The Annual Meeting of the Stratford Historical Society will be held at the Methodist Church Hall at 7:30 on Friday, September 30. The President will summarize committee reports of the past year's activities. The Nominating Committee will present a slate of officers for the coming year, and an election will be held. Following the business meeting, Mr. Hiram Tindall will present a program entitled "A Trip Through the Orient". His talk, illustrated with slides, will trace the Oriental influence on American crafts. Refreshments will follow.

The Executive Board of the Society has officially launched the effort to structurally restore the base of the East wall of Judson House. That sill has been slowly sinking for years. The nature and extent of the deterioration can't be clearly known until the area is opened up for repair. Mr. Jack Wardman has agreed to supervise the restoration work. In order to get the work done before cold weather arrives, the House and Museum will close for the season after September 18.

For the past six months, the resources of the Society's library have been under study for inclusion in a catalog of Stratford history materials. This project, conducted by the Stratford Library with CETA personnel, will list historical and geneological sources in the society library, the Stratford Library and other library collections in surrounding towns. Miss Pauline Gravel is the writer-researcher conducting the survey of the Society library.

Last winter, the Society was given a sizeable collection of Indian artifacts from the Ryan Farm Site in the Frash Pond area. Since then, under the direction of Prof. Ernest Wiegand, Director of the Archeology Dept. of Norwalk Community College, much of the collection (over 400 artifacts) has been studied and cataloged. Phyllis Baxter and Franz Goldbach of our Society and a number of Norwalk students have worked Wednesday evenings to identify, weigh, measure, sketch and describe each piece. When they finish, we will have a complete archeological record of the collection together with the artifacts themselves for preservation and display.

Finally - membership renewal notices are in the mail for the year starting October 1. While renewing, why not enlist a friend or neighbor; bring them to the meeting; sign them up.
