and ask to borrow a hat.**

Phrasal Verb **go against**
The opposite.



She went against my advice...
now look at her today.

Phrasal Verb **go ahead**
To begin.



Go ahead,
I'm ready for a face tattoo.

Phrasal Verb **go all out**

Do something 100%.



The worlds most tattooed man obviously went all out.

Phrasal Verb **go along**

To participate.



**If your friends get a tattoo,
are you going to go along?**

Phrasal Verb **go around**

The spread of information or an illness.



**There is rumor going around
this is your teacher's tattoo.**

PS Don't believe rumors.

Let's not
talk about
bad tattoos
for a
moment.

Enough for everyone.



**Don't worry, there is plenty
to go around.**

Phrasal Verb **go around**

How someone dresses or behaves.

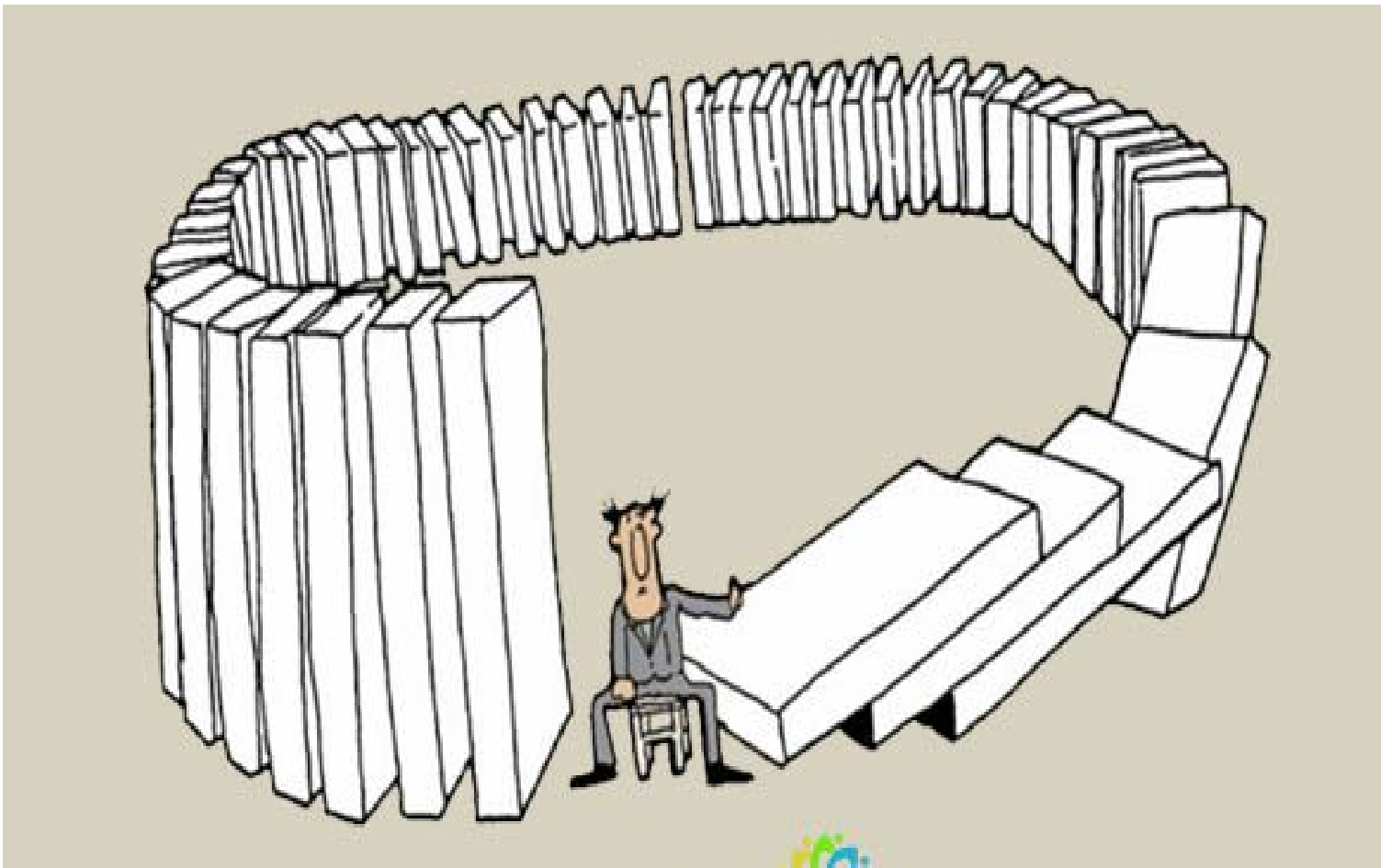


He always goes around with a surprised look on his face.

The way you treat people today is the way you will get treated in the future.

