


Present tense/Base form <u>Please help him push</u> that stone uphill.



Present tense/Base form <u>Please help him push</u> that stone uphill. Simple past <u>No, I pushed it uphill yesterday</u>. that stone uphill.




Present tense/Base form <u>Please</u> help him push that stone uphill.

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Past participle (add a helping verb) He should have pushed a smaller stone.

A helping verb is not needed when a past participle is used as an adjective.




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3rd person, present singular (pushes) Anyone who pushes a stone should rethink life.

Infinitive (to push) <u>I am not going to push a</u> stone; I have a verb worksheet to do.
