

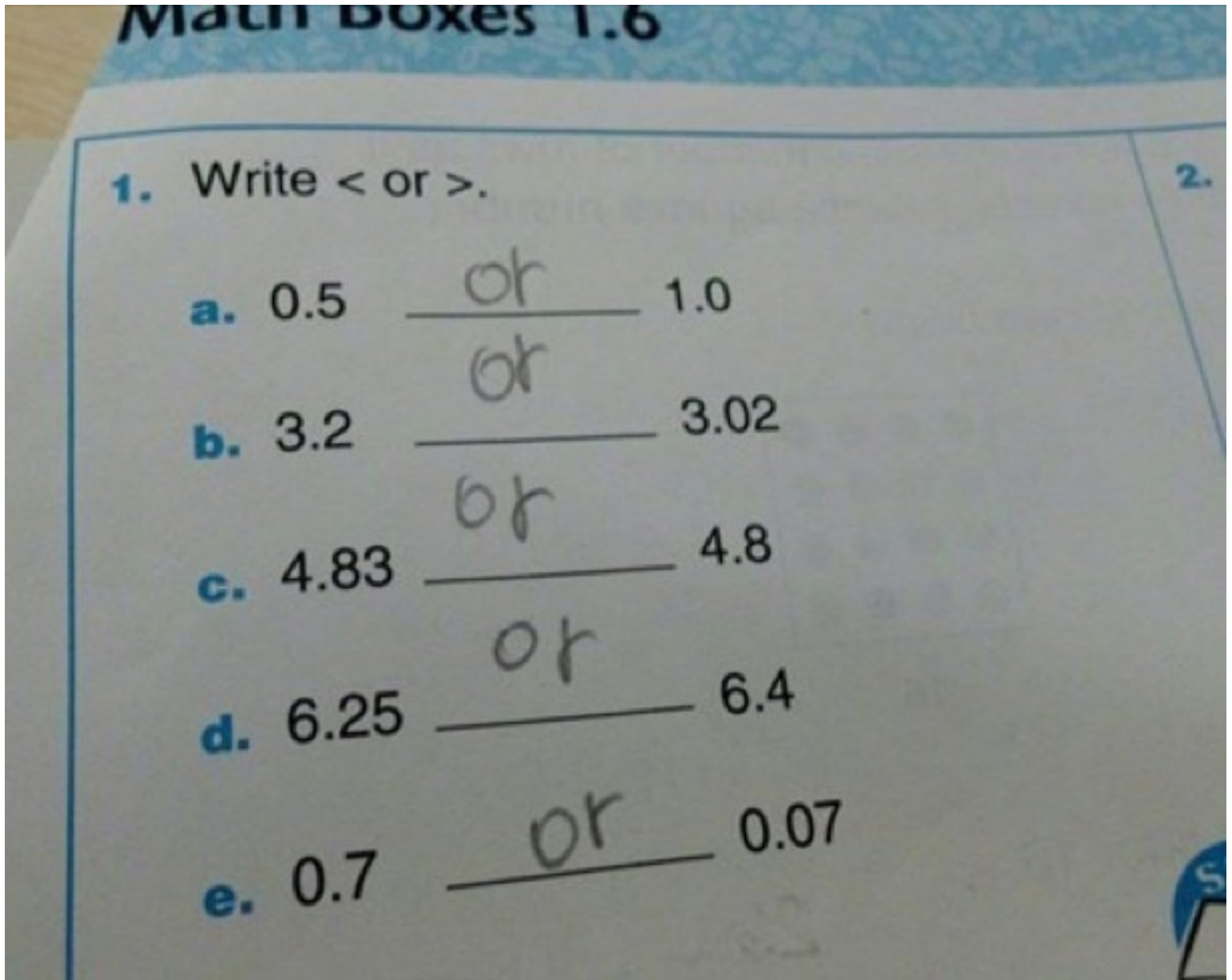
Phrasal Verb **roll in**

Phrasal Verb **roll in**

To arrive (late) in a relaxed manner.



He just rolled in into class
and took the test.

Phrasal Verb **roll out**
To release a new product.



The company just rolled out the temporary hand tattoo.

Phrasal Verb **roll out**

To lazily get out of bed, usually late.



**I can tell by his hair,
he just rolled out of bed.**

Phrasal Verb **roll over**

To put up little or no resistance.



**They
thought
they were
going to
win, but
they got
rolled
over.**

Phrasal Verb **roll up**

To fold something in a tube shape.



Please *roll up* the carpet.

Phrasal Verb **roll up**

To curl up into a ball.



A woodlouse, woodlice is plural,
will roll up if you touch it.

To move a car window in the
up position.

Phrasal Verb **roll up**

To arrive (usually in a car).