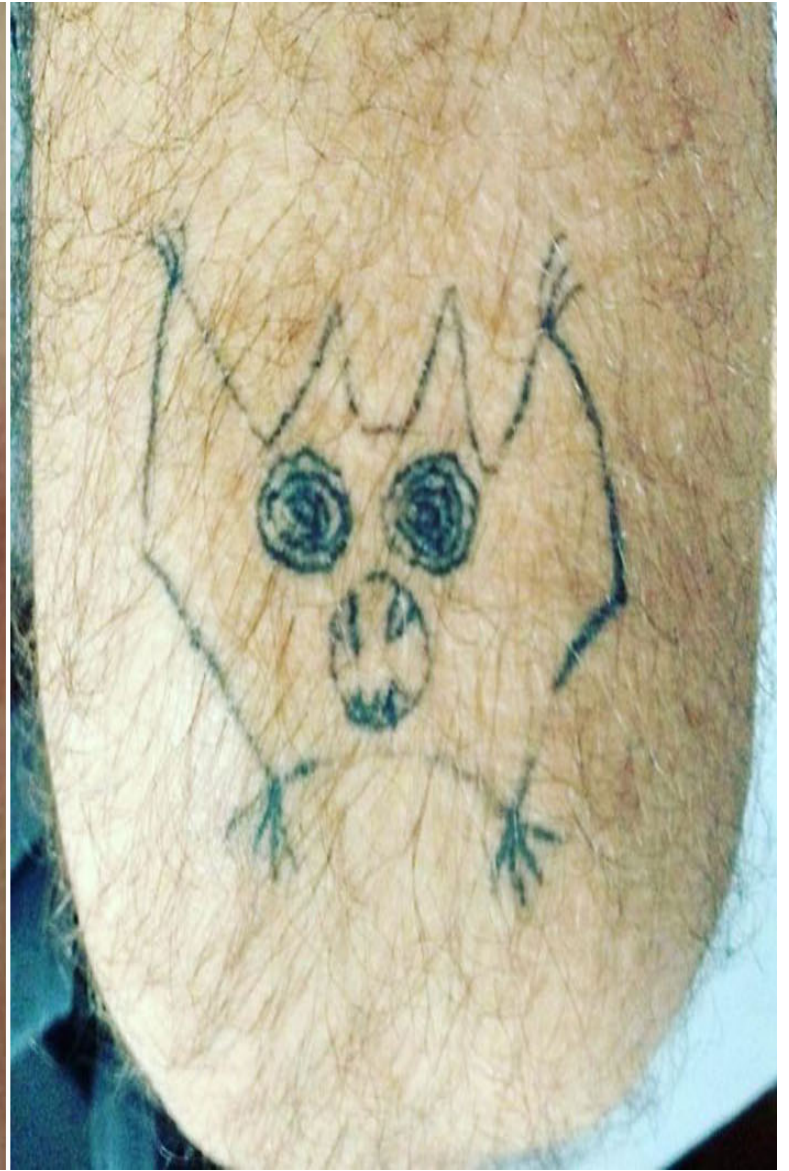


**What goes around comes

To argue or fight.



**The two went at it for over
an hour on who had the
worst tattoo.**

Phrasal Verb **go away**

To travel.



When you go away this summer, are you going to get a tattoo?

Phrasal Verb **go away**
To leave.



After getting a tattoo,
I told the artist to go away.

Phrasal Verb **go away**

No longer noticeable.



**The skin is slightly red,
but it should go away
in several days.**

Phrasal Verb **go back**

To return.



**Should I go back and get
another tattoo?**

Phrasal Verb **go back**

Fail to do something.



**You promised me a good
tattoo; you went back on
your word.**

*Enough
bad
tattoos!*

Phrasal Verb **go by**
To be used as a name.



**My name is Robert,
but I go by the name of
Chris P. Lettuce.**

Phrasal Verb **go by**

Passing time without doing much.



**They are sitting on the
dock of the bay and
watching the world go by.**

Phrasal Verb **go down**

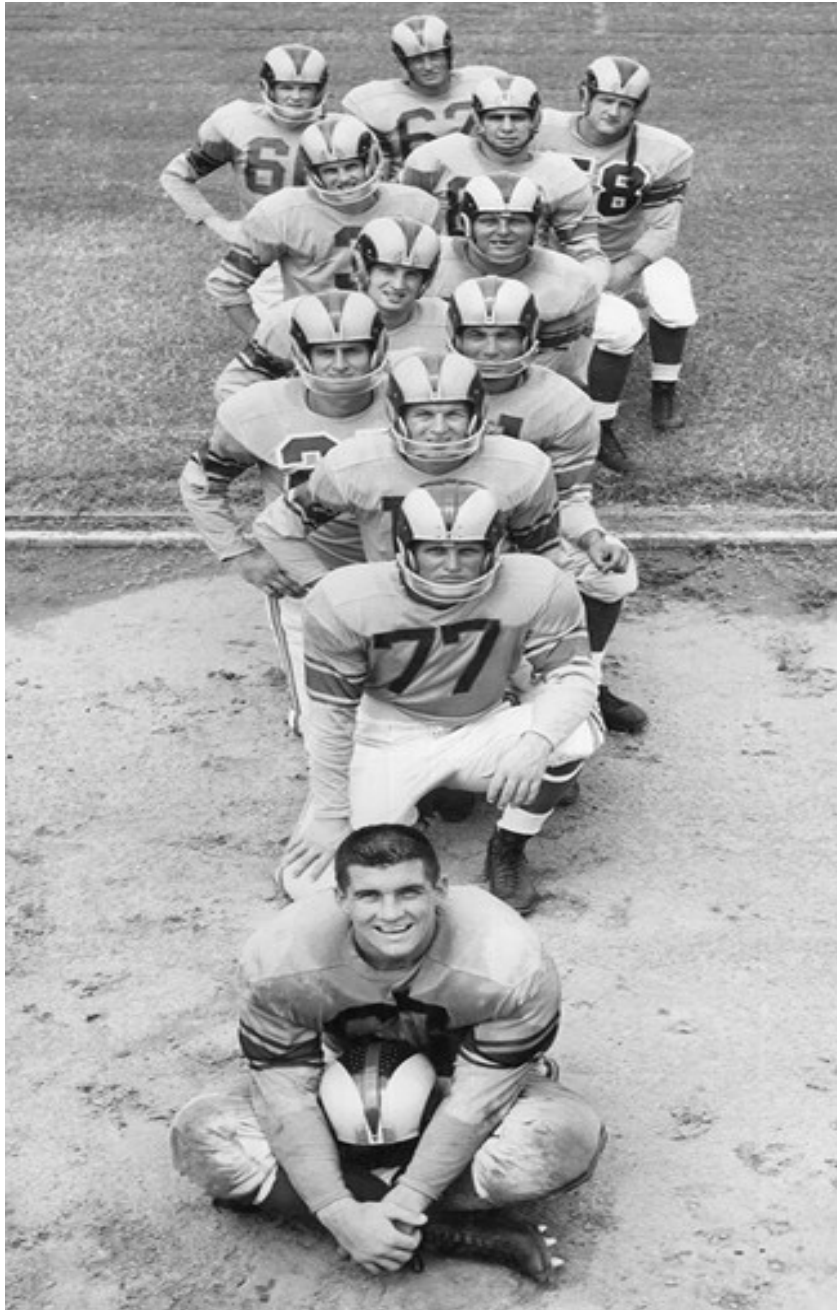
***Go down* has many definitions.
Most of them mean to decrease
(from higher to lower).**

How something is remembered.



