions. You can never match the holiness and righteousness of God. And the fact that he knows you is grounds for a deep existential terror.

But you must know the goodness of God. We see it in the bodies he gives us. We see it in the life that he brings into the world, the birth of a baby, in beautiful landscapes that God sets out for us, and in the way, he sustains us every day through his good gifts of rain and sunlight and growing things. These are broken gifts. We can list all the horrors that happen among mankind every day. God's original plan was not brokenness. In the end, the brokenness is our responsibility. However, God continues to show his goodness to us. We see that in nature; in our nature.

How does David respond to the gift of life that God has given him? How does David respond to the knowledge that God is accomplishing his plan for David? His response is overwhelming gratitude. God has given him a gift in forming and creating his life. "I praise you for I am fearfully and wonderfully made." Fearfully, in that David cannot imagine the wisdom of God in creating him. Wonderfully in that God created David with purpose and with full ability to fill out that purpose.

Too often we respond with ingratitude to the basic gift of life. We are like hypochondriacs. A hypochondriac is a person who thinks that he is constantly sick when he is not. He is unable to enjoy the life he could have because he thinks that he is not able to enjoy life. Something needs to break through

to the hypochondriac about the good things that he has. It's the same with us; somehow we aren't able to enjoy what we have. We struggle to learn gratitude for the gift of life.

But how are we supposed to develop this gratitude? As we mentioned earlier, we are sick. We are sick with anger, lust, and greed. How is David able to respond with such intense gratitude to the fact that he was born? Is he not afflicted with these things as well? Didn't he experience the hard suffering of life?

Yes, he did. David was chased in the wilderness for years by a king who once accepted him as a son. David not only struggled with anger, lust, and greed but in the middle of his life, he committed a terrible act that included murder and adultery. But David knew that God had provided a way of salvation. David didn't look to himself, but he looked beyond himself to the God who had created him; the God who showed him goodness.

He shows that goodness in Jesus Christ. He sent Jesus to die for the sake of the world so that we could learn gratitude for the goodness of God. If you believe in Christ, he promises to begin the operation of converting you. Just as God works in the womb of a mother to form a baby so God will begin to work in you so that more and more you will reject sin and love righteousness. We have only a small beginning of that transformation in this life, but that small beginning is another glorious gift that God offers to mankind. Through Christ, we may have thanksgiving for the life that God's give us despite people who attack us, despite sickness and suffering. Why? Because he promises us eternal life.
