Phrasal Verb **look after**

To take care of something.



**Please look after my plants
when I'm on vacation.**

Phrasal Verb **look down on**

To think you are too good for something or someone.

UP BEING LOOKED
UP TO.**

Phrasal Verb **look at**
To consider.

I looked at
the
possibility
of buying a
sleeping bag
that I can
walk
around in.



Technically, I should
have written **looked into**.

Phrasal Verb **look forward to**
To be happy that something
will happen.



She is looking forward to
the face-lift kit in the mail.

Phrasal Verb **look in on**

To (briefly) check on a person or place.



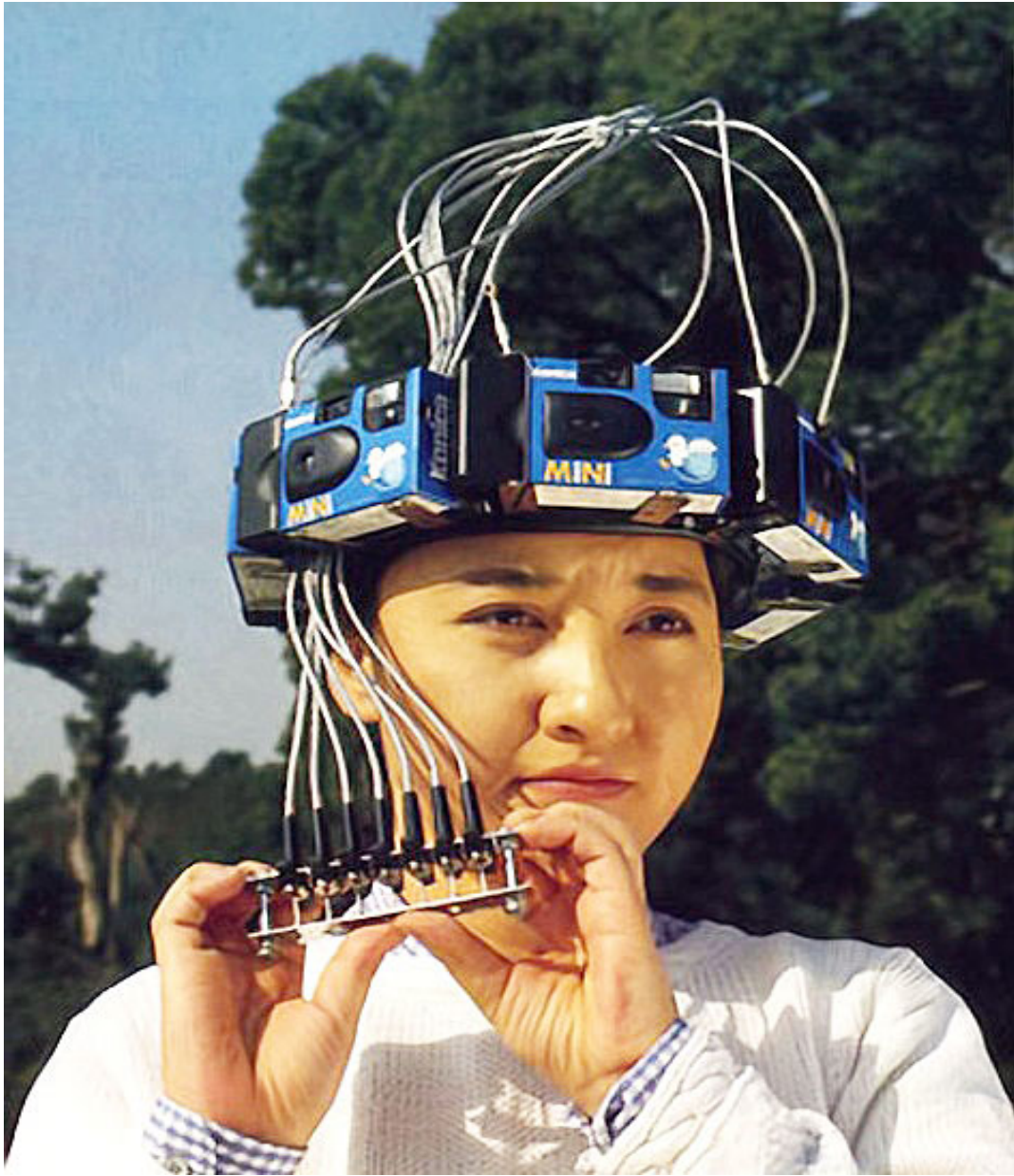
Please look in on him when he uses this face-lift device.

Phrasal Verb **look into**
To investigate something.



**Before buying a product,
look into it.**

Phrasal Verb **look out**
A warning!



Look out!