**That will go down as the

(off-line).**

doesn't go down.**

Phrasal Verb **go for**
To try for something.



**Are you going to go for
a world record one day?**

Go for it is another common phrase.

Phrasal Verb **go for**
Applies to others.



**Don't eat my food.
That goes for you too!**

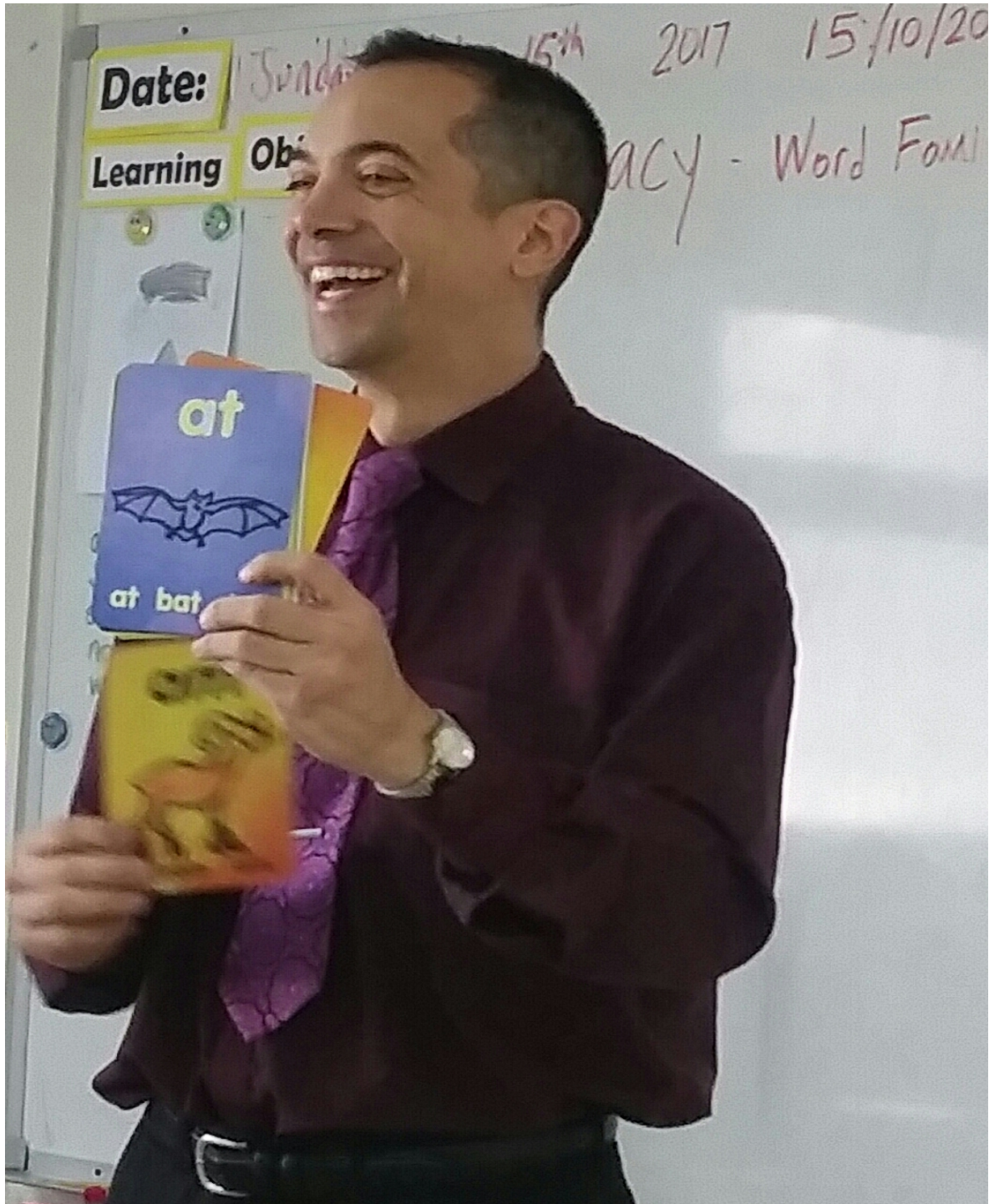
Phrasal Verb **go for**
To be sold for an amount.



I expect the car to go for
\$1,000,000.

