"Who is that Fat Man in the White House?"

William Howard Taft, The Forgotten President





William Howard Taft University

He is the President that few people know today. Sandwiched between the ebullient, charismatic Teddy Roosevelt, and the brilliant, world-embracing Woodrow Wilson, William Howard Taft is the forgotten man. If people remember anything about "Big Bill," they might remember that his adult weight fluctuated between 300-350 pounds, and that they had to build a special bathtub when he occupied the White House.

It is true that his weight was one of the dominant facts of his adult life. But Taft could always laugh at himself about his abundance of flesh. Once he told the story of how he vacated his seat on a street car and three ladies sat down. His weight became the focal point of many jokes and stories told by the press and by his friends and many of these stories will be retold in this lecture.

What people do not remember is Taft's excellent public service record. He served with great distinction as the Governor General of the Philippines, setting up public schools and putting the systems in place to move the islands towards independence. He did this while charming the natives by attending local cock fights and by traveling into the interior where headhunters were known to thrive. During Roosevelt's administration he served as Secretary of War.

People don't give Taft's presidency as much credit as they could. Although he had never wanted to be President, he longed for the robes of the Supreme Court. At the end of his life, cheerful, smiling William Howard Taft would have his dreams come true.

Mr. Williams is a retired history teacher from Trumbull High School, ending his formal academic life by earning a sixth year degree in history and literature from Wesleyan University. His numerous awards include Trumbull's Teacher of the Year, being a Fulbright teacher abroad in England and being a Milken Connecticut Educator.

As a teacher and as president of the Newtown Historical Society, he has presented many lectures filled with material that is informative and interesting, and in the case of William Howard Taft humorous.

Recent acquisitions have included a variety of items. Some have been donated by members, some by non-members and some have been won at auction.

A large collection of 19th century documents dealing with the "fancy goods" store of Selena Brooks on Main St., papers of the Sloop Accordeon, Major A. Brooks' documents about schooling was from an auction in Wallingford. Other items include oyster tongs, scythe and pitchfork, large oil painting of Judson House, a life-size Saucy Walker-type doll, early pair of men's shoes (possibly from England), 19th century soapstone warming stone and a wooden mallet and part of a wood panel which may have come from an early Christ Church structure.

Catherine Lawrence, Historian at Christ Episcopal Church, donated the last items listed. They were found in the basement of her house on Elm Street which has been occupied by members of the family for several generations.

Silas Burton, a 19th century weaver who lived on Linden Avenue, created many ledgers, account books and school records in addition to his weaving records and designs. He is the one weaver in Stratford about whom we know the most; thanks to several generations of descendants who saved his papers and then donated them to the Society.

Rebecca Arkenberg, a Society volunteer who is a weaver, has developed a CD containing photos of Burton's weaver's drafts.

It is unusual for so many early designs from one weaver to exist as a collection and the Historical Society is pleased to offer this CD at \$20 plus \$3 shipping/handling. Please send a check in the amount of \$23 to the office at PO Box 382, Stratford, CT 06615.


Plans for the Antique Appraisal are being finalized and will be announced in the March Newsletter.
