#481 lacquer (noun) /lah ker/ He painted the wood with a <u>lacquer</u> (a liquid that dries on something and becomes a protective coating).






laissez-faire

A <u>laissez-faire</u> (the government doesn't interfere with the economy) attitude has both advantages and disadvantages.


An organization, business or person can have a <u>laissez-faire</u> (relaxed, laidback or less structured) attitude.

Some say <u>margarine</u> (a substitute for butter made from vegetable oil) is better for your health than butter.






massacre

#484 massacre (noun) /ma su ker/


The government denied the

(verb) The army massacred innocent people.




mattress

(a large pad for sleeping or being lazy and watching YouTube).






mediocre

(average or below average, nothing special).






memoir