Phrasal Verb **go into**

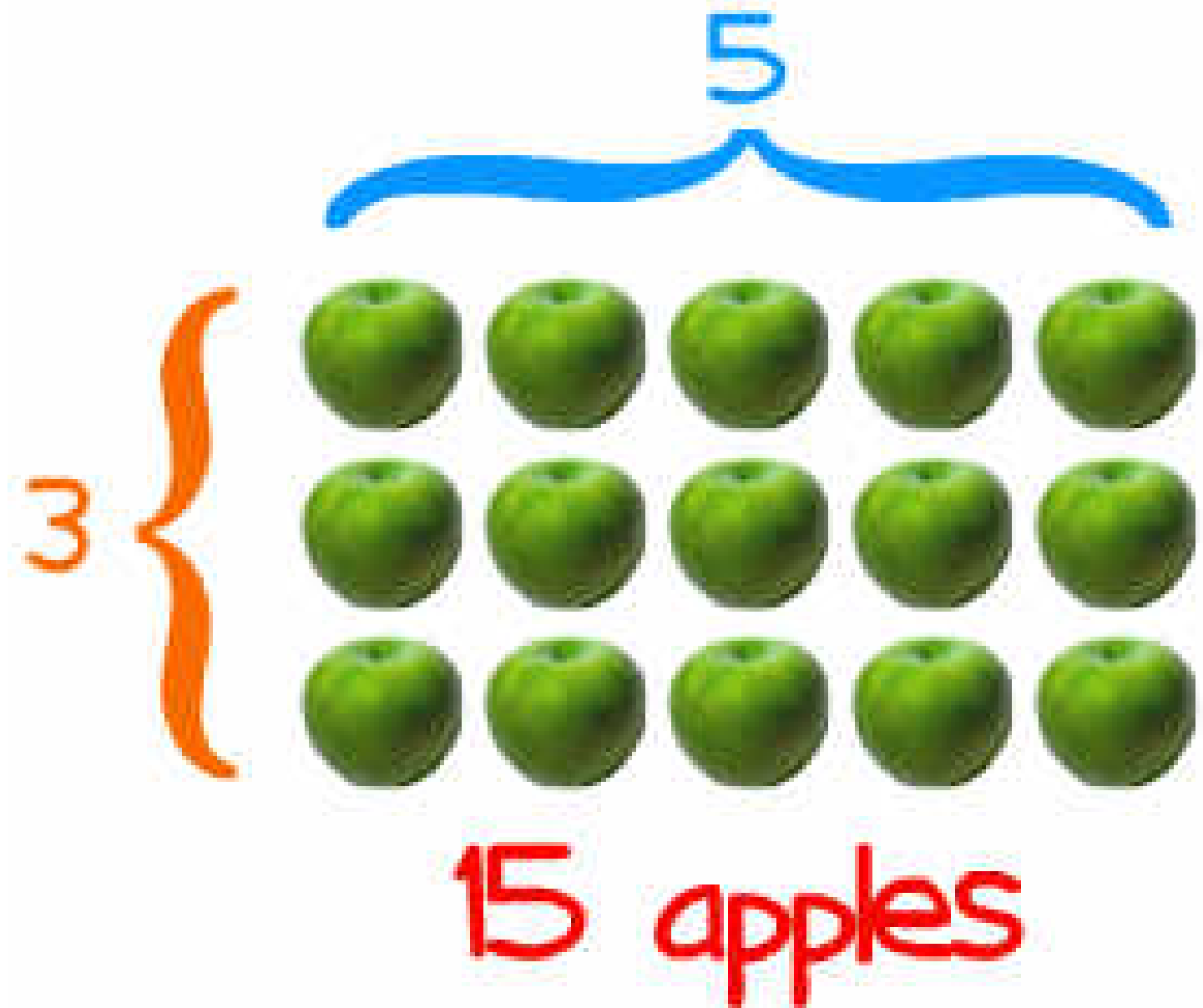
To enter a profession.



I decided to go into teaching.

Phrasal Verb **go into**

A smaller number into
a larger number.



**Five goes into fifteen
three times.**

Yes,
more bad
tattoos.

To talk in depth about something.



**Please go into detail of
what you want.**

Phrasal Verb **go off**

To become angry.



**Don't go off on me;
you asked for a tattoo.**

Phrasal Verb **go off**

To explode (literally or figuratively).



This bomb won't go off.

Phrasal Verb **go off**

To make a noise.



**The alarm went off at 6 A.M.
She completed the drawing
at 6:01 A.M.**

tattoo artist.

Phrasal Verb **go off**
To suddenly stop working.



The power went off;
therefore, the tattoo was not
completed.

Phrasal Verb **go off**

A gun that accidentally fires.



**Be careful, the gun may
be loaded and go off.**

OK, I had to show a well placed tattoo.

Phrasal Verb **go on**

To continue.



Life goes on,
regardless of a bad portrait
tattoo on your body.

Phrasal Verb **go on**

Talking too much and annoying others.



She went on (and on) about her beautiful tattoo.

Phrasal Verb **go on**
Evidence.



The police had little to go on,
other than she had light
brown hair.

Phrasal Verb **go on**

To travel.



I am going on a vacation to
the trapezius... I mean
Greenland.

Phrasal Verb **go on**

What's happening.



I haven't seen you in a while.
What's going on?

To take a drug.

go on a different medication?**

**Go on, tell me how much
you like my tattoos.**

To leave the house (usually for fun).