**Here comes that weird lady
with the camera hat.**

Phrasal Verb **look out**
To be suspicious.



Be on the look out as
some products don't work.

In this case, look out is the same as look out for.

Phrasal Verb **look out for**

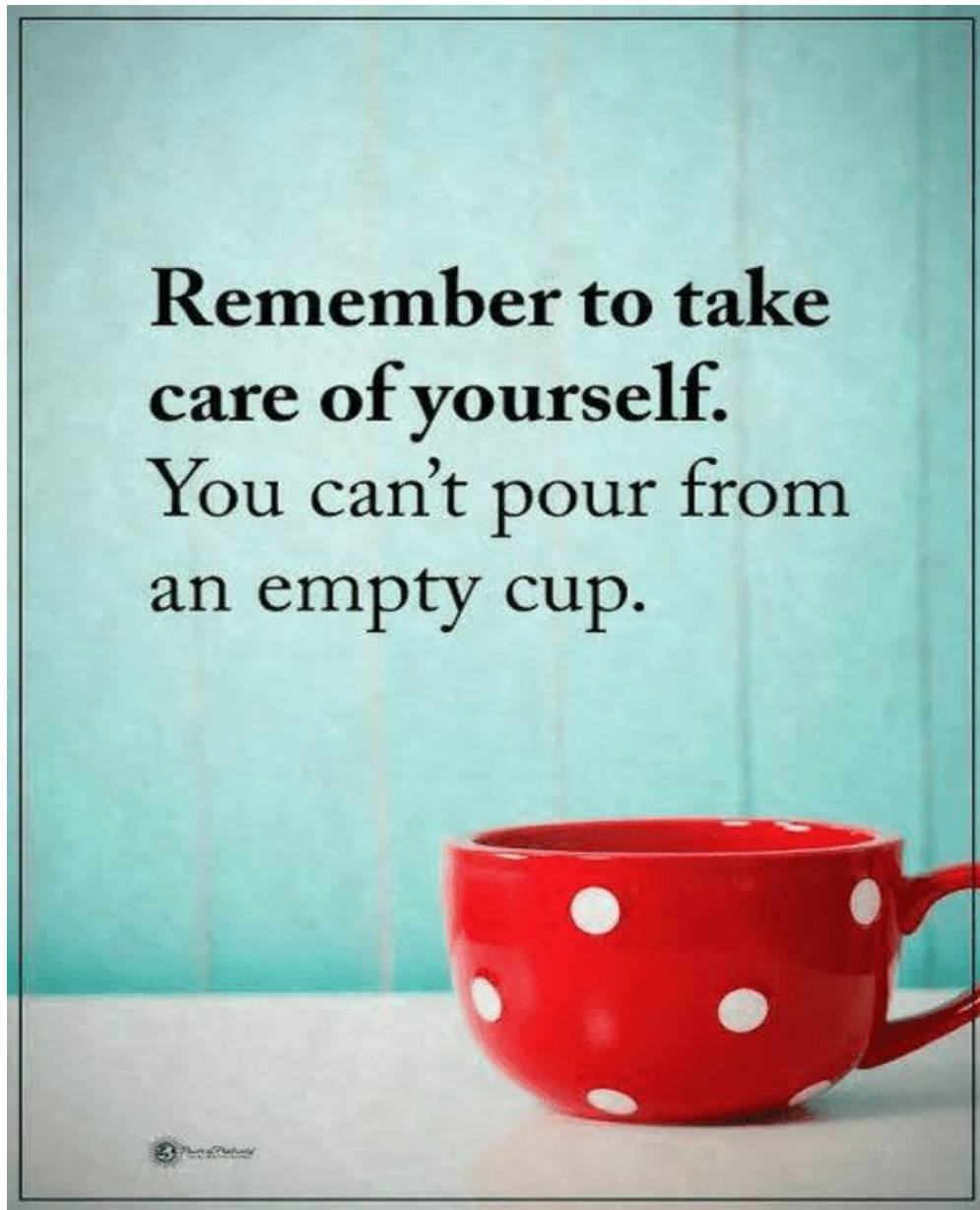
To make sure someone is OK.



A big brother should
always look *out* for his
little brothers.

Phrasal Verb **look out for
yourself**

To take care of yourself.



Please look out for yourself.

Phrasal Verb **look through**
To search for something.



Do you think airport security
will look through her bag?

Phrasal Verb **look to**
To get advice or inspiration.



Hopefully, she doesn't look to him for fashion tips.

Phrasal Verb **look up**
To improve.



The day started off rough,
but things started to look up.

Phrasal Verb **look up**
To obtain information.



If you don't know who won
the game, look *it* up.

Phrasal Verb **look up to**
To admire.



She looks up to him.
