## to whom vs who

Who is the subject of a sentence.

"Who has smelly shoes?"

Substitute he or she with who.

"He has smelly shoes!"



Whom is the object of a sentence.

"These smelly shoes belong to whom?"

Substitute him or her with whom.

"These smelly shoes belong to him!"

To \_\_\_\_\_ it may

concern... who/whom

likes its jacket? who/whom



We should give the hat to \_\_\_\_\_?

who/whom

You should keep it or give it to . who/whom

To whom it may concern...

Who likes its jacket?



We should give the hat to him?

You should keep it or give it to whom.

Two more things...

#1 An object pronoun (whom) is used after a preposition.

by whom
from whom
for whom
to whom (to + preposition [to + verb = infinitive])
etc.

#2 Sometimes, when asking a question (interrogative), the subject is not at the beginning of a sentence.

"Whom do you think we should give this smelly sock?"

Let's rearrange the sentence to make a statement (declarative).

"We should give this smelly sock to him."