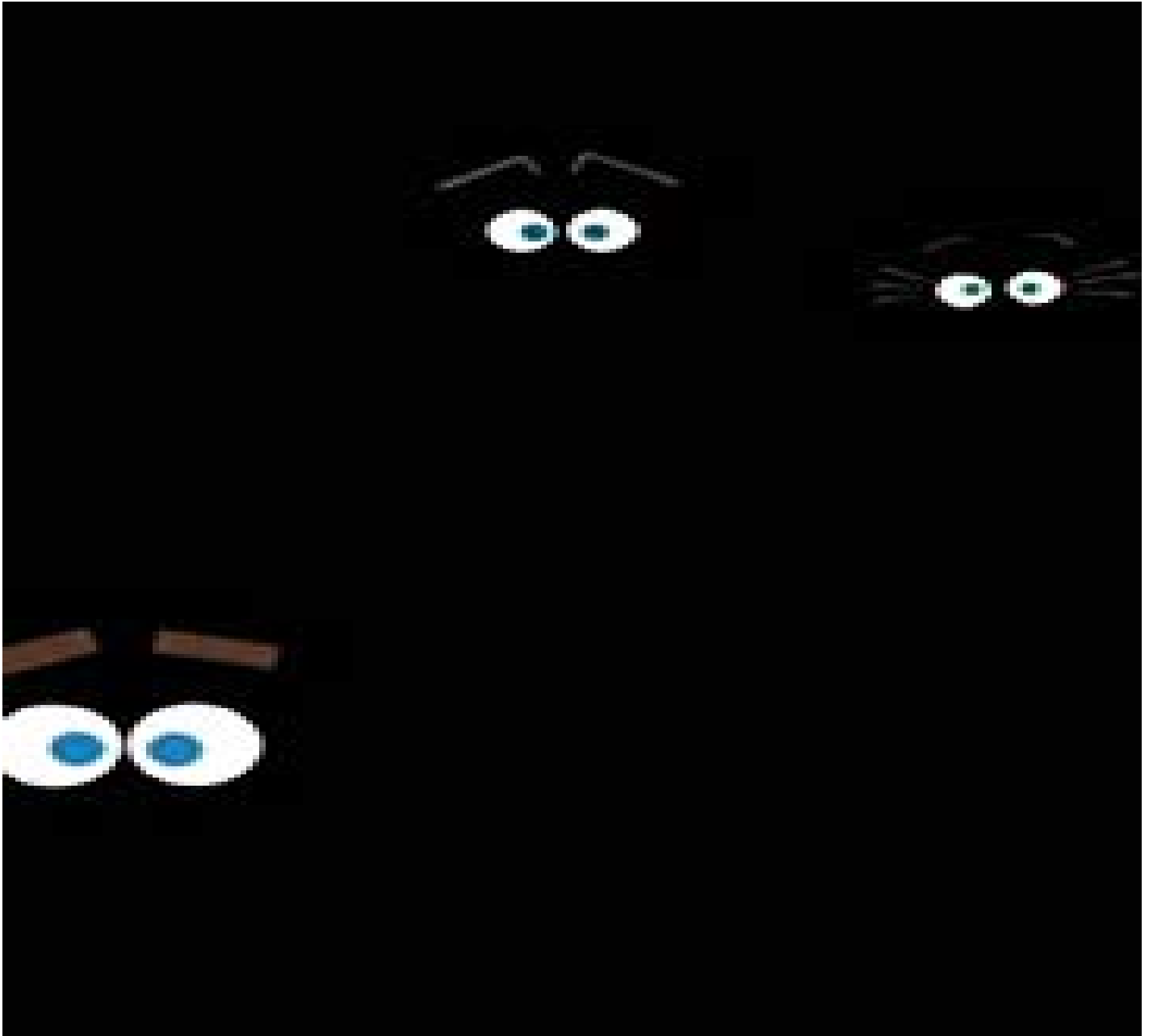


**She is going to go out for...

Phrasal Verb **go out**

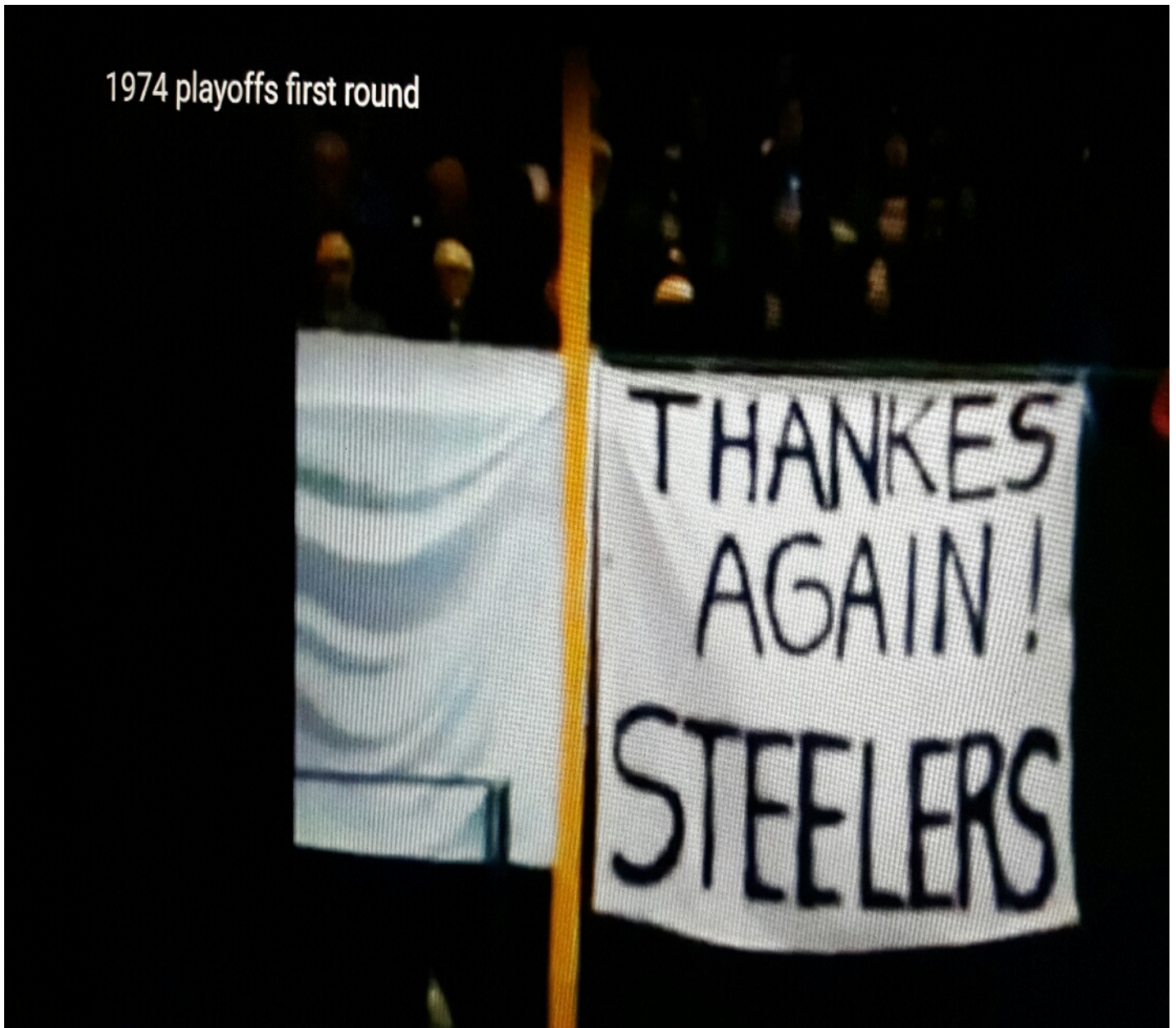
To be injured.

Phrasal Verb **go over**

To check something.



**Please go over what you wrote
and correct any errors.**

Phrasal Verb **go over**

To practice something.



Actors must go over their lines so they don't forget when the cameras are on.

Phrasal Verb **go over**

To travel a short or long distance.



They went over to his house for dinner.

Phrasal Verb **go over**

How people react (good or bad).



**The public debate
went over well.**

Phrasal Verb **go past**
To move pass a location.



