

# Look ahead, look back, look around and look for are easy to figure out.

#### Phrasal Verb look down on

To think you are too good for something or someone.

#### Phrasal Verb look at To consider.





I looked at the possibility of buying a sleeping bag that I can walk around in.

Technically, I should have written <u>looked into</u>.

#### Phrasal Verb look forward to

To be happy that something will happen.



She is <u>looking forward to</u> the face-lift kit in the mail.

#### Phrasal Verb look in on To (briefly) check on a person or place.




Please <u>look in on</u> him when he uses this face-lift device.

### Phrasal Verb look into To investigate something.



Before buying a product, look into it.

### Phrasal Verb look out A warning!



Look out!

Here comes that weird lady with the camera hat.

### Phrasal Verb look out To be suspicious.



### Be on the <u>look out</u> as some products don't work.

In this case, look out is the same as look out for.

#### Phrasal Verb look out for


To make sure someone is OK.

#### Phrasal Verb look up To improve.



The day started off rough, but things started to <u>look up</u>.

#### Phrasal Verb look up To obtain information.



If you don't know who won the game, <u>look it up</u>.

#### Phrasal Verb look up to To admire.



She <u>looks up to</u> him.
