NO AND NOT

NO

NO is opposite of Yes. It is used as an adjective to make a noun negative. It is also used before verbal nouns.

- Jim has **no** idea where his notebook is.
- This is **no** time for fighting!
- **No** smoking.
- I have **no** money.





Examples

NOT

NOT is used with verbs or auxiliary verbs to make negative. It is also used with adjectives, adverbs (typical in spoken English)

- I do **not** play football.
- We can **not** go home.
- I'm sorry but I can't hear you.
- She is **not** cooking dinner tonight.





Examples

Not makes a sentence negative.

n + ot = not

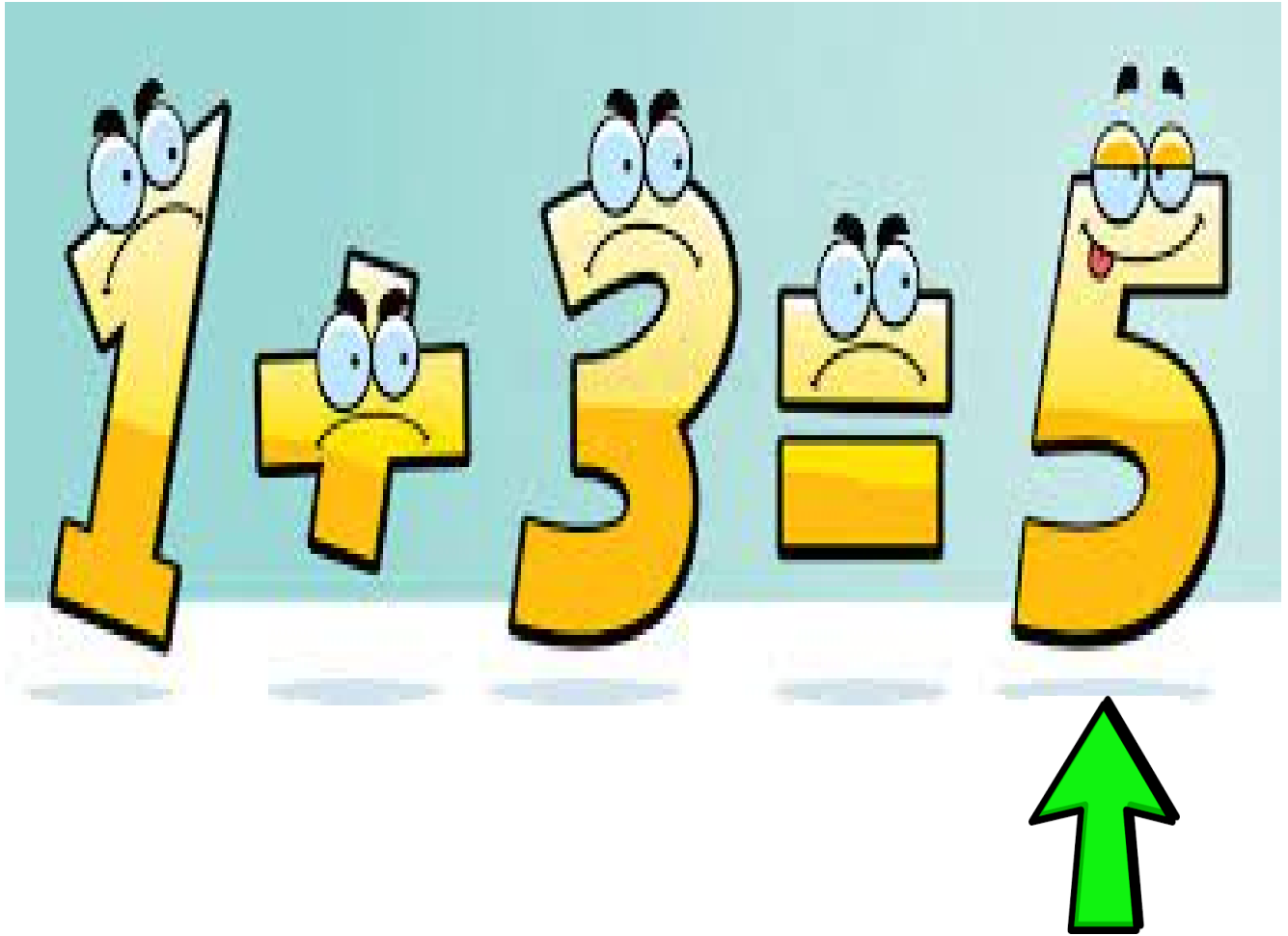

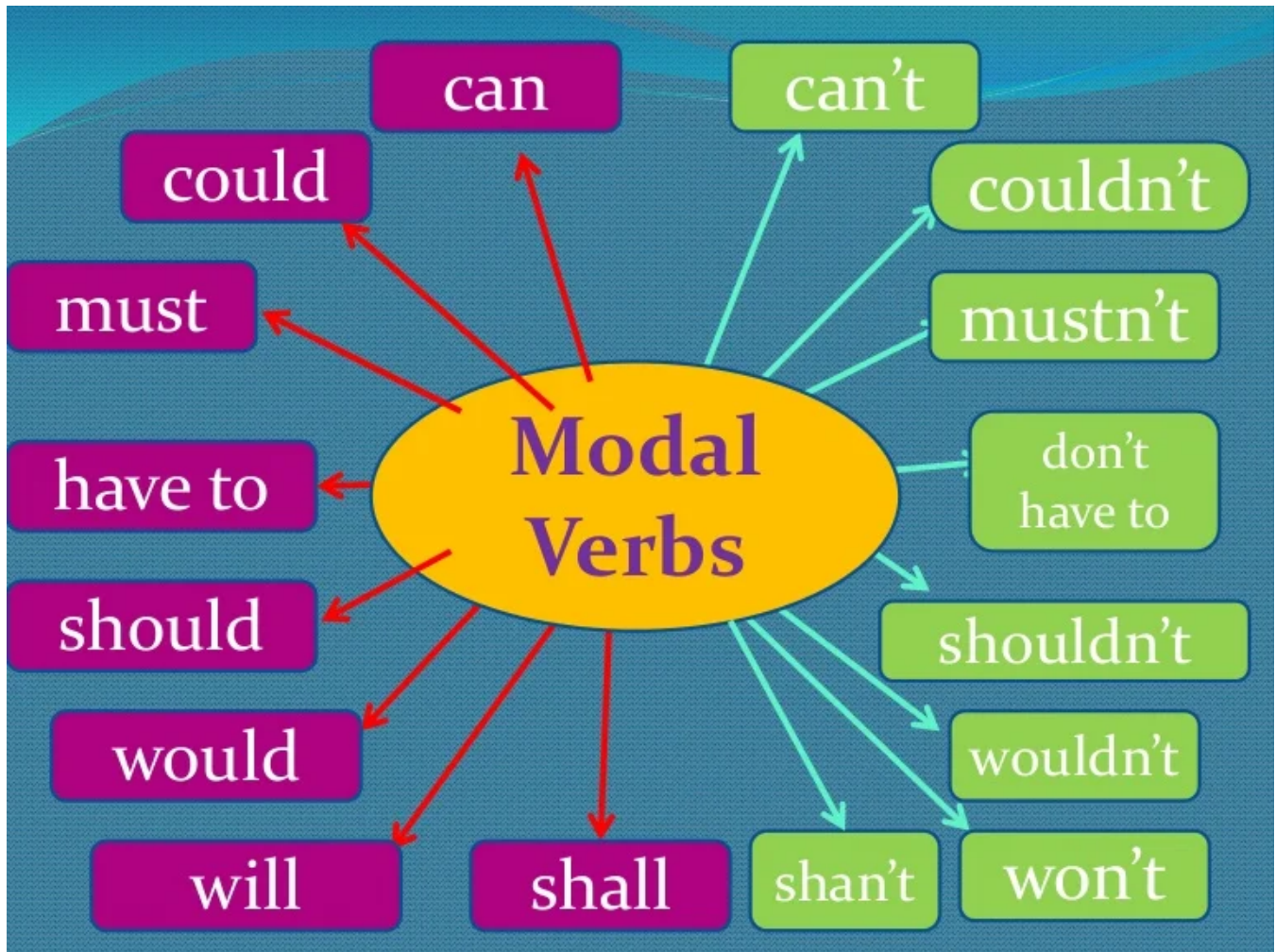

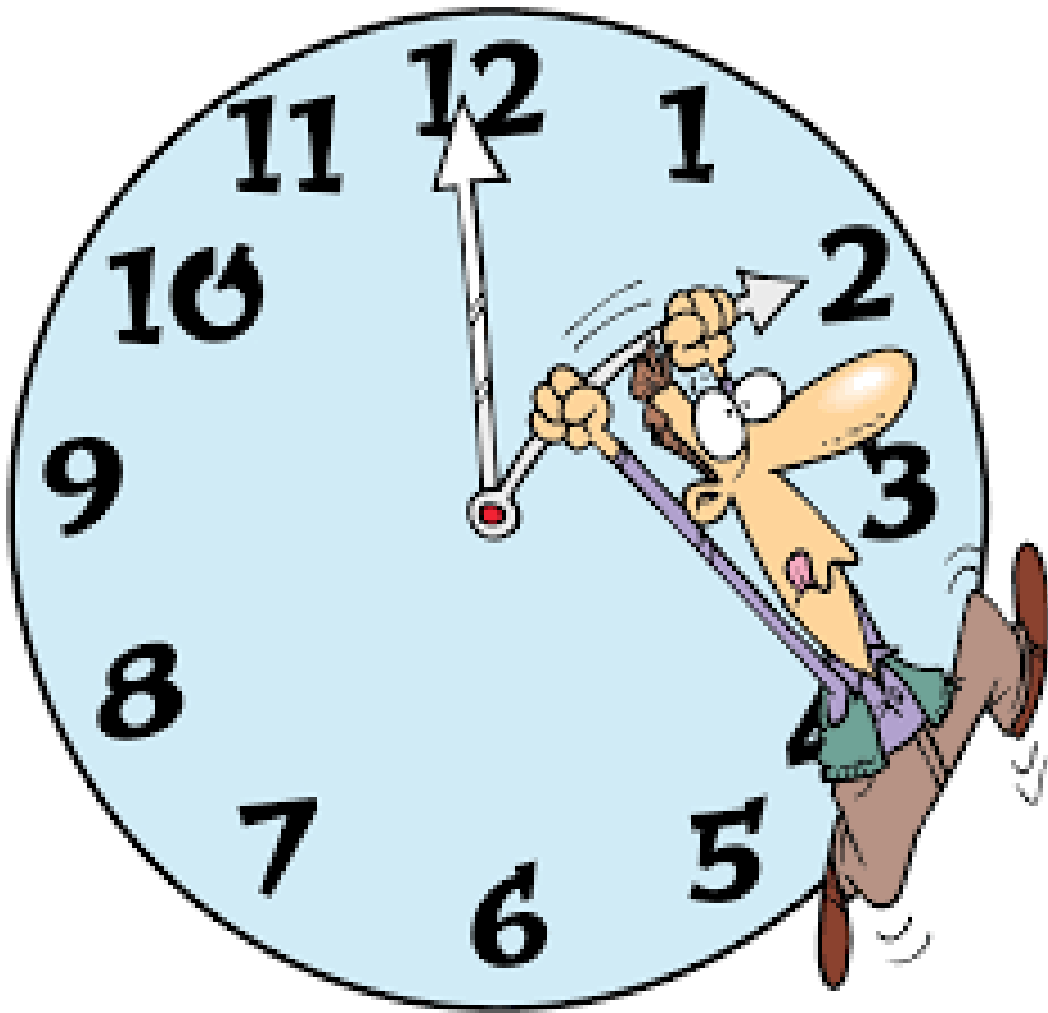
