While is used with a subject and a *verb*.

"Roger ate too much during his vacation."

"Roger ate too much while he was on vacation."

While + subject + verb While + gerand

# We want you to stay awhile.

Expect to use a while after a preposition and awhile (replace with for a while) as an adverb (modifies a verb). Perhaps the easiest way is to replace awhile with another adverb, "We want you to stay temporarily."
