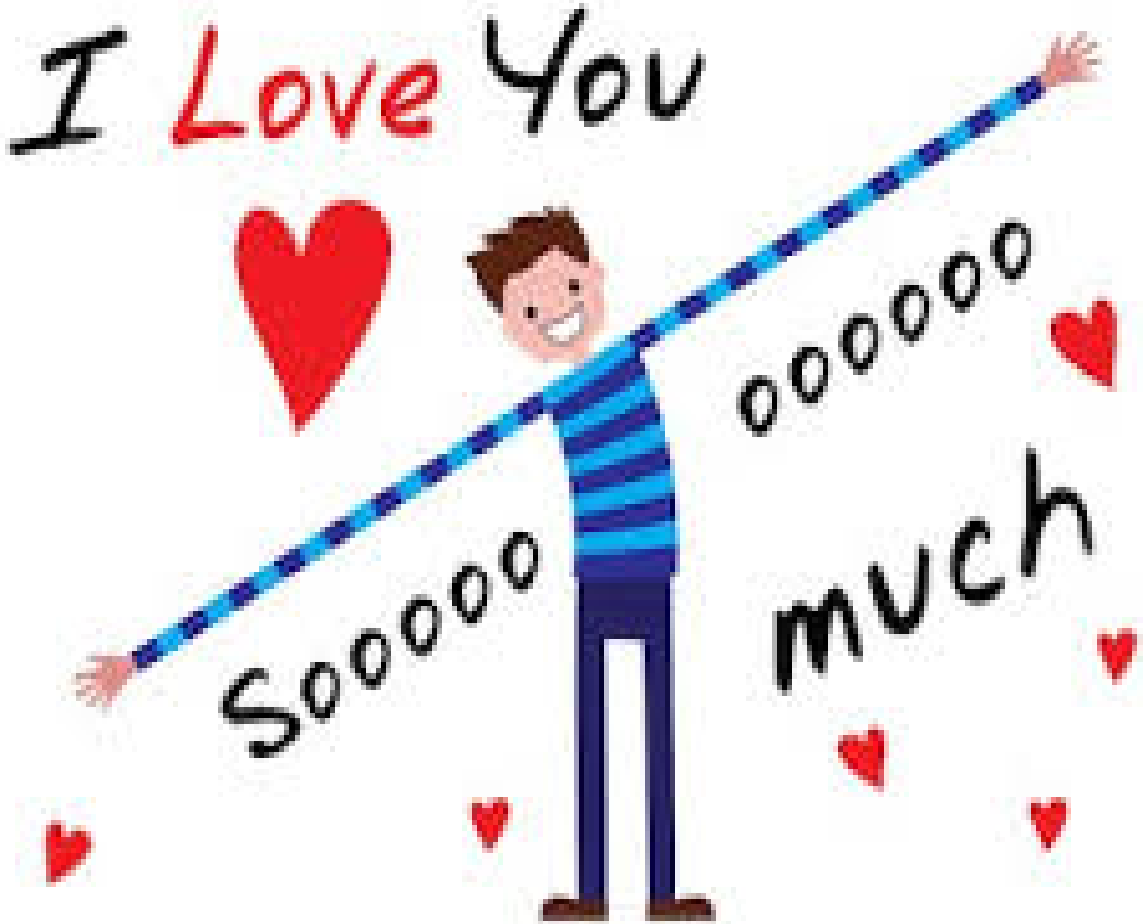

mu + ch = much



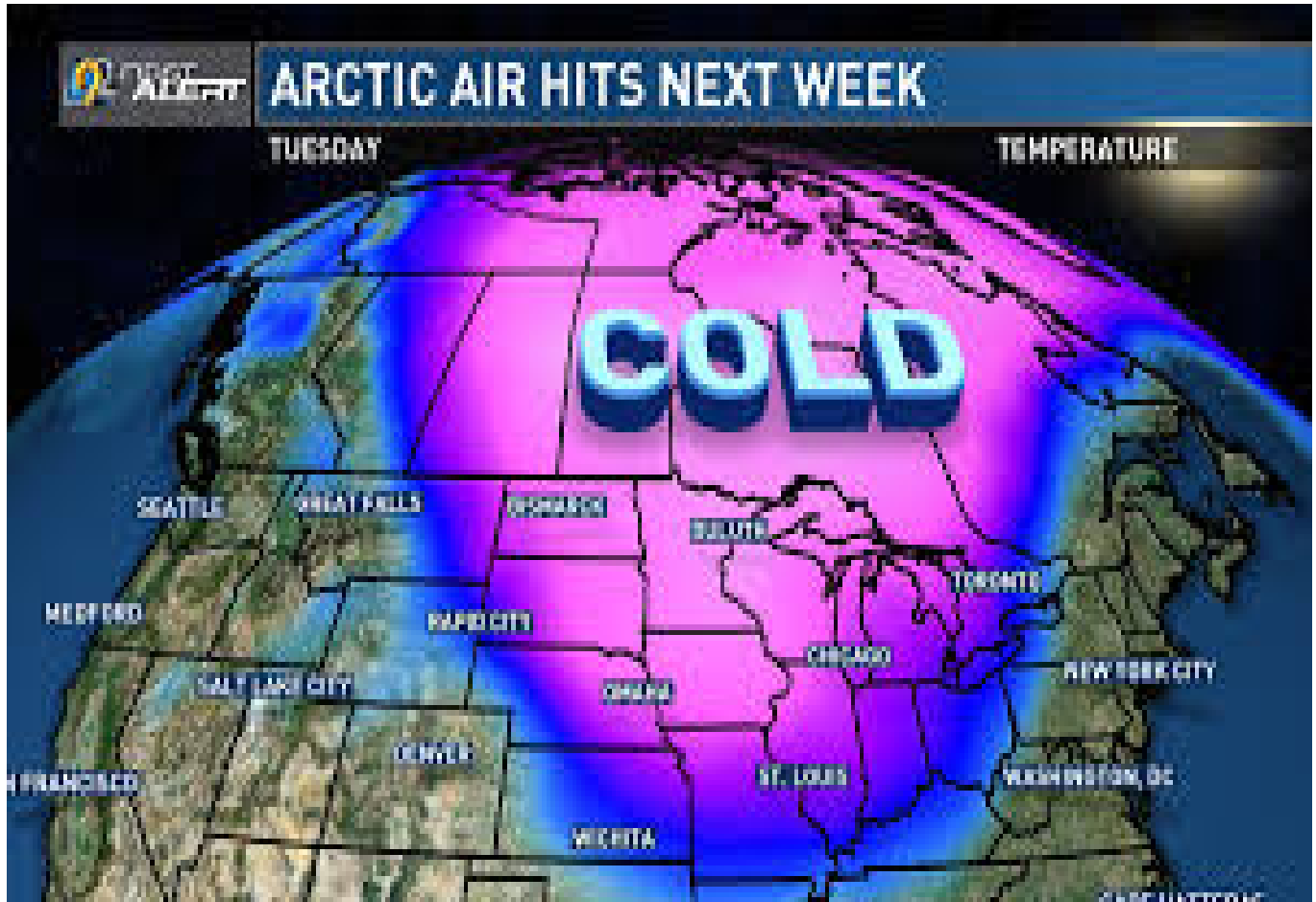
**Do not eat

Much vs. Many



**We use *much*
before noncount
nouns.**

mu + ch = much

Much VS Many

We use “**much**” with uncountable nouns and “**many**” with countable nouns in questions, affirmative sentences and negations

Example:

How **much** money have you got?

I don't have **many** friends.

It's too **much** honey in my tea.

We also use “**a lot of**” or “**lots of**” in the affirmatives with both countables and uncountables

Example:

There is **a lot of/lots** of milk in the jug.

There are **a lot of/lots** of people in the room