**Go past the clothespin and
then walk for two minutes.**

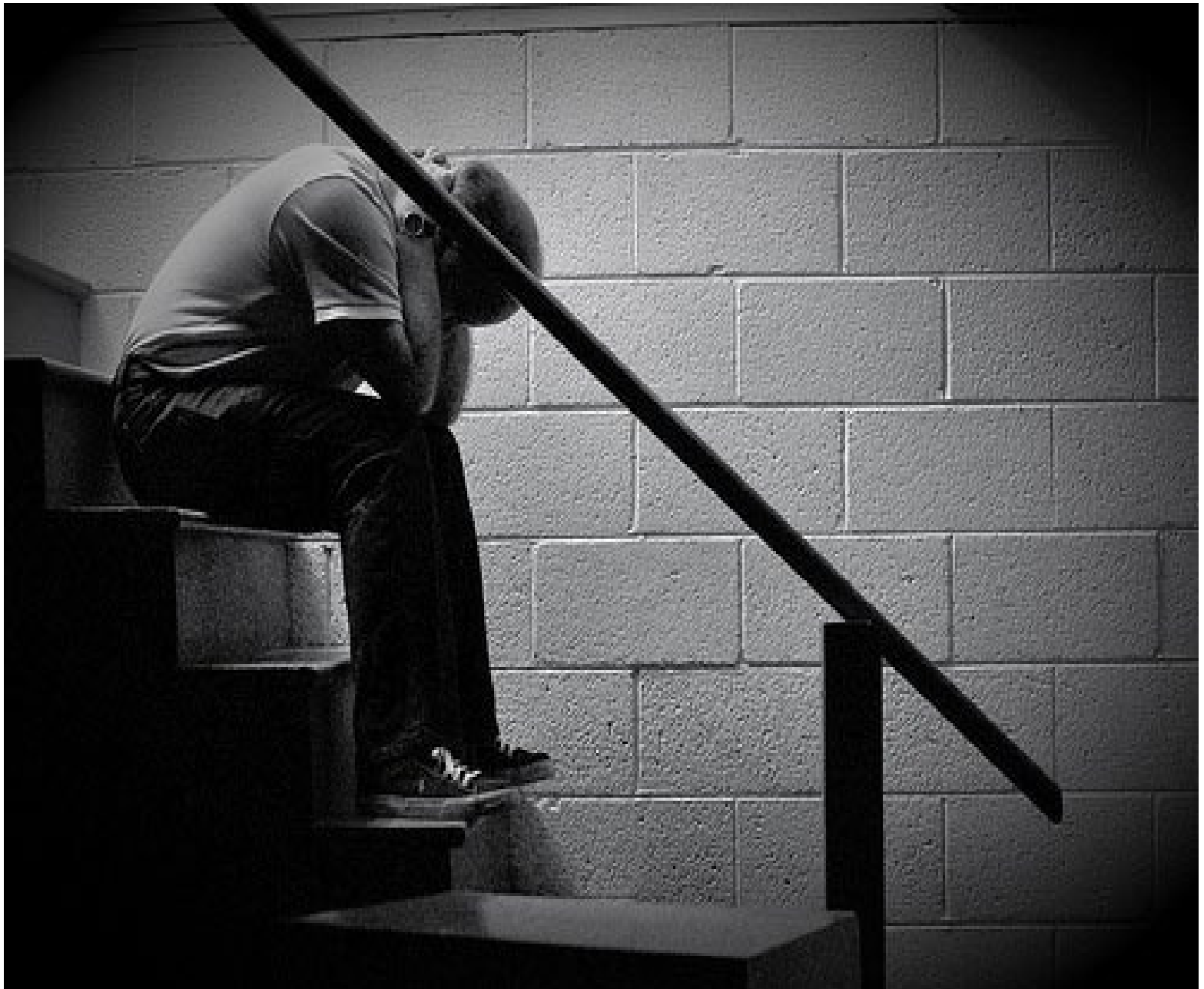
Phrasal Verb **go through**
To search for something.



I went through my entire house, but I still couldn't find my house key.

Phrasal Verb **go through**

An experience (usually negative).



**He is going through
difficult times.**

Phrasal Verb **go through**

To spend or eat something (quickly).

