

# LITTLE vs FEW

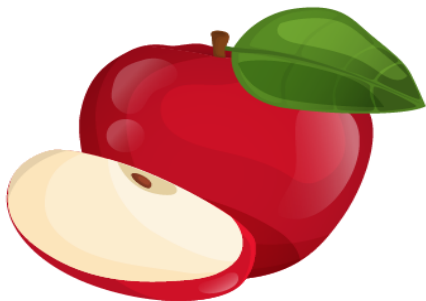
We use **little** before  
uncountable nouns.\*

We use **few** before  
countable nouns.

**a few**

not many, some  
We use A FEW with  
countable nouns in the  
plural

*We've got a few apples.*



**a little**

not much, some  
We use A LITTLE with  
uncountable nouns

*We've only got a little  
money.*
