- I always **lose** my keys.



Lost

Past form and past participle of lose.

- She **lost** her phone.
- He **lost** his life in the car accident.

Loose

Adjective.

Something that doesn't fit tightly.

For example:

- My trousers are **loose**.
- I tightened the **loose** screw with a screwdriver.