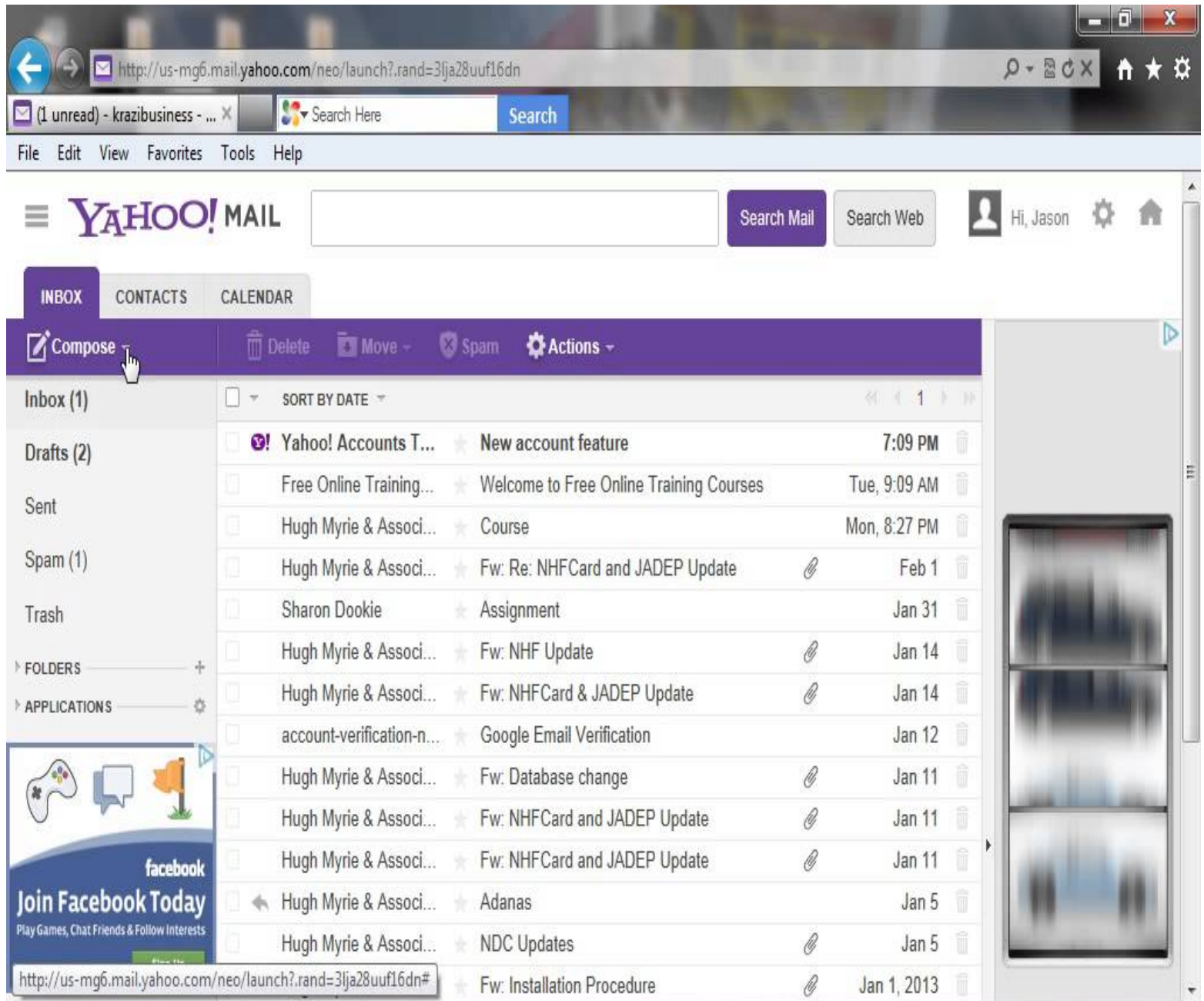


**He went through his money
in one day.**

Money down the drain is to waste money.

From one location to another.



Did the email go through?

Phrasal Verb **go through**

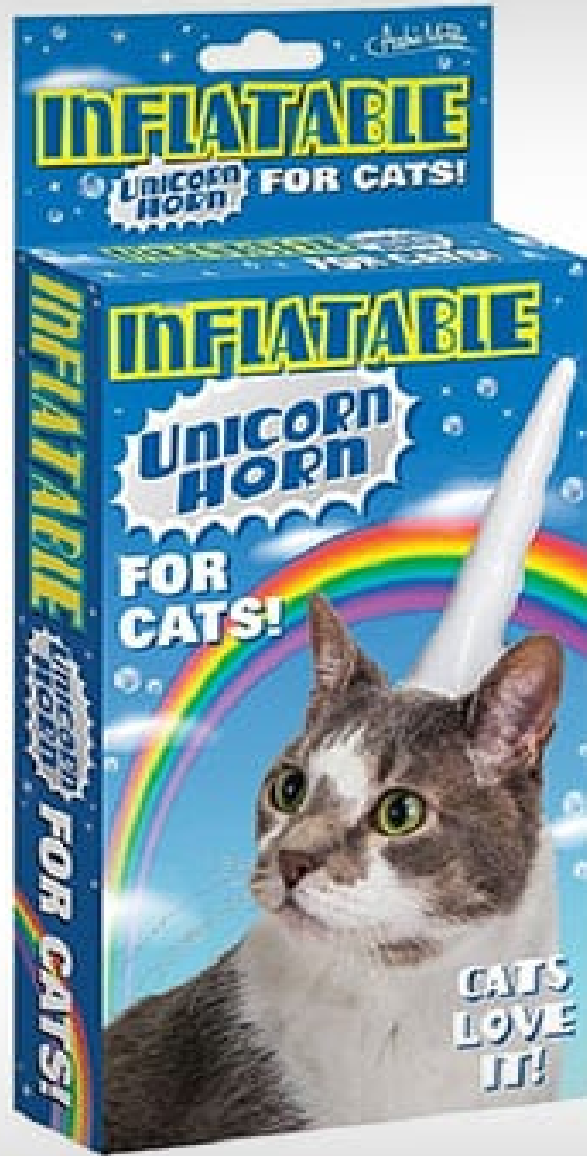
To wear out.

To do something as planned.

To attend.

Seriously, they have a gallery devoted to this garbage.

Phrasal Verb **go towards**
To contribute something.



**Yes, 100% of the money
raised goes towards wigs
for bald eagles.**

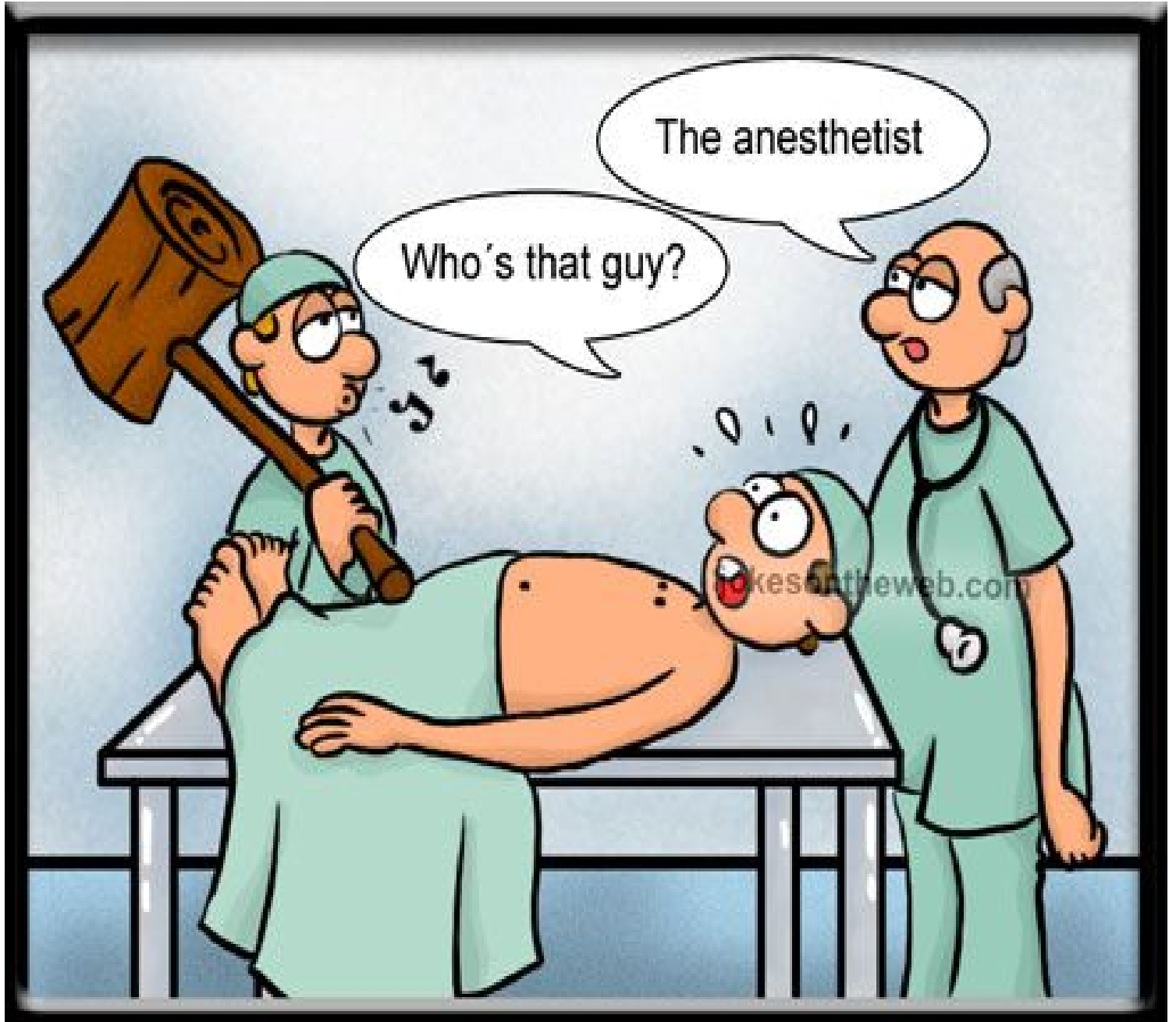
Phrasal Verb **go under**
To fail.

Phrasal Verb **go under**

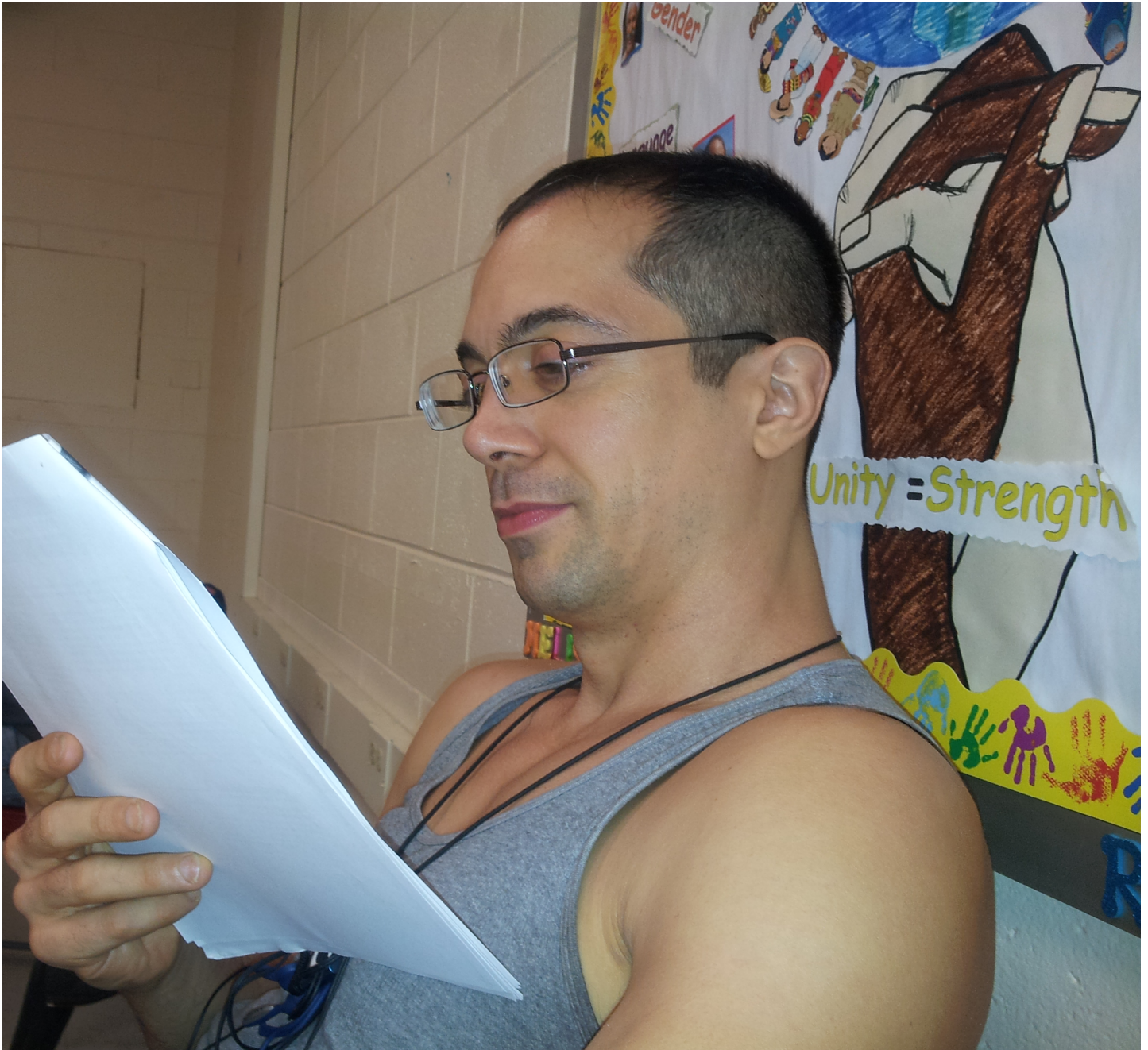
To become unconscious (anesthesia).

To be built.

Engulfed in fire.



**The building went up
in flames.**

To increase.

Not having or doing something.

Start acting like an adult.
